ORDERS PROBE
OF THREE BIG
CORPORATIONS

Dupont, General Motors and United States Steel Corp., Involved in Inquiry.

Washington, July 29.—(AP)—An investigation into the financial relationship between the Dupont, General Motors, and United States Steel Corporation was ordered today by the Federal Trade Commission.

The commission acted on a meeting today on published reports that the community of interest had been set up between the three big corporations and that the Duponts had purchased large holdings in the Steel Corporation.

The Dupont Company is reported to have paid approximately \$140,000 for 114,000 shares of Steel stock.

New York, July 29.—(AP)—A plan of corporate management, whereby successful concerns use their surplus funds to purchase stock in other successful firms, is the explanation offered by the New York World today for the purchase by the Dupont interests of 114,000 shares of common stock of the United States Steel.

Suggestions that the Du Pont purchase foreshadowed a vast combination of corporate and private wealth says the World are taken seriously in responsible financial circles.

The Du Ponts, points out the World, merely were following their previous policy as when in 1920 they purchased a dominant interest in General Motors. Du Pont now receives annually between \$15,000,000 and \$25,000,000, in dividends from its General Motors holdings.

The World says there are two factors for investments by corporations in one another—the yield is higher than that of bonds and the returns in dividends are not subject to taxation.

COLLEGE IS
CELEBRATING
18 BIRTHDAY

President Wright Delivers Forceful Address to the Students Body.

East Carolina Teachers College is celebrating its 18th birthday. The college was founded by the 1907 Legislature through the efforts of Governor Jarvis, Mr. Fleming, Ragsdale and others. President Robert H. Wright delivered the following address to the summer school students in chapel a few days ago in which he reviewed the history of the institution as follows:

We enrolled during that first year in the regular term of 174 students. During the summer term we enrolled 330 students, making a total enrollment of 504. Forty-two of these names were counted twice, giving a net enrollment of 462. Since that time we have grown a little bit, but we have refused admission to as many students as we have taught from the beginning of this college. The enrollment for this year is 736 in the regular term, and 712 in the summer term, a total of 1,448, and 152 names have counted twice, making the net enrollment 1,296. During the eighteen years of our existence we have taught in the regular college years a total of 6,171 people, and during the summer term we have taught 7,308, or a total of 14,479 of these students have been counted twice, giving a total net enrollment of 13,703, and practically 13,600 of these people have taught school in North Carolina. I believe I am safe in saying 13,600 have taught or will teach. Of course, some of those enrolled last year have not yet taught.

This institution was established by the State for the sole purpose of training teachers for the public schools of North Carolina. It started out as a normal school, and in order that it might be established they had to put in the law that our course of study should not be more advanced than that required for admission to the State University. I wish you would just think about that proviso in the bill that our course of study should not be any higher really than a high school. A good friend of mine is

Did you read about reports of our two financial giants, United States Steel and General Motors?

General Motors, in the first six months of this year, made a net profit of \$129,250,000, \$36,000,000 more than the company earned the first six months of 1926. The first six months of this year the big steel company earned \$91,825,000, taking second place.

The two or three billion dollar corporations and the two billion dollar individual are here. Now for the trillion dollar corporation or individual with a million times a million dollars, and an annual income of billions. That will come. After all figures mean nothing, all depends on how you spend the money.

OVER 150 KILLED
IN AN EXPLOSION
AT WUCHANG, CHINA

Hankow, China, July 29.—(AP)—More than 150 soldiers and civilians were killed and hundreds injured as a consequence of an unexplained fire at an army ammunition base at Wuchang across the Yangtze from Hankow yesterday. Most of the deaths were caused by the explosion of gunpowder and bullets.

The entire district surrounding the base was reduced to ruins. American missionary properties in the explosion zone were wrecked.

PUTS IN LAST
ARGUMENT FOR
TWO ITALIANS

Thompson, Chief Counsel For Sacca And Vanzetti, Appears Before Fuller.

Boston, July 29.—(AP)—William G. Thompson, chief counsel for Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, made before Governor Alvan T. Fuller today what was expected to be his final argument in behalf of the two men under sentence of death for murder. Accompanied by Herbert B. Ehrmann, associate counsel, he arrived at the State House shortly before 9 a. m.

