AMERICAN PEOPLE PAY FINE TRIBUTE TO COL. LINDBERGH IN WASHINGTON CITY TODAY

Thousands Witnessed Ceremonies Attending Arrival of Idol Of The Clouds.

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—Over a triumphal way lined with cheering throngs and leading to the highest honors a nation can bestow on its heroes of the air, Lindbergh came back today to America.

Smiling and waving his acknowledgments, the young air mail pilot, who spanned the Atlantic and reaped the glory of the adoration of foreign lands stepped ashore shortly before 12 o'clock today from the cruiser Memphis which had brought him marvelous adventure, and was whisked away to head a triumphant parade along historic Pennsylvania Ave. at the end under the shadow of the Washington Monument, waited the President of the United States to bestow on him the government's new distinguished flying cross.

For a moment before he set foot on the soil he soared away from three weeks ago he was closeted below with his mother. What passed on between the Detroit school teacher and her son remains hidden in the privacy of their own memories.

A throng at the Navy Yard had their first glimpse of the hero as he acknowledged their cheers from the bridge of the Memphis later as he stepped briskly down the cruiser's gangplank into the bright sun light the crowd pressed upon him "Lindy Lindy" many tried to seize his hands.

Lindy was flushed of face and his hair was disheveled as he pleaded with his admirers to let him pass. Struggling all the way, assisted by the White House aids, Marines and ship's officers, he finally reached the touring car in which he was to ride in the parade through Washington. He took a place in the back seat with his mother beside him. The top of the car had been thrown back and the crowds along the way had a clear view of their hero.

As he left the Navy Yard, the crowd surged forward in one great wave about Lindy's car and it had to stop.

"Stand up, get up Lindbergh," shouted the crowd. "Let us see you Lindy."

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—As conqueror of the air over the Atlantic and ambassador of good will, Lindbergh received today from the hands of President Coolidge a distinguished flying cross, the highest award of the American air service.

The ceremony crowned a reception such as the nation's capital never before had given any person, no matter what his rank, station or accomplishment.

As the chief executive pinned the bronze medal, the first to be struck off, on the lapel of the blue sack coat of the world's hero, a mighty roar went up from the thousands upon thousands who were massed in the broad expanse of park surrounding the towering granite shaft erected to the memory of the first President.

Secretary Davis of the War Department handed the cross to President Coolidge pinned to the lapel below the French decoration of the Legion of Honor. Then the two shook hands and Lindy advanced to the microphones to reply. The crowd stopped him with a roar of demonstration.

When he had quieted them, leaning forward, and with both hands holding to the stand, he made his speech of thanks slowly and distinctly.

"On the evening of the 24th of May, last," he said, "I arrived at Le Bourget, Paris." "During the week I spent in France, the day in Belgium and the short period in London and the land, the people of France and the people of Europe requested that I bring back to the people of America one message from the people of Europe. At every gathering, at a every meeting I attended, were the same words:

"You have seen the affection of the people of France and the people of Europe for the people of America demonstrated to you."

Here the speech was broke by a thundering moment of applause. Then Lindbergh continued his quotation of the message he said had been sent back to America from Europe saying:

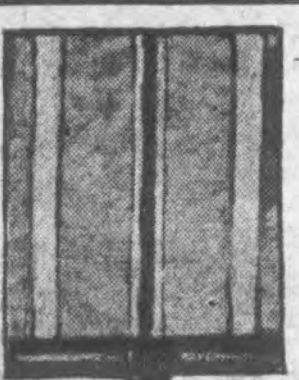
"Demonstrated to you. Upon your return to your country take back with you this message from France and Europe to the United States of America."

"I thank you."

That was all but the crowd cheered and cheered and cheered.

PEKING ENTERS FIRM PROTEST AGAINST U. S.

Sending of Marines to Tientsin Considered Direct Act of Hostility.

Peking, June 11.—(AP)—It is learned authoritatively that the Peking foreign office at the Beihai of Marshal Chang Tso Lin is preparing a formal protest to the United States against the dispatch of American Marines to Tientsin.

The protest it is unofficially stated is contemplated primarily for the sake of consistency, since the Peking Government has already protested against the sending of Japanese troops to Tsingtao, Shantung province, and the British expedition to Shanghai.

The Angkouchin, or northern military alliance, it is added, does not regard the despatch of the American marines from Shanghai to Tient-Tsin as a hostile act.

LOCAL BOYS INTERESTED IN PROGRAM

Numbers Showed up Today in First of Boys' Work Program for Summer.

A fairly large crowd of youngsters met Charles W. Porter at the fair grounds this morning at 9 o'clock and took part in first day's training in connection with the Boys' work program to be conducted in the city during the summer months.

The first game of the Sunday school baseball league which the boys were trying out for this morning, will be played at the fair grounds Monday afternoon at three o'clock between the Jarvis Memorial Methodist church and the Memorial Baptist church. The league schedule will be arranged during the first of next week, and will be made public Wednesday.

Mr. Porter today requested all the boys of the city interested in the athletic program to meet him at the school building Monday evening at six o'clock. From the high school they will go to Rock Springs on this first picnic of the season.

Considerable interest is being manifested in the Boys' work activities now in progress and it is expected that before the summer is over practically every youngster in the city will be a participant in a part of the extensive program recently outlined.

Poultry Shipments To Hit High Mark

Raleigh, N. C., June 11.—(AP)—Live poultry shipments from North Carolina this year will hit the high water mark, running over two million pounds, the State Department of Agriculture said today.

"This will mean it was pointed out more than \$500,000 revenue for products this season and will bring the three year total up to five million pounds. More than 110 carloads have already been shipped in addition to express shipments.

"For several years the Department of Agriculture has been aiding producers in shipment of live birds," Commissioner Graham said "and it is extremely gratifying to review the results obtained. I believe that there is a still greater future before the poultry industry in this State.

While I cannot cite, off-hand, figures for other States, yet it is safe to say that we are leading entire South. This is just another instance of North Carolina's pioneering spirit. I am glad that the department has been able to have a part in this great work."

