DEFER \$35,000
AIRSHIP FLIGHT
ACROSS PACIFICPostponement Caused
by Failure of En-
trants to Properly
Equip Themselves

San Francisco, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Postponement of tomorrow's \$35,000 Dole flight from San Francisco Bay to Honolulu because of the entries who have thus far presented themselves "are not now properly equipped or qualified" was ordered today by the flight committee and the Department of Commerce subject to the approval of the Honolulu Chapter of the National Aeronautic Association.

The committee announced its decision to the Associated Press after a meeting which lasted well into the early hours of the morning.

The following statement was given out:

"The starting committee of the Dole flight, upon recommendation of Lieutenant H. Wyatt, an experienced navigator, Clarence M. Young, director of Aeronautics, Department of Commerce, Major H. D. Clagett, a member of the committee, Valentine Gephart, secretary of the National Aeronautic Association, Captain C. W. Saunders, chairman of the starting committee of the Dole flight, and H. E. MacConaughy representative of Mr. James D. Dole, concluded to recommend the postponement of the start of the flight for a period not exceeding two weeks."

A request for authority from Mr. Dole and the Honolulu chapter of the National Aeronautic Association, to make the postponement effective was cabled to Honolulu last night.

The recommendation was promulgated upon the opinion that the planes and participants which have thus far presented themselves are not now properly equipped or qualified and that there is not sufficient time to make the necessary preliminary navigation tests, to start August 12, the scheduled date would present hazards never contemplated by the donor of the committee and the result could be easily unfavorable.

"It was further recommended that no additional entries be accepted for the proposed date."

The postponement ordered closely followed the crash of one of the entries near San Diego yesterday in which Lieutenants George W. D. Covell, and R. S. Wagner of the navy were killed when their monoplane plunged into a cliff in the fog, fell to the bottom and burned.

The outcome of the test flights by the seven entries now here was reported to have shown compasses several degrees off in some instances rendering them practically useless.

The plan of some pilots to depend on "dead reckoning" in their flight toward the island was regarded as highly questionable considering the small target at which fliers aimed.

Another factor that presented itself was in regard to the planes that had not arrived at the Oakland or San Francisco starting lines. If the planes of Captain William P. Edwin, of Dallas, Texas; Arthur V. Rogers, of Los Angeles; Charles Parkhurst, of Laramie, Wyo.; and Fred Giles of Detroit, should arrive here tomorrow noon it was doubted if they have time to undergo necessary tests.

HEAVY SALES ON
S. C. TOBACCO MARKET

JUNKER PLANES ARE
READY FOR FLIGHT
TO UNITED STATES

Dessau, Germany, Aug. 11.—(AP)—The Europa and Bremen Junker planes in which four Bremen airmen hope to fly across the Atlantic to America were announced to be ready for the start of their long journey. It has not been decided, however, whether the third plane which has been prepared for the flight is to carry mails or newspapermen. In the latter case the three planes will start simultaneously.

Sacco-Vanzetti Case in Paris.
Unfortunate Indiscretion.
Ask Our Guess.

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In Paris, where this is written Sacco and Vanzetti represent important news. Rows of soldiers with steel helmets surround the American embassy examining suspicious persons. Look poor, not a workman; or queer, and not an American, and you are suspicious.

Many police protect the American consul office. Americans drawing money from the Guaranty Trust in the same building, wonder Madame Nungesser and Lehouet, former President of France, cable America asking clemency; others cable Col. Lindbergh asking him to intervene. The average Frenchman knows America as little as the average American knows France.

Radical newspapers talk violently. Le Soir with a front page picture carries the caption: "The best plan would be to electrocute America." It suggests no plan for carrying out so large a program. L'Humanite, commenting on the alleged news that the Massachusetts American Legion approves the Sacco-Vanzetti executions, threatens a boycott that would be ruinous to the United States and says over the signature of P. Vaillant-Couturier that if the executions take place the gathering of the American Legion in Paris next month will appear as regards its managers, "comme un congrès d'assassins"—"like a congress of assassins."

