COOLIDGE WILL NOT RUN NEXT YEAR

ISSUES STATEMENT THAT HE DOES NOT CHOOSE TO BE A CANDIDATE IN 1928

Those Close to President Surprised When He Hands Out Statement to Newspaper Men.

Rapid City, S. D., Aug. 2.—(AP)—President Coolidge today issued a statement saying: "I do not choose to run for President in 1928."

The statement, which was type-written on small pieces of paper, was handed out today by the President on the fourth anniversary of his becoming Chief Executive of the United States, without comment.

Mr. Coolidge had asked newspaper men to see him at 12 o'clock today. Until a minute or two before there was not the slightest knowledge among the presidential staff of what would occur at the conference.

Shortly before 12 o'clock Mr. Coolidge sent for his personal stenographer, Edwin Geiser, and dictated the brief message which was then transcribed onto small pieces of paper by typewriter.

After the newspaper men had come into the room the President asked them to file past him.

He handed each the small piece of paper with the message.

The paper had been folded by him.

Newspaper men stopped to ask him if there was any comment and Mr. Coolidge replied that the statement was for the newspaper men. There were in the room at the time Senator Capper, a house guest of the President, Everett Sanders and Edward T. Clark, his secretary; Stanton Winship, his military aide and Dr. James F. Coupal, his physician.

No word was spoken outside Mr. Coolidge asking if everyone was present, and inquiry of newspaper men if there was anything more to say. It is said that the President counseled with no one in preparing his startling announcement.

Those closest to him in his official family have taken occasion on this day—the fourth anniversary of Mr. Coolidge taking the oath of office—to express the private view that he would not make any statement of his plans for another term and would accept the nomination if given to him without expressing himself.

It was pointed out later by those same staunch supporters of the President that the door to the nomination had not been closed by the statement in the event of his selection by the convention.

Auditor Takes Part In Wilkes Financial Tangle

Winston-Salem, N. C., Aug. 2.—(AP)—Latest developments reported include the coming to Wilkesboro of J. B. Rodgers of Statesville, who made the audit of the books of the defunct Bank of Wilkes and closed and sealed its vaults, the presence of Mark Squires of Lenoir, counsel for Curtis and Sanger, bond brokers of New York, who sold some of the \$25,000 notes to the National City Bank and for whom Mr. Squires is demanding a replica of both the seal of the county board of education and the board of commissioners; also the arrival of an conference with J. A. Rousseau, of John H. Folger, of Mount Airy, of counsel for Clem Wrenn, president of the defunct Bank of Wilkes, who is now at Liberty under a bond of \$25,000 upon charges of false issuance of a \$25,000 note, forgery and embezzlement. Wrenn's brothers are also in Wilkesboro.

STATE CONTINUES TO EXAMINE WITNESSES IN FLOGGING TRIAL

Oneonta, Ala., Aug. 2.—(AP)—The State continued its examination of witnesses today as the second day of the trial of Eugene Doss, one of seven men indicted for the flogging of Jeff Calloway, 19-year-old farm youth got under way.

Only two witnesses were heard yesterday. Dr. L. A. Fennell, reputed cyclops of the Tarrant City, Ala., unit of the Ku Klux Klan denied he had access to the records of his lodge in answering questions concerning his failure to produce records and membership lists.

ASSAILANT OF WHITE GIRL IS SHOT TO DEATH

Tom Bradshaw Killed By Sheriff's Posse Near Bailey This Afternoon.

Bailey, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Sheriff J. S. Griffin's posse today closed in on Tom Bradshaw, negro, attacker of a young white girl near here Sunday, and shot him to death as he was trying to flee, it is reported to newspapermen here.

The negro was shot twice. His body was being brought here for an inquest at 5 o'clock this evening.

The posse caught the negro Tolson Swamp near here.

Nashville, N. C., Aug. 2.—(AP)—Renewed reports that the quarry had been sighted early this morning in the vicinity of Vick's mill, spurred the posse headed by Sheriff J. S. Griffin of Nash county, in their search today for Tom Bradshaw, also known as Paul Bladsoe, negro, alleged attacker of a young white girl near Bailey last Sunday.

The posse was augmented this morning by fresh groups of citizens as 48 hours of continuous searching told in their physical endurance. The man-hunt continued through the night and morning despite a driving rain which increased difficulties for the searchers.

Bloodhounds are again on the trail as the result of the report from Vick's mill, after they had been withdrawn because of the downpour of yesterday and last night.

The negro was trailed into a dense section of underbrush which is being combed systematically.

Sheriff Griffin made a flying trip to his office here early today and added new strength to his posse, wearing after long hours of tramping and brush-beating over a 12 mile area of densely wooded, and in many places swampy territory as conflicting reports of persons having sighted the negro were received.

Feeling among members of the posse continued high today.

Raleigh, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The mass of men searching for the negro attacker of a young Bailey white girl is orderly, and there is no cause to fear violence, in the belief of C. H. England, secretary to Governor A. W. McLean, who returned from the scene of the man hunt today. England was accompanied by pardon commissioner Edwin B. Bridges.

The posse has been divided into squads, each headed by a police officer or deputy sheriff, England reported, and are conducting an orderly and systematic search. Gov. McLean has been advised by telephone of the affair and seemed well pleased with reports that there was no prospect of violence, England said.

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The Prince of Wales and Prime Minister Baldwin of Great Britain, and therefore CHIEF THINKER for the British empire, are in Canada. Crowds welcome the two men, everywhere, the Prince keeping himself in the background, putting Baldwin forward.

It's a great combination, all the British know it, to have great countries like Canada, Australia, South Africa, inhabited and controlled by European blood, directed and held together by a thinking, highly intelligent group in that little European office of the British empire, called "Great Britain."

It is good for the United States, to have so good a neighbor and so swift a peacemaker as Canada on the north. We should like to see Mexico develop as Canada has developed and give us stronger competition on the south.

We want nothing that belongs to anybody else, and we don't let anybody take anything that belongs to us.

Eventually, we shall have a government that will approve of spending money for defense and preparation, as well as of saving it unwisely for no reason in particular.

Then everything will be O. K.