President Coolidge Hails Lindbergh As Illustrious Citizen In Address Today

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—Col. Chas. Lindbergh was welcomed home today by President Coolidge as "illustrious citizen of our Republic," a conqueror of the air and strengthener of the ties which bind us to our sister nations across the sea.

Concluding his brief address of welcome, the President bestowed upon Lindy the distinguished flying cross, as a symbol of appreciation for what he is what he has done. Praising the young airman's conduct abroad where he was acclaimed by Kings and rulers, Mr. Coolidge declared, "the absence of self acclaim, the refusal to become commercialized, which has marked the conduct of this sincere and genuine exemplar of fine and noble virtues, has endeared him to every one."

"He has returned unspoiled," the President said. "He has brought his unsullied fame home." Mr. Coolidge spoke as follows: "My Fellow countrymen:

It was in America that the modern art of flying of heavier than air machines was first developed as the experiments became successful the airplane was devoted to practical purposes. It has been adapted to commerce in the transportation of passengers and mail and used for national defense by our land and sea forces, beginning with a limited flying radius, its length has been gradually extended. We have made many flying records. Our army fliers have circumnavigated the globe. One of our Navy men started from California and flew far enough to have reached Hawaii but being off his course landed in the water. Another officer of the Navy has flown to the North Pole. Our own country has been traversed from shore to shore in a single flight.

"It had been apparent for some time that the next great feat in the air would be a continuous flight from the mainland of America to the mainland of Europe. Two courageous Frenchmen made the reverse attempt and passed to a fate that is as yet unknown. Others were speeding their preparations to make the trial, but it remained for an unknown youth to tempt the elements and win, it is the story of valor and victory by a son of the people that shines through every page of American history.

"Twenty-five years ago there was born in Detroit, Mich., a boy representing the best traditions of this country, of a stock known for its deeds of adventure and exploration. His father, moved with a desire for public service, was member of Congress for several terms. His mother who dowered her son with her own modesty and charm, is with us today. Engaged in the vital profession of school teaching, she has permitted neither money nor fame to interfere with her fidelity to her duties.

"Too young to have enlisted in the world war, her son became a student at one of the big State universities. His interest in aviation led him to any army aviation school, and in 1925 he was graduated as an airplane pilot. In November 1925, he had reached the rank of captain in the officers' reserve corps, making his home in St. Louis, had joined the one hundred and tenth observation squadron of the Missouri National Guard. Some of his qualities noted by the army officers who examined him for promotion, as shown by reports in files of the militia bureau of the war department are as follows: "Intelligent," "industrious," "energetic," "dependable," "purposeful," "alert," "quick of action," "serious," "deliberate," "stable," "efficient," "frank," "modest," "congenial," "a man of good moral habits and regular in all his business transactions." One of the officers expressed his belief that the young man "would successfully complete everything he undertakes," this reads like a prophecy. "Later he became connected with the United States mail service where he exhibited marked ability and from which he is now on leave of absence.

"On a morning just three weeks ago yesterday this wholesome, earnest, fearless, courageous product of America rose into the air from Long Island in a monoplane christened "The Spirit of St. Louis" in honor of his home and that of his supporters. It was no haphazard adventure. After months of most careful preparation supported by a valiant character, driven by an unconquerable will and inspired by the imagination and the spirit of his viking ancestors, this reserve officer set wing across the dangerous stretches of the North Atlantic. He was alone, his destination was Paris.

"Thirty three hours and thirty minutes later in the evening of the second day, he landed at his destination on the French flying field at Le Bourget. He had travelled over 3,600 miles and established a new and remarkable record. The execution of his project was a perfect exhibition of art.

"This country will always remember the way in which he was received by the people of France, by their President and by their government. It was the more remarkable because they were mourning the disappearance of their intrepid countryman, who had tried to span the Atlantic on a western flight.

"Our messenger of peace and goodwill had broken down another barrier of time and space and brought two great peoples into closer communion, in less than a day and a half he had crossed the ocean over which Columbus had traveled for 69 days, and the Pilgrim fathers for 66 days, on their way to the new world, but above all in showering applause and honors upon this genial, modest American

STATE RESTS MURDER CASE EARLY TODAY

Defense Counsel Asked for Recess in Trial Of Kenneth Boone And Mrs. Phillips.

Fayetteville, N. C., June 11.—(AP)—The State rested its case against Kenneth O. Boone and Mrs. May Elle Phillips, charged with the murder of Frank McLaurin near here January 22, and court recessed until 9 o'clock Monday morning.

Defense counsel requested that recess during argument in which they stated they had many witnesses to examine, and asked for time in which to arrange their case in order to refuse the surprise testimony of H. Savage, convicted liquor law violator who swore he was near the spot when McLaurin was killed.

Dr. J. P. Hiesmith was the leading witness of the day. He explained the fracture on the dead man's skull which was brought into court, and said that in his opinion McLaurin's skull was fractured by a blow and not by a pistol bullet.

Mrs. Carl Cox, sister of the dead man, testified to having several conversations with Boone in regard to her missing brother. She begged Boone to "tell her the truth about Frank," as she believed he knew more than he had told. He took an oath, she said that he knew nothing of Frank but suggested that he may have joined the Navy and though it would be a "good idea to notify the War Department and furnish them with a picture."

The State, it is believed, will rely mainly upon the testimony of Savage and Will Prest, negro employee of Boone, for the conviction of Boone and Mrs. Phillips. Their testimony was substantially the same.

Defense counsel have announced they intend to show McLaurin came to death by his own hand.

ARGUMENT IS COMPLETED IN ASSAULT CASE

Judge Webb to Charge Jury This afternoon in Sensational Laurinburg Case.

Laurinburg, N. C., June 11.—(AP)—After the noon recess, Solicitor Donald Phillips concluded the argument for the State this afternoon in the case of Clyde Norman and Merritt Everett charged with attacking a young girl near here recently.

The charge of Judge Webb was next in order with the case ready to go to the jury some time in the afternoon.

After listening for two hours and ten minutes to W. H. Weatherspoon, last lawyer for the defense, court recessed at 11:20 this morning.

The courtroom was crowded morning and afternoon as an intense was the heat that Weatherspoon's address left him dripping with perspiration.

