AIRMEN WINGING WAY ACROSS PACIFIC

TWO ARMY FLIERS HOPPED
OFF THIS MORNING FOR NON
STOP FLIGHT TO HONOLULU

Civilian Plane That Was to Have Raced Army Airman to Hawaii Delayed in Hop Off.

Municipal Airport, Oakland, Cal. June 28.—(AP)—While mechanics worked at top speed to install a new windshield on the civilian monoplane piloted by Ernest L. Smith, the Army flier that took off from this field at 7:09 a. m. today, was last reported at 10:25 a. m. 300 miles out from San Francisco, speeding approximately 100 miles an hour toward Honolulu on its non-stop flight attempt.

Smith took off from this field at 9:36 a. m. with the announcement that he expected to overtake the Army plane but was forced to turn back ten minutes later because wind pressure broke a mica shield designed to protect him from wind. He landed safely despite his heavy load of 370 gallons of gasoline and Army and civilian mechanics immediately started work to replace the windshield with one loaned from an Army plane on the field. It was too large, however, and there was further delay while it was cut to fit.

San Francisco, June 28.—(AP)—The naval radio reported at 10:25 a. m. today, that the Army radio service had communicated with the Army flier that left the Oakland municipal airport at 7:09 a. m. for Honolulu. The Army plane was 300 miles off the coast at that time. The flier passed over the steamer American Legion 108 miles out.

San Francisco, June 28.—(AP)—After hopping off from the Oakland municipal airport at 7:09 a. m., without effort or much ceremony, the giant Army flier piloted by Lieut. Albert Hagenberger and Lieut. Lester J. Maitland, passed through the Golden Gate at 7:20 a. m. and swung out over the Pacific towards its goal—Honolulu.

As the big Army plane passed through the Golden Gate and opposite Land's End, the most western point on the San Francisco coast line, it was 2,000 feet in the air. The steamer Matsonia, coming in from Honolulu, the destination of the airplane, blew its whistle in one long blast, bidding the aviator good-bye.

The plane started down the runway raising such a great cloud of dust that the spectators could not see the machine.

The screams of several women could be heard amidst the cheers of the spectators. They feared the huge machine might not leave the ground successfully.

Seconds that seemed minutes elapsed before the drab colored wings of the Army plane were seen to emerge from the cloud of dust. "They're off! They're in the air!" shouted the crowd, and another cheer arose from civilians and Army men.

Overhead, circling and swinging about the field were several Army (Continued on page six)

Rush For Auto
License Begins

Raleigh, June 28.—(AP)—Scores of automobile owners stood in line before the windows of the automobile license bureau in the revenue building here today as North Carolina's annual automobile license "rush" started a day or two earlier than usual following the announcement of Revenue Commissioner R. A. Doughton that no extension would be allowed.

Two hundred thousand licenses had been sold by noon today since June 1, Sprague Silver, chief of the motor vehicle department estimated. Mr. Silver today was dictating letters to police chiefs and sheriffs throughout North Carolina requesting them to arrest persons operating automobiles with old licenses after June 30.

P. & N. HEARING
MAY BE ENDED
ON TOMORROW

Night Session Will be Held Tonight to Complete Case if Found Necessary.

Charlotte, June 28.—(AP)—Prospects that the Piedmont and Northern hearing, in session here all of last week, would be ended tomorrow, were seen as the morning session opened here today.

Examiner H. C. Davis of the Interstate Commerce Commission had announced that he would hold night session tonight if necessary and Carl W. Davis of Wilmington, an executive of the Atlantic Coast Line, announced that he would require less than a half day to present witnesses for the lines he represented. The Wilmington man represents besides the Coast Line, the Louisville and Nashville Railroad and the Carolina, Clinchfield and Ohio.

Lincoln C. Green of Washington traffic expert for the Southern Railway, continued on the stand today. Mr. Green recognized as one of the foremost traffic experts in the country told the examiner that he regarded "duplication of railway facilities as unsound" economies because it "takes away from existing roads the available traffic without creating new traffic. He said that crippled transport service might result.

