MOB MADNESS
DOES NOT COW
UNITED STATES

Dr. Willis Tells Presbyterians of Conditions as They Exist Today.

Montreat, N. C. August 10—(AP)—"America is a nation of law and not to be intimidated by popular clamor and mob madness," Dr. William T. Ellis, noted traveler and journalist told the general missions conference of the Presbyterian Church in session here today. He was discussing the threats against the United States if Sacco and Vanzetti are electrocuted tomorrow morning.

"Mob madness, even though world wide," he said, "cannot cow America or divert the law from pursuing a constitutional course. From all points of the compass come bewildering reports of anti-American manifestations by International communists. We are witnessing an amazing demonstration of organized radicalism or Russianism which takes the arrogant position that no representative radical shall suffer the penalty of the law. Open threats are being made against America, should the law be permitted to take its course in this instance."

"Responsible French newspapers declare that the relations between the two nations are imperiled by this verdict of Massachusetts Court. Mob violence is predicted against American representatives almost everywhere in the world. Great strikes are ordered in many lands. A reign of terrorism by the communists of America and the world is openly threatened."

"The time for true Americans to think straight. Some of our communities, which have given way to lynch law, are suddenly stricken with shame and confusion at finding themselves in such company. Law defying citizens had not foreseen what dire consequences may follow repudiation of constitutionalism. They little dreamed that individual disregard of the courts is but the overture to the mad music of the dictatorship of the proletariat."

"Now we are suddenly brought up standing to confront the question of whether we shall carry out the orderly processes of Legislative and judicial procedure; or whether we shall yield to mob clamor. Whatever may be our sympathies with these two condemned aliens they have been found guilty of murder, and entitled to the extreme penalty of the law. A brave and honest Christian Governor of the state of Massachusetts assisted by a council of three eminent publicists reviewed the case and confirmed the verdict of the courts."

"It must be understood by the whole world that America is a nation of law and not to be intimidated by popular clamor at home or abroad. We shall do what is right in scorn of consequences. America cannot be frightened into any course of action that is contrary to our convictions. Justice confronted by mob madness stands steady and serene."

Wrenn's Denial
Of Confession
Causes Discussion

Winston-Salem, Aug. 10—(AP)—Denial by Clem Wrenn, president of the defunct Wilkes bank, that he had made a confession to his counsel that he alone was responsible for the forged Wilkes county notes, issued and sold other banks, has added further complications to a case that has for weeks been one of the biggest sensations and produced more discussion than perhaps anything that has ever happened in that section of the state.

Following Wrenn's denial of the forged confession, solicitor John R. Jones, who gave out the alleged signed confession for publication, was questioned a bit. The solicitor very promptly stated that the attorneys for Wrenn, J. H. Folger, and J. A. Roussau, came to his office Sunday, afternoon and told him of the confession that their client had made to them. Jones stated he told the attorneys that out of fairness to the public and to the county officials whose names were on the notes in question, a statement should be given to the press.

The solicitor then stated that he and the two lawyers drew up the confession which was that afternoon submitted to Wrenn for his approval. Only a few changes were made in it by the president of the defunct bank, Jones stated.

"Wrenn knew the statement was being prepared for the press," the solicitor Jones stated. "The confession was approved by Wrenn, returned to me by his lawyers, but was not signed. His attorneys will vouch for his having approved the document."

FINISH WORK
ON WAREHOUSE
OF THIS CITY

Forbes and Morton Announce Completion of Building Demolished by Snow.

The large tobacco warehouse of Forbes and Morton on Dickinson Avenue and Church street which was almost totally wrecked by the large snowstorm during the latter part of February, has been entirely rebuilt from the floor up, with many new improvements, according to announcement made this morning by W. Z. Morton, one of the proprietors and owners.

The improvements consist of several inches elevation of the roof, the addition of forty percent more skylights, increased width of the driveway about sixty feet, a larger and modern rest room for the ladies and larger and airy sleeping rooms for the farmers.

This warehouse when filled with tobacco requires practically a whole day to clear the floors.

Mr. Morton stated that he hired the best and most efficient force of book men, floor managers and auctioneers obtainable.

This is one of the seven warehouses that will be operated in Greenville this season.

Greenville will have ten acres of floor space this year in which to put the farmers tobacco out for sale. On this ten acres of space practically 2,000,000 pounds of tobacco can be displayed for sale each day.

