New Orleans, May 19-(AP)-Residents of the vast area in the western Atchafalya Basin were leaving their homes today in everincreasing numbers, spured by the ninous warnings of the weather sureau here and flood relief director John M. Parker at Baton Rogue rector Parker last night had a ore of telephones operators at ork urging all the inhabitants of the region in the line o Ithe floodan area 100 to 150 mlles northwest of New Orleans- to flee. Twenty seven small towns, none with more n 500 inhabitants, were affected by the warning.

The territory is in the path of the waters from Bayou Des Glaises breaks and the water is pouring through the crevasses on Atchafalaya at Melville. These are reported to be covering about forty miles below Bayou Des Glaises, to form a great lake extending up the valley to the northern parishes, 250 miles long and from 15 to 100 miles



To Investigate Truckline For North Carolina

Raleigh, May 19 .- (AP)-I. M. Bailey, executive secretary of the State transportation advisory commission today sought out an expert traffic analyst to work with him in investigating possibilities of water and truckline transportation and lower freight rates in the State,

The commission, following its first meeting, decided today to mee' again next month when its full plans will be announced.

The fact that the State slready is being benefitted by water transportation was brought out at the meeting by E. K. Bishop, of New Bern, who desscribed the fast growing truck line business out of New Bern which is engaged in hauling produce into that port by recently established ship lines. Mr. Bishop. said the truck lines were serving number of Eastern Carolina cities including Goldsboro, Wilson, Kinston and Greenville, at a marked saving over rail rates.

Progress also was reported in sectring the right-af-way for the Beaufort-Wilmington inland waterway extension, for which \$75,000 was appropriated by the last legislature. A committee composed of J Allen Taylor, Wilmington E. K. Rishop, New Bern, and John W House, Wilson, was named to take this project in charge.







The bodies of Kehoe and Huyck were blown to tits. McFarren was killed outright and Smith so badly injured he died in a hospital shortly afterward.

Kehoe's car was torn to pieces. The rear wheels and differential were hurled across the road.