"Adequate and expeditious transportation," he said, is the first interest of the shipping public. He referred to the relationship of cheap transportation and railway earnings powers and the federal government's guarantee of a return of five and three-quarters per cent per annum on the invested capital of a common carrier.

These relationships, he said, emphasize the public interest in avoiding possibilities of crippling existing roads.

Picture Of Negro
Slayer is Still
Causing Concern

Morganton, June 28.—(AP)—Following a report from Hickory that the picture of the alleged slayer of Gladys Kincaid, which was sent out by the sheriff of Burke county was a photo of Gene Martin and not of Broadus Miller, there has been an effort here to check the likeness.

Broadus Miller's wife was shown the picture and she said it was her husband but was not a good picture of him. Deputy Sheriff C. R. Culbertson, who knows Miller, said that the picture sent out by the sheriff's department was of Miller and was not a picture of Martin.

Several persons in Morganton who know Gene Martin said that the negroes, Martin and Miller, look very much alike but the contention is strong that the photograph is one of Miller.

Yesterday a story came out of Hickory saying that a dozen negroes in that section took one look at the picture and said it was Martin. One Hickory negro was quoted as saying that Martin is tall and Miller is short.

The opinion was current for a while that Miller and Martin were the same person but a good many have arisen now to say they know both of the men. Some say they look alike and some say they do not.

However, the sheriff's department is not considering the conflicting rumors seriously because a deputy said, "we know that we are after Broadus Miller and we know that the picture sent out is a picture of Broadus Miller, Gene Martin and the others to the contrary notwithstanding."

Rotarians and Kiwanians
Now Lined Up Solidly For
Municipal Swimming Pool

The combined bodies of the Greenville Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs will appear at the next session of the board of aldermen July 7th and request that body to provide a municipal swimming pool for the children of the city.

The decision was finally reached at the regular meeting of the Rotary Club last night when W. H. Rogers member of a committee appointed to ask the Kiwanis club to appoint a similar committee to assist the Rotarians in presenting the proposition to the aldermen, reported that the Kiwanians were not only willing to assist in every way possible but suggested that the entire membership of both clubs be represented when the matter was brought up before the city fathers.

The session of the Rotarians was presided over by President Haywood Dail, and consisted of the usual supper, the singing of lively songs, presentation of several visitors, and one or two interesting talks dealing with current problems.

The principal talk of the evening was made by E. F. Arnold, director of agriculture in Pitt County. He talked in an interesting way of problems confronting the grower at the present time and said that they could not be handled successfully without the aid and cooperation of the townspeople.

He told of efforts of the Department of Agriculture to encourage production of a different type of tobacco from that used so extensively at this time. The new tobacco has been tried out in Craven county, with great success, he declared. In fact, the farmers of Craven increased their earnings in a most appreciable way, and Pitt County should be able to increase the value of her crop by \$100,000 and a quarter million dollars through the planting of the kind of tobacco used in Craven.

The raising of poultry, pigs and cows is another way for the Pitt County grower to increase his earnings, Mr. Arnold declared. He said the farmers of this community had plenty of spare time to give to poultry and livestock, and that they should be able to bring in at least a million dollars extra every year through this one line alone.

He urged the Rotarians to lend their moral support to the farming interests. "Let the farmer know you are with him in all of his undertakings," he declared, "and you will see this branch of industry go forward as it has never gone forward before."

Herbert Waldrop, cashier of the Greenville Banking & Trust Co. spoke on the subject, "Who and What I Am," which was a continuation of the biographical sketch of the life of each member.

Two of the most outstanding parts of the program were musical numbers presented by a quartet composed of Dr. C. J. Ellen, Burney Warren, Bill Lee, Junius Rose. They made a great hit with "My Wild Irish Rose," but "Sweet Adeline" displeased "Bobby" Wright, president of the East Carolina Teachers College to such an extent that he was forced to give public expression of his sentiment.

President Dail asked Mr. Wright if he thought he could improve upon the number. Mr. Wright didn't know, but thought he could. The president told him to get busy, and immediately began naming other members of a quartet to assist. But Bobby Wright wouldn't be satisfied with a quartet, he wanted an "aggregation" of musicians. President Dail appointed such song birds as Claude Gaskins, Rev. Frederick Jones, Bill Rogers, F. C. Harding, Francis Bowen and Bill Sandford to assist.

