GERMAN PEOPLE COMPETE TO
ENTERTAIN DARING AVIATORS
AT NUMEROUS FESTIVITIES

Suggested That Cham-
berlin be Brought to
United States on Ger-
man Cruiser.

Berlin, June 9.—(AP)—Feted and
feasted since they landed on
German soil after their flight from
New York, Clarence Chamberlin
and Charles Levine, were on the thresh-
old today of still further honors.
The enthusiasm of the country
over the flight knows no bounds
and organizations and individuals
are competing to entertain the air-
men.

Among the many suggestions
that have been made is that when
Chamberlin returns to the United
States he be taken aboard a Ger-
man warship, preferably the
cruiser Berlin.

"This honor," says the Achur
blatt, "would show the American
people more than anything else how
proud Germany is over the fact
that the two countries are not di-
vided any longer by the ocean."

On Saturday the two aviators
plan to fly to Potsdam with lead-
ing German air league officials.
Next day they expect to fly to
Vienna. They will return to Ber-
lin Thursday proceeding by air to
Bremerhaven to meet their wives
due from New York the next day.
Such enthusiasm as has been
aroused over the flight is rarely
seen in Berlin. From the time the
fliers rose yesterday to keep their
appointment with President Van
Hindenburg until they returned to
the American embassy, their head-
quarters, to dress for an official din-
ner, they were constantly obliged to
acknowledge greetings.

The popular not only talks about
the two Americans but sings about
them. As hastily composed ballad
sung to the tune of a well known
German ditty, is heard everywhere.
It begins: "Chamberlin, Chamber-
lin, has dich sehen in Berlin." "Let
us see you in Berlin."

The newspapers are filled with
columns of description of the
flight and its significance and praise
for Chamberlin and Levine.

The Communist role fahn (red
flag), however, describes the Lind-
bergh and Chamberlin flights as
tests by "American Imperialism" of
the possibility of aviation, with a
view of later to bombing attacks
from the air.

German engineers, airplane man-
ufacturers and airmen who flocked
to the Tempelhof field to in-
spect the Bellanca plane, Colum-
bia, were enthusiastic over its con-
struction.

The plans envisaged by the two
men who spanned the Atlantic
from New York to Germany in the
Bellanca monoplane, Columbia,
would provide for regular trans-
atlantic lines from America to var-
ious points in Europe.

"I am ready at this moment to
put \$2,000,000 into the scheme,"
Levine said. "Because I not only
believe it practicable but that it
can be realized even within a year."
"We have a definite type of ma-
chine in mind, which will carry
2,000 pounds, and will be equipped
with more than one motor."

Chamberlin said: "The machine
we intend to have built is unlike
anything known here in Germany."
A part of the development of
trans-Atlantic aerial lines, Cham-
berlin thinks floating landing
places anchored in various parts of
the ocean may be desirable for
emergency landings, but he does
not seem to attach prime impor-
tance to this feature, which has been
discussed in the European press as
an absolute necessity.

"The main thing," he said today
"is the constant development of
more efficient machines which can
carry a greater useful load in propor-
tion to their weight. During the
war we carried one pound of mail
per horsepower on jumps of from
200 to 300 miles.

"Ten years later, we already carry
10 pounds per horsepower on jumps
of from 500 to 600 miles. That is
10 times the former efficiency and
shows what the possibilities of en-
gineering development are."

"The reason we could cross the
ocean was because we carried al-
most double the weight of our
plane. The plane weighed 1,850
pounds and we carried almost 3,000."

He intimated that the trans-
atlantic machines under consi-
deration might even take a form and
shape hitherto unused.

"Too much horsepower is still
absorbed by air resistance," he said
"to reduce this is one of the chief
engineering problems."

TWO KILLED IN
EXPLOSION AT
BUTLER, PENN.

Several Persons Also
Injured When Truck
Load of Nitroglycerine
Explodes.

Butler, Pa., June 9.—(AP)—Two
men were killed instantly and 20
other persons were hurt, some seri-
ously, when an automobile truck
load of nitroglycerine exploded on
the main highway at Lick Hill five
miles from Butler, today. Three
Lick Hill residences were destroyed
and 15 others damaged by the
force of the blast.

Frank Greer, of Oil City, Pa.,
driver of the truck, and an uniden-
tified man accompanying him, were
killed. Two unidentified men walk-
ing on the highway were injured
seriously and doctors said their
chances for recovery were slight.
Occupants of Lick Hill houses were
injured, some seriously.

