### REOPENING OF MINES IN OHIO IS ADVOCATED

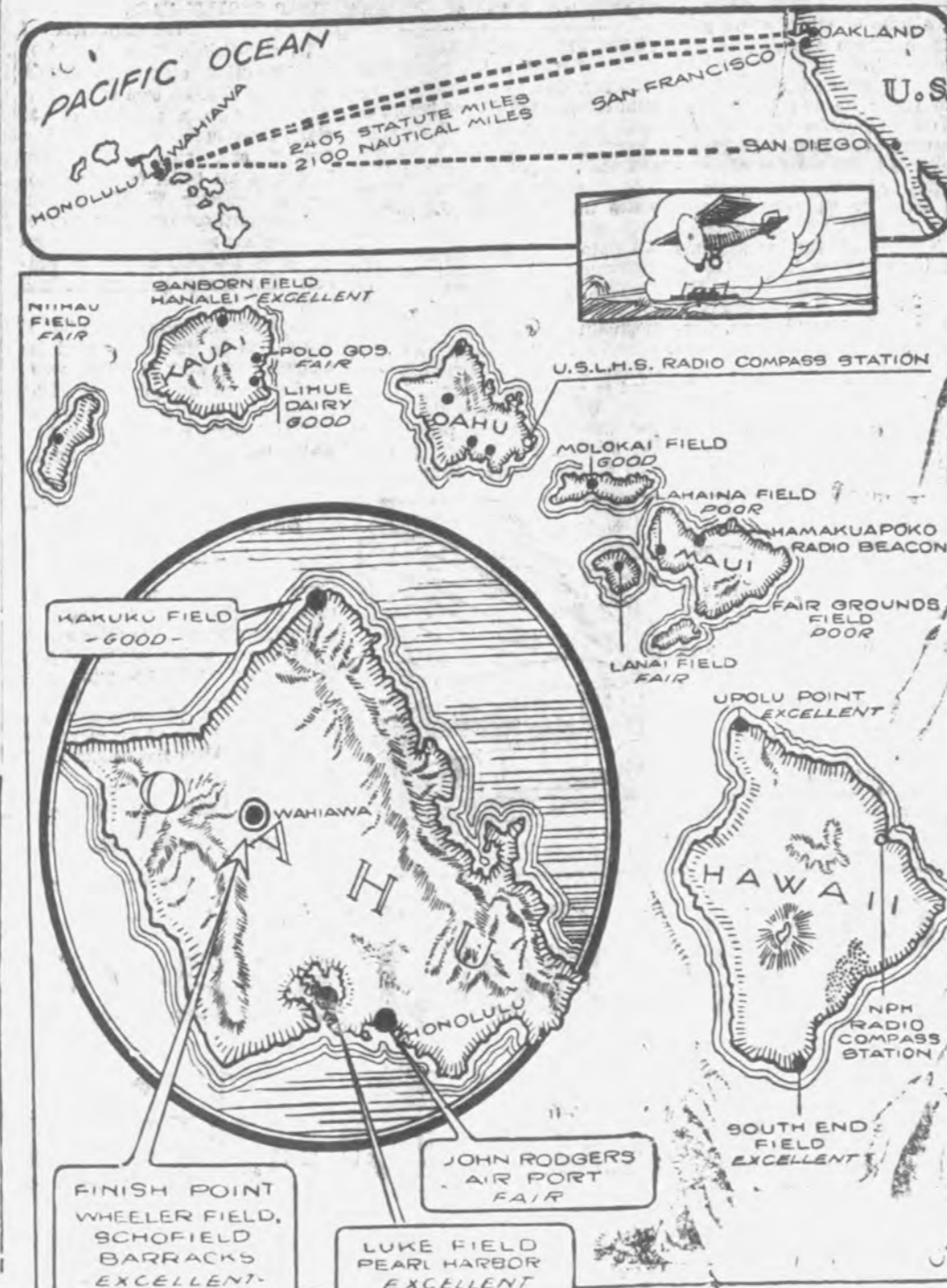

### WOMAN SEEKS MOVIE CONTROL IN NEW JERSEY



Newark, N. J.—(AP)—Authorities in New Jersey will be given the power to close objectionable motion picture shows, if Miss Florence L. Haines wins a fight she is waging in the State Assembly. When Newark authorities found themselves powerless to close objectionable shows, she proposed a motion picture censorship bill at the closing joint session of the New Jersey Legislature last year. Undismayed by failure of her bill to pass, Miss Haines has made control of motion pictures by law her platform for re-election on the Republican ticket. "I intend to continue the fight for motion picture control in New Jersey," Miss Haines said. "If returned in the next session of the legislature, I shall propose a similar bill, strengthened by revision."

