TWO CAPTIVES ARE RELEASED BY GANGSTERS

Abraham Scharlin and James Taylor Released This Morning

New York, May 6.—(AP)—Abraham Scharlin of Chicago and James Taylor, who had been held prisoners for ransom by kidnaping gangs, were released at 4 P. M. today police reported.

Police believed the release of Scharlin and Taylor was prompted by the killing yesterday of Joseph Marcus and Charles Kraemer, neighbors suspected of having been involved in the kidnaping.

Scharlin was kidnapped April 28. Police Inspector Coughlin said that at the point of a pistol one of Scharlin's friends was forced by the conspirators to telephone and make an appointment with him. When Scharlin left the 72nd street apartment house, where he lived with his wife, he was seized and taken to a house, the address of which has not been disclosed. Police did not say whether they know where this house is located.

The release following closely upon a battle between detectives and two of the alleged kidnapers in which one of the latter was killed when he refused to throw up his hand. A second man was arrested.

The police had been working on the disappearance of Scharlin but did not know that Taylor too had been kidnapped until after the shooting affray. It developed that Taylor disappeared the same day as Scharlin.

The battle occurred in Central Park and sent scores of persons scurrying to safety. Joseph Marcus of Chicago, alias "Red" Thompson, and his companion, Dave Berman of Sioux City, Iowa, elected to shoot it out with John Cordes a detective who had been shadowing Marcus, who had been connected with several telephone calls to the Scharlin home demanding ransom. Cordes seized Berman's gun and overpowered him. Motorcyclist policeman Richard W. O'Connor, who had been trailing Cordes, quickly arrived and when Marcus ignored demands to raise his hands and tried to grab a gun O'Connor shot and killed him.

On Marcus was found half of Scharlin's Elks card. The other half had been sent to the kidnaped man's relatives.

With the Elks card police found five checks for \$3,000, each signed by James A. Taylor, of Brooklyn, and made payable to Charles Kraemer of New York. Kraemer was arrested on a charge of complicity in the kidnaping. He said he could prove the checks were legitimate.

BOOTHE GROWS WORSE TODAY

End Apparently Near For Youth Kept Alive Two Weeks by Respiration.

Roanoke, Va., May 6.—(AP)—Walter L. Boothe was asleep at noon today as he entered the sixteenth day he had been kept alive by artificial respiration. When he dozed off he had not rallied from a sinking spell which earlier in the day caused physicians and two score friends who have pumped air into his lungs day and night for more than two weeks, to fear that the end was near. The spell was described by attendants as worse than any of the previous ones from which the youth recovered to the amusement of physicians.

Boothe was still asleep at one o'clock.

Boothe, whose body is practically paralyzed, is bright, resolute, cheerful and confident.

He has the most remarkable way of coming back after having sinking spells. Time and again physicians have despaired of his life but he has rallied and come up with a smile.

Yesterday he had a fairly good day of it. He took nourishment, his pulse was around 70, his heart action good and he took more interest in his surroundings.

At three o'clock this morning his condition became so grave that those in attendance gave him up. This was said to be the worst attack he has suffered.

RED CROSS RELIEF NEARS EIGHT MILLION DOLLAR MARK TODAY

Washington, May 6.—(AP)—The Red Cross relief fund today reached a total of \$7,813,903.

The eastern states have now contributed \$5,029,477; the mid-western states \$1,924,000; the Pacific coast states \$748,907.

DELINQUENT TAXES TO BE ADVERTISED

Board of Aldermen Defers Publication of 1926 List Until Monday, May 9.

The Board of Aldermen in regular monthly session on last night reviewed the city's 1926 delinquent tax list and authorized City Clerk J. O. Duval to wait until Monday, May 9th, before advertising same. The list was to have been published today.

All members of the board were present at last night's session. Mayor J. C. Lanier presided.

The board approved a petition for paying 11 street, from Greene to Evans street.

M. K. Blount asked for a permit to erect a gas filling station at the intersection of Greene street and Dickinson Avenue, on the present site of the Presbyterian Church. The matter will be given final consideration at the June meeting.

The Tobacco Board of Trade presented a petition asking the city to widen Church street, between Dickinson Avenue and 9th street. The matter was referred to the street committee for investigation and report at the next meeting.

Roy Corbett, of Raleigh, appeared before the board with a complete compilation of city ordinances. The board accepted, and vouchers were ordered drawn in payment for services rendered. The mayor and ordinance committee were instructed to go through the ordinances and mark out those out of date and not applicable at the present time.

