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SENATOR SMOOT DECLARES CONGRESS WILL BE CALLED TOGETHER DURING OCTOBER

Declaration of Member From Utah Comes After Conference With President.

Washington, June 8.—(AP)—Congress will be called in special session in October, Senator Smoot, of Utah, declared today after a conference with President Coolidge.

On leaving the White House, the Utah Senator represented the President as being convinced of the wisdom of the session.

The senator, who is a member of the senate finance committee which handles tax legislation, added that there "is no doubt" the call being issued so that Congress can get a running start on its legislative program.

Senator Smoot declared that the deficiency appropriation bill failed of action at the close of last session, tax reduction and settlement of election contests were problems that must be taken up at an early date along with flood control measures.

No time had been set, he added, but October 1 or 15 was the most likely date.

Mr. Smoot predicted that the Republicans would have no difficulty in organizing the senate. If the special session is called on October 1 there seemed no doubt that Congress would be able to adjourn in May or early in June.

Public opinion the senator continued has fairly well shaped itself on the important problems which Congress would be called upon to deal with and in his opinion there should be no major difficulties in solving these questions.

Mr. Smoot believed the Smith and Vane Senate election contests would be handled expeditiously, and that passage of the deficiency bill, which failed in the March filibuster this year was of prime importance.

After the deficiency bill has been disposed of, he believed tax legislation should be taken up and then if flood measures have been shaped Congress should turn its attention to them.

The Senator also believed that farm relief would take an important place in the next Congress. Although he predicted a bill similar to the defeated McNairy-Haugen measure would not have a chance he predicted that some form of farm relief legislation meeting the views of the president and the desires of the rural sections would be worked out.

"The problems before Congress will be entirely domestic ones," he said. "I do not look for any major foreign question that will have to be dealt with."

Reconstruction Of Parishes of La. Considered

New Orleans, June 8.—(AP)—Plans for the reconstruction of the Louisiana parishes hit by the flood waters were beginning to materialize today as relief committees in many parishes began an intensive study of the damage wrought by the waters.

Charles L. Denechaud, relief director for the South Central Louisiana area, directed the survey with a view to conferring Friday with Secretary Hoover and James L. Plesier, vice chairman of the Red Cross.

The committees have been asked to prepare accurate data on farm acreage flooded, number of families affected by the flood, number of persons flooded out, and losses and funds needed.

The forecast of the weather bureau yesterday that new waters coming down the Mississippi probably would extend flood conditions in some part of Louisiana until August, caused the State Department of Agriculture to issue a statement detailing the best method of utilizing the short planting season.

The flood waters continued to pile up at the mouth of the Atchafalaya, but little further damage was expected.

WESTON-SALEM PLANS TO CELEBRATE RETURN OF CHARLES LINDBERGH

Winston-Salem, June 8.—(AP)—Simultaneously with Washington's celebration of the return of Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh to America, Winston-Salem will hold a celebration Saturday morning in honor of the daring flyer's accomplishment in flying from New York to Paris and at the same time, will memorialize Nungesser and Gollé, French aviators who attempted to make the flight from Paris to America.

The local program will include blowing of factory whistles, brief talks, band music and other features.

Twice in succession, American fliers have crossed the Atlantic in one "hop," Lindbergh flying to Paris—Chamberlin with Levine, almost to Berlin.

What will military and naval gentlemen say now about their theory that "the airplane is no real menace to this country?"

Out of two attempts to fly across the ocean by American, both succeeded.

What would be the probable percentage of success if five thousand foreign aviators, with full government backing and unlimited expenditure of money, should fly the other way on a hostile errand?

Cyrus H. K. Curtis' evening newspaper, never an alarmist, says these two flights "show a new war menace," and "the flight assumed in the opinion of military officials the cloak of military menace, emphasizing the need for adequate air defense."

President Coolidge will devote earnest attention to this plain fact. A hostile European nation could send a thousand or two thousand bomb dropping air machines westward across the Atlantic today and within forty-eight hours New York, Boston and Washington could be wiped out.

FLOOD AREAS AGAIN FACED BY DISASTER

Rising Waters in Arkansas, Missouri and Illinois Drive Many To Refugee Camps.

