FULLER STILL
PROBING CASE
OF ITALIANS

Governor Today Has Before Him Advisory Committee of Sacca-Vanzetti Case

Boston, July 28.—(AP)—Governor Alvan T. Fuller, was believed to have before him today either in whole or in part the advisory committee which he named to investigate the Sacco-Vanzetti case.

An announced visit of three members of the committee, president A. Lawrence Lowell of Harvard, president Samuel Stratton of Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Robert Grant, former probate judge to the state house was interrupted by newspapermen here who have been in close touch with the proceedings to indicate a decision had been reached.

Each carried thick brown folder when he entered but none was so burdened when he quit the chamber after less than 15 minutes conference. The committee members were all reticent. The governor declined to reveal the nature of the visit. But it was known that although the advisory body apparently had concluded its work the governor's independent investigation was not yet finished.

Having received a long list of witnesses, including many who testified for both state and defense at the trial six years ago, and having interviewed the jury members who found the two men guilty of double murder at South Braintree of paymaster and guard the governor still has further evidence to pursue.

Expects Shake-Up
In Dry Forces

Charlotte, July 28.—(AP)—That a shake-up in federal dry forces will come with the resignation of General Lincoln C. Andrews, scheduled to take effect August 1, is being predicted freely at prohibition headquarters here and the forces under deputy administrator Ben C. Sharp, of the Western North Carolina district, admittedly are "marking time" until Dr. J. M. Dean, new commissioner, takes office.

The "marking time" process, they were careful to stress, does not imply any letting up in their war on liquor manufacturers and vendors, but they feel that with a new national prohibition head there likely will develop some variations in the service.

Reports that R. Q. Merrick, prohibition administrator for North Carolina and Virginia, may be transferred to another district have been current here, but no comment on this possibility was made by Mr. Sharp.

DAWES WITNESSES

"DIVINE" TRICK BY NEGRO MAGICIAN
Memphis, July 28.—(AP)—Vice-President Dawes, during a short stopover in Memphis today witnessed a "divine" trick performed by a negro car repairer for the benefit of the Vice-President, and at the expense to him of a new hand-embroidered handkerchief.

William Watson, the negro magician claims that who was a boy he had a vision from heaven and that he became endowed with the power to blow his breath on any object and set it afire. The party was taken to the office of Clyde Mays, general superintendent of the Illinois Central railroad and Watson came forward.

He asked for a handkerchief and Mr. Dawes let him have one with the remark—"Well, I'll never see it again." Watson, true to his promise blew his breath on it and after a few mysterious puffs the handkerchief caught fire. Watson repeated the trick several times while the Vice-President puffed away at his underslung pipe.

SAY FINANCES
OF WILKES IN
BAD CONDITION

Audit Now in Process Expected to Show County Affairs in a Muddle.

Winston-Salem, July 28.—(AP)—The announced purpose of Solicitor John R. Jones, to send bills of indictment against seven Wilkes County officials has turned the county affairs into the limelight of public interest and rumors and counter rumors of matters in connection with the finances of Wilkes have all but overshadowed the broken condition of the Bank of Wilkes, which held \$300,000 deposits or thereabouts, including \$100,000 of the county's money, according to a press report received here from Wilkesboro.

That the county's affairs in certain departments are somewhat muddled, the audit now in process may show when it is fully completed, it is indicated. Reports in circulation that some of the deputy sheriffs of Wilkes, who were employed for tax work, had deposited funds in their own names in the savings department of the now defunct Bank of Wilkes and had drawn the interest on such funds themselves and had used it for their own benefit, had the citizens of the county considerably excited.

WITHDRAW
RESOLUTION

Bertie County Officials Rescind Protest Against Partial Equilization.

Raleigh, July 28.—(AP)—N. B. Gilliam, chairman of the Bertie County Board of Education and Herbert W. Early, superintendent of schools, the same county, have withdrawn Bertie's resolution of July 14, in which the county protested against alleged partial equilization of property valuation on part of the State Board of Equalization.

Leroy Martin, State Board Secretary had a joint letter from the two officials today, rescinding action of the county's representatives at the time of the opening hearing before the board. The two officials said the resolution was unwarranted and unauthorized.

More County has taken the same rescinding action, Mr. Martin said, and added that virtually all county officials are co-operating with the State Board.

