DEATH TOLL OF LAKE TRAGEDY STANDS AT 27

Several Passengers
Reported Missing
Accounted For At
Chicago Today

Chicago, July 30.—(AP)—A day spent in searching for bodies failed to reveal any additional victims of Thursday's lake tragedy and the death toll today stood at 27 as four different inquiries into the sinking of the excursion boat "Favorite," were under way.

Several passengers of the ill-fated craft who had been reported missing were accounted for today, having been among the first to be rescued and soon lost sight of in the confusion which followed.

Coast guards who dragged the lake near the place the boat turned over abandoned further search.

At the same time, the coroner, the state attorney, the police and the United States steamboat inspection service conducting inquiries into the tragedy, had arrived at no definite evidence of criminal liability for the disaster.

The sportsman told investigators that Capt. Olson had acted heroically, doing the utmost for the safety and rescue of his passengers scurrying to shelter on one side and causing the boat to list until it tipped over and sank, came up so suddenly and was so terrific that there was nothing that could have been done.

Government inspectors said the boat had been declared seaworthy and was equipped with enough life preservers for 175 people although at the time of the tragedy, there were only 60 on board, nearly mothers with their children on it.

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Bodies of Dead Soldiers Found In Shell Hole

Washington, July 30.—(AP)—The bodies of seven members of the 79th division who were killed in action at the battle of Mont Faron have been discovered in an isolated shell hole in France.

A search by the War Department has been in progress on French battlefields for nine years in an effort to locate and identify all American dead, and the discovery of the seven was an incident of that work.

The bodies in the shell hole include that of Lieutenant William A. Sheehan Company F 315th infantry, a native of Covington, Ky., whose home was in Washington, D. C., with the officer were the bodies of these six privates:

Irving B. Roofs, Company F Brooklyn, N. Y., August H. Irtmiller, Company F Baltimore, Edward C. Moran Company F Philadelphia, Jesse Schall, Company F Philadelphia, Ellis Eskowitz, Company C 313th infantry, Baltimore, and Henry Fuller, Company H 315th infantry, Pottsville, Pennsylvania. The city in each case being the residence of their next of kin.

The report received by the War Department said the bodies were buried together and that indications were that they were buried by German troops. There were two tags on each body, making the identity certain.

Queen Marie May Seek Quiet And Peace at Convent

Bucharest, July 30.—(AP)—Grief-stricken over the death of her husband, King Ferdinand, Queen Marie may seek peace and consolation with in the quiet walls of a convent, it is believed by her close friends. They say she has often been drawn to the picturesque sixteenth century convent near her castle in the Carpathian village of Bran, for prayer and think it likely that she will join the nuns in this retreat.

The idea of Queen Marie entering a convent is not favorably received by the Rumanian peasantry. She has long been the peasants' idol and they are adverse to losing a champion of their interests.

VOLCANIC ERUPTION COMES TO AN END

Hilo, T. H., July 30.—(AP)—The great volcano of Kilauea after several weeks of activity is apparently subsiding. Volcanologists said today that the flow of lava had ceased. Steam vents in the Halemaumau crater continue very active, however, and some glow is still visible at night.

Minister Deposed For Remarrying

New York, July 30.—(AP)—because after a divorce he remarried contrary to the canons of the Episcopal church, the Rev. Harold Author Lynch today stood deposed from the ministry.

A statement by Bishop William T. Manning, in the churchman a denominational publication, says the action was taken due to the Rev. Mr. Lynch "having declared to me in writing his renunciation of the ministry and having asked to be deposed solely because of his marriage contrary to the canons of the church."

The Rev. Mr. Lynch married a second time after he had been divorced from his first wife.

During the fourteen years the Rev. Mr. Lynch served in the ministry he was associated with the late Rev. Percy Stickney Grant at the church of the Ascension and the Rev. William Norman Guthrie of St. Marks in the boulevards, both of whom have been at odds at various times with the ruling powers of the local Episcopal diocese.

Ford Is Making Test of New Car

Detroit, July 30.—(AP)—Motor and speed tests of the new automobile shortly to be introduced on the market by the Ford Motor Company, are being made personally by Henry Ford, it was announced today.