Mario Chiosone came to America and, it is alleged, carried on agitation in this country against Italy's Fascist government. This government sent him back to Italy. Signor Chiosone wrote to the secretary of labor, begging not to be sent back. The Fascist, he said, would kill him for having opposed their theories here. They haven't killed him, but a Roman court sentences him to prison for twelve years, a severe sentence for talking, even for talking foolishly.

HEARS LAST WITNESSES

Governor Fuller to Render Decision in Sacca-Vanzetti Case Tomorrow.

Boston, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Governor Alvan T. Fuller came early to the State House today to interview a few last witnesses and to work on his decision in the case of Nicola Sacca and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, radicals under sentence of death during the week of August 10 for a murder committed seven years ago. The Governor's decision has been promised for tomorrow.

Vanzetti today for the third successive day ate breakfast and even asked for an extra glass of milk. His strength was said to be rapidly returning after his two weeks of fasting.

Sacca, however, has not broken his hunger strike begun July 17th. He was described as showing indications of weakness but the prison physician has seen no signs of danger in his condition.

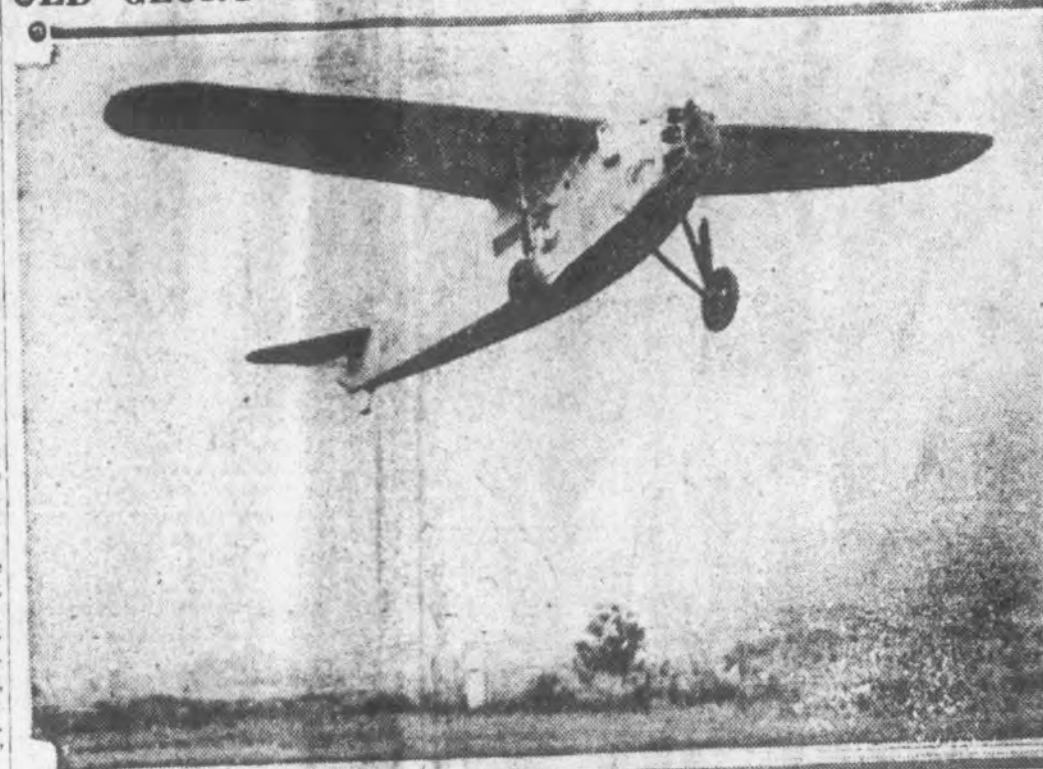
It was recalled that in 1923 he went without food for a month without showing any serious effects. One forcible feeding at that time ended the strike.

AIR FLIGHT TO SAYS PRINCE TURKEY AMONG NEW PROJECTS

Rene Fonck, French War Ace, Plans to Make Trip to Turkish Capital.

New York, August 2.—(AP)—Further notable activities in the fast developing aviation picture flashes on the news screen today.

With completion of preliminary test of the monoplane Old Glory for its projected non-stop flight to Rome, plans have been disclosed for another non-stop flight with Constantinople as its objective.

Capt. Rene Fonck French War Ace, whose attempted take-off on a flight across the Atlantic last September, ended in disaster, is the latest aspirant for non-stop flying honors. Instead of a projected 3,600 mile flight to Paris he will attempt a hop of approximately 5,100 miles.

Indications were that the plane in which Lloyd W. Bertaud and J. D. Hill hope to fly to Rome, would be ready by next week, although Bertaud declined to predict when the take off would be made.

Captain Fonck, with Lieutenant L. W. Curtin, U. S. N., plans to start from Roosevelt Field within a few weeks in a Sikorsky plane. Fonck has not made public his proposed destination but that Constantinople is the goal was revealed by persons close to his backers. Test flights will be started next week.

The tentative route for the Constantinople flight will take the plane over Ireland across the corners of France, Germany, Austria, Rumania and Bulgaria.

Bryson Tests Gold Samples

Raleigh, Aug. 2.—(AP)—J. H. Bryson, of the Department of Conservation, today had before him 14 samples of gold-bearing ore from Randolph county, upon the analysis of which will be based his final report of their content, to the State Corporation Commission.

Bryson's report will be handed to I. M. Bailey of the Commission and if his statement shows the samples contain gold which will average \$10 to the ton of ore, a charter may be granted to a concern which plans to launch gold mining activities in the county.

According to Southern Mining Congress officials, ore which will not assay \$6 to \$7 per ton is not of practicable commercial value.

Bryson has also asked officials of the Mining Congress for verification of his recent report that there is no indication that oil might be found in Sampson county.

SAYS PRINCE NOT SEEKING ANY THRONE

Queen Marie Believes Her Son Will Remain Away From Rumanian Capital.

Insia, Rumania, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Former Queen Marie believes that Prince Carol, the former crown Prince, will keep his word and abide by his renunciation of the throne and remain away from Rumania. She is not moved by reports of the Prince's kindly declarations saying she had received several telegrams and letters from Carol since King Ferdinand's death of a tenor which made his return extremely improbable.

