NEW YORK CITY S THREATENED BY CAR STRIKE

Suspension of Service Of all Elevated and Subways Loomed as Certainty Today.

New York, July 26.—(AP)—New York's millions rode to work today facing the possibility that they may have to walk home.

A strike affecting all the elevated and subway lines in Manhattan and Brooklyn and surface car service in Brooklyn loomed as almost a certainty for late today.

The Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Railway Employees, whose efforts to unite the employees of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, the Brooklyn Manhattan Transit Company and the Brooklyn City Railroad caused the strike threat, has called a meeting of its members for 5 o'clock this afternoon when a strike vote will be taken. Should the vote be favorable the strike will become effective immediately. Meanwhile, the city continued marshaling its transportation forces to meet the expected tie-up of the city's two main travel arteries.

Arrangements have been made for 300 extra buses to parallel the East and West Side subways while municipal ferries will be run the length of Manhattan on the Hudson River.

Large corporations have been asked to operate their own trucks to bring their employees to and from work. Surface car lines and bus companies are prepared to place all their equipment into service and extend their routes.

The involved companies hope, however, to keep their lines in operation as long as possible. Fifteen hundred men, most of them said to be skilled electric car men and others corralled from city benches have been examined and pronounced fit for service by the Interborough Company that a secret ballot be cast by its employees to determine the question of their affiliation was refused by the company.

Recognition of the Amalgamated as the main point at issue in the threatened strike. The companies now recognize only company unions. The Amalgamated has announced its willingness to submit to arbitration the question of revision of working hours and wages.

FOURTH WOULD EMPLOY HIGHWAY PATROLMAN

Winston-Salem, July 26.—(AP)—Forsyth county commissioners have taken the first step toward the employment of patrolmen to patrol the highways of the county. Sheriff J. B. McCreary has been authorized to employ two officers and furnish them motorcycles and all other equipment at once. He was also instructed to make provisions for another two.

Mac Spahn and a Mr. Pfaff, both of Forsyth county, were the successful applicants at the meeting yesterday. Both are ex-service men and have met all qualifications expected of a person to hold this position.

Considerable investigation was carried out before the two men were employed by the county.

John Howell Windham died at the home of his son, J. L. Windham, 1012 Third street, yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock. He had been ill several months. He was 65 years of age.

Funeral services were conducted from the home of his son this afternoon at three o'clock. Burial followed in the new Greenwood cemetery.

Mr. Windham was born near Conetoe, where he spent the most of his life. He moved to Greenville about two months ago, and since that time has been confined by illness.

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Monte Carlo says Mr. Mellon plans to purchase "an extensive estate at Monaco."

Some Americans that have never invested in red, black, odd, even, "passe" or "manque" do not know that Monaco is a tiny principality on the Mediterranean, and Monte Carlo, a small town of hotels and villas, in Monaco, containing the gambling house that finances the Prince and his principality.

If Secretary Mellon should buy what would be for him "an extensive Monaco estate" he would have to buy all of Monaco. He would thus acquire a most beautiful palace overlooking the Mediterranean, a lucrative "joint" a little to the east.

But the estate could be lost in one corner of a Texas ranch.

However, until 1928 Mr. Mellon won't know whether he wants "an extensive estate" on Monaco territory or not.

If Mr. Coolidge should decide not to take a second nomination and a second election, Mr. Mellon might take a first nomination and election, in which case the Monaco residence would be postponed.

Bethel Policeman Gets Run Runner And Much Whiskey

Bowling Jackson, alleged professional run runner, was arrested near Bethel Saturday afternoon by chief of police Martin, assisted by deputy sheriff Earl James. Jackson was later brought to Greenville and released under bond of \$250 for his appearance at the next term of Pitt county criminal court.

Chief Martin, it is said, had been tipped off that a notorious bootlegger from Bear Grass would pass through Bethel some time Saturday night. He got his plans ready, and at a filling station, three miles from Bethel, came in contact with Jackson, who had stopped at the station.

Jackson was asked if he had any whiskey in his possession. He handed the officers a pint, saying that it was all that he had. Officer James searched the car and found four or five gallon kegs of whiskey.

The Chevrolet automobile, which Jackson was driving, was confiscated along with the whiskey, and will be held by the county officials until the case has been settled.

Raleigh Votes On State Fair

Raleigh, July 26.—(AP)—Raleigh citizens today decided whether to keep the State Fair at the State capital.

With voting from 8 a. m. to 7:24 p. m. sunset, the question was whether the city should issue bonds not to exceed \$75,000 for permanent buildings to be erected on a new site to be furnished by the State, comprising 200 acres.

The North Carolina Agricultural Society has offered \$125,000 to the fair. The \$75,000 voted on today would complete the \$200,000 necessary to keep the fair here, State-owned and operated.