Clerk Duval was instructed to secure sealed bids for the annual audit of the city books. Bids will be opened at the June meeting.

Returns of the recent city election were canvassed and certified as correct. Mayor J. C. Lanier, re-elected, will serve two years. Aldermen will serve the following length of time: Smith, 1st ward, one year; Waldrop, 2nd ward, two years; Goodson, 3rd ward, two years; Boyd 4th ward, two years; Dees, 5th ward one year.

Clerk Duval and engineer Rivers were instructed to get up data and advertise for bids on gutter and curbing authorized by the board some time ago.

An ordinance was passed requiring all firms and corporations to make a deposit with the city clerk an amount sufficient to pave streets before any permit is granted to cut up any pavement. The Water and Light Commission and the Gas Company, however, were excluded in this ruling.

A resolution was passed instructing the fire committee to investigate the needs of the fire department, determine what is needed in the way of new equipment, and report at the June meeting.

HIGHWAYS CLOSED IN FLOOD SECTION

LOCALS WIN RELAY RACE

Denton and Gurkins Started First Quarter Mile Lap at 1:50 O'clock Today.

Greenville won the relay race from Washington this afternoon. The time was one hour and forty-seven minutes. The Greenville runner led the Washington sprinter about one hundred yards when they arrived at the postoffice in Washington.

Greenville led Washington as far as Grimesland in the first half of the race. Just beyond Grimesland, however, Washington took the lead and held it until about a mile from the stopping point, when Greenville runners again forged ahead.

The annual relay race between Washington and Greenville got under way here this afternoon promptly at 1:50.

Alton Denton, representing Greenville, and Bonnie Gurkins, of Washington, started the race at the intersection of Evans and Third streets at the crack of a revolver in the hands of Chief of Police Lester Jones, official starter. The boys were relayed by new runners a quarter of a mile from the starting point. The relays will continue at a similar distance until the postoffice in Washington is reached.

Denton got away slightly ahead of the Washington runner today. He was leading by a fair margin at the completion of the first and second blocks.

Considerable interest was manifested in the race, and numbers of people from both towns had gathered along Evans street to watch the contest get under way.

Traffic cops began clearing the streets of traffic promptly at 1:30 and the sprinters had a clear field when the crack of the revolver started things off.

One hundred and eighty runners representing both towns, will take part in the event.

The contest started in Washington last year, and ended at the courthouse here. This is the third event of the kind, Washington nose out victorious on both occasions.

MEN AND WOMEN TO DEBATE TONIGHT

Raleigh, May 6.—(AP)—Men meet women debaters this evening at Portsmouth, Va., when State College engages in argument with the Virginia State Teachers College on the query concerning equal rights.

The men were granted no handicap, and gallantly asked for none.

The debate is an outgrowth of attempts by Prof. C. C. Cunningham of the local institution to secure a contest with women institution. The proposition was, "Resolved, that this school deplores the tendency toward political, economic and social equality of the sexes."

It is up to the audience to render the decision.

STEEPLECHASE RIDER DIES AT BALTIMORE

Baltimore, May 6.—(AP)—Robert "Bob" Taylor, widely known steeplechase rider, died at his home here yesterday following an acute heart attack. He is survived by his widow and three sisters.

GRAY ENDS TESTIMONY

Continues To Maintain That Mrs. Snyder Induced Him to Kill Her Husband.

Testimony was completed in the Snyder murder trial today and adjournment was taken until Monday.

New York, May 6.—(AP)—The defense of Henry Judd Gray, co-set salesman lover of Mrs. Ruth Snyder, both of whom are charged with the murder of her husband, rested today.

New York, May 6.—(AP)—Henry Judd Gray completed his ordeal upon the witness stand in the court where he is on trial for his life today.

Seventeen hours after he voluntarily assumed the witness chair at the attorneys had done with him and court was adjourned for lunch. Throughout all the questioning Gray had stoutly maintained his story that he had struck the first blow, but that the murder of Albert Snyder could never have been accomplished but for the aid of Mrs. Snyder.

District Attorney Newcombe questioned Gray but half an hour, whereas counsel for Mrs. Snyder had examined him for eight hours and his own lawyer for six.

After Newcombe, Samuel Miller, Gray's lawyer, took the witness for re-direct examination which lasted but three minutes. Gray then left the stand.