The Fuller committee report that the judge in the case had been "guilty of indiscretion" makes a bad impression on Americans as well as on Frenchmen. Any juryman talking indiscreetly about the men accused, thus revealing advance prejudice against them, should be withdrawn.

Talk that would make a citizen unfit for the jury should make a judge unfit to preside.

Hostile comment indicating prejudice in the judge would mean that justice was tainted at the source. The committee report on that point should have been so explicit as to make impossible the suspicion that the judge was influenced by the accused men's revolutionary opinions or by anything outside the evidence in the murder case.

A cable just received announcing that the judge declines to postpone the execution causes anxiety among officials here and in other countries. A few small bombs exploded in London's subway today as a Sacco-Vanzetti warning are out of the usual run of communist activities.

England, allowing absolute free speech and harboring without question such men as Kropotkin and Lenin in the past, has usually been exempt from communist or anarchist activities.

Conservative French papers as the communists who they do not take up some of the Russian executions of socialists, etc. One paper's front page says: "No more anarchists will be executed in Russia because they have all been shot already."

SEEKS \$40,000 DAMAGES

Winston-Salem, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Frank L. Blum and Company, a corporation, W. N. Reynolds and R. Edward Lasater are named defendants in a suit started in Forsyth county court by Frank Urbay in which the plaintiff is seeking judgment for nearly \$40,000 as a result of damage to merchandise in his store building and for the total loss of the store building when it collapsed on February 24, 1927. One person was killed and two injured in the accident.

GOOD PRICES
CONTINUE IN
BORDER BELTSmaller Acreage and
Increased Consump-
tion Result in Higher
Prices

Raleigh, August 11.—(AP)—With the bright leaf tobacco belt showing good prices, North Carolina's border belt markets today continued auctions with prices averaging \$20 per hundred acreage.

The Federal-State department of Agriculture Cooperative crop reporting service pointed to a small acreage and increased consumption of the weed, looking to higher prices this season than the 1926-27 average of \$23.53 per hundred pounds and \$22.50 in 1925 and \$23.29 in 1924.

The highest prices were paid on the markets in the new bright leaf belt where the average was over two cents higher last season than that on the old bright belt or the South Carolina belt, according to Frank Parker, Federal-State Agricultural Statistician.

North Carolina, he reported makes the big end of the bright leaf, changing places with Kentucky.

As to the tobacco outlook, Parker declared:

"The major factors affecting the tobacco industry in 1927 are those that have been pointed out in previous outlook reported, namely: The world wide tendency of consumers to accept the cigarette habit in preference to other forms of tobacco."

The increased foreign competition with which American growers of non-cigarette types are confronted.

"Indications of the continued drift toward cigarettes are unmistakable and are of fundamental significance to tobacco growers. Growers of cigarette tobacco have before them an expanding market, but not one that will stand heavily increased acreage, and no serious foreign competition, whereas the producers of dark-leaf and dark-leaf export types are faced with increased foreign competition in a market which itself is undergoing contraction."

Last season there were 370,820 184 pounds of farmer's tobacco sold on the tobacco warehouse floors in North Carolina.

Another Death
Is Reported in
Tunnel Blast

Franklin, N. C., August 11.—(AP)—Claude Kinsland, 27 year old, foreman for the Conner Construction Company, died Wednesday night in a Knoxville hospital from injury he received late Monday when a premature explosion in tunnel 7 being built to convey water from the Santeeah Dam to the Rymer's Ferry Power Plant of Tallahassee Power Company near here, killed three negro miners instantly and so seriously injured four others that little hope was held out for their recovery. They were taken to the Knoxville hospital along with Kinsland.

Little hope had been held out from the first for Kinsland, a native of Franklin. His body will be brought back to his home for funeral services Friday.

Surviving him are, his father, Charles Kinsland, and four sisters Mrs. James Guest, of Franklin; Mrs. Ivory Henry, of California; Miss Myrtle and Irene Kinsland of Easley, S. C.

Atlanta Man is
Injured When
Train Hits Car

L. H. Batte, of Atlanta, Ga., traveling salesman, is confined in a local hospital suffering from injuries sustained yesterday afternoon when his automobile was completely demolished by a westbound Norfolk & Southern passenger train, at a grade crossing on the Greenville-Farmville road, a short distance from Farmville.