Thompson saw the Governor for a few minutes alone before Ehrmann was ushered into the office. Joseph Wiggins, the Governor's counsel and two stenographers were the only other persons present. It was understood that after Thompson had finished his argument Ehrmann also would address the Governor.

Boston, July 29.—(AP)—A last minute appeal from the widow of one of the men slain in the South Braintree murder for which Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti are under sentence of death was before Governor Fuller today.

Mrs. Sarah Berardelli, whose husband Alessandro was killed when an armed band shot down Frederick Parmenter, the shoe company paymaster he was guarding, telegraphed from her home in New Haven, Conn., that she hoped the governor would free the two prisoners.

The message was made public by the Asco-Vanzetti defense committee which through the seven-year fight to free the two internationally known radicals had expended hundreds of thousands of dollars in their behalf.

In the meantime, the condemned men carried on their hunger strike at the State prison which today entered its thirteenth day. Both men were described by friends as showing unmistakable signs of their long fast. They were said to be weak and listless.

Scotland Neck, July 29.—Mrs. Kate Speed Dunn, prominent and beloved life long citizen of Scotland Neck, passed away at 6 p. m. today, after a brief illness. She leaves the following children: Judge Albion Dunn, of Greenville; Mrs. John Biggs of Williamston; Ashby Dunn, Mrs. J. G. Elmore, and Mrs. W. O. Lawrence, of Scotland Neck.

IDENTIFY BODY
OF DEAD MAN

Body of Man Found Near Goldsboro that of G. Greenier, of Wilmington.

Wilmington, July 29.—(AP)—Department of Justice officials today discontinued their search for Guilford Greenier, former paymaster of the U. S. Coast Guard who had been sought for three months on charges of defalcation. The body of a man found near Goldsboro yesterday was identified definitely as that of Greenier.

In response to a message from the Department of Justice, officers in Norfolk giving a description of the man sought, sheriff W. D. Grant, advised that the body was that of the man for whom the agents held a warrant.

Greenier's body will be buried at Goldsboro today, to remain there for thirty days when it will be disinterred and conveyed to his home in Massachusetts for burial, his widow said. No inquest will be held as the coroner of Wayne county attributed death to alcohol poisoning.

Mrs. Greenier has been a resident of Carolina Beach near here, for the summer.

Washington, July 29.—(AP)—Gilbert Greenier, the warrant pay clerk of the Coast Guard, whose body was discovered yesterday near Goldsboro, N. C., is listed as having deserted from the ship yard at Camden, N. J. He was assigned to the yard in connection with the building of new craft for coast guard duty. No record of any embezzlement or defalcation is shown in headquarters records here, although his accounts were said to have been confused.

Greenier was born at Cambridge, Mass., on January 10, 1892. He enlisted in the Coast Guard at Wilmington, N. C., in 1921.

ONE KILLED
TWO HURT IN
TRAIN WRECK

Engine to Train Bearing V-Pres. Dwaes Plunges in Trestle Near Head, Miss.

Memphis, Tenn., July 29.—(AP)—One man was killed and two others seriously injured early today when the locomotive of a special train bearing Vice-President Charles G. Dawes and his party plunged through a trestle on the Yazoo and Mississippi Valley Railroad near Head, Miss.

The Vice-President was asleep in his berth and was not awakened by the accident, a telephone message from the scene of the wreck stated. Mr. Dawes and C. H. Markham, chairman of the board of the Illinois Central Railroad, retired soon after the special train left Greenville, Miss., where the Vice-President addressed the State convention of the American Legion last night. The train was bound for Memphis and was due to arrive about six o'clock this morning.

Saint Jones, of Memphis, engineer of the special was killed. His fireman J. P. Horton, also of Memphis was seriously injured as was also Henry Fletcher of Greenville, traveling engineer of the Y. and M. V. The body of the engineer had not been recovered early today.

The trestle which gave way spanned a drainage ditch which carried about 18 ft. of water. The wooden structure crumpled beneath the impact of the heavy locomotive. The engine was completely submerged.