Gray's mother, Mrs. Margaret Gray, was expected to be the first witness of the afternoon.

TOBACCO MEN ATTEND FRY

Fifty Members of Local Board Guest At Edenhause Fishery Yesterday.

John Bell entertained members of the Greenville Tobacco Board of Trade at a fish fry given yesterday at historic old Edenhause on Chowan river, 16 miles below Windsor.

About 50 members of the board left here yesterday morning and returned last night, declaring the affair one of the most enjoyable in years. Mr. Bell conducts a large fishery at Edenhause and catches fish at the rate of 100,000 or more daily. His guests yesterday assembled along the banks of the river and watched the boats as they brought in fish to be used in the fry. Then they repaired to the eating house where shad and rock had been provided in abundance for the day's feast.

Mr. Bell is not only a fisherman of distinction, but he also conducts a 2,000 acre farm at Edenhause. A brother assists in caring for the plantation, which, like the fishery, is one of the finest in that section of the state.

PRISON FARM STRIKERS GO BACK TO JOB

Ring Leaders at Calcedonia Farm Kept in Confinement as Precautionary Measure.

Kaledonia Prison Farm, N. C., May 6.—(AP)—Strike of 370 white convicts, protesting against working from sun to sun as civilian farmers do, and seeking a 55 hour week and Saturday afternoons off, was short-lived. It started Wednesday night and was about over this morning.

Policy of "No work, no food, no water" found the mutineers without food for 36 hours without water for 24, and George Ross Pou, state prison superintendent, who came from Raleigh to Halifax county to deliver the state's mandate of not acceding to the striking prisoners' demands, ordered that crackers and water be given all men this morning who renounced the ring leaders' demands as to hours.

Authorities found that only one-third of the 370 men gave any sort of active support to the 55-hour proposition, that the rest were herded in with the strike. As early as last night, the men, behind bars, began begging food and water, and they eagerly renounced the ring leaders' cause this morning.

Little by little they were sent out on the 6,500 acre farm but the ring leaders were kept confined. Solicitor or Parker of Halifax county, said prosecution probably would be started against these. Mr. Pou and the solicitor and other officers, who admitted to having a good night's sleep last night, planned to go into conference around noon to decide what course to pursue.

Virtually all of the 370 men behind the bars were fed this morning. No discussion or argument was entered into with any of the men on part of officials as any nourishment to striking morale and the men were allowed to counsel with their own thoughts as they pined for food in their solitary cells.

Martial law had been established with arrival of 100 National Guardsmen from Wilson and Warrenton. The soldiers guarded all four corners of the stockade and lights played on the building all night long. The ring leaders had been segregated.

The men struck riotously but that was the end of it. The \$5,000 worth of property damaged by disheveled breaking of windows, washstands, beds lights, will be paid out of the compensation due the prisoners when their time expires. Mr. Pou said.

The pup-pup of machine guns of Company M from Wilson, testing out, it had a soothing effect apparently as all hands behind bars dropped to sleep shortly after dark. Dispatch of tear bombs from the Richmond, Va. police department, like the guard detachment ordered out by Governor McLean, was merely precautionary.

No injuries, all strikers back in bars, and 170 honor guards doing their customary rounds comprised the upshot of the incident. Return of rioters to the fields, to their crops on 4,500 acres under cultivation, with its annual state investment of \$150,000, was the immediate prospect, punishment of ring leaders the pending aftermath.

Outside of the moment of passion Wednesday night when the rioters were quickly driven back to solitary cells by the honor prisoners, the situation remained quiet, and this morning came food and water, absence of which had been the authorities' answer to the convicts' demands. All tenseness was dispelled. Fear of punishment replaced boldness of riot.

The first quota to leave their cells numbered 80 repentant prisoners, who were marched out between lines of national guardsmen. These broke down and cried in the cells house yard. Water buckets of it was brought to them and they slacked their thirst, splashing the cool drink over their faces, cooling their throats, clearing their throats. In the bunch were men all the way from 15 years of age to 70.

The less guilty mutineers were separated from the others and one by one others followed out into the fresh air all morning. This procedure was kept up to noon, when the first solid meal in two days was served to some, bread and water to those still confined in cells.