"He expressed the deepest sorrow over the death of his father and spoke of him and myself in the tenderest terms," said the former Queen. "I am sure he is penitent for all the trouble and grief he brought upon us and myself. I repeat my former conviction that he will not attempt to return to Rumania."

"I think his father's death will make him see things in a new and more sober light. I am hopeful it will at least prompt him to lead a different and more serious life. By his loyalty to his pledged word to remain out side Rumania for ten years, he can be of great help to his son Michael, who reigns in his place."

JAPAN PLAYS LAST CARD AT NAVAL PARLEY

Presents Compromise Project in Effort to Prevent Wrecking of Confab.

Geneva, August 2.—(AP)—Japan has made a last supreme effort to save the Tri-Partite Naval Conference.

After failing in their first attempt to find any formula which held the possibility of giving satisfaction, Admiral Salto and Viscount Ishii this morning visited Hugh S. Gibson, Chief American delegate and handed him the text of a compromise project concerning cruisers.

The project is quite provisional in nature, but designed to prevent the wrecking of the conference on this outstanding difficulty.

Drouhin and Levine Split

Paris, Aug. 2.—(AP)—After two hours of hot discussion today Maurice Drouhin, French aviator and Charles A. Levine, owner of the trans-Atlantic monoplane "Columbia," separated without signing the final contract for the projected return flight of the plane.

Bazemore Gets 30 Day Reprieve

Raleigh, Aug. 2.—(AP)—State Pardon Commissioner Edwin B. Bridges today issued a 30-day reprieve to George Frank Bazemore negro, under death sentence.

Bazemore who was to have died tomorrow in the electric chair, has until September 2, to live in "death row," State prison, under the reprieve, issued to give the commissioner time to study the case.

The negro has been in prison here six months following conviction in Green County Superior Court last December of murdering Gordon Yelverton, young white man of Fremont, who was shot while passing through Green County on his way to Wilson with a load of tobacco, November 5.

The Supreme Court granted Bazemore a new trial last spring on technical grounds. Through his attorney he also filed notice of appeal upon his second conviction last month before Judge E. H. Cranmer but it never was perfected.

PRINCE AT DOG RACE

GOOD PRICES PREVAILED ON OPENING OF GEORGIA TOBACCO MARKET TODAY

MANY NOTABLE SOUTHERN MEN GO TO REUNION

Vanguard of Three Day Encampment of Confederates Arrives in Raleigh.

Raleigh, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Interesting figures loomed up in the advance today of the thinning gray line of United Confederate Veterans gathered in 20th reunion of the North Carolina Division here.

While the three day's encampment at State College formally begins tonight, the vanguard was arriving today.

Major Charles M. Stedman, the only living veteran on either side, of the War Between the States, to be a member today of Congress, was a picturesque figure. The Greensboro veteran saw service as Major of the 44th North Carolina Regiment.

The 88-year-old soldier-Congressman talked politics with some of his old friends and passed informally on the new generation of voters, the ladies, with expressed hope that the fair sex generally joined to his party, the Democratic fold, because, he thought, women were more fundamentally honest in their convictions than were the men.

Judge Charles B. Harry, of Washington, D. C., one time commander of the department of the army of Northern Virginia, holding rank at that time as General, was here with the remark that he would rather be known as a fight First Lieutenant than a peacetime General.

General W. A. Smith, of Ansonville, state commander of the U. C. V., not only was here but his picture appeared on the ribbons all the veterans wore, and many were the medals on fast shivering forms.

The welcome officially was set for tonight at Pullen Hall, State College, but at homes and in a automobile rides over the capital city the veterans were being made at home as soon as they arrived.

The strenuous three day program started with registration of each veteran, his name, company, regiment and brigade. Nurses and doctors were on hand to quieten the concern of the children and grandchildren over the annual return to the bivouac—a long time now since 1861.

But the comrades of yore laughed all this away, and one of them winked and said he had one foot in the grave and the other on a banana peel.

General Quality of Opening Day's Offerings Poor With Prices Favorable With Last Year.

The Georgia tobacco market opened today with prices favorable compared with former years and grades ranging from very poor to excellent, according to advices received from that section.

Metter reports heavy sales, excellent grades, with a price range to \$1.00 a pound.

Tifton reports an approximate average of twenty cents, with quality poor.

Waycross reports fair quality of leaf with prices 20 to 35 cents.

Blackshear reports very poor quality with prices from three to 38 cents and an average of about 18 to 20 cents.

Nashville reports poor quality with average between 17 and 18 cents.

Cairo reports quality off 40 per cent, with price average around \$15.00 per hundred.

Metter, Ga., August 2.—(AP)—Withover 2000 visitors in Metter and both warehouses overflowing with excellent grades of tobacco, the tobacco market opened here today with prospects of its being the brightest year in the history of this industry in its fourth year.

At noon today, the highest price paid for tobacco was one dollar per pound.

Seventeen tobacco companies are represented here, including big Virginia and North Carolina concerns.

By noon today half a million pounds had been sold.

Tifton, Ga., Aug. 2.—(AP)—The Tifton tobacco market opened today with three million pounds on sale with the price estimated to average twenty cents per pound. Offerings included primings, sand lugs, and poorer qualities but the color was excellent.

The quality of the leaf for quality price was about the same as last year.

Blackshear, Ga., Aug. 2.—(AP)—Hundreds of truck loads of tobacco arrived here today for the opening of the tobacco market. "First Cuttings," and "Lugs," brought fair prices.

Waycross, Ga., Aug. 2.—(AP)—It is estimated that a hundred thousand pounds of tobacco will be sold today on the floors of the two warehouses which were heavy with a fair quality of leaf. Prices opened at, from 20 to 35 cents.

MARKED DECREASE IN TYPHOID FEVER

Raleigh, Aug. 2.—(AP)—With Dr. Charles Laughhouse, State health officer, in the field spreading typhoid fever prevention education, State Board of Health officers here report a marked decrease in new cases.

The last seven days showed 78 new cases of the fever compared with 106 the week before, but 17 new cases of diphtheria were reported compared with 14 the week before.