Messages from the scene of the accident stated that the train was running at a slow speed due to the weakened condition of the roadbed as a result of the floods which have swept the territory. This fact alone, officials of the railroad declared, probably averted wrecking of the entire train.

The train, detoured over another road was expected to reach here about 9 o'clock.

Chicago Doctor
Kills Two Gunmen

Chicago, Ill., July 29.—(AP)—A doctor beat two gunmen at their own game last night killing both when they attempted to rob him.

The robbers, who have not been identified, posed as patients on entering the doctor's office but the physician, Frank L. Nathanson, recently had been robbed and was suspicious. He stood by his desk and when they drew their guns he pulled open a drawer, whipped out a pistol and fired before they could level their weapons.

One fell dead but the other staggered out and fell down the stairway into the arms of a policeman who had heard the shooting. He died in a hospital.

SENIOR LATOUR
SHOOTS SELF
EARLY TODAY

Wife of Guatemalan Minister to U. S. Believes Shooting Was Accidental.

Washington, July 29.—(AP)—Senior Francisco Sanchez Latour, Guatemalan Minister to the United States, was found unconscious with a bullet wound near his heart early today in the study of the legation and is believed to be in a dying condition at the Emergency hospital.

The Minister was alone when the shooting occurred, and beside him was found an old fashioned revolver which he kept in a drawer of his desk. He had been studying the archives of the legation at the time of the shooting.

His wife declared that the shooting must have been accidental, and said he was not in ill health nor had any financial worries. She, however, asserted the recent drowning of Rep. Crumpacker of Oregon, a close friend, in the San Francisco harbor, had been preying on the Minister's mind.

Latour, who became Minister here five years ago, was involved last October in a court action filed by his wife's divorced husband to gain possession of letters said to have been exchanged between the Minister and Senora Latour before she had been divorced. The divorced husband, James Armstrong of Washington, in his suit, which was against a lawyer who had kept the letters, said he wished to take possession of the letters to take action for the removal of Latour by the Guatemalan government.

Raleigh, July 29.—(AP)—Francisco Sanchez Latour, Minister from Guatemala, to the United States, reported in a critical condition in Washington, D. C., is a friend of Governor Lee of North Carolina.

The Governor who is at present spending his vacation in Wisconsin, has had Latour as a house guest at the mansion here twice. Last Christmas day the Guatemalan Minister spent at the mansion.

Anti-Saloon League
Leaders Son Held
On Whiskey Charge

Richmond, Va., July 29.—(AP)—Faced with a statement from his father that he did not believe his son guilty, but that he would ask no leniency for him if convicted, Carroll Hepburn, 23-year-old son of Rev. David Hepburn, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of Virginia, was to appear in police court today to answer charges of transporting liquor and driving an automobile while intoxicated.

The charges were lodged against young Hepburn last Sunday when he was arrested after the automobile he was driving was impounded by the property of the Anti-Saloon League, crashed into a pole. Several other young men are alleged to have been in the automobile with young Hepburn being the only one arrested, the others said to have escaped by running away.

The Rev. Mr. Hepburn, in a statement last night said that his son "had never touched a drop of liquor" and that he did not understand the affair.

"They say liquor was found in the car, but I don't believe my boy knew it was there," he said.

John Shoenfield
Reported As Dead

Raleigh, July 29.—(AP)—The News and Observer in a copy-righted dispatch from Shanghai today says that John W. Shoenfield, of Westfield, N. C., former naval officer and lawyer who was the center of an international controversy shortly after the Spanish-American war, died of heart failure Wednesday.

Shoenfield, while in the navy, captured Los Palmas, and Island of the Philippine Archipelago from the Dutch, still disputed between America and Holland, the paper says.

Squall Capsizes Steamer
On Lake Michigan Sending
27 To Watery Graves

Chicago, Ill., July 29.—(AP)—Survivors of the "Favorite" tragedy today still were overawed by the suddenness of the disastrous squall which struck the boat virtually without warning and gave the passengers no time for lifebelts, the life boats or the emergency rafts. Members of the crew also blamed the suddenness of the storm for the disaster on the grounds it gave them no time to direct a systematic disposal of the life preservers.