The manufacturer has been engaged for the past few weeks in driving the car over roads in the vicinity of Dearborn, Michigan, the announcement from the executive office of the organization said. The result of the tests were not disclosed and officials did not indicate if they were in the nature of final try-outs.

Ford who celebrated his 64th birthday quietly at home today indicated he had completely recovered from injuries received in a recent accident.

"I feel better and have a greater interest in life than was the case four years ago, because I have a new job to tackle that was unforeseen then," he told associates. The new job was taken to refer to his new car.

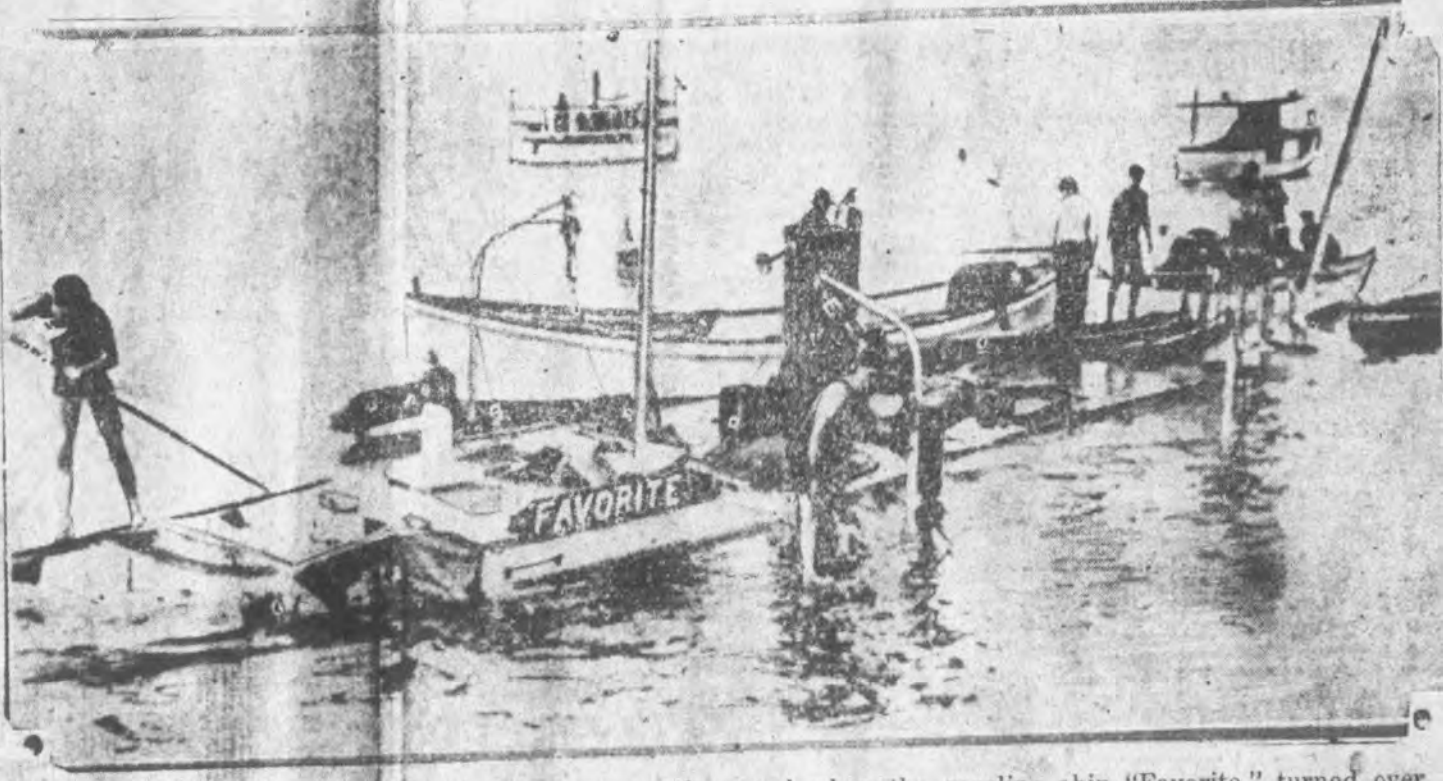
Sampson Crops Badly Damaged By Hail Storm

Clinton, N. C., July 30.—(AP)—The southern portion of Sampson County section of fine tobacco, cotton and corn crops, was a scene of devastation today, as farmers recovered from one of the severest hailstorms in local history.