While his injuries were today described as painful, they are not considered necessarily serious.

WOMAN INJURED IN
BOMB EXPLOSION DIES

Paris, Aug. 11.—(AP)—One of the two women injured late last night in the explosion of a bomb in Basle, Switzerland, died this morning, says a Havas dispatch from Bern. The woman was the mother of five children.

Three other victims were so seriously hurt that they were being treated at hospitals today.

Twelve More Days of Life
Assured Italian Radicals

Boston, August 11.—(AP)—Judge Sanderson of the Massachusetts Supreme Court today announced that "we allow" exceptions to go before the full bench on his denial of a writ of error in the case of Sacco and Vanzetti.

The announcement came after a conference of more than two hours in chambers with Arthur D. Hill, defense attorney and attorney general Arthur Reading. A bill of exceptions was finally agreed upon and after this has been formally worked up and approved, Judge Sanderson indicated that he would allow it.

It was said that the four Justices of the Supreme Court who will hear the exceptions were all within 24 hours journey of the courthouse and had already been notified to hold themselves in readiness for the session which will probably be on Tuesday morning.

Boston, August 11.—(AP)—Twelve more days of life have been assured Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti.

Fifteen minutes before their march to the death chair was to have started, the warden at Charlestown prison brought them word that Governor Fuller and his counsel had announced a respite until and including August 22.

The delay was ordered to permit a ruling on a writ of error by state Supreme Court Justice Sanderson which, if an approval, will take the case before the full bench of that court. There was some inference today that the ruling would be favorable.

A third respite, signed with the others less than a hour before the current would have been switched on for the first of a triple execution stayed for the same twelve days period the death of Celestino Madrieros, convicted of another murder and self-identified with the case of the other two.

The dramatic announcement for the state house climaxed a day charged with increasing tension.

It came after Governor Fuller who once before had respited the condemned men and who only last Wednesday had turned down a plea for clemency after a long investigation, had presented to the council new reasons for delay.

Those reasons, in brief, were the contention of Arthur D. Hill, of defense council that a few days were needed to prosecute his eleventh hour fight through the remaining legal channels, and the decision of Justice Sanderson to defer until today announcement of his decision whether to permit the defense to appeal to the high court, exceptions taken to his earlier denial of a writ of error in favor of the condemned men.

Inference that the decision would be favorable was drawn from the announcement by Richard Murray messenger for the state Supreme Court, that he was telegraphing members of the high tribunal that a session would be held either next Monday or Tuesday.

The reprieves came after the defense's hope of possible intervention by the Federal Courts had been blasted by announcements

OHIOAN SAYS
COOLIDGE IS
PARTY CHOICESenator Fess Predicts
Nomination of Pres-
ident at Next Con-
vention Meeting

Rapid City, S. D., Aug. 11.—(AP)—Railroad consolidation, farm relief and the Mississippi flood situation were problems opened to discussion by President Coolidge today with Senator Fess, of Ohio, and Representative W. E. Hull, of Illinois, who came into the Black Hills for summer conferences at the State Game Lodge.

Reaching the summer White House yesterday in time to attend the Rushmore memorial exercises with Mr. Coolidge, the Ohio Senator predicted that the President would be nominated by the Republican convention next year in spite of his determination to leave office.

He brought with him, also the prediction that Congress would insist on a naval program which would place the American Navy upon an equality with that of Great Britain in the event President Coolidge was unsuccessful in obtaining guarantees for limitation at another armament conference.

Senator Fess made these statements as he rode with two newspaper men correspondents in the saddle behind President Coolidge on his return to Keystone from Rushmore.

"President Coolidge does not desire another term as his statement fully explained," he said. "But I think that he will be nominated as a result of a deadlock in the next convention. Be sure, he is sincere, but I feel that the country will demand him and that the convention will nominate him, unless he makes his position known more positively and unequivocally terms."

The Senator said, in reply to a question as to whether he thought Mr. Coolidge would accept a nomination said:

"I know of no man who could decline the duty of running for President if the nomination were tendered him by his party."