New Orleans, June 8.—(AP)—Rising waters in sections of Arkansas, Missouri and Illinois drove hundreds of persons to levees and refugee camps today.

Disaster relief headquarters of the American Red Cross was informed that 1,100 persons in the refugee camp at Marianna, Ark., and that refugees were pouring out of the St. Francis valley in the vicinity of the city.

More than 1,000 families were expected to be affected by the new rise, although field workers were unable yet to predict the dimensions of the new disaster.

A six inch rise was registered in the bottom lands of the St. Francis basin yesterday. The waters were rising higher today.

Union County, Illinois, was reported virtually evacuated. Livestock and other property has been moved from the danger zone, but no refugee camps have been established. Most of the persons have fled to homes of relatives and friends in the hills.

A seven and one half inch rise was reported from Blytheville, Ark., where gardens planted by the Red Cross to grow food supplies are rapidly going under water. It was announced today that many families would be removed permanently from the area since it will be impossible to grow any kind of crop this year.

FLYING ACE RESTING FOR CELEBRATION

As Liner Draws Near American Shores, Lindbergh Prepares For Reception.

U. S. S. Memphis, by Wireless to the Associated Press, June 8.—Journeying homeward from his triumphal welcome in Paris, Brussels and London, Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh has passed the half way mark of the Virginia Capes today, making steady progress at 22 1-2 knots.

Knowing full well the round of greeting he will have to undergo after he steps ashore on his native soil, the flier is resting as much as possible. He had another good sleep last night.

The photographers had their in-lings with him yesterday—the first day of brilliant sunshine since the warship steamed out of Cherbourg last Saturday.

"Let's have it over with," he said so four photographers, packing their cameras climbed with him to the bridge. They photographed him looking out over the sea, with his blond hair waving picturesquely in the wind, took him at the guns, and sitting on one of the two seaplanes on deck ready for action.

Later they snapped him with the ship's officers and with Tasse, the Kangaroo mascot, who did not like being held up on his hind legs even by a hero.

Last night Colonel Lindbergh was the dinner guest along with the ship's departmental heads.

Several vessels have been sighted by the Memphis, the latest of them being the Bremen, eastward bound. The Bremen came out of her course to salute the distinguished passenger. There were three blasts of the Bremen's whistle, and then the Captain Radioed his good wishes to Lindbergh.

Washington, June 8.—(AP)—With Colonel Charles Lindbergh half way home from Europe on the Crusces Memphis, the National Capital today was busily engaged in perfecting its program to welcome America's aviation hero which will far exceed and reception ever extended to a private citizen in its history.

Daily the list of honors which the United States is conferring upon her 25 year old one eagle is growing and the latest is the award of the Hubbard Medal of the National Geographic Society, which has been bestowed only seven times to the great explorers of the air, sea and land.

Washington will be entirely devoted next Saturday to the honoring of the New York to Paris flier. Government offices, banks, stores and business houses all will close at noon so that Yorkers can join in (Continued on Page Two)

Says Greenville Is Best Policed Town In State

Greenville is one of the best policed cities in North Carolina, according to information made public yesterday afternoon by E. P. Renner, private detective of the Brant Detective Agency, New York City, who has just completed a two week's investigation here.

"There is less vice and immorality in Greenville than any small city I ever operated in," the detective stated. "It is not only one of the cleanest cities from the standpoint of morality, but protected by the most efficient police department to be found anywhere in a town of similar size."

Discussing the problem of illicit liquor traffic, Mr. Renner said the only bootlegger of any importance in this locality had been apprehended during his investigation. He said there were a minor number of small whiskey dealers, but that their operations were confined to the outskirts of the city.

As to the question of gambling he intimated that only one or two such places existed in Greenville prior to his arrival. These have been cleaned out, and the town today is absolutely free of gambling of an extensive nature.

STEPHENSON SHOT DOWN BY OFFICERS

Two Other Members Of Smithfield Jail Delivery, Surrendered Today.