The court had held a session last night when W. H. Cox spoke for the defense, trying to show that the alleged attack was nothing more than commercialized vice while the State held tenaciously to its original contention of attack of a revolting nature. These two major arguments echoed in the closing contentions today.

State Peach Crop About 2,262 Cars

Raleigh, N. C., June 11.—(AP)—North Carolina's 1927 commercial peach crop should be equivalent to 2,262 carloads, it was pointed out today at the Department of Agriculture, following receipt of report from sixty-two growers. This estimate is based on 302,000 trees, or about 125 per cent of the total number of trees.

The carlot movement, it was said would be difficult to ascertain, as it will be determined by many factors. Last year 30 per cent of the crop was distributed by channels other than carlot shipments.

Early varieties began to move a week earlier than last season, and later varieties are likely to be about a week earlier.

TRIUMPHAL MARCH OF LINDBERGH IS HALTED BY CROWD

Washington, June 11.—(AP)—Lindbergh's triumphal journey up Pennsylvania Avenue was halted soon after it started today when the enthusiastic crowd broke through the lines and halted the parade.

Those anxious to cheer the aviator did not recognize him because he was in civilian clothes. When they did spot him, they descended upon his automobile making it necessary for the police to get busy in holding them back.

NEW COUNTY LEGISLATION IS IN EFFECT

County Government Commission Reports Considerable Progress in 22 Counties

Raleigh, N. C., June 11.—(AP)—County legislation has been introduced into twenty-two counties in the State, the county government commission reports progress in the new era of government as slow, Chas. M. Johnson, executive secretary said, but auditors and accountants generally are co-operating in the work.

Bookkeeping forms prepared by the commission and recommended for use in various counties in order to attain efficiency and uniformity in keeping records, were adopted by the commission, and will be supplied to the counties shortly.

An institute of county finance officers will be held at State College during July, under direction of the commission it was decided. The date for the institute, which will continue for one week, was not announced. The object of the school is to effect a better understanding of the function and operation of the new laws.

"Inquiries have come from a number of county officials relative to the application of the county fiscal control act to the special character school districts," Secretary Johnson said.

"After discussing the matter with the members of the commission in session and with the attorney general, I advise you that since a special charter school district is a corporate entity, created by special act of the General Assembly which provides the governing body and prescribes its powers and duties, the Attorney General has ruled that the fiscal control act does not apply.

"As far as the county's accounts are concerned with respect to his control over those districts, he need only set up in his bookkeeping records accounts for the apportionment to the respective charter districts as included in the county-wide school budget of his county. He should see that no overpayment of its apportionment is made to a special charter district, and to be able to do this, he should require that a warrant be issued for the amount turned over to them."

Catholic Summer School to Open Monday Morning

Catholic summer school conducted by Catholic Sisters of the Order of the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The Catholic instruction school for the children of the parish will begin in Greenville on Monday morning at the Catholic Church, at 8:45 until 12:30, lasting through the month of June.

The teaching will be conducted by Rev. Mother Lucinda with the Sisters of the Order of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, which order is widely known throughout the East for its splendid instruction. These sisters have been teaching in New Bern the past winter, and are representatives of this order having its headquarters in Scranton, Pa., and numbering a thousand and teaching sisters.

While here they will instruct the Catholic children and prepare them for their first holy communion.

TWO COUPLES OBSERVE 65TH WEDDING DAYS

Berlin.—(AP)—Two couples in Germany have just celebrated their sixty-fifth wedding anniversaries. Almost coincidentally, Berlin widowed celebrated the sixty-fifth anniversary of service in the same firm.

Herr and Frau Doeder of Frankfurt-on-the-Order are 93 and 89 years old, respectively. They are in the best of health.

Frau Auguste Spellerburg, age 79, has for 65 years been employed with a Berlin firm dealing in lobsters and crabs.

U. S. AVIATORS RECEIVE MANY GIFTS IN BERLIN

Chamberlin and Levin In Germany Illegally, But They are Happy Just the Same

Berlin, June 11.—(AP)—Clearance Chamberlin and Chas. Levine, although hailed as heroes for their trans-Atlantic flight, are in Germany illegally and will probably be in the same outlaw status in all the European countries they visit unless they can find time amidst the round of entertainments to procure the necessary papers.

Levine has a passport but no visa. Chamberlin said today:

"I have no passport and I don't want one," Levine remarked however, that no one had yet asked for a passport and he doubted if any body would.

Chamberlin is occupying a bedroom in the American Embassy turned over to him by Miss Barbara Schurman, daughter of ambassador Schurman, it is full of gifts of bottled beer, light wines, casks, stains and loving cups, but in order to correct erroneous impression that might be gathered from this, Chamberlin emphasized that while he likes an occasional single glass of beer when at home he does not drink at all.

"I just sip enough wine to be polite in drinking toasts and when I take a glass of beer I stand on that. I don't want more. It makes me sleepy and naturally I want to stay with the party."

Levine voiced similar sentiments and then came the disclosure that gold cigarette cases from Chancellor Marx and foreign secretary Steinhilber bearing the engraved autographs of the statesmen are entirely useless except for supplying friend neither Chamberlin nor Levine use tobacco in any form.

"I was reared a Methodist," Chamberlin explained, "and I am still a Methodist."

Both, however, appreciate other gifts that have been showered on them, such as big bottles of orangeade, a wooden bass-relief of Col. Lindy, from a zealous master carter and colossal wreaths from the Naval fliers' league and good friends at Kottbus, but their highest prized presents are the silver framed autographed portraits of president Von Hindenburg.

The armen closed their fifth busy day on German soil with a gala dinner and dance under auspices of the American clubs.

Ambassador Schurman expressed the gratitude of his country for the reception that had been accorded the fliers and spoke in optimistic vein of the disarmament movement.

Mrs. Lloyd Wooten was named chairman of the music committee, which will arrange for several vocal numbers. Prof. M. H. Wooten of Warsaw will read a paper on the family history, and Dal F. Wooten is scheduled for an informal talk.

About five hundred members of the Wooten clan attended the reunion last year, and it is expected a similar number will be in attendance this year.