Mr. Fess spoke of the farm relief bill which Secretary Jardine is credited with sponsoring, as having "many good features." He added that a farm relief bill was bound to be passed in the next session, but that it would not contain an equalization fee provision.

The so-called Jardine bill, he said, was similar to, but an improvement over his own farm relief proposal of the last session. This bill would set a federal farm loan board with a revolving fund of \$300,000,000 to loan to co-operatives and farmers and would attempt to further co-operative marketing.

Senator Fess said his primary purpose in coming to Rapid City was to discuss prospective railroad consolidation legislation with the President.

Representative Hull, a member of the House Rivers and Harbors committee was expected to discuss the Mississippi River flood situation. He was also interested last year in a bill for the manufacture of medicinal whiskey by the government.

Ask Dismissal
of P. & N. Case

Charlotte, N. C., Aug. 11.—(AP)—Dismissal of the case in which the Interstate Commerce Commission required the Piedmont and Northern Railway to seek authority to build proposed extensions in the two Carolinas was asked in the brief the applicant railroad filed with the commission at Washington.

The dismissal was asked on the ground of lack of jurisdiction, according to the text of the brief, which was made public here Tuesday by W. S. O'Brien, general counsel of the applicant.

If jurisdiction were to be taken, the issuance of a certificate of public convenience and necessity, as prayed for, should be authorized.

The brief was 223 pages, and more than 100 pages were devoted to abstracts of the testimony of the many witnesses examined at the hearing held here over a period of ten days, beginning June 20, before Haskell C. Davis, examiner of the commission.

Jurisdiction is lacked by the commission, said the brief because the applicant for the authority to engage in construction is "an electric suburban railway not operating as a part of a steam railway system, and that the work involved is not the construction of a line of railroad within contemplation of the act but is the continuance to completion of work projected and commenced prior to the enactment of the transportation act."

KING GEORGE'S YACHT
SECOND IN TROPHY RACE

Plymouth, Eng.—(AP)—King George's yacht, the Britannia, was beaten by four minutes in a special race for a trophy put up by King Fuad during the Plymouth Regatta.

His Majesty connected with the Westward of Mr. F. T. B. Davis, the Shamrock of Sir Thomas Lipton, the Lulworth of Sir Mortimer Sinner and the White Heather of Lord Waring. The Westward won. The Shamrock was third, being forty-five seconds behind the Britannia.

The five yachts had to cover a triangular 29-mile course twice.

ALL QUIET IN
LONDON TODAYScores Injured During
Sacco-Vanzetti Dem-
onstrations Held
Last Night

London, Aug. 11.—(AP)—All was quiet this morning, after an exciting night, when news reached London that a respite had been granted to Sacco and Vanzetti.

Only a few hours before the news came mounted police, riding four and six abreast, had to charge to break up a demonstration of sympathy for the condemned men before the American embassy. Scores of persons were injured and bruised before the manifestos were scattered.

Shouting "the Internationale," waving red flags and carrying red banners, the crowd estimated at ten thousand persons, packed Grosvenor Gardens, opposite the American embassy after a protest meeting in Hyde Park where a succession of speakers denounced the execution of Sacco and Vanzetti.

A. J. Cook, secretary of the miners' federation, who was one of the principal speakers, had to contend with a constant heckling by a part of a crowd.

"I warn you and I warn Americans," he declared, "that if they murder these two men we shall give them. I ask you to take off your hats and pledge yourselves to get even. I am not anti-American, but anti-capitalist. We must boycott America."

"British justice is no different from American justice. I am more concerned with the results of this execution, if it takes place, than with the murder itself. If Auferer kills these two men, it will be murder, and we shall reply and we shall repay."

Rum Pirate Had
Planned to Take
Coast Guardsmen

Fort Lauderdale, Fla., Aug. 11.—(AP)—Twentieth century revival of the pirate custom of forcing his prisoners to "walk the plank" had been planned by Horace Alderman, rum runner, if his sea battle with the coast guard cutter CG-294 a few days ago had been successful.