The Greenville tobacco market will open Sept. 6 at 9 o'clock with four sets of buyers. K. W. Cobb, secretary and treasurer, stated this morning that as several warehouses had hired extra auctioneers he thought the Greenville tobacco market would be in a position to sell 1,225,000 pounds of tobacco daily. This means a great convenience to the farmers of the twenty counties that will in Greenville as it will enable them generally to sell their tobacco and return home the same day.

EXTENSIONS
P. N. R. R. MAY
BE ALLOWED

Brief Filed Says Proposed Extension of Railroad not new Project.

Charlotte, N. C. August 10—(AP)—The record in the case of the Piedmont and Northern Railroad justifies the Interstate State Commerce Commission in finding that the proposed construction of extensions to cost \$12,000,000 to lines in the Carolinas will be part of a line of railroad, the construction which was begun in good faith prior to the enactment of the Cummings Acts stated the state of South Carolina and joint intervenors, in a brief filed with commission in behalf of the Piedmont and Northern.

The text of this brief was made public here Wednesday by W. S. O. Robinson, general counsel of the Piedmont and Northern, which is applying to the commission for a certificate of public convenience and necessity. That certificate would constitute the authority for construction of the extensions, which would connect Charlotte and Winston-Salem, in this state, and Gastonia and Spartanburg S. C.

Joining with Gov. John G. Richards, of South Carolina in signing this brief were the railroad commission of that state; and a number of South Carolina cities and Chambers of Commerce.

The testimony of Sam G. Blease, Chairman of the Railroad Commission; A. J. Maxwell, of the North Carolina Corporation Commission.

W. S. Lee, Vice-President of the Piedmont and Northern, was cited in the brief in support of the contention that the proposed construction will be the continuation of a project left incomplete. The intervenors pointed out that the Interstate Commerce Commission, in the case of the San Antonio and Arkansas Pass Railroad, in Texas when that construction was authorized, that "the project is not a new one, but merely the resurrection and completion of a project inaugurated some twenty years ago, partially carried out but never finished."

"This might well have been written of the Piedmont and Northern case," said the brief. "The construction of a line from Greenwood, to Winston-Salem was the plan inaugurated by Mr. J. B. Duke, and his associates nearly twenty years ago. Its construction was begun but never completed. Obviously it was never intended that it should exist as at present with two disconnected and separate branches, one line running from Greenwood to Spartanburg, and a line from Gastonia to Charlotte."

Construction of extensions to connect sections of existing lines is in accord with the policy of the Interstate Commerce Commission as established in the Oregon short line case, the brief said.

More flexible and satisfactory service will be rendered by the electrically operated P. and N. it was stated by the intervenors, who added that the asserted ability of the Southern Railway to adequately serve the territory unfortunately is not shared by some of the largest shippers along its lines. The argument emphasized the statement that the completion of the applicant's line "will not injure any other carrier, but will develop new business."

The brief also said, "Its worst fears are realized and its net earnings reduced to \$14 per share, the Southern could still serve the south—and its stockholders."

Find Body of Young White Woman

Raleigh, August 10—(AP)—Boys today discovered the body of a young white woman in Crabtree creek near Edwards Mill about four miles north of this city.

The body had apparently been in the water for several days. The skull had been crushed with a blunt instrument.

The body was badly decomposed and early attempts at identification were futile. The woman was well clothed.

MEMORIAL TO
BE CARVED IN
S. DOKATA

Gutzon Borglum to Carve Figures of Four Presidents on Mountainside.

Keystone, S. D. August 10—(AP)—On a towering granite mountain rising proudly in the midst of the Black Hills man laid his hand today to begin a gigantic memorial to four American Presidents who chartered the course for their country's progress.

The mountain from which the figures of Washington, Jefferson, Lincoln and Roosevelt are to be carved, was so deep in the forest that President Coolidge with the leading role in the dedication had a saddle horse reserved here for him for the four mile journey to Rushmore, the name by which the memorial rock is known.

A narrow winding trail which some day is to succumb to a modern graveled automobile highway goes up to rushmore from Keystone but occasional rains have made it tortuous for automobile travel and the President's party had the saddle horses on hand for use in an emergency.

