Woodrow Henderson Accidentally Shot With Shotgun by Herbert Clark.

Woodrow Henderson, 11, was accidentally shot and killed by Herbert Clark, 16, on the L. A. Stocks' farm, in Cox Mill section, shortly after the noon hour yesterday.

An investigation of the shooting

was conducted by Coroner E. S. Williams a short time later. The jury returned a vesdict that young Henderson came to his death thru the careless handling of a shotgun by Herbert Clark.

Evidence produced at the inquest revealed the fact that Clark had taken his single barrel shotgun and gone out to shoot a hawk. He came back and sat down on the steps in front of his home, loading and unloading the gun. In some unaccountable manner, the gun was discharged, the load taking effect in Henderson's breast. The gun was loaded with birdshot.

The jury did not recommend the holding of Clark for criminal intent, as evidence tended to show that the shooting was accidental. Young Henderson was buried this afternoon in the church yard at Black Jack. He was a native of





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
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