No individual invitations will be issued. All members of the family and their friends are invited to attend.

ITALIAN AVIATOR HOPS OFF FOR LISBON

AND WINNERS YESTERDAY

Ted Lyons and Paul Waner, two ball playing products of the south-west, came in for the largest shares of individual glory today as their teams moved onward in their rapid chase for pennant and world crown.

Lyons pitched his eighth straight victory and his eleventh in thirteen starts for the Chicago White Sox in beating the Yankees 4 to 2 yesterday and Waner of the Pirates swelled a batting record that already included leadership of his league in the hitting of three baggers by getting two doubles and a triple as his team beat the Giants 13 to 4.

More than any other one factor it was Lyons' pitching craft that enabled the second place team to score their single victory over the league leading Yankees in their important series. Allowing the most feared batting order in this league but five hits, all singles, Lyons showed coolness and box generalship far beyond his four years in the majors.

When Lyons' right arm was not working yesterday his bat was, his triple in the fifth putting the White Sox in the lead.

Waner's batting performance against the Giants may have been in celebration of his approaching wedding. Paul's marriage to a childhood sweetheart from his home town of Ada, Okla., was set for immediately after the game. Waner had a part in the downfall of three Giant pitchers while Carmen Hill held Hornsby and his clan almost helpless.

Extra inning games showed a sudden growth in popularity. The Robins were beaten in the 12th 5 to 4 by the Cubs for a clean sweep of a series. The Tigers too, won in the twelfth after saving the day with a 3 run rally in the ninth. Their ten to five victory over the Red Sox was the third in a row. In two other overtime games, the Boston Braves outlasted the Cardinals 11 to 6, and the Senators beat the Indians 6 to 5.

The St. Louis Browns dropped to seventh place by losing to the Athletics 4 to 3. Philadelphia's National League representative took a 9 to 3 beating from the Reds.

Double Bills In Piedmont Today

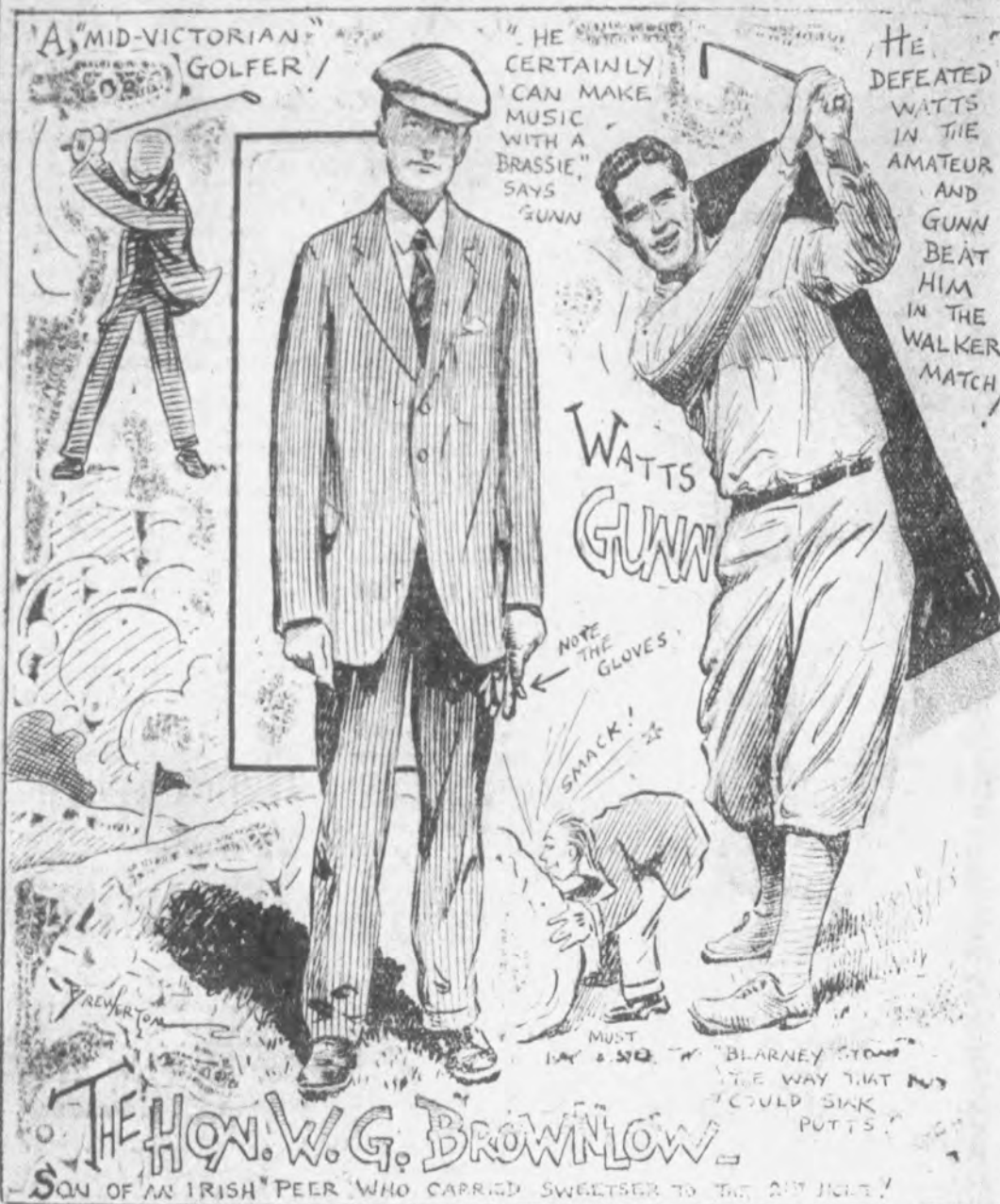
Tokyo Mayor Asks Advice

This is a distinct departure from the customary autocracy of officialdom in Japan.

Concerning The Hon. W. G. Brownlow



SON OF AN IRISH PEER WHO CARRIED SWEETSER TO THE 1911 HOLE

I do not recall seeing the name of the Hon. W. G. Brownlow in the dispatch from Heylake, where the recent British amateur golf championship was contested and won by a golfer hitherto to fortune and to fame unknown, at least in America. One Dr. Tweddell again proved that the British amateur championship frequently goes to some worthy combatant until then outside the pale of celebrity.

