## LONE AVIATOR WINGS HIS WAY TO PARIS IN MOST THRILLING NON-STOP FLIGHT OF THE AGE

**Captain Lindberg  
Hopped Off at New  
York This Morning  
at 7:52 o'Clock**

(By The Associated Press)  
Captain Charles Lindberg is on his flight to Paris. "Lone Slim" hopped off from Roosevelt Field, L. I., at 7:52 a. m. Eastern day-  
light time, and an hour and a half later, eight minutes later, the description of the Spirit of St. Louis was sighted, flying low over Halifax, Mass., about 30 miles southeast of Boston.



The plane was headed northeast on the course selected by the "Flying Fool" in his attempt to win the Orteig prize of \$25,000. One observer reported that the plane's motor was skipping. Residents said the monoplane, flying low, bore the insignia NX-211, the number of the Ryan airplane. Thirty-five minutes before a big monoplane had been sighted passing over East Greenwich, R. I., flying at the rate of one hundred miles an hour.

Lindberg flew through screening fog and mist during the first few hours of his flight. Fairly good weather conditions are reported by the weather bureau after he passed the Grand Banks that lie southeast of the coast of New Foundland. Cape Race, N. F., reports a fog this morning. Flying conditions along the south west coast of Nova Scotia were fine.

Clouds were light and steamships are waiting for the intrepid American but are not expected to sight him until he swings his airplane off the coast of New Foundland.

Paris, May 20.—(AP)—All the air beacons from the coast to Paris have been ordered lighted tomorrow to show Captain Lindberg his way to the French capital.

The world's greatest searchlight atop Mount Valerian, just outside Paris, will flash a beam that on clear nights is visible approximately 200 miles.

The American Ambassador, Mr. Herrick, was informed by The Associated Press of Lindberg's flight eight minutes after the flyer rose from Roosevelt Field. Mr. Herrick is calling together various persons interested in organizing a suitable welcome for the aviator.

Roosevelt Field, N. Y., May 20.—(AP)—Charles A. Lindbergh, captain to the Missouri National Guard but "Slim" to his buddies, set out today on an unmarked air trail to Paris.

The Missouriian who plays a lone hand, no one to show him the way as he hurled his Ryan monoplane the "Spirit of St. Louis" into the muggy air above Roosevelt Field a few minutes before 8 o'clock this morning.

"The Flying Fool," as his friends affectionately call him, is on his way but he is just in. Five times in the 3,600 feet of the long runway over which he sped in making his take-off, he was close to disaster. Twice by inches. At the very last, as he was climbing before straightening out for the start on his course leading north, his plane, weighted by a load of 5,150 pounds, barely cleared a string of telegraph wires. A few seconds before it had almost struck the cross-arms as he was attempting to get off the ground. Three times the plane struck soft spots and bounced into the air, always coming back to earth and finally straightening out after seconds of hesitation which seemed minutes to the anxious spectators fringing the flying field. The slightest slip would have been dire disaster, for Lindbergh knew he had no easy task in getting his plane off the ground and he increased his speed steadily as he tore down the runway. When he finally left the earth he was literally the "Flying Fool" as

## SINCLAIR IS SENTENCED TO TERM IN JAIL

**Millionaire Oil Operator  
Draws Three  
Months for—Contempt of Senate**

Washington, May 20.—(AP)—A sentence of three months in jail was imposed today upon Harry F. Sinclair, millionaire oil operator for contempt of the United States Senate.

In addition, Justice Hitz in the District of Columbia Supreme Court fixed his fine at \$500, both a jail sentence and fine being mandatory under the law.

The sentence was imposed because of Sinclair's refusal to answer certain questions in the Senate Teapot Dome investigation, when he was summoned for the sixth time in March, 1924. He was convicted on last March 16 after the jury had deliberated eight hours.

Immediately after sentence was imposed an appeal was noted to the District Columbia Court of Appeals and the oil man was released on \$5,000 bail.

The maximum sentence which Justice Hitz might have imposed was 12 months in jail and a fine of \$1,000. The three months and \$500 sentence apparently came as a surprise both to Sinclair and his attorneys, who had expected the minimum jail sentence of one month.

