Harvest of Gold Follows Sale of 25,000,000 Pounds in Three States

Bright belt tobacco market in North and South Carolina and Georgia hummed with activity during the past week, when total sales soared above 25,000,000 pounds, releasing millions of dollars in cash to the growers.

Prices tended upward on the Georgia market during the second week of sales, while South Carolina and North Carolina's "border belt" reported a strong tone.

Unofficial figures from South Carolina showed an average of \$20.50 per hundred on 18 markets for the four days period, while Georgia's unofficial average went above \$22 per hundred.

South Carolina's unofficial figures gave sales of 10,908,756 pounds for a total of \$2,163,566.87, while Georgia's figures from 20 markets aggregated 15,466,682 pounds bringing \$3,569,706.17. North Carolina's "border belt" totals were not available for the seven markets in the area, but Fairmont for three days reported unofficially \$25.735 pounds at an average of \$19.36 per hundred, a total of \$179,262.83. The first three days on the Fairmont market nearly doubled the first three of 1926 when an average of \$16.68 was made \$2.68 less than this season.

Lumberton's official figures for 4 days gave gross sales of 897,756 pounds at an average of \$18.52, both sales and the average being higher than last year on all markets, the prospect is for an upward trend of prices as lower grade leaf and sand lugs have comprised a large portion of early sales, with the better leaf being held back until the season is further advanced.

Congestion on the Palmetto State floor, that hampered sales at the opening at some places on Tuesday, has been relieved and better conditions prevail. The harvesting of the crop is well advanced, and curing is progressing safely.

Georgia's market showed a marked increase in volume and price during the past week, general satisfaction with prices being reported throughout the belt. Vidalia led the 200 markets in sales during this week, offering there totalling more than 3,000,000 pounds.

The highest general average for a day's sales was recorded at Bainbridge, where 60,000 pounds brought \$27.50 per hundred.

The Georgia figures, however, are subject to revision downward, when official figures are released by the United States government statisticians early next week.

Color of the weed throughout the bright belt is exceptionally good, according to experts, with weight and texture in South Carolina also reported holding up. In Georgia unfavorable weather was said to have cut in on weight and texture, counter-balancing the excellent color.

Harvesting and curing is progressing in North Carolina according to government agricultural statisticians who predict a yield of 421,742,000 pounds, this year against 393,190,000 last year. Except in the "border belt," North Carolina markets do not open until September.

Florence, S. C., August 13—(AP)—Heavy rains of past few days somewhat stemmed the golden weed from the golden weed but the weeks total as compiled from the 18 markets of the bright tobacco belt in South Carolina show approximately 10,908,756 pounds at average of \$22.70 which means that \$12,653,666.87 of new money has been brought into the five counties that comprise the tobacco belt.

Very little of the better grades have been offered and none of the light press wrappers which bring the top of the market. The farmers are getting rid of the lower leaves or sand lugs and are pleased with the prices obtained which are from seven cents to 27 cents slightly more than in 1926. The ware-housesmen expect the better grades to begin to move about the middle of next week when the average price which has begun to stiffen already will materially increase.

Mullins reports the largest gross sales, with slightly over 2,000,000 pounds and the highest price paid for a single pile \$1.05.

Pamphilo reports the highest average for the week at \$24.75. Lake City reports the next heaviest sales of 1,750,000 pounds which averaged slightly better than 20 cents. Timmonsville reports 1,250,000 pounds at an average of 21 cents.

NEGRO SHOTS
RAEFORD MAN

Paul Johnson Fatally Wounded in Unprovoked Attack by Hector Graham

Payetteville, N. C., August 13—(AP)—A sheriff's posse today believed itself drawing near on the trial of Hector Graham, negro, who yesterday shot Paul Johnson, son of former Senator J. W. Johnson.

No mob violence was likely, and the search was being conducted in ordinary fashion. It was reported to Edwin B. Bridges, state pardon commissioner, who showed concern in the affair. Following this advice, Mr. Bridges said he would remain in his office at Raleigh.

Funeral services will be held for Johnson at the Raeford Presbyterian Church at 2 P. M. Tomorrow.

Raeford, N. C., August 13—(AP)—With Paul W. Johnson, former army officer and son of a late state senator, fatally wounded, the entire country side was being searched today by Sheriff Hall's posse-members and blood hounds for his alleged assailant, Hector Graham, negro.

The shooting occurred, the Associated Press learned, five miles out of town on the Fayetteville highway yesterday, when the negro, with his child, stopped his car and called Johnson to the road, apparently for a short conversation. Thereupon, it is alleged, Johnson was met by a bullet from a .45 caliber gun squarely in the chest. He fell dying later.

Graham was killed by the posse at his home near Fort Bragg Army Post boundary. Graham's wife then told officers he left with a gun and pistol.

Graham is under \$900 bond for firing a pistol at Random, officers said near a negro church here recently, wounding two negro bystanders.

Asheville Man Held at Chicago

Chicago, Aug. 13—(AP)—Archibald R. Collins, Asheville, N. C., is held by police here while they investigate charges that Collins victimized Chicago women by selling them fake oil stock after obtaining their confidence through promises to marry.

The money is alleged to have been spent to support Collins' wife in Asheville, police said. His activities were uncovered, authorities say, when Miss Doretta Otten of Winnetka, a Chicago suburb, complained that Collins had obtained \$12,000 from her for oil stock after promising to marry her. He told her he represented the Puller Oil Company of Shelby, Montana. Miss Otten claimed, Collins was arrested at Asheville and returned here.

TWO KILLED AT BOLTON

Jackson, Miss., Aug. 13—(AP)—Two men were killed near Bolton today when their automobiles fell into a declivity where a bridge was being repaired. Three others were brought here by a train crew.

The dead are Charley Williamson 70, of Mendenhall, and Bernie Cutton, of Louisiana.

