RESCUE OF 50,000 PERSONS
CORNERED BY LEVEE BREAKS
PROBLEM OF RELIEF BODIES

Craft of Every Type
Being Used in Moving
Homeless to Concentration Camps.

New Orleans, May 5.—(AP)—The rescue of fifty thousand men, women and children, thousands of them cornered by repeated breaks in the Mississippi levee during the past four days, became the immediate problem today of the great relief machine of Louisiana.

Craft of almost every type, from the lumbering river steamer to the flat boat propelled by an outboard motor, were converging upon wide stretches of northeastern Louisiana, moving the homeless to the safety of concentration camps in many sections of the State and in nearby Mississippi towns.

Directing the rescue work from the air were many swift seaplanes of the navy.

Playing a prominent part were bronzed life savers of the light-house department men who have fought the mountainous waves of the Atlantic, the Gulf and the Great Lakes for years to find a new and strange enemy in the roaring waters of a mighty river writhing in the northward, other battles go for in history.

As the rescue goes forward many heart rending scenes are enacted. Tiny children literally dazed by a catastrophe new in their lives cling to their mothers and fathers, and to allay those of their fears and anxiety to allay those of their offspring.

Occasionally as the caravans move slowly to the highland groups of negroes began to chant their favorite ditty, their spirits undimmed by even the worst of the many floods they have survived.

With the marchers go horses, mules, cattle, pigs and many varieties of fowl, but not all of the livestock will be saved. Many have been caught in the flood, to swim until exhaustion has made them a prey to the murky waters.

As this fight for life proceeds to the northward, other battle go forward over wide fronts to the south and west. At the bottom of the funnel shaped flooded area engineers and laborers pit their wits and brawn against the great mass of water bearing down from the north in the effort to divert it back into the Mississippi and so save the rich sugar cane belt in the south central part of the State.

U. S. Balloonist
Captures Laurel

Scott Field, Belleville, Ills., May 5.—(AP)—America apparently had captured another laurel in the conquest of the air, through the ascension of Captain Hawthorne C. Gray, army aviator yesterday to a height of approximately 41,000 feet. It is believed this is the highest altitude ever attained in a free balloon. From his basket he surveyed the earth from a distance of nearly eight miles.

While the sealed altimeter remained to be celebrated by the Bureau of Standards at Washington, Captain Gray said he checked his instruments at 40,000 feet and found them to be accurate.

Starting at 1:33 p. m., Captain Gray piloted his balloon to its maximum height until a pain in his chest forced him to descend after his instruments indicated he had reached his goal.

The previous record was less than 36,000 feet, made by two German balloonists. He landed at four p. m. at Golden Gate, Ills., more than 300 miles away.

Captain Hawthorne Gray, who yesterday established a new world's altitude record for free balloons, last year landed near Mount Holly N. C. in the American Bennett Cup qualifications race. He had started from Little Rock.

Funeral services were conducted this afternoon, burial following in the Galloway burying ground in Chicago section. Six girl school-mates acted as active pall bearers.

FINE SERMON
LAST EVENING

Rev. R. G. McCless De-
livered Brilliant Dis-
course at Presbyterian
Church.

At 8 o'clock services in the Presbyterian Church last evening a large crowd assembled despite the falling rain at that hour. A great sermon was delivered by R. G. McCless, D. D., Chatham, Virginia, and attention lagged not for a moment. The evangelist's text was "Pilate answered, What I Have Written, I Have Written." John 19:22.

Pilate officially wrote the accusation of Jesus and had it placed on His cross above His head. "Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews," and the Jews besought him to change it to read "He said He was King of the Jews." Pilate refused. What I have written I have written. I have done that and I am done with it. I want no more to do with it. The whole matter is over; I am finally done with it.

Nay, nay Pilate, you are not done with it for it is fixed and you cannot undo it. You have upon your hands the greatest crime in all history, and it is fixed upon you; it is irremediable. Ten thousand Jews from every part of the inhabited earth are gathered here and will carry back to their lands the story of your deed. They will tell it to their children, and they to their children.

Widow's Story
Confirms First
Belief of Murder

St. Louis, May 5.—(AP)—The first intimate story of the fears that beset Clifford M. Hicks, slain last week partner of former Governor Elliott W. Major, today appeared to confirm the belief of chief of detectives Kaiser that the young Sunday school superintendent was killed by gangsters. The story was told by the former minister's comely widow who emerged from seclusion for the first time last night.

