LUCKY LINDBERGH GIVEN BOISTEROUS WELCOME BY CITIZENS OF NEW YORK

Countless Thousands Greet Intrepid Airman on His Arrival At Noon Today.

New York, June 13.—(AP)—Considering him one of their own because he left from here on his pioneering flight to France, New York's millions today welcomed Charles Lindbergh, viking of the Atlantic heavens, as they had never welcomed any one before.

After a greeting from 50,000 throats at the Battery that shook the city and a triumphant march up Broadway close packed with cheering crowds and paper showmen from the windows at the crackle of skyscrapers, the young flier arrived at City Hall at 2:09 p. m., this afternoon.

When the shrieking of harbor whistles gave notice that Lindbergh had landed from the bay, to which he flew from Mitchell Field and Washington, a great rolling roar of welcome spread through the city. Over miles and miles of the financial, wholesale, shopping and residential sections paper drifted into the air in the city's traditional welcome to its heroes.

Along the line of march hundreds of thousands of cheering men and women packed behind police lines cheered until they were hoarse and after that waved flags, blew horns and danced about as best they could in the press. Any sound, any gesture was enough so long as it indicated that though this boy who had dared to confront the forces of nature alone and who had won fame might call his home in any city he liked, he was by unanimous adoption a son of New York and a son loved above all others.

While waiting for Lindy to arrive the estimated 50,000 persons at the Battery were orderly enough but when he came in their emotions broke all bounds. Men beat each other in the backs, women threw their arms about those nearest to them, and both men and women struggled to get nearer to their idol, alternately laughing aloud and weeping openly.

During the progress of the parade up Fifth Avenue as the flier was smiling and waving acknowledgment of the tremendous acclaim being accorded him the chauffeur, seeing progress endangered, suddenly put on speed. So sudden was the advance that Lindy was taken unawares and hurried backward against the seat. Mr. Whalen caught him by the legs and steadied him.

Lindy quickly regained his composure and waved laughing at the crowd as he drove on.

As it seemed that Lindy was about to be thrown to the street there was a moment's deadly silence as the crowd's cheers were stopped.

At City Hall Lindbergh was presented with a scroll which read as follows:

"The City of New York to Captain Lindy, America's air ambassador New York to Paris non-stop flight, greeting:

"On this historic spot and in this seat of our city government it has been our custom to extend our municipal welcome to many of the notable people of the world.

"Here the chief magistrates of this city of New York have received many noted heroes of the land, the sea and air. Kings and leaders of mankind and the highest dignitaries of church and state and heroes in the many fields of human endeavor have here received the hearty and cordial official welcome which always marks the hospitality of the city of New York.

"Today, the equal of the height and dignity of all the traditions through the years has been established here as on behalf of the millions of New York citizens who have been thrilled and inspired by your heroic deed, I welcome you—Captain Charles A. Lindbergh—back to the city from which you set forth in your courageous non-stop flight to Paris.

"From this the youngest of the great cities of the earth, your intrepid voyage carried you, braving the perils of the air and the sea, to Paris, one of the oldest cities of the world, and by your glorious flight you not only attained the ambition of the aeronautical science but, enhancing your prodigious accomplishment and in modesty and diplomacy that is found only in genuine heroism, you inspired in the hearts of the European people a warmer affection and admiration for your own beloved country and her people.

"Youth of our nation has found in your coming spirit of courage and youth an encouragement and (Continued on Page Four)

BOOTLEGGER LEAVES STORE TO CUSTOMERS

Sheriff Asks Him a Question and John Harris Goes to Parts Unknown.

The story of how an alleged member of the illicit whiskey traffic disappeared Saturday night, leaving his filling station and store in the hands of customers, was told this morning by Sheriff Whitehurst as he continued his efforts to apprehend those connected with the case.

The man that left his filling station in the hands of the law and his customers, was John Harris. He operates a place on the Greenville-Washington highway, three miles from Greenville, but so far has failed to make his appearance at the office of the sheriff to acknowledge reposition.

The apprehension of Harris came about in a most surprising way—not to the sheriff, but to Harris himself.

The representative of the law had seated himself in front of the filling station, apparently "killing" time, but in reality, waiting for the owner to return.

He didn't wait long. Harris drove by in an automobile. He went down the road a short distance, turned around and came back. An assistant ran out to the car and whispered something. Harris got out of the car on the opposite side from the sheriff and disappeared in the dense swampy land with something in his arms. He returned a few minutes later, and was confronted by the sheriff.

"How about the five gallons of whiskey you just carried in the woods?" the sheriff interrogated.

Harris didn't wait to offer any explanation of apology for his haste, but dived through the woods not to return to reclaim him whiskey or the filling station.

The sheriff returned to the store and found that the assistant had also vanished, leaving several customers standing around waiting for service.

COOLIDGES GO ON VACATION

President and Wife to Leave Capital Tonight for South Dakota.

Washington, June 13.—(AP)—President and Mrs. Coolidge leave Washington tonight for a far away corner in Western South Dakota to spend their summer vacation in the state Game Lodge of Black Hills.

It is the first time the President has planned such an extended trip of the country and in consequence the preparations for the journey inordinately taxed the energies of the White House staff.