Robert Weech, Alderman's companion, has disclosed in an affidavit. Officials who made the document public said Weech charged it was Alderman's plan to capture the coast guardsmen, carry them far out to sea and make them "walk the plank" in true pirate style, after which he was to return to sink the cutter.

Robert K. Webster, secret service operator and Sidney Sandelberg, coast guardsman, were killed instantly during the fight at sea which followed the capture of Alderman's rum vessel by the coast guard cutter, Victor A. Lamb, motor machinist, died today as a result of injuries received in the fight, while Jodie L. Hollinsworth, another coast guardsman, is in a hospital here seriously wounded.

The clash occurred 35 miles off the southeastern coast of Florida.

Mexico City, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Special dispatch from Vera Cruz reports that eight rebels were killed and four soldiers and sixteen rebels wounded in a three-hour combat in the Teocelo district of the State of Vera Cruz.

VON ELM FACES HORDE OF GOLFERS WHO SEEK TO CAPTURE HIS CROWN



JIMMY Johnston

Minneapolis, Minn. — (AP)—Over the rolling and rugged acres of the Minikahda Club here George Von Elm of Los Angeles will defend his title of national amateur golf champion the week of Aug. 22.

Von Elm will shoot at the scintillating mark made in the same event on the same course in 1916. Chick Evans set a record of 286 for the open championship at Minikahda, never equalled in the United States and only recently bettered by Bobby Jones by one stroke in the British open at St. Andrews.

Minikahda offers a course minus freak holes and blind greens and with putting greens developed nearly to perfection. A horde of will try to lift Von Elm's crown.

Against the golfing layout is a back drop of twinkling lakes, bewitching terraces and clumps of brilliant verdure that lend natural enchantment to the stretches of ominous bunkers and tricky water holes.

Harrison R. (Jimmie) Johnston will carry the hopes of the home club. Johnston, a Minikahda member, has slashed out a noteworthy record in competitive golf. His most recent exploit was leading the

field for 36 holes with 144 strokes in the national open at the Oakmont Club. Later he won the Minnesota amateur title for the seventh consecutive time. He was twice a member of the Walker cup team and western amateur champion in 1924.

Donald Carrick of Toronto, Canadian amateur champion, probably will be the only foreign entrant. The Minikahda Club has improved its links and added 300 yards and numerous hazards to

make expert shots imperative at all points. It is one of the few courses that has its fairways watered throughout.

The links run 6,689 yards, with the first nine totalling 3,133 yards and the second 3,551 yards.

FOR STABILITY AND
ECONOMY

In his thoughtful address at the County Commissioners' Convention at Lake Lure yesterday, Chairman Maxwell, of the Tax Commission, made one concrete suggestion which should have long ago been adopted. He pointed out that in the year 1926 there was outstanding evidences of indebtedness by the counties, municipalities and special tax districts in this State to the extent of three hundred and twenty-five million dollars, and he added, "Quite a sizable number of millions of dollars of bonds have been issued since that time." He might and should have added that the Legislature let down the bars so that, practically speaking, county authorities by declaring almost anything "a necessary expense" can issue bonds without limit up to the constitutional provision, and this without the vote of the people. This power should not have been conferred. It is the same power that is enjoyed by municipal authorities under which the city indebtedness has piled up much more rapidly than has been wise. Mr. Maxwell says that the same increase of debt is already going on by the counties. The Legislature grievously erred in conferring such unrestricted power on county authorities as a previous body did in giving large power to city officials.

But that is aside from the excellent suggestion by Mr. Maxwell, and cannot be remedied until the Legislature is in session. It is not a reform and should not have marred the many excellent features in the new County Government bill. Mr. Maxwell points out that "this stream (it may be a Mississippi flood) of issue and reissue is fairly constant." He then goes on to say:

Of this large column of indebtedness \$1,219,174 bears interest at rate of 4 per cent;
\$1,500,000 at 4 1-4 per cent;
\$24,329,485 at 4 1-2 per cent;
\$38,393,433 at 4 3-4 per cent;
\$67,481,922 at 5 per cent;
\$18,908,500 at 5 1-4 per cent;
\$33,125,391 at 5 1-2 per cent;
\$5,464,500 at 5 3-4 per cent;
\$85,247,740 at 6 per cent.