APPROPRIATE \$500,000 FOR CROP REHABILITATION IN MISSISSIPPI

Vicksburg, Miss., May 6.—(AP)—An appropriation of \$500,000, for crop rehabilitation work in the flooded area of Mississippi was made today by the Red Cross at a conference of Red Cross and state officials attended by Secretary Hoover.

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Russian "Reds" in China are enticing sailors of the American and British Warships, seeking to make Bolsheviks of them. It is safe to say that a British or American Tar will be difficult to convert to the Communist theory. He believes in getting what he can and keeping what he gets.

Besides, Chinese things do not look very real to the honest sailor man. In London Punch a sailor on duty asked by his superior, "has anybody passed this way?" "yes sir, fifty Chinks, or may be the same chink fifty times."

One hundred cities and towns are flooded along the lower Mississippi. The total flood damage amounts to two thousand million dollars. Less than half that money, combined with brains and engineering skill, would have made the flood impossible.

The best engineers in the United States including the experts of the army, men such as those that put through the Panama Canal, after De Lesseps and France had failed should map out a plan, and the country should supply the money to carry it out.

Fortunately, the Great City of New Orleans is undoubtedly safe. Colonel Ewing, editor of the New Orleans State, quoting General Jadwin, an experienced engineer, says that as far as the city is concerned all danger is past.

Mellett is dead, murdered by those whose graft, gambling, bootlegging and general rascality he persistently exposed.

If there is a place in heaven for editors, and Mellette has met Pulitzer, they will get on well. Not everybody could do that with Joseph Pulitzer. He was a fighter, had something to say and when he said it there was no mistaking his meaning.

MUDDY WATERS OF MISSISSIPPI STILL RACE UNCURRED OVER THE LOWLANDS OF LOUISIANA

GOVERNOR BELIEVES STATE SHOULD DOUBLE FLOOD CONTRIBUTIONS

Raleigh, May 6.—(AP)—Governor McLean feels that North Carolina should match the federal government in doubling its donations to the Red Cross Mississippi flood relief fund.

He has issued two proclamations calling on the state to respond to the need of those in the rich agricultural district whose everything has been wiped out.

"We should have a liberal offering, certainly in proportion to what the Washington authorities are asking of all states," he said.

GLEN HICKS FACES TRIAL IN ST. LOUIS

Police Grill Young Man Charged With Murder of His Elder Brother.

St. Louis, May 6.—(AP)—Facing a barrage of questions today in connection with the death of his elder brother, Clifford M. Hicks, slain law associate of former Governor Elliott W. Major, Glenn T. Hicks today occupied a conspicuous role in the dramatic turn taken yesterday by the police investigation of the crime.

Named as the beneficiary of most of the estate and \$36,000 insurance of the dead man who was a former minister turned financier, Hicks was arrested yesterday with two former convicts, William Davis and Harry W. Bostleman. Five hours of grilling at the hands of authorities brought announcement from chief of detectives Kaiser, that the solution of the baffling mystery was not near. He openly accused Hicks of being the instigator of his brother's death, after Hicks was unable to explain why he knew of the murder two hours before the body was found last Sunday morning in clump of bushes outside the town.

After questioning Miss Ida Sinnwell, secretary of the slain lawyer, Kaiser said he was satisfied Hicks had visited his brother's office before the body was discovered and ransacked it for papers.

Miss Sinnwell identified Davis as the man whom she saw in the younger brother's company Sunday morning in the office and Bostleman as a man whom she had seen in her employer's office on numerous occasions.

Hicks denied any connection with the crime but was non-plussed Kaiser said, when asked bluntly how he had known of his brother's death prior to the discovery of the body.

"Well, I just thought it—I just thought it, that's all," Kaiser quoted Hicks as replying.

When told of the arrest of her husband's brother, Mrs. Hicks expressed faith in him and stated she would not believe he had anything to do with the murder.

Four upper valley states not so severely visited by the floods, ranked in order: Missouri 11,821; Illinois 6,900; Tennessee 4,322; and Kentucky 3,032. In the latter state were many refugees from Missouri.

The new figures were compiled from reports to the Red Cross here by field workers in the 64 area offices within the flood area.

These reports showed that 95,000 persons have been immunized for typhoid and 85,000 for malaria. Ninety-nine trained Red Cross disaster workers were stationed in the field; 40 Red Cross physicians and 78 Red Cross nurses.

Twenty-seven airplanes and seaplanes and 626 power boats flying the Red Cross flag were in the waters. Thirty wireless stations were operating.