Before sentence was imposed Martin W. Littleton, of Sinclair counsel, a former member of Congress, appealed to the court for leniency declaring that Sinclair's refusal to answer the questions had not interfered with the oil investigation in any way and constituted a mere "irregularity." He added that he had the right to appeal to the court to demonstrate by the sentence that the law did not "reflect politics" and did not "speak for Senators" but for the citizen before the bar.

When Littleton concluded Justice Hitz directed Sinclair to stand up.

"Have you anything to say before sentence is imposed," the court asked the wealthy oil and turf man.

"I have nothing further to say than already has been said," was Sinclair's reply.

**Asheville May  
Be Made Stop  
For Air Mail**

Washington, May 20.—(AP)—Designation of Asheville, N. C., as a stop on the New York-Atlanta air mail route to be served by a feeder line from Spartanburg by the present contractor, without further advertising, is permissible, in the opinion of Comptroller General McCarl.

Postmaster General New sought the opinion of the Comptroller General in view of the desire of Asheville interests to have mail service and of the willingness of the Piltain Aircraft Corporation to perform the service. The postoffice department has not yet signified its intention to inaugurate the service but it is considered probable that the feeder line will be placed in operation when the new service begins, should Asheville interests guarantee sufficient postal business.

Opening of the New York-Atlanta air mail service this summer depends upon the lighting of the airway by the government under the direction of the Department of Commerce. The funds for the lighting system will become available July 1.

Orders for equipment have been placed for delivery at that time and work will be rushed in order that the service may be started at the earliest moment.

## MANY CHANGES MARK SESSION OF ASSEMBLY

**Presbyterians Present  
Report Providing  
Radical Changes in  
Machinery**

Eldorado, Ark., May 20.—(AP)—Reports of ad interim committees held the attention of the sixty-seventh annual general assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States today as the commissioners swung into the second day's work.

Among these reports was that of the committee on survey which recommends a radical change in the church machinery to be effected by the appointment of a committee of 44 members to have oversight and direction of all executive and promotional agencies of the assembly between annual sessions.

Eleven members of the committee would be women. All would be elected for a term of four years, no person eligible to serve more than two terms. Divided into six sub-committees, the work would be apportioned as follows:

Foreign missions, home missions, Christian education ministerial and benevolent relief, stewardship, men's work, and women's work.

The plan is submitted by the ad interim committee which holds the belief that the varied activities of assembly are "really one great cause of Christ" and that as such there would be unquestioned advantage in having the larger aspects of the work planned by one committee representing every phase of the work.

This proposal as well as other recommendations made by various committees must be submitted to a standing committee for consideration before it is brought to the General Assembly for action.

Reports on theological colleges of the Church as well as many smaller activities of the church, were scheduled for today. The annual report of the Women's Auxiliary of the church, submitted by Mrs. W. C. Winsborough, superintendent, showed that all departments experienced growth during the year.

There are 130,000 members enrolled in 2,355 auxiliaries in 16 states. The auxiliary last year gave \$1,362,136 to the entire work of the Church, an increase of \$66,000 over the previous year.

The annual summer conference of the auxiliary will be held at Montreat, N. C., July 14 to 21.

Scientists began digging into the lava that covers the buried city of Herculaneum, and immediately Vesuvius began growling, shaking the earth and throwing lava into the air.

Once the diggers would have quit their work in terror, thinking they had displeased the volcano god—or demon.

Now they look at Vesuvius, say "Thank heaven for that safety valve," and go on digging.

Our sham battle in the Atlantic goes along admirably. Firing is heavy, and the "blue" force, supposed to be defending us against invasion by the "black" enemy, yesterday afternoon blew up and destroyed a boat bringing airplanes to attack us. That's most satisfactory.

But in real war, the carriers bringing airplanes might not oblige us by coming within range of our guns. The planes might leave the coast, go up out of sight, and surprise our big cities.

What then?

In Chicago, Samuel Insull, not so young as when he worked with Edison in the last century, runs gas, electricity and grand opera, for a city going on four millions.