Mr. Wright interposed. He said he wanted his "aggregation" composed of something other than "legs and abdomens," but President Dail was not to be changed. His appointments had to stand. So Mr. Wright announced that his aggregation of "legs and abdomens" would attempt to render "A Perfect Day," the number being dedicated to President Dail, who presided over his last meeting for the club. The number made a great hit but repeated encores failed to bring the "aggregation" to the floor again.

PUBLIC DEBT
INCREASES IN
THIS STATE

Per Capita Debt Increases From \$33.44 In 1925 to \$42.03 in 1926.

Raleigh, N. C., June 28.—(AP)—From \$3.85 in 1917, the net indebtedness, less sinking fund assets per capita, in North Carolina increased until in 1926 it stood at \$42.03 per capita, financial statistics obtained at the State Capitol today show.

Within one year's time the per capita debt in the State increased from \$33.44 in 1925 to \$42.03 in 1926.

Total payments for expenses of general departments and public service enterprises and outlay were \$45,804,036, which amount included all payments, whether made from current revenues or from the proceeds of bond issues. The sum was apportioned as follows:

For maintenance and operation of general departments, \$16,292,922 including \$1,923,579 apportionment for education to the minor civil divisions of the State; for expense of public service enterprises, \$16,635; interest on debt, \$5,214,374; and outlays for permanent improvements, \$34,280,205.

Of the governmental costs reported, \$23,990,081 was for highways, \$2,940,210 being for maintenance and \$21,050,671 for construction.

OIL MAGNATE
PASSES AWAY

Henry Clay Pierce Dies at New York Following Colorful Career.

New York, June 28.—(AP)—Henry Clay Pierce, 78, who began his career as a bank messenger in St. Louis at the age of 16, and became one of the country's leading oil magnates, died at his home here yesterday.

The cholera epidemic in St. Louis in 1866 was held by Mr. Pierce as largely responsible for the development of a self-confidence that marked his entire career. He went to that city at the age of 16 to visit with a sister, intending to return on his birthplace at S. Lawrence, N. Y., but instead took a job as messenger in the Second National Bank. The next year when the bank's personnel was depleted by an exodus during the outbreak of cholera, he was made acting cashier. At 19 he had a brick business.

He soon switched to the oil industry, distributing on his own account oil refined by John R. Finlay, owner of the first refinery west of the Mississippi River. In 1871 he took over the Finlay business and as railroads were built in the Southwest, he followed them into Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana.

In 1880 he extended his operations into Mexico and owned refineries in Mexico City, Vera Cruz and Tampico before oil had been discovered in that country. From then until about 1896 he controlled all of the Mexican oil business.

He acquired control of the Mexican National Railways in 1900 and held it for several years, until it was merged into what is now the National Railways of Mexico. Even then he retained an interest in the News. In 1913 his oil business became the Pierce Oil Corporation.

The Prince of Wales might learn something from Mrs. Coolidge. On his thirty-third birthday he and his brother went to a costume ball dressed as Eton schoolboys. That will not please Britons that like to take their royalty seriously. Henry the Eighth, predecessor of King George, at the age of twelve wrote letters of Erasmus and others that amaze you. Perhaps he didn't really write them, but he signed them. Royalty that wishes to be taken seriously must take itself seriously.

Mrs. Coolidge, in South Dakota, sees women of all kinds, young girls and grandmothers, wearing knickers. Mrs. Coolidge respects them and probably admires their common sense, but she will not wear knickers. Rubber boots when she goes fishing and a skirt of reasonable length, never mind if it gets wet. Clothes, as Carlyle shows in "Sartor Resartus," makes all the difference between a king in his grandeur and a "featherless biped."

Commander Byrd, in his flight, will make an important experiment different from Lindbergh's dashing adventure. In a big Fokker plane, with three engines, Commander Byrd will take three other men, a radio which will send news as the journey progresses. That flight is the beginning of a series of trans-Atlantic passenger carrying flights on a sound basis.

