

There has been of late a marked tendency for the Government to undertake activities with which previously it was less concerned. Each class of ordinary civil expenditure has doub led since 1915.

Each citizen of the Unit ed States is individually respensible for increasing or decreasing taxes.

The budget idea is the basis of all economy and efficiency programs, whether in Federal, state, or local jurisdiction. The budget function is never popular. It often requires a "hardboiled" attitude to resist enthusiastic spending officers and citizens who are interested in particular projects. 

Mexicans Ready To Meet Indians

Nogales, Ariz., May 12.-(AP)-A sleepy, dusty town just below the international boundary became the center of Mexico's latest revolutionary movement today as it awaited the arrival of a rebel Indian army bent on its capture, while the hill around bristled with the cannon of government troops.

Chief Louis Matuz, riding at the head of the Yaqui red mer has demanded that the border town of Nogales, Sonora, surrender to his rebel army before Sunday. Although no confirmation of this could be obtained from Mexican officials Adolfo De La Huerta, former Provisional President of Mexico, whom the Yaquis havep roclaimed as their leader, stated in Los Anegles that he had verified the demand.

Opposing the rebels, who apparently have engaged ni several skirmishes with federal troops below Nogales, is General Manzo, said to have approximately 4,000 men Lieutenant-Governor of New available at Nogales and nearby towns. Observers on the American side of the line last night counted 14 gun emplacements on the hills about the town and about 700 men actively engaged in perfecting defense works. 