Mr. Martin today sent to the registers of deeds in all counties word that abstracts of taxables must be filled out later and asked information as to the number of acres of cleared land, in pasture, water, in timber, cut over and land acres of land, mineral, quarry and water-power in conformity with the valuation record of April 25.

Believes Inmates
Of Prison Should
Make Auto Plates

Raleigh, July 28.—(AP)—Making of automobile license plates by inmates of state prison is the vision of George Ross Pou, state prison superintendent.

He said today that material for the making could be purchased for \$28,000, that the prisoners could make the license plates for four cents a plate, saving the state 7-10 of a cent on each plate, making a material saving on the average of 500,000 plates contracted for yearly.

Frank Page, State Highway Commissioner, today endorsed the proposition of the prison superintendent.

Making of plates would bring about the seventh industry under taken by prisoners. The six prison industries last year cleared \$50,000.

LINDBERGH FLYING
OVER NEW YORK STATE

Albany, N. Y., July 28.—(AP)—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh said goodbye to Albany this morning and then in his "Spirit of St. Louis" headed up the Hudson valley to save hello to several other cities and towns.

PITT GROWERS
INTERESTED IN
SOYBEAN MEET

Delegation to Attend Session of American Association at Washington, N. C.

A delegation of planters from Pitt county will attend the eighth annual convention of the American Soybean Association to be held at Washington, N. C., August 9-10 and 11th, according to an announcement made this morning by members of the Pitt county Department of Agriculture.

This is the first time the national association of bean growers has ever met in the southland, and farmers of this section of the country are today being impressed with the importance of the gathering upon this section of the state which it so vitally affects. Heretofore the association has held its meetings in northern states, members of the Pitt agricultural department stated today, and its coming to Eastern North Carolina is indicative of the importance of this section in the soybean industry.

Officers of the association are: Fred P. Latham, Belhaven, president; Taylor Fouts, Camden, N. C., vice-president; W. E. Ayers, Stoneville, Miss., secretary-treasurer. Association headquarters and office of the president are at Belhaven, N. C.

The highlights of the first day's program include an address of welcome by Congressman Lindsay C. Warren, of Washington and a response by Harry Clapp, president of the Crop Improvement association. Addresses will be made by David Coker, plant breeder, Hartsville, S. C., and W. J. Morse, of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Wednesday morning at eight o'clock a trip will be made through Beaufort and Hyde counties on a tour of inspection. A community picnic luncheon will be given at Swan Quarter at the noon hour. Hon. John H. Small, of Washington, D. C., will deliver the principal address at one o'clock. The party will then go to Bayview and from there to Washington.

Wednesday will feature moving pictures of the soybean industry in China, and an address dealing with the soybean and pork production by Prof. E. Z. Russell, of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Thursday a trip will be made by auto of tobacco, peanut and soybean growing section, the tour ending at Elizabeth City. Demonstration of soybean harvesters, tour of soybean fields, and two addresses will conclude the program.

INFANTILE PARALYSIS
REPORTED IN STATE

Raleigh, N. C., July 28.—(AP)—Infantile paralysis made its presence known in the State again Wednesday, the State Board of Health announced today. It was the first case reported since January.

Linwood Smith, 134 North Broad Street, Winston-Salem, was the person named as having contracted the dread disease, which, health board officials say, is more dangerous from a morbidity rather than from a mortality standpoint.

During 1926, there developed in North Carolina 112 cases of the disease.

SAYS INDICATIONS
POINT TO FAILURE
OF NAVAL CANFAR

Geneva, July 28.—(AP)—Agreement was reached by the tripartite naval conference at the meeting this afternoon and the Japanese spokesman expressed the opinion to The Associated Press that the plenary session convened for Monday will probably be the last. The spokesman said indications are that the conference will fail.

The Japanese spokesman said that the British and American viewpoints on the problem of 8-inch gun cruisers would be extremely difficult to reconcile. He added that this would be the real cause of the rupture if a rupture came.

Robbers Extract
Undetermined Sum
Greensboro, N. C.

Greensboro, N. C., July 28.—(AP)—An undetermined amount of currency was stolen last night by robbers operating in the King Cotton Hotel. The rooms of several guests were entered and the robbers confined their thefts to money.