Dr. Laughhouse also is interesting himself in dental clinics.

CUBS BACK IN FIRST PLACE IN NATIONAL

The Chicago Cubs and the Pittsburgh Pirates have traded places in the National League standing once more. The Cubs moved into the leadership position yesterday by defeating Philadelphia 6-5, while the Boston Braves stayed an eleventh inning rally to waylay the Pirates 4-1.

The polite maneuvering of the leaders appears to be encountering a new element of danger at this stage, however, for the New York Giants took their third straight from the Cardinals at St. Louis 6-3, and are now only five and one-half games out of first place.

Two weeks ago, while the Cubs and Pirates were playing humpty dumpty, the Giants appeared to be out of consideration altogether. Their position today is anything but hopeless. At the same stage of the 1921 season, when they won a pennant, they were worse off so far as the standing is concerned. McGraw's club has won five of its last six games on the road and may make serious trouble over the championship before the season ends, two months from today.

Home runs by Bill Terry and George Harper routed the Cardinals. Terry hit for the circuit twice. Between them the pair drove in five of the New York runs. Flinn Rhem, back in the St. Louis fold after a disciplinary set-back was driven out in three innings.

Brilliant had Philadelphia in check until the eighth when he weakened and was driven out but Chicago tied the score at five and in their half of this inning and won out in the ninth. Webb drove out a home run.

Pittsburgh and Boston were deadlocked, 1-1, at the end of the 9th. Any High's triple in the 11th, put the skids under the Buccaneers.

Brooklyn and Cincinnati fought it out for temporary occupancy of fifth place and the Dodgers came through with a 2-1 decision. Dazzy Vance, held the Reds to five hits, the same number the Robins collected from Eppa Riekey and Beckman, a recruit.

Cleveland defeated the New York Yankees in the only game played in the American League. The teams were scheduled to play a double-header but rain intervened after six and one-half innings of the first game had elapsed. The Indians won by a 2 score making both tallies off Herb Pennock in the sixth. Ruth went hitless in two attempts and Gehrig collected a single in two trips to the plate.

Walter Johnson Will Not Pitch Regular Again

Washington, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Walter Johnson, never expects to take his regular turn in the pitcher's box again.

After twenty years of campaigning, the big train has decided that he no longer can be counted upon to pitch turn in and turn out, but is satisfied that he still has a number of winning games left in his right arm, which has hurled more baseballs past batters than any other the game has ever known.

"I cannot go out there and throw that ball over like I used to," Johnson told an Associated Press correspondent. "But with proper care and rest I think I can go in and win a game now and then."

"The injury I received this year hurt me a whole lot. It would not have made so much difference with a young fellow, but I am getting along and it took something out of me," he said.

Walter is undecided how long he will continue in the big show, but his mind is made up definitely that he will not give up baseball any time soon.

"I'll probably be like the rest of them," he said, with a smile. "Baseball is hard to get away from. I probably won't try to pitch much more, but the chances are that I'll be connected with a ball club as long as I am able to put on a uniform."

"Are you still interested in buying into a minor league club as you were a few years ago?"

"I did want to buy a minor league club and I may when the time comes for me to retire from the American League."

Johnson labored seventeen years for the Washington club before he got his big thrill. That came in the 1924 world series, when after losing two games to the New York Giants he was called upon in a relief role and pitched his team to a world's championship.

His greatest disappointment came a year later on a rain-soaked field in Pittsburgh when the Pirates hammered out a victory against him in the seventh game to become the baseball champions of the year.

New York.—(INS)—Promoter Tex Rickard believes that radio broadcasting is hurting the "gate" at big boxing bouts. Rather than deny radio privileges, he offers a plan to tax members of the radio audience.

Rickard said he believed that the radio public would be glad to contribute from twenty-five cents to one dollar a head for the privilege of listening in. Rickard sees a fortune in the idea, and it is estimated that 50,000,000 persons heard the account of the Dempsey-Sharkey fight at the Yankee Stadium here.

The promoter said he realized that the scheme would "raise an awful howl" at first, but was confident that the public would see the fairness of the idea. He declared that radio is driving away the purchasers of the cheaper seats.

The proceeds Rickard suggested, could be used partly to meet the expenses of staging the bout and partly to perfect broadcasting arrangements.

To most golfers a quartet of players is a foursome, which is technically out of line unless the quartet are playing as partners and the two partners constituting each side are playing alternate strokes with the same ball.

This is the true Scottish foursome. It is not much played in this country save as a novelty—usually a mixed affair, somewhat terrible, with both the man and the woman driving from each tee and selecting which drive they will continue to play. Foursome play is a regular part of the international and Ryder cup matches, however, and usually develops some interesting anecdotes.

In the recent match at Worcester between the teams of American and British professionals, some inspired genius, probably Walter Hagan, who was the American captain, bracketed Leo Diegel and Wild Bill Melhorn as partners; a whimsical notion, since both are of a volatile and excitable disposition and they react on one another about like the two parts of a Sedlitz powder. This was the only match the Americans lost of the four played in this half of the contest, but it wasn't for lack of earnest endeavor on the part of Leo and Wild Bill. In fact, they tried rather too hard.

While the affair ended in something of a rout for our pair it started off close enough and was still about level when it reached the middle of the second nine where a dog-leg drive-and-pitch hole presented itself—the thirteenth or fourteenth, I think Leo and Melhorn by this time were rather getting on each other's nerves. One of them would slap a good approach up on a green and the other would miss the putt or else leave the other a five-footer coming back, which he would miss. And they were conferring constantly and were rather free with advice, at times of an abrupt nature.

Coming to the hole in question, it was Melhorn's turn to drive. "Now, Leo," said Bill, "I know you can't pitch to this green from anywhere except well out to the left, so I'm going to place this drive right out at the left-hand edge of the fairway and open the green up."

"Fine!" said Leo, hopefully. "Place it!"

As sometimes happens with the best of golfers when trying to "steer" the ball, Wild Bill then pulled a powerful wallop much farther offline to the left than he had intended to go to the right.

"Deep in the spinach!" moaned Leo. "For heaven's sake Bill, don't place any more of 'em for me!" Just shut your eyes and let nature take its course."