Dressed in mourning costume, Mrs. Hicks sat in the living room of the Hicks home and unfolded a picture of the agitation and fears which pursued her husband for a week before his bullet riddled body was found outside of the city.

She told of Hicks' increasing nervousness after he reported being held up and robbed of \$5,000 Thursday night before his death Saturday. He sat at home silently weeping.

"Those fellows are after me," was the only explanation he would give she said, and by those fellows she understood the two bandits who robbed him April 20. Not to alarm Mrs. Hicks, who is an expectant mother, he would say no more, she said, but others told her that he said he had been threatened.

Bad Flood News
Government Should Pay.
A Magician Speaks.
Labor—British, Italian.

More bad news from the flooded regions. Floods in the sugar belts bankrupt farmers. Thousands of acres of cotton destroyed. The fact that other cotton will sell for a higher price is small comfort.

Demonstrations of bolshevik in this national disaster have been innumerable. Consider the diver, weighted down with one hundred pounds of lead, struggling against a powerful 68 foot flood to plant dynamite under the ledge of a levee.

The government has wondered what to do with surplus taxes. It might use a few hundred millions to indemnify victims of the Mississippi flood. If government had used its brains and money and had done its duty, in years past, the flood would not have occurred.

For a change, a fortune teller and "magician" speaks the truth. Looking into his crystal ball or deck of cards, he says Mrs. Snyder and Gray, accused with her of murder, hypnotized themselves and each other and did not know what they were doing.

That probably is the best description of the "important crime." However, rough justice through the ages has made it a habit to deprive of life or liberty those possessing this faculty of auto-hypnotism. That has caused such hypnosis gradually to decrease.

Mussolini also seems to understand hypnotism. Twenty thousand farm laborers in one district accepted without murmur a cut in their pay. They wish to "co-operate with Fascism," and make it more efficient.

Ancient Greeks, two thousand years, and more, before Mussolini started, showed the same quality. Asked to decide whether a great sum should be divided among the citizens or kept for national defense, they voted to use the money for defense.

British labor is excited about a proposed law to prevent national or "general" strikes.

Labor says it has a right to do as it chooses. Britain's government says: "You have no right to tie up the nation."

The world at large admits that it would be outrageous to allow a minority, even of union labor men, to rule a nation. British labor will say: "You Yankees find no difficulty about allowing a small minority of capitalists to rule your country." Possibly, but that is something else and besides, we are used to it, and we are ruled, on the whole, rather well.

Professor Roop says, teaching a materialistic conception of the universe is chiefly responsible for student suicides.

If that's true, something should be done about it, especially for students that find thinking a painful suicidal process.

On the other hand statistics will not show that in the past year the number of student suicides, is not equal to the number of people murdered by religious fanatics.

The wise thing is to go back to Aristotle, "Not too much, not too little."

The administration denies that Mr. MacMurray will resign as Minister to Peking because this government refuses to join other powers in refusing China. The public is interested to hear that Mr. MacMurray will not resign. But if he thinks he should overrule the opinions of the President and the American people, the public also would like to know what reason there is for keeping him in China.

For Affiliation
With Christians

Raleigh, May 5.—(AP)—While the Carolina Council of Congregational churches stood adjourned today, the joint ecclesiastical advisory council, composed of representatives from seven Christian churches and seven Congregational churches, today met to formally approve the proposal to affiliate the First Christian Church in Raleigh with the Christian denomination.

Reverend Jason Noble Pierce, pastor of the First Christian Church, Washington, D. C., known as the President of the Council and Dr. William E. Barton of Detroit, Mich., past moderator of the National Council of Congregational Churches will speak tonight in celebration of the union of the Raleigh Christian Church.

Support of prohibition and opposition to war were echoed in virtually all addresses before the two-day meeting.

CONVENTION
IS AGAINST
EVOLUTION

Flying Fundamental-
ists Vote For Legisla-
tion Against Evolu-
tion Hypothesis.

Atlanta, May 5.—(AP)—Resolutions in support of a nation-wide movement for anti-evolution legislation were adopted by the World's Christian Fundamentalists Association in convention here today.

An organization known as the "Flying Fundamentalists" already existing in Kansas will be enlarged and commissioned "to mould sentiment against the evolutionary hypothesis, and get voters educated to the place where they will express themselves through the ballot as the fundamentalists wish," said the Rev. Gerald B. Winrod, Wichita, Kans.