Now he arranges to run all the city's elevated, surface and future subway lines. Some yell "Monopoly," but that word is out of date. Now, it is "The bigger the better," if the man is up to his job.

Princeton's professor of Palaeontology, R. M. Field, says powerful protruding jaws on handsome men, in collar or clothing advertisements show degeneracy. The receding chin of the Neanderthal man, scores of centuries back, is a better chin, says the professor, because it could grip more tightly, hold more and bigger teeth, than the jaw of the collar advertisement.

The professor is 100 per cent wrong. Successful men usually have well developed jaws and noses. Thinking develops the nose, saved and made more to resistive, and the balance, \$100,000, for a

## VICTIMS OF BLAST TO BE BURIED TODAY

**Bodies of Several Other  
Schools Tragically  
Buried Saturday**

Bath, Mich., May 20.—(AP)—Funeral preparations were completed here today for the 44 persons killed in the blasting of the village school house by Andrew Kehoe, demented farmer, Wednesday. Steps were being taken by the State to provide financial relief for the stricken community.

It was planned to bury some of the victims, 37 of whom were children, late today and the others Saturday. Plans for a group funeral were abandoned when ministers and welfare workers agreed the mental anguish would be too great.

"It would be hard enough for father and mothers to give up their own, without enduring the trial of seeing all of the victims who a few days ago were joyful school mates, go to their grave together," one minister said.

Among those who will be buried Saturday is Kehoe's invalid wife who the man apparently slew by pounding her skull. The body had been toppled in an outhouse where it was burned when flames destroyed the place prior to the school house explosion.

Kehoe had taken the invalid woman from a Lansing hospital a few days before, presumably to move her to another institution.

A relief drive, instituted by Gov. Fred W. Green, got under way today. Funds for a new school house were being received from over the State by the Red Cross. If insufficiency is obtained by popular subscription, Governor Green said, the State Treasury will be drawn upon.

There is little enough we can do to lessen the grief, the Governor wrote in his appeal for funds. "We are not able to share their sorrow. We can help with the material problems of the community and these I am sure, the people want to share."

The police investigation into the tragedy was virtually at a standstill today, pending an inquest next Monday. The theory that Kehoe may have had assistance in mining the school was abandoned when it was learned the man had access at night to the building for several weeks.

Frank Smith, school janitor, told police a back door had been sprung for three or four weeks and that two other doors had been tampered with so they would not shut.

Washington, N. C., May 20.—(AP)—It was the propounder's sway in court this morning in the hearing on the admission of the last will of Judge George H. Brown. The widow of the last jurist, Mrs. Laura E. Brown, led by attorney J. C. B. Bringham, gave damaging testimony to that of the caveators, relating to the mental condition of her husband, his habits near the close of his life, the amount of attention paid to either the Judge or his widow by his nephews and nieces before his death. The goodness on the part of some of them, the fact that most of them were not at the funeral of the Judge, nor did these send messages of condolence. Counsel brought, however, that they had been in court during the present trial.

## Pinedo Hops Off To New Foundland

## PITT HENS IN FIGHTING MOOD

**Accept Challegne in  
Egg Contest and Be-  
gin Producing Rec-  
ord Sizes**

Pitt County hens evidently have accepted the challenge recently sent out by different parts of the State relative to production of all sizes, shape and structure of eggs and today is believed to have brought the contest to a climax with the bringing in of an abnormally large egg, containing a perfectly developed average sized egg and another which did not contain a shell.

The egg was laid by a hen on the farm of Mrs. Rufus Galloway at Grimesland. It was brought to the office of distributors of Purina Feed in this city, and later turned over to the Reflector for comparison with records claimed by other parts of the State.

The egg weighed 53-8 ounces and measured exactly eight inches in circumference. It was stated by Mrs. Galloway. She said numbers of hens had laid eggs of similar size the last few weeks. The mammoth phosis has attracted attention of the Grimesland neighborhood, and the What is claimed to be a record in raisers.