Raleigh, June 8.—(AP)—With Robertson indicted with Robert Stephens, for the murder of "Mighty" Forsythe, alleged Raleigh rum-runner, perhaps fatally wounded and his alleged confederate, together with Rossie Parker, again occupying cells in the Johnston County jail, Johnston officials believe the final chapter has been written in the Smithfield jail delivery of Sunday night.

Paul Adams, fourth member of the party which escaped after cutting their way through the floor of their cell, is still at large, but is surrounded by a posse of deputies near Lillington and his capture is imminent.

Stephenson was brought down with a bullet in his right side, when officers surprised the escaping party at a filling station near Lillington early this morning, where they had stopped for supplies on what was admitted to be a dash for the South Carolina line. Stephenson is under guard in an Erwin Hospital where authorities say that unless complications set in, he will live.

Separate and Parker, after eluding a posse of nearly a dozen officers in the woods about Lillington through the morning, walked into the office of Sheriff T. M. Turley at Smithfield just before noon, surrendered and were returned to cells in the Johnston jail.

Raleigh, June 8.—(AP)—Robert Stephens, indicted with Robert Stephens, for the murder in November of "Mighty" Forsythe, Raleigh alleged rum-runner, was shot early this morning when he, Separak and the two men who escaped with them from the Johnston county jail Sunday night, were surprised near Lillington by a sheriff's posse.

Separak and his two companions have been cornered in a section of woods within ten miles of Lillington. Their capture is imminent. Officers who surprised the four escaped men have been augmented by other officers from Harnett and Johnston counties.

Stephenson is at point of death in an Erwin hospital. The bullet entered Stephenson's right side and he was operated on at the hospital.

The other men made good their break for liberty when surprised by the officers but Stephenson was brought down by the fire of the officers and Paul Stevens, driver of the small automobile in which the men were preparing to leave the section was captured.

Several of the officers had opened fire on the men and it was not known just which brought down Stephenson. Stevens was placed in jail in Harnett county.

The shooting occurred when officers surprised the four escaped men and Paul Stevens, driver of the car, at a filling station near Nell's Creek church, about seven miles from Lillington, shortly after one o'clock this morning.

Sheriff Matthews and his officers had learned where the men spent Monday night and they were planning on surprising the quartet of escaped men at this place, but they had made an early start and the officers came upon them at the roadside gasoline tank.

The four were headed for South Carolina. Stevens, Dunn officers said, has been arrested there for bootlegging. The men apparently were planning no stops on their way to South Carolina.

While other officers pressed for the three men who made their getaway, Sheriff Matthews brought Stephenson to the Erwin hospital and returned to the man hunt.

The sheriff had six men with him when they stood at the gas tank. Apparently the men had delayed their break from their hiding place in Harnett county until last night or more than two days after their escape and apparently intended to do all their traveling at night, and a small automobile was decided upon rather than a conspicuous new one.

Stephenson, Separak and two others, Paul Adams, Harnett youth, charged with firing on Johnston officers, and Rossie Parker, alleged auto thief, escaped from the Johnston county jail at Smithfield by ramming a hole through the ceiling of the court room and dropping from the cell corridor by means of knitted bedcoverings.

Forsythe was killed November 22.

Stephenson's condition three hours later was reported as "fair," according to attaches of the hospital at Erwin, and he will recover unless complications set in. He is

FARM WOMEN SHORT COURSE BEGINS HERE

Seventy-Five Rural Housekeepers Enroll For Study at Teachers College.

Following the commencement exercises Monday when two hundred young women graduated from East Carolina Teachers College, another school opened in the Administration building, Tuesday, when seventy-five rural housekeepers matriculated for the short course for farm women offered through the co-operation of the Extension Department of State College, the home demonstration agent of Pitt County, Miss Bertha Lee Ferguson, and East Carolina Teachers College.

The purposes of this school is to give rural housekeepers an opportunity to come together for a period of four days and to gather information and swap experiences in the art of home making. The subjects taught are practical cooking, meal planning and table service, house furnishing, clothing, food preservation and arts and crafts.

Through the generosity of the Woman's Club and the business interests of the town, the students are being entertained free of charge. Most of the women drive in from the country, hence they take only the midday meal in town. Thursday the Woman's Club, and Friday the Tobacco Board of Trade. Through the generosity and cooperation of the college these meals are being served in the college dining room.