It should be remembered that Rodman Wanzamaker planned a trans-Atlantic flight in 1914, and has spent \$500,000 carrying out his idea. He made the flight possible. He deserves the nation's thanks, not merely for spending his money, but for sticking to his plan to promote American flying.

BRAXTON IS
FINED TODAY

Cox Mill Man Appeals to Superior Court Following County Court Decision.

Jasper Braxton, white man of the Cox Mill community, was found guilty of reckless driving, and driving an automobile while under the influence of whiskey, in this morning's session of county court. He was required to pay the sum of \$70.00 to J. H. Boyd for damages to his automobile in the first case and \$100 and cost in the second offense. Attorneys immediately filed notice of appeal to Superior court under bond of \$300.

The charge against Braxton grew out of a wreck Sunday night, when an automobile which he was driving collided with one driven by Mrs. J. H. Boyd at the intersection of Ninth and Church streets. Both cars were more or less badly damaged, and occupants slightly injured.

Braxton was given preliminary hearing in mayor's court yesterday morning, the case being continued until this morning's session of county court.

J. S. Moore and H. D. Everett were found guilty of illegal possession of whiskey, but judgment was suspended for a period of two years on payment of cost and good behavior.

Judgment was suspended on payment of costs and good behavior in the case of G. A. Justice, charged with illegal possession of whiskey. Graves Harris was found not guilty of giving worthless checks. Thomas Jones, prosecuting witness in the case was found guilty of alleged malicious indictment, and taxed with the cost. He appealed to Superior court.

Several other cases were to be heard when court adjourned for lunch today, and it is expected the remainder of the evening will be consumed in the hearings.

AMERICANS AT
NAVAL CONFAB
NOT DISMAYED

Equanimity of Delegation Not Disturbed By Japan's Support Of British Views.

Geneva, June 28.—(AP)—Although some observers had expressed fears that the tri-partite naval conference had reached a critical stage, the American delegation was wholly undismayed today.

The Americans' equanimity was not even disturbed by the Japanese revelation of their inclination to support the British view of the question of limitation of the size and armament of battleships, consideration of which would mean rediscussion of problems thought to have been solved by the Washington treaty of 1922. Nor did the denial by the Japanese of an intention to seek a security pact with the United States agitate the American delegation.

The determination of the American delegates to restrict the conference to the scope outlined by President Coolidge's invitation to the powers with regard to the Japanese hint that the conference might well be adjourned to allow a period of reflection of the powers represented, and to permit the British to return for further consultation with the home government, with having suffered American refusal to reopen the capital ship question.

That the technical experts of the conference arranged to proceed today with discussion of the cruiser problem after having gone far in settling the status of such minor craft as Chinese river gunboats and mine sweepers, indicated that progress was being made.

Announcement by the Japanese that they had called for new instructions after they had become convinced that the British proposal to discuss capital ships appeared to promise decreased naval expenditure was made by Viscount Ishih, former Foreign Minister, he said that so far as Japan was concerned, there was no intention of proposing a security pact.

Subsequently the report was circulated that Viscount Ishih had visited Hugh S. Gibson, head of the American delegation, and told him the Japanese had been impressed with the British proposals.

Among the opinions prevailing as to what prompted the sudden change in the Japanese attitude is one that they may use the question as a lever to win the Americans over to an increased ratio for Japan as regards auxiliary war vessels. Another is that the Japanese are working to bring about a compromise that would result in a settlement in the Anglo-American differences. A third is that the Japanese have been won over to the British viewpoint.

A formal statement of the Japanese predicted that the popularizers would have to continue for some time as the British proposals "unexpectedly included highly important propositions regarding maximum tonnage and the life of so-called capital ships, namely, those fit to fight in great naval actions."

The old mill machinery will be junked or renovated and operation is expected to get underway by July 1.

CARDS CROWD PIRATES FOR FIRST PLACE

Pittsburgh's Pirates today had their backs to the wall in the fight to retain leadership of the National League. The Cardinals were within half a game of the top.

The victory which cut down the Buccaners' lead and focussed eyes of all baseball fans on the bitter battle between the champions of 1925 and 1926 went to the Cardinals at Pittsburgh yesterday by 7 to 5.