The story told by small Katherine Olson, daughter of the ill-fated ship's captain was typical of the tragedy. She said the weather had been ideal when the boat started its trip and had given no indication that the afternoon would be different from any of the 100 others she had spent with her father.

But suddenly the clouds gathered and the storm broke, waves dashing high against the side of the ship. Lightning flashed and rain fell as though poured from buckets, the child said, sending all the passengers scurrying to the opposite side of the boat to avoid the storm. "The boat began to tip," she said, "and the scores of other children began to cry. I was afraid too. I saw one big wave dash against the boat and fall back. Then came another, but this time it splashed over the deck and drenched us all."

"I don't remember the rest very well. There was a lot of terrible howling and I remember falling in to the lake and felt the bottom with my feet. I came up and paddled and paddled, managing to keep up until somebody picked me up."

Charles T. Abernethy, another survivor whose two children perished said that when the storm broke he made his wife and the two boys stay on the upper deck. "We were drenched, but I thought it would be safer up there than down with the crowd below. As the boat began to list I cut some life belts from the fastenings but in that instant she toppled over and swept us all out in the lake. I managed to grab my wife but the two boys were washed away. I fastened one of the belts around her and we kept afloat until they picked us up."

Among the witnesses of the tragedy was L. B. Hendricks, of Sterling, Ill., husband and father and two of the victims, he said he had decided not to make the trip and was waiting on shore while his wife and two daughters took the round trip excursion. He said he was still watching the boat as the squall hit. Seeing it topple over he ran along the beach frantically until rescuers began arriving with survivors and victims. He collapsed when he recognized his wife and one daughter among the dead. He later was re-united to his other daughter who had been rescued.

Chicago, July 29.—(AP)—A sudden off-shore squall that passed in a few seconds to leave the lake as smooth as a mill pond, capsized a small pleasure steamer late yesterday, carrying at least 27 of the passengers, mostly women and children, to their deaths.

The tragedy came almost twelve years to a day from the date of Chicago's greatest water disaster, the sinking of the steamer Eastland with a loss of 812 lives. The two resulted from the same cause—the rush of passengers to the port side of the ship.

Fifteen of yesterday's victims were children—nine boys and six girls—ten were women and one was a man. Some seventy-five women and children and half a dozen men were thrown into the water when the vessel—The Favorite—toppled over, but fifty or more were saved some in a thrilling rescue by William Hofnauer, millionaire yachtman who chanced to be cruising by in his large yacht, the Doris, when the storm broke.

While divers searched the lake bottom near the scene for more victims, derricks lifted the craft late last night as flood lights were played on the tragic picture. The last five bodies were found as the ship came to the surface, seven hours after the Favorite foundered.

It was a gay crowd of excursionists that left Lincoln Park aboard the vessel in the late afternoon for the two-mile run to the municipal pier. A two piece negro orchestra—piano and mandolin—strummed. "I'm Looking for a Four Leaf Clover," children scampered along the two decks and their elders hung over shoreward rails admiring the Chicago skyline.

Suddenly when a mile out, a rain storm broke and with it came a gust of wind out of the northwest. As the captain, Arthur Olson, who has sailed the lake 18 years, sought to head his boat into the wind, the passengers rushed to the port side away from the driving rain. The boat dipped sharply, and as the lake water rushed over the decks, turned over.

Children, with candles and popcorn still clutched in their hands, fought to free themselves, but the weight of chairs and other encumbrances deck held them under. Some were thrown free of the boat and many of these grabbed up belts and rafts as the steamer righted itself and sank until all but the roof of the upper structure was submerged.

Twenty-one bodies were recovered before the steamer was raised to be towed ashore. The others were found after the craft was brought to the surface.

The five members of the crew escaped and these, all experienced sailors, saved many from drowning, by tossing life preservers and rafts to those in the water. The Favorite's two lifeboats also were unharmed and into these clambered a number of the survivors.

Word of the tragedy sped along the lake front, a popular resort for swimmers and small boats put out to the rescue. The first to reach the scene was Mr. Hofnauer's yacht Doris. Hofnauer and his companions saved a number of persons.