One of these days we will take up a discussion of the British game which seems to most Americans peculiar. But just now I would speak of the Hon. W. G. Brownlow son of Lord Lurgan, an Irish peer, a musician first and a tournament golfer afterward because his father wishes him to be the rosy-cheeked boy who drubbed Watt Gunn soundly in the British amateur championship last summer at Muirfield and carried Jess Sweetser to the twenty first green before succumbing to the eventual victor of the tournament. We American golf writers prompt-

ly dubbed the Hon. Brownlow "The Mid-Victorian Golfer" from his costume and also his modest and sedate demeanor. He did not go in for knickerbockers and snappy hosiery. He wore long pants, a short full sack coat, a sort of round cap, black shoes and gray gloves. He was tall and rangy, with a singularly engaging and boyish countenance, and the gentlest and most delightful manner imaginable. It was his first big tournament and his temperament fitness was simply astounding.

Nothing in my thirty years of golf observation quite compares with the utter insouciance with which this inexperienced boy, two down and two to play against the redoubtable Sweetser, banged a putt of 25 feet into the hole at the seventeenth green, to win with a birdie, and on the eighteenth green rammed down a putt of 20 feet for a birdie 3, to square the match. Sweetser was lucky to get a half at the first extra hole; both slipped on the twentieth, and Sweetser finally won at the twenty-first, his closest call of the campaign.

After the Hon. Brownlow had defeated Watts I asked the Atlanta

youngster if he knew his conqueror was a musician.

"I don't know if he can play a fiddle," said Watts ruefully. "But he certainly can make music with a brassie. And the way he rings the bell on the green he must be a Swiss!"

Brownlow was chosen a member of the British Walker Cup team which played against the Americans in the international match at St. Andrews the following day, and Watts and he were matched in the singles. Watts was going splendidly and had his first while conqueror 9 down at the end of the first 18 holes. He finished him off 8-7 in the afternoon.

"You know," Watts told me afterward "he's such a peach of a boy I sort of hated to keep, bearing down after that morning round. But then I thought about Muirfield and remembered I had a lot of revenge to get. I never saw a golfer like him before. He doesn't look like a golfer at all. But he does get those shots away."

Which of course is a ponderable factor in golf, whether you wear knickerbockers or long pants.

In averages compiled including games of Wednesday, McGraw has 74.4, Hornsby, Hornsby and Lindstrom, and Donie Bush has 74.4, Paul Waner, Wright and Traynor in sight of the first ten places.

Frankie Frisch sticks to seventh position, not so far behind Rogers Hornsby. Hendricks of Brooklyn rounds out the list.

East, South and West the undergraduate talent has performed this year in a manner calculated to warm the heart of any track coach, not to mention the enthusiastic and patriotic followers who see the brightest of 1928 Olympic prospects in the exhibition of the country's athletic youth.

Here are a few of the high spots of the season that show how the new crop is developing:

1. Pole vault world's records, in-

doors and out, by Sabin W. Carr mark of 14 feet at the Eastern Institute of Yale, including an astonishing collegiate, where Lee Barnes of Southern California was over 13.5 feet, and four other topped 13 feet.

2. Sensational sprint performances by Charley Borah of Southern California, consistently beating "evens" for the 100-yard dash and galloping the "220" in better than 21 seconds.

3. Development of Fred Alderman, Michigan State ace, as a crack quarter-mile, along with 300-yard champion, Barbuti of Syracuse and Emerson Spencer of Stafford, who ran the distance in 47.4-5 seconds on the Pacific coast.

4. Broad jumping feats by Ed

Hamm of Georgia Tech, consistently around 25 feet, and the entire qualifying field at the Eastern Intercollegiate, where it took jumps of 24 feet to get into the finals, in which Barnes and Mathias of Penn State starred.

5. Fine mile-running of Bill Cox, Penn State sophomore, indoor and outdoor I. C. A. A. champion as well as cross-country running king.

Except for Cox and Barnes, mere schoolboys in 1924, none of these athletes has experienced Olympic competition and another year's seasoning should make them ripe for international work.