FOUR QUALIFY
IN JAMES DOLE
AERIAL DERBY

Flight of Nine Participants Scheduled to Start Probably Next Tuesday

Municipal Airport, Oakland, Calif., August 13—(AP)—Navigation tests remained today as the main hurdle between five airplanes entered in the James Dole \$35,000 prize flight and official approval as starters in the 2400 mile Aerial Derby to the Isle of Oahu scheduled to start on Tuesday noon. Four of nine entrants who have planes here have qualified thus far.

Death crossed another entry from the list of starters yesterday when Captain Arthur V. Rogers, flying his Tandem Engine Monoplane, was killed on a trial flight at his home hangar near Los Angeles. He jumped with a parachute after his engine stopped. The parachute failed to open and Captain Rogers fell 150 feet to the ground, landing about 200 feet from the spot where his plane nose dived into the earth. Mrs. Rogers witnessed her husband's death.

Dogers was known as an experienced pilot, but the plane he flew was of a new design.

The tragedy brought the total flight entrants killed to three. Lieutenants George W. D. Covell, and R. S. Waggener having crashed near San Diego Tuesday.

With this spectre of death facing them, the remaining pilots and navigators showed no inclination to quit the race. Instead, they complained about severity of tests imposed by Department of Commerce inspectors, who were insistent that pilots display more than ordinary skill before being certified.

The San Francisco Chronicle, said protests were lodged with secretary Hoover, but that official refused to interfere. Individual pilots and navigators denied they had complained to the Commerce Secretary.

The Chronicle also said Clarence M. Young, director of Aeronautics of the Department of Commerce who has been inspecting the dole flight entrants, left Oakland last night, for Washington after the complaint had been lodged. Director Young is known to have favored a postponement of the flight, with other experts on the local starting committee.

Lt. Ben Wyatt, Naval aviator, who is an authority on navigation and in charge of navigation tests for the entrants here, has insisted on an actual demonstration of ability to fly over a prescribed course without more than 10 percent inaccurate.

Only four have passed the test. They are: The Traveler Monoplane "Okla-homa," Bennett H. Griffin pilot, and A. L. Henley navigator.

The monoplane "El Encanto" of San Diego, Norman A. Goddard, Pilot and Lt. J. C. Hawkins navigator.

The Breeze monoplane "Pacific Flier" in which Livingston G. Irving of Berkeley, will hop off without a navigator.

The monoplane "Golden Eagle" entry of the San Francisco examiner piloted by Jack Frost, with Gordon Scott as navigator.

The approved starters will hop off in the order named and those who qualify today will obtain places in the starting line in the order of qualification.

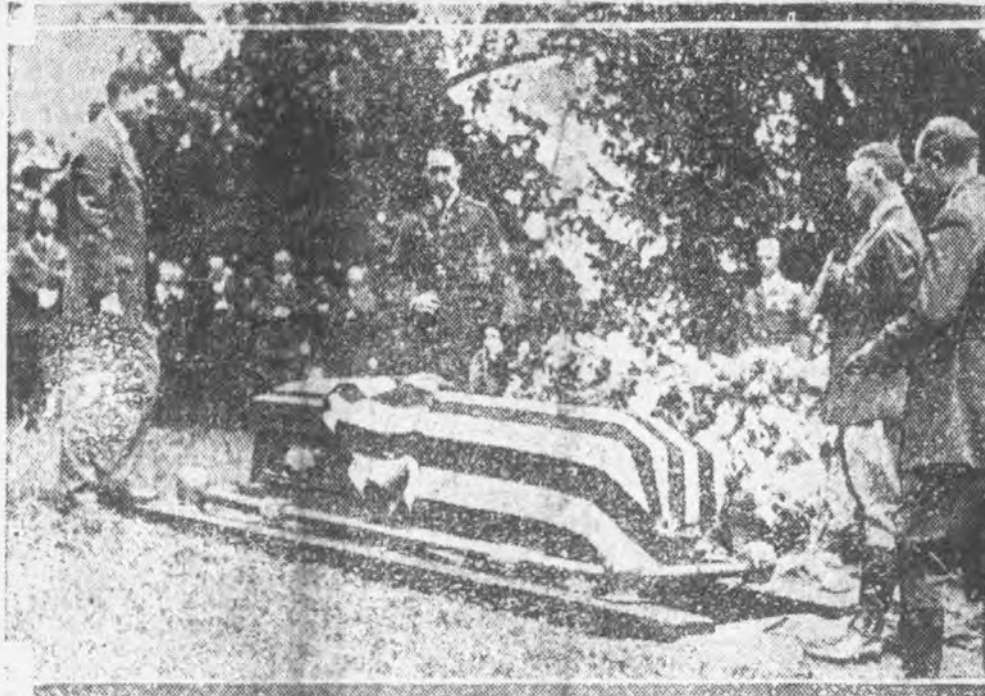

TWO COPPER
STILLS TAKEN
IN PACTOLUS

Thirty-five Gallons of Liquor and Much Beer Taken by Chief Paramore

Two copper stills and thirty-five gallons of contraband whiskey were brought to this city yesterday afternoon by W. B. Paramore, chief of Police of Grimsland, N. C. The outfits were captured by the officer and members of his force in the Pactolus community, following an exciting chase after three distillers who finally made their escape.

The stills are among the finest captured in this part of the state in some time. Both are constructed of copper, and are complete with worms and caps. They were not in operation at time of capture, but from all appearances officers were led to believe that the 4,000 gallons, of beer found in close proximity to the still sight would have been run off within the next several hours.

The still was located on a small stream of water known as Tranters creek. Two white men and a negro were making their way to the still when they saw the officers in position of their equipment. All three fled toward the creek, jumped into a small skiff and rowed hurriedly to the other side of the stream.

The officers gave chase, but the distillers had gained such headway that their efforts were all in vain. While identity of all three men could not be established, officers expressed opinion that they recognized at least one of them. This may lead to arrests of the entire party within the next few days.