At Rushmore there was no Radio hook-up as is customary when Mr. Coolidge speaks, no telegraph wires for newspaper correspondents. There was only a five party line telephone to the outside world and that four miles away.

The Rushmore Memorial to be carved by Gutzon Borglum, beginning the head of Washington today he hopes to follow as quickly as funds are provided with the figures of the other three presidents.

The completed memorial, the largest of its kind in the world, is intended to typify the growth of the United States through four presidents who took dominant parts in the country's progress.

Washington was selected because he was the first Jefferson because through his efforts the dominion was extended westward; Lincoln because he saved the union and Roosevelt because through the Pan-American canal which he brought to reality, east was linked with west.

Two Men Shot By Gangsters At Chicago, Ill.

Chicago, Aug. 10—(AP)—The bodies of two men believed to have been "taken for a ride" and shot to death in the usual gangster fashion were found lying on a suburban road early today. Scattered glass and a number of 45 calibre pistol shells strewed the road near the bodies, indicating the men had been shot in an automobile and their bodies tossed out. The men apparently were Italians.

FIRE DESTROYS HOME AND \$500 IN SAVINGS

Cerro Gordo, Aug. 10—(AP)—Nothing but ashes remained today of the home of Mrs. Fannie Grant, widow, who lived near here. The building, valued at \$4,000 was not insured and the owner reported that \$500 in cash in a trunk was also burned.

GEORGIA MARKET
AVERAGED \$17.70 FOR
THE FIRST WEEK

The Georgia tobacco market average \$17.70 for the opening week this season, according to the report of the Department of Agriculture of that state, just made public.

According to the report, sale for the opening week this season were 7,149,156 pounds at an average of \$17.70 compared with sales of 8,239,758 pounds at an average of \$24.33 for the opening week last season.

The quality of this year's offerings was considered somewhat below last year and believed to be responsible to an extent for the difference in the price.

BORDER BELT
PRICES GOOD

Five Million Pounds Of Bright Leaf Handled in S. C. at Opening Yesterday.

(By ASSOCIATED PRESS)

Farmers through the bright leaf tobacco belt begun reaping their harvest when the "Border Belt," of North Carolina began auctions yesterday.

Prices in the neighborhood of \$2 per hundred average are general through the belt, which according to available information is satisfactory to the growers.

Throughout the belt, the demand is reported good, with cigarette tobaccos in especial demand on the South Carolina floors. Harvesting and curing the crop is well advanced with deliveries steady, insuring a good volume to daily sales.

Opening day sales on the South Carolina markets were estimated in excess of five million pounds, bringing in round figures approximately \$10,000,000. Due to the lateness of the opening date, curing is well advanced in the Palmetto state that deliveries to the warehouses have been heavy, with congestion on some floors so great that sales were not completed yesterday.

The top price reported on South Carolina floors yesterday was \$8 per hundred, paid for a lot at Lamar, but a number of sales at above \$50 were reported. Buyers on the South Carolina floors yesterday commented on the general good quality and weight of the weed.

FLOOD WATERS
RISE RAPIDLY
IN ARKANSAS

Water Said to be Pouring Through Levees Gaps at Pendleton and Medford.

Little Rock, Ark., Aug. 10—(AP)—Swept by three successive floods this year southeastern Arkansas today faced inundation again as flood waters on the Arkansas river poured through gaps in the levees, at Pendleton and Medford, forty miles south of Pinebluff.

Arkansas City out from under flood waters less than a month, preparing to carry on if the approaching flood reached the city.

The water was expected to reach the outskirts of the town late today but it was not believed there the city would again be flooded.

Desha and Chicot counties are bearing the brunt of the present flood, as they are in the area of the Pendleton and Medford gaps in the levee. Approximately 100,000 acres will be inundated, it was estimated but, the damage will be small.

Residents of the area who had returned to their water soaked homes after the disastrous floods of the spring, are not expected to evacuate the territory.

Red Cross officials say the new flood will not materially hamper rehabilitation. Relief agencies caring for 25,000 persons from Desha and Chicot counties.

Arkansas City's lone hope for escape inundation was the low stage of the Mississippi river, which it was believed might be able to carry off a large enough volume of the Arkansas river flood to prevent the water sweeping through the town again.