The truck, loaded with explosives
had just turned from the main
highway to a side road, en route
to a magazine storage shed, when
the blast occurred. The nitro was
to have been used in blowing oil
wells. The force of the blast was
felt five miles away.

Parts of the truck and the bod-
ies of the victims were found
yards away. The home of Mrs. Ed-
ward Redig, nearby, was destroyed
as were 100 adjoining houses. Mrs.
Redig and two of her children were
among the injured. Others
known to have been injured
include W. D. Wonderly, Irene Long
Mrs. S. J. Turner, Sadie Arnold,
Mrs. M. Walters and Nevada Mc-
Fadden, all residents of Lick Hill.

The Butler Chapter of the Amer-
ican Red Cross sent workers to the
scene at once. State highway pa-
trolmen and State troopers took
charge of the situation.

Many telephone poles, carrying
telegraph, telephone and electric
wires were ripped down and gas
lines were broken. Some of the
damaged houses caught fire.

Weevils Reported
In Two Counties

Raleigh, June 9.—(AP)—Boll
weevils are now reported as being
commonly found on cotton growing
in Scotland and Robeson counties,
the first authentic record of their
presence having been sent to the
department of agriculture by J. A.
Harris of the division of entomol-
ogy.

Mr. Harris reported finding six
weevils in one field on June 6, after
having examined a thousand plants.
At this rate, the weevil population
is about 300 per acre, which is about
the same rate of infestation found
in the early summer of 1923 on cot-
ton plants before they showed
squares. The winter survival of
weevils was shown to have been
greater than during the three pre-
ceding winters.

The Mexican bean beetle is now
on the rampage in the western part
of the state, it is indicated by a
statement given out by Dr. R. W.
Leiby, entomologist of the depart-
ment of agriculture. He recom-
mends dusting with a mixture of
one part calcium arsenate to each
nine parts of lime. The bean beetle
he says is known to infest 46 of the
western counties. This pest first
entered the southwest corner of the
state in the summer of 1921.

Pitt County Crops
Show Fine Growth

Crop conditions in Pitt county
at the present time are mighty
fine, according to farmers coming
to Greenville from various parts of
the county.

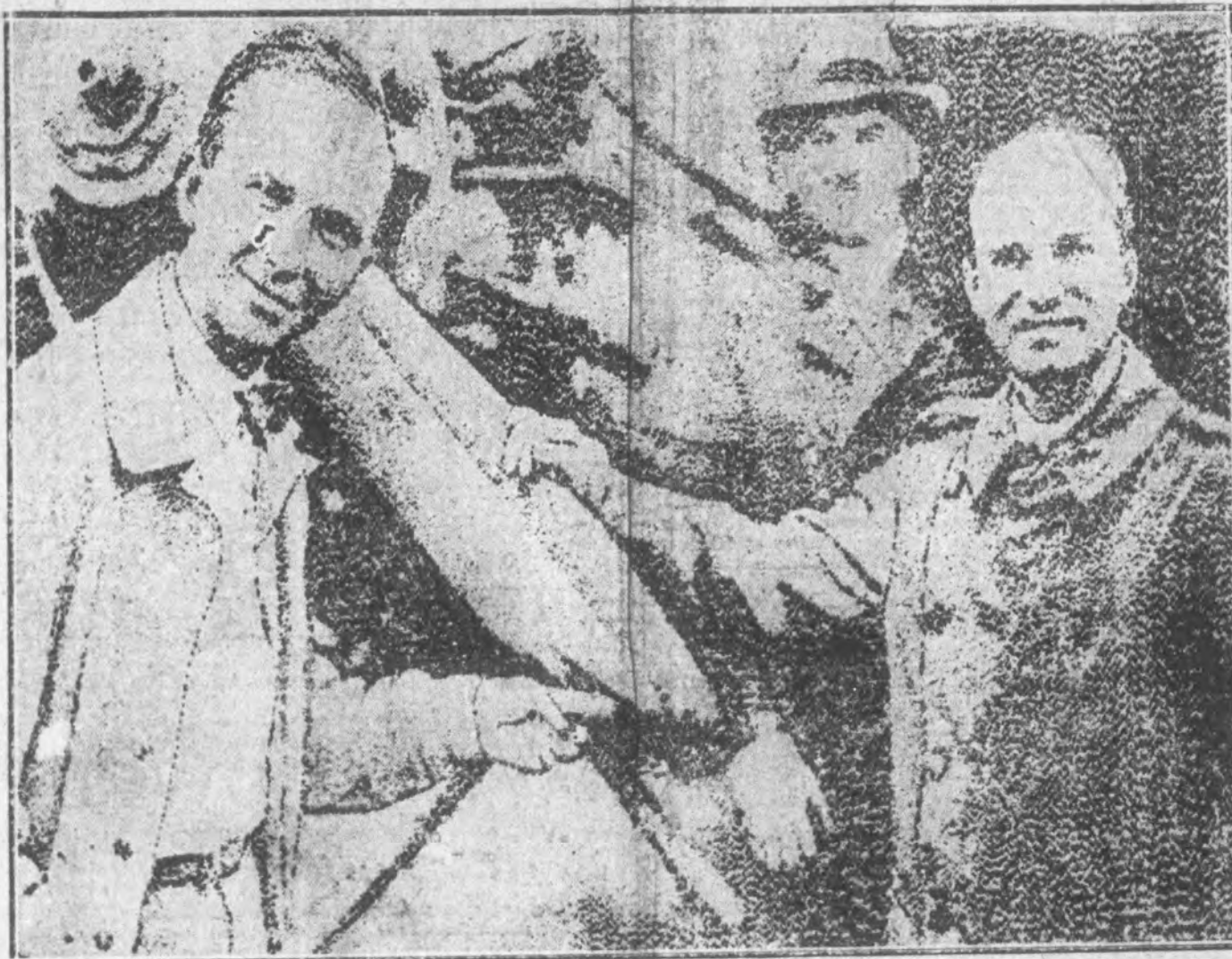
A general improvement in growth
of virtually all crops has been not-
ed especially during the last few
days. This is ascribed to the heavy
rainfall that has visited practically
all sections.