From that point on, the American pair disintegrated rapidly. A story is told of Harry Vardon and James Braid that illustrates how partners in a foursome can make use of each other's good shots. They were in competition on a very dry course with a certain green on which it not only was virtually impossible to stop an approach but where the third shot usually was played out of dire trouble and many sixes and some sevens were turning up there. Both rounds, old Harry, playing the second, deliberately planted the ball in the sand of a certain bunker and Jimmy Braid, one of the classic mikes players of the world, both times pitched the ball out so well on the green that Harry was able to get the putt down for a four.

However, I should like to hear Leo and Wild Bill planning to put each other in a bunker on purpose!

American Golfers Invade Canada

Toronto, Ont., Aug. 2.—(AP)—The full force of American invaders for the Canadian open golf championship is expected here today for the three-day event, starting Thursday at Toronto Golf Club. Several prominent American professionals including MacDonald Smith of Great Neck, N. Y., defending champion, had practice rounds yesterday.

Tommy Armour, United States open champion, Harry Cooper of Sacramento, Calif., who was beaten in a play off when Armour gained his title; Bobby Cruikshank, Johnnie Farrell, Emmett French and Gene Sarazen runners-up, for the Canadian open last year, are in the field that will compete for the Dominion golf crown.

Dempsey Tunney Fight to be Staged September 22nd

New York, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The date for the return heavyweight championship match between Gene Tunney and Jack Dempsey in Chicago has been definitely shifted from September 15th to September 22, Billy Gibson, Tunney's Manager, said he was informed today by telephone word from Tex Rickard.

Chicago, Aug. 2.—(AP)—A threatening monkey wrench, tossed from Los Angeles to Chicago, ricocheted harmlessly off the championship fight machinery of Tex Rickard early today without leaving even a dent.

Jack Dempsey did the tossing, his missile being a statement that he could not possibly be ready to meet Gene Tunney in their 10-round heavyweight title match at Soldiers' Field here, September 15—the date Rickard had set.

Three minutes after Dempsey's statement had been received here Rickard assured newspapermen that there would be no dispute over the date, that he knew all about Dempsey's attitude, and that everything was all right.

"I won't be ready until September 22 at the earliest," said Dempsey in Los Angeles, "and I would rather have September 29 as the date."

To which Rickard replied:—"It makes no difference to me. I chose September 15 merely to permit George Getz, my Chicago ally to get away Sept. 21 on a trip to Africa he had planned. However, he is willing to stay over and help me out on September 22 if necessary, and so we probably will stage the fight on that date."

Dempsey's objection to the September 15th date was that his wife, Estelle Taylor, is ill, her condition being such that her physicians have advised her not to attempt the trip to Chicago for another 10 days or two weeks.

Rickard said there is nothing in his contract to compel Dempsey to fight Tunney Sept. 15th. He added, however, that he is confident Dempsey will withdraw his objection to that date after the situation has been explained to him. Rickard expected to communicate with Dempsey by telephone during the day.

Word of Dempsey's attitude came several hours after Rickard had made definite announcement that the fight would be held in Soldiers' Field here. The New York promoter in a radio talk following completion of arrangements for use of the stadium declared the Tunney-Dempsey match was, in his opinion, the best he had ever made.

Ruether And Moore Year's Surprises

New York.—(INS)—The heavy bombing work of the Huggins artillery has raised so much dust that most folks can't get a squint at the pitchers who have been sniping so consistently behind the barrage.

But just the same the lads who specialize in curve balls and fast ones have been on the job.

And a pitching staff that was supposed to be several parasangs weaker than a common house fly has shown the surprising sting of a man-sized enterprising Jersey mosquito.

Right now and for most of the time since the season started. The Yankee pitchers have been the class of the American League. And with the possible exception of the Cubs and the Cardinals, there is nothing in the National League to top them.

A rather surprising thing, but true.

And the chief member of the Huggins squad—the guy who has turned mediocrity into near perfection, is a lumbering, slow-moving, farmer chap by the name of Moore. First name, Wilcy. Nickname Cy.

Mr. Moore has started mighty few ball games since the season opened. But he has finished a lot of them—and always well. So far this season he has appeared in thirty-three ball games, and in all that time he pitched just one bad inning. His earned run average is the lowest on the club.

The chief advantage of having Moore around, so far as the other pitchers are concerned, is that the regulars are now relieved of any necessity for bull pen duty. In the old days Huggins had no capable relief men, and if one of his regulars started getting his bumps it meant that another regular had to go in and relieve him. As a result the boys were constantly being called upon to work out of turn and consequently they were worn out most of the time.

Next to Moore's performances, the most remarkable thing about the Yankee pitching is, perhaps, the rejuvenation of Dutch Ruether. A lot of unkind things have been said and written about Dutch during his big league career. And the boys who wrote them will have to eat their own words this season.

Ruether, right now, is the leading pitcher of the league—and deserves to be. He has performed consistently and well. He has pitched with infinite skill and almost uncanny judgment, and has rolled up victory after victory through the excellence of his work. In all his starts this season he has pitched only one bad inning. That was against Washington when he was knocked out in the first frame—and his trouble came more from over-anxiousness than from inability.

Would Advertise N. Carolina Apples

Raleigh, Aug. 2—(AP)—A plan for the exploitation of North Carolina apples that proposes to make this fruit as well known as a product of this state as the widely heralded Sunkist orange is for California, is suggested to Gov. A. W. McLean by Edward A. Oldham of New York City, a former Tar Heel.

Mr. Oldham declares that he has mapped out a plan for "advertising and distribution of North Carolina apples that will make them a permanent asset."

One of the plans in mind is "The North Carolina Apple Book," to be illustrated in colors, showing actual sizes of fruit and counties producing them. The packing of the fruit for market will be dealt upon in detail.

Continuing his plan, Mr. Oldham declares that his plan would create an immediate market for the fruit and forms of advertising that will make the fruit talked about, "even more than the California press-agented Sunkist oranges, and create a permanent demand for them."