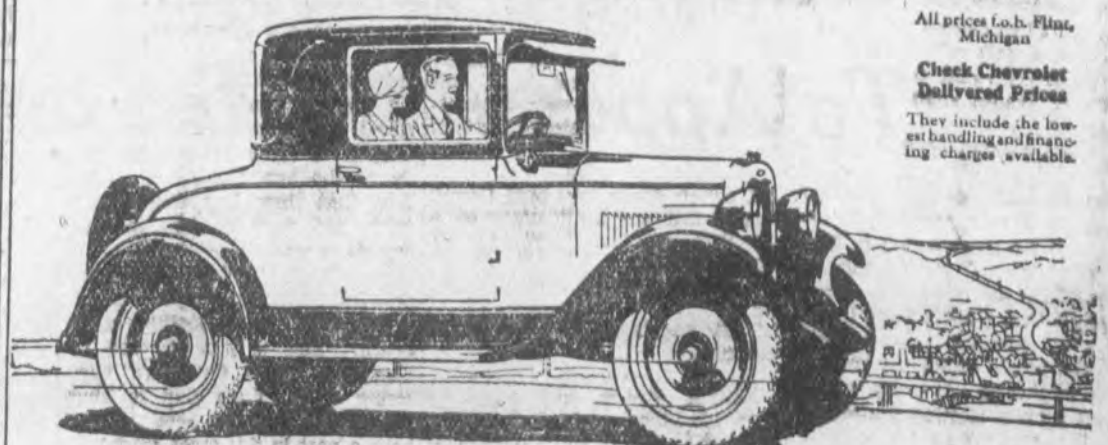

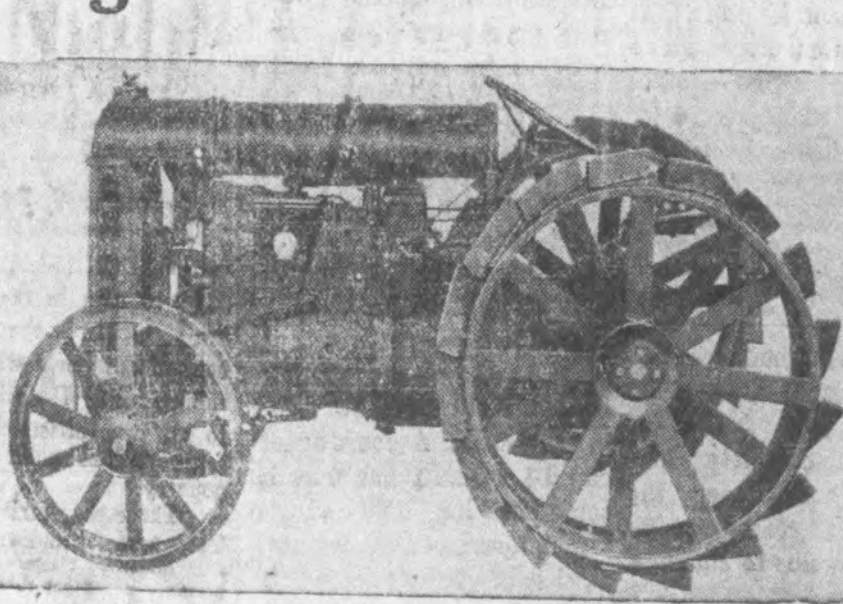

White crosses have been set up in Boston at each of the forty points where persons have been killed in that city by automobiles since the first of the year—as reminders to motorists to be careful. If this custom is to be generally followed, the United States will look like a French World War graveyard.

Now that Lindbergh has made a Missouri Colonel he has a right to think that his triumph is complete and that, like Alexander the Great, he has reason to sigh for other worlds to conquer.

When the President reviewed the fleet, each of 20 ships fired the usual salute of 21 guns and on the heels of every such salute the Mayflower's band played "The Star Spangled Banner." Even if his eardrums survived Mr. Coolidge must have thought that fewer guns would serve the purpose and be more consistent with his policy of economy.

LET YOUTH ASPIRE
 Speaking to the graduating girls at Bryn Mawr, Judge Learned Hand advised youth to aspire to do great things and refuse to let graybeards or grandmothers induce them to remain content within conventional and stereotyped grooves. He said: "Our dangers are not from the outrageous, but from the conforming; not from those who upset our moral complacency or shock us with unaccustomed conduct, but from those, the mass of us, who take their virtues and their tastes, like their shirts and their furniture, from the limited pat-

terns which the market offers." There is truth and good advice in this—provided the free aspiration recommended is toward great and useful things and does not seek merely to defy the proper restraints which the wisdom of the ages has provided. Youth is the age of daring, and sometimes even of original, epoch-making achievement. Many of the greatest names in history were made while those who bore them were still young in years. The world owes a great and lasting debt to its Lindbergh who dared and did while still in the twenties.

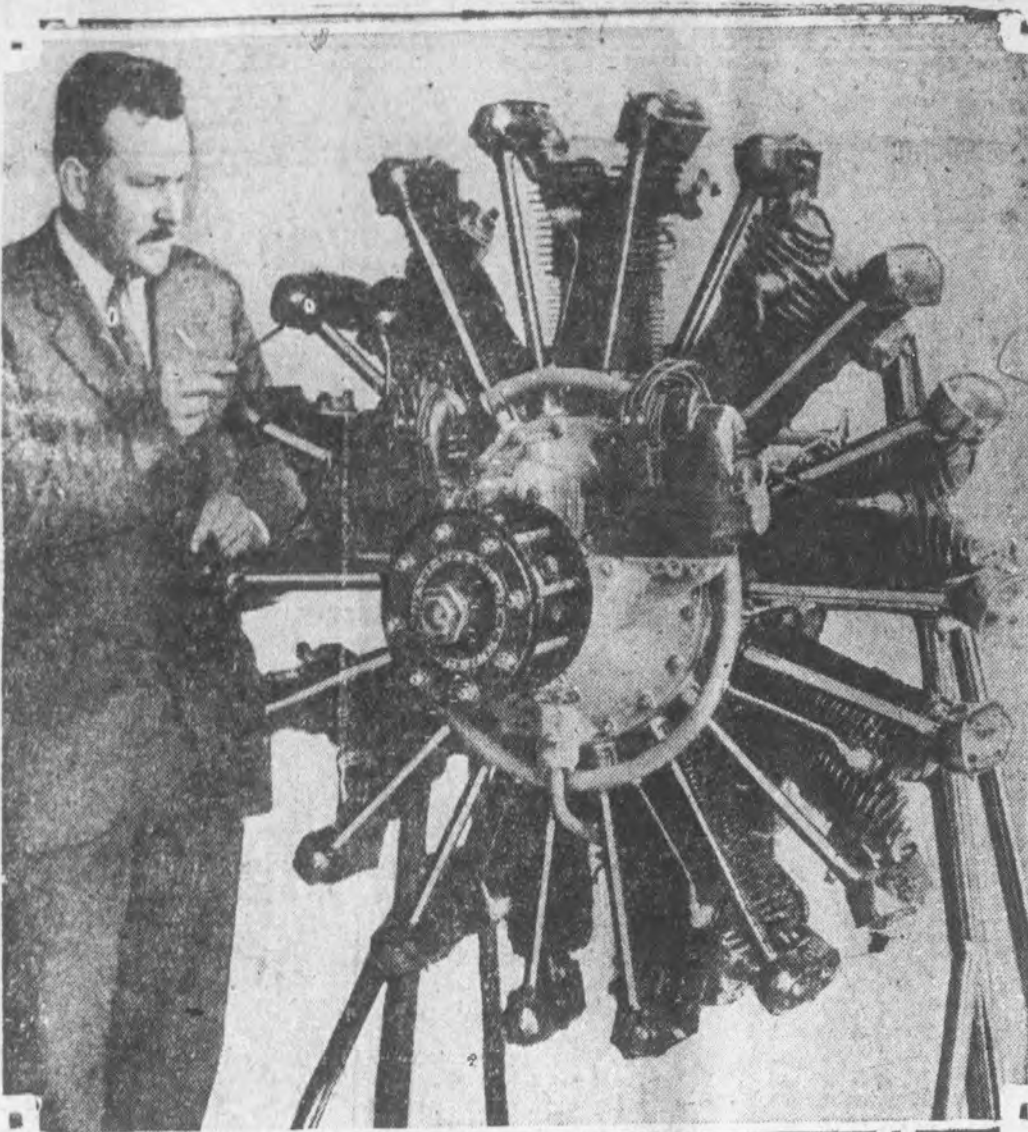
THE WRONG ATTITUDE
 A staff correspondent of The Raleigh Times over at Smithfield to inquire into a jail delivery there, reports having found the sheriff in an "unhappy" mood and noncommunicable. "We don't like fellows to come down here prying into our business," is the way the sheriff is said to have greeted the newspaperman.