Two Killed When
Hawaiian Flight
Entry Crashes

Sandigo, Calif., Aug. 10—(AP)—Lieutenants George Covell and R. S. Wagener, U. S. N., who left here today in an airplane they had entered in the Dole flight to Honolulu were killed when the ship crashed into Point Loma, near here.

The plane was destroyed less than fifteen minutes after they had left for the Oakland, California airport where they intended to take off Friday in the Flight to Honolulu. The plane burst into flames after it struck Point Loma.

An orderly from the U. S. Naval Coaling Station at La Playa returned to his station and reported both bodies had been recovered.

From the position of the plane it was believed it had struck the west bank of the point as the airman were attempting to gain altitude.

Covell's body was found in the cockpit of the plane and was carried beyond recognition, identification being made from a wallet that was found in a pocket of his coat.

Wagener's body later was recovered from the wreckage and also was badly burned. Wagener is believed to have attempted to jump clear of the plane as it fell, but was caught in the wreckage.

GEORGIA FLIER TWO ITALIANS
ALL SET FOR FACE TO FACE
BRAZIL FLIGHT WITH ETERNITY

Paul Redfern to Visit Principal Cities of S. A. After Reaching Goal.

Brunswick, Ga., August 10—(AP)—Not content with the prospect of being the first fly from the United States to Brazil without stop, and possibly at the same time set a new distance and endurance aerial mark, Paul R. Redfern Georgia aviator, is looking forward to a visit to leading cities of South America, once his principal ambitions are fulfilled.

The 25 year old birdman, who hopes to set out within a few days alone, in his monoplane, "The Port of Brunswick," for a journey across the Caribbean Sea, the mountain ranges near South American coast, the jungle lands of the Amazon river and other paths fraught with danger, now declares he hopes to visit Buenos Aires, and possibly hop from there to the west coast of the southern hemisphere once he has landed safely in Brazil.

Redfern, told newspaper men that his trip had man purposes, first he says he hopes to break the non-stop distance record and also expects to reach Rio de Janeiro before coming down.

He also hopes the flight may center the attention of South American countries on the possibilities that now prevail in aerial transportation and communication, as well as convey the friendliness of the United States officially to the southern republic.

Until when I reach Rio or Pernambuco," no "if" being used, "I believe that I will have focussed the attention of some of the South American countries upon the possibilities of aerial communication and transportation, and with the many messages of good will which have already been given me, to carry I hope to convey to them in part, the actual feeling of good will which the United States has toward those countries."

Redfern believes "that South America affers a vast and fertile field for many United States Manufacturers, including in no small way our airplane builders," adding that Brazil and other nations of the South will soon be "using a large number of airplanes both commercially and for military and naval operations."

He declared that if he can pave the way for the accomplishment of this opening of the new industries, he will feel his flight has done great good and "will fully justify the risk."

The execution of the two men has been set for some time between midnight and morning. Whether Judge Sanderson's announcement presaged a postponement could not be told in advance of Gov. Fuller's making public his decision whether to grant a stay of execution.

The Judge's announcement followed a conference in Chambers with Attorney General Reading and Arthur D. Hill chief defense counsel. Reading and Hill, in a joint statement said that they had agreed substantially on the form of the bill of exceptions and that the bill would be put in final shape this afternoon.

Before the exceptions can come before the full bench of the court Judge Sanderson must give his consent.

Boston, Aug. 10—(AP)—Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti awoke today to face what presumably was to be their last day of life. Unless Governor Alvan T. Fuller and his council decide to grant them a eleventh hour respite, or their counsel can succeed in the last minute legal strategy, the seven year fight of the condemned men to escape electrocution will come to an end shortly after midnight.

With the electric chair at the Charlestown state prison, its straps oiled and its electrodes brightly burnished waiting and a triple line of guards patrolling the great walls of the cheerless penitentiary and other officers guarding nearby street the final hours of the condemned men sped by, unmarked by any departure from death house routine.

Celestino Madeiros, a third slayer was also to go to the chair early

Sacco-Vanzetti Sym-
pathizers Yell "Mob
Police-Strike" in
Demonstration.

MOB CLASHES
Chicago, Aug. 10—(AP)—Led by a 16 year old girl, a mob numbering four thousand men and women, alternately roaring the "third international" battle song of the world radicals and shouting "mob the police," marched toward the loop district early today. It was dispersed only after a clash with police reserves who restored to tear bombs and revolver shots.