The stills were of the 200 gallon capacity type, and were capable of producing an enormous amount of illicit liquor with a comparatively short time. The capture is considered one of the most effective blows landed against the traffic in many weeks.

PAUL REDFERN
PLANS TO SET
NEW RECORDS

Airman Would Establish Non-stop Record from New Brunswick to Brazil

Brunswick, Ga., August 13—(AP)—Paul Redfern today planned to hop off within the next few days on his New Brunswick-Brazil Flight, in which he seeks to establish a new non-stop aviation distance record and possibly a new endurance mark.

The 25 year old flier yesterday cleared the last barrier necessary before the start of the proposed journey when he passed the government tests for a pilot's license.

Redfern today continued to condition himself physically for the grueling task of negotiating the 4,600 mile trip, which he estimates will take 55 hours. His daily diet is being prepared under supervision of a graduate dietitian, Mrs. C. M. Ward, who is confining his foods to wholesome and easily digested dishes.

The birdman devoted further time to the arrangement of his emergency equipment, weighing forty pounds, to be used in the event of forced landings on land or water. He will carry quinine and serum for medicinal purposes, a gun, a pistol and flare, a head net, light boots, miniature distilling set to purify water, two light hunting knives and matches also will be carried. A pneumatic seat cushion and air lift raft complete the incidental equipment.

STATE DEBT
ON INCREASE

Increase of Twenty Million Dollars Shown During Last Twelve Months

Raleigh, August 13—(AP)—At the close of business on July 31 the State of North Carolina stood with approximately 47 million dollar of its constitutional capacity to issue bonds, according to figures obtained from the office of the state auditor and from the office of the commissioner of revenue.

Figures from the auditor's office fixed the total state debt on July 31 at \$162,576,600. The Constitutional limitation on the state debt is approximately \$209,872,020.

The state debt increased virtually twenty million dollars in the twelve month period ending July 31. On July 31 1926, it was only \$143,575,600.

On July 31 the state general fund showed a credit balance of \$1,593,611 as against a credit balance of \$1,403,833 on July 31, 1926.

The state debt is divided as follows:

General funds notes, \$9,038,000.
General Fund Bonds, \$33,704,000.
Highway Bonds, \$94,999,600.
Special School building bonds \$14,835,100.

WAGE STRIKE
CONTINUES AT
COTTON MILL

No Violence or Disorder Expected, and National Guardsmen Withdrawn

Raleigh, N. C. August 13—(AP)—The strike of textile workers seeking to recover a 12 1-2 per cent cut in their wages, made in 1914, continued today.

National guardsmen had been withdrawn after an order from Col. Jas. W. Jenkins, acting for adjutant General Van Metts. They had been on duty since Wednesday evening.

Harriett Cotton Mill officials issued a formal statement in defense of asking for military aid, stating the strike situation had become threatening and that civil authorities had said they were unable to handle the situation. The strikers said the military force was unwarranted.

Sheriff D. L. Kearney named some deputies to guard the mill property. He said, however, he expected no trouble. No evidence of violence or disorder marked mass meetings.

Very few workers have so far quit at the North Henderson-Mills, and Harriett Mill officials reported today that 25 or 30 had gone back to work in the No. 3 mill. Four mills have been the center of the strike, with about 500 workers affected.

Striking employees, at a mass meeting held in a pine grove near the mill properties, resolved to reject proposals made by the mill directors and seem determined to remain idle until their demands of wage increase had been met.

This action came following committee reports last evening and speeches by labor organizers. Labor leaders present besides Mr. Wilson included: Frank J. Torley, representing the central labor union of Winston-Salem; Alfred Hoff in Durham; Southern representative and organizer for the United Textile workers of America and G. E. Hayes Durham, assistant to Mr. Hoffman.

"Stick like one big man and stay out, until you get your twelve and a half per cent; you ought to have struck for 100 per cent increase," Mr. Hoffman told the employees, adding that labor all over the state was watching the strike and "was in sympathy with them."

The Rev. J. S. Hopkins, who at times has been spokesman for the employees striking, exhibited to them the petition sent to the mill owners and which, it is alleged, was torn up before reaching the latter. He said the employees ought not to be denied more than they were entitled to, but that "they should stick to that."

Lacy McDade, spokesman for the strikers' committee, reported that the mill owners wanted them to go back to work as a matter of good faith.

Mr. Torley told the strikers that he thought the letter from the mill directors was an insult to any United States Citizens and that the only way to "get it" was to join the union. He promised financial assistance in "sticking out the fight."

Charlotte Lawyer In Perjury Case

Charlotte, N. C., Aug. 13—(AP)—Henry Edwards, widely known young attorney, was arrested here today on charges of subordination of perjury after two of his clients repudiated former testimony in county recorder's court and accused him of having induced them to give false testimony. He gave \$500 bond for appearance before the city recorder Monday.

The clients, Lee Cochran, of Pittsboro, and B. J. Moore, who gave Florida as his home, were charged with perjury. They previously had given the names of Johnson and Jones. They were charged with possessing three quarts of whiskey, and were fined \$350 and costs each, last Tuesday.

Edwards denied the charges made by the men. He said he had wanted them to plead guilty and had hesitated quite a while before permitting them to tell the story they told.

The men appealed from the sentence but today came into court and repudiated their testimony. Justice Fred B. Nelms ordered the previous sentence stricken out and new one judgment continued until next Tuesday.

(By Associated Press) Pittsburgh's baseball situation had a grave aspect today. Unable to match the speed of the tremendous Cubs, the Bucs have fallen into tie with the Cards for second place. Considered by many critics to have the potential strength of a championship outfit, the Bucs appear to be skidding out of it. Yesterday they traveled 11 strenuous innings against the St. Louis team and lost a 2-1 decision. "Sunny" Jim Bottomley's home run ended the contest, just as it did the day before. Cammie Hill, ace of the Pirates hurling staff, granted only six hits, but Jess Haines, allowed only four.