ATTORNEY FOR BIRGER DENIES NEWS STORIES

Charles Karch Says He Did Not Tell of Birger's Reputed Confession Recently

Benton, Ill., July 26.—(AP)—Preparing for the eventuality that their motion for a new trial might be denied attorneys for Charles Birger condemned southern Illinois gangster, searched the trial record today for grounds on which to appeal to the Illinois supreme court in an effort to save Birger from the noose.

Arguments on a motion for a new trial were set for Thursday by circuit judge Charles H. Miller.

Meanwhile a printed statement that Birger had confessed to his attorneys as to his guilt in the murder of Joe Adams of West City, was denied by two lawyers to whom it was credited before they had determined to take the gangster's plight into the state's highest court.

Charles Karch, member of the defense staff continued today that he had told two reporters that Birger was not placed on the witness stand for "ethical reasons" after they had become convinced of his complicity in the Adams slaying.

He said he could not recall telling newspapermen that they could publish the story of Birger's reputed confession after the verdict was reached. One of the reporters was a representative of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch which printed the story and said it did not intend to recede from its position.

"I am here to work for the life of Charles Birger," Karch said.

"I hope I can continue and will not serve myself from the case unless the situation created by a St. Louis newspaper in regard to Birger's reported confession causes me to relinquish my connection with my client."

POSSES HUNT FOR ROBBERS OF VA. BANK

Comb Mountain of West Virginia For Robbers of Bank at Mount Jackson, Va.

Winchester, Va., July 26.—(AP)—Posses, officers of two States aided by bloodhounds were combing the mountain fastnesses of the sparsely settled territory of Hardy County West Virginia today in search of two men and two women who yesterday held up and robbed the bank of Mount Jackson, Va., of \$2,000.

Heavily armed mountain residents joined with the officers in the hunt in the vicinity of Great North mountain where officers believed the four bandits were surrounded. The search began late yesterday and continued into the night with four ten-man bloodhounds from Keyser, W. Va., placed on the trail where the abandoned automobile used by the four was found.

Sheriff Borden of Shenandoah County, Va., who confiscated suit cases containing clothing and letters found in the automobile led the hunt for the robbers announcing that he would not return until he captured the bandits. The officers are operating in a wilderness ten miles from a telephone.

The automobile was found 10 miles from Mt. Jackson on the road to Lost City, W. Va. Residents of the section said the sedan had been seen in that section before and that it was believed to be a stolen car. After searching the automobile Sheriff Borden declined to make public the letters found with keys, several automobile license plates and women's clothing. He declined to discuss the letters except to say "they read like love letters."

Names of the addresses found will probably be announced when the bandits are captured he added.

C. I. Dellinger, bookkeeper in the bank that was robbed, declared that he recognized his cousin Kirby Dellinger as the man who accompanied the two women into the bank. The other Cecil Wilson of Wardsville, W. Va., remained in the car he said. He declared the two women were strangers.

Sheriff Borden, returning today said that the dogs had picked up several trails but were unable to follow them for any great distance.

PLANS TO MAKE STATEMENT IN HOUSE TODAY

American Delegation At Geneva Calls on Britishers For Some Information.

London, July 26.—(AP)—The British government will make a statement in the House of Commons regarding the tripartite naval negotiations tomorrow on Thursday Winston Churchill, Chancellor of the exchequer told the House today.

Geneva, July 26.—(AP)—The American delegation to the tripartite naval conference sent a letter to the British delegation today asking for information as to when W. G. Bridgman, chief of the British delegation and Earl Cecil, who are now in London, are expected to return to Geneva to resume the conference.

It appears that Mr. Bridgman informed Hugh S. Gibson, chief of the American delegation before departing for London early last week that he expected to start back on Sunday last, but since then no word has been received.

In the meantime the delegations in Geneva have remained at their desks and it is understood that the American Secretary of State, Frank B. Kellogg is remaining in Washington to keep in touch with the situation.

The impression prevails in conference circles that there may be some division of opinion within the British cabinet and that this is the chief reason for delay in the return of the British plenipotentiaries.

An unconfirmed report has been received in Geneva that some of the British Dominions, becoming anxious over a possible rupture of the conference have urged Great Britain not to be apprehensive over details of the American building program on the contention that everybody realizes perfectly well that war between the United States and Great Britain can be considered as perpetually outlawed.

Additional Jurors In Murder Issue

Franklin, La., July 26.—(AP)—Selection of eleven additional jurors to try the murder case against Mrs. Ada Bonner LeBouef, was begun in St. Mary Parish criminal court today at the beginning of the second day session of the trial.