Former Field Marshal Congratulates Chamberlin and Levine on Achievement.

Berlin, June 8.—(AP)—Germany's veteran president, Field Marshal Von Hindenburg, received Chamberlin and Levine at the executive mansion today and congratulated them on their achievement in spanning the Atlantic by air from New York to Germany.

The interview, which was of a cordial nature, lasted 18 minutes. President Von Hindenburg handed each of his visitors a fine framed autographed portrait of himself.

After questioning the Americans as to the details of their flight, he expressed the hope that it would contribute to bringing the American and German peoples in closer communion.

Chamberlin and Levine were accompanied by the American ambassador, Dr. Jacob Gould Shuman. A crowd massed outside in the Wilhelmstrasse gave them a rousing volley of "hochs" upon their entrance and exit, while pair of statue-like sentries in field gray and steel helmets, standing on either side of the door, saluted and clicked heels in the most approved Prussian style.

Ambassador Schuman was in top hat and ceremonial morning garb but the aviators were in the only clothes they brought with them—those they wore on their great flight.

They arrived in a down-pour but left in brilliant sunshine, giving the waiting platoon of photographers their tiring. The ambassador was slightly annoyed at the cameramen's persistence and finally shouted an energetic "Halt!"—the equivalent in German and the car whirled the trio back to the embassy.

The majordomo of the presidential household, in full uniform with ivory headed cane and cocked hat under his arm, said farewell from the top of the steps.

Ostend, June 8.—(AP)—Four fifths of the clubs of Rotary International are represented here at the conference now in progress, a check up on the attendance showed today.

Today's conference put through most of its resolution program with little discussion, generally accepting the committee's report as presented by William R. Manier, Jr., of Nashville, Tenn. Rotary administration was revised with a view to greater flexibility by the adoption of resolution no. 3, which is regarded as one of the most important decisions of the convention. This resolution, Mr. Manier said, was designed to open the way for a revision of the committee system and establish and area of administration throughout Rotary as a step toward erecting the machinery for administration throughout the world.

Most of today's forenoon session was devoted to addresses on and discussion of club administration and the actual working of the Rotary idea.

Several Injured In Bomb Explosion

Moscow, Russia, June 8.—(AP)—Twenty-six persons were seriously injured when two bombs were thrown in a business club at Leningrad last night while a meeting of members of the debating section of the communist party was in progress, it was learned today. The premises were badly damaged.

The bombs were thrown by two strangers who entered the hall quickly one after another, hurled the bombs and then rushed out firing revolvers as they ran. The explosion took place almost immediately. The building was surrounded by militia soon after a resulting fire was extinguished.

In addition to the 26 seriously injured and taken to a hospital, there were several others who suffered slight injuries.

PROHIBITION AGENT SHOT DURING RAID

Baltimore, June 8.—(AP)—Chas. C. Rouse, federal prohibition agent, was shot in the abdomen and seriously wounded today during a raid in northeast Baltimore.

Rouse's assailant, who fired several shots from a house which the enforcement officer was attempting to enter, escaped.

Rouse has been a member of the dry force here for about five years.

PIRATES AND YANKS STILL HOLD LEAD

(By The Associated Press)

Battle flags of the Pittsburgh Pirates and New York Yankees still are flying at the top of the major leagues despite the efforts of 14 other clubs to lower them.

All the homerun power in the bats of Ruth and Gehrig was needed by the Yankees yesterday to repulse the charging White Sox, but the league leaders managed to turn back their rivals by a count of 4 to 1.

Yankee hits off the pitching of Alphonse Thomas numbered only one less than the White Sox gathered in from the slants of Waite Hoyte, but the Yankees hits were long ones that counted runs. Ruth made his 18th homer, Gehrig his fourteenth and Pat Collins added another, while Clancy, of the White Sox, cracked out one for the visitors only tally.

In the four times they have met the Yankees now have won three games from the White Sox. The present series which opened with the Yank victory yesterday has three more games to run.