The Cubs had a five game lead over the second place teams today. The first three teams have played the same number of games.

The Braves hammered out a 12-6 victory over Philadelphia. Scott of the Phils, and Robertson of the Braves finished the game in the box (although 29 safe hits were recorded).

Manager Dave Bancroft of Boston benched himself, sent in Ed Farrell, to short and placed Gaudreau at second. Every Boston player with the exception of Welton played at least one hit and one run.

Brooklyn's defense blew sky high in the eighth and the Giants were allowed to come from behind with a five run spurt, add another run in the ninth to tie the score, and win in the tenth on Babe Herman's miff on a low throw. Roger Hornsby's homer was a big factor, however, in New York's 7-6 victory.

The Giants second baseman knocked the ball out of the lot in the eighth with the bases loaded and two down. It was his 18th circuit smash of the year. The New York victory put the team three games out of second place.

IT'S THE PUNCH THAT DRAWS THE CROWD

New York.—It's a habit among the "wise ones" of the ring to string with the fighter who has the better punch.

It's the wallop that wins, as a rule, and it's the "sock" that appeals nowadays to the crowd, whether it is delivered with a fist, a tennis racket, golf club, baseball bat or polo mallet.

Look over this list of "heavy hitters" and you will realize why they are at or near the top, drawing the bulk of popular interest and figuring in the main melees of 1927.

Helen Wills, the hardest hitter among all women tennis stars.

"Big Bill" Tilden of the "cannon-ball" service and "Little Bill" Johnston of the booming forehand drive.

Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig, twin battering-rams of the diamond, the mightiest hitting combination the game has ever known.

Devereux Milburn and Tommy Hitchcock, polo's heaviest hitters, the top-ranking players at the game.

Jack Dempsey, aiming at a heavyweight come-back with fists that pack much of their old dynamite.

Mollie Bjurstedt Mallory, the present national tennis champion, won the title seven times on sheer power alone until Helen Wills came along to dethrone her in 1923. The California girl had developed even greater power of stroke than Mrs. Mallory. Miss Wills' comeback this year, after a period of illness, has been marked by the most sensational stroking "punch" any woman tennis player has ever shown.

Similarly, Tilden and Johnston, although they have passed the peaks of their greatness, ruled international heights chiefly on the tremendous power in their games. Both are versatile, but in a pinch it has been Tilden's booming service and streaking backhand shots or Johnston's blazing forehanders that have proved the main weapons.

The lively ball has put a premium on the wallop in baseball. The crowd prefers home run to the "squeeze play" or "inside stuff." Ruth's tremendous hitting opened up a new era in a game in which the resounding smack of the circuit blow now echoes from one end of the baseball front to the other. Gehrig has come along this year to give the Babe a spectacular race for long-range honors, a tussle of titans that is furnishing even greater interest than the pennant chases.

On the polo field, Milburn and Hitchcock are the twin long-hitting aces upon whose prowess America is banking heavily for the International Cup matches with Britain in September. Milburn, 46-year-old veteran, is the hardest hitter this thrilling game has ever known. His long, looping wallops at the willow ball have turned the tide of many a game. Hitchcock, younger, and a brilliant forward, isn't far behind the "old master" at getting range to his shots.

Jack Sharkey probably will testify that Dempsey still packs a mighty wallop with either fist, refinement the veteran Manassa Mauler may lack. The come-back of the heaviest hitter the modern ring has known is one of the high spots of the year. The former heavyweight champion may not turn the tables on Gene Tunney, who beat him so badly last September, but his wallop will be dangerous as long as he is upright and charging in.

League Records May Be Broken This Season

Chicago, August 13.—(AP)—Two major team records may go by the boards when the 1927 season ends. With the New York Yanks 11 games ahead of their nearest competitor, Washington, and still winning most of their games, a new high team percentage record seems probable in the American League. The highest percentage by a pennant winner in the Junior circuit since its organization was the .691 of the Boston Red Sox in 1912. The Yanks have been far above that mark all season and now have a percentage of .700.

In the National League, a new low team percentage appears probable. Last year the St. Louis Cardinals broke a record of 38 years standing by taking the pennant with a percentage of .578. It was the lowest mark that ever won a National League flag. This season, the four cornered affair between the Pirates, Cubs, Cards and Giants which, with the increased strength of the second division clubs, indicates the pennant can be won by an even lower percentage than that of 1926. The Cubs now lead by five games, but they have a long hard eastern invasion and a series with the Cards at St. Louis a head which is not unlikely to cut their present percentage of .623.

83-Year-Old Golfer Makes 'Devil's Own' Hole In One

Cincinnati.—(AP)—There is joy in the ranks of Cincinnati's most famous golfing foursome, the "Four Musketeers," whose ages total 311 years. The dean of the group has made a hole in one.

Continued from Page One: North Carolina border markets South Carolina and Georgia. Farmers received about 16 1-2 million dollars.

Total sales for the Fairmont, N. C. market from Tuesday through Thursday of 925,735 pounds brought \$179,262.83 or \$19.34 per 100 pounds.

"Over 75,000 pounds on opening and better than half million since," he said, "average price \$19.16 on opening market for medium grades stronger than last season, and for brighter not set so good. Prices upward yesterday on light sale. Mostly primings and seconds offered so far and with fair weather prospects bright for next week."

R. W. McFarland, director of sales Fairmont market, said farmers should wait at least a week until the priming grades are well sold before putting on the market tobacco high up the stalk.

Whiteville reported about a half million pound sold at satisfactory prices.

The 18 markets of the bright belt in South Carolina showed about 10,908,756 pounds sold at \$20.70 average, bringing \$12,653,666.87 of new money from the five counties.

Georgia sales totalled 15,466,682 pounds, bringing \$3,569,706.17, or better than \$22 average.