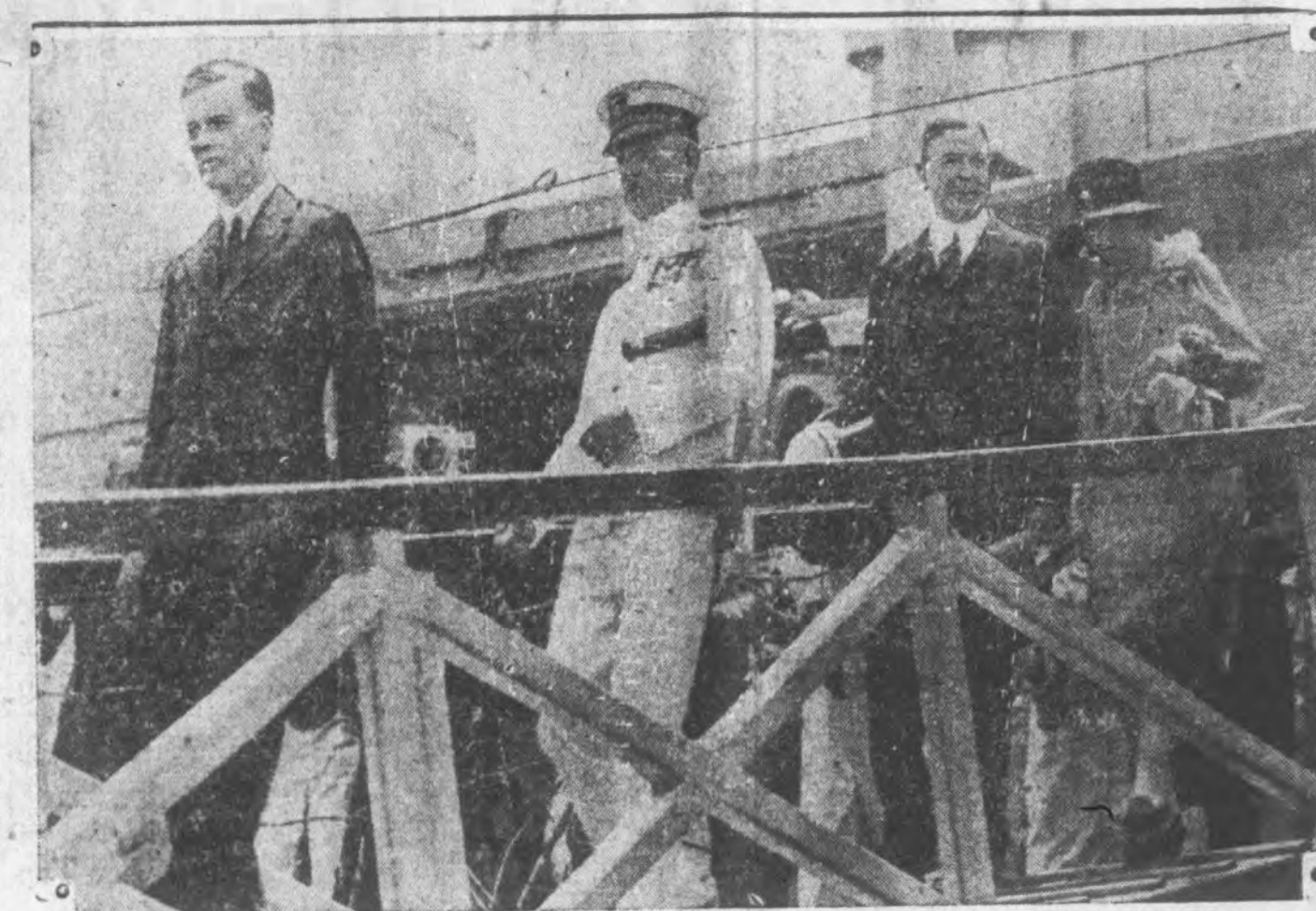
The Presidential train will make its first scheduled stop after leaving Washington, at Hammond, Ind. where Tuesday Mr. Coolidge will dedicate the Wacker Memorial Park to the World War Veterans. No other formal stops are planned except at Pierre, South Dakota, where the President will be welcomed to the state of his summer residence by Governor Bulow and other state officials.

In view of the busy week-end which caused Mr. Coolidge to forsake his office in order to participate in the celebration for Col. Lindy the last day in Washington found many matters awaiting attention. In addition to clearing his desk of pending matters, the President was to make a brief address before the First International Congress of soil science.

NEGRO TO FACE TRIAL HERE IN MURDER CASE

Willie Whitaker Held For Killing of Paul Hyman Early Sunday Morning.

Willie Whitaker, colored man of Whitehurst Station, is held in the county jail without bond today charged with the killing of Paul Hyman, colored, in the Whitehurst Station community yesterday morning about six o'clock. Whitaker will be given preliminary hearing before Magistrate John Ivy Smith tomorrow morning at ten o'clock.

Whitaker is alleged to have shot Hyman with a .32 calibre revolver, the bullet taking effect in the neck and producing death almost instantly.

The shooting occurred at the Tom Barnhill place, and is said to have been the result of an argument over a cap. Both of the negroes, with several companions had been up all night gambling. Shortly after the game was over Hyman missed his cap and accused Whitaker of having it.

After considerable argument, Hyman pulled out a knife and struck at Whitaker. The latter pulled his gun and fired one time at his assailant. Sheriff Whitehurst arrested Whitaker a short time later and brought him back to the county jail to await preliminary hearing tomorrow morning.

BADEN TURNS OUT TO GREET U. S. AIRMEN

Crowd of Two Thousand and Germans Receive Chamberlin and Levine Today.

Baden, Germany, June 13.—(AP)—Clarence Chamberlin and Chas. Levine were received by a crowd of about 2,000 at the railway station upon their arrival from Berlin this morning.

The burgomaster and members of the municipal council escorted the trans-Atlantic fliers to their hotel where there was another demonstration and a frantic rush for autographs, the airmen enjoyed their first railway journey in Europe and said the continental sleeping cars were preferable to those at home.

At Frankfurt and Karlsruhe they were serenaded by representatives of the aero club, delegation of German was aviators and boy and girl scouts.

They plan to tour the black forest and to leave for Bremen the latter part of the week to meet their wives who are due Friday from New York.

Lindy's Mother Cheered By Thousands Upon Her Arrival At New York

New York, June 13.—(AP)—Mrs. Evangeline Lindbergh, mother of Col. Lindy at Pennsylvania station at 8:05 o'clock this morning from Washington.

Major William F. Deegan, representing the Mayor's reception committee, received her and she was driven immediately to an apartment in the mid-section, reserved for the use of herself and her son. The flier's mother was cheered by crowds that had gathered in the big terminal. She smiled at the welcome.

She came on a private car of the Washington express. With her was her uncle, John Lodge, acting mayor of Detroit, and Richard Blythe, the personal friend and representative of Col. Lindy.

Attached to the same train was a private car filled with members of the St. Louis committee and two other cars filled with St. Louis citizens.