State Testing Finance Act

Raleigh, May 6.—(AP)—The State Administration is testing the constitutionality of the county finance act passed by the 1927 General Assembly.

The case will have early consideration by the Supreme Court following appeal filed by Cyrus P. Frazier, Greensboro, who alleged, in the friendly test case, that the act is invalid.

Judge M. Oglesby, of Concord, presiding over Guilford superior court, held the act to be valid.

Entire Town of St. Joseph Disappears Slowly in Rising Flood Waters.

New Orleans, May 6.—(AP)—The muddy torrents of the Mississippi still raced uncurred over northern Louisiana lowlands today after having already overrun more than five million acres of farm and swamp lands in their mad rush to the Gulf of Mexico.

The spread over eleven Louisiana parishes continued. Rayville had disappeared and an urgent appeal was made for boats to remove the residents from tree tops and the tops of houses. Tallulah was being covered. Newellton was being invaded. Delta point stood on the fringe of the tawny sheet. Dozens of small villages already had disappeared.

More than three hundred square miles had been covered. Mississippi and its tributaries Louisiana as the giant stream gathered its forces after their rampage over six other states.

Rescued refugees became refugees again and gradually were removed from Delhi to Monroe. Seventeen thousand refugees were assembled at Delhi from the flooded area between Macon Ridge, Sicily Island and Oak Ridge.

The entire town of St. Joseph was disappearing slowly in the rising sea. Motor boats and skiffs replaced expensive limousines in the aristocratic old river town.

In the inland sections difficulty was experienced in removing tenants farmers since the flood waters were spread so slowly it was hard for boats to navigate. Many were threatened with starvation, plantation owners said, because they were reluctant to leave the area and had no food.

Vidalia, seat of Concordia parish, after three weeks of battling with rising waters of the Mississippi, was forced to about face and meet the assault of backwaters which were climbing up the protection levees at the rate of ten inches a day.

Memphis, Tenn., May 6.—(AP)—Raging torrents of the Mississippi river after more than three weeks' rampage, already have placed 323,837 persons, a record number for disasters in this country, under the care of the American Red Cross.

The list swelled hourly as additional flood waters poured from broken dikes in Louisiana and officials of the Red Cross would not predict what the final total of sufferers would be.

The announcement of Henry M. Baker, national director of disaster relief, does not include complete counts from inundated sections of Louisiana. Continual movement of refugees there has prevented field workers from making their reports.

Of the 232,867 persons, 173,566 are refugees in sixty concentration camps in seven states affected by the flood. The others are persons receiving food or other supplies in their flooded homes, in upper floors of town buildings and in other places where they have elected to remain rather than go to the refugee camps.

Mississippi led the list with 100,941, many of whom are Louisianians brought to Vicksburg or Natchez with a slight infusion of Missouri refugees, had 114,372.

Last reports from field workers in Louisiana gave a total of 22,748 persons under Red Cross care

EAST AND WEST MEET TODAY IN BIG LEAGUES

The first inter-sectional skirmish between major league contenders this season put four eastern teams on the defensive in the National League today.

The struggles bulged with promise of hard fought battles, and indications were that New York would supply the battleground for many of them. The acquisition of Rogers Hornsby and Eddie Roush by John McGraw, the threatening early season spirit of rivalry between the men of Gotham and a deeprooted spirit of rivalry between the men of St. Louis, Cincinnati, Chicago and Pittsburgh, supplied some of the background for expectations of fireworks.

While their pitching thus far has been unsteady the Giants yesterday gave further indication that the shock of the western offensive would be received with a heavy blast of hitting. Hornsby again touched off the big gun in a New York rally which routed the Robins 4 to 1, polling out a home run with two runners on base to clinch the victory.

Today the Giants were paired off against the fifth place Cubs and Brooklyn against the league leading Cardinals, who rode to victory yesterday over the Pirates, 4 to 2, behind masterful pitching by Grover Alexander. The other two meetings pit the tail-end Cincinnati Reds against Boston and the Pirates against the Phillies.