"If I remember aright, North Carolina was awarded the first distinction at the Philadelphia Centennial Exposition in 1876 for having the greatest variety of apples and the best fruit. If this fact has ever been capitalized, I do not recall it."

Governor McLean has referred the suggested plan of Mr. Oldham to George Ross, chief of the bureau of markets of the state department of agriculture, director Wade H. Phillips, department of conservation and development, and J. C. K. McClure, a member of the conservation department board, with a request that they study the suggestion and take such action as they deem advisable.

Gov. R. O. Brewster, of Maine, at the closing session of the governors of the states, held in Michigan, presented the captured flags to Gov. Richards, of South Carolina. Each one of them had fallen into the hands of Maine soldiers during battle but the era of good-will has come and so the trophy cabinets of this Northern state were stripped of captured flags in order that they might be returned to the Southern states in evidence of "great good feeling."

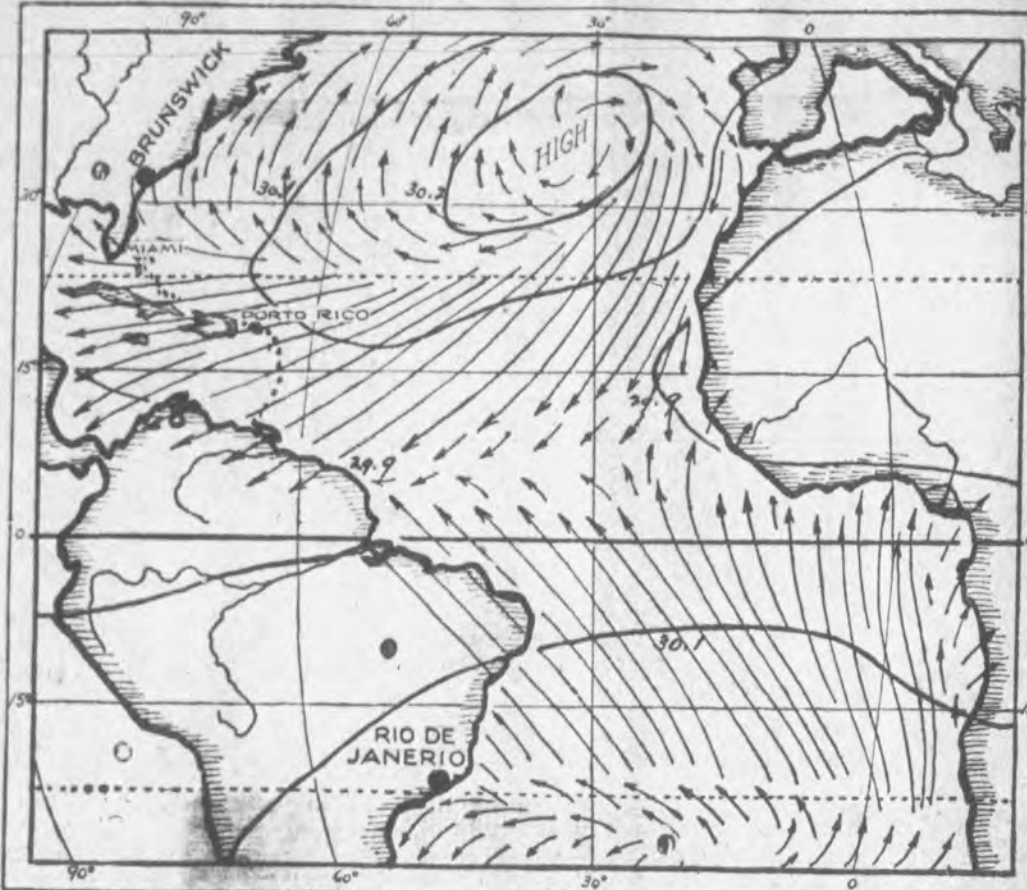
This is not the first time that such a return has been made, but the dramatic scene, as Gov. Brewster delivered his flags will not be soon forgotten. It serves to emphasize again the great re-union which has blessed the people of the United States, and demonstrates the friendly thoughtfulness that prompts such restorations.

MOTORISTS, ATTENTION

Calling attention of motorists to the fact that rear lights on an automobile are as essential for safety as are the front lights, the Wilson Times says:

"Since the passage of the 1927 law by the Legislature affecting the operation of motor cars, considerable interest and enthusiasm has been manifested by the owners of cars in having their front lights tested, and seeking to conform with the law. Apparently no such interest is attached to the condition of the rear lights of cars.

DANGEROUS WEATHER CONDITIONS
FACES REDFERN ON BRAZILIAN HOP

The above chart, prepared by C. F. von Herrmann, government meteorologist, of Atlanta, in a study of the weather Paul Redfern is like to encounter in his proposed light to Rio de Janeiro from Brunswick, Ga. It indicates the flyer will meet either opposing currents or strong winds in an easterly direction virtually the entire distance of his route.

He will face a region where tropical hurricanes are frequent, in addition to severe thunderstorms and baffling winds. The length of the arrow lines indicates the strength of the winds and the direction. The continuous lines pass through points of equal pressure. The latter indicate Redfern will meet his lowest pressure and the most dangerous part of his journey—from an atmospheric viewpoint—just before he reaches the equator.

Brunswick, Ga. —(AP)—Paul Redfern in his proposed flight from Brunswick to Rio de Janeiro across the Caribbean sea, "from the point of view of the weather likely to be encountered will have a far more difficult task to perform than crossing the Pacific or the Atlantic," declares C. F. von Herrmann, government meteorologist at Atlanta.

"He will encounter either opposing currents or strong winds from an easterly direction which will tend to make the airplane drift strongly toward the right, or toward the interior of the continent," von Herrmann says in a study of the weather the young flyer is likely to encounter.

"In addition he will have to cross a region where tropical hurricanes are frequent, and the doldrums which are characterized by severe thunderstorms and baffling winds.

"Both these classes of storms are formed between the two per-

manent areas of high pressure in the Atlantic about the latitudes of 30 degrees north and south of the equator. Tropical storms during July and August are mostly formed between Cape Verde Island and the ocean just east of Porto Rico whence they are carried by the prevailing winds into the Caribbean, or across Cuba. Fortunately, they are rather uncommon in July though they increase rapidly in frequency in August. Northeastern South America and the entire region of the Amazon river have heavy summer rains.