Hotel authorities and police officers were investigating the case this morning. It appeared that a number of rooms on the same floor were entered, the intruders leaving no clues to the methods they used in opening the doors. It was suggested that perhaps some of the guests left their doors unlocked and in each case, guests reported, their clothes and other valuables were entrance was gained in this manner. Left alone, the robbers centring their efforts on pocketbooks and loose currency. The amount lost had not been determined this morning.

Police have investigated the robbery and have found that about \$350 was stolen. It is believed that it was the same crowd of thieves that last week pulled a similar stunt in a Charlotte hotel.

Raleigh, July 28.—(AP)—With election of officers and adoption of resolutions, the state farmers convention adjourned its 25th annual session today.

The convention adopted the agricultural program presented by Dr. E. C. EVANGELIST
AND MOTHER
NEAR BREAK

Crisis Draws Near in Argument of Aimee Semple McPherson and Mrs. Kennedy.

Los Angeles, July 28.—(AP)—Aimee Semple McPherson, was asked today by Dr. Gladwyn Nichols, self-exiled leader of a large group of seceders from Aimee Semple to reopen her famous kidnapping trial and hold it this time before a court composed of members of the temple.

Los Angeles, July 28.—(AP)—The walls of Angelus Temple echoed anew with discord today as Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, mother of Aimee Semple McPherson, the pastor warned that "a crisis is nigh," in the dispute between the two women leaders.

Four alternative futures of "Mother Kennedy" were held out by the committee appointed by her daughter. They offered to permit Mrs. Kennedy to remain at the temple as "the Evangelist's mother," or to permit her to tour the world or visit the Holy Land at the church's expense. They suggested that she might carry on religious work in other fields if she liked. In conclusion the committee suggested that Mrs. Kennedy return to her "wealthy husband, W. Whittebeck, who is a well-to-do engineer on a big Hudson River liner."

This last, like the three other proposals, struck no favorable note with Mrs. Kennedy. Although there have been reports from time to time that Mrs. Kennedy had married since her first husband died, the statement by her daughter's committee was the first announcement that had been made regarding it.

Mrs. Kennedy said she was not divorced from Wittebeck but that she had no intention of making her home with him.

"The crisis could have been avoided," said Mrs. Kennedy, "when I attempted to hold a conference with Mrs. McPherson."

She said she had called her daughter on the telephone yesterday only to have the receiver hung up before she could say a word.

The evangelist had a different version of the affair.

"Mother used language that I could not bear others to hear if they were listening in on our party line," Mrs. McPherson said. "I tried to tell her that it would be ruinful for us if her language to her daughter was heard by others. I hung up waiting for five minutes until she had cooled off and then called her again."

Mrs. Kennedy denied her daughter had called her the second time. "That statement is untrue," she declared. "I did not use any but the best language at my command, and my daughter did not call me again."

The row between mother and daughter threatened to involve questions surrounding Mrs. McPherson's story of kidnapping. Mrs. Kennedy told reporters how she had defended her daughter when the evangelist was under fire at that case declared she had taken blame for the temple pastor and stood shoulder to shoulder with her daughter. She denied vehemently a published report that she had doubted the evangelist's story.

NURSE FOUND
NOT GUILTY IN
MURDER CASE

Mrs. Mitchell Acquitted of Charge of Killing Mrs. Clay, This Morning.

Asheville, July 28.—(AP)—Mrs. Mildred Mitchell, graduate nurse accused of murdering Mrs. Sue E. Clay May 14th in a drunken fight over a man, walked from the Buncombe County courtroom Thursday afternoon, a free woman.

The jury returned its verdict of not guilty at 12:55 o'clock after deliberating for 55 minutes. As the verdict was read out, the courtroom crowd broke into applause. The defendant showed no emotion as she was acquitted. She walked over to the jurors and shook the hand of each, thanked Judge Nunn, who presided over the trial, and then thanked her attorney, Robert Reynolds, and the prosecution counsel.

Asheville July 28.—(AP)—The case of Mrs. Mildred Mitchell, graduate nurse charged with the murder of Mrs. Sue E. Clay, for a second time was placed in the hands of a Buncombe county jury shortly before noon today.

Closing argument in the case was made by solicitor Robert M. Wells, on the opening of court this morning. The solicitor spoke for slightly more than one hour. Judge Nunn's charge occupied over an hour.

The state asked for a verdict of second degree murder. The case ended in a mistrial the first time it was tried when the jurors failed to agree, standing eight to four for acquittal.