Today a triple inquiry into the accident was under way. One was an inquest, the others investigations by Michael Hughes, chief of police and state's attorney Robt. M. Crewe. Olson and his crew were arrested shortly after the tragedy.

Out of the sudden disaster came acts of heroism and devotion. Olson, at the wheel of the boat, leaped through the cabin window into the water, turning back to drag several of his passengers from the boat. Pulling himself along the sides of the boat he also cut away passengers, tossing them to persons floundering near the steamer. His daughter, Katherine, 9, also assisted several children to gain rafts or boats.

Lee Sobata, an army officer, whose hand was mangled, told of throwing four children into a boat. Sobata related his experience as his hand was being dressed.

"I got four kids and a woman. The boat was full of water, and we could not get any more in. A girl started bailing out with a straw hat. I was dizzy. When the Favorite went down she listed—" and he swooned.

Nopal Helton, 18, of Hugo, Okla., visiting in Chicago, dragged two little girls through a window, and held them afloat until a member of the crew pulled them into a life boat.

"It was terrible. I wish I had gone down with the boat," Olson murmured. (Continued on Page Six)

KANSU QUAKE
IS DESCRIBED
AS TERRIBLE

First Detailed Story of Catastrophe Shows 10,000 Killed and Many Injured.

London, July 29.—(AP)—Scenes of death and terror are described in the first detailed account to come out of the "wild west" of China of the great earthquake which occurred in Kansu province on May 23rd. The details, telling of the complete destruction of cities, towns and villages, with a casualty list estimated at 100,000 show that the disturbance may be classed among the most terrible catastrophes of all time.

Monsignor Buddenbrook, vicar apostolic of the Steyl mission at Lanchow, Kansu, gave the details in a letter, an outline of which has been sent to the Westminster Gazette by its Shanghai correspondent. It says that in Liang-Chow alone, at least 10,000 were killed while a moving mountain completely wrecked the city of Tumen-Tse.

Scores of worshippers at mass in the church at Sui-An were overwhelmed by the sudden collapse of the edifice as subterranean rumblings were heard. Priests worked for hours administering the sacrament to the dying and carrying the injured to places of safety. No house in Sui-An escaped damage, and in each dwelling there were dead and dying. Throughout the earthquake area the populace suffered untold miseries.

Monsignor Buddenbrook says that at some places, great fissures appeared in the earth, from which a bluish black liquid oozed.

Late in June a report reached Shanghai that a very severe earthquake had ruined the greater part of Liang-Chow, in the northern part of Kansu province, near the Mongolian border on May 23. This was the date of which seismographs of these continents recorded a heavy earth shock. Calculations by the United States coast and geodetic survey in Washington were that the remote province of Kansu was the scene of the disaster.

Seven years ago Kansu was rent by a terrific earthquake which, although little advertised, took a toll of more than one hundred thousand lives. That disturbance as chronicled in a national geographic society bulletin, brought death and destruction through the movement of mountains, tremendous landslides and the carrying away of villages by a deluge of loose earth. The earth opened up in many places swallowing houses and camel trains.

FRANK LEVINS
FOUND GUILTY
KILLING FIVE

Tampa Man Sentenced to Death Without Recommendation for Mercy.

Tampa, Fla., July 29.—(AP)—Benjamin Franklin Levins, charged with the slaying of five members of the Merrell family here last May, was found guilty without recommendation of mercy by a jury in circuit court today. The verdict carries a penalty of death by electrocution.

Levins was tried on the charge of murdering Loney Merrell, a member of a family of five persons who were beaten to death in their home here last May. Levins was indicted for the murder of his father, mother and three children following his confession to the police that he mauled them to death with a railroad spike. His confession he repudiated on the witness stand as his trial when he testified he and Leonard Thompson, while drunk, climbed into the Merrell home hunting a place to sleep. He said he thought the house was vacant and killed Merrell after the latter had struck him. He denied killing the others and said he had left the house alone.