Opening their series against the Giants, the National League leaders were as successful as the Yankees. Despite two New York homers the Pirates kept up the Giant killing streak they started at the polo grounds last month, getting 16 hits off the notoriously poor New York pitching and winning 9 to 6.

Chicago's 7 to 6 victory over Brooklyn meanwhile sent the Cubs to third place above the Giants and only a few points below the Cardinals.

By confidence the tail end club in each league as well as the leaders won their games. Jackie May's seven hit pitching gave the Cincinnati Reds a 5 to 1 start on their series with the Phillies. While the Red Sox just survived a Tiger rally in the ninth and held the long end of a 6 to 5 count.

As Connie Mack's revised line up won a hitting match from the Browns 11 to 9, a bit of added drama appeared in a last fight between pitcher Gaston, of the Browns and a spectator who was "riding" him as Gaston walked from the field after being batted off the mound.

The Boston Braves' 12 to 5 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals was remarkable chiefly for the lack of consideration with which the visitors treated the champions touted pitching staff, while the Senators 10-8 decision over the Cleveland Indians was partly due to the hitting of Tris Speaker against his old teammates.

the dense throng of admirers of the youthful aviator when he sets foot again on his native soil at the Navy Yard. It also will be a gay and resplendent city for every building it is planned; will be bedecked with flags and bunting.

Plans for the welcoming of the flyer to Washington to become a nation-wide tribute have been made a reality. Dr. King Denies Peonage Charge

Athens, Ga., June 8.—(AP)—Dr. W. R. King took the stand in U. S. District Court today and entered unqualified denial to charges of peonage conditions on the farm he formerly occupied in Oglethorpe County.

The farmer-physician replied with an emphatic "no sir" to questions as to whether he had ever used force or threats to keep laborers on his farm or at his sawmill or as to whether he had used "any means" to force persons to work for him.

On direct examination Dr. King said that at different times he had struck four negroes, explaining the reason in each instance. He told Benny Dorsey to make him tell where he had placed a time book stolen from the saw mill. A riding whip was used on Nellie Elder, during an argument over provisions which he said she had been giving to a negro preacher. James Felton was switched for cursing a sawyer at his mill and Tom Davis was struck with a piece of iron when the negro struck at Dr. King during an argument, the latter said. Other witnesses yesterday had testified in refutation of stories told by former employees of Dr. King.

