WASHINGTON CITY ALL SET
FOR CELEBRATING RETURN
OF COL. CHAS. LINDBERGHFirst Home Contact
With Memphis Made
This Morning by Des
trover Humphries.

U. S. S. Memphis, June 10.—(By wire to the Associated Press)—The first home contact for Col. Chas. Lindbergh, New York to Paris flier, occurred at 6:05 a. m. today, when the destroyer Humphries met the scout cruiser Memphis off the coast. The destroyer took aboard movie films, made of the aviator during the voyage and a bag of official mail which she was to carry to New York. The destroyer was expected to reach New York, late today.

Washington, June 10.—(AP)—Washington is prepared to honor tomorrow with one of its greatest welcoming ceremonies in history the heroic New York to Paris flier, Col. Charles Lindbergh.

The first taste of the admiration of the American people for his epic flight, however, was to be given the 23 year old pilot on the last stretch of his voyage from Europe late today when the navy dirigible Los Angeles and sixty army and navy planes, together with a convoy of six destroyers were on their way to meet the cruiser Memphis as she rounded the Virginia Capes, the cruiser was scheduled to pass the Capes at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

Meanwhile, a proud mother, Mrs. Evangeline Lindbergh, a Detroit school teacher, was anxiously waiting the triumphal return of her son when she can extend to him her hearty greeting.

Mrs. Lindbergh quietly left Detroit late yesterday by train and was expected to arrive here today. She and Col. Lindy are to be the guests of Mrs. and President Coolidge at the temporary DuPont Circle White House during the aviator's stay in Washington.

Tomorrow as the cruiser slowly steams up the Chesapeake Bay and Potomac River another array of aircraft, one of the largest concentrations of flying machines ever gathered in this country, approximately 90 army, navy, commerce and postoffice department airplanes, together with more than a score of civilian planes, will escort the aviator to the Washington navy yard dock where he will disembark.

Outside of the roar of airplane motors and the familiar hand signals of pilots, the trans-Atlantic flier will receive no welcoming greeting until President Coolidge and a brilliant array of government officials, diplomats and fellow famous aviators extend their tributes upon his arrival at Washington.

In deference to the wishes of President Coolidge to have the first welcome in Washington, Virginia will not even extend a reception to the flier as he passes along her coast although Governor Byrd and hundreds of the State's residents will embark in boats to cruise along the Memphis to catch a glimpse of him. Governor Byrd previously had planned to board the Memphis at the Capes.

The dropping of a pacifist message and his Missouri National Guard uniform with the new spread wings of a Colonelcy which he will wear for his reception tomorrow from the dirigible Los Angeles on the Memphis's decks was practically his only contact with his homeland today.

But upon landing at the navy yard at noon tomorrow if the Memphis adheres to the program, the youthful pilot will receive plaudits in a tribute of a proud nation such as never have been accorded to a private citizen.

Met at the dock by three Cabinet members, Secretary of War Davis, Secretary Wilbur of the Navy, and Postmaster-General New, Colonel Lindy will be the cynosure of hundreds of thousands in a parade of soldiers, sailors and marines past the capitol and along Pennsylvania Avenue to the Washington Monument.

There the nation's Chief Executive will extend the welcome of the United States to the young birdman with an expected crowd of 100,000 as spectators and will pin on it is breast the government's highest award for aviation achievement, the first Distinguished Flying Cross ever to be struck off.

The Flying Cross will be but one of the many decorations which will be conferred upon the aviator. The Smithsonian Institution has awarded him the coveted Langley medal, given only to the "Founders of Aviation." The National Geographic Society has conferred the Hubbard medal, the decoration reserved for famous explorers and the U. S. Flag Association will present its cross of honor for glorification of the American flag.

A continuous round of honors and receptions then will await the Knight of the Air for the remainder of his stay in Washington until early Monday morning when he

SIX PERSONS DROWN
DURING HEAVY STORM
ON LAKE MILLELACS

Onamia, Mich., June 10.—(AP)—Huge waves, lashed up by a sudden squall, claimed the lives of five men and one woman who were fishing in Lake Millelacs near Garrison, 30 miles north of here, last night. A dozen other persons were rescued.