Mrs. Lindbergh wore a two tone green crepe dress, black satin coat with narrow ermine collar and black straw hat, with white gardenias. News of Mrs. Lindbergh's arrival spread quickly. As the official car bore the party into seventh avenue the screaming motorcycle patrol warned the sidewalk crowds of her approach.

Along 34th street turning into fifth avenue, the sidewalk were already lined, and as the party sped up the avenue, Mrs. Lindbergh was given rousing cheers.

As her car bore her to the private apartment reserved especially for the Lindbergh party.

"I don't know what to say," she protested, smilingly when greeted by reporters, but before retiring to her room turned and exclaimed "It's wonderful. I had a wonderful time in Washington."

"I don't know what my plans are in this city. They are in the hands of the committee."

A crowd of police pushed the crowd as she entered the apartment of Harry H. Frazer on the eleventh floor at 270 Park Avenue where she and her son will stay.

Mrs. James J. Walker, wife of Mayor Walker, called on Mrs. Lindbergh shortly before 10 o'clock.

When Mrs. Lindbergh saw the newspaper men later she met the barrage of questions with smiles and was perfectly at ease.

Asked if she had any idea as to the future plans of her noted son, she replied that she did not.

She said that no plans of Col. Lindy would affect her own plans. She again expressed her opinion of the reception in Washington as "very wonderful."

"Would you like to fly with your son?" was the next question. "I have flown with him a good many times," replied Mrs. Lindbergh with a smile. "But I have never crossed the Atlantic."

"Can you pilot a plane?" "Yes," she replied, "I can pilot a plane, but not very well."

"Did you have any other plans for your son or was it his own idea to become an aviator?" "You had better ask him."

"Do you want to fly to San Diego with your son?" "I have not been asked."

"Did he bring you anything from Europe?" "I have not seen anything," she said.

"You had better look after that!"

JAPAN TO ASK NAVAL CONFAB FOR CRUISERS

Delegation to Arms Parley Directed to Show Reason For Need of Increase.

Tokyo, June 13.—(AP)—The Associated Press is informed from an authoritative source that Japan's delegation to the Geneva Naval Conference is instructed to propose an equal ratio, with a maximum limit, for auxiliary vessels.

The contention is that Japan is theoretically entitled to have even more cruisers and other auxiliaries than America, owing to her greater necessity of protecting trade routes.

It is also argued that an equal ratio with Great Britain and the U. S. will continue to menace whatever, because it is virtually impossible for auxiliary vessels to operate offensively across the wide expanse of the Pacific.

The delegation it is understood will declare that Japan does not intend to build the maximum but that what is wanted is "liberty to build" equally with the other powers.

Oyster Yield Increases In This State

Raleigh, June 13.—(AP)—The yield of oysters from North Carolina bays for the past season increased by more than 60 per cent over that of the previous year, the output for the season of 1926-27 being 300,000 bushels as compared with 185,000 according to a report issued today by Capt. J. A. Nelson, fisheries commissioner.

Officials assigned the large increase to the rebuilding of the marshes of the country which fell off all over the country as the result of adverse propaganda affecting all oyster beds in 1924.

Although the purest of oysters has always been furnished from North Carolina waters, the markets of this state's products suffered with the rest as a result of the typhoid scare. A thorough system of inspection and supervision over the taking and preparation of the bivalves by the state department of health and the department of conservation and development has completely destroyed public confidence in the sea-food.

Production of scallops which fell to a low mark in 1925-26 because of the damage of scallop beds by fresh water from excessive rains, experienced a large increase last season, a production of only 1,300 gallons was reported.

The output of clams showed a small decrease with 27,266 bushels in 1926-27 as compared with 30,357 bushels for the previous season.

BYRD READY FOR FLYING

Commander of America Makes Final Radio Test in New York Today.

New York, June 13.—(AP)—Commander Richard E. Byrd who accompanied Lindy from Washington as one of the pilots of an escort group of planes today told the Associated Press that at the first break of good weather "after the Lindbergh reception is over in New York," he would set out for Paris in his tri-motored plane, the America.

New York, June 13.—(AP)—While New York was welcoming one flier back from Europe today another flier, Commander Richard E. Byrd, was making near-final preparations for another flight—which, he said, like Lindy's feat, will be to Paris.

The America (tri-motored plane, was to be put through a final radio test today, which would make the craft ready for flight except for loading emergency supplies already on board.

The weather bureau, which prepared weather charts for Lindy and Chamberlin, to chart ocean maps for Commander Byrd and masters of all vessels in the North Atlantic will be requested to make weather reports twice daily by radio beginning today.

BANDITS ROB PAYMASTER AT YELLOW CREEK

Two Men Held in Graham County Jail Waiting Completion Of Investigation.

Robbinsville, N. C., June 13.—(AP)—A tale of road agency that rivals the old stories of the days of the western frontier, was brought here today by officers who lodged Patrick Jenkins and Richard Williams, 18 year old boys, in the Graham county jail pending completion of investigation into the holdup and robbery of a paymaster of the Connor & Sons Construction Company, of Pittsburgh, Pa., on a lonely trail over the Yell Creek Mountains.

The paymaster, S. M. Baldwin, guarded by deputy sheriff Tom Crist, had paid a gang working at the western end of the Tallahassee Power Company tunnel being dug through the Yellow Creek Mountains by the construction company. Taking a mountain trail on horseback the paymaster and his guard started across the mountains to pay off the men working at the east end of the tunnel.

About half way across the mountains two men suddenly appeared from behind trees.

"Hands up!" they commanded. Both the paymaster and deputy, caught unawares, were quickly disarmed and forced to dismount. One of the robbers kept the pair covered while the other seized the paymaster's satchel containing the pay envelopes of the employees, the most of which contained cash. Then one faded into the mountain thickets as the other kept guard. His companion safely out of sight, the second robber fled. The men, according to the victims, were either negroes, or had their faces blackened. Officers inclined to the latter view.

Although only two men were seen, the officers said they found traces of a number of other persons having been hidden in the undergrowth.

Bloodhounds brought to the scene failed to pick up the trail, but 300 yards from the scene of the robbery the paymaster's satchel was found. The robbers were trailed for quite a distance by the envelopes which they apparently tore open as they fled.

The trail, officers said, led toward the home of one of the two mountain boys who were arrested. They also said that they had evident evidence tending to implicate the boys but declined to make it public.