Galloway farm is a regular "camping ground" for ambitious poultry the way of small eggs, was brought to the Reflector office last Saturday by I. A. Nichols, farmer, residing a few miles north of Greenville. This product of a normal size measured exactly 21-2 inches in circumference.

The term of the men will expire January 1933. The members reappointed are: Dr. W. L. Poteat, Wake Forest; Dr. Alexander Graham, Charlotte; C. H. Vanstort, Greensboro; Prof. M. C. S. Noble, Sr., Chapel Hill; and A. M. Seales, Greensboro.

Governor McLean also announced the appointment of K. L. Clark, of Clarkston, as a member of the State Board of Equalization to succeed J. O. Carr, Wilmington, who recently resigned.

## Airplane Wing Found on Coast

New London, Conn., May 20.—(AP)—An airplane wing picked up in Fort Pond Bay at the extreme end of Montauk Point, Long Island, last night, and towed in here today by a coast guard patrol boat, had been in the water for months. It was determined after inspection.

When the piece of wreckage was picked up there was an opinion held that possibly the wing was from the "White Bird," plane of Nungesser and Goll, missing since their attempted flight from Paris.

The wing was brought here and Captain H. G. Hamlet, base commander of the coast guard, gave it an examination. The condition of the wing showed it must have been partly submerged in the water for a considerable period.

## Frantic Appeals for Aid Answered by Forces at Concentra- tion Points

New Orleans, May 20.—(AP)—Women and children were warned to evacuate Pointe Coupee parish today by flood relief dictator John M. Parker.

The warning issued by former Governor Parker, urgently requested all women and children, aged and infirm to leave the parish and directed residents of the area to prepare for the removal of livestock.

New Orleans, May 20.—(AP)—With the Bayou Teche converted into a raging torrent and overflowing its banks in many places, the residents of the Acadian country, through which the Bayou sweeps, today were approaching the panic stage.

The Bayou Teche, which ordinarily seems to have little current has been fed by the backwaters of the Atchafalaya and Bayou Des Glaises breaks, and now has taken on mammoth proportions.

The endangered territory in which approximately 105,000 persons live is largely in the path of the flood and John M. Parker, State Flood Director, has issued a warning that residents flee for their lives. This territory is approximately 120 miles northwest of New Orleans on the opposite side of the river.

The 27 towns are small, only two or three having a population of more than 500. They are Port Barre, Mottisville, Hazelwood, Cortabean, Armandville, Oaklawn, Benito, Teanore, Robin, Bushville, Huron, Fourie, Cecilia, Delcoud, Dedko, Nines, Henderson, Parks, Levert, Edmond, Tale Labbe, Cote St. Pierre, Caroline, Cade, Moriban and Oxford. They are in St. Martin, St. Landry and Avoye Parishes.

New Orleans, May 20.—(AP)—Panic today began to supplant the derisive confidence with which the residents of the Acadian country have heretofore viewed possibilities of a flood. Frantic appeals for aid were received at all concentration centers and relief workers were sent out to rescue the same persons, who a few days ago refused to leave their homes when pleaded with by rescue workers.

Refugees arriving at the camp at Lafayette revealed the change of front. They said they had not been afraid when the radio flood warnings were broadcasted, but that when relatives and friends from farther up Bayou Teche spread the alarm that the flood was coming they were ready to flee.

Bayou Teche, which flows through the heart of the Acadian country, and ordinarily is a sluggish stream, has become a raging torrent from back waters of the Atchafalaya and Bayou Des Glaises breaks and is overflowing its banks in many places. The refugees said.

Residents of Armandville, who arrived here last night, said that water reached that town when they left yesterday but that it was coming up so rapidly that many probably would be cut off before they could get out. The sudden rise in the Teche found the town unprepared and all women and children were ordered out immediately. The men stayed behind to save what they could.

The threatened area, which is 100 to 130 miles northwest of New Orleans on the west side of the river, has taxed facilities for relief and urgent appeals for more men and boats have been sent out. A train load of boats and 35 men reached Lafayette last night and similar trains were sent to Washington, La., from Monroe. Word was also received that another train load of boats was on the way from Beaumont, Texas.