Tobacco has almost doubled in
size in the past ten days, and some
farmers today expressed opinion
that a considerable portion of the
crop would be ready for housing
and curing the early part of July.

Plants in many communities are
over knee high, and are a source of
much gratification to growers who
one time feared production would
be cut short by continued dry
weather.

LINDBERGH TO
BE GREETED BY
BIG DIRIGIBLE

Los Angeles to go out
To Meet Idol as He
Approaches Shores
Tomorrow.

U. S. S. Memphis by wireless to
The Associated Press, June 9.—Col-
onel Lindbergh will be greeted by
the United States Dirigible Los
Angeles early tomorrow as he nears
the shore of the homeland. A re-
quest has been received by the Na-
vy Department for the course of
the Memphis for the guidance of
the dirigible's commander. Ac-
cording to the present schedule the
Memphis will arrive off the Vir-
ginia Capes at 4 o'clock tomorrow
afternoon and reach Washington at
11 o'clock Saturday morning.

The aviator, Americans are so
anxious to greet, has had his first
glimpse of a whale, he was sum-
moned from his quarters by tele-
phone after the lookout gave the
familiar call "there he blows!" and
in record time was on the bridge to
see a large bull spouting every few
seconds. The bull was surrounded
by a number of cows.

Lindbergh was pleased with the
sight, saying it brought to mind a
school of porpoises that attracted
his attention as he was nearing the
coast of Ireland on his trans-Atlantic
voyage in the Spirit of St. Louis.

Long before the Memphis reaches
the Virginia capes an army of jour-
nalists, feature writers and just
plain reporters will swing into ac-
tion, with its ranks augmented
rapidly as the cruiser passes up the
Potomac and finally delivers her
hero to the official reception com-
mittee at the Washington Navy
Yard. The vanguard of this army
will fly 100 hundred miles to sea
on naval planes to meet the Mem-
phis and then wing their way back
to land to report the reception
there of the flyer by his fellow
aviators of the Army and Navy.

Still other writers will speed in-
to the Atlantic in destroyers to ad-
dress their output of the grist of millions
of words which for more than sixty
hours will test the capacity of a
greater portion of the network of
telegraph and telephone wire
of the country as well as the gov-
ernment radio facilities.

There will be more newspaper
men to board the Memphis inside
the Capes and still others to fol-
low her up the bay in sea and air-
planes. On Saturday the "story"
will be in the hands of nearly 500
men and women who make up the
Washington corps of the newspa-
per correspondents.

LEVINE READY TO PUT
\$2,000,000 IN REGULAR

ed machines capable of carrying
2,000 pounds each.

come operative within a year.

RECEPTION OF
LINDBERGH TO
BE BROADCAST

Eleven Hours Radio
Program Will Tell
World Hero's Wel-
come.