The weighted average rate of interest paid on this composite sum of public debt is 5.320 per cent. Interest on this debt represents 25.5 per cent of the total property tax levied in the State for all purposes and by all taxing units. This figure does not include taxes for interest on fifty million dollars of indebtedness evidenced by notes as distinguished from bonds, nor does it include any part of taxes levied for sinking funds or serial bond retirement, but includes only amounts of interest actually paid on bonds.

There is no better security under the sun than the obligations of these units of government. They constitute a first lien upon all the property in each taxing unit issuing these securities, with no limitation on the tax rates that may be levied to meet their terms, and the courts ready to enforce terms. They are so near tax free that none of them ever find their place on a tax book. They also enjoy the valuable privilege of complete exemp-

tion from Federal income tax, a privilege that is not enjoyed by bonds of the Federal government except as to a limited number of issues.

Mr. Maxwell does not present a serious situation without offering a remedy. In the absence of any legal way to check this continuing constant stream, he wisely proposes that the State of North Carolina undertake to borrow all this money, and shows that it could be obtained at a rate much lower than the small counties and districts are compelled to pay. He proposes a State Board and Sinking Fund Commission as the clearing house and controlling body to pass upon and regulate all such bond issues. Certainly there should be such an agency and Mr. Maxwell's chief idea should be approved even by those who might feel that with the large number of fiscal agencies in the State and the increasing number of commissions a better way might be devised. But that is a detail. The principle outlined by Mr. Maxwell is so sound as not to call for debate.

The State of Virginia is moving rapidly toward simplification of its public agencies, while North Carolina is moving toward increasing and multiplying. This is seen in the recent organization of a Transportation Commission which is undertaking an important work that is needed. But there would have been no need for it if the Corporation Commission had functioned in a larger and broader way. The Tax Commission is beginning an interesting and important study of taxation. Good. But there ought to be in the permanent plan of State government an agency to make this study day by day every year and present the findings and recommendations to the General Assembly. The time has come for North Carolina to have what will be like the Treasury Department at Washington, which will have direction of all taxing and fiscal policies and execution under the direction of the Governor and Council of State. We have made improvement by having only one tax collection agency, and yet we have a State Treasurer, a State Auditor and a State Revenue Commissioner and a Budget Officer and other separate and independent agencies which have no relation to each other. They should all be under one department similar to the Federal Treasury Department. To be sure this cannot be effected without a constitutional convention or amendments to the Constitution. The County Government law is also hobbled because of the constitutional requirement for certain county officials which are not needed in every county, this requirement making a modern county administration impossible.

Why not a constitutional convention instead of so many ineffective commissions and so many agencies that overlap each other? Better administration with economy in both State and county administration could be provided by such a body.