Hail stones, said by farmers to have been as large as hen eggs, fell in uncounted numbers, stripping leaves and bolls from plants and fodder from corn stalks. Houses were unroofed and several trees were blown across highways, partly blocking traffic.

The tobacco crop, expected to have been the best in years, suffered the most damage. Corn crops represented a partial loss.

TO MAKE TEST OF THE YADKIN RIVER BRIDGE

Unique Test of
Bridge's Strength to
be Made by Highway
Commission.

Raleigh, July 30.—(AP)—Unique in annals of American bridge testing in twelve years Mount Vesuvius this morning hurled hundreds of tons of incandescent fragments far into the air while a huge column of lava after nearly filling the inner crater began to creep over the edge into "the valley of hell" toward the bay of Naples.

Although Professor Alessandro Maladra, head of the observatory, renewed assurances that there was no imminent danger part of the population of the towns of Torre Annunziata and Torre Del Greco and residents of the region lying below the valley began to prepare for a quick flight to Naples should the lava continue its downward course.

The low point at which the lava is finding exit from the crater already is covered by the hardened flow of November 3, 1926 but the extent and force of the present flow of flaming material has not been equalled since January 2, 1916.

All night long there were violent explosions accompanied by the hurling of fragments which continued at a rate of several every minute. A column of pink flame-flecked smoke, rising to abank of ominous blackness of the sky and scores of thousands remained awake most of the night to watch the spectacle.

Alleged Embezzler To Be Given Trial At Whiteville, N. C.

Whiteville, N. C., July 30.—(AP)—E. Garland Brown, alleged embezzler, will be brought here for trial from Los Angeles, Calif., at an early date, if plans of city and county officers, who left for the distant city yesterday, do not miscarry.

Brown, said to have a striking personality, was traced through several sections of Western States, is now under \$2,000 bond to appear at an extradition hearing in Los Angeles August 8.

Brown is alleged to have used several aliases, including "captain" and "Colonel" Brown during his operations. He is wanted here in connection with embezzlement of funds of an estate he is alleged to have settled for a client. Brown, on one occasion posed as a brother of Josephus Daniels, Raleigh publisher, it is alleged.

W. L. Craven, bridge engineer for the State Commission, is in charge of the test. The U. S. Bureau of Public Roads is co-operating.

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MILITARY UNIT RETURNS FROM FAYETTEVILLE

Greenville Artillery-
men Established
Fine Record at An-
nual Encampment.

Members of Battery E, local military unit, who have been in annual encampment at Fort Bragg the past fifteen days, returned to Greenville yesterday afternoon. Virtually every member of the organization expressed himself as being well pleased with the excellent training which he received while away, and is looking forward to establishing even a better record at encampment next year.

Captain Lester Jones stated today that he was proud of the excellent record established by his men. The unit consisted of fifty artillerymen and four officers. This was thirty-three less than the normal fighting strength of the organization, the reduction in numbers being brought about by inability of the men to get away from farm work at this season of the year.

Battery E was a member of the First Battalion. This organization established an enviable record on the firing line. They finished firing ahead of all other troops, and was the only battalion permitted to fire high explosives. The battalion was composed of three hundred men and fourteen officers.

Captain Jones said the morale of his organization was splendid throughout the entire training period. He said very little sickness was reported, although one man, Edwin Tucker, was left at camp as a result of some slight eye trouble.

The troops left Fayetteville yesterday morning at 10 o'clock on a special train and arrived in Greenville yesterday afternoon at 6:30. The journey was uneventful, except at stops where units were greeted by home town folks. Upon arrival here, the men marched to the armory, unloaded paraphernalia, were dismissed, and returned to their homes in many sections of the county.