As a preliminary step the convention approved plans to inspect and perfect the word of all anti-evolution measures before they were introduced. Such a step, it was said, would give the bills a better show for passage by State legislatures.

"We realize," said Reverend Winrod, "that it will take a long time—perhaps years—of effort, before we accomplish our desired ends. But as was the case with prohibition, we can win out in the long run and it is a program to that end that we are outlining."

RELAY RACE
TOMORROW

One Hundred and
Eighty Runners to
Start From Court
House at 1:30

The relay race between Washington and Greenville will begin tomorrow at one thirty from the front of the Pitt County courthouse. One hundred and eighty four runners will participate in the event, and great interest should be manifested by Greenville people.

This is the third race of this type and is run in the following manner: A message is given each of the beginning runners. They run four hundred and forty yards and give it to the next set of runners who in turn do the same to their successors until the message has reached the addressee in front of the postoffice at Washington.

Those who follow the runners are asked to keep at a safe distance from the judges car so that an accurate time can be checked on each participant of the race.

HENRY JUDD GRAY
FACES CROSS-FIRE
EXAMINATION TODAY

New York, May 5.—(AP)—Henry Judd Gray began his ordeal of cross-examination by counsel for his co-defendant, Mrs. Ruth Snyder, with unflinching manner today.

In the first few moments of cross-examination he was forced to leave his seat and demonstrate how he had beaten Albert Snyder over the head with a window weight. He did this without apparent emotion, lifting his arms and bringing them down like a wood chopper.

Mrs. Snyder averted her gaze during the demonstration and kept her head bowed until the noon recess.

MARTIAL LAW
IN LITTLE ROCK

Militiamen With Fixed
Bayonets Greet
Citizens Following
Lynching Last Night

Little Rock, Ark., May 5.—(AP)—Militiamen with fixed bayonets greeted residents of Little Rock today after a night of disorder during which a negro was lynched, his body dragged through the business section, and burned while thousands looked on.

Fear of serious racial trouble caused Governor Martineau to order out a National Guard Company for all-night patrol duty and himself to speed homeward on a special train from Van Buren, where yesterday he attended a strawberry festival.

By midnight, after hundreds of armed men had paraded the streets in automobiles, firing volley after volley of shots into the air, the National Guard had virtually cleared the streets and gained control of the situation.

The Governor acted when informed that local authorities were rendered helpless by angry crowds which invaded the negro quarter. The negro lynched was John Carter, 38, who was said to have admitted attacking two white women early yesterday.

One of the women, Miss Glennie Stewart, identified him and stood a short distance away when he was lynched. Her mother, Mrs. B. E. Stewart, was in a hospital.

He attacked them with a iron bar as they rode near the city in a wagon.

The mob and posses of officers captured him in woods near the city and the mob, numbering several hundred persons, took charge. The negro was hanged from a telephone pole, riddled with bullets and then cut down and dragged by an automobile through business thoroughfare.

In a street bordering the negro section the body was covered with gasoline and burned.

Another negro found armed in the crowd was beaten and threatened with death but was rescued and sent to a hospital. A white youth, Robert Love, was slightly injured by one of the many bullets fired at random by the mob.

CALL TROOPS
QUELL STRIKE
PRISON FARM

Wilson and Warren-
ton National Guards
Ordered to Halifax
County Today

Raleigh, May 5.—(AP)—Governor McLean today ordered out National Guard soldiers to quell a strike at the Halifax county prison farm.

Adjutant General Van Metts dispatched Company B, rifle outfit, Warrenton, and Company M, machine gun unit, Wilson, to the scene.

A long distance telephone call to George Ross Pou, state prison superintendent, who had left yesterday for the farm brought in information that 400 white prisoners were striking for a minimum of 55 hours work a week and one-half day holiday on Saturday.

Mr. Pou said the trouble started yesterday when the prisoners became angry and broke out the windows.

The water supply has been cut off and the prisoners have had no food since yesterday evening, Mr. Pou said.

Mr. Pou said at least \$500 worth of property had been torn up.

"Everything in sight has been torn up," Mr. Pou told the Associated Press. "Last night the men, who work like any other men do on a farm, from sunup to sundown, demanded a 55 hour week. We will never accede to the demand. The men are locked in their cells and are being watched by the 170 honor prisoners who are going about their work as though nothing had happened."