The payroll has been carried over the same mountain trail on horseback every Saturday for a year. Officers believe that the robbers were familiar with this procedure and that they were residents of the section.

Franklin, N. C., June 13.—(AP)—Paymaster of the Conley Construction Company was held up and robbed of \$6,500 Saturday afternoon at Yellow Creek, Graham county, according to a telephone message received here today from C. B. Lane, editor of the Graham county News at Robbinsville. Few details of the robbery were available as it occurred in an isolated section of the mountains.

Two men giving name of Patrick K. Jenkins and Richard Williams were brought to Robbinsville this morning and placed in the county jail on charges of complicity in the robbery.

Details available at Robbinsville were meager, it was said the name of the pay-master not being obtained at the time, however it is said that the paymaster was accompanied by Deputy Sheriff Tom Crist.

Whether or not the money has been recovered could not be learned.

Pitt Club Girls Leave For Camp Leach Tuesday

Annual encampment of home demonstration club girls of Pitt County will begin at Camp Leach tomorrow and continue through Saturday, according to an announcement made this morning by Miss Bertha Lee Ferguson, home demonstration agent of Pitt County, who has charge of the girls' activities.

Between 75 and 100 young women, representing fifteen clubs of the county, will go on the camping trip. They will be joined by members of similar clubs from Beaufort County, and members of the boys' agricultural clubs of Pitt and Beaufort counties.

Miss Harriet Brown, of Washington, will act in the capacity of recreational leader, and Mr. Curran of the State Forestry Department will have charge of nature study. There will be also an instructor in arts and crafts.

LEADERS IN BIG LEAGUES MEET DEFEAT

Five of seven Sunday major league games were won by a margin of a single run and most of these were decided in the final inning or two.

Both league leaders were defeated. While the Pirates were brought down 11 to 10 from behind by a stirring Robin rally, the Yankees were beaten from in front by a seven run lead the Indians piled up in the first two frames.

A rookie Robin pitcher, Norman Pihl, was the hero of the fray in which his club felled the league leaders.

In the Yankee game Babe Ruth poked out his 21st home run, going ahead of 1921, his record year. No one was on. In spite of a second circuit wallop from the bat of Pihl, relief pitcher, the Yankees could not quite wipe out that early Cleveland lead and lost by 8 to 7.

Cardinals and Phillies waged another nip and tuck battle not decided until the last of the ninth. Although out hit almost 2 to 1, the Cardinals won, by 5 to 4, on Lester Bell's home run.

Relief pitchers were having a big day. Added to the names of Pihl and Pihl was that of Carroll of the Tigers who like them supplied fresh batting punch when needed most. Batting in three runs and scoring twice himself, Carroll helped his team to its fifth straight game, this one at the expense of Boston by the apparently popular score of 11 to 10.

Chicago's two second place clubs were having mingled fortunes. While the White Sox dropped their second in a row to the Senators by six to one, the Cubs crowded the Pirates for first place with their eighth straight victory. Earl Webb a McGraw discard, helped to beat the Giants by two singles in the eighth which pushed across the deciding run to make it seven to six.

The shut out ball pitched by Genewich of the Boston Braves, disposed of the struggling Reds by 4 to 1.

The provisions and finances for the camp are supplied by the home and club and a thorough wholesome, happy and profitable four days have been planned for the youngsters.