Second division teams staged a general uprising yesterday in the American League, which sent its eastern clubs westward today. Yazoo City Woman Writes of Flood

Miss Irene Hand, a member of the faculty of the East Carolina Teachers' College, but formerly of Yazoo City, Miss., is in receipt of a letter from a friend in that place. As the graphic pictures of conditions existing in the territory affected by the flood, the Reflector is reprinting excerpts of same in order that its readers may get a more intimate insight into one of the greatest catastrophes in the history of the county. The letter from Mrs. J. D. Roberts, head of one of the organizations that is assisting in relief work follows:

"Just time to write you a few hurried lines. I wish I could give you some idea of this flood. Sometime I'll try to tell you all about it. The refugee camp, where we have over ten thousand refugees at present, takes up every minute of time. Every train that comes in, seems to me, brings from two to eight hundred. It is a common sight to see the soldiers unload eighty box cars of negroes in one night. It seems to me that almost every woman has a baby in her arms, and every man from one to seven dogs."

The river (Yazoo) is alive with steamboats, tugs, and barges bringing in food, clothes, and more refugees. The refugees are orderly, good natured, and patient.

The camp is at Wyoming Park. It looks like a big army camp. We are told by the officers that we have the best organized camp in the flood district. Aren't you proud of Yazoo City? I am.

From four to five babies are born out there each day and the number of expectant mothers is appalling.

Every organization in town is at work. As president of the King's Daughters, I am at the head of the crowd that feeds about three thousand children under ten years of age, at the lunch hour. May I tell you something of the way we work?

With the aid of the advisory board I make out each week seven committees, composed of a chairman and sixteen lady workers, to serve the lunch at the camp each day. A committee for each of the seven days. At the grill room of the Elks Club a committee of thirty or more ladies from the church societies, a different church each day, makes

from three to four thousand sandwiches. The Woman's Club helps with this, too.

At eight o'clock each night we have another committee which goes to the grocery stores to slice and pack bread to be used for the sandwiches next day. I try to be at the three places where workers are and help all I can.

Latoria (the eastern half of Yazoo City) looks like an ocean. The water is crossing the street and families on the west side are having to move now. The grammar school is about three feet under water.

We are all completely demoralized. I am sending you Annie's card (inviting the family to come to Meridian to stay during the flood) that you may see just how dear she is. I have given up all my expression classes!

DO YOUR PART

Listen, good people. It is not our desire to keep nagging at you about contributing to the Red Cross relief fund, or to be telling you how much of your money you should give to help relieve the sufferings of the thousands of victims of the flood area, but the local quota is nearly \$600 short, and yesterday only six dollars was given to the fund.

The situation in the flood area is just this. Over two hundred thousands of persons, many of them women and children, have been driven from their homes by the raging waters. These unfortunate people are herded together in concentration camps where every effort is being made to protect them from want and disease. In order to carry on this great relief work the Red Cross asked for ten million dollars. To date little more than half that amount has been contributed, and unless the balance of the money is raised immediately, there is no chance to check the spread of disease and suffering in the stricken area.

While there are numbers in our community who have contributed liberally to this cause, there are many others, amply able, who have paid no heed to the call for "Help."

To extend a helping hand to suffering humanity is the duty of every person. You have a duty to perform in connection with the Mississippi flood disaster. Our plea is: "See your duty, and DO it."

WILL THE FOOLS PLANT?

It has been hinted that some farmers might take the foolish step of increasing their cotton acreage because of the fact that several million acres of land in the Mississippi valley have been overflowed with water. If the flood conditions should have a tendency to increase the price of the staple next fall, because of a decreased production, an increased acreage on the part of farmers in other more favored sections would mean the removal of that possibility. May we ask, what could be more foolish? —Duplin Dispatch.

NO EXCUSE

Henry Judd Gray, in describing the gruesome details of his murder of Albert Snyder, New York art editor, tells of taking several drinks between each of his acts connected with the murder, and would have it appear throughout the entire episode he was working under the malinfluence of intoxication. As we see it, intoxication on the part of

Gray does not make, and should not have any effect upon those who name his punishment.

Too often crime is committed, and when offenders are haled into court the plea is that lack of reason because of intoxication was responsible for the crime.

Intoxication, within itself, is a crime, and other crimes committed by intoxicated persons should be considered no less crimes because of the criminal's condition. There is no excuse for intoxication and intoxication is no excuse.

BAD BOYS—OR
BAD EYES?

Is little Tommy really a bad boy—or is it just that he has bad eyesight?

That question isn't as foolish as it sounds. Listen to Guy A. Genry, general director of the Eyesight Conservation Council of America, who asserts that many of the young offenders who are haled into juvenile court are there primarily because of defective eyes.