Washington, June 9.—(AP)—
America's huge radio machinery in
a continuous eleven hour program
next Saturday will be devoted to
broadcasting the name of the hero
aviator, Colonel Charles A. Lind-
bergh.

Thirty-seven stations throughout
the United States, associated with
the National Broadcasting Com-
pany which announced the plan to-
day, will be used solely in pre-
sents the addresses and descrip-
tion of the National capital's wel-
come and reception of the 25 year
old New York to Paris flyer to
America radio audiences of 300-
000,000 persons. The program will
start at 12 noon, the time of ar-
rival at Washington and will close
at 11 p. m. that night.

Three outstanding features will
be broadcast in the radio tribute to
the pilot—his welcome and decora-
tion with the distinguished fly-
ing cross by President Coolidge at the
Washington monument and his ad-
dresses at the receptions of the
National Press Club and the Min-
nesota State Society.

Another decoration has been ad-
ded to the long list of honors to be
heaped upon the aviator on his re-
turn here from Europe with the
award of the cross of honor of the
United States Flag Association.

Former Secretary of "State"
Hughes, senior founder of the As-
sociation will present the cross to
Lindbergh who is expected to at-
tend the association's citation in
the award said it was "in recog-
nition of his conspicuous service to
the flag through his marvelous
achievement which has emphasized
so strongly in the eyes of the en-
tire world the hopes, aspirations
and destiny of the American people
as symbolized by the flag of the
United States."

UNIVERSITY TO
GIVE COURSE IN
THIS CITY SOON

Post Graduate Course
In Medicine Opens to
County Doctors Be-
ginning June 17th.

The University Extension Division
and the School of Medicine at the
University of North Carolina will
conduct a postgraduate medica
course this summer in Greenville
beginning the 17th of June, it was
announced today by Morgan F.
Vining, representative of the ex-
tension division who is organizing a
class here. The other centers in
the circuit of six classes are: Wil-
mington, Hamlet, Fayetteville,
Rocky Mount and Kinston.

The 1927 course is the seventh to
be offered by the university. The
plan enables physicians to con-
tinue their studies without leaving
their practice and has met with
unusual success in this and other
States.

Instructors are secured from lead-
ing medical centers in the country.
The course this year is divided into
two sections. Eight lectures and
clinics will be devoted to the sub-
ject of pediatrics and four meet-
ings to general medicine. Each class
will meet once a week for twelve
weeks.

Dr. Alexis F. Hartmann, St. Louis
is the instructor of the section in
pediatrics. Dr. Hartmann is con-
sidered one of the best known Mar-
riott Clinic, of St. Louis and is
associate professor of pediatrics in
Washington University School of
Medicine.

Dr. Charles Leonard Brown of
Boston is the instructor of the sec-
tion in general medicine. Dr.
Brown is at present resident phy-
sician in medicine at the Peter
Bent Brigham Hospital, Boston, and
instructor in medicine, Harvard
Medical School.

The Greenville class will meet at
the Rotary Clubhouse each Friday,
beginning June 17th at 3 p. m. Dr.
E. B. Pace and Dr. S. M. Crisp are
making local arrangements for the
class.

Lesson For America.
21 Billions On Credit.

A quarter of a million Germans
saw the Bellanca plane, Cham-
berlin the pilot, and Levine in Berlin
yesterday. It was a friendly crowd
all war bitterness forgotten, far
better than the other trip with bay-
onets and cannon, that nations were
sincerely planning a few years ago.

Let's hope this country will hence-
forth keep out of Europe's quarrels.
That continent, for years to come,
will not be safe from war. There
is danger of an outbreak now in
the Balkans. Albania complaining
bitterly, threatening trouble.

Yesterday, a young Russian Cris-
tist in Warsaw, assassinated M.
Voikov, Soviet minister to Poland.
The assassin, Boris Kovorko, 19
years old, says he murdered Voikov
for his share in losing the
war. That may mean trouble for
Europe.

England complains bitterly that
the French secretly buy British gold
to bolster the franc, thus threat-
ening the world's financial balance.

France and England will never
fight, if only because the French
air fleet could destroy London and
the English air fleet could destroy
Paris a few hours after war start-
ed. But there is still bitterness
everywhere.

Americans should take to heart
the lesson that Lindbergh and
Chamberlin have taught us and get
ready to keep hostile fliers away
from this continent.

Five or ten thousand first-class
planes, carrying mail parcels and
passengers in peace, ready to take
in machine guns in war, would be
the best investment this rich na-
tion could make.