Diving is her favorite event. While she enters dashes she never goes in for marathon swimming. She comes from a swimming family. Her brother, Charles Allen, is a Naval Academy tank star. Another brother, Halie, is a high point scorer for the West Point team.

Columbus, Ohio, August 13.—(AP)—Six persons, two of them officials of Belmont County Miners Union have been arrested in connection with the beating of C. V. Nichols, a taxi cab driver, who was taking non-union miners to a mine in Belmont County near Saint Clairsville Ohio yesterday.

Col. L. S. Connelly, of the Ohio National Guard reported the arrests to Adjutant-General Frank B. Henderson today.

Col. Connelly said the arrested Union officials included the president and secretary of the Saint Clairsville local. Two women are also being held.

Six additional arrests are contemplated the Colonel replied.

Hillsboro, N. C., August 13.—(AP)—Mrs. M. E. Black, 71, Thomasville, was fatally injured here early this morning when struck by a truck driven by John Roberts, Durham negro.

FISH SHAPED PLANE FOR NEW AIR MAIL ROUTE TO ATLANTA

Bryn Athyn, Pa. (INS)—A new type of mail airplane will make its advent into the aviation field with the establishment of night air-mail service from New York to Atlanta, Ga. One of the new models, a fish-shaped plane equipped with a powerful single Wright whirlwind motor of 225 horsepower, is being groomed at the hangars of the Pitcairn Aviation Company here for the new air mail route. The huge plane will be christened "Mailwing."

It was especially designed to meet the rigors of the air mail service under all weather conditions.

The new plane is said to be able to make 125 miles an hour and carry a load of 500 pounds of mail.

The pioneer ship of the new southern route will begin its flights as soon as beacon lights have been established along the route. Work is now in progress on the placing of a number of beacons of 1,000,000 candle power each along the route across New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia and the Carolinas. The powerful beacons will be visible for 50 miles from a high altitude.

A REFLECTION

Declaring that recent demonstrations on the part of radicals in their efforts to save Sacco and Vanzetti from the death chair, should be sufficient evidence to the United States that stricter immigration laws and more rigid enforcement are necessary, the Scottish Rite News says:

"Outrageous destruction of buildings, costing the lives of innocent persons, and parades bearing banners insulting to this country taken place since Gov. Alvin T. Fuller of Massachusetts announced his decision refusing executive clemency to the radicals, Sacco and Vanzetti. His decision and report of the committee viewing the case were based upon the fact that they were unable to find, after exhaustive research, any basis for a new trial, any sign that the trial had been fairly held, and the belief that these two men were guilty of murder beyond a reasonable doubt.

The incidents that have taken place since that decision are a reflection upon the law-abiding citizens of the United States. That such things could happen in this country, all because two members of an organization had been sentenced to die for committing a brutal murder and justifiably denied executive clemency, is hardly believable. Unbiased minds are certain that these two radicals have been given every chance. Their sentence has been delayed for six years; every move possible was made in their behalf. In fact, as one writer aptly expressed it, 'justice as leaned backward in an effort to be fair.'

But is this taken into consideration by those who desire to attain their ends through force and a reign of terror, or at any cost? No. It becomes necessary in this, a supposedly civilized country, to guard all public buildings with armed forces. Not only here but in foreign countries American buildings must be guarded through fear of destruction. In Paris the police had difficulty in defending the American consulate against a mob of hostile Sacco-Vanzetti sympathizers. In Morocco the American flag was unspeakably desecrated and burned. And in many other countries acts of a similar nature, insulting to every true American, have taken place.

At least it will serve one good purpose. The public will awaken to the danger of such groups, composed largely of a foreign element, that threaten to undermine the structure of this government. It will demand no doubt that the full force

of the law, providing for the deportation of aliens guilty of violent acts, be swung into action. Groups, seeking to weaken the present immigration laws by opening wider the gates which allow the influx of such an element, will meet with more opposition.

This has already been indicated by Representative Albert Johnson, chairman of the immigration and naturalization committee of the House of Representatives, who said that Sacco and Vanzetti should never have been admitted to the United States. He hopes to pass stricter laws, in regard to the admittance and the naturalization of aliens, in the forthcoming session of Congress. He declared:

"We hope soon to put through Congress a law by which naturalized citizens who, after swearing allegiance to the United States, wear black shirts and swear undying allegiance to Mussolini or any other dictator, or who support any other government, shall be deprived of their naturalization. Citizenship is the greatest gift the United States has to bestow. It has been gladly received by millions. The time has come when such acquired citizenship shall not be used by radicals to the danger of this great Government."