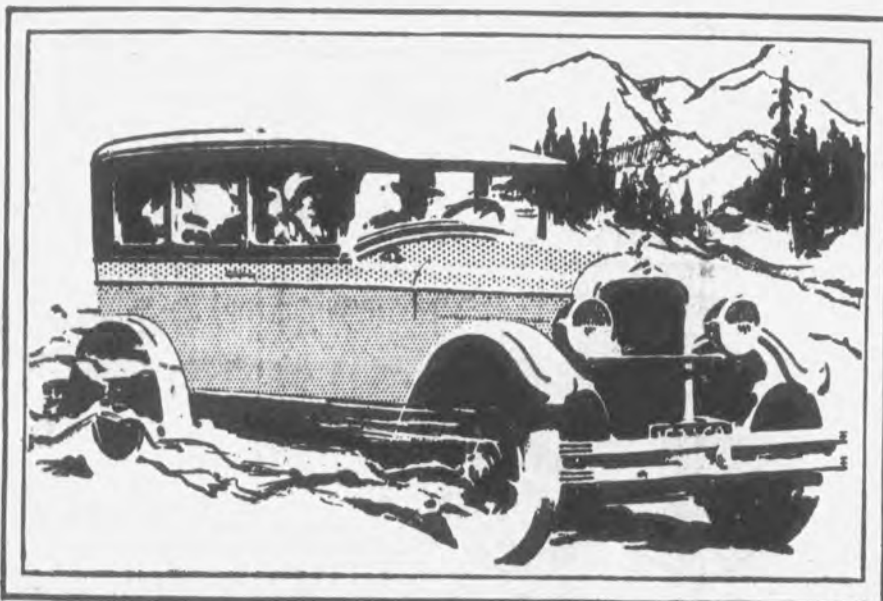

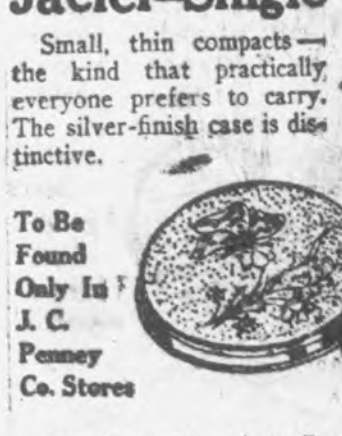

San Francisco. (INS) Spearfishing, a sport the pioneers learned from the Indians and which the pioneers passed on to modern sportsmen, is now forbidden in California.

A state law has just become effective banning this method of catching trout in California's mountain streams. The doughty fish can be caught only with a rod hereafter, and the law provides that the rod must be held in the hand. Many of the glittering baubles used by fishermen to attract the trout are also prohibited.

A 20-mile long outdoor "sprinkler system" to put out fires in the cities on the eastern side of San

Francisco Bay is planned by the Eastbay Municipal Utility District. Water from the Mokelumne river will be fed into pipes four feet in diameter running in a 23 mile belt. Lateral lines will tap the big pipe line at certain distances, thus permitting water to run downhill to any point desired.

The belt will be in the hills of the Eastbay district, and millions of gallons will run down to any town or section if emergency requires it.

Not only will the water lines prevent disastrous fires, like the conflagration in the Berkeley hills several years ago, but they will also assure the Eastbay cities of a continuous supply of water.

Quartz crystal, and element needed for producing the "death ray," is mined in quantities near Mokelumne Hill and the United States government has ordered 100,000 pounds of the crystal for naval experiments.

The "death ray," which is expected to decide the next great war is supposed to be capable of sinking a battleship or of tearing the sky of enemy planes. The largest single crystal ever mined, 2200 pounds in weight, was taken from

WOMEN BUREAU CHIEFS PAVE WAY

TO SUPERIOR GOVERNMENT POSTS

Washington — (AP) — When women walked "out of the kitchen" and into public life they took a long step towards attaining equal rights.

By agitating for the privilege and by preparing themselves for special service they soon paved the way that won appointments to governmental positions. For the most part, however, these posts were in the branches of the government which dealt with women or children.

Even today, after eight years of equal suffrage, however, the National Woman's Party points out that while many women do work entailing responsibility, the positions of highest rank are given to few. The appointment and election of women to high governmental office is one of the goals of the party has undertaken as part of its "perpetual right campaign."

Only three women at present hold offices as chiefs of government bureaus. There are besides two commissioners and there is one assistant cabinet minister. The chiefs of bureaus are Miss Grace

Abbott of the Children's Bureau and Miss Mary Anderson of the Women's Bureau, both sections of the department of Labor, and Miss Louise Stanley, chief of the Bureau of Home Economics, department of agriculture.

Miss Bessie Bruggeman is chairman of the Federal Employment Compensation Commission and Miss Jessie Dell is Civil Service Commissioner. An assistant attorney general is also a woman. Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt of California holds one of the most influential "woman jobs" in the government.

Miss Dell, who comes from Georgia, holds the highest position and in addition the one most highly paid of any woman in the government service. Furthermore, it is a life appointment. The salary of a Civil Service Commissioner starts at \$6,000 and increases according to length of service to a maximum of \$7,500. When the position fell vacant on the death of Mrs. Helen Gardner in 1925 a nation-wide demand for Miss Dell's appointment was made by women. She worked

for many years in the War Department. A life member of the National Woman's Party, she was one of its representatives at the convention of the International Suffrage Alliance in Paris in 1926.