Conflicting stories of the manner in which Mrs. Clay met her death have been told during the two trials by Mrs. Mitchell and W. N. Babb Muir, the state's star witness. Muir swore Mrs. Clay was fatally injured in a fight with Mrs. Mitchell over him. Mrs. Mitchell swore Mrs. Clay received the injuries that resulted in her death when she jumped from Muir's car after he had refused her pleas to drive faster.

Mrs. Clay was injured the night of May 14. She, Mrs. Mitchell and Bryan English, had gone for a drive with Muir. The ride turned out to be a liquor party and all the occupants of the car became intoxicated. It was in the course of this party on the Hendersonville highway not far from Asheville that Mrs. Clay was injured. She was taken to Billmore hospital and died 3 days later.

Mrs. Mitchell has been in jail ever since. Muir is now under a \$1,000 bond for prostitution, driving while intoxicated, and transporting liquor. Other charges may be preferred against him if he is intimidated.

Frank Grist To
Meet Printers
At Asheville

Raleigh, N. C., July 28.—(AP)—In an effort to come to an understanding with the militant printers, Frank D. Grist, State Commissioner of Labor and Printing, went to Asheville today to meet printers. Commissioner Grist conferred here Wednesday with several of the printers, who did part of the State printing last biennium, and proposed that the printers continue working under the old contracts until the State Printing Commission and printers reach an understanding. Printers took no action on the proposal.

The Observer Printing House, Charlotte, has agreed to do part of the State printing until August 1 under the old contract, but the other contract holders refused to do any work on the old scale. Consequently, State printing has been done here and there over the State and has caused much dissatisfaction in several departments because of the delay in getting the printing done.

The State's printing contracts, which aggregate around \$500,000 for the ensuing biennium, are still unsettled because the printing commission refused to accept the increased bids of the bidding printers.

OAKLAND TO ERECT BRONZE
MEMORIAL ON THE SPOT
HAWAII FLIERS STARTED

Oakland.—(INS)—A memorial of the first non-stop flight from the United States to Honolulu will be erected on the spot where Lieutenant Maitland and Hegenberger took off in their giant army Fokker on June 28, it was learned today.

The Oakland port commission controlling the municipal airport whence the army birdmen hopped off for Hawaii, unanimously approved erection of a bronze, palace or tablet honoring the Pacific pioneers.

It may surprise those that dread Bolshevism to learn that in dealing with outside capitalists Bolshevism keeps its bargains to the letter.

PROBE DEATH
OF O. W. LANE

Family of Man Killed On Road Near Mayesville, to Employ Private Agencies.

New Bern, N. C., July 28.—(AP)—A reward of \$1,000 has been offered by Wilson H. Lee, administrator and the family for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the parties responsible for the death last Friday night of O. W. Lane, New Bern banker.

Lane's body with a bullet through the head, was found seated at the steering wheel of his automobile near Mayesville, Jones County, early Saturday. A coroner's jury held that Lane's death was caused by gunshot wounds inflicted at the hands of unknown parties.

An investigation, it was revealed, has been going on through this week in an effort to place the responsibility for the death. But announcement of the reward was not made until today.

Notice of the reward, appearing in a local afternoon paper is signed by Wilson H. Lee, administrator, and W. B. Valdes and P. W. Menzies, brother-in-law of the dead man.

Wilmington, N. C., July 28.—(AP)—While Jones County officials continue to declare themselves mystified in the shooting to death of a road near Mayesville several days ago of O. W. Lane, New Bern banker, the family of the dead man, refusing to countenance a theory of suicide advanced in some quarters, plan employment of private agencies to investigate the killing, it was learned today.

There have been no arrests in connection with the slaying and Dr. J. C. Tish, acting Jones County coroner, said today that as far as he knew there would be none. He is "without knowledge or suspicion" as to the parties responsible for the death, he said.

A coroner's jury returned a verdict that Lane, who was well known in State banking circles, was slain by "parties unknown to the jury." Lane's body was found in his automobile on a lonely road, with a bullet wound through the head and a pistol on his lap.

GANG LEADER
SENTENCED TO
HANG OCT. 15

Charles Birger to Pay With Life For Murder of Mayor Joe Adams.