Garrison is an inland village and wire communication with the place was interrupted. Half a dozen fishing boats were caught in the storm. They capsized when struck by waves which were described as six to ten feet high. The bodies of the drowned were not recovered last night.

GOVERNMENT CHIEFS TO WELCOME HERO

First Woman Senator
Celebrates Birthday

Cartersville, Ga., June 10.—(AP)—Perpetuating the philosophy of the poet Browning, "Grow old along with me, the best is yet to be," Mrs. Rebecca Latimer Felton, the first woman to become a United States Senator and Cartersville's distinguished and oldest citizen spoke today at a luncheon in honor of her ninety-second birthday.

"As I look backward and count the years, it seems to be a long time, but, as I look forward, it is not necessary so long," said Mrs. Felton, who many years ago campaigned for the election of her husband to Congress from the Seventh Georgia Congressional District and who taught the late Rev. Sam Jones, noted American evangelist, his three R's.

"Standing in this presence today and grateful for the Lord for his preserving mercies, I have been thrilled listening to these messages of love and friendship here and elsewhere," said Mrs. Felton. "Also I have been asking myself, 'what do I owe to the time I live in—to my country—to my neighbors, and to my personal friends?'"

Mrs. Felton said she had "made the trip," to her advanced age by taking "one step at a time" and praying "to God to keep me in safe paths." Continuing she said:

"I have had my share of illness my share of ups and down, sometimes prosperous—and yet, I had to earn my daily bread by teaching school in 1865-66."

"We put in the best we had to help the boys and girls of that difficult period. It was hard work, but the results were fine. To this day the survivors tell me that it was a great time in their lives. The Rev. Sam Jones was one of our pupils."

Mrs. Felton related how many years later when the Rev. Mr. Jones was holding a revival at Cartersville, after he had risen to great heights in religious affairs of the nation, he paid tribute to her as his teacher, saying:

"I am one who believes in putting some flowers on folks before they die—not waiting until they can't see or know anything about it. There is one person in my life to whom I owe much. I owe it to a young lady who came into my life when I sorely needed somebody just like her. She was so valuable to a wild schoolboy like myself that I desire to acknowledge my gratitude on this occasion."

"Others have said and written the same thing to their teacher," said Mrs. Felton, who friends say is more proud of her work in the little country school after the war than of her other contributions to society. "You have cheered this aged pilgrim on her long, lone way," Mrs. Felton said in conclusion, "with only two grandchildren and a bright little great grandchild, I have survived all the rest of my family. You have given me the flowers before I go hence to be no more on earth. Like old Rip Van Winkle, I can only repeat it over and over again, 'heaven bless you. May you live long and be happy.'"

Chief Justice Richard B. Russell of Georgia was the principal speaker at the birthday party which was sponsored by the local Chamber of Commerce. Cora Harris, novelist, and other prominent citizens of Cartersville were on the program.

Mrs. Felton's two grandchildren, William Felton and Miss Annie Felton, and her great grandchild to whom she referred in her address, were among the guests.

Hundreds of citizens of this section of the state attended the party. A special edition of the Cartersville News was issued in Mrs. Felton's honor.

Auto License Laws
Will Be Enforced

Raleigh, June 10.—(AP)—Police chiefs and sheriffs throughout the State have been notified that the State Revenue Department expects strict enforcement of the automobile license law after July 1, according to officials of the revenue department.

Law enforcement officers have been directed to arrest all automobile owners operating without proper licenses after July 1. It was intimated strongly that there will be no extension granted this year as in years past.

"There is no excuse for almost every automobile owner in this state not having a new license by July 1," stated one official. "We have the licenses on sale now at thirty-seven stations throughout North Carolina and they can be secured without a rush at the last minute."

He said that application blanks had been placed in the mails to every automobile owner registered and advised every automobile owner who has not yet received one of these blanks to advise the automobile bureau at once.

FLOOD RELIEF
GATHERING AT
NEW ORLEANSSecretary Hoover to
Meet State and Na-
tional Representatives
Today.

