ADDITIONAL ARRESTS AT MORGANTON

Suspects Taken off Trains and Held in Connection With Death of White Girl.

Morganton, N. C., June 24.—(AP)—Additional suspects having been taken off trains at noon today by members of the Hickory troops are being held in jail awaiting identification by Burke County officers. They have followed other clues out of town in the wide search being conducted for Broadus Miller, negro slayer of Gladys Kincaid.

Although no show of resentment has been evidenced against the two negroes being held, a detail of the two National Guard companies here has been stationed at the jail as a precautionary measure.

A call from Adako, near Table Rock in Burke County, about 12:30 o'clock today saying that a suspect had been seen in that section. Bloodhounds were taken to the scene of the Adako rumor.

The general opinion around Morganton today is that the mob anger has passed. Officials as well as spectators are expressing the expression that if the negro was captured tonight, he would not be killed unless he attempted to fight. But the grim and solemn manhunters have not laid aside their guns. A pistol bulges from the pocket of almost every member of the silent crowd and shotguns are to be seen on the floor of many parked automobiles.

The crisis of the search has passed, and many doubt that the negro will be captured. Pictures of him were reproduced by a local photographer yesterday and distributed all over the state. The search on the strength of these two negroes being held, have been released.

Morganton today is besieged by reporters and curiosity seekers. People must be shown that the child was killed and they must hear the wife of Policeman Wiseman tell of her conversation with Gladys a few minutes before the attack. And they must have a look at the iron pipe now stained with the girl's blood which Miller was seen carrying as he walked a few yards ahead of pretty little Gladys Kincaid.

Curiosity seekers are the ones who are increasing the mob today.

Printing Prices In Carolina Too High, Gov. Says

Raleigh, June 24.—(AP)—Costs of public printing items in many other states are much lower than those quoted by North Carolina printers in bids on the public printing for the next biennium, according to Governor McLean and Secretary of State Everett, who based their statement today on information recently received.

"On the basis of the information we have received the prices quoted in recent bids seem entirely unjustified," said Governor McLean. He said many other states get lower prices than North Carolina not only on compensation but on binding.

Meeting today, the state printing commission authorized the Department of Labor and Printing to go ahead with such printing as was immediately necessary pending the ultimate letting of contracts for the state's printing for the coming two-year period.

Two sets of bids on the state's printing have been received. The first was rejected.

Frank Grist, Commissioner of Labor and Printing, has not yet returned from a trip through several other states where he is inspecting methods of letting contracts for public printing.

INSURANCE IS ADJUSTED ON HIGH SCHOOL

Contract For Building To Replace Burned Structure To Be Awarded July 15th.

J. H. Rose, superintendent of city schools, stated this morning that insurance companies had made final adjustment of insurance covering the high school building destroyed by fire during the month of April. Settlement was made through a local insurance agency and involved the sum of \$55,000.

Along with the announcement came the statement that construction work on the new high school building would begin as soon as plans could be arranged. It is hoped to have the new structure ready for occupancy by January 1st, 1928. During the intervening time school work will be continued along the same lines adopted after the old building was wrecked by flames.

The bleak bare walls of the old high school, which have been the grounds of controversy between the insurance companies and school authorities, will be torn down as soon as contract can be awarded. Out of the ruins of the old building will rise a three-story fireproof brick structure of classical style architecture, whose lines will be the most beautiful of any public school building in the city.

The structure will cost between \$60,000 and \$65,000, according to present plans, and will contain a combination gymnasium and auditorium. This part of the structure will be furnished with movable furniture so that it may be used for almost any occasion.

A balcony will extend all around the auditorium, greatly increasing the seating capacity, and making it appropriate for virtually all kinds of civic gatherings.

STRESS NEED OF EXTENDING P. & N. SYSTEM

Further Facilities Believed Necessary by Witnesses in Charlotte Hearing

Charlotte, June 24.—(AP)—Presentation of the case of the Piedmont and Northern Railway, an electric line, seeking to obtain permission for extension of its lines, today was suspended and the Seaboard, one of the opponents of the extension, began presenting rebuttal evidence. The hearing here is being conducted by H. C. Davis, examiner of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Many witnesses for the Southern Railway, the Atlantic Coast Line and other trunk line railways opposing the extension also were in the courtroom.

Need for further transportation facilities in the Piedmont section of the Carolinas and the problems of financing the proposed extension of the Piedmont and Northern electric line were stressed in today's hearing before Interstate Commerce Commission examiner H. C. Davis.

W. S. Lee, president of the Southern Power Company, and the electric line which is seeking the right to extend its lines from Spartanburg to Gastonia and from Charlotte to Winston-Salem, was recalled and questioned about financing. He said that all agreements had been made to finance the extensions the cost of which will be about 15,000,000.

W. S. Creighton, of Charlotte, a freight traffic expert, asserted that the Piedmont sections of North and South Carolinas "are not adequately served by transportation facilities at present, as compared with the U. S. as a whole." Despite this handicap, he asserted, the Piedmont sections have become among the richest in the nation in per capita values of farm and factory products, he said.

Mr. Lee in testifying regarding the financing of the project which is to be financed according to previous testimony by sale of bonds and use of cash in the treasury of the railroad, said he "would take all they won't take" when asked if consideration had been given to forming a syndicate to handle any securities sought to present stockholders.