Benton, Ill., July 28.—(AP)—Charles Birger, condemned gang leader made his last effort to avoid the hangman in the county where he was convicted and sentenced to death for the murder of Mayor Joe Adams of West City, Ill.

After hearing himself describe by Circuit Court Judge Miller as a man who "became intoxicated with the idea that you are more powerful than all the laws of this state and community," Birger, in a last effort to maintain his innocence, talked for the first time in open court, flinging accusations at Art Newman, his former lieutenant.

The court had finished a lecture to the condemned man after formally sentencing him to be hanged October 15.

"Your position is unique," Judge Miller told the gangster. "You so far forgot yourself as to do many things and then set yourself up as a lawbreaker."

"You surrounded me with men and the fact that when you appeared on the scene, the Clanton blew to announce your arrival to your lieutenants. You became a character in the community where you lived. The youth of the various counties assembled to watch your dexterity with your pistols."

"You had a glamour about you that youths tried to imitate, you were a man of many impulses. Some of them were for the best, but most of them were otherwise. Charles Birger, the law has overtaken you, but now you must and should realize that you owe something to your children. The only way you can repair your deeds is by co-operating with the authorities and assisting them in clearing up some of the mysteries and crimes of Southern Illinois gang warfare."

Listening attentively while the court addressed him, Birger began with "I'd like to say a few words." He denied he was the leader of a band of gangsters which had carried on unremitting warfare with the rival Shelton gang.

"I don't want to go down in history as a chief," he said. "It was never in my heart to kill anybody." He pointed to a St. Louis reporter and said: "There's a man that came to my house. Him and Newman conspired and condemned me to hang."

Referring to his former lieutenant Newman, the gangster declared "There is the man who is responsible for Mrs. Price's death." Mrs. Price and her husband, Lory Price, state highway patrolman, were both murdered. It was charged by Newman, by members of the Birger gang.

His only recourse will be to the Illinois Supreme Court, counsel for the condemned man, stated that an appeal would be made.

Edward To Serve
Warrants In Case
Of J. H. Needleman

Raleigh, July 28.—(AP)—W. P. Edward, United States Deputy Marshal, of Rocky Mount, left today to serve warrants on the 30-odd Martin county defendants against whom Joseph H. Needleman, of Philadelphia, Pa., is bringing suit in federal district court, Washington, N. C., for \$100,000 damages as a result of the 1925 mutilation masked mob case.

Answers must be filed by the defendants within 20 days in district court where Needleman has just filed his petition for \$75,000 compensatory and \$25,000 punitive damages as result of the mutilation of his person, following a charge of attacking a Martin County girl, of which charge Needleman was later acquitted.

Three injured when "skeeter" hits motor car near Greensboro. Greensboro, N. C., July 28.—(AP)—Three persons, one white man and two negroes, section hands of the Atlantic and Yadkin R. R., were injured about 7:30 this morning when the motor car in which they were proceeding toward Greensboro was knocked from the tracks by a small "skeeter," occupied by two Pleasant Garden men, whose identity could not be learned.

E. K. McArthur, of Pleasant Garden, foreman of the section crew, was brought to the Wesley Long Hospital in an ambulance, bleeding profusely from deep gashes on the back of his head. It was stated at the hospital that this scalp wound was believed to be his only injury of any consequence. At first it was feared that his skull might have been fractured but, although an X-ray had not been taken, hospital attaches did not think this was true.

GEHRIG AND RUTH TIED IN HOMER RACE

The advance of the Cincinnati Reds from the National League cellar found the team in fifth place today. Jack Hendrix's team was stopped by the Boston Braves yesterday after having won six in a row but the Reds came back to take the windup of the doubleheader by a 5-2 score. Kent Greenfield traded to Boston by John McGraw, got a 7-2 decision in the first game.

Boston scored all its runs in the fourth inning. The Giants marched into Chicago and set the Cubs back 6-4. The convention of fifty-odd "alimony alumni" who want protection against gold digging grass-widows may get little public sympathy, but there is evidence tending to show that the lot of some of them is rather trying. For example, there is that Cleveland gold-digger who assured the Court that the \$24,000 a year her ex-husband pays her is absurdly inadequate, and that he added insult to injury by declining to give her extra \$4,000 speedboat, a \$12,000 automobile and a suitable home on Long Island.