New Orleans, June 10.—(AP)—The attention of the entire Mississippi valley was turned toward New Orleans where secretary Hoover was scheduled to meet state and national relief officials in what was expected to be the most important conference yet held on flood relief.

Parish committees which have been working for some time to prepare accurate data for presentation to the secretary will report on their work today. They have been asked to give the actual number who will have to be helped to get back on their feet and what will be needed to put them back on the road to self support.

It was expected that some plan would be worked out later at a conference between secretary Hoover, Henry M. Baker, Red Cross flood relief director and Col. W. H. Sullivan, head of the state reconstruction committee by which the relief needed can be expedited.

More and more high land in the Tensas Basin began to show above the water today as the waters from the first flood receded before the new crest arrived. The land that has emerged so far is expected to be safe from the new rise, which will prolong the flood conditions in the lowlands until August in some sections.

The Mississippi continued to fall as far up as Vicksburg; above there, however, a sharp rise was noted. At Helena, Ark., the gauge showed a gain of 3 of a foot in 24 hours. At New Orleans a 3 drop was recorded, bringing the level down to 17.4, four tenths of a foot above flood stage.

New Brunswick, N. J., June 10.—(AP)—Two air mail planes left Hadley Field this morning with 1,200 congratulatory letters addressed to Col. Lindy. A third plane was in readiness to take letters which were expected to arrive later.

Rotary Convention
Adjourned Today

Ostend, Belgium, June 10.—(AP)—The eighteenth annual convention of Rotary International adjourned today after the installation of the new officers elected yesterday. Arthur Sapp of Huntington, Ind., the new president, delivered a short address, as did the other officers.

Herbert Coats, of Montevideo Uruguay, told of the growth of Rotary in South America, pointing out that all South American countries except Paraguay, Ecuador, and Bolivia are represented in Rotary International.

20 PERSONS
PUT TO DEATH
BY RUSSIANSBritish Officials
Shocked at Execu-
tion of 'anti-Soviet
Followers'

Moscow, June 10.—(AP)—Twenty persons have been put to death by a firing squad, says an announcement by the State political department for terrorist or monarchist activities, including plots to murder: George Tchitcherin, foreign commissar, and Leonid Krassin.

Among those executed were M. Elvengren, charged with plotting to kill W. Tchitcherin; former Colonel Sushin, charged with a plot to murder Krassin; Prince Mesherski for carrying on propaganda for the cause of Grand Duke Nicholas; pretender to the Russian throne; M. Eareinoff, former Czarist consul official of the Soviet State Bank who was accused of supplying information to Robert M. Hodson, British Charge D'Affaires in Moscow, and Prince Paul Dolgorouff.

Several army officers were condemned for giving refuge to "white" terrorists arriving from abroad.

London, June 10.—(AP)—British officials were shocked today by the announcement in Moscow of the execution of 20 persons charged with anti-Soviet activities, including furnishing information to the British diplomatic mission in Moscow.

The mission returned to London last night, following the recent rupture of Anglo-Soviet relations.

It was emphatically denied at Downing Street that the British mission in Moscow had had any relations of this nature with Russia. Foreign office officials reiterated that in breaking off relations with the Soviets the British government was actuated by no hidden or ulterior motives and had no intention of creating a State of war, but had hoped that notwithstanding the severance of diplomatic relations Anglo-Soviet trade would continue.

Under which the British mission in Moscow labored, it was pointed out that the members of the mission had no relations with Russians outside of the sphere of their official duties because the Soviet authorities were suspicious of all the activities of the mission. British representatives, it was stated, even were afraid to be seen in company with Russians for fear that such associations might be misconstrued.

Assailants of
Girls on Trial

Laurinburg, N. C., June 10.—(AP)—An avalanche of character witnesses was loosed by the defense today in its major attack upon the charges of Alva Hodges, sixteen-year-old Cumberland Mills girl who alleged she was attacked by Merritt Everett and Clyde Norman on the night of May 21.

Several witnesses testified that the girl's reputation was not good in the communities in which she lived. Some of these witnesses however admitted under cross examination that they themselves had court and criminal records.