Mr. Lee said that the P. & N. is now negotiating with the Norfolk and Western for a physical connection at Winston-Salem but formal agreement has not yet been reached. Examiner Davis refused to admit into the record a document received from William Gibbs McAdoo, former head of the U. S. Railway Administration, who appeared early in the week for the Georgia and Florida. Attorneys for the electric line said that Mr. McAdoo had sent in the document when he found he could not return as he expected but attorneys for the Southern Railway protested that they would have no chance to cross-examine him.

The examiner, later, however, admitted as part of the evidence testimony taken by the Interstate Commerce Commission when the Georgia and Florida last December was permitted to build a connecting link from Augusta, Ga., to Greenwood S. C.

W. L. Thornton, of Wilson, traffic manager of the Carolina Shippers' Association, emphasized need of the Carolinas for the railway connections that will be made available if the electric line is completed. W. C. Wilkinson, sixth district highway commissioner, and W. D. McGinnis, mayor of Kings Mountain, both expressed the belief that the proposed extensions are necessary for the welfare of commerce and industry in the two States.

Mr. Creighton, who acted as official representative for Charlotte and the various local organizations presented an elaborate series of charts and statistical tables to show the population of an area of 100 miles radius from Charlotte.

PARIS FLIGHT AGAIN BLOCKED BY ELEMENTS

Storm Along St. Lawrence and New Foundland Fog Prevented Hop-off of Byrd.

Roosevelt Field, N. Y., June 24.—(AP)—Commander Richard E. Byrd said today that it was improbable that the America would take off on its trans-Atlantic flight either today or tomorrow.

Roosevelt Field, N. Y., June 24.—(AP)—The monoplane America, a great grey moth with dipping wings, was lashed down on its runway today, its hope of flight to Paris blocked for still another day by the weather man's decree.

Until after midnight preparations went forward for a take-off in the dawn. For two hours gasoline was poured into the great tanks, until almost half of the full load of 1,300 gallons was aboard.

Thousands stood about through the hours or dozed in automobiles that they might have the thrill of seeing the great ship take the air on its high adventure.

Then James H. Kimball, weather bureau meteorologist, raised a hand in signal to halt.

There was a storm he said, pivoting on the St. Lawrence Bay, extending over the lake region, and crossing the America's path. Fog was thick along the air route to New Foundland and extending out to sea.

The flight must not be made Friday, Kimball said, "and Saturday is too far off to predict about."

But Byrd still had enough optimism left to refuse to order the ship to its hangar.

"Batten it down," he ordered "cover the engines with tarpaulins and we'll be ready Saturday morning if we get the breaks then. We've got to get them some time."

The first protest that the crew of unfavorable weather was still on the job came shortly before 10 o'clock when a 35 mile gale lashed the field with rain.

News of the postponement spread slowly among the spectators and an hour later hundreds still slept blissfully in their automobiles.

Noville made a name for himself as a naval aviator during the World War. He served for a time on the Italian front and won a decoration from the Italian government. After serving for a time as superintendent of the United States air mail, he was appointed the government's representative at aircraft factories where service planes were under construction.

Noville was born in Cleveland April 24, 1890. He, Byrd and Acosta are married men.

Truly American Crew Of Byrd Plane To Carry Cup Of Brew From Melting Pot

New York, June 24.—(H.N. Exclusive)—The crew of Commander Richard E. Byrd's trans-oceanic plane, "America," is truly typical of America in that it represents not one type but is composed of men of several of the many races that have fused in this country into one great nation.

Byrd is a Virginian of the most aristocratic "P. F. V." ancestry. He is fair and soft-spoken.

Acosta is of Spanish descent, tall and dark-skinned. He comes from California.

Bernt Balchen was born in Norway and only recently took out American naturalization papers.

Noville is of the Mid-west, of English descent. He is of the nervous, thinking type.

Thus the four members of the crew typify the spirit of America and represent all sections of the country and its medley of types and races.

Commander Byrd is, of course, the best known of the quartet. He hurried into world-wide fame by piloting a plane across the North Pole, with Floyd Bennett as his sole companion. That was on May 6, 1926. For this unique achievement he received the Congressional Medal of Honor.

Byrd is the type greatly admired by women. He is tall, well built, with dark brown, curly hair and blue eyes. He was born in Winchester, Va., October 25, 1888. A brother, Harry, is Governor of Virginia. Acosta is also well known to laymen. He holds an endurance and distance record from Omaha, Neb., to Philadelphia, Pa., a distance of 1,220 miles, of 11 hours and 23 minutes. His co-holder with Clarence Chamberlin of the world's endurance record of 51 hours, 11 minutes, made over New York last April. He was also holder of the American altitude of 22,500 feet, which he made without oxygen, at Dayton, Ohio.

Acosta was born January 1, 1895 in San Diego, Calif. His dark skin and coal black hair proclaim his Spanish ancestry. He began flying in 1910 and quickly became a notable pilot.

Balchen is the youngest of the party, being only twenty-seven. He met Byrd last year at Spitzbergen where he had been sent by the Norwegian government to assist Amundsen in preparing for his trip across the top of the world in the Norge airship. The two became friends and Balchen helped prepare the Byrd plane for his polar conquest. He followed Byrd back to the United States and became a test pilot. His status on the trans-oceanic flight is that of passenger, but he is an invaluable member of the party, capable of acting as pilot, observer, cook or navigator.