Well, of course, there is no way for a reporter to exact information from a sheriff or other public official, unless such official realizes that he is in a public place and that the people have a right to know facts in such cases. A court order can be secured but that is sometimes long and tedious and information in the possession of sheriffs and other such officers is not usually of so much importance as to justify the time and trouble to seek redress from the courts.

As a general rule, when sheriffs and other officers resent the visit of a newspaperman and decline to give out information, it indicates that they are suffering from a guilty conscience for failure to do their duty and they are impelled by a motive to keep out of the public glare as long as they can stave off giving the information.

In the long run, no doubt the attitude of the Johnston sheriff will help crystallize sentiment against him and will certainly have no tendency to begot sympathy of the people.—Kinston Free Press.

LONDON (I-I-N).—Charles Lindbergh is the most written-to man in the world today! He is the goal, it seems, of two-thirds of the persons in the world who "take their pens in hand to say" anything at all. His flight from New York to Paris was a boon to all post offices in Europe. Money spent on stamps for letters to him would lift the postal deficit in many an European country.
 Three secretaries have been retained to care for his mail. They sort it, and submit the most important missives to the flier himself. Matters of less importance never get to him, but are disposed of by the clerical force. Efforts are being made to answer all letters, but the secretarial staff is weeks behind the writers, who seem to be gaining every hour.
 Most of the letters are expressions of congratulation. These come from individuals, organizations, governments. They have been received in every language of Europe and many others besides. Some of the congratulations are very formal. One can imagine an otherwise unimportant secretary of some less important organization endeavoring to shine in Lindbergh's glory for the fleeting moment in which the document he has written is approved by his fellow members. Others are more spontaneous. They are from men, women and children in the ordinary walks of life, some moved by a hero-worshipping sentiment, others by a feeling of their own utility, glad to congratulate one who has achieved success.
 Then there are the letters of congratulations with strings attached to them. "Lindbergh is praised," they say. "Will he address the such-and-such society?" or "Will he be present at such-and-such ceremony?"
 Then come the frankly begging letters. Lindbergh is asked for everything. Will he give a few thousand dollars to this cause? Will he send his helmet to be auctioned off for the benefit of that society? Will he send an admirer a piece of the silk from his plane? Or just his autograph?
 There are also romantic letters! Many a young miss has penned a note to him, hoping that it may catch his favor and start a correspondence that will end with a home and babies in America. Others are more bold. The writers admire Chevalier Lindbergh. He would make an excellent husband. Is he willing to join the correspondent in wedlock?
 Nor are letters the only thing in Lindy's mail. There are decorations of every kind. Many organizations, realizing the improbability of the flier making an appearance to receive a bit of bronze and ribbon, fold the medal in a citation and mail it. There are presents of every kind. Jars of jam and preserves, jewels, knives, mechanical appliances for airplanes, locks of hair, keepsakes, heliograms. And among them are little medals, blessed by ecclesiastics, over which the senders have long prayed that they keep him safe from harm.

to the Southern markets next month, the local manufacturers are keeping posted on prospects of the crops in South Carolina, Georgia and Eastern Carolina, the markets in those sections being the first to open. According to reports the crop prospects in both South Carolina and Georgia by no means encouraging.
 J. M. Dix, a Surry county man, who moved to Georgia a few years ago and is now operating a large farm near Nashville, Ga., fifty miles north of the Florida line, writes J. W. Lovill, a Mt. Airy warehouseman as follows:
 "I have had occasion to see the tobacco crop from my place to Valdosta, and from Valdosta south beyond the Florida line and from Valdosta to Boston; also I went to Augusta, Ga. Last week by the way of Douglas and through the Vidalia section. This gives me a pretty fair idea of the Georgia crop, and I would say there is 25 per cent more planted than last year, with an average of 75 per cent in view of the fact that many of the leaf buyers here will journey there will be 75 per cent of the

original planting that will make good tobacco. Some crops that were planted from the 10th to the 15th of March have been replanted through the latter part of March through April and the first part of May. This makes the fields very irregular and the last replants in them will not get the proper amount of cultivation as the first plantings are in bloom.
 "It is still dry except for a shower locally here and there over scattered territory. The early tobacco has begun turning yellow at the bottom and unless we get rain immediately, cannot amount to much. Summing the whole crop up, it looks like about 60 per cent of last year's crop, and of poor, irregular quality, but that can come out much better than one would think if it could have rain before it is too far gone. At Nashville there have only been a few light showers since last September, most of the water courses have stopped running and the swamps are dry enough to burn. The Alabama River below Valdosta has been absolutely dry and dusty for about six