Two Firemen Are Killed At Atlanta

Atlanta, Ga., July 30.—(AP)—Two firemen were killed and two known to have been injured seriously here today when a wall collapsed during a fire at the W. L. Fain Grain Co., not far from the Atlanta terminal railroad station.

Eight other firemen fighting the flames from the roof of a nearby building, escaped when the wall of the structure collapsed.

Barney Richardson, one of the dead was buried under the wreckage. Clyde Cawthorn, captain of Fire Company No. 5 was the other fireman killed.

M. C. Bailey and A. V. Dood, were two of the firemen dug out of the ruins badly burned. They were taken to a hospital.

IMPROVEMENT TO WAREHOUSE IS COMPLETED

Moye and Gentry An-
nounce Completion
of Addition to Mam-
moth Building.

Announcement was made today by Moye & Gentry, proprietors of the Center Brick Warehouse, that the new addition to their large tobacco warehouse is now practically completed. The job will be completed with the pouring of concrete on the floor. This work is expected to be finished within the next week.

With the large new addition Moye & Gentry will have a total floor space of 55,000 square feet, fronting on three streets with a driveway entering the building from Clark and Atlantic Streets, Dickinson Avenue. This building is modern in every way. Moye & Gentry have been for a number of years conducting a tobacco warehouse on the Greenville tobacco market. The improvement to this house will materially aid the Greenville market in handling 1,225,000 pounds of tobacco daily for the farmers of Eastern North Carolina during the 1927-28 season.

This mammoth warehouse with six others will be ready for the big opening on September 6th, when the Greenville Tobacco market opens. Moye & Gentry have spared no expense to make their house comfortable and convenient for the farmers, their teams and trucks, as sleeping quarters, drinking fountains and other conveniences have been installed for their comfort.

Although Greenville is operating one tobacco warehouse less this year than last year it will have considerable more floor space as several warehouses have added new floor space to their already large buildings.

Says Needleman Should Have Good Chance To Win

Durham, July 30.—(AP)—Branding the case as one of the most horrible he has ever heard, Judge N. A. Sinclair, presiding over superior court for the trial of civil cases in Durham county, feels that Joseph H. Needleman of Philadelphia, has a good chance in his suit for \$100,000 instituted in Federal court as the result of the mutilation of his person in 1925. Judge Sinclair presided over the court which tried 32 defendants from Marlain, Wayne and Lenoir counties of which number all but four were either fined or given prison sentences.

Needleman was so weak from loss of blood that he had to be assisted to the witness stand to testify in the trial. Judge Sinclair said and then he slumped down as though he did not have strength to sit up.

Robbers Get \$200 Goldsboro Hotel

Goldsboro, N. C., July 30.—(AP)—Police today investigated the robbery here of guests of Hotel Goldsboro by unknown parties who, entering ten rooms, took about \$250, ranging in amounts from \$10 to \$40. Hotel officials reported jewelry and other valuables were left by the thieves. One guest's pocketbook was emptied of its contents but left in the room.

SENSATION IS PROMISED BY TAMPA JUDGE

Raid of "Key Club" to
Result in Expose of
Civic and Business
Leaders.

Tampa, Fla., July 30.—(AP)—A startling expose revealing the operation of Tampa's most fashionable and exclusive "speak easy" with prominent business and civic leaders as its select habitués, has been forecasted here next week by municipal Judge Leo Stalnakker following raids on "The Key Club."

Judge Stalnakker yesterday announced the premier showing in his court "some time next week" of a series of moving picture films depicting scenes at this club in which a number of representative citizens unknowingly enact the leading role.

The raids were said to have culminated repeated attempts of authorities to obtain evidence on the activities of "The Key Club," reported to have flourished for months almost within the heart of the city a stone's throw from police headquarters. Elaborately furnished quarters were maintained for the use of its patrons, it is alleged, whose names were kept secret. Participants was by members granted only on the highest recommendation and admittance to the club was by an unmarked key, which likewise was the emblem of the so-called organization.

After repeated failures to gain entrance to the club, police last Saturday in an anonymous letter received one of the coveted keys from the wife of a club member who declared she wanted the club raided because her husband neglected the family for the sociability of the club.