It is gratifying to know that five persons have been convicted of crimes charged in connection with the murder of Don R. Mellett, publisher of the Canton, Ohio, News, and that four of them, including the deposed chief of police, a former patrolman, a hardware merchant, and a hired gunman, have been sentenced to life imprisonment. There would be fewer murders if, in spite of the efforts of criminal lawyers, there were more of such effective action by the courts.

NEW YORK AND THE FIGHT

One hopes that Mr. Tex Rickard will reconsider his reported plan of holding the Dempsey-Tunney fight in Philadelphia or Chicago. New York wants badly to see it, and New York has

claims to it which cannot be lightly disregarded. To begin with, it is New York which gives Mr. Rickard and his Madison Square Garden such generous profits the whole year round. Again, it is New York which has supported the bouts preliminary to the championship engagement, bouts which have yielded large financial returns and which have contributed in no small measure to the arousing of interest in September's fight. After the city has been so generous in regard to the minor fights, it seems like a rather shabby reward to take the big fight somewhere else. Furthermore, it is doubtful whether Chicago or Philadelphia would yield more money than New York. 'Soldiers' Field, in Chicago, it is said, can seat 175,000 persons; the Sesqui-centennial Stadium in Philadelphia, 125,000 to 135,000. But at the \$50 top said to be contemplated, and the other seats priced in proportion, can Mr. Rickard hope to fill either of these arenas? One doubts. Yankee Stadium will hold 80,000 persons, and one has a suspicion these are all that will attend at the rates quoted. Even these would yield a gate considerably in excess of \$2,000,000; that ought to be enough to satisfy even Mr. Rickard. For the sake of doing the fair thing by New York he

could, at a pinch, pass up a few extra dollars.—N. Y. World.

Mr. Carpenter was a brother of K. J. Carpenter, commander of the Rutherfordton Confederate veterans and had attended many State and Southern reunions and taken an active part in the organization's work.

Surviving him are his widow and five children.

BLOODHOUNDS USED IN TRACKING THIEVES

Black Mountain, N. C., July 28.—(AP)—Buncombe County officer and bloodhounds from Asheville, were on the trail here Thursday of thieves who entered C. W. Cooper's candy shop during the night breaking the lock on the front door of the store, and who escaped with \$200 worth of merchandise, mostly cigarettes and fountain pens.

Tracks discovered early Thursday leading from the door of the shop showed that two men probably took part in the theft, investigating officers stated, and the dogs started off strongly. It was believed that arrests would be made before night.