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AUTHORIZES FLIGHT OVER THE PACIFIC

Secretary Davis Gives Approval to Plans Of Army Air Corps To Fly to Hawaii.

Washington, June 24.—(AP)—A San Francisco to Hawaii non-stop flight by the army air corps was authorized by Secretary Davis.

The 2,407 mile hop will be attempted by Lieuts. Lester J. Maitland and Albert F. Hegenberger now at San Diego with the three motored Fokker, especially equipped for the trip. The time of departure has not yet been selected but is expected to be some time in July.

Secretary Davis sanctioned the flight after a conference with Assistant Secretary Davison, in charge of air corps activities, who reported that final tests conducted by the two pilots at San Diego had been satisfactory.

Present plans are that the flight will start from the airport near Oakland, where a special runway is now being constructed. Major General Patrick, chief of the army air corps is en route to San Francisco where upon his arrival next Sunday he will make a final check up of navigation tests being given the plane.

Woman Charged With Murder Of Her Husband

Greenville, S. C., June 24.—(AP)—Mrs. Ethel Willis, widow of the slain sheriff Sam D. Willis, who was placed under technical arrest at her home last yesterday charged with murder in connection with her husband's death, was removed at 8:40 o'clock this morning to the county jail.

Members of the fair who followed the officers and prisoner to the jail, remained at the prison saying they were awaiting the granting of bond.

Mrs. Willis late yesterday was made co-defendant with Henry S. Townsend, a deputy under sheriff Willis who was arrested June 19 on a murder charge and taken to the state penitentiary.

Two deputies kept guard throughout the night at the Willis home, officers deciding not to transfer the prisoner to the jail at the time because of the lateness of the hour and because of the prisoner's four young daughters, the oldest of whom is 11.

Morehead City, N. C., June 24.—(AP)—Opening dates of the tobacco markets are decided upon by the sales committee of the Tobacco Association of the United States as follows:

Georgia, August 2; South Carolina and North Carolina, border August 9; Eastern Carolina on September 6; old belt, Oct. 4; Virginia Nov. 1.

The annual banquet and meeting with appointment of standing committees and election of officers was set for tonight. This morning's cruise was planned for those of the 450 tobaccoists as wanted to go on the cutter Pamlico.

Reports were made that the tobacco crop in Eastern Carolina would be the finest that has been produced in years.

UNITED STATES STILL OPPOSES BRITISH PLAN

Viewpoint of Americans at Geneva Conference Not Changed by Proposals.

Geneva, June 24.—(AP)—Great Britain will accept parity with the United States in the matter of 10,000 ton cruisers, W. C. Bridgeman, First Lord of the Admiralty, said this afternoon. The question of parity on other cruisers was still under discussion, he added.

If the British project is agreed to, the 10,000 ton category would disappear when the time comes for replacement of the vessels, and the maximum of all would then be 7,500 tons.

Geneva, Switzerland, June 24.—(AP)—The American delegates to the tripartite naval limitation conference continue absolutely opposed to the British suggestion for discussion during the present meeting of the agreement reached at the Washington naval conference in 1922.

Notwithstanding arguments by some of Great Britain's ablest statesmen, the Americans have not been shaken from their feeling that in convolving the present meeting President Coolidge sought an extension to auxiliary war vessels of the principles established by the Washington conference as regard capital ships. It was declared by Hugh S. Gibson, chief American delegate, that while this did not preclude consideration of other questions, he thought the time to take up these questions was at the 1931 conference, as called for by the Washington treaty.

Reiteration that the reduction in the size of warships, outlined by the British proposals, would mean not only a saving for the taxpayer, but would signify a definite move toward outlawing wars, a British spokesman said that Great Britain from the very nature of her acceptance of President Coolidge's invitation, had a right to re-open the Washington decisions. The spokesman recalled that the acceptance said that the British government was "prepared to consider to what extent the principles adopted at Washington can be carried further regarding the ratio in different classes of ships between various powers, or in any other important ways."

Doubts were expressed by this spokesman that the United States would be able to give convincing reasons as to why it was necessary to have a cruiser strength equal to that of Great Britain. As for the claim that cruisers would be needed to protect trade routes, he declared it "was generally recognized that a considerable portion of the American trade was done by means of British vessels. This he added, also was true of Japan."

Convocation of an executive committee meeting for today raised hopes that some progress would be made, however slight, toward coordination of the American, British and Japanese thesis introduced at Monday's opening session, as a consequence of private conversations among the chief delegates, Mr. Gibson, however, said that all the delegations were "still feeling their way."

WOOD RESTS AT SUMMER WHITE HOUSE

Report of Conditions In Philippine Island Placed in Hands of The President.

Rapid City, S. D., June 24.—(AP)—With a report on conditions in the Philippines in the hands of President Coolidge, Governor-General Leonard Wood of the islands, rested at the summer White House today from his long trip which plainly had affected him.

A series of accidents before leaving Manila and on the ocean trip to his continent had undermined the General's usual robust constitution, and when he arrived at Ouster, S. D., he had to be assisted to the automobile which brought him to the State game lodge.