### JOHN ROBINSON EXECUTED TODAY

London, August 12.—(AP)—John Robinson, 36 year old clerk, was executed this morning for the murder of Mrs. Minnie Bonatti, wife of an Italian waiter. He was found guilty on July 13th. The case was known as the "Charing Cross Trunk Mystery" the dismembered body having been discovered in a trunk at the baggage room of the Charing Cross Railway Station May 10, a few days after death. Robinson was tracked through descriptions furnished by the station porter and the man who sold the trunk.

### AGED WOODCHOPPER ELECTROCUTED TODAY

Huntsville, Tex., August 12.—(AP)—Refusing to break the silence he maintained during the weeks he was confined in a cell on "murderer's row" in the state penitentiary here, F. M. Snow, 50 years old, Stephensville Woodchopper, went to his death in the electric chair early today. Snow was convicted of the murder of Nannie Connally, his 19 year old step-son. He later confessed that he also killed his wife and mother-in-law, and burned the bodies in a fire place. He was pronounced dead six minutes after the current was turned on.

ious that he formerly had all the big Republican politicians of his State "eating out of his hand"—a hand with access to the Klan's bulging treasury.

He is credited, for example, with forcing the nomination of "Ed" Jackson, who as Governor Jackson, is now uncomfortably aware that "Steve" is gunning for him from behind the bars, and that belief spreads that the Klan treasury contributed heavily toward his election. According to one outspoken politician, "the Republican machine in Indiana has been dragonized to death."

Whatever that may mean, it looks as if Republican politics in that State could hardly reach a lower level. With their former Governor McCray in a Federal penitentiary, and with their present Governor along with other leading politicians under fire, it would seem to be about time for the people of Indiana to demand and make sure of a wholesale political house-cleaning.

### Preparedness in Military Field on an Increase

Toronto, Ont., Aug. 12.—(AP)—With the exception of France, military preparedness is generally on a larger scale throughout the world in pre-war times according to "military preparedness" report presented to the World Federation of Education Association in session here. In the United States it asserts, there has been an increase of 400 per cent since 1912 in the number of military training.

The report is part of the findings of committees that have been studying the plan for bringing about world peace with which Dr. David Starr Jordan, chancellor emeritus of Leland Stanford University, won a \$2,000 prize offered by Raphael Herman, of Washington, D. C.

### Taylor Fouts Elected Head Soy Bean Asso.

Elizabeth City, N. C., August 12.—(AP)—Delegates to the American Soy Bean Association Convention today departed for their homes, singing the praises of rich crops of Eastern Carolina, after a series of sessions in Washington, Elizabeth City and Swanquarter.

At a banquet here last night, the convention elected to meet next year at Purdue University, Lafayette Ind., subject to approval of the executive session of the association at the international livestock show in Chicago next December.

Taylor Fouts, of Camden, Ind., was selected as president; Walter Goodchaux, New Orleans, vice-president; and W. E. Ayers, Stonville Miss., Secretary-Treasurer.

Lectures on various phases of soy bean culture and movies showing the product and the Japanese persimmon were presented at the closing session by Dr. R. Y. Winters, Raleigh; and K. E. Beeson, Purdue University, Ind.

### Castle of Chillon Will Be Restored

Montreux, Switzerland.—(AP)—American visitors are legion in contributing to the fund for the repair and restoration of the Castle of Chillon, one of the most famous as well as the most beautiful of Europe's historical monuments. The castle embodies a struggle of liberty against tyranny. Byron perpetuated it in his poem "The Prisoner of Chillon."

Located on a small rock islet near the Swiss shore of Lake Lemman, the castle was the scene of revolting cruelties. Among the unfortunate who suffered calvary were the Jews of Villeneuve, who were accused in 1348 of having poisoned the water of the lake and of having thus introduced "the Black Death."

Jews, men, women and children were burned alive in the fortress, as well as some Christians, who were accused of complicity. Towards the end of the 16th and 17th centuries a large number of so-called sorcerers were incarcerated, tortured and finally put to death. Tombs unearthed near the entrance of the castle are said to show that human beings dwelt at Chillon in the bronze age, between the 18th and 19th centuries B. C. But the oldest authenticated historical document bears the date of 1005 A. D. and indicates that the castle belonged at that time to the Bishop of Sion. Eventually the castle pass-

Byron visited Chillon in 1816 and cut his name in the stone pillar to which Bonivard had so long been manacled. Dickens and other notables also have chiselled their names in the stone of the dungeon and today the castle is visited by thousands of Americans.