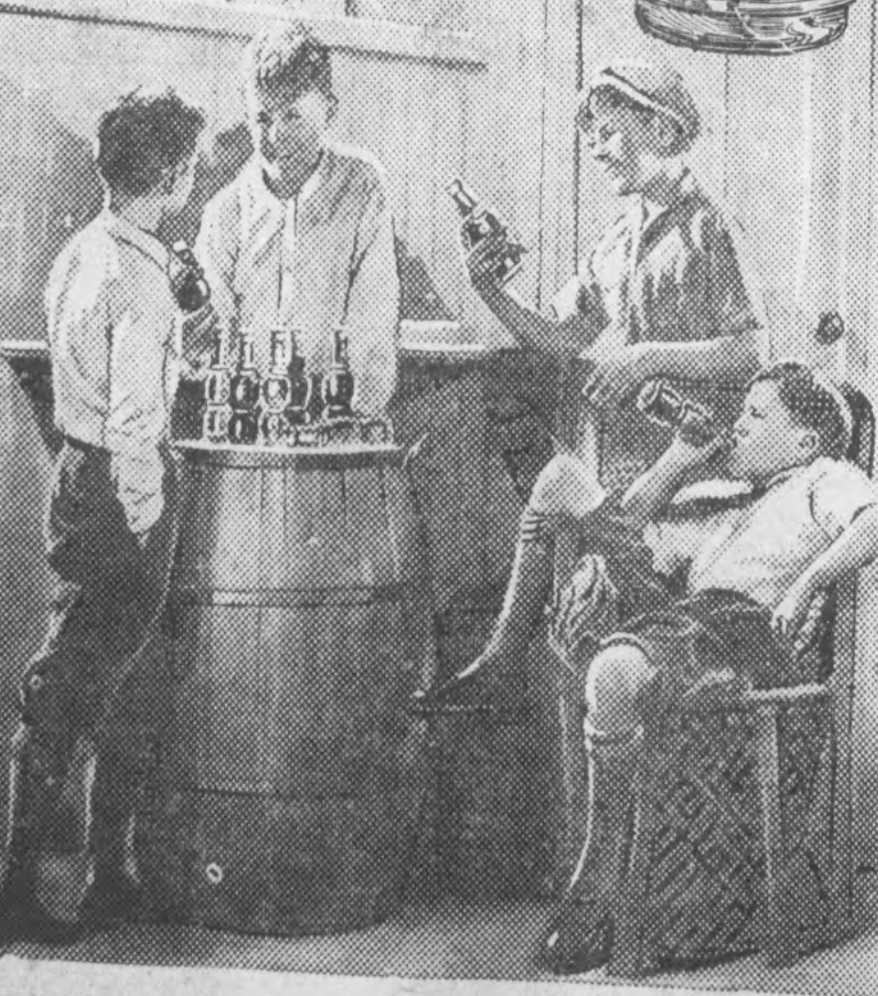

Joker in State Game Laws Has Been Remedied

Raleigh, July 26.—(AP)—Sportsmen of North Carolina have been laughing now. What was generally called a joker in the new State-wide game bill which did not provide for a license good in all parts of the State and which would have necessitated each sportsman taking out a license in every county in which he hunted has been remedied.

A ruling of the State Board of Conservation and Development announced today, provides a resident State license fee of \$5 plus the issuing charge of 25 cents, entitling the holder to hunt in all many counties as he desires.

Under the former status with the provision of the resident State license, the privilege of hunting in all of the North Carolina counties would have cost the sportsmen \$125, or one dollar and the additional fee of 25 cents in each of the 100 counties.

A resident State license was provided for in the original bill but officials believe it was left out through clerical oversight. Sportsmen pressed for authorization of the resident State license, which officials at the same time believe will bring material revenue increase.

Thurston Hicks Died Today At Henderson Home

Henderson, N. C., July 27.—(AP)—Thurston T. Hicks, 70, one of North Carolina's leading attorneys, died at his home here this morning, after an illness extending over a period of nearly two years, during which he had suffered numerous heart attacks.

He had lived in Henderson and practiced law here since 1882. He was widely known throughout the State and was prominent in Republican party affairs until his health failed. He was twice Republican candidate for Chief Justice of the North Carolina Supreme Court and a delegate to several national conventions of his party.

Hicks was prominently considered for United States District Judge in 1910 and was twice elected mayor of Henderson. He was the oldest member, both in years and point of service, of the Henderson bar. Several times during the past year he had been critically ill, but each time rallied sufficiently to enable him to walk about his home and take

short automobile rides. He abandoned his law practice a year ago because of his health.

Hicks is survived by his widow, two sons, Edison T. and Benjamin S. Hicks, who had been associated with their father in law practice in Henderson; and a daughter, Mrs. S. P. Purvis of Salisbury. Two brothers, A. A. Hicks, Oxford attorney and H. B. Hicks, farmer of this section, and a sister, Mrs. W. D. Horner, Henderson, also survive.

It is expected funeral services will be held tomorrow or Saturday.

FEET ARE BIGGER SHOE DEALERS SAY

San Francisco.—(INS)—Cindella feet have gone into the discard with whalebone corset stays, the Pacific Coast Shoe Dealers Association here disclosed recently.

Feet grow larger from year to year, the shoe dealers confided. The dealers have even invented deceptive markings to keep their women customers from knowing that the No. 3 they asked for wouldn't slip over a No. 5 foot.

The dealers believe that increased walking and sports activity have been responsible for the growth in size of feminine feet.

Urges Congress To Aid Schools Of Flood Zones

Washington, July 28.—(AP)—The National Education Association today instituted a movement to urge Congress to grant federal aid in the construction of schools destroyed by the Mississippi flood.

In an appeal to Secretary of the State Associations affiliated with the National organization J. W. Crabtree, national secretary advocated that the representatives in Congress of the several States be asked to support the plan. In the letter Mr. Crabtree pointed out that in eight counties alone in the flood-stricken area damage to school buildings totaled more than \$166,500 and 24 school houses had been totally demolished.

It is necessary that support be provided from other than local and State sources, declared the association in order that a minimum program of education may be provided for the children of the flood areas. The appeal termed the situation "an educational emergency."