After a long conference with the President, General Wood, was invited to remain overnight and he cancelled a previous decision to re-board his special car for the trip to Washington so as to be able to take advantage of the bracing mountain air in this locality and a good rest before resuming his journey.

There was no comment on the Governor General's visit either from himself or from the White House. Members of his party declared Mr. Wood expected to return to his post in September. Although General Wood seemed extremely tired and worn from his long trip augmented by pain from his injuries, his physician, Captain Lindsay Fletcher, who also made the trip from Manila, said the General was in good physical condition.

Negro Dies In Chair For Murder Of White Girl

Little Rock, Ark., June 24.—(AP)—Calm and smiling Lonnie Dixon, negro, was executed in the electric chair at the State penitentiary at 5 a. m. today on his 18th birthday, for the murder last April of 12-year-old Mollie McDonald, a white girl, in the belly of the fashionable First Presbyterian Church here. His last words were "I am guilty."

Two hours before he went to his death Dixon made a complete confession to Carl E. Bailey, deputy prosecuting attorney, that he alone committed the crime, thus exonerating another negro youth whom he previously had maintained murdered the girl.

A company of the Arkansas National Guard parolled the grounds around the penitentiary throughout the night and during the execution. In his last confession, Dixon related at length how on the afternoon of April 11 he and the McDonald child into the church where his father was janitor; up the step ladder to the towering belfry and there assaulted and then murdered her with a brick.

COTTON ACREAGE IS OUT ONLY TEN PER CENT

Raleigh, June 24.—(AP)—Cotton acreage reduction in the state will hardly amount to more than 14 per cent, U. B. Black, general manager of the State Cotton Growers' Cooperative Association believes.

He rested on this statement today following an inspection of about half of the principal cotton growing counties in the state. He said he believed the corn crop this year about the best he had ever seen.

His cotton reduction prediction was similar to that made by the State Department of Agriculture and by big cotton house surveys in the north.

GEHRIG GETS THREE HOMERS OFF BOSTON

A home run race that looked to be all over but the shouting for this season at last blossomed forth again today as a ding-dong battle that probably will carry right through the stretch of the American League campaign.

Just as Lou Gehrig, larruing Yankee first baseman appeared to have lost the knack of clouting to the distant bleachers, the Columbia youngsters smashed three homers against the Boston Red Sox yesterday to run his count to 21 for the season. Babe Ruth, king of all distance wall-poppers, leads Lou by only three round trips.

The Yankees won the ball game 11 to 4, snaring their fifth victory of the three day series and ninth consecutive conquest. The steady drummer of Yankee hits, riddled two Boston twirlers and showed the Yankees' winning percentage to 721 in the 6 games played.

Gehrig's homers boosted the New York team total to 67 to date. His feat fell just one shy of the Major League record for four, held jointly by Bob Lowe and Ed Delahanty. Connie Mack's Athletics stuck to the hunt, climbing into second place with a 4-1 victory over Washington, while Chicago fell back under a 11-inning 6 to 5 defeat by Detroit.

Charley Willis, young Philadelphia southpaw, had little trouble after the first inning. Al Simmons tenth homer helped.

A Tiger triple play in the third inning featured the Detroit win.

Rain halted the Cleveland-St. Louis fray in the sixth inning but not before the Indians had piled up a 7 to 2 advantage. Cleveland belted Vanelder roundly for six runs in the third.

The St. Louis Cardinals took advantage of Pittsburgh's idleness to gain a half game on the National League pace-makers with a neat 4 to 3 win over Cincinnati. Timely hitting in the pinches was responsible.

FARM NOTES

E. Y. Floyd, extension tobacco specialist, and county agent E. P. Arnold invite the farmers of Pitt county to meet them at the Cox farm, owned by R. C. Cannon & Son, about ten miles east of Ayden, July 1st, at 1 p. m. If you do not know the way to this farm go to R. C. Cannon's store at Ayden for directions.

A demonstration in the use of fertilizer on tobacco is being conducted on this farm along with a varied test in which Cash Tobacco is being tested along with local varieties. A demonstration in the ridge method of cultivating tobacco will also be given at this time. It is worth while to use the right variety, have the proper fertilizer, and to cultivate properly. You may be awfully busy, but you may get information at this meeting that will enable you to turn a loss into profit next year.

Mr. Arnold stated yesterday that the yellow cast showing up in tobacco fields indicated that the nitrogen in the fertilizer used, was not properly balanced, and he is anxious to have the farmer come and see the effects of a properly balanced fertilizer which was used in this demonstration.

It is hoped that farmers from all over Pitt county will attend this demonstration since it is perhaps one of the most important pieces of extension work to be conducted in Pitt county this year in connection with the production of quality tobacco. Last year farmers in and around New Bern increased their yield \$125.00 per acre by the use of the Cash variety alone. We can afford, says county agent Arnold, to put all the labor we do on tobacco, and then use an inferior plant with fertilizer that does not get a maximum yield and cultivate in a way that does not get best results. We are asking the farmers to use their heads. It will not cost a penny more to use the best variety to properly balance the fertilizer and to cultivate with the ridge method which is the best, so stop work for a few minutes July 1st at 1 p. m. and run over to the Cox farm and think the proposition over for a few minutes. It will make you more than several weeks' plowing. Exchange ideas with your neighbor, if you can't get any ideas from him you ought to be good giving a few which after all would make your trip worth while. We are looking for you, so come on.