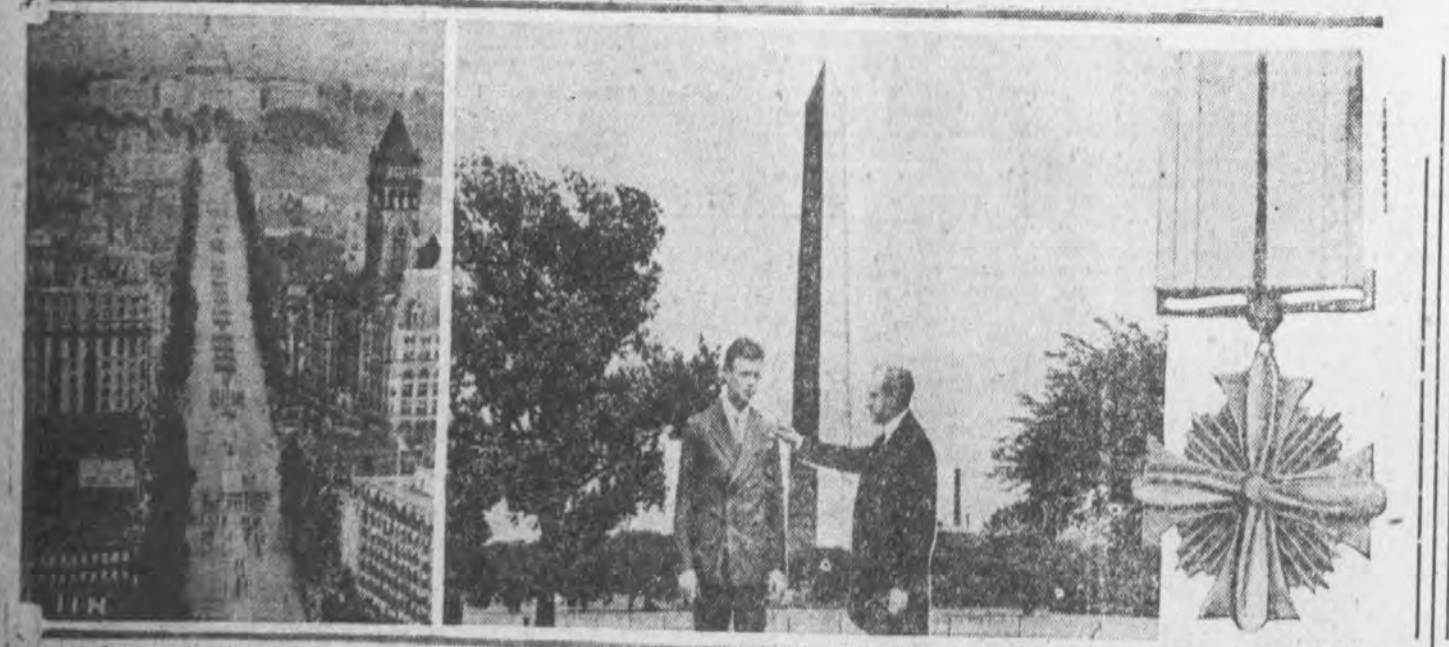

Many thousands of his fellow citizens cheered him and tried to touch his hand as he paraded down historic Pennsylvania Avenue, and many thousands more gathered to a howling mass at the base of the Washington monument to see President Coolidge bestow upon him, in the name of the republic, the first of a new order of decorations for valor. It was the distinguished flying cross conferred on him in recognition of this thunderbolt flight across the Atlantic three weeks ago today.

Discovering that Palto Alto undertakers frequently had to furnish pallbearers for funerals of persons without nearby friends, a few enterprising undergraduates applied for and got steady jobs.

Pay is good, being \$2.50 a trip to the house from the undertaking rooms. Work is easy, seldom consisting of more than carrying the casket out to the hearse and hours are short, usually ten minutes for a funeral.

Occasionally singing is required and for this additional service a dollar is added to the pay check.

Rules are few, consisting chiefly of "Don't smile while carrying the casket." It is seldom a trip to the cemetery is required but if it is required extra pay is added.

The pantheons customarily ride home in the hearse.

GERMAN FIRM PLANS AIR FLIVVER SERVICE

Berlin.—(AP)—Aerial flivvers are to be given a tryout soon between Berlin and Copenhagen, according to plans announced by the Daimler works of Stuttgart.

how Lindbergh looked and what he seemed to be thinking.

Field Marshall Haig says Great Britain really won the war, and could have won it without the help of the United States.

"That won't hurt Uncle Sam's feelings. If our friends across the ocean will kindly pay back the money they borrowed. History will say that France won the war. Without France, England would never have 'got started' and a Hohenzollern prince might have moved to Buckingham palace.

Emil Ludwig, who wrote a good book about Napoleon, now calls the German ex-Kaiser a "Poor, nervous man who never was the war lord, or demon of war, he was said to be." This annoys German Nationalists, who want another Hohenzollern dose.

Lady Astor, a Virginia girl in Britain's Parliament, and a credit to the United States every day, feels about the Kaiser. Eve says Lady Astor was an angel compared to Adm. who was nothing but a weakling. Eve was the first "protester." "She wanted knowledge and wisdom," says Lady Astor, "and refused to live in a fool's paradise."

Sir Oliver Lodge, who believes in ghosts and spirits, says that with synthetic protoplasm life can be created in the laboratory. This says Lodge does not belittle God's power, for man is God's creation, and might well imitate his Maker on a small scale.

He MIGHT but he WONT. That is, he will not create the only life that counts—the life that THINKS. Real life is THOUGHT, not MATTER.

With the naturalness, the simplicity, and the poise of true greatness, France had the opportunity to show clearly her goodwill for America and our people. With like acclaim and evidences of cordial friendship our ambassadors without port folio was received by the rulers, the governments and the peoples of England and Belgium. From other nations came hearty messages of admiration for him and for his country. For these manifold evidences of friendship we are profoundly grateful.

"The absence of self acclaim, the refusal to become commercialized which has marked the conduct of this sincere and genuine exemplar of fine and noble virtues, has endeared him to every one. He has returned unspoiled. Particularly has it been delightful to have him refer to his airplane as somehow possessing a personality and being equally entitled to credit with him self, for we are proud that in every particular, this silent partner represented American genius and industry. I am told that more than 100 separate companies furnished materials, parts or service in its construction.

"And now, my fellow citizens, this young man has returned. He is here. He has brought his unsullied fame home. It is our great privilege to welcome back to his native land, on behalf of his own people, who have a deep affection for him, and have been thrilled by his splendid achievement, a column of our republic, a conqueror of the air and strengthener of the ties which bind us to our sister nation across the sea, and as President of the United States, I bestow the distinguished flying cross as symbol of appreciation for what he is and what he has done, upon Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh."