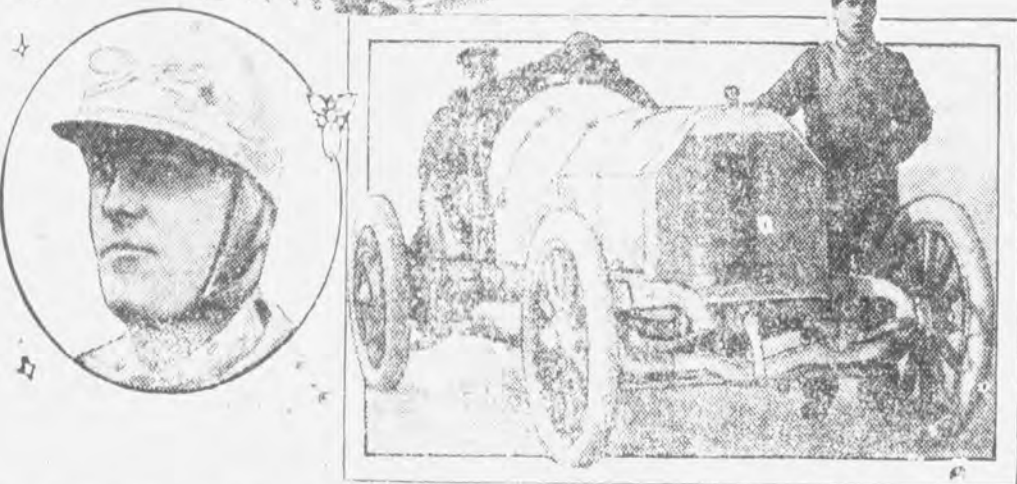
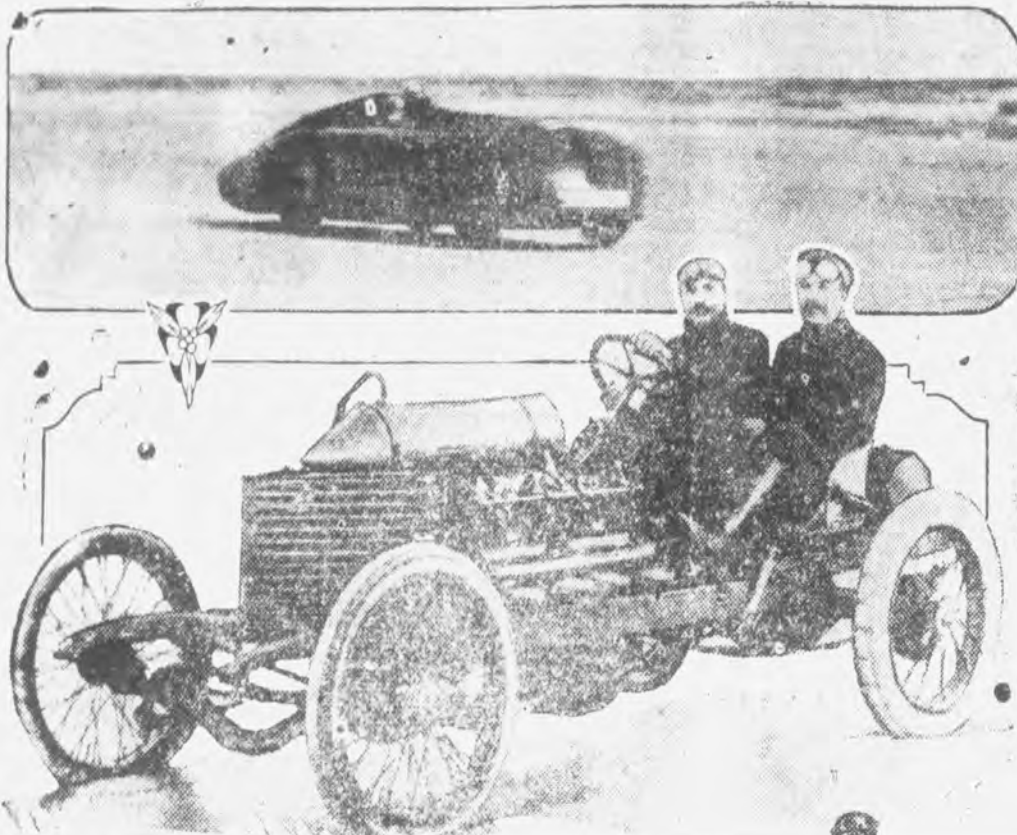

DAYTONA BEACH RECALLS RACES

OF "HORSELESS CARRIAGE" DAYS

Daytona Beach, Fla. — (AP)—A prodigious sport and playmate of its infancy will renew acquaintance here early next year, when home town folk will stage a celebration of the 25th birthday of automobile racing.

For Daytona Beach claims as its offspring the whole sport of automobile speed contests and points to the famous ocean front as its cradle.

Survivors of the contests led by William K. Vanderbilt, Henry Ford, John Jacob Astor and Frank Croker, who experimented with death in strange mechanical contraptions in "horseless carriage" races, will be invited to the beach as guests of honor.

There still is a garage here on which the site of one which is said to have refused Ford credit on a bill of less than ten dollars. Ironically, the famous automobile is credited with more than 60 miles an hour over the beach course.

In 1904, Vanderbilt established the first major amateur record of a mile in 59 seconds, on a little more than 90 miles an hour, while Astor was one of the most daring of early drivers. Croker died in the only fatal crash which ever occurred in racing here.

While automobile racing had its early life here on the beach, water landing course which permitted great speed, the sport sagged and hence only a comparatively few races, but virtually all the famous drivers have at one time or another raced over Daytona beach.