The trio are charged with murdering James J. LeBouef, husband of the woman defendant. The State contends the slaying grew out of an alleged love affair between Mrs. LeBouef and Dr. Dreher.

One juror, a farmer, was the result of yesterday's sessions. Most of the time was spent in arguing motions of defense counsel to quash the venire.

The lone juror spent the night on the top floor of the courthouse in custody of a deputy sheriff.

Mrs. Dreher, wife of the physician, was the first of those immediately interested in the case to enter the courtroom. She chatted for several minutes with James R. Parker, chief of defense counsel before the defendants entered the courtroom.

She did not glance toward Mrs. LeBouef as the widow entered the courtroom but exchanged a cheerful greeting with her husband and took a seat beside him.

Rotarians Discuss Need Of Improved Attendance

Just because the attendance record of the 57th district gave them an average of 85.85, members of the Greenville Rotary club in regular twice-a-month session here last night, decided to redouble their efforts to improve their attendance during the next several months. It was urged that all members going away to attend some other club meeting notify the secretary of the local club so that he might be able to keep an accurate check of activities of the organization, and at the same time be in position to furnish a complete report to the district secretary.

Julian White, newly elected secretary of the club, invited attention to the records of the various clubs of the district as outlined in a recent report. He called out the record of various members and found that they had made up some of the meetings which they were credited with missing. It is important that these records be kept as accurate as possible, President Rogers told the club. He urged them to do everything possible to establish a 100 per cent record during succeeding months.

The program last night was probably one of the shortest of the summer months, yet one of the most interesting. It consisted of the usual supper the singing of Rotary songs under the direction of Junius H. Rose, superintendent of city schools, and a special musical program by Mrs. Doris Brim of Greensboro, and Miss Florence Overton, of Greenville, daughters of D. D. Overton, Rotarian and Manufacturer of this city. The program consisted of vocal and instrumental numbers. The Rotarians applauded liberally, and expressed their appreciation in more concrete terms by repeated encore.

J. M. Henderson, baby Rotarian, was formally inducted into the mysteries of the realm of "grown-ups" after he had been divested of the swaddling clothes of infancy. Presentation of certificate of membership was made by Hon. F. C. Harding. YOUTH KILLS MOTHER THEN SHOOTS SELF

Mother and Son of Prominent Salisbury Family Die Instantly After Shooting.

Salisbury, July 26.—(AP)—Paul E. Smith, Jr., 23 years old, shot and killed his mother this morning as she slept and then committed suicide by shooting himself in the right temple. The tragedy was enacted at the Smith home at 1705 North Lee street, this city. The husband and father awoke at 2 o'clock this morning to find the son attacking his mother, having dealt her a blow on the forehead with a hammer and before he could interfere sufficiently to prevent assault the son fired a pistol ball into the right temple of the woman who was 52 years old. Then rushing into his room, adjoining that of his parents, he jumped in bed and shot himself just below the right temple. Death for both mother and son was instantaneous.

The son had been in ill health for several years and about a year ago underwent a serious operation. However, he was able to go about and attended a picture show last night. Returning home he retired and nothing further was heard of him until he entered the room where the father and mother were sleeping.

It is said the father on awakening, called to the boy to know what he was doing, and he replied that he was "going to kill mother and myself," and in an instant, after striking the blow with the hammer, shot her, using a 32 calibre pistol, the same one with which he only a minute later killed himself.

Mrs. Smith was a member of a prominent family of Gold Hill township, this county, and was a sister of H. E. Ruffy, chairman of the board of county commissioners of Graham. She leaves besides the husband, several brothers and sisters and an aged mother. The dead son was the only child.

The double funeral will take place at Gold Hill Methodist church Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock and the two bodies will be buried in the church cemetery.

It is very probable that a coroner's inquest will be held over the bodies of Paul E. Smith, Jr., and his mother, Mrs. Roxie Smith, to determine all the facts in the affair.

So far as can be learned the young man's mind had not been affected, although he has been in ill health. Officials have been conferring this morning relative to the advisability of holding an inquest.

BISHOP WANTS TO THROW OFF NORTH POWER

Methodist Leader Wants to See Establishment of Strictly Southern Democracy

Charlotte, July 26.—(AP)—Possibility of a united effort on the part of church workers in the South to throw off "the nomination of the Democratic party by New York and New Jersey" and the establishment of a strictly Southern democracy was indicated here today by Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon of the Methodist Episcopal Church South in an interview with the Charlotte News.

Speaking of the discussion in progress between Bishop Cannon of Richmond and Wayne B. Wheeler of the Anti-Saloon League, Bishop Mouzon refused to state whether or not he was definitely in favor of a break or the establishment at present of a Southern Democratic party.