SETS NEW RECORD

Endicott, N. Y., July 29.—(AP)—Dae, Bay Gelding, by The Extract, in winning the 3-year old trot here Wednesday set a new world's record for horses of his age by stopping the first heat in 2:07 3-4. He is owned by L. S. Hadley of Wilson, N. C.

BABE TAKES HOMER LEAD FROM GEHRIG

(By The Associated Press)

In the nip and tuck scramble in the National League pennant chase a spurt by the Giants had pulled them up to six and one-half games of the crest defended by the Pirates.

The Giants bowled over the Cubs for their fourth consecutive victory yesterday by 6 to 5, thwarting efforts of the Bruins to jockey into a first place clinch with the corsairs who in turn were tumbled by the Robins 7-5.

Rogers Hornsby hastened the Chicago downfall by producing his 17th homer of the season, the seventh with two on base, which knocked Guy Bush out of the box and eventually proved to be the deciding blow of the game. Hornsby's triple in the previous session started a three-run spurge.

Carmen Hill, pride of the Pittsburgh pitching staff and erstwhile leading hurler of the national circuit was shelled off the mound by Brooklyn in the fifth during a three run barrage. Umpire McLaughlin gave Captain Traynor the gate during the same session for objecting when Max Carey stole third.

DICKINSON AVENUE

The matter of the correct name of Dickinson Avenue has again come up, this time from members of the legal profession of this city who are experiencing some difficulty because of the fact that in many instances legal papers in describing certain property have bounded it on one side by "Dickerson" Avenue, while in other papers the same property is correctly bounded by "Dickinson" Avenue. In recent instances legal instruments prepared for out-of-town and out-of-state parties have been returned to this city because of the discrepancy in the name of the street.

Dickinson Avenue years ago was so named for Marshall Dickinson who owned much of the property along the thoroughfare and who had much to do with its development. Since that time the street has been called Dixon, Dickerson, Dickenson and correctly, DICKINSON Avenue. Some time ago when the city remarked the streets the signs along Dickinson Avenue were changed to "Dickerson" Avenue, and as stated above, this change has caused no little confusion in the drawing up of legal instruments.

It is time that the matter as to the name of the street is definitely settled. If it is to remain Dickinson Avenue let's mark it that way, or if the markers are not to be changed, let's change the name of the street to correspond with the signs and so record it in the city records in order that in the future the street will have and be known by only one name.

RUBBISH

Some time ago an ordinance was passed in this city that prohibits the throwing of circulars and other forms of advertising matter on the city streets, in parked automobiles, or in the yards and porches in this city, but despite this ordinance there are seasons in the year when this city is afflicted with an epidemic of circular scattering with the result that residents find it almost an impossibility to keep their premises clean and city authorities experience the same difficulty with the streets. The city ordinance provides that no circulars, etc., shall be distributed other than to be placed inside the places of business or inside the residences in this city but despite this regulation there have been thousands of circulars strewn about the streets and yards of the city within the past few weeks. Just this week as high as half a dozen of the same circulars have been picked up within a space of a few feet on one of the sidewalks while just

a few feet away from the spot five more of the same were found on one doorstep. Such promiscuous strewing of paper about our streets is prohibited by law, and the officers should see to it that the law is enforced.

If advertisers, who desire to use the circular method of advertising, would conform to the law by seeing to it that the circulars were placed within the residences or handed to persons on the premises, they would not only help to a great extent to keep the city clean, but would find that the results from their expenditure for circulars would be much greater. Pieces of paper scattered about people's front yards or blowing in the wind along our streets are not read by shoppers, and only help to give Greenville the name of an unkept, unclean city.

A good business man would not think of throwing his money about the city streets, but that is just what he is doing when he puts it into advertising matter and then scatter it about where it is not read.

We believe in advertising and would not advise any business to attempt to exist without it, and we do not condemn the circular method of advertising when used properly.

Circulars scattered about our city streets are just so much "rubbish," and do no one any good.

SPECIAL TERM OF UNITED STATES COURT CALLED FOR SEPT. 13TH

Retroit.—(AP)—Every July George E. Buchanan, Detroit coal dealer, consummates his annual adventure in boy-philanthropy. Buchanan now is Alaska-bound with 40 boys, from half dozen states, who have earned in the past year the privilege of adventuring into the northland.

