

OFFERS JACK \$300,000 TO MEET SHARKEY

Sharkey Says He is Ready To go Again If Battle Should Be Arranged.

Boston, July 27.—(AP)—A flat guarantee of \$300,000, or 40 per cent of the gate receipts has been offered to Jack Dempsey for a return battle with Jack Sharkey, by Tom Goodwin, matchmaker of the Suffolk A. A. of Boston. Goodwin, who made his offer in a telegram to Dempsey, feels that his offer is substantially better than any terms the former champion can make with Rickard for a bout with Tunney and that the difference of opinion concerning the events leading up to the knockout of Sharkey in the seventh round leaves plenty of room for another try.

Newton, Mass., July 27.—(AP)—"Of course I would!" was Jack Sharkey's answer when asked today if he would meet Jack Dempsey again if Tom Goodwin should succeed in his efforts to arrange a return bout.

"I'm always in condition for a fight," he said. "I am feeling fine now, although I was sick Saturday and Sunday. I am certain that I received no injury which would prevent my meeting Dempsey again."

Helen Wouldn't Be "Pro" Though Poor As Church Mouse

London.—(AP)—Professionalism in tennis bores Miss Helen Wills.

"If I were as poor as a church mouse I should not become a professional," Miss Wills asserted just before her departure for the United States.

"I cannot quite understand how anyone can play such a good game when he or she knows that the prize will be received whether the game is won or lost."

But Miss Suzanne Lenglen thinks differently. She is quite certain that "sport, professional or otherwise, does not spoil a woman's femininity."

"Far from it," was Miss Lenglen's reply to criticisms here that too much indulgence in athletics and sport was tending to make women masculine. The French champion appeared in London, professionally, just after the close of the Wimbledon tournament where Miss Wills won the women's championship.

Miss Lenglen did not agree that tennis makes thick ankles.

"So far as my experience goes," she said, "I have found tennis a most valuable aid to a perfect figure. I have never known any cases—either among amateur or professional players—where it has developed thick ankles."

"Every woman whose health permits ought to play some game or other. Even the risk of thick ankles is better than the risk of ill health. I have never known a woman yet whose femininity has been spoiled by sport."

CHURCH FOR DEAF
Chicago.—(AP)—Chicago has an Episcopal church where hymns are never sung and sermons never spoken. It is attended by 200 deaf and dumb parishioners. Rev. Always Wins More Than He Loses

St. Louis.—(AP)—Grover Cleveland Alexander, dean of National League hurlers and the fellow who did more than a little to bring the Cardinals their championship and world title last year, is the proud owner of at least one record seldom attained by major circuit hurlers.

Big Alex, now in his seventeenth big time campaign, has never finished a season without winning more games than he has lost. The feat is all the more noteworthy considering the fact that the veteran pitcher has been on but two pennant winners and for the most part performed with clubs far removed from the top.

Alexander made his major league debut with the Phillies in 1911. His start was auspicious, winning 28 games and losing 13. He stayed with the Phillies until 1918 when he was traded to the Cubs along with his battery-mate, Bill Killefer, for \$55,000 and players, Dillhoefer and Prendergast.

In the middle of the 1926 campaign, the Cubs, figuring they could get along without Alex, asked waivers on him. The Cards immediately grabbed him. Alexander given a new lease on life, turned out to be the ace in the Hornsby deck.

Alex has won 20 or more games on eight occasions. Three times he passed or reached the 30-victory class. Oddly enough, he turned them in in consecutive seasons, getting 31 in 1915, 33 in 1916 and 30 in 1917.

The nearest he came to spilling his record of chalking up more wins than losses during a season was in 1918 when he took part in but three games, winning two and losing one. In 1925 he hung up a mark of 1.22 earned runs per game, one of the best ever compiled in the old circuit. Three other times he allowed less than two earned tallies to the fracas.

Remarkable control has long been one of Alexander's biggest assets. He's been uncanny in his ability to shoot the ball over the plate just where he wants it.

In 1923 Grover issued but 30 passes in 39 games, pitching 305 innings. Twice in the last three seasons he has dished out less than 30 walks to the campaign, though

not being in as many frays as in 1923 when he established his premier performance.