Sixty seven men and four women including the gal-leader Aurora D'Angelo, pretty, bobbed-haired school gal were arrested. Several persons were reported injured as the mob broke and fled before the stubborn police resistance.

The mob, forming after a protest meeting at the Ashland auditorium moved toward the city hall and federal buildings. Urged on by the gal, who cried: "Oh, comrades. Sacco and Vanzetti must not die."

Automobiles in the street were smashed and windows were broken as the crowd surged toward the loop.

LE BOUFFE SLAYER GETS LIFE TERM

Franklin, La., Aug. 10—(AP)—James Beadle, Morgan City, rapper today was sentenced to life imprisonment for his part in the murder of James J. Le Boueff, Morgan City utilities man.

Southampton, Eng., Aug. 10—(AP)—Owing to adverse wind reports, Captain Frank T. Courtney decided at 9 a. m. that he would not make an attempt this morning to fly to Valencia, Ireland, on the first lap of his trans-Atlantic flight. He had been studying weather conditions since three a. m. at which time his flying boat "Whale" was made ready for the hop-off. He was expected to get away about 6:30 a. m.

Just when he plans to start now have not been announced.

Vanzetti and Sacco To Go to Chair Tomorrow Unless Fuller Grants Respite.

(By the Associated Press)
Protests came from nearly all over the civilized world in an effort to save Sacco and Vanzetti on this last scheduled day of their lives. The protests were mostly peaceful. In Buenos Aires a bomb damaged the Palace of Justice slightly, and in Montevideo and unexploded bomb was found.

France, Ireland and Canada reported meetings marked by good order.

In Havana and Santo Domingo the American legations were guarded. A sixteen year old girl led a wild crowd that did some damage in Chicago.

A bomb explosion in the town of Picher, Okla., was regarded with suspicion as possibly protest inspired.

The industrial section of the United States was tranquil in the forenoon.

Sacco and Vanzetti began their last day refusing breakfast, apparently apathetic.

Governor Fuller's reply to their last request for delay of execution was not expected until late in the day.

Police departments were held on emergency duty throughout the day in dozens of cities, following frustrated demonstrations last night and announcements that new efforts would be made to hold such meetings up to the final hour.

Protest strikes called in leading cities yesterday failed to come up to the point of numbers of workers who were expected by leaders to leave their employment. At Rochester, N. Y., however, ten thousand clothing workers left their jobs, while in New York City leaders gave an estimated estimate of 400,000 being on strike.

Boston, August 10—(AP)—Judge Sanderson of the Supreme Court announced today that he would give his decision tomorrow morning on the question whether he has the power to permit the sending to the full bench of that court of a bill of exceptions to his refusal to grant a writ of error and a writ of habeas corpus in the Sacco-Vanzetti case.