He declared, however, that the party must break away from the "yoke of the two eastern states" and said that if Bishop Cannon's statements in regard to the activities of eastern Democrats prove to be correct, he would "watch with interest" a movement looking to a complete break with Tammany Hall and the east and the independence of Southern Democracy.

"Al Smith is the candidate not of the Democratic party, but of the anti-prohibitionists," said the Bishop. "I for one shall vote the Republican ticket in preference to Republicans of the North and Democrats of the South have much more in common than the two wings of Democracy. Church people in the North usually vote the Republican ticket and church people in the South the Democratic."

Burlington Boy Kills Friend In "Hold-Up" Play

Burlington, N. C., July 26.—(AP)—A Burlington boy, still in his middle teens, who played "hold-up" robberies, today sought a \$5,000 bond, while his companion, victim of the fatal outcome of the game was being buried.

Arthur Craven snapped a pistol he acquired from his father's trunk while pointing the weapon toward Harvey Flint, 15, who died with a shot in his body from the "unloaded gun." The gun was said to have snapped three times before the fatal firing.

KING MICHAEL GETS SUPPORT OF OPPONENT

Old Foe of King Ferdinand Publicly Recognizes Authority Of Present Regency.

Bucharest, Rumania, July 26.—Rumanian political unity around the child King Michael was virtually achieved when the former opposition leader, General Averescu publicly embraced Premier Bratianu and recognized the authority of the regency last night.

Averescu, who has been a bitter opponent of Bratianu and hostile to King Ferdinand, made his political reconciliation all the more emphatic by staging it in the presence of the full Senate. The 300 members knowing full well the differences that existed between the two statesmen were amazed when they saw them embrace sincerely and heard General Averescu proclaim him and his party's allegiance to the king and Premier Bratianu and their support of the regency. Bratianu who has been strongly opposed to the return to Rumania of former Crown Prince Carol, succeeded Averescu as premier in June.

Another sensation of last night's Senate session was the demand of Julius Maniu, leader of the National Peasants' party for the immediate dissolution of parliament. Amid an uproar from the Liberals he charged that the post war governments and elections were dishonest and unconstitutional.

Paris, July 26.—(AP)—Further assurance that former Crown Prince Carol would undertake no action likely to create difficulties for the government of Rumania "as lawfully constituted by the wish of his tenderly respected father" was given to the Petit Parleien by Professor Niculesco of Bucharest University, one of a group of Rumanians who called on Carol, at his Beuilly villa yesterday afternoon.

"His Highness," said the professor "is very bitter at not having been allowed to return to his country to salute the King's remains. He is also surprised at the comments of certain newspapers which tend to represent him as leading a life of dissipation whereas he rarely, if ever goes out and spends the greater part of his time in reading."

Bucharest, July 26.—(AP)—Two incidents of King Ferdinand's funeral are the talk of Rumania. One is the spontaneous act of William S. Culbertson, American minister to Rumania, kneeling beside the monarch's grave and offering a prayer. The act was all the more conspicuous because none of the other diplomats knelt, merely passing the coffin.

The other incident involved Queen Marie. While the clergy were chanting the solemn words "Farewell for Evermore" over the King's body the Queen tottered to kneel a pillar for support and wept aloud. Fearing she was about to collapse, a palace officer brought a chair and smelling salts but she refused them and insisted that the chair be given to her daughter Queen Marie of Jugoslavia who is soon to become a mother.

Mrs. Ann Eliza Stocks, well known Greenville woman, passed away at her home on Pitt street yesterday morning at 11:30 following long illness. She was 83 years old.

Mrs. Stocks had been confined to her bed several years, and death was not unexpected. She spent the most of her life in Greenville and Pitt County and was a member of one of the oldest and most prominent families of this section.

Funeral services were conducted from her late home this afternoon at 5:30 o'clock by Rev. H. Frederick Jones, pastor of the Memorial Baptist church of this city, and Rev. L. R. Ennis, Arden, pastor of the Free Will Baptist Church. Burial will follow in Cherry Hill Cemetery.

CUBS BACK ON TOP OF LADDER IN NATIONAL

The National League's humdrum race for first place showed the Chicago Cubs back on top again today. All Joe McCarthy's boys had to do to regain the lead was to keep away from the ball field. Andy Reese, third baseman of the New York Giants contributed to a dual cause by spanking a home-run in the seventh inning against the Pittsburgh Pirates. The homer proved to be the only run of the game and it toppled the Corsairs from the top rung of the ladder.

Ray Kremer and Larry Benton engaged in a tight hurling battle at the Polo Grounds and each pitcher had the batters popping up flies most of the afternoon. Reese's drive carried to the left field screen and bounded back onto the playing field. Under ground rules the hit was good for a home-run. Two fast doubleplays helped Benton over the rough spots.