Last winter Major Henry O'Neil Delane Seagrave, ruler of European tracks, started a four-ton speedster from Wolverhampton, England, and "put his foot on it" to move than 200 miles an hour. 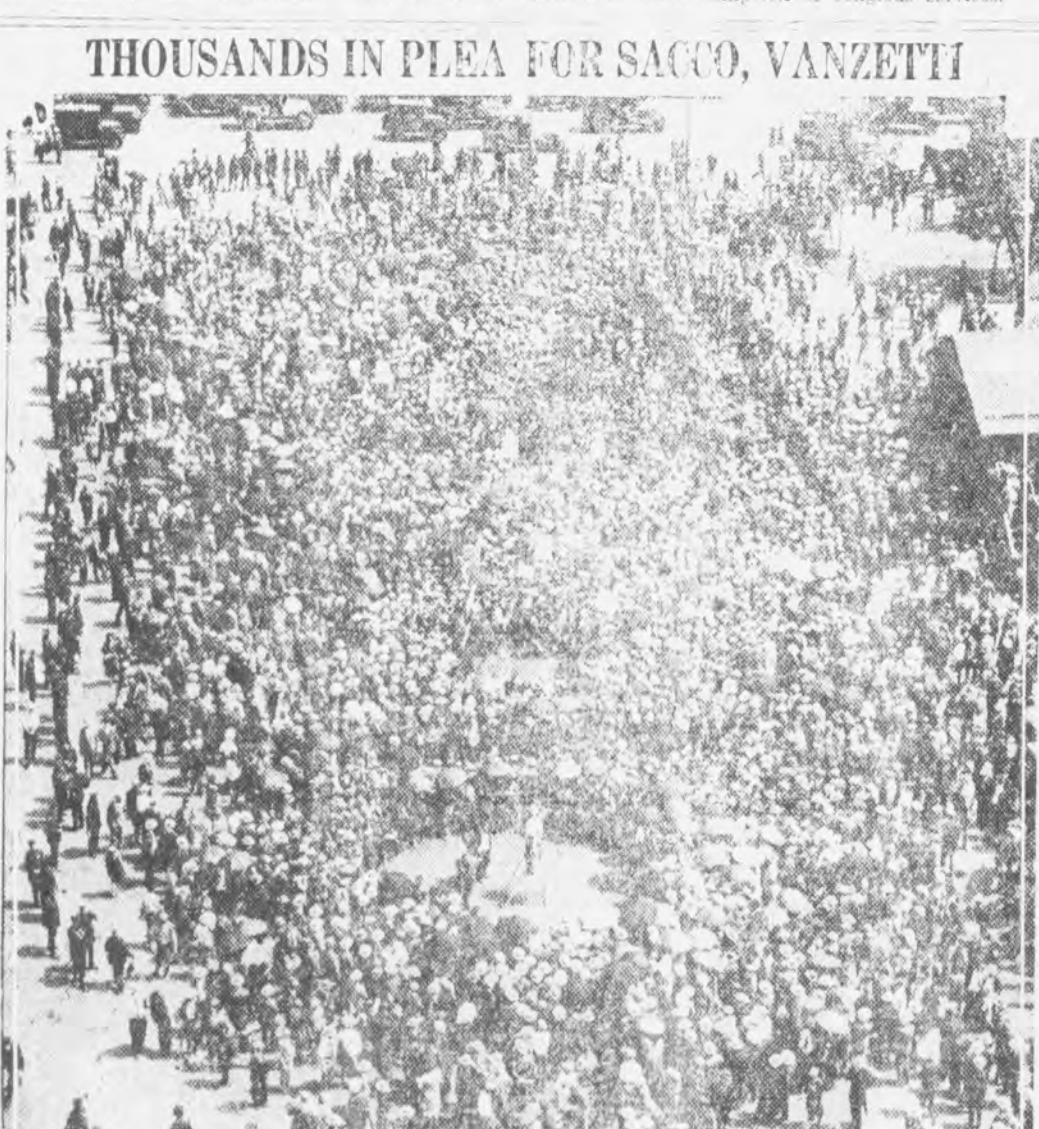

WEEKLY COTTON

GOODS REVIEW
New York, August 13.—(AP)—Cotton goods markets have been advancing steadily in consequence of the sharp advances in the raw material markets following the issuing of the first government report on cotton production and condition. In the gray goods division advances were made promptly. The finished goods lines are now being priced on higher levels.

Cotton goods buyers are now more generally convinced of the probability of much higher cotton and have been making closer inquiries for goods to be delivered on contract but have not been buying liberally. On finished goods they are making moderate provision for future needs. In the unfinished cloth sections buying has been restricted in part by the withdrawal of old prices and the unwillingness of mills to accept late business on present price levels. Print cloths are 1-4 cents a yard higher, and in some instances 1-2 cent a yard up compared with a week ago. Sheetings have risen from 1-2 cents to 1-4 cents. Pajama checks are up 1-2 cents. Drills, satens, tobacco cloths, and other

lines have advanced. Fine combed vanced 1-2 cents. Bleached cottons yard, broadcloths, carded, have advanced up about 1-4 cents a yard up 1 cent a yard over the low point. Many lines of colored cottons are being advanced.

STOCK MARKET
New York, Aug. 13.—(AP)—Stock prices rebounded briskly today after the drastic reaction of the two preceding sessions. Extreme gains ran from two to ten points in many active issues, but these were not fully maintained. A few new weak spots cropped out, but there were no wide open breaks such as took place early in the week.

Encouraging week end trade reviews and indications of a continuance of easy money conditions acted as a sustaining influence. "Bear" traders, who sold stock freely on the big break covered part of their commitments, buying orders from that source being swelled by the investment and speculative demand attracted by low prices of some of the seasoned dividend payers.

The closing was steady. Total sales 1,000,000 shares.

WEEKLY GRAIN AND PROVISIONS

Chicago, Aug. 13.—(AP)—Leading grain trade authorities here are suggesting likelihood that the United States wheat yield this season may be cut under the total raised in 1926. Owing to rapid and heavy deterioration of spring wheat since August 1, the cut from early prospects for that crop, it is stated, may be greater than in winter wheat.

Compared with a week ago, wheat this morning was 3-7-8 cents to 4-5-8 cents a bushel higher, with corn 3-3-8 cents to 4-5-8 cents up, oats showing 1-1-2 cents to 3 cents advance, and provisions varying from 22 cents decline to a rise of 30 cents.

Not only in the United States but in Canada, present indications, it is contended, are for considerably less than a year ago. Reports current in Chicago today said rush has spread over a wide area northwest that in some cases the damage has bordered on the sensational, and that the injury appears to be still progressive.

Corn prices are being dominated largely by the fact that there is a huge amount of corn which will apparently require two months yet of ideal weather, and that the final result for the most part seems to hinge on a question of frost. The oats market is turning mostly in response to threshing returns which so far have been a disappointment. Provisions owe their relative steadiness largely to big advances scored of late in the cotton market.

WEEKLY FINANCIAL REVIEW

New York, August 13.—(AP)—Speculative interest in this week's markets was divided between the spectacular advance in cotton prices to new high levels for the season on publication of an unexpectedly small government crop estimate and a series of wide-open breaks in pool specialties of the New York Stock Exchange and curb market, which culminated in the failure of a stock exchange firm the first in over two years.