Alexander has been in two world series, winning and losing one game while hurling for the Phillies against the Boston Red Sox in 1915 and gaining two victories in the Cardinals unexpected triumph over the Yankees last fall. He also saved the final game in the 1926 classic, striking out Lazzari with the bases full after taking the mound in relief role.

Alexander is 40 and has been playing professionally since 1909. He made his pro debut with Galesburg in the Illinois-Missouri league.

YANKEES WIN 3 IN A ROW FROM ST. LOUIS

The St. Louis Browns have yet to win a ball game from the Yankees this year. A crowd of 30,000 welcomed the American League champions on their return to New York yesterday and Miller Huggins' outfit replied with a broadside of hits that laid the Brown low in the two games. The Huggins took the opener by a 15-1 count and then bounded out 12-3 victory that gave additional weight to Owner Phil Ball's statement from St. Louis that his team was overworked with fading veterans and reconditioned players.

The Yankees have won thirteen games in succession from the St. Louis team.

Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig started their home run derby whirling again. The Bambino batted one of Gas slants out of the lot in the first inning of the opener and found another in the sixth to his liking. Ruth's two herculean wallop brought his season to 33 but Gehrig connected for his thirty-second in the wind-up contest.

Cleveland trimmed Boston 7-2. Both teams scored all their runs in the third inning. Ira Flagstead hit a homer with Myer on first. Shaute held the Red Sox to six hits.

The Athletics and Detroit Tigers split a doubleheader at Philadelphia. Detroit won the first game, 10-4, and the Mackmen the second 5-2. Fothergill and Manush hit for the circuit.

The Washington Senators returned to their home grounds and won a twin-bill from Chicago 5-1, and 6-5. The second game went 11 innings although the Senators out-hit their rivals 18-5.

Joe Judge collected five hits in six attempts in the night-cap Pittsburgh went into a tie with the Chicago Cubs for first place in the National League when they defeated Brooklyn 6-5. Max Carey starred for the Robins with three hits, three runs and three stolen bases but the rest of Uncle Wertz flock was somewhat dormant.

Joe Meadows went the route on the mound for the Bucs. Cincinnati made it four straight from the St. Louis Cardinals and increased their winning streak to six games by handing the world's champions the short end of a 11-10 count. The Reds are now only a half game behind Brooklyn which team holds fifth place. Bob McGraw was hit hard, Cincinnati getting six safeties in less than three innings. Dressen, Bressler and Pipp came through with timely hits for the Cincinnati cause.

18 Year Old Jockey Heads List Of Years Winners



LEE HARDY

Chicago.—(AP)—Less than a year ago Lee Hardy, Hoosier-bred jockey, won his first horse race. Today, still an 18 year old apprentice, he heads the list of 1927 race winners. He has ridden since January almost 150 horses which showed their heels to the field at the wire and he is leading for the year's jockey championship.

Hardy clinched fame by riding home ahead of the field at the Washington Park course, the longest shot that ever won a race in Illinois. He rose Blue Blood which paid \$365.10 to \$2 at the mutuels.

So rapidly has the demand for Hardy's services been accelerated by his performances that after he won on Blue Blood, C. E. Durnell paid \$16,000 to L. C. Everett for Hardy's contract. Hardy has until August 23 to ride as an apprentice. He won his first race on that day a year ago.

The diminutive youngster started racing only two years ago. He had had luck in his early efforts, but he rode a winner in Montreal last August and in the remaining four months of the year brought home 129 horses in the money.

Hardy is one of ten children. He has a twin brother back on the farm near Lexington, Ind. His earnings help to support the family, which is fatherless.

Kippax stressed the number of good batsmen who are wretched fielders and said that every cricketer who plays baseball is excellent in the field.

London.—(AP)—Round the world in 120 days is the air of S. T. Glanfield and Flight Sergeant Sparks, who have started off on two motorcycles with side-cars.

The side-cars will be used as beds on the journey of about 15,000 miles through Germany, Australia, Jugo-Slavia, Constantinople, the Syrian Desert, Basra, Bombay, the Straits Settlements, Austria and across the United States.

BAN JOHNSON RECALLS FIRST BIG BALL GAME

Chicago, July 27.—(AP)—In the twilight of his baseball career, Ban Johnson today recalled the only major league game in which he ever participated as a player, 47 years ago.