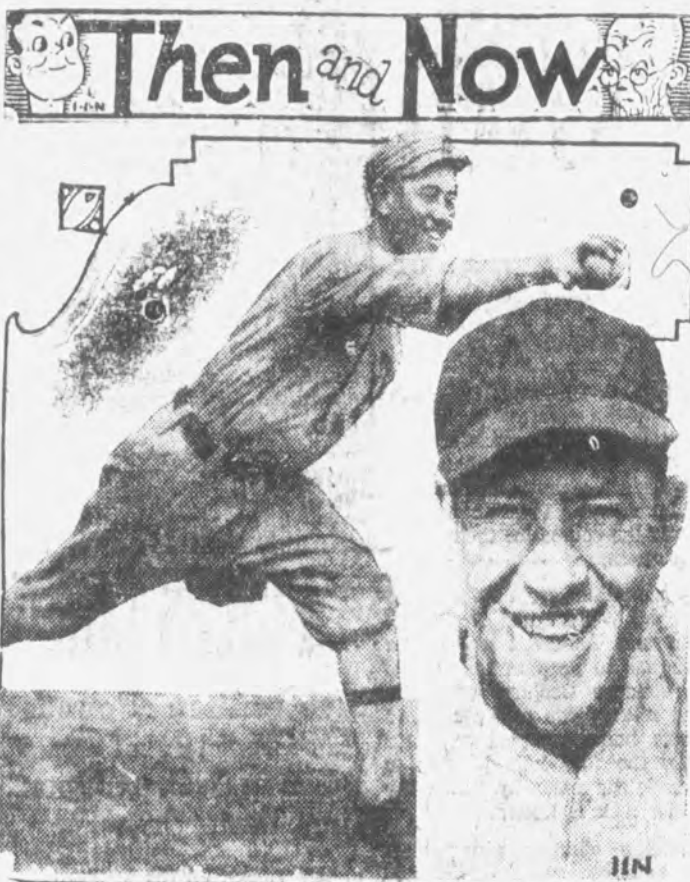

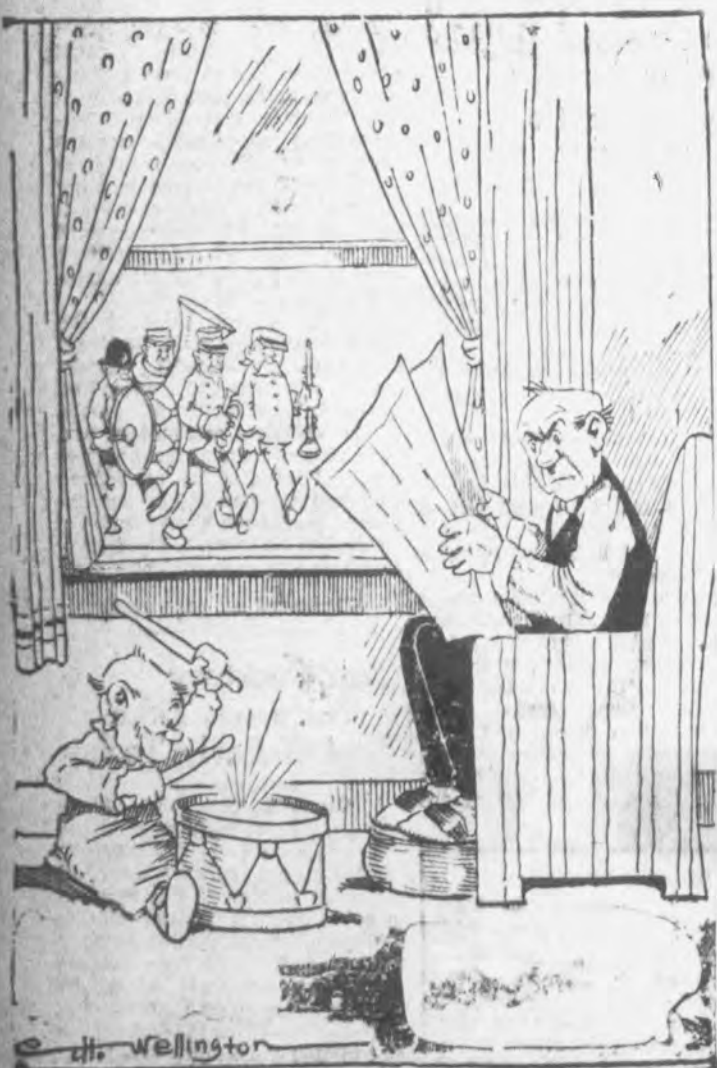

Milburn has been playing the game for thirty years, and he doesn't show the slightest sign of being "burnt out." He still has the stamina and gameness to carry him through in one of the most exacting competitions in sports.
And remember this: Polo is only a hobby with him. He doesn't let it interfere with his business. After the hottest sort of a battle, with much younger players "all in" the next day, you'll always find Milburn at his desk, bright and early and chipper as the proverbial lark.
He's forty-six years old now, but you'd never know it. He made his debut in international polo in 1897 on the famous team which also had Larry Waterbury, Harry Payne Whitney and Monty Waterbury as members. They've passed out of the picture, but Milburn's still going strong.
Cracked ribs, internal injuries and other damages sustained from nasty falls have never prevented him from playing. He's as game as they make them—a splendid athlete, a rough rider, a brilliant polo mind and one of the hardest hitters the sport has ever seen.
Back in 1913 "Devy," as his friends call him, proposed to the beautiful Miss Nancy Steele, then a much prized society bud. "Win the cup and you'll win me," said Miss Steele. And Milburn's playing against the British invaders was the sensation of the day. Yes—Miss Steele is Mrs. Milburn now.
The Milburns are as popular in England as they are here. During the Prince of Wales's visit to this country the Milburns played host to royalty on several occasions.
"Devy" is all primed and rarin' to go against the British-Army-in-India team in defense of the cup, at Meadow Brook, L. I., and it's a safe bet that once again his playing and riding will be the supreme features of the clash.