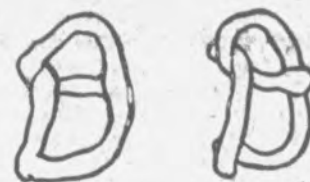

"It's horrible—horrible, I tell you," the boat's master shouted. "I did the best I could—I tell you man it was terrible and I only recently spent a lot of money improving the 'Favorite'."

Sixteen-year old George Holmes of Berwyn, Ill., saved his father and attempted to rescue his mother, but she had died from shock and heart disease.

A mother of five children, Mrs. Gertrude Berndt, who also was aboard the Eastland when it capsized in the Chicago river, again escaped death on the "Favorite," four members of her family, a married daughter a grand daughter, nephew and sister in law were drowned.

The body of Michael Citra, 7, the 27th victim of the disaster was found by coast guards early today along the shore where it had been washed in from the scene of the tragedy.

The only one of the 27 victims not identified is the small girl about eight. Authorities believe the child was Rose Polen, daughter of Mrs. Celia Polen, another of the victims Mr. Polen, who established his wife's identity, was prostrated and unable to go to the morgue where the girl's body is held, but an uncle of the child partly established her identity.

COLLEGE CELEBRATES EIGHTEENTH BIRTHDAY

(Continued from Page One) the man who had that put in, so I have been told. Well, I said to Governor Jarvis, who was a wise man, the wisest man I ever knew. "Do you know that is in the law?" He said, "Yes, we had to put it in." "We cannot plan a course of study that way," I told him, and he said, "Do not pay any attention to it. When the legislature meets we will revise it. It does not make any difference." At the next meeting of the legislature we had the law repealed, and then when the North Carolina law was codified it got into the law again and we had to have it repealed once more. Well, I think we have that out of the law now. But they put a name to the institution longer than the president they selected, (referring to his own stature) East Carolina Teachers Training School, and after a long discussion with our board of trustees we managed to get it cut down to East Carolina Teachers College, and now people are talking about making it something else. I hope they will not, but if they do I hope the name will be just State Teachers College.

At first this was only a two year normal school, doing two years of teacher training beyond the standard high school, but giving two years of high school work also, because there were no standard high schools all about over North Carolina then. We would take students with two years of high school training and give them special training, getting them ready to enter the normal course. We have gone beyond that just as we have gone beyond the board walk, just as we have added about one and one-half million dollars worth of buildings, until the requirements for admission here are about the same as for any other standard college in the State.

The institution has moved from what it was to what it is without ever changing one particle from its original purpose—to train teachers for the public schools of North Carolina. Just as we see more of each other than they did in 1909, just as we know more about the things of life than they knew in 1908. The old world is changing a great deal and our college is keeping apace with it and just a little ahead of the procession, just enough so that you can meet the advancing civilization and still be tied to the things of today, without purposes constantly held in view, never wavering one iota from the purpose for

which the State of North Carolina spent about 21-4 millions of dollars for buildings. The State is spending this year \$165,000 to maintain this institution so that the children of North Carolina may have better trained and efficient teachers, that we may have a better civilization, a more intelligent people, a more prosperous State, a better North Carolina for you and for me to live in.

This is the anniversary of the breaking of ground for the building of this institution. The town of Greenville and the County of Pitt voted jointly for \$100,000 worth of bonds to go to the State toward building this institution. When they first put up the six buildings that were here at the end of the second year I told Governor Jarvis that we would have to go to the legislature and ask for more money to enlarge the institution and he said, "Mr. Wright, we thought we had built it large enough for twenty years." "Well," I said, "Governor Jarvis you are not really angry with me because we filled it in two years, are you?" He answered, "No, we are glad to see that the people of North Carolina are anxious for a

place to take training to teach the children of our State. We will go to the legislature and ask them for more money."

And we have been doing that regularly since 1911, and the State has been giving to us very liberally. We have no just complaint or fault to find with our State, but she has not given the institution anything like as rapidly as the needs of the State call for. But have grown a little over 280 per cent in the eighteen years of our existence.