The mad rush of the Cincinnati Reds carried the team further toward the top of the second division. Jack Hendricks men dropped the St. Louis Cardinals twice in a doubleheader. They won the first 3-2 in ten innings and took the second 4-3 by a four run rally in the seventh that caused the retirement of Flint then. The double-killing put the Reds close to the Brooklyn Dodgers who are occupying fifth place and widened the breach between St. Louis and the leaders—the Pirates and Cubs. Hugh Critz won the first game with a single in the tenth that scored Walker who was on third with two out.

The Detroit-Philadelphia game furnished the lion's share of the American League excitement. Jimmy Dykes knocked out a home-run in the thirteenth that gave the Mackmen a 6-5 victory. Philadelphia fought an uphill battle, tying the score in the ninth on a double by French and a single by Pinch Hitter Lamar. The fielding features were supplied by Zack Wheat whose great catches in the tenth and thirteenth saved the game.

OUT of KEELER'S GOLF BAG!

Ted Ray In And On Oakmont Bunker



After a discussion of the astonishing speed of the Oakmont greens in the recent open golf championship, which cost Ted Ray, the big English professional who is regarded as having the finest putting touch in the world, 38 strokes on the putting surfaces of the third round and 40 in the second, Big Ted also a famous player of recovery shots, gave his ideas on the furrowed sand in the Oakmont bunkers.

Ted did not complain of the speed of the greens—he said it was all his fault that his putts slid away from the objective. And he merely said that in his opinion the furrowed sand in the bunkers was too leveling an idea.

This sounded interesting and I asked him to continue. You know the furrowed bunkers at Oakmont are a sort of tradition; I had a little story of them in this series before the tournament, and suggested then that there were at least two ideas about them. One is the Oakmont idea, which is that a player is not compelled to put the ball in a bunker and that when he does he should pay a specific penalty, by finding the ball in a furrow from which only a blasting shot will recover him. It is not intended that a player in an Oakmont bunker 200

yards from the green shall put that ball on or near the green with his next shot.

Ted Ray's idea is the other. Says Ted:

"The recovery shot from sand in a bunker is a distinct type of golf shot, executed by a good player in a variety of ways and with a variety of clubs. On what we call wind-blown sand—that is, sand in its natural state—a golfer may find his ball lying well enough, despite the proximity of a possible mound before the bunker to play a boom-crang shot. If he requires distance, an expert golfer can cut or pull a spoon shot fifty yards off line to escape the mound and bring the ball in near and maybe on, the green, 200 or 220 yards away. He can execute other shots of various ranges with other clubs. These are the most beautiful and most perilous shots in golf, but their mastery rewards the player for his skill and his courage.

"With the furrowed sand and almost inevitable banks here, all golfers are automatically reduced to the same level.

"The expert or the duffer has only one course—to explode the ball out toward the fairway or the green, if it is near enough. I think this is taking variety out of

the game, and some of the just reward for excellence. Of course you should not be in the bunker. But everyone is, at times. And the bunker shot in its almost infinite phases is one of the finest shots in

Officials of the Hayes-Barton Baptist church, of Raleigh, express shame at the recent wrangle over whether or not a Greek would be permitted to take up residence in the exclusive residential section of that city. Not only the church but those citizens, who so apparently lost their heads as to urge action by the Ku Klux Klan or other mob action, should hang their heads in shame.

MUST STUDY FARM PROBLEMS

The farmer who plows and sows and reaps is carrying on a business just as vital to the welfare of the country as that of the railroads, the public service corporations or other interests; but the farmer feels that he is not given a fair show. He knows that the railroads are permitted by Governmental authority to charge a freight rate that will yield a fair profit on their investment. He knows that public service corporations are protected by State and municipal authorities to the point where they are permitted to earn a fairly large profit on their investment. He knows that industrial interests, whenever the market will not absorb their output on a profitable basis, can shut down their plants and not be forced to run at a loss. But the farmer knows he does not receive any direct or indirect guarantee as to the profit on his business, although he feels that railroad and industrial and banking securities are no more sacrosanct than his business.

Unlike the railroads which are permitted to charge a freight rate yielding a profit or the management of industrial corporations which can close their plants at any moment, however great may be the hardship, the farmer must plow and sow often six months or a year in advance of the reaping, and he cannot, therefore, shut down his plant, nor can he call upon the Government for Federal aid.

It is true that the mercantile business must operate under somewhat similar conditions; and yet it has to take no such risks as do the farmers. The professional man has no Governmental assistance in his operations. Nevertheless, the farmer feels that if the railroads and the industrial interests can appeal to Congress for protection to their investments, he must in some way have a right to do the same thing; but how this can be brought about is a problem which has not yet been solved. Its importance, however, demands the most careful study of the business people, the industrial leaders and the rail-

road managers of the country, not only for their future safety against agrarian legislation, but for the broadest prosperity of all interests.