Detectives swooped down on the club and arrested an alleged bartender and three negro helpers, and confiscated a quantity of bonded liquor. They described finding of a real bar with brass foot rails, sawdust on the floor and an atmosphere reminiscent of pre-Volstead days.

The detectives posted themselves at the entrance and secretly photographed patrons who used the key to gain admittance. Judge Stalnakker had locked the celluloid strips in a bank vault for safe keeping and declared they will not be removed until the scheduled matinee.

"The pictures should be more popular than any feature movie ever exhibited in Tampa," he asserted. "To see ourselves as others see us is not always pleasant, but in a case like this, I believe Tampa will be taught a great moral lesson."

Dry Bone Club Helps Agents In Mountains

Winston-Salem, July 30.—(AP)—Dry agents who are making it hot for blockaders and bootleggers in the caves and mountains of Wilkes, tell of the help they are getting from a constantly increasing membership of a mysterious organization known as the "dry bone club," which has for its object the stamping out of the illicit liquor traffic and which performs its work so well that blockaders and rum runners have become frightened.

Deputy administrator Osteen's hot drive against the illicit liquor element inspired the dry bone club according to a newspaper report. Its members first began their activities in Elk and Boomer township in the "state of Wilkes." The influence gradually spread. Now it has members in many of the Eastern townships of the county. A branch has been established just in the edge of Ashe and one up under the Blue Ridge where the counties of Wilkes and Watauga come together. Back over in the fair planes and trap hill county is the nucleus of another "club" which is spreading terror to the liquor law violators.

Bus Driver Is Released Today In Murder Case

Asheville, N. C., July 30.—(AP)—The State's hope of pushing aside the black cloak of mystery shrouding the murder of the pretty young widow, Annie Mae Burges, in Asheville, the night of January 20, 1926, faded out again Friday when Wilsey Hensley, bus driver, accused by his wife of having committed the crime was released from Buncombe County jail.

"I knew they'd find I was not guilty. I never in my life had murder in my heart against anybody. I am innocent." With these words and without show of emotion, Hensley, nonchalantly sauntered out of the big steel gate surrounding the jail yard, jesting with jail officers as he leisurely stepped into the open air and sunshine to freedom.

Hensley who had been held for "investigation," since Sunday as a result of accusations made by his wife, Gertrude Hensley, was ordered released from jail Friday morning by Judge Nunn in Superior Court on motion of J. Ed Swain, Solicitor Robt. M. Wells consented to Hensley's release, since he said investigation by State's officers had failed to uncover evidence sufficient to prosecute.

There has been considerable loss of life at Baroda, according to the official. An estimate of the number of casualties being impossible at present. Damages to the Bombay-Baroda Railroad probably amount to \$1,000,000.

WEEKLY FINANCIAL

New York, July 30.—(AP)—Easy money rates and excellent half yearly earnings statements by the country's two premier industrial corporations—General Motors and U. S. steel—provided the back ground for another advance in prices in this week's stock market. The average of 20 leading industrials climbed to the net high ground although several of the leaders such as Atchison, Union Pacific, and Southern Pacific topped their previous high prices.

Heavy buying of U. S. Steel common was stimulated by the reported improvement in the steel trade and the announcement that Dupont interests had acquired 114,000 shares of stock at slightly less than \$123 a share. The rise in Bethlehem steel was checked by the failure of the directors to authorize a resumption of dividends on common stock, although the stock previously approached to within a small fraction of the years high. American steel foundries and central Al-ley steel reached new high ground.

General Motors responded to the publication of the best half yearly earnings report in its history by crossing 228 to a new peak for the present stock. Other Motors also developed strength despite the announcement of new models at lower prices and talk of increasing competition and further price cuts when the new Ford models made their appearance. Chrysler made an unusually good showing in the first half of the year, but Pierce Arrow preferred broke to a new low on publication of a relatively poor semi-annual report.

Oil shares failed to make much response to the renewed efforts to curtail production in the seminoles field.

Another new high by Baldwin featured the railroad equipments, in the motor accessory group gabriel snubbers "A" and Timken roller bearings reached new high ground.