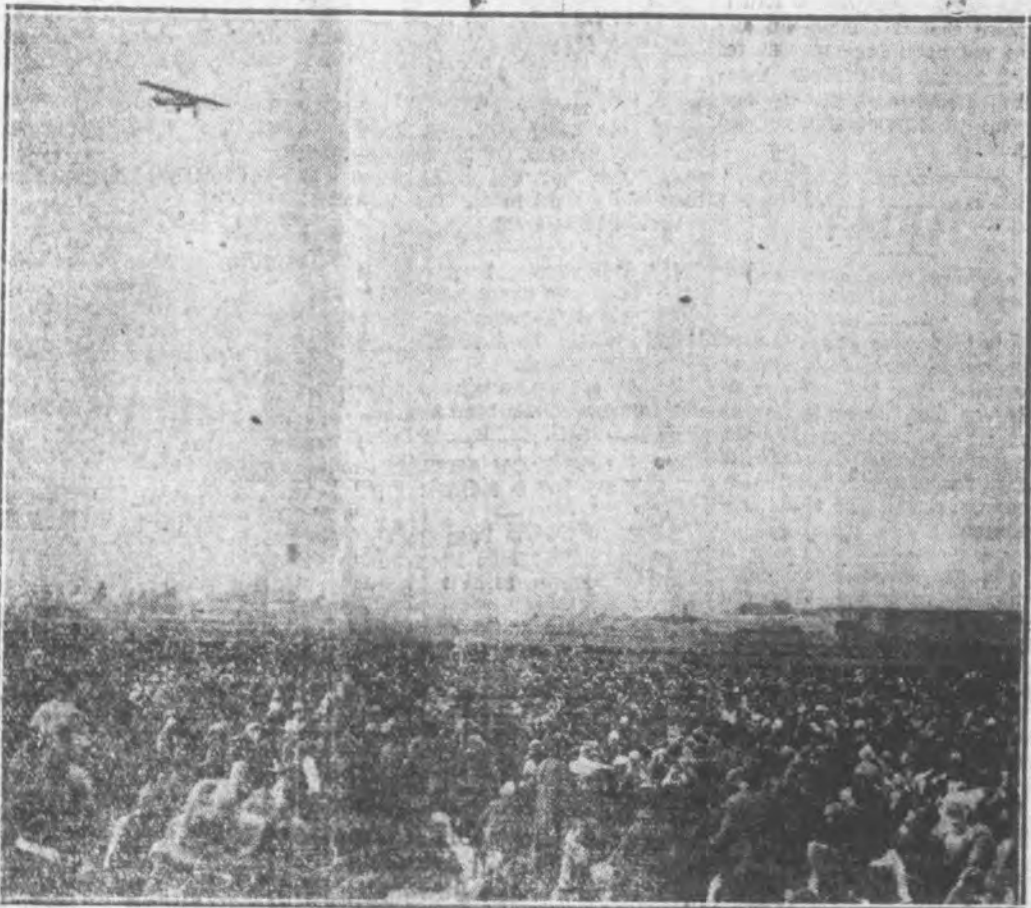

ENTIRE TOWN TURNS OUT FOR CHAMBERLIN



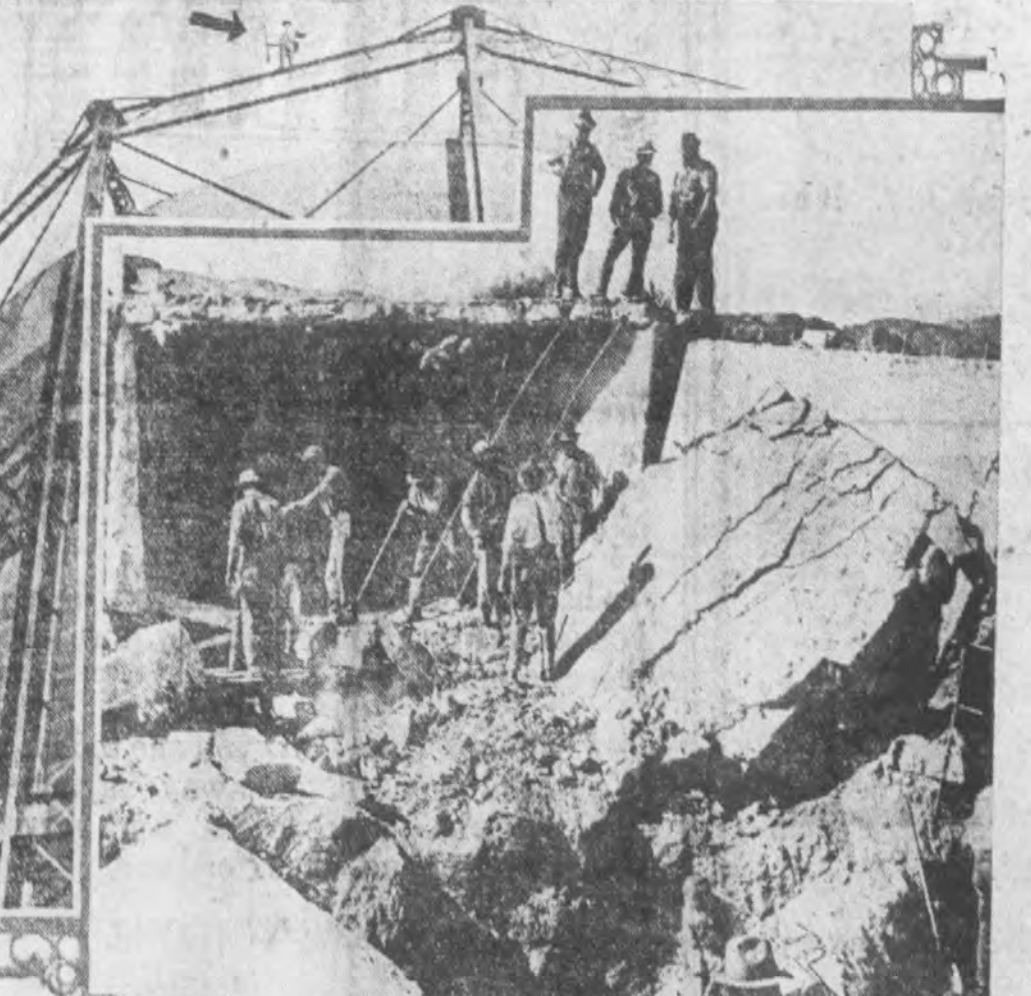

College Editor Ready to Appear Before Grand Jury

Raleigh, June 8.—(AP)—W. E. Wilson, State College student-editor, today wired president E. C. Brooks that he was ready to return to Raleigh and appear before the grand jury in the probe of charges against Raleigh policemen, when ever summoned.

Mr. Wilson left for his home in Asheville yesterday morning with relatives and did not wait for his diploma or accept of service of a subpoena calling him before the grand jury. It was a result of charges made by Mr. Wilson that the investigation started.

Dr. Brooks wired Mr. Wilson as follows:
"You are criticized by the morning paper for failure to appear at sheriff's office yesterday. Did you receive summons to appear yesterday? Why did you fail to appear yesterday and why did you fail to attend graduating exercises? Answer my expense."
Dr. Brooks received the following telegram from Mr. Wilson:
"Did not receive summons. Left Raleigh yesterday morning to drive relatives home. Father due back on job this morning. Will return for trial when summoned."

Dean E. L. Cloyd said that just at the close of the graduating exercises he received a notice which was telephoned to the treasurer's office at the college as follows:
"The sheriff wants the following men to report to his office as soon as possible after exercises: W. E. Wilson, J. L. Smathers, H. M. Coley, M. L. Crawford, B. E. Howard, W. H. Campbell and Bryan Wilson."

Dean Cloyd at once made an effort to locate those men.

W. E. Wilson could not be located. J. L. Smathers was notified. Upon calling the home of H. M. Coley in Raleigh, Mrs. Coley said that H. M. Coley had already left the city for Anniston, Ala., to attend camp. M. L. Crawford was reported as having gone home. B. E. Howard had left for his home in Concord. W. H. Campbell, whose home is in Raleigh, was reported as being at work for the Carolina Light and Power Company, and Bryan Wilson, a foreman at State College, had left for his home in Newton.