The great thing for prosperity is
credit which stimulates sales, busi-
ness and prosperity. It is the
moving dollar that helps, not the
stagnant dollar. Mr. Hewitt, of
Baltimore, vice president of the
Retail Credit Men's Association,
says we have spent so far in 1927
forty-two thousand million dollars
in retail purchases. Half of it on
credit. Without that spending of
twenty-one billions on credit, pros-
perity would look peaked.

BAYOU BLACK
DAM WRECKED

Blowing up Dam to Re-
lease Flood Waters
Causes Optimism
Among Citizens

New Orleans, June 8.—(AP)—
Residents of the Bayou Black sec-
tion in the lower Atchafalaya ba-
sin were awaiting with more confi-
dence the passing of the greatest
flood in the history of the Missis-
sippi valley as a result of the blow-
ing up of a dam which held back
the flood waters late yesterday.

Bayou Black, a part of the in-
tra-coastal waterways system and
the principal route of water travel
between Houma and Morgan City
was dammed up several weeks ago
when it was feared that the flood
water would inundate fertile farm
lands below. The residents above
the dam protested at once. But no
action was taken. Yesterday
at a mass meeting, it was calmly
announced that the dam would be
blown up and that no interference
would be brooked. Guards were
stationed and several charges of
dynamite set off.

ters here that he had instructed
area directors to provide food and
shelter for the refugees who have
been driven from their homes again
by a recurrence of flood conditions
in Arkansas, Missouri, Illinois and

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FRANCE HOPES
TO GET BETTER
DEBTS TERMS

Poincare Says Fail-
ure of Parliament to
Ratify Makes Action
Necessary.

Paris, June 9.—(AP)—Premier
Poincare told the chamber of de-
puties today he hoped to get bet-
ter debt settlement terms from the
United States and that he intend-
ed to try. Particularly as he re-
alized that the French parliament
would not ratify accords with
America and Great Britain in their
present form.

The Premier said that was why
he had made the "provisional" pay-
ments on the debt account—to a
to keep free to renew the negoti-
ations.

His declaration came after he had
reminded that "the French Parlia-
ment does not seem to wish to rat-
ify" the accords, drawing from
Jacques Dubois, who was under sec-
retary of finance under Caillaux,
the question:

"Are you proposing that the
chamber ratify them?"

The chamber suddenly flamed
into interest, an addressed the pre-
mier for an explanation.
"I do not propose ratification of
the accords," he said, "because I
hope to obtain better terms and
because parliament would not agree
to bind the country for sixty-two
years."

"That is why I voluntarily pro-
posed provisional payments, so we
could retain our freedom of action
to negotiate a new basis. But, in-
order that we may fear nothing
and be truly independent of our
creditor countries, don't you think
it would be useful to have foreign
monies and particularly money that
did not come from those creditor
countries?"

The deputies, when the debt ques-
tion bobbed up, were debating con-
cession of the French match mono-
poly to Svenska, the Swedish
match corporation which has offered
to loan the government \$80,000,000.
Premier Poincare was defending
this proposed contract which he
wants ratified. Point out the ad-
vantage to the treasury of hav-
ing the Svenska's \$80,000,000 bond,
he added: "that is an operation to
which I attach great importance."

The expert's commission has ad-
vised the government to sign the
accords with the United States in
hope of attaining foreign credit.

"Certainly today the rise of the
franc has permitted the treasury
and the bank of France not only
to re-establish the Morga fund,
but also to procure a stock of dol-
lars and pounds—but parliament
has not yet ratified the accords and
does not seem to wish to ratify
them."

Young Actress
Branded With
Razor Blade

Hollywood, Cal., June 8.—Miss
Doris Dore, 21-year-old actress who
appeared recently in "An American
Tragedy" at a local theatre, was
branded with the letter "K" on her
forehead, chin, breast arms and
hands with a razor blade wielded
by an unidentified man who forced
any entry into her apartment early
today.

The man, about 30 years old, be-
lieved by the police either to be a
degenerate or motivated by re-
venge, entered Miss Dore's apart-
ment when she opened the door in re-
sponse to a knock about 2 o'clock
this morning, she told police. The
razor wielder held her powerless
while she slashed the letter "K" on
her in seven places.

The Hollywood police who ques-
tioned the young actress said she
had been followed to Denver from
New York City several days ago
and that when she left the Colo-
rado City she was trailed here. She
hinted also of some "trouble" in
New York City several months ago
but did not disclose its nature.

17 HOMERS IN BIG LEAGUES YESTERDAY

Led by the player who fanned at their critical moment in the last world series, the hitters of the major leagues have registered a total of 17 circuit blows for one day's games.