Johnson was a catcher and his team, representing Oberlin College, defeated the Cleveland Nationals in 1880, 2 to 0.

"We had a strapping big negro, Davis, pitching," Johnson said, "and I caught him, with no mask, chest protector or shin guards. Davis surely had a wicked inshoot and after the game I soaked my catching hand in hot salt waters for hours."

"That was before the days of the modern catcher's glove and I padded up my fingers with for the game, but not enough it seemed. Davis, six feet tall, had a blacksmith from St. Louis."

Ban was then in his 15th year and a freshman at Oberlin. Two years later he entered Marietta College, the Alma Mater of vice-President Dawes.

It was there that his real affection for the diamond developed and he said today that he had promised to go there for the dedication of the new athletic field this fall.

"I played at second, besides catching at Marietta, but I remember best the dormitory windows I used to knock out with home runs."

"My mother objected strenuously to my playing so I could never take my suit home to wash it. I remember one game when I got razzed for being the only Marietta player in a dirty suit but after I got a couple of long drives, they forgot the soiled uniform."

Johnson's first efforts at building up ball parks he said, was at Marietta, where he headed the student organization which raised funds to build Marietta College's first diamond and grandstand.

Johnson laughed as he recalled a story told him by the vice-President about that first ball park.

"You are the only man who was ever able to talk my father out of such a donation," Mr. Dawes told Johnson. "My father subscribed \$150 and no one else was ever able to win him over like that."

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Dreyfus Would Plead Cause of Doomed Italians

Paris, July 27.—(AP)—Alfred Dreyfus, who was the central figure in one of the world's most famous criminal prosecutions in the early nineties, has accepted an invitation to be a member of a committee to go to America to plead the cause of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, under sentence of death for murder in Massachusetts.

Major Dreyfus served four years in the French penal colony of Devil's Island on conviction of treason of which he was exonerated later.

Lindbergh Ends New England Tour

Springfield, Vt., July 27.—(AP)—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh completed his tour of New England today and hoped off from here for Albany, N. Y., at 10:20 a. m. Eastern Standard Time. He flew over Plymouth, Vt., President Coolidge's home town, before crossing the New York state line.

Carelessness and recklessness are boon companions of the grim reaper and with the aid of either the result is inevitable.

A REAL STATE FAIR

Raleigh citizens at the polls yesterday voted a bond issue to make possible the resumption of the North Carolina State Fair. No state can be considered wide-awake that does not have a state fair, and the capital city is the logical place for it to be held. Raleigh citizens by their favorable action yesterday, have made the fact known that they are up with the times and are keeping step with the state's progress.

Now if every citizen in the state who has anything suitable for display at a fair will see to it that his wares are on exhibition at the next fair, North Carolina will have a real state fair.

NO LONGER EQUAL

Declaring that equal justice in the courts of North Carolina is apparently a thing of the past, the wealth and standing of the defendant having much to do toward lessening the sentence, the Gastonia Gazette with reference to a recent Mecklenburg case, says:

"We can but wonder what the sentence would have been had Conley Robinson, Charlotte lawyer, been an ordinary man."

"He forced his way into a man's home and attempted to shoot him with a pistol a few weeks ago. His case came up for trial in Mecklenburg county this week and Judge Webb was instrumental in having the charge reduced to one of less severity and he drew a paltry fine of \$50 and costs. Robinson is no better than any other defendant who is in the courts of the land, and such actions as this tend to disgust us all with the futility of obtaining justice any more. Courts have been held in solemn and sacred regard by the citizenship of this country, but the time is here when money and pull will rescue any one from any sort of a predicament and the courts are a huge joke as far as obtaining real and unbiased justice are concerned."

"It makes no difference, we suppose, whether Robinson was punished or not, but why not measure all defendants by the same yardstick? Why was it so terrible for Conley Robinson to lose his citizenship and his law license if convicted of the felony of which he was,

without any doubt, guilty? There are scores of defendants in our courts who would like to retain their citizenship, too, and why discriminate in favor of one?"

"These are questions the people would like to have answered when the lawyers and judges begin to rant and rave on the 'sacredness of the law,' and infallibility of the 'smooth, even-handed administration of justice.'"

"Our courts are coming to be farces and there ought to be no great mystery about the rapid increase in crime and immorality."