Better pitching as well as good hitting helped the Cardinals win. Flint Rheim outstayed the four Pirate hurlers who opposed him. Ray Kremer who tried it, also was the only one with much success.

Paul Waner of the Pirates made his 100th hit of the season and Frankie Frisch, of the Cardinals slammed his 99th and stole his 22nd base. Waner now leads both leagues in hits, being the first to reach the century mark. Frisch tops all rivals in stealing bags.

Lou Gehrig found a chance to make his own 99th safe hit of the season as the Yankees won by 6 to 2 over the Athletics. Ruth was out of the line-up with his knee injury. Combs and Lazzeri made circuit slams that helped stave away the game.

Still figuring strongly in the pennant races, the two Chicago clubs were at least holding their own in third place, the Cubs annexing an 11 to 4 victory over the Reds, while the White Sox gleamed a 7 to 2 decision over the Indians. Only to lose the second half of the double bill by 12 to 4.

Unable to see the slants of "Weeping" Willoughby, the Giants dropped a game to the Phillies by 6 to 0.

Washington and Detroit just a jump or two behind the three leaders in the American League both turned in victories. The Senators 9 to 8 decision over the Red Sox on Tris Speaker's eight inning single was their fourth straight at Boston's expense, while the Tigers 4 to 2 decision over the St. Louis Browns gave them a flying start in the series.

Kinston Breaks Losing Streak

Raleigh, June 28.—(AP)—Kinston broke its losing streak of four straight by downing Richmond 5-7. Wilson lost to Portsmouth, 8-2; and Norfolk continued to win, this time from Petersburg, 5-4 in yesterday's Virginia league play.

Jack Rice, formerly with Norfolk appeared in a Kinston uniform to put in a good day in the outfield.

Sweetsters Win Father and Son Golf Trophies

New York, June 28.—(AP)—Jess Sweetster and his father, George, won about every prize in sight in the annual father and son golf tournament of the metropolitan district.

Taking alternate strokes at the same ball, the Sweetsters covered the 18 holes of the Garden City golf club links in an 83 for the low gross score which gave them their second victory in recent years. They won the event in 1919 with an 81.

The Sweetster team scored its second triumph of the day when Jess, the former United States and British amateur champion, whacked a ball 242 yards 11-12 feet to win the long driving contest. The prize was a cigarette case which Jess liked good as he does not smoke.

