Two Score of Towns Under Water Within Radius 100 Miles; Guardsmen Called Out.

Memphis, Tenn., April 27-(AP)-While Louisiana authorities were preparing for the unprecedented ex pedient of deliberately cutting the dykes to save New Orleans from the mighty flood tide sweeping down the Mississippi, situations little short of desperate were presented today in Southeastern Arkansas and the Mississippi delta section.

Two score of towns within a radius of less than 100 miles in the two States were under water with the plight of thousands of refugees described in official reports to Red Cross headquarters here as serious In the extreme

With the raging waters battering at their homes or the levees and knolls upon which they had sought refuge, those in the devastated area were sending out piteous calls for boats, clothing, food and other supplies. Directors of Red Cross relief moved as speedily as possible to render aid.

Almost hourly new groups of refbgees are being found by relief workers as they move by steamer, motor boat or plane over the desolate regions. One such group was found last night on the Mississippi North of Helena. They had been without adequate food for days and had little shelter on the levee perch.

An intrepid little woman, Nell Williams, a Red Cross worker from Bt. Louis, was the first to carry succor to them, braving the raging flood crest in a tiny motor boat alone at night that some measure of relief might be afforded the womon and children at least.

While no new reports of breaks in the levees on either the Mississipni or the Arkansas Rivers were reported overnight the flood waters already released by yawning crevises were rushing over lowlands and through valleys to lay waste new areas and drive more thougands from their homes.







FLIEFS CONQUED TO SAVE HUNDREDS FROM RAGING FLOODS



OVERFLOWING ITS BANKS and tearing down levees in its irresistible sweep to the Gulf of Mexico, the Mississippi River has made thousands of persons homeless and has brought death to more than 100. Towns have been suddenly flooded and their inhabitants swept away or forced to upper stories and roofs. In some places terror-stricken multitudes are marooned on tree tops. Apparently it is their doom to die of hunger or of exposure or of drowning when the waters reach them,



BUT HUNDREDS OF these refugees have been saved through the daring of a handful of aviators, many of whom served in France. Hourly they take their lives in their hands to fly over the stricken areas locating persons in distress. The locations are reported to relief stations and steps are taken for rescue. The aviators have dropped food and medical supplies and mail in many isolated places, preventing starvation, spread of disease and the panie which follows no word from the outside world.