STOCK MARKET

New York, July 30.—(AP)—Consecutive forces were again at work in today's stock market, with major speculative operations for the advance shifting from the industrials to the rails. Profit taking sales in some of the recent strong spots were well absorbed and new leaders brought forward in an effort to maintain bullish enthusiasm.

Heavy buying of Pennsylvania, which moved up more than a point to 66, the highest level since 1910, featured the railroad group. Erie common also moved into new high ground and gains of a point or two were registered by nearly a score of others, including New York Central, Baltimore and Ohio, Chesapeake and Ohio, Rock Island, Delaware and Hudson and several others.

Hudson assumed the leadership of the motor group by moving up more than three points to a new 1927 high around 89. General Motors also was heavily bought around its recent high levels but the other motors failed to make much headway. U. S. Steel common and Dupont were under slight pressure.

Trapped "shorts in Manhattan Electrical Supply received another jolt when the stock soared more than seven points to a new peak at 118. International Harvester extended its gain to more than five points to new high levels. Radio Corporation was weak.

The closing was firm. Total sales approximated 1,000,000 shares.

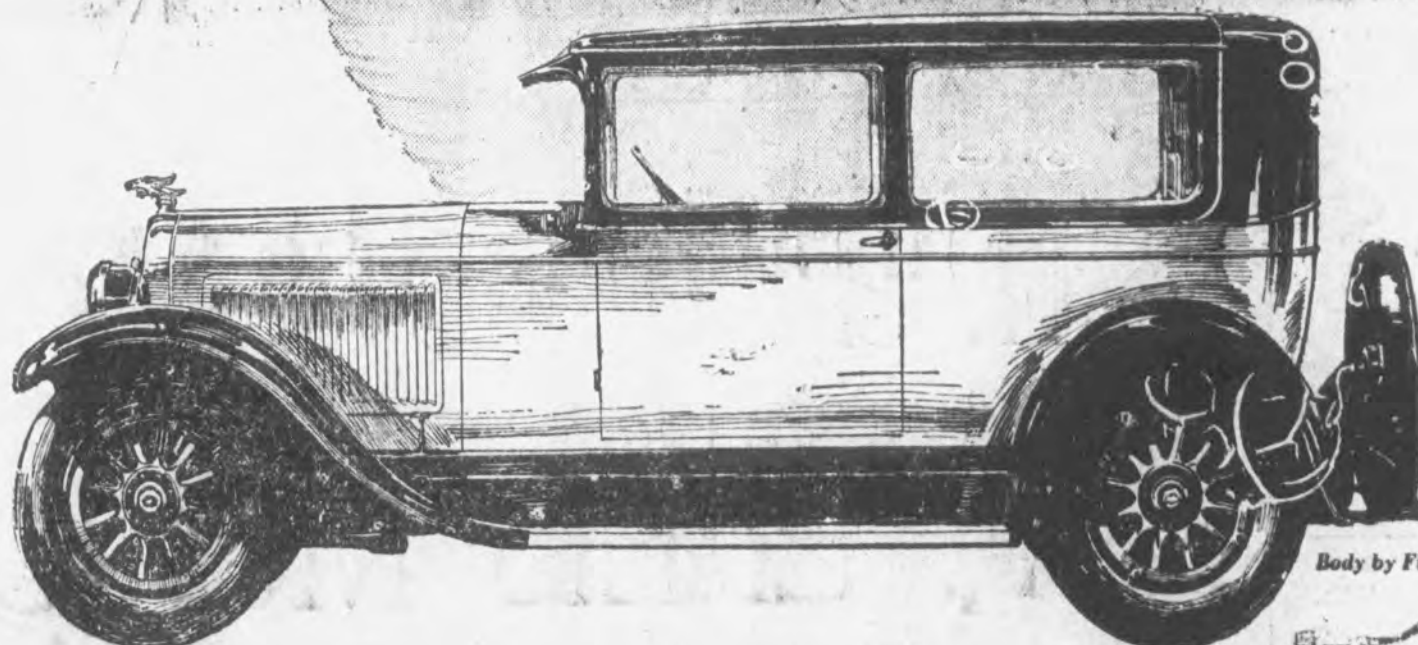