Some of the wallpapers were old reliable and some were new but Tony Lazzeri's name led all the rest. The Yankee infielder made 3 home runs in five times up against the White Sox at New York.

Lazzeri's performance which came within a single run of the record for number of homers in one game featured a long drawn and thrilling battle which ended with the Yankees on the long end of a 12 to 11 score, the 11 inning victory was the Yankee's second in two days over their nearest rivals for the American league lead.

Again the defeat was hard for the White Sox to swallow for they made more hits than the Yankees just as they did in the previous day's game. Also, Falk, Clancy and Barrett's homers just evened matters for Lazzeri's three home runs. SPORT SLANTS

NEW YORK, June 9.—(AP)—The present watchful waiting policy in cauliflower circles, appears, at least to be giving ringside observers an opportunity to put on file their guesses as to how Tex Rickard will solve his heavyweight puzzle.

It is possible just now, for instance to take your pick from these widely varying predictions:

1—Jock Dempsey is merely stalling to help the ballyhoo and won't fight again at all, thereby assuring a match between Gene Tunney and Jack Sharkey for the title.

2—Dempsey will postpone his comeback and meet the winner of a Sharkey-Tunney bout, either this fall or next year.

3—Dempsey will announce his comeback shortly and sign to meet Sharkey in August, the winner to meet Tunney in September.

4—Rickard is about convinced that this is an off year for big box office attraction, especially if Dempsey doesn't return to the ring and will put off the next heavyweight championship fray until 1928.

5—If a big championship is held,

Chicago's big arena, solders field, will provide the scenery, in preference to New York or Philadelphia.

Considering the width of range, it seems likely that at least one or two of these predictions will hit the mark.

Considering that Bobby Jones has finished two-one-two-two-one in the last five American open championships, besides bagging the British open title last year it isn't so surprising that the invading representatives of John Bull regard the American championship next week at Oakmont as principally a battle against the Great Georgian.

"Oh, Jones," and of the Britons will say at the mention of his name and dismiss the subject with a gesture of the hands expressive of a conviction that the Atlanta amateur is in a class by himself as a shot naker.

The era when golfers spoke with something akin to reverence of the names of Braid, Taylor and Vardon Britain's famous triumvirate, has added to the background in the almost awe like regards nowadays for Bobby.

"The best thing that has happened to Babe Ruth this year is the way he has been spurred on by his clouting teammate, Lou Gehrig," said Arlie McGovern, the Bambino's trainer.

"There's nothing the big fellow likes more than competition. Gehrig is giving him plenty and I think

has a lot to do with the fact that the Babe has been getting his homers at a pace as swift as he traveled in establishing his record in 1921.

Perhaps you have also noticed that Ruth hasn't let out a single squawk this year on the field. There was a time when he was called the bad boy of baseball but he is playing strict attention to business these days.

The Babe likes his homers as well as anybody, a lot more perhaps and he won't relish the idea of Gehrig or anyone else stepping out ahead of him.

Another of the Yankee's brand of belters, the views of Dan Howley, new manager of the Browns, may be of interest.

"The way they are going now," says Dan, "I would rather see Ruth at bat than Gehrig. We can usually count on the Babe to do one of two things, bust up the ball game or strike out. But Gehrig is liable to do anything: slap one to right, left or center when you least expect it."

Columbia Lou furnished an example of his versatility in helping the Yankees to beat the White Sox in the opening game of their series here. After following Ruth with a home run clout to the Babe's right field bleachers preserve, Gehrig came to bat on his next turn and ranned a hot shot to left field while the defense was concentrated on the other side.

Blame England For Assassination Russian Minister

MOSCOW, June 9.—(AP)—Soviet indignation at the assassination of the Soviet minister in Warsaw on Wednesday has turned against England almost to the exclusion of Poland.

The Soviet government has issued a communique alleging British complicity in Terrorist plots and outrages in Russia, while the entire press this morning following the tone of the government's declaration ascribing Russia's counter-revolutionary difficulties in the past few years to English leadership directed verbal batteries against England.

The only mention made of Poland's responsibility was to the effect that her protestation of regrets over the assassination of the Soviet minister was "the usual procedure of bourgeois diplomatic etiquette."

The government communique makes reference to an English spy described as Sidney George Riley, captain of the Royal air force who is declared to have confessed to having been sent on a Terrorist mission into Russia and that Winston

Churchill, chancellor of the exchequer personally had given him instructions.