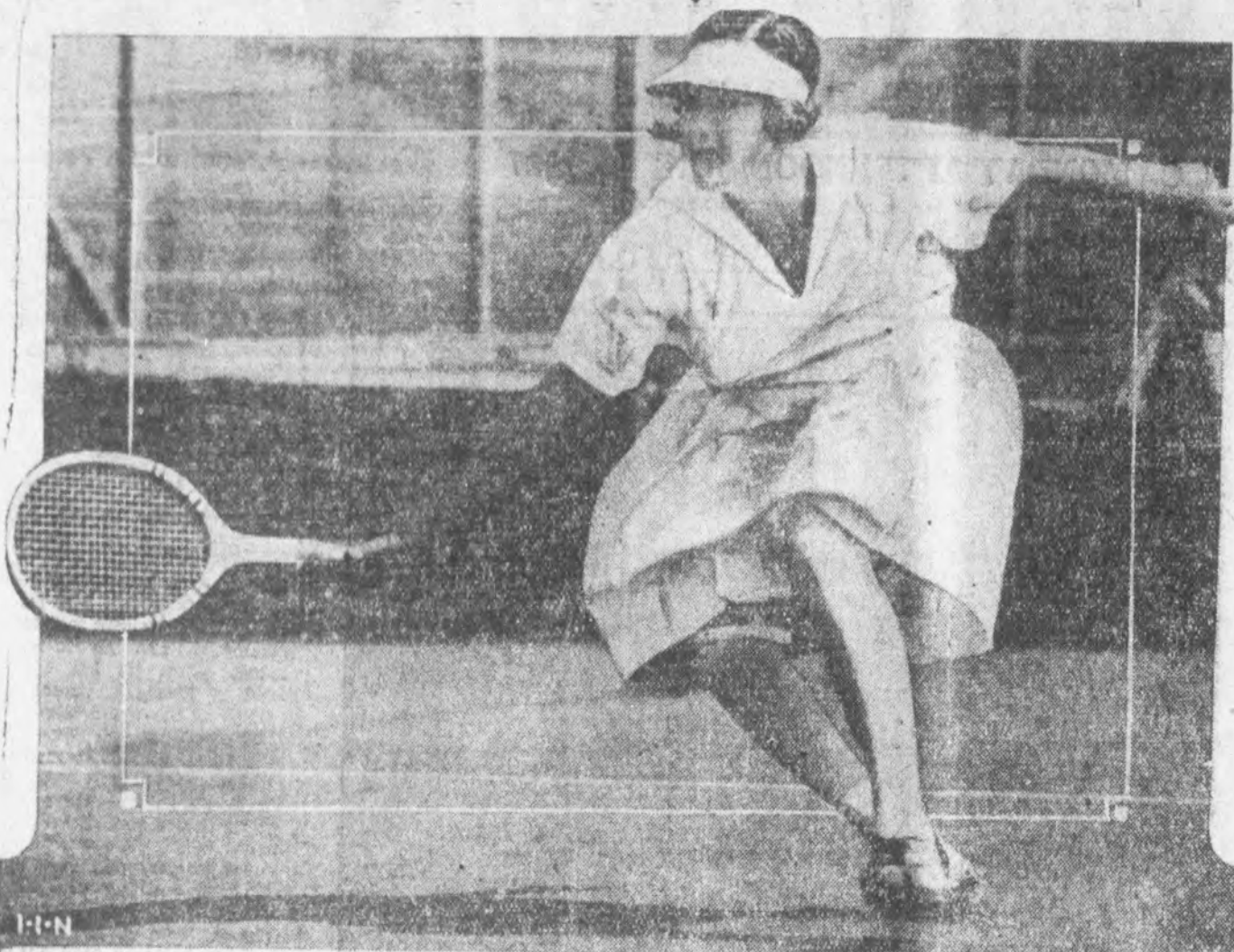
Washington Pays Farewell to Lindy

SPEED BOAT REGATTA AT BOSTON DRAWS BIGGEST YACHTING DEMONS

Boston.—(INS)—Wind and sail will give way to gasoline and high powered engines when the two-day National Speed Boat regatta is held in Dorchester Bay, June 17 and 18 under the auspices of the Massachusetts Gold Cup Association and the Boston Yacht Club.

For the first time in the history of New England boating sportsmen of this section will conduct a speed boat regatta that is of national import. It is a new departure in boating in this vicinity. The thrills of speed boating which have heretofore been for the Great Lakes, Mississippi river waters and famous resorts of the southern Atlantic seaboard will be brought to Massachusetts waters that have long been famous for its sail racing.

Three Mile Course. The regatta will be held over a course of three miles. The course has been laid on a kite shaped marine track. It runs from a point off Castle Island, by the Steel Pier at City Point, to a point in mid-channel of Thompson's Island, then by Thompson's Island again to a point between that Island and Spectacle Island, back to Castle Island and repeat.

Among the boats which will be seen here will be Miss America IV and Miss America V. Their races will be purely exhibition and for fun only. They are considered the fastest boats in the world.

The big event of the regatta is the 151 class, free for all with or without superchargers. The first prize is the national championship trophy will be the prize of the regatta. The trophy is a silver cup which is presented to the winner of the regatta.

Cholera Campaign Gets Co-Operation

The hog cholera campaign sponsored by the Board of Agriculture and approved by the county commissioner and extension forces at State College is receiving a hearty response from the farmers.

More than 2,000 hogs have been listed for the June campaign and the farmers on all sides are approving the idea of having two campaigns a year, one in the spring and one in the fall and leaving the balance of the county agent's time to be devoted to other phases of the agricultural program which includes poultry raising and shipping, hog production and marketing, dairying and the selling of dairy products, standardizing varieties of cash crops and the numberless other farm problems that come up for attention.

In exchange for the three Giants get Benton, a pitcher who is better than average (Taylor, one of the best catchers in the league and a rookie infielder.