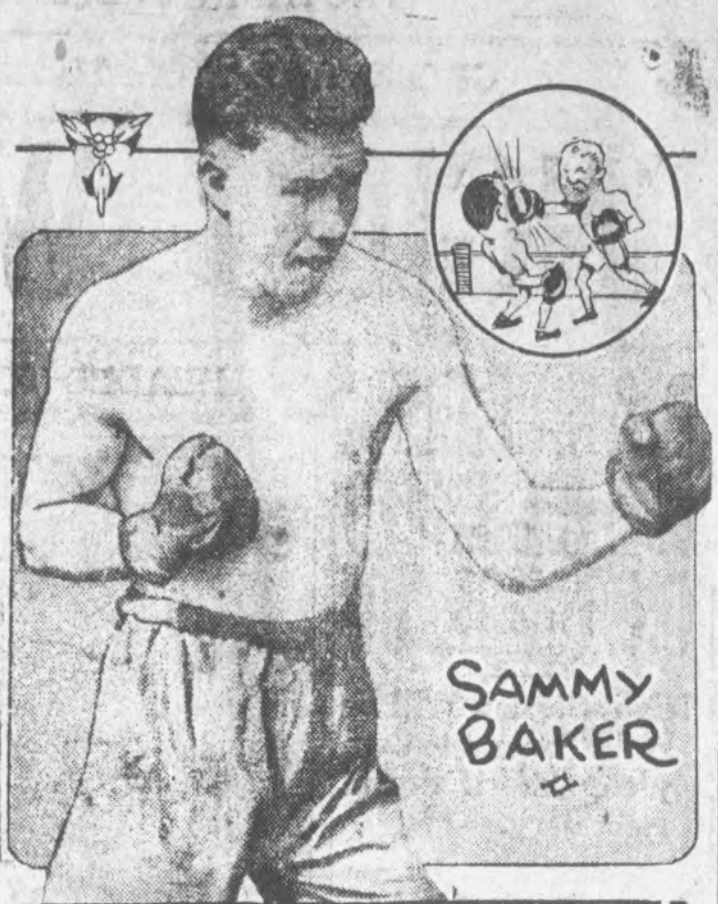

Paul Berlenbach Scores Knock Out In Single Round

New York, June 28.—(AP)—Paul Berlenbach scored a sensational one-round knockout over Charles Rammel, Australian heavyweight, Paul Berlenbach today was out to prove to the pugilistic world that some of his best fighting days are still ahead.

It took the dynamite fists of the former light heavyweight champion just two minutes and 33 seconds of fighting in the first battle of his comeback campaign last night to batter his opponent so badly the referee stopped the bout and awarded Berlenbach a technical "kayo." The fight was scheduled for ten rounds.

While Rammel has no impressive ring record he outweighed Berlenbach by 15 pounds and to knock him out, Berlenbach needed at least something like the power of punch which carried him to a title more than two years ago.

In his attempted comeback Berlenbach has youth in his favor, his age is 27. Despite his long lay off he weighed in for his fight last night at 170 1-2 pounds, well within the light heavy weight limit.

ASK MEDAL FOR HERO

Indianapolis.—(AP)—Special fans have asked that Norman Batten, Brooklyn race driver, be rewarded with a Carnegie medal for heroism during the 500 mile speedway race here on May 30. Batten's car broke into flames while traveling more than 100 miles an hour, but the pilot stayed with it until it slowed down and he could run it off the track. He had to direct it with his foot at the last, when flames forced him from the seat.

Officials said his bravery probably saved the lives of other drivers and spectators and prevented a fire which might have spread to the stands. Formal application for the hero medal have been made and Batten, who was in a hospital for weeks after the accident, has been given a purse of \$7,000 by friends and fans.

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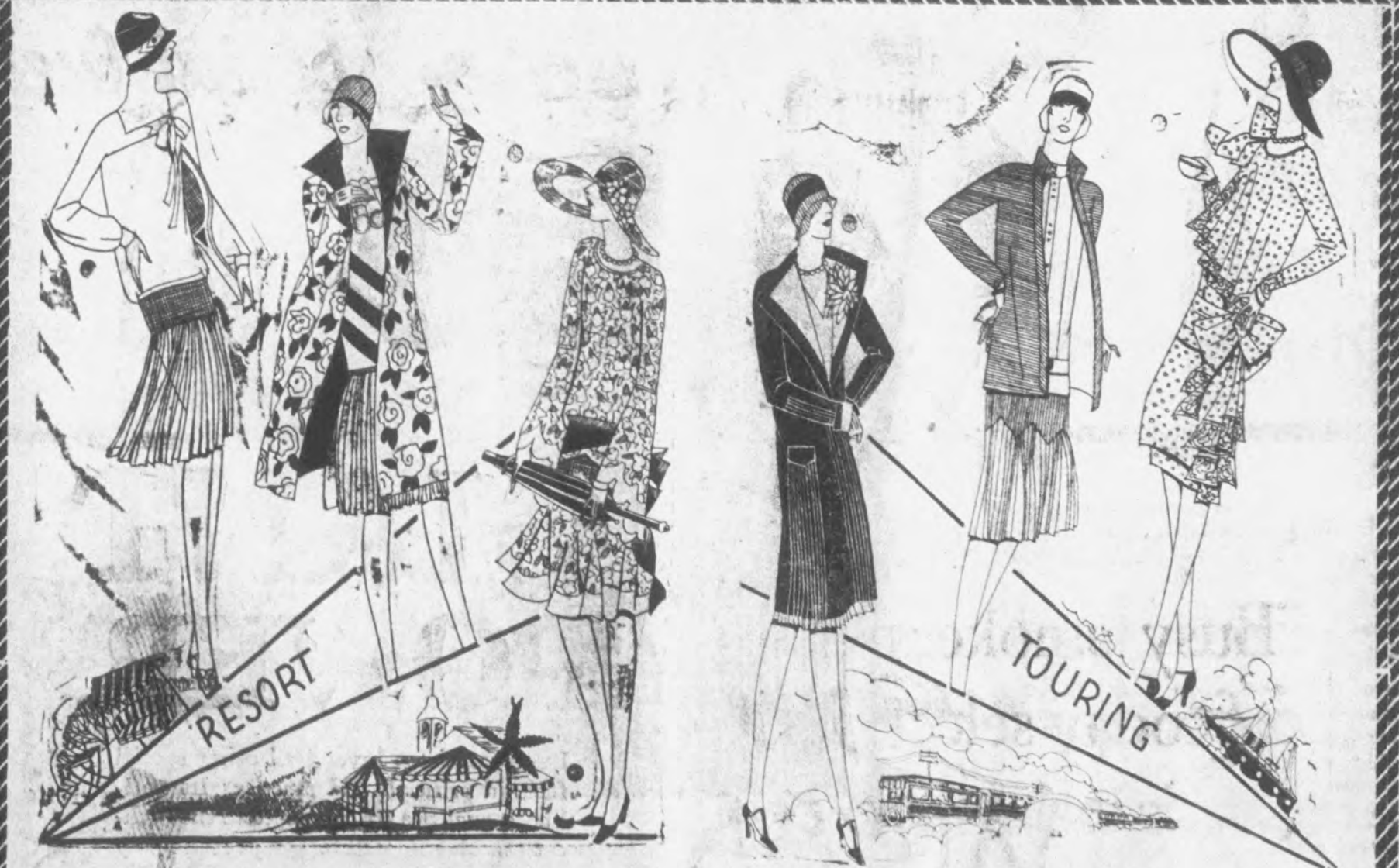