Rural Mail Boxes Should Be Grouped At Cross Roads
The Postoffice Department of the United States is making an effort to effect a systematic grouping of mail boxes along rural routes of the country, according to H. R. Munford, local postmaster. Advertisers' matter containing pictures of the old plan of arranging boxes and the plan as sponsored by the department have been sent out to the hundreds of rural carriers with the request that they use every influence in getting the rural population to co-operate with them. The new plan provides for the grouping of boxes at cross roads. It is suggested that a board erected on posts firmly planted, so that the height of the shelf upon which the boxes rest may be about four feet above the surface of the ground. The movement is in keeping with efforts of civic organizations endeavoring to eliminate unsightly billboards and preserve the natural beauty of the countryside.

POTATO SHIPMENTS PASS 6,000 CARLOT MARK
Raleigh, June 24.—(AP)—The lowly spud went over the top yesterday, when shipments for North Carolina passed the 6,000 carlot mark, the State Dept. of Agriculture announced today. Indications were that before the season ends, last year's 6,700 carlot record will be smashed. Dry weather failed to cut the crop below the estimate made early in the season when it was predicted that shipments would reach the 6,000 mark. Prices have been exceptionally good this season and the net sum received by the producers is expected to materially exceed that realized last year. This year's crop will bring easily seven million dollars, it is estimated.

Declaring that an entire community should not be judged by the bad actions of a few individuals and that the good in practically every instance outweighs the bad a hundred fold, the News and Observer takes yesterday's issue as a fair record of the age in which there are many who would have us believe the world is going to the bow wows.

Under the editorial heading: "What's the Matter With Us?" the Observer says:

"Yesterday's News and Observer was an average number—a map of busy life. And yet no one could read it without laying it down with a sad reflection that there is a long road a-winding before we can claim to have a State that is wholly civilized. Here were some of the stories that must give pause:

"1. Thousands of Burks county people, heavily armed, were spending night and day surrounding the woods supposed to be protecting a Negro, who had murdered a 15-year-old girl in Morganton.

"2. Ghouls in Rowan county had opened the grave of a woman buried the previous day, taken her body from the coffin, and replaced it face down on top of the coffin—a deed as inexplicable as ghoulish.

"3. An Asheville business man of prominence in ill health was found dead with a self-inflicted fatal wound, the suicide shocking the community.

"4. The gruesome story was told of a young Caldwell county boy using his rifle to kill his step-father.

believed to be guilty of beating his wife, the mother of the boy.

"5. A Raleigh Negro was sent to the roads on the charge of "assault on a female."

"That is the record on the bad side of the news that filled 18 pages, but these stories filled less than five of the 146 columns. The good side the progressive deeds, the problems of betterment, the stories of happy marriages, and efforts to make a better world, together with business announcements—all for good things—filled the other 141 columns. It is therefore, error to reach the conclusion that all the world is hastening to the bad because of five crimes and ghoulish actions.

"It is probable that the paper yesterday was a true picture of what transpires daily in North Carolina—much that is wholesome and good, marred by enough of evil and wrong to stimulate religious and other leaders to new zeal and to new effort to eradicate crime.

"There is much of wrongdoing—that is the matter

with us. But that there is many times as much of honest labor, of earnest evangelism, of wise development, of happiness and usefulness. It should be remembered, in trying to appraise the ratio between good and evil, that as a rule there is no news in the life of men and women who lead correct lives. It has been said that a woman's name rarely appears in a paper except when she marries or dies. To that old saying should be added her activities for social, civic and religious purposes. The same is true of the average private citizens. It is these who do the work of the world, maintain its standards, and by whose lives it should be judged. A thousand married couples maintain happy homes with never a news item to tell the story of a well-ordered couple. Then let one wife go wrong and get into the courts. It becomes news and is broadcasted with the result that many people judge the community by one incident rather than the beautiful thousand homes where peace and contentment abide."