He says: "Bad eyesight leads to inattention in school, to unfair competition and to disrespect for authority. Bad eyes lead to truancy and the truant child is a criminal in embryo."

Raleigh, May 5—(AP)—Strawberries in North Carolina are forging ahead to a record crop experts here believe.

The record is 2,046 cars, set in 1924.

This year, up to Monday, 1,693 cars had been shipped with no let-up in sight. Daily shipments from

the berry district have run as high as 139 cars a day.

Frank Parker, head of the State Federal corps of crop statisticians predicted that recent rain and warm weather would give the record crop another boost.

Prices are holding up good, market reports indicate. The average last week was between five and \$5.25 a crate of 32 quarts. Last year it averaged \$5.12 for the season for first class berries.

New York, May 6.—(AP)—Jobless and facing a Broadway that doesn't employ girls who have been jilted, Connie Almy, 21 year old cabaret singer, has filed a breach of promise suit for \$500,000 against Stanley E. Comstock, wealthy real estate operator of Florida and Chicago.

Miss Almy yesterday said Comstock's disappearance convinced her he didn't love her. "I knew he'd just been fooling me," she said. "I gave up my position in Florida because he asked me, and came back to New York broke. I can't get a job. Broadway cabarets don't employ girls who have been jilted."

Miss Almy in her complaint charges Comstock announced their engagement to secure publicity and as a result of the subsequent alleged jilting she has been held up to public ridicule.

Attorney Frances C. Dale, counsel for Edward West Browning, in his successful suit for separation against Frances (Peaches) Browning, filed the papers for Miss Almy.

Raleigh, May 6.—(AP)—Attorney General Brummitt conferred with Governor McLean as to petition of Dr. Laughinghouse, State Health officer, for a thorough investigation of the State Board of Health's operation of the sanitary privy law.

The State Health officer said he welcomed a complete investigation "in justice to the board and to the general public."

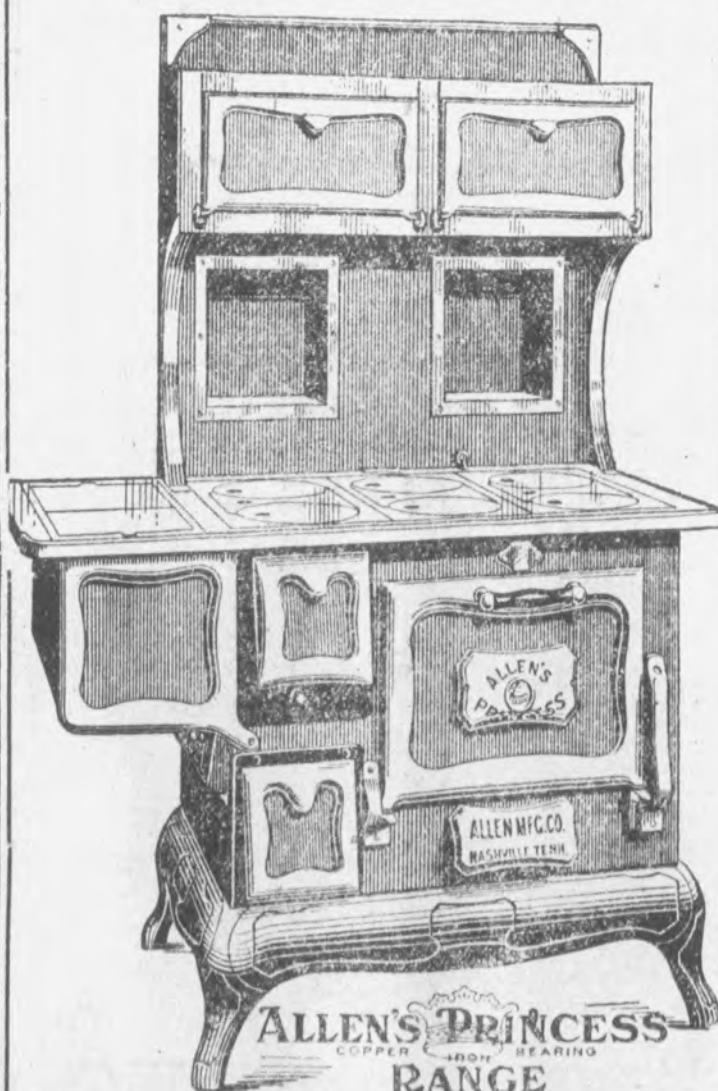