There can be no permanent prosperity for railroad and industrial interests unless there is prosperity for agriculture. Too long have the farmers been ignored, and at times berated. Too long have the newspapers and the cartoonists pictured the farmer as a "hayseed." Too long have the real and serious problems of farm life been ignored or put aside by men of affairs. That situation must be changed. The farmer must have his inning, or there will be trouble for all.—Manufacturers Record.

Resolution of the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Greenville, With Respect to the Paving of Certain Streets Within Said Town.

Be it resolved by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Greenville, at the regular monthly session of said Board held on Thursday night, the 7th day of July, 1927:

THAT WHEREAS, the Town of Greenville heretofore in 1916 and 1918, both inclusive, caused various streets in said Town to be paved with asphalt pavement, as will appear from various resolutions of the Board of Aldermen of said town recorded in the Minute Book of the meetings of said Aldermen, occurring during said period; and whereas, the cost incurred in making the aforesaid improvements has in a large amount been repaid; and whereas, since said streets were so improved, the Town of Greenville has experienced a considerable growth, both materially and in population; and whereas, in the opinion of the Board of Aldermen, it is both necessary and expedient that the paving program heretofore instituted be extended to better provide for the welfare and convenience of the citizens of said town;

AND WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen is of the opinion that Rotary Avenue between Fourth and Fifth Streets, THAT Fourth Street between Reade Street and Rotary Avenue, THAT Tenth Street between Evans Street and Lawrence Street, THAT Elizabeth Street between Third and Fourth Streets, THAT Contentnea Street from Fourth Street to Ward Street, AND Ward Street from Contentnea Street to Latham Street, THAT Reade Street from Ninth Street to Tenth Street, THAT Albermarle Avenue from Virginia Avenue to Fifth Street, and THAT Third Street from Elizabeth Street to Tyson Street are badly in need of repairs and improvements, and the welfare and convenience of the public at large require that said streets should be graded, improved and paved between the curbs, within the limits aforesaid, with asphalt or other suitable pavements; and whereas, the Board of Aldermen finds as a fact that the above im-

provements are necessary and expedient, and will promote the interest of the Town of Greenville; and

WHEREAS, a majority in number of the owners on said respective streets above mentioned, between the points above respectively designated, have petitioned the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Greenville to pave said respective streets with pavement to be selected by the Board, requesting in said respective petitions that two-thirds of the cost of said pavement be assessed upon the lots abutting directly on the said respective streets named within the limits set out therein, according to the extent of their respective frontage thereon, with an equal rate per foot of said frontage; and

WHEREAS, the said respective petitions were duly filed with the Town Clerk of the Town of Greenville on the 30th day of June, 1927; and whereas, the said Town Clerk has investigated the sufficiency of said petitions, and has heretofore certified the result of his said investigation and findings to the Board of Aldermen of said Town; and his said certification is to the effect that the majority in number of the owners who represent more than a majority of all the lineal feet of frontage of the lands abutting upon Rotary Avenue, between Fourth and Fifth Streets, upon Fourth Street between Reade Street and Rotary Avenue, upon Tenth Street between Evans and Lawrence Streets, upon Elizabeth Street between Third and Fourth Streets, upon Contentnea Street between Fourth Street and Ward Street, and Ward Street from Contentnea Street to Latham Street, upon Reade Street between Ninth and Tenth Streets, upon Albermarle Avenue from Virginia Avenue to Fifth Street, and upon Third Street from Elizabeth Street to Tyson Street have duly signed each of the said respective petitions heretofore mentioned; and it further appearing that the said respective petitions, each of said petitions being treated herein as a separate district, complies with Chapter No. 56 of the Consolidated Statutes of the State of North Carolina, as amended, in all respects; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Greenville finds that each and every one of said respective petitions is sufficient in all respects, and that chapter No. 56 of the Consolidated

Statutes, laws of North Carolina, as amended, have been fully complied with in all respects as to the filing and certifying of said petitions to this Board, and further finds that each of said petitions contains the requisite number of names and the requisite number of lineal feet for the respective district included within each of said petitions; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen is of the opinion that all of the Streets heretofore mentioned herein, between the points designated and described and proposed to be paved, should be paved with asphalt; and