"The men last night tore up all their beds, broke out the windows, smashed the lights, tore up the washstands, laid low everything that could be destroyed before the guards rushed them back to their cells."

"Then we turned off the water and they have had no food since yesterday evening. I came to the camp yesterday afternoon on private advice of trouble brewing and we hoped to avoid trouble, but it broke last night."

"I recommended to Governor McLean this morning that two units of the National Guard be held in readiness only, but the Attorney General and Adjutant General, decided to send the troops to the farm here as a precautionary measure."

Tear bombs have been ordered from the National Guard headquarters at Richmond, Va.

Mrs. J. Hudson Crockett, 31, died at the Pitt Community hospital last night at 10:45 o'clock. Mrs. Crockett had been ill only a few days, and her death was received as a distinct shock to numbers of her friends throughout this and other sections.

The body will be shipped to Norfolk tonight at 1:30, and burial will take place tomorrow afternoon.

Mrs. Crockett had been making her home in an apartment with Mrs. Nannie D. Holloman, on Fifth street, since last September when she first moved to Greenville.

Mrs. Crockett was born in Norfolk, Virginia, Dec. 11, 1896, and had made her home there until Mr. Crockett became a representative of the Texas Oil Company in Greenville several months ago. She was a member of the Episcopal church of Norfolk.

Mrs. Crockett made numbers of friends in Greenville who will be deeply grieved to learn of her death.

EFFICIENCY
IN BUSINESS
CONSIDERED

Southern Baptist Face
Drastic Changes in
Policies at Louisville
Convention.

Louisville, May 5.—(AP)—The Southern Baptist convention today considered discussion of possibly the most vital report of its meeting that is the committee on business efficiency which has aroused widespread discussion among the messengers since its presentation.

A number of rather drastic changes are incorporated in the recommendations of this committee presented by its chairman, Dr. Austin Church of Murfreesboro, Tenn. and for this reason action on its approval or rejection as a whole or in part was deferred for 24 hours. Executive officers planned to interrupt the scheduled program of this afternoon to allow free discussion of various phases of the report and it was anticipated that heated debate will be heard on many points. The main feature of the report embody recommendations for enlarged activity of the executive committee of the convention and the curtailment of abolition of several boards now in existence.

At the same time discussion will be held on the report of the special committee appointed yesterday to consider the address of Dr. George W. McDaniel, retired president. These recommendations contain two points on which there has been some difference of opinion. A majority of members of the committee favor inclusion in theological education and ministerial relief, declaring that other causes should be handled by state conventions and secondly a minority of the committee is opposed to a request for cash offerings during the Christmas holidays for home and foreign mission boards in addition to a membership campaign with the goal of a tithe as the minimum contribution.

A short program of the convention last night included a report of the inter-board commission, the American Baptist Theological Seminary report and the report of the Education Board.

DECLINES TO
DISCUSS DEBT
WITH BRITISH

Kellogg Tells British
That Discussion With
Hibben Was Purely
Domestic.

Washington, May 5.—(AP)—Great Britain has sought an unofficial restatement from the Washington Government arising from Secretary Mellon's letter to President Hibben of Princeton University regarding the British war debt, but Secretary Kellogg in a two paragraph note, has replied the discussion was purely domestic and no desire for diplomatic exchanges is entertained.

To the opinion expressed in the British note, however, that Mr. Mellon's letter was in some instances inaccurate and that some declaration seemed advisable "to remove the unfortunate impression that has been created," the American Treasury Secretary countered with a lengthy statement devoted to the defense of his Hibben communication and a reiteration that "the relation of war debts would place an unjust burden upon the American people."

Specifically the British note complained against what it termed the misleading impression given by Mr. Mellon that Great Britain debt payments to the United States will not constitute a drain on England's economic resources and that she is receiving in reparations from other nations more than her payments to the American Treasury.

Some three thousand spectators assembled on the campus an hour before time for the performance to begin. DO LIKEWISE

A lad of 16 years, who for four months has been confined in a hospital, sent 25 cents to Henry M. Baker, head of the flood disaster relief work, and with it a letter stating that the quarter is all that he has to give but that he hopes it will help some in the great relief work. While the quarter is but a mite in comparison with the great need in the flooded area, the beautiful spirit behind the donation is an example which, if followed by the citizens of our nation, would bring immediate relief to the hundreds of thousands of homeless in the flood swept territory. Day in and day out year after year the American Red Cross stands ready and willing to rush all possible aid for the relief of suffering humanity and to do this much money is needed. The present disaster is one of the greatest that has ever befallen this country, and the people of the nation have been asked for ten million dollars to be used in the relief work. So far little more than half the amount asked of the nation has been raised, and the percentage for the response of the nation as a whole, is not different from that of the people of this immediate community.