### POLO IN SPAIN PLAYED BY ARMY

Madrid, Spain.—(AP)—Although King Alfonso on advice of his physicians, has been compelled to give up his favorite sport of polo, he continues to take an intense interest in the game and its development among Spanish army officers. Since 1924, through the king's encouragement, the number of regular army players has increased from seven to 60. Nearly every cavalry regiment now has a team. The Ministry of War has acquired a number of ponies in the Argentine for distribution among the teams. Grounds are now available for matches in Madrid, Jerez, Cordoba, Barcelona, Valladolid and Sevilla.

Spain suffers from a lack of civilian players, of whom there are less than twenty, most of them personal friends of the king. These play only in Madrid and in Santander. Besides the king the leading civilians are the Marquis de Villabrama and the Duke of Penaranda. Both have an international reputation.

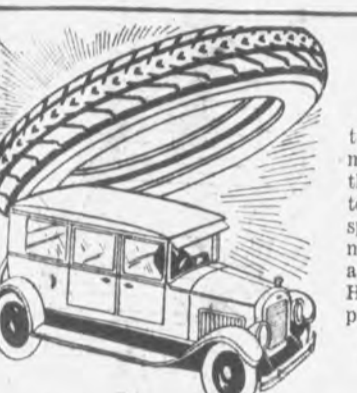
One of the chief promoters of the game is the Marquis de Villavieja, who, although past taking an active part in the game, shows great enthusiasm and energy.

**TOWN FINDS ASBESTOS; USES IT IN CHIMNEYS**  
Casper, Wyo.—(AP)—Two thousand chimneys of Casper homes are built of cement and asbestos, because the asbestos mines are near and the material is cheap. So extensive is local use of asbestos that it has created a new State industry, C. F. Dietz, assistant state geologist, points out.

Wyoming has several asbestos deposits, chiefly of the valuable chrysotile variety, in half a dozen mountain ranges. In other large producing States, Dietz says, commercial deposits are generally confined to one small area. The United States is the largest consumer of asbestos products in the world, but it imports 99.5 per cent of the mineral—largely from

Winston-Salem, N. C., August 12.—(AP)—That automobile thieves have been stealing cars in the central and eastern portions of the state, bringing them up into Wilkes County and trading them for liquor, is the belief of state Automobile Inspector W. W. Ashburn and other officers here. An orgy of thieving has recently been uncovered, it is learned, and it is probable that many prosecutions will follow.

Inspector Ashburn made what is believed to be the state record for a single day's work in Wilkes Wednesday when he recovered eight stolen cars in the call section of Wilkes County, a section it is said which has long been noted for its blockading and liquor dealing.

