BRITISH FLIERS FORCED DOWN AT MARTLESHAM, ENG

Martlesham, Eng., June 18-The British long distance fliers Lieuts. C. R. Carr and P. H MacWorth, who hopped off from Cranwell, Lincolnshire, at 12:41 o'clock this afternoon for a flight of India, were forced down at the Martlesham Heath airdrome this afternoon.

The aviators were forced to descend because of a minor defect, and despite the great load which their bombing plane car-ried for its long flight, landed successfully. The airmen were uninjured.

Martlesham is near Ipswich. which is about 100 miles from Cranwell.

Pilot Planes to San Francisco to Make Preliminary Tests.

Washington, June 18- (P)-The Army Air Corps is striving to be first in crossing the Pacific ocean between San Francisco and Honolulu in a non-stop flight.

After months of preparation, shrouded in secrecy two crack Army fliers are now piloting a giant trithe continent to San Diego, Cal., for final grooming and testing of the machine and navigation instruments for the hop. 