The local chapter of the Red Cross was asked for \$1,500 as its part in this great work for the relief of the sufferers, but so far but little more than half the amount asked has been contributed. We feel sure that the people of this community are amply able and willing to do their part in the time of need and we feel that procrastination alone is responsible for the fact that the local quota has not already been over-subscribed.

Cold, hunger and disease are a part of the sufferings of the homeless refugees in the flood area, and only by prompt action can a further spread of the sufferings be checked. Immediate action on the part of citizens of this county might save hundreds

of lives, while still further delay no doubt will mean that our contributions will be too late to do the most good.

The relief of the suffering is a part of the duty of every citizen, and now is the time for every one to take a part.

Whatever you feel you can give, give it now.

NO REGARD FOR PRIVILEGE

Rightly declaring that the investigation of the charge of graft against the State Board of Health should be thorough and without regard for special privilege, the Raleigh Times says:

"There will be no two ways of thinking concerning Governor McLean's decision to have a thorough investigation of the Board of Health and his direction to the Attorney General to use his power of subpoena to make it effective.

The investigation is to be made broader than the specific charges of graft, which is as well as not. If there is

anything the matter with the Board of Health, if it functions in an oppressive manner, it should by all means be known. If, on the other hand, it is following faithfully the precedents set for it by Doctor Lewis and by Doctor Rankin, we should have that reassurance.

The painful thing has been that direct charges of graft were made on the Senate floor. They were made in so many words. Agents were charged with selling sanitary devices at certain prices and pocketing a share of the profits. Senator Rivers Johnson made these charges in the open, for the world to hear. He has never retracted them. For some reason he has never attempted to support them.

Senator Johnson was privileged in his remarks in the Senate. He will be no less privileged if he testifies under oath in an inquiry conducted by the Attorney General. If he knows anything, if he can give us any lead to crookedness, the

Board of Health as well as the public should have the benefit of his knowledge.

There is this badge of a white-wash that does not look well. Mr. Brummitt is quoted as suggesting that remarks made in the Senate cannot properly be followed up in an inquiry. That is a construction to make an abuse of privilege. What a man says in the Senate cannot be used again him; but he has no right to voice there a criminal indictment

affecting a public agency into which the State shall be prohibited from inquiring.

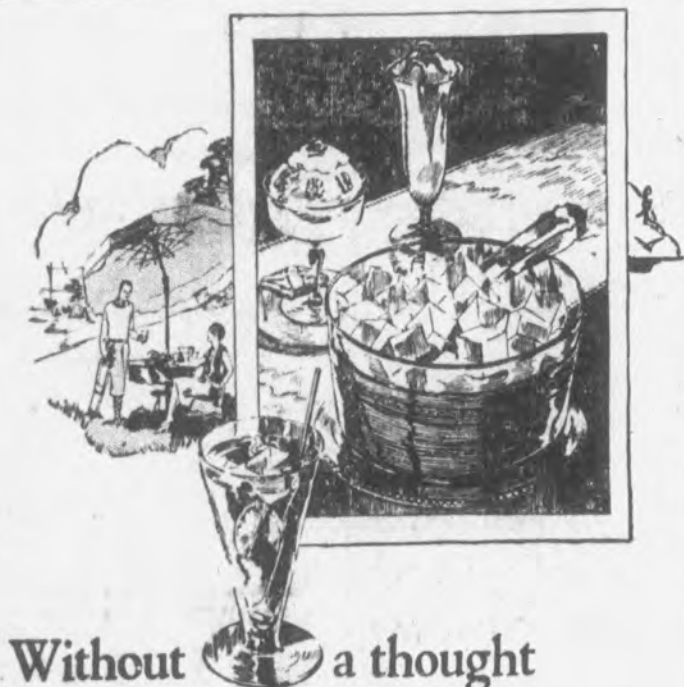

Predict Short Crop of Peaches

Raleigh, May 5.—(AP)—The peach crop hardly will touch half bumper crop proportions, the State-Federal co-operative crop reporting service finds.

