THE FRENCH ATTITUDE

The attempt of the French public to place the blame of the failure of the trans-Atlantic flight upon the American government, is just another example of the real anti-American feeling that lurks within the hearts of those whom the American soldiers helped to save from destruction or bondage. Bedded deep in their hearts and souls this feeling creeps out at intervals upon the least provocation and the point has been reached that it is not only disgusting but distasteful to the American

In the face of the interest the American public has expressed in the attempted feat of the two French fliers and the expressions of anxiety for their safety, the attitude of the French publie, as recorded in press dispatches, is little short of an insult and shows clearly that they still have no love for their benefactors.

It is safe to say that had the attempt of Nungesser and Coli been successful, the two Frenchmen would have been received in this country far more royally than any American can ever hope to be greeted in France.

THE VERDICT

Few will dissent from the verdict of the jury in the Snyder murder trial, which ias found both Gray and Mrs. Snyder guilty of murder in the first degree. If there ever was a case which corresponded to our picture of premeditated murder, this was it. There was no single circumstance to confuse the moral issues involved; the defendants planned their deed for months, they committed it with the utmost deliberation; their motives. so far as one can understand them at all, were wholly sordid. Indeed, so lacking were they in common decency that they failed utterly to arouse any of the sympathy that . usually goes to people in their plight -they turned on each other with ratlike ferocity, apparently being devoid even of the honor of many a thief who at least tries to shield his woman.

But if the moral issues were clear, the psychological problem was too much for most of us. When the cold-bloodedness of the crime is compared with the commonlpace appearance of those who committed it, one is completely at a loss for an explanation. This pair, so far as one could see, differed not a whit from thousands of other pairs one sees daily on the subway; it would be hard to think of two persons who superficially varied so little from the norm as they. Moriarty, placing his hand on Cobb's shoulder as he spoke, related his experiences as teammate of the former Tiger 20 years ago and pictured him as one athlete above all others who played at all times for the winning run regardless of con-

"And that same trait has lived with him through the years to make him one of the greatest ball players of all time," the Bengal pilot concluded.