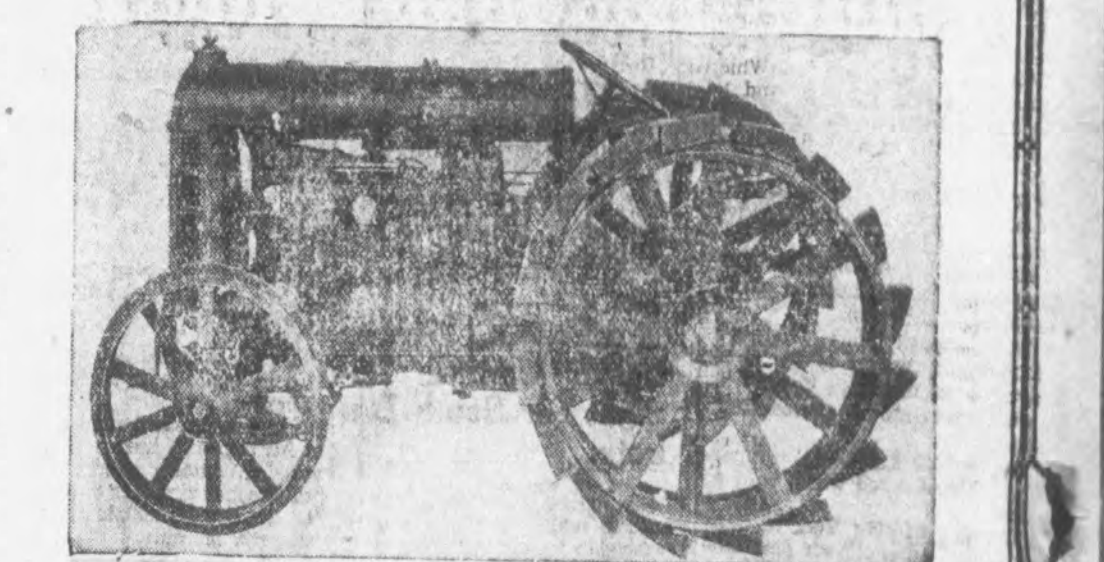

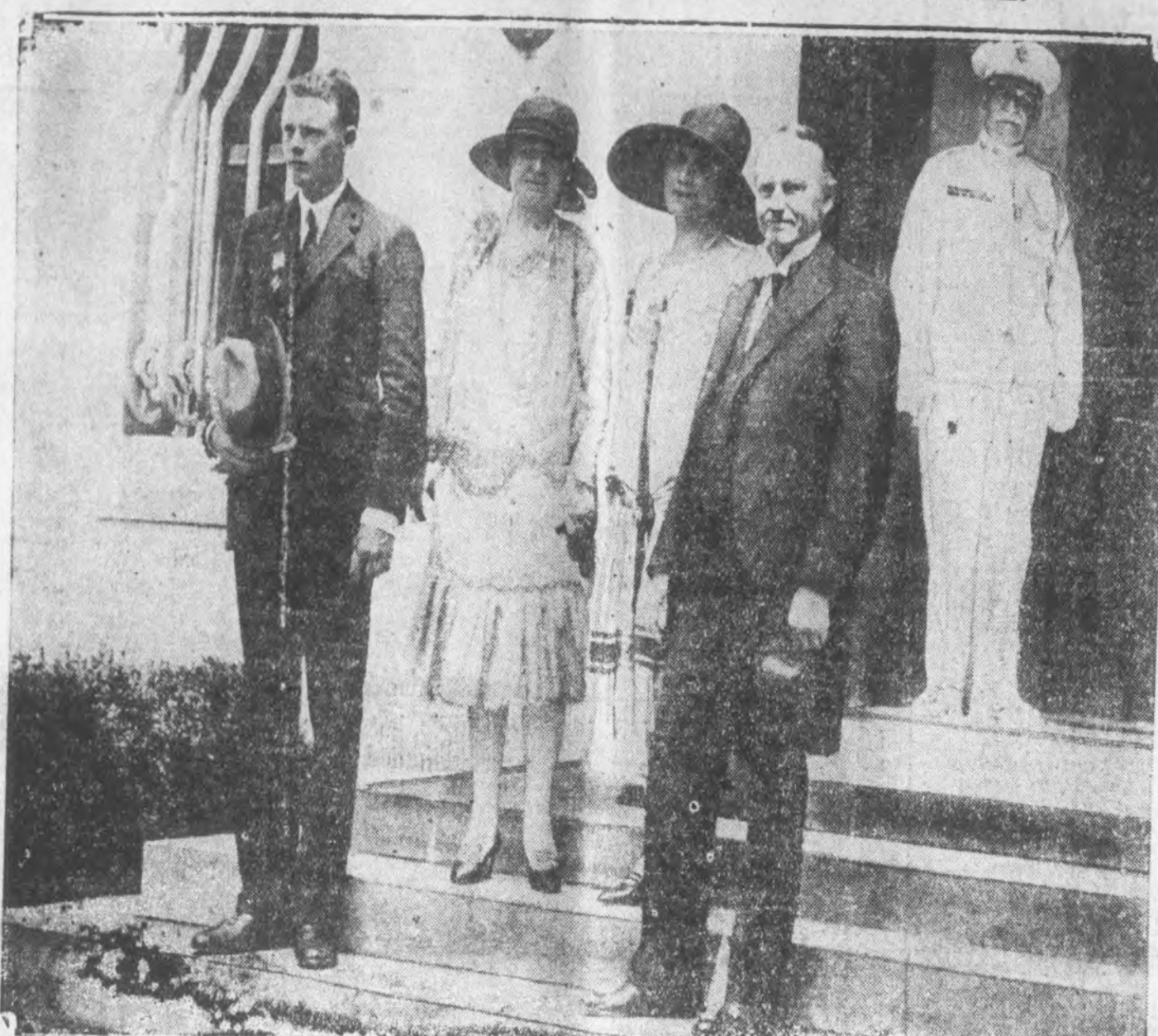

LUCKY LINDBERGH GIVEN BOISTEROUS WELCOME BY CITIZENS OF NEW YORK

(Continued From Page One)

illustrious example.

"The great game which you have won in the history of your youth, not only for yourself but for America, this city inevitably shares with you. From New York you sailed on your adventurous exploit; and our fair city is linked forever with the fame that is yours.

"The people of New York delight to honor you; their hearts are wide open to you and in their name, I present to you 'this scroll of honored welcome' that you may have a permanent record of how the people of New York, speaking through me, hold you and your epoch making deed in honor for all time."

After reading the scroll, Mayor Walked addressed Lindy:

"Let me dispense with an unnecessary function," he said, "by telling you that if you have prepared yourself with any letters of introduction to New York they are not necessary.

"You are a great grammarian you have given added definition to the word 'we.' We are familiar with the 'editorial we' but not until you arrived in Paris were we aware of the aeronautical 'we.' You have given to the world a flying pronoun.

"That word was an indication of the courage and hopes of Nungesser and Coli who live now only in the memory of the peoples of the world.

"New York City is yours. I don't give it to you. You won it. I congratulate you and welcome you into the world's greatest city that you may look the world in the face."

In reply Lindy said that his New York reception was greater than those of Paris, Brussels, London and Washington "all put together."

"When I was preparing to leave for Europe," he said, "I was told that if we landed in Le Bourget we might expect a rather demonstrative reception. After one half hour at Le Bourget I didn't believe anyone in New York would have the slightest idea of the reception given us.

"And again at Brussels and also at London, 1,500 of the pride of Scotland Yard were lost in a crowd at Crofton as completely as though they had been dropped in the ocean. Except around the car in which it was and around the plane, I don't recall ever seeing two of them together.

"At Washington there was another enormous reception, but at New York I believe that there was a reception greater than all four put together. I wonder what those London Bobbies would have thought of their position here."

Lindy then went over material of previous speeches, stressing the point that he still was without his "little visit to Europe, the quiet one."

Three loud throated cheers interrupted the aviator. He smiled and waited until quiet came again and continued:

"I received many telegrams urging me to come back and Ambassador Houghton advised me to come back. When I started up the Portomac the other day I decided I wasn't sorry that I had followed that advice. And when I reached New York this morning I was very glad indeed I had taken it."

Col. Lindy then spoke of the future of aviation, reiterating part of a speech he gave at Washington. Of the future of aviation, he said: "We must not expect too rapid a development of aviation. We are not going to have trans-Atlantic service until five or ten years. Aviation has been developed on a sound basis. It will continue to develop on a sound basis."

After the ceremonies at City Hall, Lindy again joined the parade and continued uptown. The line of march led through Lafayette Street and past Tombs prison where the inmates looked out upon the gray stone walls and cheered in concert with the crowds in the street.

The parade passed on to Central Park for presentation by the State of New York, through Governor Smith, of the State Medal of Valor. Lindbergh will end the first day of his return to New York by being the guest of society. He will attend a dinner, reception and dance at the Long Island country home of Clarence W. Mackay, president of the Postal Telegraph and Cable Company.

A special detail of 8,000 policemen, stationed at five and ten foot

intervals along the line of march from the Battery to Central Park, was one of the city's precautions for handling crowds. Thirty thousand Boy Scouts volunteered to aid in maintaining lines along the parade route.