WHEREAS, in order to secure uniformity of work done, the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Greenville is of the opinion that the work should be let out to contract in whole, and that this would be cheaper and better for the property owners and for the Town of Greenville; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen is of the opinion that the pavement aforesaid is the best and most suitable for said streets, and that said improvements should be made as aforesaid, and that two-thirds of the cost of said pavement and improvements should be assessed upon the lots abutting directly on said respective streets named in said respective petitions within the limits above described and designated and mentioned in said respective petitions, according to the extent of their respective frontage thereon, by an equal rate per foot of said frontage; and that the other one-third of the cost of said pavement and improvement

should be paid by the Town of Greenville, and that the Town of Greenville should bear the entire cost of paving the intersections of said streets where paving shall be necessary.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it, and it is hereby resolved, by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Greenville, at the regular session of said Board held on this the 7th day of July, 1927, that Rotary Avenue between Fourth and Fifth Streets, that Fourth Street between Reade Street and Rotary Avenue, that Tenth Street between Evans and Lawrence Streets, that Elizabeth Street between Third and Fourth Streets, that Contentnea Street between Fourth and Ward Streets, and Ward Street between Contentnea and Latham Streets, that Reade Street from Ninth Street to Tenth Street, that Albermarle Avenue from Virginia Avenue to Fifth Street, and that Third Street from Elizabeth Street to Tyson Street be paved with asphalt pavement, as aforesaid, under and by virtue of chapter No. 56 of the Consolidated Statutes, laws of North Carolina, as amended, and the procedure thereunder;

And be it further resolved: That two-thirds of the cost of said pavement and improvements on each of the streets heretofore designated, as set forth in each of said respective petitions, and within the limits in said respective petitions set forth be hereafter assessed upon the lots abutting directly on said respective streets according to

the extent of their respective frontages, the assessment against the said lots abutting upon said streets to be based upon the total cost of paving said street within the respective limits mentioned and upon which said respective lots abut, exclusive of so much of the cost as may be incurred at the intersections, and the share of the Railroads, if any, to be hereinafter, or hereafter, determined.

And be it further resolved: That that portion of the cost of said improvements herein provided for, on the streets above designated, to be assessed upon abutting property, shall be divided into ten equal annual installments, the said installments to bear interest at a rate not exceeding six per cent per annum from the date of the confirmation of the assessment roll, and shall become due and payable on the date on which taxes are payable, the first installment to be due and payable on the date for which taxes for the year 1928 are due and payable, and one installment to be due and payable each year thereafter in the same manner, for a period through and including the year 1937, with the right and privilege of any property owner

to pay in cash the amount which shall be assessed against his said property.

And be it, and it is hereby further resolved: That the owners of all property abutting on the streets hereinbefore mentioned between the limits as in said respective petitions set forth, shall, where necessary, connect their several premises with water mains and sewer pipes located in the street adjacent to their several premises, under the supervision of the Superintendent of the Water and Light Commission of the Town of Greenville, and unless the owners shall cause such connections to be made on or before the 30th day of September, 1927, the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Greenville will cause such connections to be made, and the entire cost of making each water and sewer connection required to be made by the respective owners of the property abut-

ting on said streets, which the Town of Greenville may be called upon to make after default by the property owner in making the same, as hereinbefore provided for, shall be especially assessed against the particular lot or parcel of land, for or on behalf of which said connection is made, as provided by chapter 56 of the Consolidated Statutes, laws of North Carolina, or as amended, as aforesaid.

That this resolution be published, as required by the Act aforesaid.

"If we had, had five years ago over North Carolina, men trained in local communities to work together we would today have a tri-state tobacco association and we would not see the officials of three great States asking in vain that the tobacco markets be opened at a reasonable time."

Mr. Cates, pointing to Chambers of Commerce, bar associations, medical societies and the like, said the farmers need a rural organization for promotion of better schools, roads and homes in county and State.

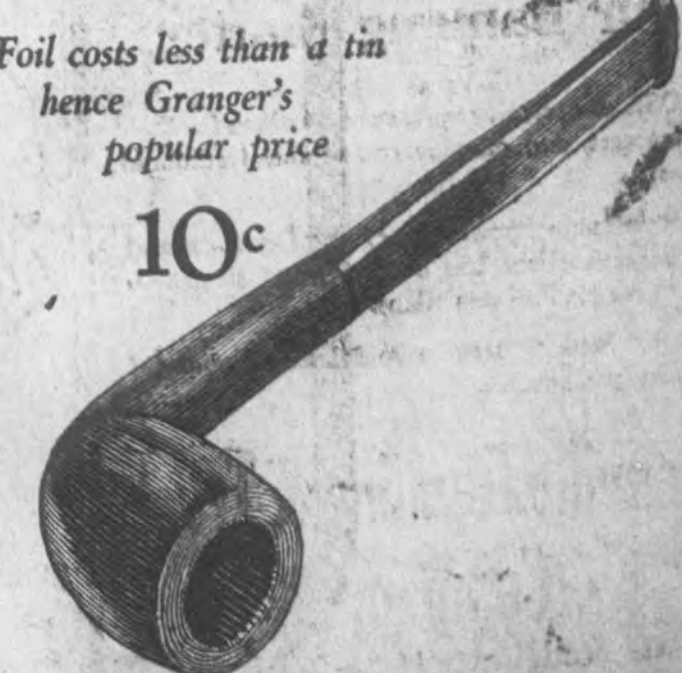

Daily News Letter

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population

Rochester, N. Y. — (INS) — With trans-oceanic flights becoming daily more common and perilous stunts in the air passing almost unnoticed, an event which fifty-six years ago startled the whole State and attracted attention throughout the country, pales into insignificance compared with events of today.

