RESCUE OF 50,000 PERSONS

Craft of Every Type Being Used in Moving Homeless to Concentration Camps.

New Orleans, May 5 .- (AP)-The rescue of fifty thousand men, women and children, thousands of them cornered by repeated breaks in the Mississippi levee during the past four days, became the immediate problem today of the great relief machine of Louisiana.

Craft of almost every type, from the lumbering river steamer to the flat boat propelled by an outboard motor, were converging upon wide stretches of northeastern Louisina, moving the homeless to the safety of concentration camps in many sections of the State and in nearby Mississippi towns.

U. S. Balloonist Captures Laurel

Scott Field, Belleville, Ills., May 5.- (AP)-America apparently had captured another laurel in the conpuest of the air, through the ascension of Captain Hawthorne C Gray, army aeronaut vesterday to a height of approximately 41,000 feet. It is believed this is the highest altitude ever attained in a free halloon. From his basket he sureyed the earth from a distance nearly eight miles.

What are overtones?

When we set anything such as a tightly stretched string connected to a sounding board vibrating, it sends ont a powerful or fundamental wave. It also sends out many other related waves. These secondary vaves are called overtones.