Its report is based on estimates of 119 peach growers in the sandhill and other peach regions, showing the commercial peach crop in the State probably will amount to about 2,262 carloads, with Wilkes, Harnett and Lee listed as the heaviest producing counties outside the sandhill.

Reports from the most important peach growing counties show probable yields as follows: Montgomery 297,000 trees with 81 per cent condition, indicates 264,000 crates; Moore, 822,000 trees at 39 per cent crop indicates 382,000 crates; Hoke 26,000 trees, 23 per cent, with 10-300 crates; Scotland 73,000 trees, 8 per cent, 4,000 crates; Richmond 728,000 trees, at 23 per cent crop shows 201,000 crates, and Anson with 38,000 bearing trees and 25 per cent condition forecasts 12,000 crates.

The State prospects outside of the counties above generally known as the sandhills, are as follows: 190,000 bearing trees, 35 per cent condition and 67,000 crates.

Rioting Continues In British India

Lahore, British India, May 5.—(AP)—Rioting broke out again last night in several parts of the city when thousands of Moslems were returning from the funeral of three Mohammedans who were killed in a clash between Sikhs and Moslems Tuesday night.

Ten persons were killed and more than 30 injured in last night's disturbance. The troops have received orders to fire in case of other outbreaks.

LIGHTNING STRIKES MAN AT KERNERSVILLE

Winston-Salem, May 5.—(AP)—During a slight thunderstorm yesterday, J. P. West, 58, was seriously injured when a bolt of lightning struck an axe he was carrying on his shoulder, twisted it around, striking West on the cheek bone and breaking the bone. The peculiar accident occurred at the rear of the West's in Kernersville. The injured man was brought to a Winston-Salem hospital and examination disclosed the broken cheek bone and that the man had lost a quantity of blood. West was taken back home today and his condition is reported to be favorable.

GOVERNOR NAMES BEACH COMMITTEE

Raleigh, May 5.—(AP)—Governor McLean has appointed delegates to represent the State at a special meeting of the American Shore and Beach Preservation Association, on May 23 and 24 at Washington, D. C.

Appointees include R. L. Gray, of Raleigh; Charles O. Robinson, Elizabeth City; Ernest M. Green and W. B. Bledsoe of New Bern; George E. Kidder, Wrightsville Beach; Wade H. Phillips and Tharn dke Saville of Raleigh; and Thomas H. Wright of Wilmington.

COUNTRY HAS 291 PUBLIC GOLF LINKS
New York, May 5.—(AP)—From a single one 32 years ago, the number of public golf links in the country has grown to 291, distributed over many States, a survey by the United States Golf Association shows. The first was a nine-hole course laid out at Van Cortland Park here in 1895. Illinois now leads the country with 22, eight of which are in Chicago. New York State has 13, Texas 12, California 11 and Pennsylvania 8. The "score" States include Florida 5; Georgia 3; North Carolina 2; Tennessee 5; Virginia 1.