Maple routes for airplanes held them directly over the harbor and the Hudson and East Rivers. After escorting the Macon to the Battery, the airplane squadrons were ordered to proceed up the Hudson, across Harlem and down the East River to a separating point near the tip of Manhattan Island. This was done to prevent possible collision between the two planes.

Col. Lindy will be guest of honor of the City of New York at a dinner in the Hotel Commodore tomorrow night. Reservations have been made for thirty-five hundred guests.

The Borough of Brooklyn Thursday is planning to present Col. Lindy a silver bowl.

Two Negroes Burned at Stokes

Louisville, Miss., June 13.—(AP)—Jim and Mark Fox, negro slayers of Clarence Nichols, sawmill superintendent, were taken from Sheriff Peremientier, New Noyapater, early today, brought to Louisville, and burned at the stake by a mob estimated at 1,000 after they were paraded through the streets.

The negroes were caught by Deputy Sheriff W. S. Peremientier near Noyapater and were started toward Louisville. Before reaching the jail several hundred white citizens coming from every direction, overpowered the officers.

Mr. Nichols it was said, was riding with his brother, J. B. Nichols, and met the two negroes on the road, a difficulty following. The negroes fatally shot Nichols and fled. J. B. Nichols notified the officers of the shooting.

Mr. Nichols leaves a wife and several children. His body will be taken to Cone Hill, Miss., for burial.

Everything is reported quiet at Louisville and officers expected no further trouble.

Murder Case At Fayetteville Is Continued

Fayetteville, N. C., June 13.—(AP)—Defense in the trial of Mrs. May Belle Phillips and Kenneth O. Boone, for the murder of Frank McLaurin near here last January 22, today began the presentation of evidence, after a recess from Saturday.

The recess was granted upon petition of defense counsel, requesting time in which to realign their case following the testimony of G. H. Savage, the State's surprise witness. An affidavit executed by Savage in the federal prison at Atlanta, where he has been serving a sentence for liquor law violators,

Next Two Years Will See Surplus Grow Smaller

Raleigh, June 13.—(AP)—The huge surplus which has accumulated in the general fund of the State during the past two years will be reflected during the next two years by a lessening of the ad valorem tax burden in many of the counties of the State, Governor A. W. McLean said today.

The easing of the tax burden will be brought about on account of the fact that the General Assembly authorized large portion of the potential surplus of \$1,700,000 to be used in increasing the school equalizing fund.

This fund distributed among the majority of the counties in the State helps the counties to support their schools and thus either lessens the county tax rate for schools, enables the counties to provide better schools without an increase in the tax rate.

The recent General Assembly increased the equalizing fund from \$1,500,000 to \$3,250,000. This increase just about takes care of the State's expected surplus.

Governor McLean said that he expected a small surplus in the general fund on June 30, 1929.

The State's credit balance or surplus May 31, was \$1,361,374.11; according to the combined report of the treasurer and auditor released today.

Heavy expenditures cut the credit balance down by almost two million dollars in May but a great deal of money usually paid out by the State in June was paid in May this year and therefore June expenditures be proportionately less."

NEW YORKERS PREPARE FOR CELEBRATION
Window's of Financial District Boarded For The First Time In Years.
New York, June 12.—(AP)—The buildings of Broadway were put in splints today lest they get their ribs cracked in the boisterous welcome to Charles Lindbergh. Beginning with the International Mercantile Marine building at the Battery and extending all the way up to City Hall, the windows of the financial district's buildings were boarded, fenced or wired against the impending crush of the young airman's admirers. The boarding of windows was the revival of an old election day custom which has fallen into disuse in recent quieter years. For no welcome celebration in many years has such a precaution been deemed necessary. But that it was necessary today was evidenced hours before the time for Lindy's arrival. The early morning saw Battery Place filling with patient watchers who crowded the sea wall to inspect sailly fogged harbor craft and ringed the aquarium to watch the far-hailing of hundreds of horse, motorcycle and foot police in the open space before the second precinct station house. The Stars and Stripes flew everywhere and buildings were hung with great streamers. In front of the public library at Fifth Avenue and 43 Street "the

cross roads of the world," green benches from Bryant Park were piled in two great heaps beside the guarding granite lions, watched over by police lest they be prompted by the uninitiated. Fifth Avenue, one of the world's greatest thoroughfares, had to some extent followed Broadway's lead in boarding windows, but the majority there trusted to the wider street and sidewalks to save their plate-glass from the crush. The score or so of buildings which were boarded were mostly those occupying by famous jewelers behind whose windows lay treasures to tempt a king. In the early morning the sky was overcast and a child breeze from the northwest swept the island, but toward eight o'clock blue sky appeared and a warming sun smiled over the city.