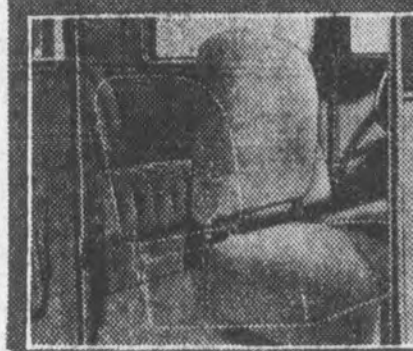
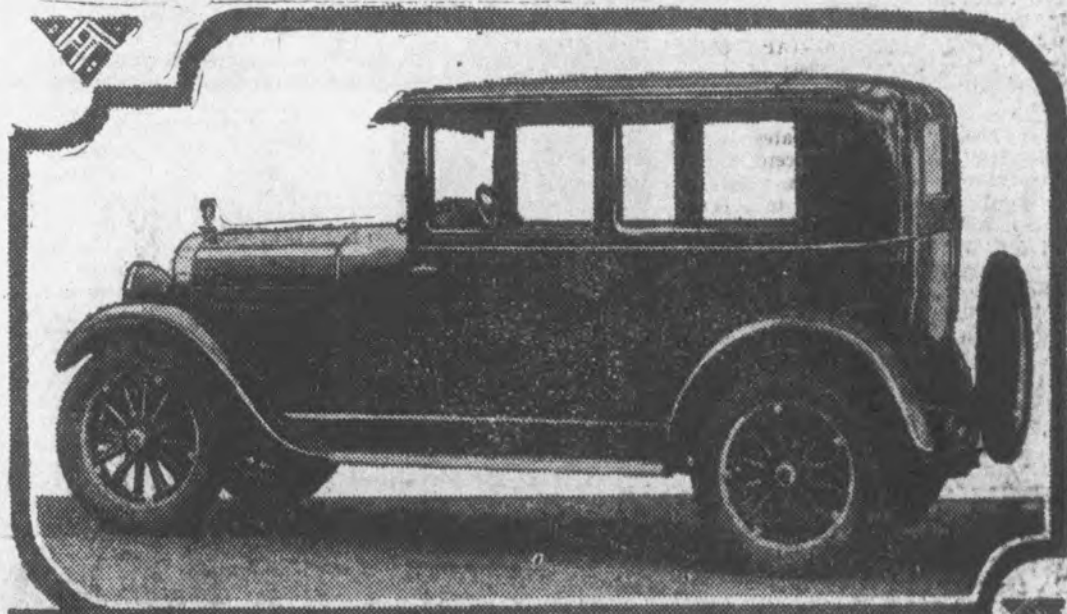

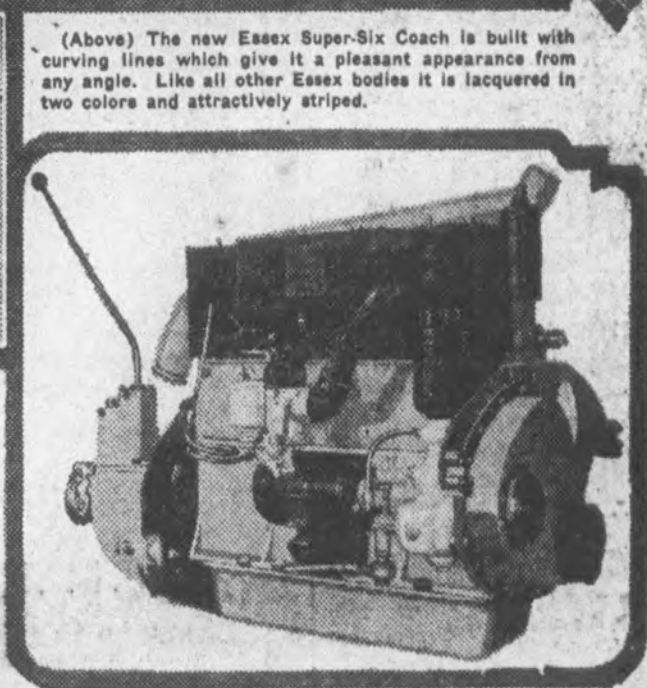

London.—(INS)—Major H. O. D. Segrave holder of the world's speed record of 207 miles an hour, has definitely decided to rest on his laurels and retire from automobile racing. To this end he has tendered his resignation to the Sunbeam Automobile Company, the makers of the car with which he made new records at Daytona Beach, Florida, and intends to go in for a business and widely dissociated from motor racing as the poles.

"I have won every big race in Europe; I have fulfilled my ambition to be the first man to travel more than 200 miles an hour—what more can I do in speed motoring?" said Segrave in announcing his final decision. Under the terms of his contract with his new employers, Segrave will have two months a year free to devote to his new hobby of motor-boat racing, in which he has great ambitions.

"Even for stout old prima donnas, who after all are not built for speed, there comes the right time to make their bow and retire," added Segrave. "It is the same in my case. I have never driven better than I am driving today, but the next step is 250 miles an hour, and I should say that is a long way off. I am just as likely to kill myself doing something unimportant. I have had a great deal of luck."

"I feel I have done all I can expect of myself at high speeds. Some trifling mistake might get me killed, so I have decided to go into business. Most of the big racing drivers that I used to look up to when I started have been killed."

Nobody is better pleased at his decision to retire than his wife.

CROWDS JAM COURT ROOM IN ASHEVILLE

Prosecution Ready to Spring Series of Surprises in Montague Case.

Asheville, June 24.—(AP)—The second day of the trial of Mrs. Anna K. Montague, 45-year-old practical nurse, charged with murdering her employer, Mrs. Mary R. Cooper, opened today with the prosecution prepared to spring a series of surprises with which it hopes to strengthen the net of circumstantial evidence in which it is attempting to entangle Mrs. Montague.

As on the first day of the trial the courtroom was jammed with curious spectators. These were more of them if anything than yesterday. They choked the aisles, pressed into the bar around the judge's stand and swarmed in at the windows of the courtroom, in an effort to obtain a glimpse of the accused woman as she was brought into the courtroom at 9:30 o'clock.

A crumpled pile of bloodstained under clothing, found in the trunk of Mrs. Montague shortly after Mrs. Cooper's death, will represent the State's principal stronghold today so far as it has failed in any substantial way to connect Mrs. Montague with the slaying.