But the memory of Mrs. Mary A. Boynton of Waterloo still retains vividly her marriage to Dr. John F. Boynton of Syracuse on November 8, 1870.

Starting from Central Park, New York City, at two o'clock Wednesday afternoon, Professor Thomas F. C. Love's balloon, the United States, served a double purpose. Discussed in aeronautical circles for some time previous to the event, the ascent was primarily to observe scientific phenomena.

In discussing plans for the proposed trip to the clouds, then a feat of magnitude, the future Mrs. Boynton expressed a desire to have their wedding take place in the air. Her husband readily agreed and purchased what then was a luxurious wicker car for the vehicle at a cost said to have been \$500.

Some question over the legality of a wedding in the air caused a delay in the proceedings. Ministers were sure of their ground regarding a marriage on land or sea but expressed doubts about the ceremony scheduled to take place in the sky. Accordingly the couple were married at a Fifth Avenue hotel by a prominent clergyman, the ceremony being repeated while the craft drifted for an hour and a half, landing at Mt. Vernon twenty-five miles away.

National attention will be drawn to what once was a wilderness criss-crossed by the trails of the Seneca Nation, when the discovery of petroleum in North America will be marked by appropriate ceremonies July 23, at Cuba, N. Y.

The famous old "oil spring" of the Seneca Nation, first mentioned in Father Joseph de la Roche D'Aillon's letter dated July 18, 1627, still is useable, encased in a wooden cask preserved by the oil content for more than a century.

British engineers have constructed the greatest locomotive ever run in England called "George V." developing a speed of more than 100 miles an hour.

Donald Woodward, Lat. Leroy, N. Y., is experimenting with a plow that enriches the earth by plowing into it a high electrical voltage as the plow moves through the field.

L. Roe of Pittsburgh who invented the plow, says the 100,000 volts of electricity that it carries destroys weeds and harmful bacteria, while renewing the fertility of depleted farm land and producing crops in record time.

The tractor that pulls the plow generates electricity sent through steel blades into the earth.

Many a farmer will be interested in the statement that the use of this plow in a buckwheat field freed the land of quack-grass and weeds. The buckwheat seed germinated in 80 hours, and buckwheat plants grew twice as high as those in one-half the field that was ploughed without electricity, and fertilized with 200 pounds of fertilizer to the acre.

When time and money are applied to agriculture as they are now applied to industry, some of the farmers' troubles will vanish.

A special radio is constructed not to carry messages from the earth to Mars, but to let the engineers of a freight train a mile and a half long talk to the conductor, in a caboose, at the other end of the train. Caboose and engine connected in identical apparatus, transmitter, receiver, and double antenna.

SAYS PLANES MAY LAND IN SAFETY NOW

Jenkins Says He Has New Invention That Eliminates Fog and Mist Dangers.

Washington, July 26.—(AP)—Francis Jenkins, Washington, inventor of several airplane devices announced today that he had originated an apparatus to enable an aviator to make a safe landing in fog or mist.

It is the nature of an altimeter Mr. Jenkins said, which "makes known velocity of sound. The function of the instrument is to measure the time which is taken for sound to travel to earth and back. It consists of a tiny motor which first of all actuates a sound producing mechanism through which the sound is sent to the earth. It also operates a wheel spinning tiny light bulbs just behind the ground glass calibrated dial of the altimeter on the instrument board of the plane.

As the sound reaches a microphone attached to the plane, lamps are lighted back of the dial. The frequency of the sounds and the resultant echoes caught by the microphone are transformed into flashes of light and these flashes, appearing at various points on the calibrated dial furnish the guiding marks which tell the aviator whether he is five hundred or five feet above the ground.

Police Search For Portraits Stolen In N. Y.

New York, July 26.—(AP)—Police were today following a trail they believed might lead to Europe in their search for five 17th century miniature portraits on ivory stolen from the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

Theft of the objects was kept a secret for a week while detectives conducted a fruitless search. Warnings were sent to art dealers without result. The police fear now that the thieves will not attempt to dispose of their loot in this country but will try to sell them to dealers in Europe.

EIGHT CASES HEARD TODAY