FARM HINTS

The proper length of time that a cow should be dry depends on the quantity of milk she has produced and on her condition of flesh. Cows of low or medium production should be dry a month or six weeks. High producers require a longer dry period.

Chestnuts killed by blight is being replaced naturally by oak to a large extent. The chestnut trees are doomed and stands running heavily to chestnut should be almost clear cut to accelerate growth of other species. Seed trees of other valuable types should be left to restock the area.

The 22,000,000 dairy cows in this country, with an estimated average production of 4,500 pounds of milk annually, are better and more economical producers than they were a few years ago. During the last eight years there has been an increase of 800 pounds of milk per cow.

In a locality where there is a market for wood for handle stocks ash, beech, birch, hickory, sugar maple and white oak are the best trees to conserve or replant in the farm woodland.

Some kinds of meat food for hens is desirable for maximum egg production and also to keep the birds in good condition. Most of the staple grains do not fully supply the protein requirements of the hen. For this reason meat scraps generally are used in the dry or wet mash rations. Milk in some form while not entirely taking the place of meat provides part of the necessary protein and is good supplement to the regular diet.

Nearly all diseases or disorders of calves are caused by lack of cleanliness. Buckets in which the calves are fed and also the pens in which they are kept always should be scrupulously clean.

Preacher's Wife
Commits Suicide

Memphis, Tenn., July 27.—(AP)—Mrs. Ella Armstrong, wife of the Rev. W. W. Armstrong, pastor of the Galloway Memorial Methodist Church, was found dead in the gas filled bathroom of her home early today and the Rev. Mr. Armstrong, who was found beside her, was taken to a hospital in a serious condition.

The police report listed Mrs. Armstrong's death as suicide and said the minister was overcome in trying to drag her from the room. She was 55 years old and her husband 56.

Mr. Armstrong's fear of an impending surgical operation was shared by Mrs. H. M. Wilson, a daughter, for the tragedy.

Queen Marie To
Visit America

Bucharest, Rumania, July 27.—(AP)—Queen Marie has decided to visit the United States again. She hopes to start soon after her period of mourning for King Ferdinand is over, she told the correspondent for The Associated Press today.

In a conversation with the correspondent the Queen who is gradually recovering from the first shock of Ferdinand's death said that she wishes to travel next time as a private person so that she could go where she pleased, do as she wanted, not be burdened to the State and municipal authorities and avoid quarrels among her followers.

"There are thousand and one things I omitted seeing on my last journey and legions of people I failed to meet," Queen Marie said. "I want to see one of your great national political conventions and if time and my duties permit next summer it is possible that I shall be able to leave here in time to see such a gathering."

Raleigh, N. C., July 27.—(AP)—With the second annual hog calling contest, attracting a record noon crowd, in front of Pullen Hall State College, various divisions of the North Carolina farmers' and farm women's convention swung into its second day's activities.

Meanwhile the convention authorized C. F. Cates of Mebane, president, to name a committee to demand that the State tax commission, recently appointed by Governor McLean, keep the farmer ever in mind in considering its problems of taxation.

The big question of the hour, Josephus Daniels, publisher of the Raleigh News and Observer, told the convention is taxation because of a changing civilization bringing about changes in property ownership and the big job of the newly appointed commission was to make provision for taking of all revenue producing property in proportion to its revenue.

While fifty years ago all property practically was visible and could be listed on the tax books without difficulty because it was tangible, today property was represented not simply by land but by stocks and bonds, by mortgages and deeds, and evidence of ownership of property could be hid away in a safe, he said.

The tax commission has not a single farmer member, he reminded the convention. A movement is on foot to exempt revenue producing property from taxation and to impose still further tax burdens upon land.

In the noontime hog-calling contest, volume, variety, excitement, musical quality, and facial expression were taken into consideration. Winners last year were J. C. Nichols, Dufham, J. H. Sprinkle, Winston-Salem, and H. G. Ounday, Elizabeth City for first, second, and third prizes respectively.

Agronomy was discussed by E. G. Moss, Granville County, W. T. Moss, Franklin, M. L. Adderholt, Davidson, Dr. W. J. McLendon, Anson, and C. B. Williams, of State College.

Animal husbandry, horticulture, poultry, forestry, all had their places on today's program while tonight Mrs. Harry A. Burnham, chairman, division of homemaking, General Federation of Women's Club, and Fred Breckham, representative of the National Grange, had places on the joint session program.