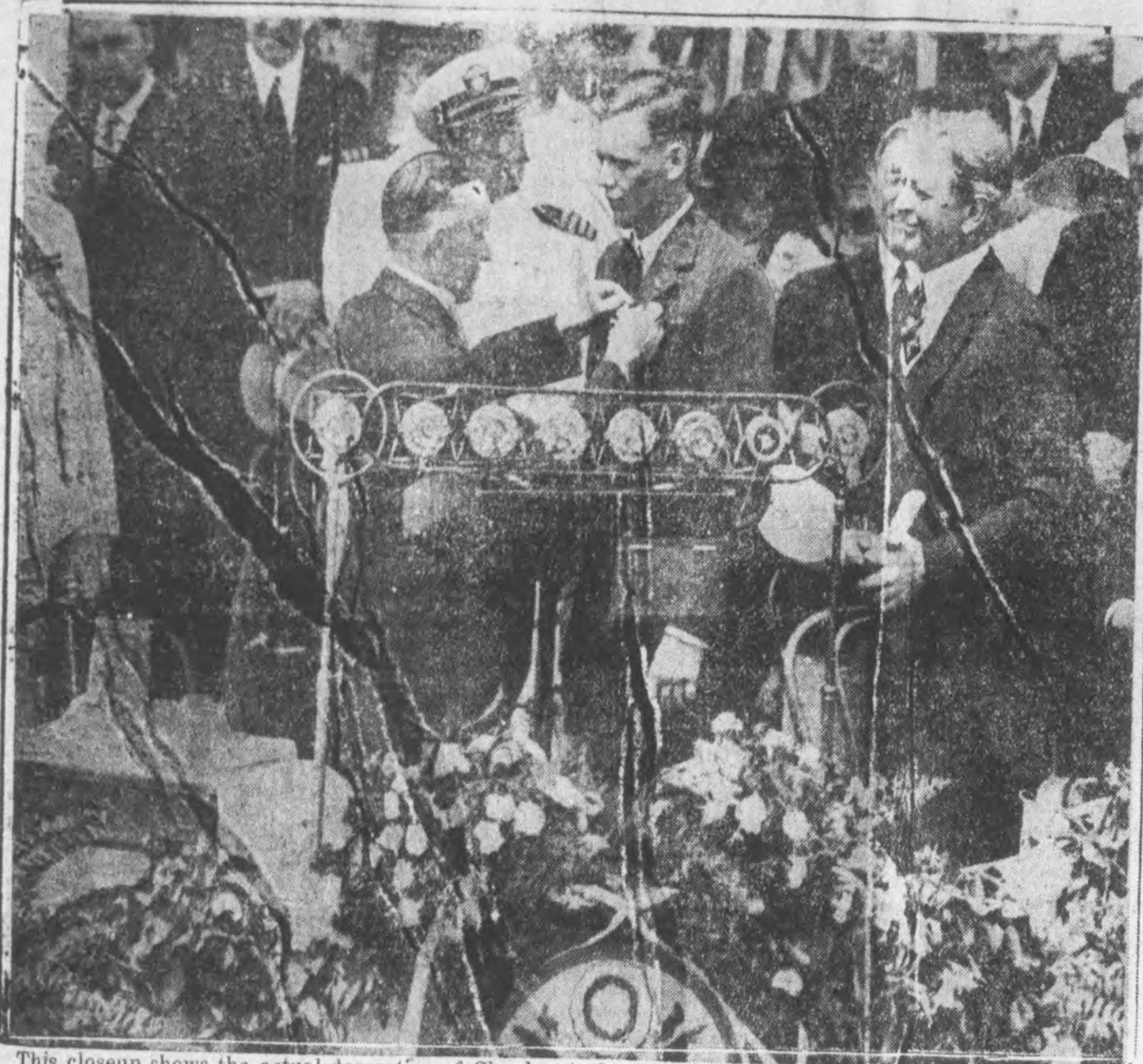

The constitution won't let Lindbergh run for President until he is thirty-five years old, and this nation forgets quickly. Ten years from now Lindbergh will be a part of the past, with Dewey, who sank the ships at Manila, and Eliot, who first flew across the English channel. You have to do something all the time to be remembered in this country. And Lindbergh intends to keep on doing it; if he can, promote American flying he will be content.

A genuine American beat that record was "Red Jacket," chief of the Seneca Indians, whose bronze statue stands in Buffalo's public park.

"Red Jacket," who taught the late Albert Brisbane as a boy to make bows and arrows in Batavia, N. Y., was called "Sa-Go-Ye-Wat-Ha" which means "He Keeps them Awake." He talked twenty-four hours without stopping to prevent a massacre of whites by Indians, and succeeded, which was fortunate for the people of Batavia and other little frontier settlements of that day.

"Sa-Go-Ye-What-Ha" died in 1860, proud of a silver medal that George Washington gave him. But people.

he never took to missionaries, saying to them, "If you killed your God, do not come here, to blame us Indians. We did not kill him. If he had come to us we would have treated him kindly."

The French know the wisdom of protecting industry, and proved it long ago. After French noblemen had ruined themselves in silks and velvets at the "fields of the cloth of gold," when Francis the First and Henry the eighth had their wrestling match, the French government said, "no silks, velvets or looking glasses shall be imported. If French noblemen want such things they must buy them from French workers." Because of that decision France today rules the world in silks, velvets and some other things.

Now France says to the horror of Great Britain "no coal shall be imported into France except by special permit. We shall use our own coal, including that recently taken from Germany."

Great Britain has been selling 10,000,000 tons of coal every year to France, and the French embargo threatens a new crisis for harassed Britain.

Expenses of our national government have been reduced to three thousand million dollars a year which means a cut of \$295,000,000 in four years. The government can cut as much more from its expenditures, in four years, by stopping foolish squandering of hundreds of millions, on battleships, coast defense guns and other out of date, wasteful targets for airmen. Lindbergh's return ought to make this government realize flying is in, and heavy, slow, battleship targets are out.

Thurston Moore Buried Yesterday

Thurston Moore, 63, highly esteemed colored man, died at his home near Staton's Mill, on the old Bethel highway, Saturday night. Funeral services were conducted yesterday afternoon. Moore was one of the few negro lawyers receiving licenses to practice in this part of the State. He practiced in Greenville some thirty years ago retiring sometime later at the farm near Staton's Mill.

He was a fine example of his race, being courteous and considerate at all times, and was held in high regard by numbers of white people.

Export Tobacco Co. Erects Addition To Mammoth Factory

Keeping step with progress of the Greenville tobacco market, the Export Tobacco Co., has erected a new addition to the factory building on 10th Street. The addition gives the Export people 6,200 extra feet of floor space, and will enable them to handle approximately a quarter of a million pounds of bright leaf daily.

The mammoth enterprise with

eight other factories puts Greenville in a position to handle from 60 to 75 million pounds of tobacco during the coming season. Export buyers this year will be A. E. Hobgood, D. E. Wells, J. E. Newton and W. S. Cleary.

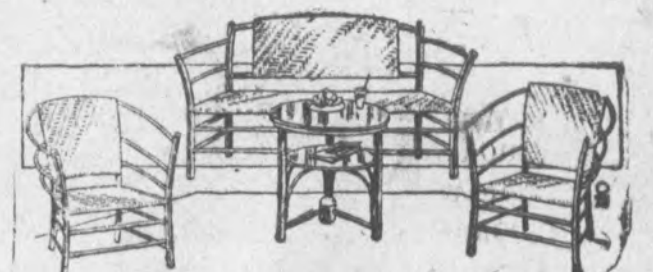