An additional fleet of boats was being concentrated today at Morgan City and Houma in anticipation of relief work.

In addition to 500 persons who were taken out of the territory around Melville, Palmetto, Opelousas and Krolls Springs yesterday, rescue workers announced that they would evacuate all persons between Melville and Simmesport today.

A bout 150 persons, reported to be in need of food and other supplies but refusing to leave, are still living on the levee at Melville.

The conditions at Melville were reported to be growing steadily worse.

Gifford Pinchot, former Governor of Pennsylvania, was in Baton Rouge today to confer with relief director Parker on problems of relief and flood control. The former Governor spent yesterday in New Orleans.

Two deaths were reported last night, one at Port Barre where a negro boy died from exposure and the other at Opelousas, where a baby was reported to have died from infantile paralysis.

# CLOSE SCORES FEATURE PLAY YESTERDAY

Forced into undisputed possession of the major league spotlight for the day when rain blotted out the national pastimes in the East, the American Leaguers bore manfully to fandom with baseball entertainment through four interesting struggles.

Wilcy Moore, lanky Oklahoma farmer, seems destined to pitch all late innings for the New York Yankees unless the hurling staff of the league leaders takes a brace. Wilcy was hauled from the Bull pen again yesterday, this time to go to mound in the second inning to relieve Shocker after Cleveland had tied the score at 3—all.

Wilcy held the enemy in subjection until the ninth and when his mates seemed to be doing nothing about winning the game for him, he laid down a sacrifice to score Dugan from third and clinch the verdict 4 to 3, Lou Gehrig's ninth home run of the season, tying Babe Ruth's total, accounted for two Yankees scores in the first frame.

Hollis Thurston, Washington right hander, plastered Detroit with the Tigers' first shut out of the season, 3 to 0.

Topper Rigney, once a Detroit shortstop, singlehandedly gave Hollis all the help he needed by driving in two runs and scoring the third himself.

Chicago's young pitching ace Tommy Thomas, turned in the second shut-out of the day and his sixth win of the season, by blanking Philadelphia 3 to 0. The White Sox managerial alumni were out in force, with Eddie Collins and Kirt Gleason watching from the Athletic fold and Clarence Rowland from an umpire's berth, as the incumbent Schalk did his master minding. Ty Cobb, former Detroit pilot, ran his string of consecutive hit games to 19.

The St. Louis Browns victory over Boston came dramatically in the tenth inning when Ken Williams blasted one of Blin Harris' curves out of the lot for a home run, breaking a deadlock to win 6 to 5. The victory, St. Louis' fifth in the last few games, jumped them to a third place tie with Philadelphia. The Sox created their share of the excitement by falling on Wingard for four runs in the ninth to tie the score after two were out.

Individual representatives from a score of other schools are expected.

The Greenville Baseball Club went to Washington yesterday afternoon and dropped a perfectly good ball game to the town team of that place by the score of 9 to 0. Despite the one-sided score, the game was fairly well contested at times and furnished considerable thrills for those interested in the development of the two clubs.

West pitched a wonderfully effective game for Greenville, but received poor support at critical stages when hits counted for runs. Potts hurled a spectacular exhibition for Washington, and held the visitors hitless when bingles would have resulted in runs.

Washington will take on the locals at the fair grounds here tomorrow afternoon at four o'clock. The complete line-up of the local club will be seen in action and a good game is expected.