It is expected testimony in the case will be completed today. The State in its rebuttal is preparing to use a number of character witnesses. Argument by counsel will probably begin tomorrow morning.

The State rested its case after the testimony of direct conflict with the declarations of Alva Hodges, chief witness for the prosecution, that there was no violence in the act and that it was carried out with the girl's assent. Stiff cross-examination failed to shake the major points of his story.

NEGRO MAN PAYS
FOR MURDER IN
ELECTRIC CHAIR

Raleigh, N. C., June 10.—(AP)—Pearl Mitchell, 29, Chatham County negro, today went to a murderer's death in the electric chair here, after conviction of slaying a storekeeper near Pittsboro last January during a robbery in which he planned to obtain a pair of silk stockings and suspenders for a girl friend.

Mitchell didn't get the gifts he sought but was surprised in the store and after a struggle in which fists and teeth figure, killed W. L. Fogleson, a storekeeper in the store, waiting for the expected attempt at robbery.

Mitchell was pronounced dead three minutes and fifteen seconds after the current had been turned into his body at 10:30 o'clock.

Communists, anarchists, nihilists used to blow up Czars and grand Dukes or try to. Now friends of cardom adopt the method, bombing and shooting Communists that have taken the Czar's place and power. Yesterday came news that the Communists' debating club in Leningrad had been sent into the air by two bombs, 26 hurt.

News the day before told that M. Volkoff, Bolshevik minister to Poland, had been murdered by an advocate of Czarism.

Bolshevism is sensitive to these attacks as were the Czars of old. The fact that Volkoff said to have signed the Czar's death warrant was murdered in Poland, may cause trouble for Europe. It was the crime of Serajev, killing the heir of the Austrian throne, that started the great World War.

It is said "Murder never changed the course of history." But it sometimes hurries things along.

HIGH HONORS
STILL BEING
PAID FLIERAmericans Flock to
Berlin to Attend
Socials For Cham-
berlin and Levine.

Berlin, June 10.—(AP)—Americans from all parts of Germany were flocking to Berlin today for a dinner dance to be given by the American Club tonight in honor of the trans-Atlantic flier, Charles Chamberlin and Charles Levine.

Another feature of a day that promises to see the climax of their visit to Berlin, is a great benefit by the municipal of Berlin at which the Bourgmaster is to present them with special plaques.

The aviators intend to visit Munich and Vienna. They will fly to Prague, capital of Czechoslovakia, next Thursday, visiting the international aviation exhibition as the guests of the serial club of Prague.

Chamberlin is anxious to make a call at Rome as part of his European tour.

"I feel I owe it to Bellanca if it can possibly be arranged, to see the eternal city," he said. Chamberlin, now in New York, was engaged and built his plane.

Honors and gifts of a kind and a profusion rarely bestowed on individuals in Germany continue to be heaped on Chamberlin and Levine because they landed on German soil in their trans-Atlantic flight.

Not only have they heard their praises sounded by President Von Hindenburg, foreign secretary Stresemann and other officials, but they learned that one of Berlin's streets is to be named after their plane.

"Columbiadresses," Chamberlin received word also that the management of the principal brewery of Berlin has offered to name one of its brands after him subject to his approval, and to present him with a tankard of honor.

Although they have been in Berlin only a little more than a day, the American embassy, where the fliers are stopping, is filled with gifts—cigars and cigarettes, golden cigarette cases and silver cups, cases of champagne, wearing apparel and floral tributes. As Chamberlin and Chamberlin only drinks light beer occasionally, some of the gifts are destined to find their way to hospitals and other institutions.

Among those attending tonight's dinner of the American Club will be Thes Rasmussen, Germany's woman pilot, who aspires to be the first woman to attempt a trans-Atlantic flight. She expects to fly from Hamburg for the occasion and expressed the hope that Mr. Chamberlin and Mr. Levine would reserve a little time to discuss with her technical details of a voyage across the ocean.

The White Sox today were painfully aware of the fact that the Yankees consider them "just another ball club" as the first three games of the current four game series would indicate on the surface whatever Ray Schalk's Chicagoans showed against other American League clubs it has been lacking in the first invasion of New York.

