Funeral Service Here at One o'Clock Tomorrow, Interment Following at Wel-

passing away of Mr. W. B. Tilghman, this morning at 3:15 o'clock. Mr. Tilghman had been in feeble health for some time, and several weeks ago suffered a second slight stroke from which he gradually grew weaker until the end.

Mr. Tilghman was born at Oakland, the famliy residence, in Halifax county, N. C. He was a son of the late James B. and Virginia Wills Tilghman. His early youth

was spent in and near Weldon. On December 19, 1888, he was married to Miss Ethel Mason, of Garysburg. Northampton county who survives him. Mr. Tilghman became associated with the Seaboard Air Line Railway in 1891. serving in many capacities, the duties of which placed him first in Weldon, then Portsmouth, Va., and later in Richmond, Va., from which place he came to Greenville in 1913, after being in a wreck, which leaving him deaf and from which he never fully recovered, incapcitated him for further railway serv-

On coming to Greenville, he accepted work with T. A. Person, leaf tobacco dealer, later the Person-Garrett Co., which position he held until failing health forced him to give up active duties in October

In early youth Mr. Tilghman was converted and joined the Methodist church at Garysburg, and on coming to Greenville, united with the Methodist church here. As long as health permitted, he never misssed a service, and when unable to attend he still remembered the