## Greenville Highs Score 13th Victory

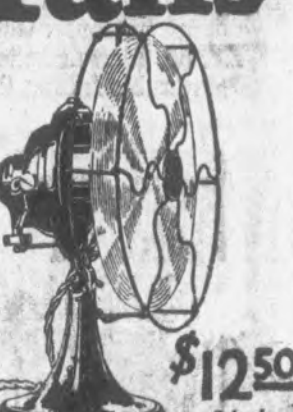

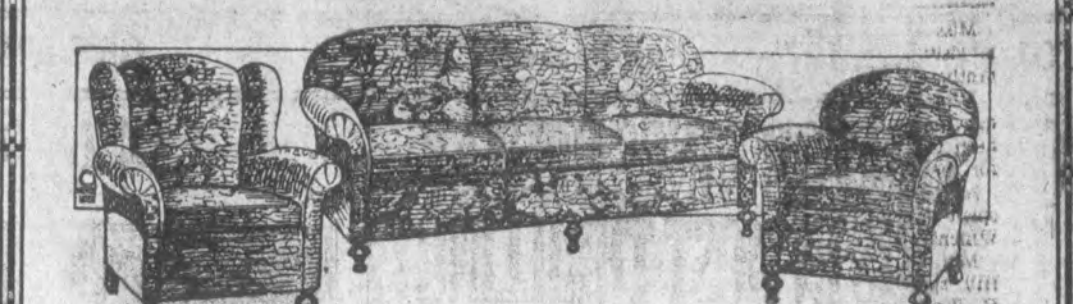

## EYES SEAWARD

The eyes of America are today seaward, and it might be truthfully said the heart of the majority also, following the course of the flight of Charles Lindbergh, who this morning, unaccompanied, hopped off from New York for a non-stop flight to Paris. After breaking all records for a cross-continent flight, this daring young aviator has waited in New York for days for the weather to clear enough to permit his hop-off for the French capital. Interest not only around the flying fields, but throughout the nation has grown daily as three American planes have waited for the start, and today enthusiasm runs high as the lone flier wends his way over the waters of the Atlantic with Paris as his goal.

If Lindbergh's plane is as strong as the wall and determination of its master we prophesy a successful voyage.

## NAMES FOR FLOOD BABIES

Another problem connected with the Mississippi flood causes a smile to distant readers. The Associated Press reports that colored babies, born in refugee camps or in town in the flood area, are being given names suggestive of the present situation along the river. Highwater Jones and Overflow Johnson are said to be authentic names. There are undoubtedly others yet more surprising.

The New York World suggests that public-spirited citizens with a gift for naming, send their suggestions to Red Cross authorities on the scene of action. It adds an important hint.

"And don't be a piker. If you're going to have the honor of naming a child, in close a large enough check to pay for that child's support during this trying period of its life."

It is easy to laugh at such stories and the funny names that some of those flood babies will bear through life. Yet the stories have a stronger appeal. Babies are being born in that stricken region, white ones as well as colored. Lives are taken by the flood or the disease and exposure that attend it, but the whole drama of human life goes on just the same. The train of thought started by reading of Highwater Jones and Overflow Johnson takes one into the midst of the flood terrors and problems and brings them close to our own daily lives.

## A VALUABLE LESSON

One of the most striking editorial cartoons seen for some time was that appearing in today's News and Observer captioned "A Valuable Lesson." The cartoon

pictures Judge Finley pointing out to a drinking driver a simple problem in arithmetic which is a bottle of "Hootch" plus an automobile, equals, or results in a suit of stripes. We suggest that copies of this easily understood problem be placarded throughout our state as a warning to the automobile driver who persists in indulging in alcoholic beverages, and in addition to this we urge that all other judges follow the example of Judge Finley who declares that nothing short of road sentences will be netted out in his court to drunken drivers regardless of race, sex or prominence.

## Thousands Attend Mecklenburg Day At Charlotte, N. C.

Charlotte, May 20.—(AP)—Thousands of North Carolinians gathered here today in celebration of the 152nd anniversary of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence, a document much disputed among historians but which generally is accepted as having been signed in 1776 by a group of representative North Carolinians.

Perfect weather greeted the thousands who turned out this morning for a mile long parade and brief shower at noon did not dampen the holiday spirit. Late today military units from Fort Bragg and National Guardsmen from a number of cities will stage a sham battle.

## LONE AVIATOR WINGS HIS WAY TO PARIS IN THRILLING NON-STOP FLIGHT OF AGE

(Continued from Page One.) he is called. The plane carried 448 gallons of gasoline and the 25-year-old aviator, who believes that he travels fastest who travels alone, and who thought as he sped away that he could fly 45 hours on that amount of fuel. He does not think that he will need it, for he expects to land in Paris with

no stops on the way in not more than 36 hours.