The State so far has merely established the fact that Mrs. Cooper was murdered the night of May 9 and she arrived at her home at 9:30 o'clock. Mrs. Montague, it was testified, was frantic with excitement the morning the body was found.

As court opened this morning Judge Thomas J. Sclaw of Greensboro, who is presiding, gave orders to the court to arrest any spectator who created any disturbance at all so that the trial might be brought speedily to an end. The State is expected to rest its case early this afternoon.

Walter S. Adams, city editor of the Times, was the first witness called to the stand this morning by the State. He was quizzed at great length about his investigations into Mrs. Cooper's mysterious death and his conversations with Mrs. Montague, after the tragedy before and after Mrs. Montague's arrest.

It was Adams' investigation into the crime after the burial of Mrs. Cooper which resulted in the exhumation of the body and the eventual arrest of Mrs. Montague.

The solicitor exhibited an iron pipe, blood stained to which a white hair was attached and asked the witness what he knew about it. Adams testified he found the pipe on the lawn of the Cooper home that blood stains were on it and also the white hair.

"What did Mrs. Montague say to you about the suicide theory, the razor blade and what took place in your interview with her?" asked the solicitor.

"After the razor blade was found under the Cooper kitchen balcony I interviewed Mrs. Montague at length on the suicide theory," said Adams. "She conducted me to the kitchen balcony in the rear of the house and pointed below where the razor blade was found. She said she was convinced that Mrs. Cooper cut her throat with that razor blade on the balcony and had then run out of the house, down the embankment in the yard and fallen over the barbed wire fence. She said she had found a bloody sack of onions near the body and that the sack had been on the ice box on the balcony."

The solicitor then asked Adams what Mrs. Montague told him about the razor blade to which Adams said Mrs. Montague said it "seemed strange that the razor blade was clean and showed no traces of blood."

Mrs. Montague immediately explained that she had thrown lots of dish water out of the balcony on the place where the blade was found and that this water could be washed off.

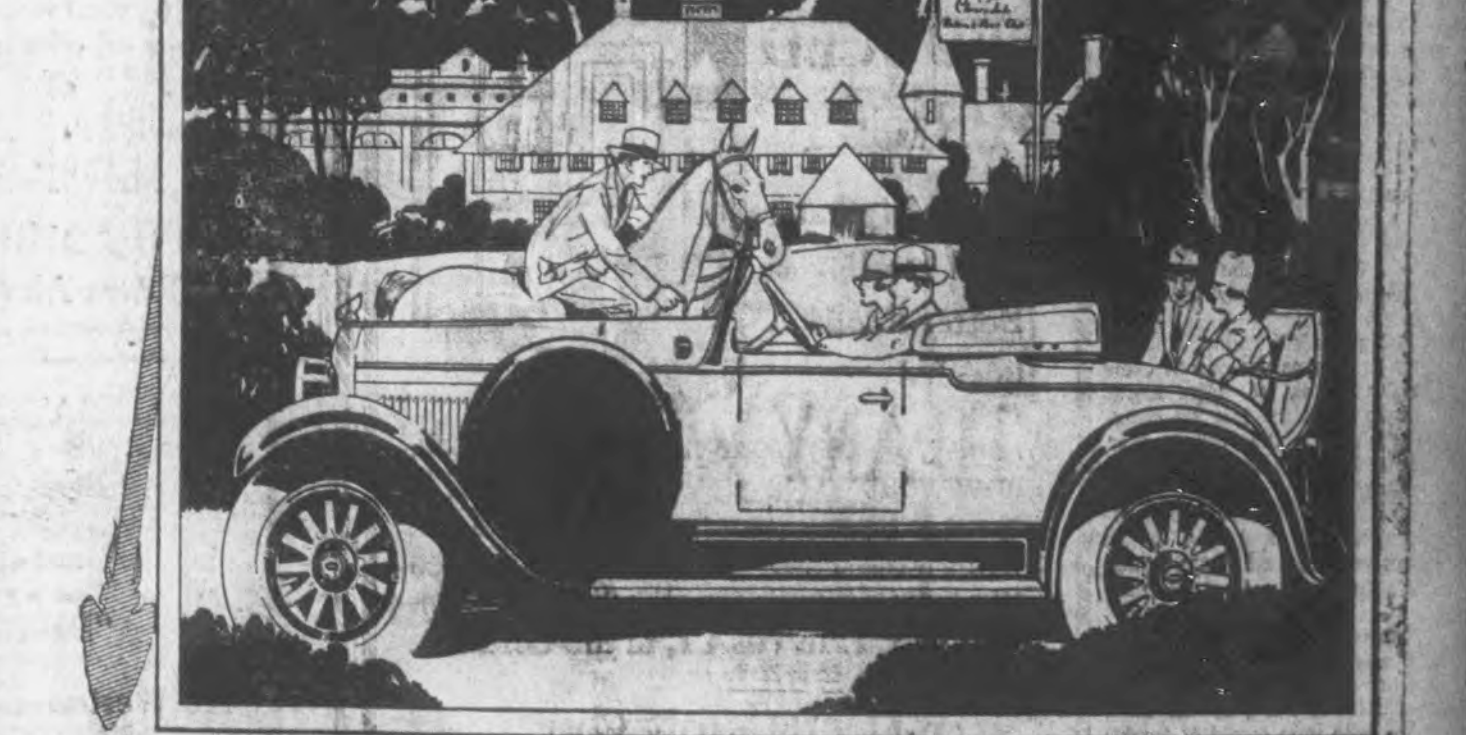

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population

Chicago. — (Ins.)—Some folks never bathe or even wash their clothes.