The Soviet authorities were exercising increased vigilance today as a consequence of two Terrorist outrages and a huge anti-Polish demonstration staged as a protest against the assassination at Warsaw Tuesday of the Soviet minister to Poland.

NEGRO TO DIE IN CHAIR AT RALEIGH TOMORROW

Raleigh, June 9.—(AP)—Pearl Mitchell, Chatham County negro will die in the electric chair tomorrow morning for the murder of W. L. Fogleman, Chatham County merchant.

Edwin B. Bridges, State pardon commissioner, refused to commute the death sentence, after a thorough study of the record, he decided there were no grounds for clemency.

Mitchell shot Fogleman Jan. 14 last.

London, June 9.—(AP)—Reuter correspondent at Bucharest telegraphs that the condition of King Ferdinand of Rumania "is so critical that fatal termination of the illness appears only a question of days."

AUTOMOBILE DRIVER DIES FROM EXHAUSTION

Baltimore, June 9.—(AP)—Howard M. Keys, 41, died suddenly here yesterday after driving an auto 900 miles in 48 hours in an effort to reach the bedside of his father who is critically ill here. His death was attributed to physical exhaustion.

Keys, who lives in Florida, two days ago received news of his father's illness and immediately set out for Baltimore. He arrived late Tuesday, seven hours after his arrival he was found unconscious and died shortly afterwards.

ESCAPED CONVICT CAPTURED TODAY

Raleigh, N. C., June 9.—(AP)—Robert Allen, negro, who escaped from a state road construction camp in Wilson county this morning, was recaptured this afternoon a few miles from the camp, according to advices received here by George R. Fou, State prison superintendent.

Allen was sentenced to serve a term of five years for robbery in Edgecombe county.