"Immediately on leaving Brunswick moderate opposing winds are likely to be encountered, but by the time the aviator reaches Cuba, the northeast to easterly trade winds will prevail with gradually increasing strength, blowing directly across the line of travel and tending to force the airplane toward Yucatan and Panama.

"These cross winds he will continue to encounter both at the surface and at the usual flying altitudes until he has entered the main South American continent and is approaching the equator.

"Here for perhaps 5 to 10 degrees of latitude, baffling winds will be encountered with air pockets, extending to great altitudes, and probably thunderstorms.

"After crossing the equator and heading southeast toward Rio de Janeiro Redfern will encounter strong southeast trade winds at almost all possible flying altitudes. These will cause a right-hand drift toward the Andes mountains over the trackless forest of the Amazon.

"However, as he finally approaches Rio de Janeiro conditions will materially improve, the winds will diminish, though still opposing flight. Thunderstorms will become less frequent and good flying weather will prevail."

LEADS IN AUTO
REGISTRATION

N. Carolina had 441,650 Cars Registered up Until The First Of July.

Charlotte, Aug. 2.—(AP)—North Carolina led the South in automobile registrations up to July 1, 1927, according to figures received in motor circles here today.

There were 441,650 registrations in this State up to that period, a gain of 49,977 over the previous year, the largest in the South, the figures showed.

Florida, which showed a decrease in registrations, came second to North Carolina. There were 374,757 registrations reported in that State. South Carolina was placed at the bottom of the ten Southern States in the compilation with only 174,523 registrations, however, South Carolina showed a gain of 22,173 motor cars.

According to the figures, there is an automobile for every 6.6 persons in this State, whereas in South Carolina one car must do for 10.6 persons.

North Carolina rated 17 among the 48 States in the union in automobile registrations, only California, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Texas, Wisconsin and Massachusetts exceeding North Carolina in the number of automobiles.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Center of Population

Chicago. — (INS) — Americans spend too little time in selecting and eating their foods. Europeans are now making eating a fine art. Two hours at the table, eating the food slowly, is now the average time for dinner, even in the cafes and restaurants of Europe.

There were the declarations made here today by Ernest Byfield, president, and Frank W. Baring, Chicago millionaire, who recently completed a study of European conditions.

"With the joys of pre-Valentine days denied them, Americans should take a leaf from Europe's book and re-discover the joys of eating," Byfield declared. "The first thing that impresses us in Europe this trip was the progress the Europeans are making in the development of foods. They eat no more than they did previously but they are eating aesthetically."

They are horrified by the rush and hurry of Americans and insist we are missing a great national opportunity. Paris and London shops are now closed tight at 12 o'clock noon because all their best customers have set aside that period of the day for the enjoyment of food and there is no use attempting to transact business as the proprietors go to lunch too.

Prices everywhere that Americans congregate are still high, Byfield said.

Europe is being swept by a wave of modernism in art and decoration and is rapidly removing itself from traditional forms and inspirations. Chicago and New York shops and office buildings will hardly be distinguishable from those of Paris and London within the next few years, he believes.

A 13-year-old boy, wading in Deep River near the Illinois-Indiana State line, discovered in a shady dell the living grave of countless animals many years ago.

Paleontologists, familiar with the territory expressed the belief that the animals had become caught in the quagmire and had been sucked down in the swirling waters. Quick-sand beds were once known in the vicinity. Buried in the sands were the bones of large elks, deer, and smaller animals. The dell is believed to have been a treacherous watering-place for wild game.

The youth, whose discovery of the watery grave is deemed an important one by scientists, came across what he believed to be the branches of a submerged tree. Tugging at the stems he brought forth the antlers of an elk. He reported his discovery and a cursory examination caused the unearthing of other bones. Chicago paleontologists plan to excavate the region.

A room where the roar of a hungry lion sounds like the squeaking of a mouse is on exhibit here at the Permanent Builders' Exposition.

Servants of domestic discord immediately rushed to the conclusion that the room would be an ideal addition to any household. The room has been named the "quarrel-proof" chamber.

"Just think what a boon this room is to humanity," pointed out C. B. Craig, manager of the exposition. "The husband with the voice of a mad bull, the whining nagging of a wife, the lusty yowls of an infant in the early hours, the husband who sings while shaving, the wife who yelps for the benefit of the neighbors that she's going back to mother—all these can now be eliminated."

The secret of the room is in a perforated ceiling, through which sound vibrations filter and become lost in a maze of absorbents. All vibration is reduced to an absolute minimum.

Technically the room is not dissimilar to a radio broadcasting studio.

PRESIDENT ROUNDS OUT FOUR YEARS

And it is Believed Mr. Coolidge Will Not Block Way for Re-nomination.

Rapid City, S. D., Aug. 2.—(AP)—Calvin Coolidge, today ends four years as President of the United States to which he succeeded upon the death of President Harding.

One year and seven months remain in the four year term to which Mr. Coolidge was elected as President in the fall of 1924—a little more than a year after he first took office.

In this period it will be decided whether he will or can succeed himself for another elective term of four years which would entitle him to the office of President for a longer period than has been served by any other chief executive of the nation, two regular terms totalling eight years added to the year and seven months of Mr. Harding's term completed by him.

There has been a unanimity of opinion among those here with the President and among national political leaders who have come here this summer that Mr. Coolidge would not stand in the way of a movement to nominate him at the convention of the Republican Party next June, but a few of his friends have predicted that he will not be a candidate.

It is pointed out by some as too early for Mr. Coolidge to make such a decision. So far as is known no one has asked him point blank in direct conversation of his intentions.

It is recalled that in the 1924 Pro-Constitution Campaign Mr. Coolidge made no announcement whatever that he was a candidate. He did have a campaign manager and he positively sanctioned the movements in various states to have convention delegates instructed in his favor. William M. Butler, his campaign manager then, today is chairman of the Republican National Committee.

Besides Mrs. Coolidge there are few with the President today who were with him or associated with him on the eventful night four years ago when Warren Harding died.