Indeed there are individuals, who instead of soaping their garments, soak them in grease and in doing so become regarded as quite fashionable.

These strange people are found among the tribesmen of Madagascar and their bizarre modes of life have just been made known on a report from Dr. Ralph Linton, assistant curator of Oceanic and Malayan Ethnology of the Field Museum, Chicago.

Dr. Linton is leader of the Captain Marshall Field Madagascar expedition, now in the field, and his latest report discloses, according to museum officials here, that he has obtained many valuable anthropological specimens, as well as ethnological data which may revolutionize theories concerning the history of the races of Madagascar.

While sojourning with the Antandroy and Mahafaly tribesmen, Dr. Linton discovered these strange people neither bathe or wash their clothes and follow the curious custom of soaking their attire in grease. They sleep on carved wooden pillows.

The Antandroy tribesmen use signal drums and have an elaborate drum language, Dr. Linton reported.

Another tribe, the Antifasians, are head hunters, the Chicago scientist learned.

Dr. Linton gained the confidence of the chiefs of the Sakalava to such an extent they permitted him to take part in their sacred annual ceremony of cleaning the tombs of their kings. He is believed to be the first white person to participate in this ritual and the second white person to witness it.

The tomb cleaning took place at Mahabo, one of the three sacred places of the Sakalava. There are kept the sacred ritual drums and other objects used in the rituals of the tribesmen.

Traders are not in style among the Sakalava and Dr. Linton was forced to dress up in native loin cloth. He was not even permitted to wear shoes during the ceremony. Another adventure of the Chicago man was the encountering of a man-eating crocodile between the villages of Marovasy and Mahabo in the Betaloka delta.

This region is in the midst of tidal swamps and extremely unhealthy, Dr. Linton reported. "I was amazed at the number and viciousness of the crocodiles in this region. They are so bad that the women always get their water with a dipper on the end of a ten-foot pole. It is unsafe to ford even small streams to go out of houses near the river at night unless you carry a light. While I was at Mahabo a crocodile came up and stole my host's dog from in front of the house. We heard the noise, but the crocodile got away before we could get out."

"During a night canoe trip, one nearly as long as my dugout came alongside of it, so close I was afraid to shoot for fear its struggles would turn the canoe over. Fortunately, it passed on without attacking."

New information about weird religious practices and the native wizards was obtained by Dr. Linton among the Sianaka on Lake Alaotra.

"Unfortunately, my best informant was suspected of poisoning me when I had a sharp attack of fever and was killed by the other natives, who were afraid of trouble with the government," Dr. Linton stated.

Westbrook Park Opens Tomorrow

A portion of the Westbrook estate in the southern part of this city has been converted into an amusement park, and will be formally opened to the public tomorrow afternoon, according to announcement made this morning by Mrs. J. L. Westbrook. The park will be known as the "Westbrook Jewel Box."

One of the main features of the park at the present time is a 6,000 gallon swimming pool, covering a space of 61-33 feet. The pool is twelve feet deep at the deepest part, and is fed by a spring of water at the rate of 75 to 100 gallons per minute. This insures fresh water at all times, and is quite an improvement over the ordinary type pool.

Other features are lunch and drink stands, bath houses and dance pavilion. The owners at present time are making arrangements for a series of dances to be given at regular intervals, and definite announcement concerning same will be made at a later date.

In a recent announcement Mrs. Westbrook stated that the absence of a swimming pool and recreation park in Greenville had prompted her to open up this part of her estate as a public park. A nominal charge will be made for the various attractions.

Entrance to the park has been provided on 14th street.

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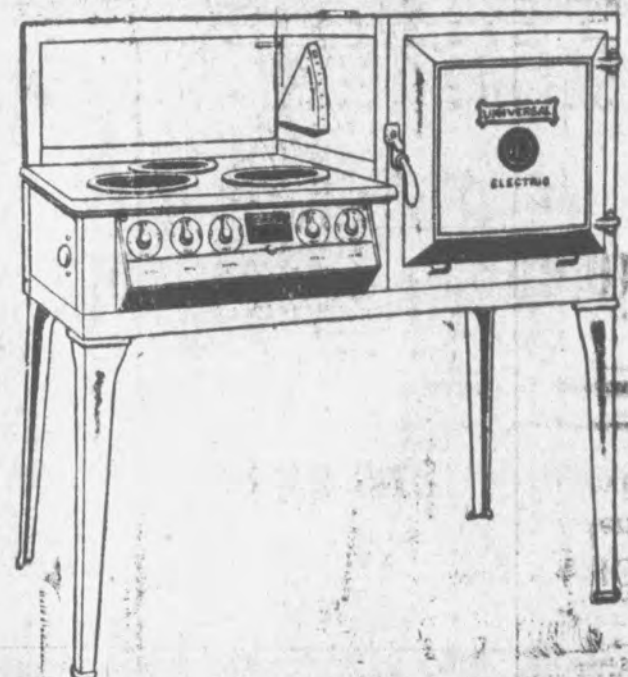