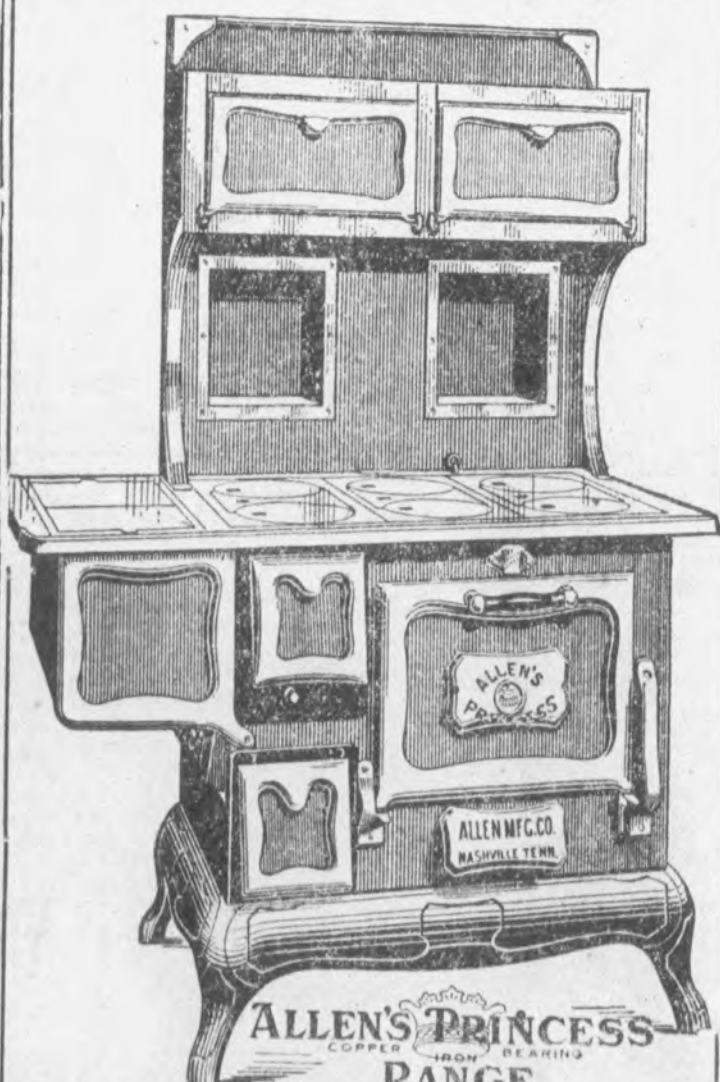

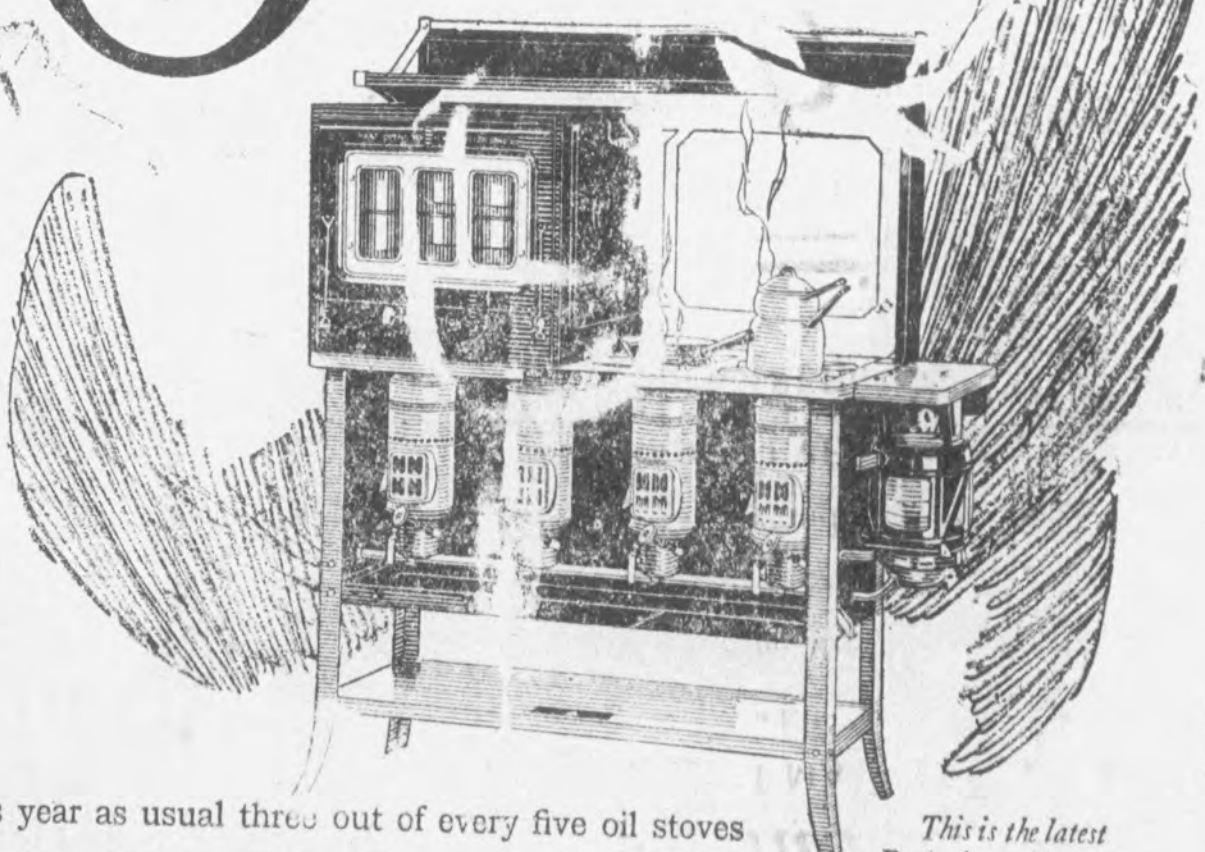