The Millers had been employed at a hotel for several seasons. Miller said another machine forced Osius to drive on to the street car tracks along the middle of the causeway, and that their car caught a wheel between track and pavement causing it to plunge into the water.

Nine Injured In Explosion At Tenn. Mine

Birmingham, Ala., June 28.—(AP)—Nine miners were injured in an explosion at Hamilton's slope mine of the Tennessee Coal, Iron and Railroad Company here today. Several of the men were seriously burned, early reports said. State and federal mine officials were conducting an investigation in an endeavor to assign a cause for the accident.

The injured men were taken to the company's hospital at Ensley.

Pierce, widely known minister and editor of the Advocate, the paper calls on the Klan to discard its regalia in public and recommends that the legislature enact a law making it a felony for any persons to appear in public masked and reborn.

service planes. As soon as the Fokker cleared the ground, these escort machines straightened out on a westerly course and fell in formation behind the Fokker as she passed over the San Francisco Bay heading toward the Golden Gate.

A fleet of seaplanes left the Fokker as she swung out over the sea at an altitude estimated at 2,000 feet.

A secondary question was when will Smith leave?

All night long mechanics worked on the Smith plane to correct final details. Smith and his navigator,

Charles H. Carter, of Los Angeles, arrived at the camp shortly before the Army plane took off. They said they had enjoyed four hours sleep during the night and were ready to leave as soon as their plane was pronounced complete in all details.

An unexpected delay was encountered when Smith found he needed a new altimeter. Army air service officials offered Smith the use of one of their altimeters, and a plane was dispatched to Crissy Field for the instrument.

To them went the final hand wave from the pilot as the plane started rolling along the runway. Neither the father nor the mother would discuss their son's venture after the plane had departed.

Smith displayed signs of nervousness when it was announced the altimeter installed in his plane would not function correctly.

His father led him away and as they conversed in low tones the parent patted his son on the shoulder assuringly.

Smith was perturbed by the setback but he believes he can overtake the Army plane though the latter had a three-hour lead.

This belief was based on the estimated speed of the two planes. The Army plane was expected to travel about 90 miles an hour for the first 2,000 miles and then increase in proportion to the decreasing weight of gasoline.

Smith expected to take the air at about 90 miles and increase until he attained 125 miles per hour at the finish.