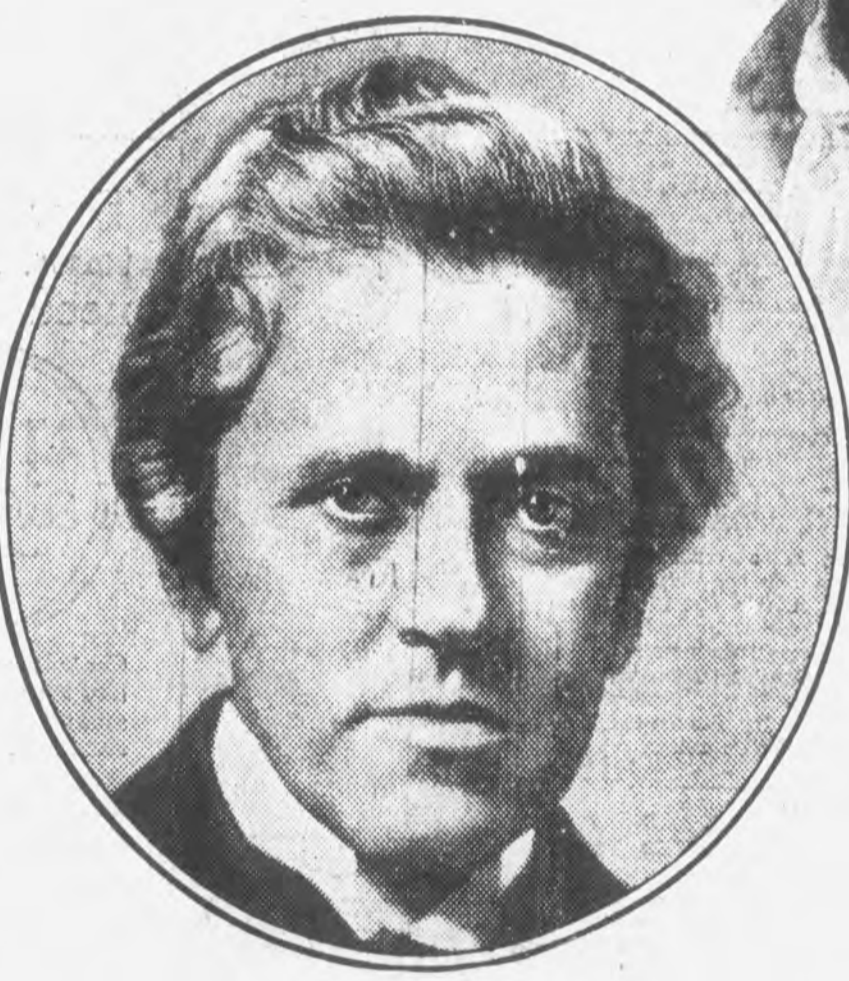

Chicago. — Co-eds of North Western University at Willard Hall, a dormitory, have started an intensive campaign for bigger and better window shades, stained-glass windows, and old-fashioned shutters.

Across the street a real estate company, headed by John F. Hahn of Evanston, is constructing a large bachelor apartment building with the name "Willard View."

Willard Hall, named after the first dean of women at Northwestern, houses all freshman girls who are compelled to live there for one year by a university rule. The building for years has been guarded by every fence and barrier of conventionality that university officials have been able to erect.

"What will the rates be in the Willard View building?" Hahn was asked.

"Ah," he replied, "the front rooms, looking across at Willard Hall, will of course be extremely desirable. They will be more expensive, the others will be materially cheaper. Although our building is far from being completed, almost all the front rooms have been leased."

The coeds are indignant. They have announced they will appeal to Counselor of Women Mary Ross Potter to see what steps can be taken to force a change. If arbitration with the real estate firm fails, the collection box will be passed for shades stained windows and shutters, they said.

## SHATTERS FOUR WORLD RECORDS



New York. — (AP) — A sturdy young girl of Nordic extraction, Miss Martha Norelius, is the freestyle mermaid champion of America, successor to the crown that was worn by Gertrude Ederle until the famous English Channel conqueror turned professional.

Daughter of a Swedish swimming first splashed to fame as winner of the Olympic 400-meter championship at Paris. Now, at 20, she has demonstrated clear title to speed swimming honors as a result of record-breaking victory in four national championship events, ranging from 100 meters to one mile. She is one of the galaxy of stars representing the Women's Swimming Association of New York that monopolized the national title.

Here's what Miss Norelius accomplished in the four-day championship meet at Massapequa, N. Y. Shattered four world's records, swam anchor on an 880-yard relay team that broke a fifth, and set up three new American records; accomplished what experts had termed the "impossible" by swimming a mile in 25 minutes, 13.2-5 seconds world's record time, with intermediate records broken at 1,000 meters and one-half mile along the way.

Miss Norelius was taught to swim by her father, now an instructor at White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., but her championship prowess has been developed as a member of the W. S. A. under the tutoring of L. D. Handley. In the past year or two she has broken many of Miss Ederle's records.

New York, August 12.—(AP)—Trading in the stock market today was demoralized following a wide open break in a long list of specialties shares which have been supported by pools. Air reduction was forced down 22 points, while commercial solvents B and Du Pont dropped 15, 17 and 15 points respectively.

Fayetteville, N. C., August 12.—(AP)—N. A. Watson, former sheriff of Cumberland County, is in the Highsmith Hospital suffering from broken bones in his forehead as a result of an accident last night on state highway No. 24 when his car left the road and crashed into a house. Physicians stated this morning that although Mr. Watson is in a serious condition it is thought that he will recover.

## STEWARDS ON LINERS GET BOOTLEG PROFITS

New York. —(INS)—Stewards on ocean liners are reaping a nice profit as salesmen for American bootleggers. The stewards observe those who frequent the smoking room on the journey in to New York and as the ship nears port make discreet suggestions that for a consideration to "a customs man" it might be possible to smuggle some liquor off the ship for delivery to the passenger in New York.

Thirsty passengers are gullible and willing to believe anything of American customs officials and a deal is arranged.

Within a few hours of the time of the ships docking the steward appears at the given address of the passenger and delivers the "stuff right off the ship." The price is generally high, often times as high as \$20 a quart for whiskey. The passenger considers himself lucky but if he is discerning in his taste he may discover that the liquor has never seen a ship. It is just good old American made synthetic liquor manufactured by New York bootleggers and sold in New York to the stewards who are merely salesmen for the bootleggers.