Like many of the sailors who go down to the sea in ships, Clarence D. Chamberlin, who flew across the Atlantic, does not know how to swim. One would think a swimming ought to be a part of the preliminary training of both sailors and flyers.

NO TIME TO FALTER

With less than 24 hours remaining before Sacco and Vanzetti are scheduled to pay with their lives for the death of a paymaster seven years ago at their hands, every known legal effort is being made to stay the execution, and the American people today are wondering what the outcome of these efforts will be.

Unfortunate for the American people the two self-confessed anarchists were valuable members of this country, and in the case the radicals have found opportunity to gain publicity by an attempt to make martyrs of the two murderers alleging illegal conviction because they were "Reds," and in so doing they hope to gain friends for the red flag.

Despite the estimated thousands who threaten sympathetic strikes if the two men are executed, as we see it the radical element is small compared with the total number of citizens of the United States and this is no time for the nation to bow its head in submission to those whose underlying principle is disregard for law and the destruction of government.

During the seven years since the murder, Sacco and Vanzetti have been given every legal consideration,

Vanzetti, whose hunger strike has not been as rigid as that of his companion, has paced his cell and has been largely preoccupied with numerous letters. Sacco, however, he had ceased to believe that escape is possible. "I die for Anarchy," has been the burden of his correspondence.

Madieros seems to have least concern over his fate although he will be the first to be strapped into the chair, if the usual arrangements are followed.

More policemen took post in the streets that circumscribe the walls and on the nearby bridges, closing some and guarding others. Even residents of the thoroughfares facing the prison were restricted in their movements while entrance to the prison itself was almost impossible to gain.

In today's last minute legal battles, a hastily summoned meeting of the governor's council occupied major interest. Some in touch with the case at the state house forecast the possibility of a second respite to allow the state Supreme Court to pass on exceptions to Supreme Court Justice Sanderson's dismissal of a plea for writs of error and a Habeas Corpus Writs.

Columbia, Ky.—(AP)—The Mississippi river, which gave the town of Columbus to the nation is slowly reclaiming its gift.

For many years the mighty stream sweeping around a gentle curve in its course, deposited silt and sediment at the foot of a high bluff until the soil was built out for almost a mile. On this rich bottom Columbus was laid out and has thrived.

Floods came from time to time, but Columbus built levees and a 2,500 foot reventment, and a wooden island above the town helped to stay the waves. When the great surge of 1917 swept down the river it changed the course of the waters from the east to the west side of the protective island. A reventment was built by the Iron Mountain railroad company to hold in check the waters which threatened the town.

But in 1924 the current cuta deeper into the city frontage, eating behind the reventment. Government engineers inspected the site and appropriation of \$175,000 was made for a new bulwark. Before the work started in 1927 flood came, covering Columbus with 12 feet of water and washing away most of the protective levees.

The river bank has now caved in 300 feet of the business section and it is doubtful whether the money available will build a suitable reventment. The town is crumbling into the stream whence it sprang.

So Columbus is going to move to a new site. A high bluff has been selected not far away, overlooking the Mississippi for miles in each direction. Away from the bluff and the river stretches a rich plateau, part of which was once laid out as a national capital. Thomas Jefferson proposed the site, but it was rejected in congress by a single vote.

Paris — An American has brought jazz to Barbizon, the sleepy little town on the edge of the Forest of Fontainebleau, where Millet painted his celebrated "Angelus."

Alf Grand, the proprietor of "Tumble Inn," is the nephew of Sarah Grand, who wrote "The Heavly Twins," and was born in England of very pious parents. Alf ran away from home when he was seventeen and one day turned up at his uncle's home in Philadelphia. His days since that time have been everything until one day found him at Barbizon, where he decided to establish a home of good eating.

He leased an old stone barn, such as can be found only in France, and transformed it into "Tumble Inn." He left the old walls just as he found them but improved the interior. There is a delightful lounge-bar where one can drink the most delicious mint julep ever dreamed of, and a lovely garden of flowers and vegetables which are picked just before they are cooked.