AVERAGE 12 TO 13 CENTS ON MIDDLING COTTON

Raleigh, June 10.—(AP)—An average of 12 to 13 cents a pound for 7-8 inch staple cotton was paid for middling, according to the final settlement figures of the North Carolina Cotton Growers' Co-operative Association.

Fifty-seven per cent of the 120,000 bales delivered to the association was of 7-8 inch staple, and the remainder was of longer staple, which commanded a premium of 35 points for 16-16 inch length, and 145 points, or a cent and a half a pound for inch staple.

While middling cotton is now selling for 15-14 cents a pound, it dropped from 16.9 cents in September to 12.3 in October, and to 11.5 cents in November. The average price for December in North Carolina was estimated at 11 cents, and in January the average was

will fly to New York.

Although his trans-Atlantic airplane, "The Spirit of St. Louis," which is being brought on the Memphis, will be reassembled immediately by navy aviation mechanics upon its arrival, Col. Lindbergh has not yet decided definitely whether he will fly his machine to New York. There has been a suggestion here he may pilot an army amphibian plane so as to land in New York harbor and thus avoid the danger of the crowds which are expected to mass at the landing field on Staten Island. Another pilot then would fly the "Spirit of St. Louis" to New York.

Washington has turned from its customary ennui over spectacles and receptions and become so enthusiastic over welcoming the flier a chief role in the tribute to the former air mail pilot. Not only will there be the escort of nearly 100 planes on the last lap of his voyage, including the crack Selfridge field pursuit group of 21 single seat ers, but at the dock Lindbergh will pass through a double line of several hundred fellow birdmen, many of whom also have won the highest laurels of the flying game. Among those who will be at the dock will be Robert Nungesser, brother of the French ace who was lost in making a Paris to New York flight.

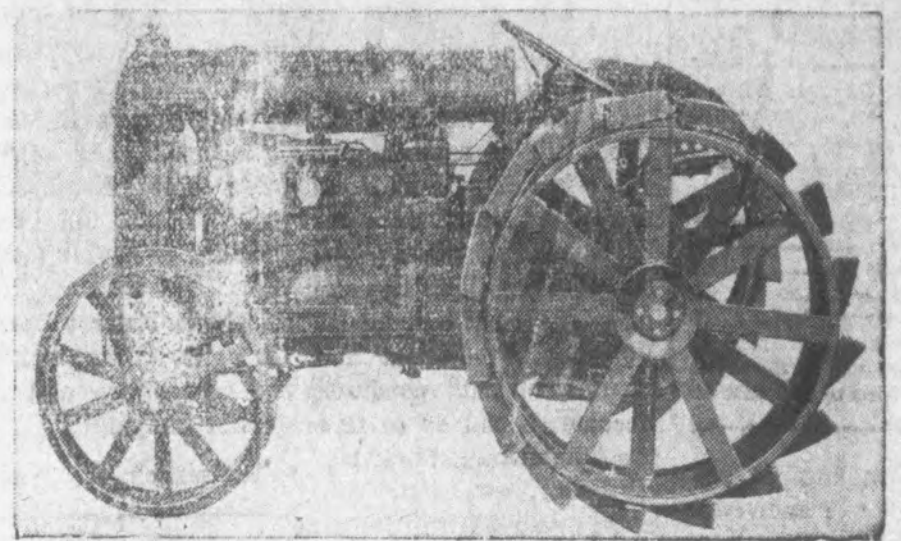

A SPECIAL SESSION
—IN OCTOBER

From the point of view of
flood relief there is one good

thing to be said about the
proposal to call a special
session of Congress in Oc-
tober. The problem of re-
habilitation, which is bound
to demand attention sooner
or later, will be better off
by two months in this case
than if Congress does not
meet until December. Mean-
time 700,000 victims of the
flood will be returning "to
what is left of homes and
farms (as Mr. Hoover puts
it) to take up life again in
the face of heartbreaking
discouragement and losses.
For at least the next four
months, or until conditions
become so bad as to force
the Administration to change
its policy, we shall drift
along. No adequate plans
have been made for the
work of rehabilitation.
Thousands of flood victims
will be left to their own
devices. Even if all the mon-
ey now asked for "credit
corporations" is raised by
private subscription, even if
the most favorable redis-
count privileges are secured
from the intermediate credit
banks, even if ways are
found to loan from these
private funds without collat-
eral, and even if the distri-
bution is managed with per-
fect even-handedness, the
per capita credit available
will be \$28. And this for
rehabilitation work after
what Mr. Hoover has called
"the greatest peace-time ca-
lamity in the history of our
country," a calamity of
which he says:

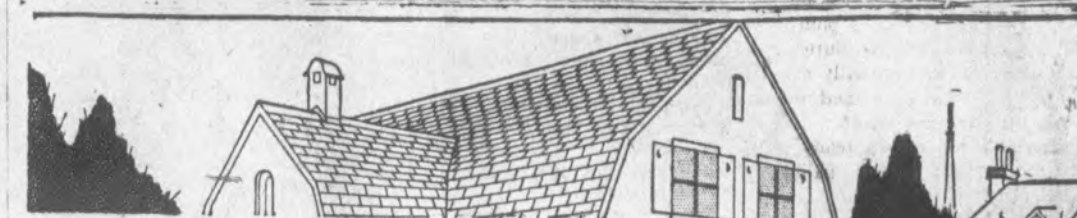
MOTORIST INSURANCE LAW

Copenhagen. — The prohibition movement in Denmark has received what many believe to be a knock-out blow. Even dry crusaders appear resigned to an educational temperance campaign advocating moderation in the consumption of alcohol.

The changed attitude resulted from the publication of the report of the government temperance commission which after two years of investigation almost unanimously declared in favor of the "free sale of all intoxicants" in the belief that "while moderation is desirable, it is absolutely impossible to enforce a prohibition law."

Even two dry leaders on the commission signed the report. The thoroughness with which the commission went about its work is attested by the fact that the report consists of 800 single-spaced typewritten pages with numerous charts and diagrams. Norway's recent return to the wet fold is said to have greatly influenced the decision of the commission here.

Europeans are getting all balled up around the hands of railroad and telegraph office clocks, the dials of which under the newly installed system of 24-hour time, look like crossword puzzles to most people.

In Denmark a storm of protest is being raised. Norway which introduced the plan a few weeks earlier is also having trouble. Germany appears to have accepted the idea as a novelty. Hundreds of Copenhagen travelers are missing trains and threaten damage suits against the railroads. It is not unlikely that the scheme will be abandoned unless the people forget their school book learning and consent to lunch in the dining cars at 13 o'clock instead of 1 p. m.; catch the 5.15 at 17.15, and get to bed early as say 24 o'clock instead of midnight.

The even hours which run from one to 24 are not so troublesome, but the people protest that only a mathematician can see at a glance that :05 means five minutes after midnight.

Slashed and scraped faces inflicted by unskilled barbers' apprentices during the lockout of 350 regular barbers will be more quickly forgotten than the story of a shop with his face pasted up with a scrap of newspaper upon which was legibly printed the touching caption, "The kiss he never forgot."

Courtplasters of newspapers

were commonly used in addition to caustic sticks to stop the flow of blood from cuts, and dozen of disgusted customers fled to the street with three and sometimes more printed scraps glued on their chin and cheeks. Even worse were the curious bobs and shingles women received at the hands of novice barbers.

Such a condition shocks men. Others are shocked by the suggestion that men and women should continue living together after they cease to like and even begin to hate each other.

Those who believe that marriages are made in heaven will naturally object to their being ended in Paris.

Whoever does the thing a second time, no matter how well he does it, suffers by comparison. This applies to Levine and Chamberlin. But, if they carry out a plan they suggest, and fly back to the United States, they will be alone in their class, "the only round trip" Atlantic fliers.

In years to come, air roads far above the clouds, will be marked at regular intervals by balloon light houses floating in the air, each with just enough power to keep it in the right place. The light house keeper will be a navigator sticking to one place in the sky with the north pole, his compass and other instruments to keep him "on location."