Dean Cloyd immediately called the sheriff's office and made this report.

Lindbergh May Visit This State

Elizabeth City, June 8.—(AP)—President Coolidge is taking a hand in Elizabeth City's and North Carolina's invitation to Colonel Lindbergh, trans-Atlantic flier, to make his first flight to Kill Devil Hill, near here, upon his return to America. Kill Devil Hill is the scene of the first airplane flight made in America by the Wright brothers.

The invitation was extended to Colonel Lindbergh in a cablegram from the local Chamber of Commerce Friday. Today, the Chamber of Commerce is in receipt of a telegram from Everett Sanders, secretary to the President, which states the invitation is being brought to the attention of the committee in charge of reception of Col. Lindbergh.

Representatives Lindsay C. Warren and Chas. M. Stedman, of North Carolina, have promised they will assist in bringing the matter to the attention of Colonel Lindbergh upon his arrival. Strong hopes are held here that the visit will be made, as Kill Devil Hill is but an hour and a half or two hours flying time from Washington, it is possible that Col. Lindbergh could make the trip in one day, paying honor to the pioneer aviators and greting the people of North Carolina.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population

Denver.—(INS).—One of Colorado's "Ghost Town" districts—a former beehive of mining industry—along the famous Georgetown Loop—is going to lose its passenger railroad service.

The encroachment of the motor bus has resulted in the authorization by the State Utilities Commission of the abandonment of passenger rail service between Idaho Springs and Silver Plume with Central City, Blackhawk, Lawton and other famed mining towns in between.

The Colorado and Southern railroad claimed in its petition for abandonment that it lost money on its passenger service to the district over a long period.