For the first time in three years cotton prices this week recorded the maximum 200 points gain permitted in a single day, trading all options crossing the 20 cents a pound level. The government report indicated a crop of only 13,492,000 bales, or more than a million bales less than the trade had expected.

The break in the stock market started with a sensational collapse from 121 to 58 1/4 in the common stock of the Manhattan Electrical Supply Co., which was followed the next day by the failure of a stock exchange firm, due to its inability to arrange loans on that stock. A further break in that issue was accompanied by the collapse of several other pool specialties with resultant declines of 10 to 25 points, caused a general unsettlement of stock prices.

Credit conditions continued easy although another increase of more than \$18,000,000 in broker's loans on Thursday brought the total to a new high record for all time. Call money was in plentiful supply all week at the renewal rate of 3 3/4 per cent. And the shorter maturities in the time money market dropped below 4 per cent for the first time this year.

The United States Steel Corporation reported an increase of more than 88,000 tons in July unfilled orders but a further weakening price tendency was noted particularly for heavy products so that the report failed to exert much market influence. Bethlehem and Vanadium Steels reached their highest price in years during the week's trading.

The General Motor Corporation directors asked stockholders to approve an increase in the common stock from 10,000,000 shares of no par value to 30,000,000 shares of \$25 par value, preparatory to a 2 for 1 stock split-up. No intimation was given as to the dividend to be paid on the new issue, with the result that Wall Street's first reaction to the announcement was one of disappointment.

Selling pressure in the stock market was most effective against the issues which recently have recorded spectacular advances, such as Houston Oil, Tinken Roller Bearing, Air Reduction, Eureka Vacuum, White Sewing Machine, Pittsburgh Coal and Commercial Solvents "B".

High grade rails and industrials yielded with the specialties but the losses were proportionately much smaller. Another flock of new high records was created during the week the list including Sears Roebuck, Congoleum, Mullins Body, Sterling products and yellow truck.

SCIENTISTS have it all figured out that quadruplets occur but once in some 400,000 cases. Just what the percentage is where all four babies are girls isn't known, but it's so rare as to be almost in the miracle class. And when you consider that the four girls are all alive and healthy at the age of twelve—well, it doesn't happen once in a blue moon, that's all!

The quadruplets who merit special attention are the daughters of Mr. and Mrs. F. M. Keys, of Hollis, Okla. So far as is known, they are the only quartet of the same sex born. What is more, they have never been ill in all their lives.

The girls are Roberta, Mona, Mary and Leota Keys. They were born on June 4, 1915. With the exception of Leota, who is a blonde, the others are brunettes. They are of almost uniform size and appearance, and furnish their parents with plenty of perplexities in trying to distinguish them from each other.

FAR AHEAD.
The quadruplets in their intelligence and educational ratings are far advanced for students of their age. They play hard, study regularly, go to bed early, arise early, help with the housework, play various musical instruments, take long hikes and are fond of swimming, riding and other forms of outdoor exercise.

There have been a number of cases of quadruplets where the children were of both genders. In most instances, however, the foursome was broken up by early death.

Third—He cultivated a great anticipation: "I press toward the goal." He kept ever before his eyes a moving goal. He anticipated a richer companionship with Jesus here as the years roll on, and a sweeter fellowship in the gloryland. He anticipated victory. Listen as he says: "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course. I have kept the faith. Henceforth there is laid up for me a crowning victory." Above and beyond all he could see the saints who had preceded him, Heaven with all its glories and the sinless resurrection, glorified Christ bending over the battlements of Heaven and cheering him as he applied these secrets in the building of a Christ-like character.

Heaven is not reached by a single bound. But we build the ladder by which we rise from the lowly earth to the vaulted skies. And we mount the ladder round by round.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population

Tokio—The Imperial Military Academy of Japan has just turned out eight potential Chinese warlords, who hope soon to be as famous as Chang Tso-lin or Wu Pei-fu. They are Chinese students who have spent four years studying modern warfare at the Japanese academy, the most efficient in the Orient. Five of the latest graduates are from Mukden, one from Mongolia, and the other two from southern China. So someday, these school fellows may find themselves leading armies against each other in China's eternal civil war.

For the first time in Japanese history an emperor may be crowned in Tokyo during November, instead of in the historic capital of Kyoto. If so, the Emperor Hirohito's determination to cut down governmental expenses will be responsible. For centuries the coronation ceremony has been held in Kyoto, although since the Restoration in 1868 the Emperor has lived in the new capital Tokyo. Officials have estimated it will cost \$500,000 more to hold the ceremony in Kyoto than Tokyo. For this reason, the Emperor is reported to be urging a change in the place of the ceremony.

Much excitement was caused re-

cently in the Asakasa place in Tokyo, occupied by the Emperor of Japan, when officials heard the sounds of a drunken man, singing and shouting in English, coming from a room near that in which the Emperor was reading. The Palace grounds are guarded carefully, and no foreigner is permitted within a thousand pards of the Emperor unless most carefully introduced. So the officials rushed in haste to discover the intruder. They were surprised to find a parrot was responsible for the disturbance. The bird had escaped from a house not far from the Palace, and had flown almost into the presence of the Japanese ruler.

The little Japanese coast town of Kurihama has gotten its biggest thrill since the American Commodore Perry put into this same harbor with his "black ships" of war more than half a century ago. Nine monster whales did the trick. They appeared suddenly before the town, and the population turned out solidly in an effort to capture them. Every possible boat was used and axes, picks and pitchforks were parshalled for the attack. But the whales disappeared as suddenly as they had come.

A youthful Tokio dealer is ornamental stones, M. Kobayashi, has "returned from the dead," and his relatives have almost mobbed him in their wrath. For Kobayashi came back penniless, and his relatives are trying to figure some way to make him pay for an expensive funeral they gave him, out of insurance they collected. For the insurance company is demanding its money back. Kobayashi disappeared, and shortly afterward a body was found in a Tokio canal, which was identified as the missing man. The unknown got a fine funeral.