Maryland chicken, corn-fritters, clam chowder, lobster a 'merican are only a few of the American delicacies Alf and his charming wife prepare for any people of any nationality who happen to come along. They can satisfy anybody's appetite and almost by magic, between one or two appetizers, Madame, who does the real "home-cooking," always comes in a moment to smile and shake hands—unless they are in doubt because of some delicious apple pie someone has ordered.

"To much salt is at the base of nearly all the maladies of old age," declares Dr. Jean Bouchon, one of the best French surgeons. "It picks man's organism just as it does pork or cucumbers."

Salt, according to this doctor, causes arteritis, hypertension, uraemia, heart-trouble, asthma, catarrh and serious constipation. Salt also provokes bad headaches, wakefulness, general debility and that tired feeling so many have and wonder why they have it. Finally salt is the real reason for three-fourths of the rheumatic troubles one finds among persons hovering around fifty.

A certain amount of salt is necessary, but very little, Dr. Bouchon says, and this little should be diluted in milk. He advises everyone to get the habit of the "Milk & Petizer," a glass of good milk before every meal which will receive the salted food and make it harmless to the system.

"Drink a large bowl of milk before going to your next banquet," the French doctor advises, "and you will find yourself feeling better than ever before. Chew a little gum afterward, too."

"Do away with the salt-cellar on your tables. The cook will put enough salt into beefsteak and potatoes and remember that nearly all green vegetables contain a certain amount of natural salt which is the best of all. Remember too, that Moses from Mount Sinai ordered the Hebrews to eat unsalted bread during Jewish Easter."

Paris policeman are beginning to earn English in earnest in order to be able to direct the thousands of English and American tourists swarming through the city's streets. Monsieur Jean Confida, one-time English professor to Myron T. Herrick, American Ambassador to France, and special interpreter to the American Expeditionary Forces has been engaged to help the gendarmes through their grammar. He intends to give them twenty lessons, having them learn sixty words each day and feels that after a short time they ought to be able to "speak English" with almost any bewildered traveller.

HEAVYWEIGHT BATTLE MAY BE ONE OF YEARS MOST COLORFUL



Delaney or Uzcudun May Fight With Dempsey or Tunney

(Associated Press Sports Editor)

New York—Paulino Uzcudun, the Spanish woodchopper, and Jack Delaney, the erstwhile French-Canadian sharpshooter, have an argument to settle that may furnish one of the year's most colorful heavyweight ring battles, even though it has no title significance.

The picturesque Bounding Basque, gold teeth, acrobatics and all, meets the saturnine "Ripper of the North" in a 15-round battle at the Yankee Stadium, August 11.

Both have ambitions to fight for the world's heavyweight title but they won't have an opportunity to further this desire until 1928, at the earliest. Both seemed slated at the start of last winter's eliminations to occupy important roles in this year's drama.

But Delaney's rise was abruptly checked by Jimmy Maloney, the Boston Irishman, while Paulino was shunted aside by Jack Dempsey's refusal to engage the Spaniard in a preliminary bout.

Since he knocked out Harry Wills in four rounds, Paulino is more confident than ever that he is headed for a championship match. The Spaniard eagerly sought a match with Dempsey and showed no reluctance to try conclusions with the sharpshooting Delaney, who has cast aside his light-heavyweight title to concentrate on a come-back as a full-fledged heavyweight.

Training camp reports say Delaney has fully recovered from the effects of an injured left hand and "tennis elbow" in his right arm—consequences of his match with Maloney. If so, he probably will outpunch the Spaniard. But whether or not the Bridgeport batter can bring down the rugged Spaniard is another matter.

There are few harder specimens in the ring than Uzcudun. In fact, observers of his first few fights in this country labelled him more of a "chopping block" than a wood-chopper. His powers of assimilation seemed greater than his punching powers but since then he has displayed the knockout blow that felled the giant Wills at Ebbets Field. The negro offered little resistance on that occasion but it took a full-powered wallop, nevertheless, to bring him down.

"If Delaney couldn't bring down Maloney in ten rounds or even jar him, what chance has he to topple Paulino?" the Spaniard's followers ask.

"Paulino is made to order for Delaney," counter the latter's admirers. "Jack will box the Spaniard dizzy and then knock him out."