Erwin Geiser, confidential stenographer to Mr. Coolidge was by his side here again today at the Executive Offices. Geiser was with Mr. Coolidge in the isolated farm house of Col. John Coolidge on the night of August 2, 1923. A telegraph agency got word into Bridgewater, six miles from Plymouth, about 11 o'clock that night of the death of President Harding and Geiser who happened to be there was one of the first to get the word to Mr. Coolidge a half hour later.

Edward T. Clark, confidential secretary to the President, who was his secretary then in Washington, is also here today. He got Washington officials into communication

with the store of Miss Florence Gilby where the only telephone in Plymouth was located and passed along over this wire the oath of office which was administered to the President about 2:30 A. M.

Five of the ten present Cabinet officers were appointed by Mr. Harding—Secretaries Mellon, Hoover, Work, Davis of the Labor Department and Postmaster General New.

Hickory Man Shot By Unknown Party

Hickory, Aug. 2.—(AP)—Earl Williams, victim of a mysterious attack on the highway near here, yesterday afternoon, died in a local hospital about noon today. He never completely regained consciousness after he told police late yesterday that he had been shot by a negro man who wanted to sell him some liquor.

However, local authorities are increasing their efforts to arrest two white men, one of whom will be charged with the murder of Williams.

Hickory, N. C., Aug. 2.—(AP)—Earl Williams, about 30 years old was still clinging to life at a local hospital this morning while police of three counties searched for his mysterious assailants. Williams is shot through the liver and his abdomen is punctured in three places.

Just before he was placed on the operating table, from which doctors told him he might never return alive, Williams swore to police investigators that he was shot by an unknown negro who wanted him to buy some whisky. But members of a railroad section gang who are said to have seen the shooting yesterday afternoon declare that Williams was shot by a white man.

The railroad laborers said that while they were working just across the Burke county line, about four miles west of Hickory they saw a car stop on the highway near them. Three men got out, they declared and an argument begun. A pistol fired several times and one of the three men dropped to the ground the workers told police.

Before any one could get to the car they said the two men picked up the third and placed him in the car, driving away hurriedly. Williams was brought to a local hospital by two men in a car who said they found him on the side of the road. One of the men gave his name as W. A. Young of Charlotte.

Police said this morning that they had a strong clue and expected to make an arrest any time. Chief Lentz said, "I am waiting on a long distance call from Raleigh and will probably make the arrest a few minutes after it comes through." He would not divulge the nature of the call.

NEXT HIGHWAY LETTING SET FOR AUGUST 23
Raleigh, Aug. 2.—(AP)—The next highway letting will be on August 23, Frank Page, State Highway Commission chairman, said today. The projects to be advertised for letting have not been fully decided upon.

The letting inaugurates the fall program. On the same day the Supreme Court meets in opening the fall session.

CUT EXPENSES IN CLINIC WORK

Board of Commissioners Reduce Operating Expenses \$450 a Year.

Members of the county board of commissioners in regular monthly session in this city yesterday morning reduced expenses in connection with operation of the Pitt County Health Department. The reduction involves an annual sum of \$450 for the operation of a venereal clinic. The clinic for the past several months has been conducted by Drs. Grady Dixon, of Ayden, and K. B. Pace, of Greenville.

The commissioners were of the opinion that the clinic should be conducted by officials of the Health Department. Drs. Dixon and Pace, however, agreed to continue their work free of charge for an indefinite period. As soon as they decide to give up the work it will be carried on by the health department.

This was the only thing of interest considered by the commissioners yesterday. Considerable time of course, was consumed in the disposition of regular routine business, but the decks were cleared by one o'clock and adjournment declared in order.

The session was presided over by S. T. White, with every member of the board present. The routine work consisted largely in the liquidation of monthly accounts, settlement with the various officials, and adjustment of business with the other various departments.

GIRLS BUY SMALL SHOES DESPITE CRAMPED FEET

Washington.—(AP)—The desire for small feet is by no means confined to the women of China, judging from the report just issued by the American Home Economics Association on effects of various types of shoes on the feet of high school students.

A survey made by professor Katherine Cranor of Iowa State College and by Maude Eastwood Little, covering 311 high schools girls showed that shoes both too short and too narrow were worn by 296. Only 28 wore correct length and 14 correct width shoes.

The shoes were examined as to type, length and width. Next the feet were measured and examined for defects. Only one student was found to have normal feet.

Despite the fact that high school girls are supposed to be of flapper age and tastes, the investigators did not find the high heel much in evidence. Oxfords were most commonly worn though the older girls wore pumps frequently. Only about 75 per cent of the shoes had been fitted on the wearers when purchased.

WIFE OF EARL'S HEIR FIRST TITLED WOMAN TO RUN LAUNDRY

London.—(INS)—Lady Ossulton, wife of the heir to the Earl of Tankerville, is Britain's first titled woman laundry director.

She has joined the board of a prominent laundry company and with very definite ideas regarding what the public wants intends to devote her time to the perfection of a process for the elimination of laundry marks, look after housewives' interests, and conduct welfare work among laundry employees.

"I want to involve the perfect laundry," Lady Ossulton told reporters. "None but a woman can realize to the full the possibilities of laundry reform. More than fifty per cent of laundry work consists of feminine garments, and a good deal of the remainder is made up of household materials under the charge of the mistress of the house."

ONE INJURED WHEN GOLDSBORO BUS TURNS OVER NEAR WILSON

Wilson, N. C., August 2.—(AP)—One man was painfully injured today when the Wilson-Goldsboro Bus turned over on the Goldsboro Highway about six miles from this city. Details of the accident could not be learned, but it was said the bus was slightly damaged.

Mike Romanos, Goldsboro, the injured man, was brought to a local hospital, suffering an injured shoulder.

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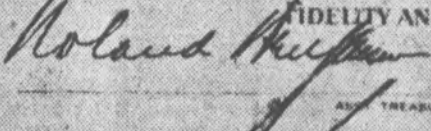
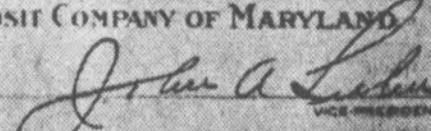
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