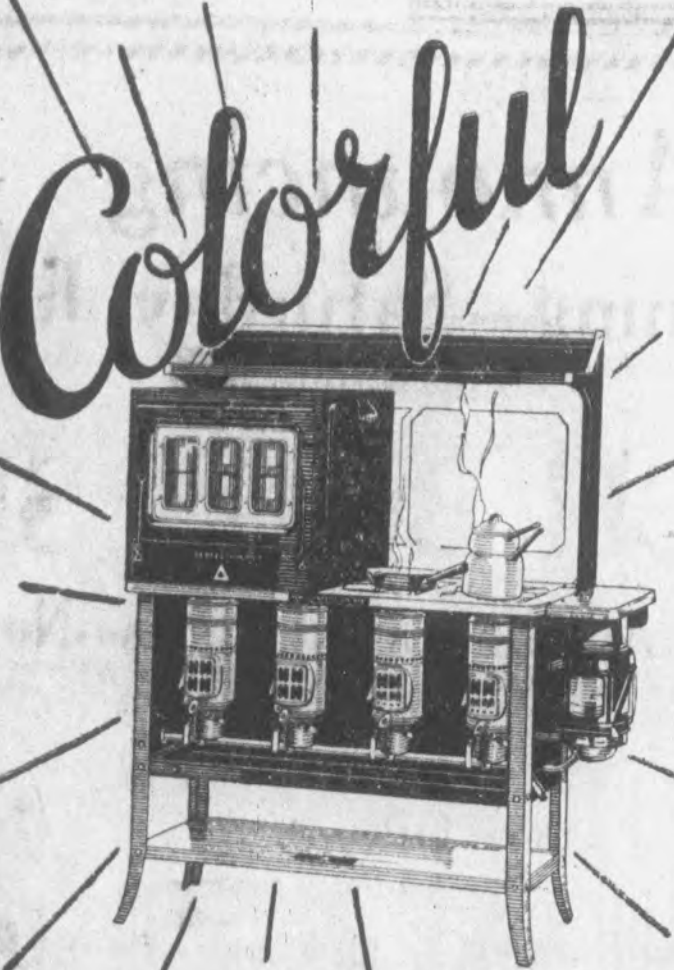

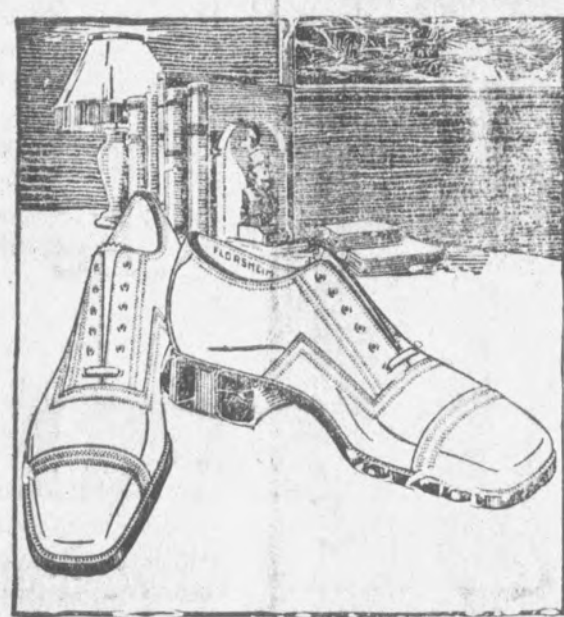

Madrid.—About the first thing a traveler will notice when he comes from France into Spain, is that he is welcome. The Frenchman seems to have it in for the foreigner these days, especially if he be English or American. The Spaniard receives him with open arms and goes out of his way to show him all the wonders of his native land. It is born in him to be kind, generous and amiable with everybody and he does it all with no expectation of receiving a reward. In fact, it is a very difficult matter to get him to accept anything for his help, even though he be a stranger. Spain is probably the only country in the world where a tip is often refused. More than that, it is never hinted for, if it turns out to be only one-third of what is really due a Spaniard will never murmur.

Another thing that will make the traveler rejoice, especially if he be an American, will be to find cool, sparkling water with easy reach at all hours of the day. Of course this does not mean that the Spaniard is on the water-wagon. One can find his "nip" whenever he wants it and the man who wants to forget about Prohibition will have no cause to worry. But like all Spaniards, he will soon find out that nothing is more refreshing than the cold water which comes from the mountains but he may not care for the large cake of flaky sugar which is always served with it.

Next to water, the Spaniards drink more beer than anything else, and this means his own beer, made in Madrid, which they declare to be much better than any made in Germany. A curious combination of beer and gaseous lemonade is one of the favorite hot-weather drinks.

American travelers also will find plenty of bootblacks to shine their shoes. They trot up and down the Paseos and business streets, looking for trade and will accept

almost anything one offers them. And there are plenty of peanuts, too. They are not the hot roasts—American variety, but big dark brown African ones.

One can find something to eat at every ten paces along the main streets and boulevards of the capital. Spaniards have good appetites and they are not left unsatisfied. There is the shrimp vendor and the man who sells small lobsters, the almond-lady, the banana man and the one who carries a cake-machine and sells "chances."

In the theatres, a novel invention provides caramels in case the chocolate boy isn't handy. It is a kind of slot placed on the back of each seat, into which one drops a big penny and out comes a convenient rack for one's hat as well as some good bon-bons.

These serve as a little dessert for the usual lunch which nearly everyone brings to the matinee. Ham sandwiches, small cakes and oranges take the place of the daily six o'clock "merienda," if one happens to be shut up in the theatre.

Just why one seems to require more than the customary nourishment in this country, has not yet been explained. The Spaniards themselves put the blame on the water, which according to them gives one a large appetite. Whatever it is, the fact remains that one will find himself eating twice his regular portions soon after arriving and still be looking forward to the next meal.

Famous Holdup Twins Arrested

Steubenville, Ohio, June 9.—(AP)—Extradition to Oregon to stand trial for the murder of two persons killed in train holdup in 1923 was waived by Ray and Roy De Autremont, twins, who were arrested here last night after a search that extended almost around the world.

Formal extradition proceedings will be carried out late today before C. J. Borkowski, U. S. Commissioner and the brothers probably will be taken to Columbus for safe keeping pending the arrival of officers from Oregon.

Both men have confessed their identity, but neither has admitted complicity in the holdup that took place in a tunnel near Siskiyou, Oregon, October 11, 1923.

Ray, however, when confronted by a group of officers who arrested him at his home where he was living under an assumed name with his wife, recognized Edward E. Pomeroy, a federal agent, and told him that he would have killed him if he had the chance, because he knew what was ahead of him.

"If you had come inside the house I would have killed you and then shot myself. My life is worth

nothing to me now, for I know what I am up against," the officers quoted him as saying.

Ray, who was arrested in an employment agency and taken to police headquarters for fingerprinting, remarked "well it looks like some of you guys are in for a reward."

Twenty thousand dollars was on the head of the brothers when the arrest was made.

Ray, who had married an Iron- tin, Ohio, girl, since the holdup under the name of Clarence Goodwin had never revealed his identity to her, and when news came back to her from the police station of the charge against her husband she was prostrated. She was left at home with her one-year-old child.