The farmers visited horticultural exhibits.

Crops Reported
Making Progress

Washington, July 27.—(AP)—Weather conditions for the week ended yesterday as summarized by the Department of Agriculture says that in the Southeast, frequent rains interfered with cultivation and favored insect activity in cotton, but at the same time crops made good progress.

In the cotton belt, temps were mostly moderate and showers were general, but rather irregularly distributed. In the Atlantic Coast States plants made good to excellent growth, but the frequent rains promoted weevil activity and hindered cultivation, especially in Georgia where the general condition of the crop continues mostly

good to excellent, weevil have become numerous in many places with damage increasing rapidly in some sections, especially through the central portion of South Carolina and in Georgia.

In Tennessee progress was excel-

lent in some counties but only fair in others and was mostly fair in Mississippi with increased weevil activity.

In Oklahoma, the progress of cotton was generally fair to very good with weevil general in central and eastern portion but only locally destructive. In Texas condition and advance of the crop were spotted averaging only fairly good.

Condition by States included Virginia: Good progress in all growing crops under very favorable conditions. Cotton and peanuts improved and condition fair to good. N. C. growth of cotton good to excellent; weevil in several additional counties and complaints of increasing. Other growing crops doing well.

Tennessee: Condition of cotton excellent in some counties and fair. Tobacco growing well.

STOCK MARKET

New York, July 27.—(AP)—Responding to the excellent 1.11 yearly reports of the country's two leading industrial corporations—General Motors and United States Steel—stock prices surged upward to new high ground today under heavy buying for both accounts. Early gains ran one to 9 points with more than a score issues at new peak prices.

General Motors, which earned \$14.35 a share in the first six months of the year, was in the forefront of the advance, attaining a new peak of 277 for the present stock.

U. S. Steel of which DuPont interests are reported to have been heavy buyers during the last few months, also moved up to the highest price since the distribution of the stock dividend. DuPont reached new high ground above \$271 a share.

Nash Motors climbed over four points to a new peak and Chrysler and Mack Trucks climbed more than 2 points each. Pierce Arrow pld sank to a new low, below \$50.00 a share.

The closing was strong. The favorable character of the weekly steel reviews and reduction of the call money rate to 3-1/2 per cent from the 3-3/4 renewal rate helped to maintain bullish enthusiasm in the last hour. There was some profit taking at times but offerings were continued to move into new high well absorbed and several stocks territory including Radio, General Electric, Atlantic Coast Line and Baldwin. Total sales approximated 1,800,000 shares.

Combined with the moonlight, soft colored lights placed on the beach show that the bathers are wearing the very latest costumes designed by the big couturiers in Paris. French doctors all agree that these midnight baths are conducive to the best of health and even certain cure for certain diseases. If Madame le Seigne were to return, she would have plenty to write about in these days of midnight bathing. Years ago, she sang the praises of sea-baths, unknown before her days as a remedy for rashes. Fortunately, Pasteur found a letter one.

"The Paris Season" has now grown to be something that goes on forever. Formerly, in a fashionable sense, it ended with the Grand Prix and everybody that was somebody packed up and hurried away to the seaside, mountains or country. Dancing ceased and theatre audiences thinned out and every house showed long rows of closed shutters. The automobile has done much to keep people in Paris throughout the summer which they spend taking week-end trips to Deauville, Le Touquet, La Baule or any one of the many holiday resorts which have grown to be Parisian suburbs.

Then too, there is an ever-increasing tendency to make the city attractive to the many foreigners who come during the warm season, for after all, they would never understand Paris' "season."

"I just wanted it for luck," declared Madame Leonie Launio when she admitted recently that she took a piece of a dead woman's skull-bone soon after she had committed suicide. A railway line across the Sahara Desert which would unite French Algeria, Tunis and Morocco to the French Sudan, Senegal, Nigeria and the Congo is being urged upon the government by one of the Deputies. It is believed that the colonies could invest a great part of the money required, in order to aid in their commercial development. Railway engineers are reported to consider it an easy matter to lay rails over three-quarters of the route, once the Atlas Mountains are crossed. A new mode of trans-Atlantic travel was tried out on the Seine River recently, near the Pont de Suresnes.