There was fog reported and the temperature off New Foundland was lower than he would have liked, had he been able to pick. When he tired shortly after 11 o'clock he expected to see the crowd watching him closely again today.

He saw most of them only when he was attired in flying clothes and ready to defy the elements over a three thousand mile front.

The weather at midnight was more hopeful and it was decided that "Slim" would hop off if the improvement kept up. He was up at 2:30 o'clock and was at his hangar in 45 minutes. The improvement in the Atlantic was reported as hoped for, but in the meantime a rain began falling here. The up favorable local weather again made the verdict a doubtful one. The rain did not last long and although a heavy mist hung over the field and weather reports was studied again and then Lindbergh suddenly said "let's go" to S. J. Stum, a fellow Missouri National Guardsman and representative of the S. Louis group sponsoring the non-stop flight effort.

The Spirit of St. Louis, which has been carefully gone over by mechanics and found in perfect condition, was wheeled from a hangar which had been barred to all except the mechanics.

Traveling light, with only a week's supply of army emergency rations "Slim" has no radio and will not be heard from until he lands in Paris. He hoped as he left that he would "get a break" off New Foundland where he was anxious to see landmarks and get his bearings for his dash across the ocean to Ireland.

Always a man of few words, he had even less to say than usual before he left this morning. When the plane was being fueled at an automobile nearby with B. F. McHony of the Ryan Air Lines, its builder. He seemed impatient to be off. He half smiled when the weather began to clear and when the sun finally came out just before he crawled into the in-seated cockpit to tune up his motor his smile became a broad grin.

Clarence D. Chamberlin, who has hoped several weeks to get off on a hop to Paris, wished Lindbergh good luck, as did Commander Richard E. Byrd, who will follow the trail blazed by the youth in a few days.

Commander Byrd's careful preparations to have the America act as escort for the Spirit of St. Louis finally prevented rather than insured it. The America was in the air for a three hour test flight when the commander decided the youngster was ready to go. He came down to find out just when he could tender his services as escort and found the flying hosieman so far advanced in his preparations that he was able to be off before the giant Fokker could get back into the air to follow.

Lindbergh evidenced no excitement or nervousness before the hop off. In the Curtis hangar, the young trail blazer, after carefully studying weather charts, played with a stray kitten. He donned his flying suit about 7:30 a. m., five minutes before his motor was started. Before boarding the plane, he smilingly remarked to Chief Abraham Skidmore of the Nassau county police:

"When I enter that cockpit, its ke going into the death chamber. When I get to Paris it will be like a war."

With the confidence of youth, the 25-year-old flier started over the aerial on which Captains Nungesser and Coli. French aviators were lost in their flight from Paris to New York.

Dapper and immaculate in the newest of aviation apparel, the young aviator seemed to reflect a gay challenge to the dangers of

the 3,800 miles between New York and the French metropolis.

Disregarding the threatening weather, the "flying fool" again merited his name as he fulfilled his promise to start the very minute that the clearing comes regardless of whether "it's breakfast, supper, dinner or the middle of the night."

Instruments on board in front of him will be the young aviator's sole guide. He can not see in front of his enclosed Ryan monoplane except through a periscope. He carries no wireless.

Lindbergh began his journey from San Diego, California, almost two weeks ago. Spanning the continent in two jumps in less than a day's flying time, he established a new record for transcontinental air travel.

Youngst of the trans-Atlantic contenders, Lindbergh is a post-war product of aviation. He was born at Detroit, February 4, 1902, and at the age of 19 learned to fly at Lincoln, Neb. He soon completed a flying course in the army and was graduated with the reputation of being one of the best pilots in the service.

Excursions with flying circuses followed. Then he entered the air mail service, piloting a plane between Chicago and St. Louis. In six years he spent 1,800 hours in the air.

His flight is being backed by a group of St. Louis business men. Probably the one person most anxious for his success is Mrs. Evangeline L. Lindbergh of Detroit, his mother. Mrs. Lindbergh, a widow, has flown with her son and her confidence in the youthful pilot already sees him safely landed in Paris.
