ith the fliers at noon. The Macom came from Quaranine where it had taken Commander Richard E. Byrd and his three man crew of the monoplane "Amerca" and Clearence Chamberlin pilot of the monoplane "Columbia" from the liner Leviathan on which they returned from Europe.

As the Macom steamed up the bay harbor craft whistled a shrill greeting, fire boats sprayed fountains of sea water into the air, the guns of Governors Island boomed nine gun salute, and airplanes

hovered overhead. Among the persons who made the trip down the bay to welcome the fliers home was Charles A. Lindbergh, who preceded these five over the Alantic air route. Others on the Macom were the mother of Com mander Byrd and the wives of Bert Acosta and George Noville, pilot and engineer of the America. No relatives met Bernt Balchen, the "America" relief man, as he is unmarried and his mother and sisters live in Norway. Commander Byrds wife was at the battery to greet him as he stepped from the Macom Chamberlin's wife was with him on