The Georgetown Loop, one of the most wondrously scenic rail routes in the Colorado Rockies, has for years been a major attraction for tourists. It was considered one of the most remarkable engineering feats in railroad construction, winding along steep mountain sides and over hanging trestles to a height of more than 12,000 feet.

Automobiles and buses will now transport sightseers to the district although an occasional freight train will be seen carrying away ore from the workings that are still in operation in this district.

Miss Kathryn Evans, a Denver girl, has the distinction of being the first person of her sex to graduate in chemical engineering from the University of Denver. Miss Evans concedes that she may encounter much difficulty in securing a position in her chosen field, because, she says, "they don't usually hire a woman for engineering work."

Frank M. Case, 83, a veteran Colorado pioneer took his first flight in an airplane recently, just 61 years after he came across the western plains in an ox cart. The plainsman declared there wasn't much more thrill in soaring through the sky than he experienced in fighting off foraging Indians in his trek from Indiana to Colorado in the early 60s. Case makes his home in Denver.

The Colorado chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution are going to erect a granite memorial monument upon the site where gold was first discovered in Colorado. The romance of the discovery, made by a party headed by William Green Russell of Georgia, in 1858, will be told on a bronze tablet attached to the monument. The first gold located in the State was at the junction of Cherry Creek and the Platte River, about five miles south of what is now the city of Denver. The original "diggings" were valued at about \$500, and the great gold rush of 1858 followed.

A new elementary science course in Denver schools, to be inaugurated next September, may result in many pets of the animal kingdom being brought to the school room by youthful pupils for animal studies. The course is part of a plan to "humanize education," according to directors of curricula. The new course, it is explained, is motivated by a desire to have elementary pupils develop a human feeling toward animals and to learn of the adaptation of every living thing.

PRESIDENT VON HINDENBERG RECEIVES AMERICAN BIRDMEN AT EXECUTIVE MANSION

(Continued From Page One) new American flag in honor of its guests—a banner of such ample proportions as to dominate the entire Wilhelmplatz.

The stars and stripes were displayed all about the business section of Berlin often in clusters with the German national colors and the Prussian State flag.

America's new aerial heroes, were up fairly early this morning prepared to undergo the round of ceremonies of which yesterday's welcome to Tempelhof air field was but the beginning.

Although they did not retire until late, they were up at 9:15 Chamberlain was still in the tub when the first newspaper man got in touch with Levine.

"We didn't get to bed 'till the wee hours of the morning," he said. "I don't know just when, but it was already daylight. We were so busy going through the hundreds of cables that it was very late before we went to sleep."

Asked which messages interested him most, Levine said:

"It would be a long story to tell

you all that, but I will say that a message was sent from Chamberlain's dad I'll dig it out for you later."

Then turning questioner himself he asked:

"But how tell me it is really true that Mrs. Chamberlain and Mrs. Levine are on the way over?"

When assured that they had sailed from New York for Germany he expressed great satisfaction.

The airmen are the guests of the American embassy, where Colonel Lindbergh was the guest of the embassy of Paris after his flight from New York to Paris. They were taken to the embassy soon after their arrival last evening from Kottbus, near Klinge, where they were forced down Monday while trying to reach Berlin on their trans-Atlantic flight from New York.

The airmen went to bed after an informal dinner at the embassy with the hoofs and songs of all Berlin ringing in their ears. Had they flown direct to Berlin from New York the welcome given them could hardly have been more enthusiastic than the demonstration when they landed at the Tempelhof field last evening.

As they drove from the flying field in the ambassadorial car, they were cheered repeatedly, the automobile making its way through the crowded streets only with the aid of a police vanguard. Such enthusiasm has not been seen since Field Marshal Von Hindenburg made his triumphal entry into the capital as president-elect in 1925. When they reached the embassy there was another demonstration and they had to appear on the balcony to satisfy the multitude.

Some enthusiastic Germans even went without food to greet the fliers. It was felt that the descent of the trans-Atlantic fliers near Kottbus did more to put the city on the map than a half century of effort by the Chamber of Commerce of that place. Lord Mayor Krueger intimated that if Chamberlain and Levine did not return in 1930 for the celebration of the one thousandth anniversary of Kottbus, they would not be grateful adopted sons.