Recently a few more women have risen to prominence in departments in which work is not confined to women and children, but extends to law and finance. Miss Mabel Owen of the Board of Tax Appeals in the Treasury Department is the first woman attorney to represent the government in the courts.

Other women prominent in financial affairs of the government are Miss Mary M. O'Reilly, Assistant Director of the Mint and a Founder of the National Woman's Party. Miss Laura Berrien, who has been a leader in the campaign for equality for women and is a member of the District of Columbia bar, is an expert in the interpretation of the income tax law for the Treasury Department. Miss Berrien organized the "Government Workers' Council of the National Woman's Party, one of the largest and most important in the party.

Miners are anxious to fine a block of clear quartz to grind into lens for the 40-inch telescope in the Yerkes observatory in Wisconsin. Five million dollars has been promised by Charles T. Yerkes, founder of the famous observatory to the man finding a huge lump of quartz of the desired quality.

A new treatment for cancer is being studied at the Woodland clinic, where sufferers from the dread ailment are given a colloidal solution of lead.

The lead is alternated with the regular remedies for cancer — radium, x-ray and surgery.

No definite figures are yet available on the percentage efficiency of the new cancer treatment. Doctors, however, say that results are encouraging so far. The lead is placed directly upon the cancerous tissue, destroying the diseased growth. The metal is said to be without many of the harmful after-effects of other treatments.

The "Asiatic invasion" of the Hawaiian islands will discourage and additional heavy investment of American capital in the mid-Pacific archipelago a group of California's business men reported upon their return to the main land from a survey of the Hawaiian group.

74, has devoted his life to the service of his country, never using time or talent in building up a fortune for himself. Friends have arranged privately to give him an annuity of \$512,500 a year. Because he was formerly Prime Minister he is entitled to a pension of \$10,000 a year from the British Government, if he cares to take it.

A great part of Britain's strength is in the unselfish service and devotion of her ablest men, devoting their lives, energy and intelligence to the public service. You find it in British Government service such ability as you find in American steel, motors and railroads—and such statesmanship as you find nowhere else; ask our geese of the Washington conference.

Ralph Arnold, a distinguished California geologist, says the Government must protect the nation's oil supply, "for the supply necessary for national defense will be gone in seven years."

That statement interests President Coolidge.

The Government, having taken back its naval oil reserve from those that stole it, announces that

it will leave the nation's oil in the ground, "to conserve it," buying oil elsewhere. That would seem sound, but the plan includes this: "Neighbors adjoining national reserves may pump out the Government's oil, exhausting the supply. Those neighboring pumps will be compelled to give the United States a small percentage of the extra profit that they make by pumping near the Government wells."

What good will that little money do this richest Government when she finds herself without oil in a war depending on gasoline supplies?

The United States Government should adopt a plan to conserve and protect the nation's oil—the Government supply and the general supply—making such laws as may be necessary.

London looks forward to a big "oil war," but doesn't say what kind of war or whether it will reach America.

There is an oil war now in the United States, with oil and gasoline both selling at prices that make consumers happy. They won't be so happy when the dust settler and prices swing up higher than ever before.

Organized labor requests the United States to withdraw its forces from Nicaragua and let Nicaraguans "work out their own problems." If the United States plans to build a sea level canal through Nicaragua, which would be better than the Panama route, and if it has obtained the right to build from competent Nicaraguan authorities, the canal should be built regardless of opposition.

This country is interested in Fraulein Thea Rasche, well named. In Sweden the law lets you drink but it doesn't let you drink foolishly. If, for instance, an American orders a cocktail, the murderous mucous membrane destroying poison that only a Yahoo should absorb, that American is not allowed to drink the cocktail until he has eaten something.

Millions of American stomachs and constitutions have been ruined by pouring inflammatory liquor into an empty stomach. European nations know better. That law exists in Sweden, and according to Harold Scarborough, for more than a century it has been an unwritten law in France. Every Frenchman would class cocktails with carbolic acid.
