TRY TO ENLIST
MORE WORKERS
IN MILL STRIKEUnion Leaders At-
tempt to Bring Out
Sympathy of Work-
ers at Henderson.

Henderson, N. C., Aug. 16.—(AP)—Union leaders observing the progress of the strike of more than 800 textile workers here today were concentrating their efforts on other local mills in an effort to bring out in sympathy, all local textile employees, according to information from strikers' camps.

Four Harriett mills have been idle for eleven days and the attempt to enlist the remaining workers to the ranks of the idle would bring the total of the striking army to around 1,400. Little progress is reported, with varying declarations as to the number of recruits from the North Henderson plants, there the majority of the employees continuing at work.

Strikers' spokesmen have variously reported addition of two to three hundred from the North Henderson mills, while mill owners have said that the number is much smaller. The main losses from the mills, it is agreed, have been from the card rooms, with the remainder of the working force practically intact.

If the card room force can be reduced sufficiently, however, strikers' spokesmen point out, the mills will of necessity have to close, as the remainder of the plants are dependent for their work on the output of this department.

Alfred Hoffman, of Durham, of the State Federation of Labor, who has been attempting to unionize the strikers, and who has according to strikers, promised them financial aid, said today that he would not push his attempts to unionize until financial backing was forthcoming.

Hoffman announced that two truck loads of groceries had been delivered among needy strikers' families during yesterday, but did not say whether or not they were furnished from union funds. It is understood meetings of union workers are being held in several North Carolina cities at which funds to aid the Henderson strikers are being solicited.

Funds are being raised in Henderson by popular subscription. It was said today that a representative of the Textile Union from New York city is on his way to Henderson to observe the strike and attempt unionization of the workers. It was also declared that he will "have or will get" money to aid the strikers.

There has been no picketing during the strike.

Various meetings continue to be held, but strikers' committees have not met mill owners since yesterday afternoon when they reiterated their intention of holding out for a 12-1/2 per cent increase in wages or a return to the 1924 scale. Wages were reduced 12-1/2 per cent in 1924 because business was bad, and the workers declare that business has reached such a plane that they are justified in demanding the former scale. Mill owners have flatly refused to grant the raise.

Few of the families affected by the strike are in serious circumstances, say strike leaders, and the mill folk generally are prepared to hold out indefinitely. Women, who comprise a large percentage of the striking forces, are not urged to attend strike meetings, but leaders do wish them to return to their places.

No determined effort is being made to reopen the idle mills. Steam is kept in the boilers, and watchmen patrol their beats, but outside aid has not been solicited by the operators and apparently no attempt is being made to enlist workers from any local source.

HOME OF JUROR IN
SACCO - VANZETTI CASE
WRECKED BY BOMB

East Milton, Mass., Aug. 16.—(AP)—The home of Lewis McHardy, a juror in the Sacco-Vanzetti trial seven years ago was wrecked by an explosion at 3:30 this morning.

Mr. McHardy, his wife and three children were thrown from their beds by the blast and suffered severe cuts and bruises.

Police expressed the opinion that a bomb caused the explosion. Windows in houses in the vicinity were smashed and near the house leaves were stripped from trees. A report reached the police to the effect that a small sedan type automobile was seen leaving the vicinity shortly before the explosion occurred.

JUDGES LISTEN
TO ARGUMENTS
FOR ITALIANSFull Bench of Sup-
reme Court Justices
Hear Exceptions for
Doomed Men.

Boston, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Four justices of the Massachusetts supreme court setting as the full bench, today heard arguments on the exceptions taken by counsel for Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti to decisions made by Judge Webster Thayer of the superior court and Justice G. A. Sandersons, of the supreme court.

There were two bills of exceptions. The first was to the denial by Justice Sanderson of a writ of error for which defense counsel had petitioned on the ground that the defendants' constitutional rights had been violated by the alleged prejudice of Judge Thayer, who presided at their trial for murder.

The second bill excepted to Judge Thayer's refusal to grant a new trial, a revocation of sentence or stay of sentence. Exceptional so was taken to his refusal to decline to hear the motions and to request that another superior court judge be assigned to hear them.

Arthur D. Hill, chief defense counsel, appeared to argue for the exceptions. Attorney general Arthur K. Reading, represented the state in opposing them.

The Suffolk county courthouse in Pemberton square where the hearing was held, was closely guarded. Police were stationed about the building. The corridor leading to the chamber was barred by a row of benches and court officers excluded every person who could not show that he had a right to be there.

Hill submitted a lengthy brief signed by himself and by Elias Field and Richard C. Everts, as associate counsel.

Hill, argued that prejudice on the part of Judge Thayer who presided at the trial of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, for murder, had been clearly shown and was sufficient to warrant a writ of error and a new trial. Attorney general Arthur K. Reading took the ground that no evidence of prejudice sufficient to require Justice Sanderson to issue a writ of error had been presented.

In connection with defense affidavits telling of alleged statements made by Judge Thayer outside the courtroom, some of which asserted that the judge had used vile language with reference to Sacco and Vanzetti, attorney general Reading made remarks in his brief.

"We feel it our duty to point out that the constitution of Massachusetts does not guarantee that every judge will at every time and place within and without the courtroom refrain from the use of profanity and vile language."

Delano Putnam and R. Ammi Cutter, assistant attorneys general and Dudley P. Ramsey, of Norfolk county where this murder trial was held, were present to assist the attorney general.

Justice Sanderson did not sit in the case. In the absence of Chief Justice Henry P. Ruger, who is ill, Justice Henry K. Braley, presided. The other members of the court sitting were Justice Edward P. Pierce, James Bernard Carroll and W. C. Wait.

Ordinarily, in argument before the supreme court is limited to about an hour. At the outset Hill said he would ask for more time. Justice Bradley assured him that he might have all the time he thought he needed.

The brief filed by defense counsel, upon which Hill elaborated in his argument, was devoted to the question of Judge Thayer's alleged prejudice and the power of the court to take action in favor of the defendants.

The following fundamental questions, the brief, said "are before the court."

"1—Whether, in view of the state of mind of Judge Thayer, as disclosed by the facts upon the record and petitions, had such a trial and such consideration at subsequent proceedings as that to which they were entitled under the law and the examinations of Massachusetts and of the United States.

"2—Whether the question of Judge Thayer's own prejudice or any other question in the case could legally and constitutionally be decided by him.

"3—If either or both of these questions be determined in favor of the petitioners, whether there is any legal remedy available to them in the two cases now before the court. This includes the question whether a writ of error may now be brought to re-examine the case for any error in law or in fact.

American Legion Bestows
High Honors Upon Leaders

Washington, N. C., Aug. 16.—(AP)—Honor was bestowed on leaders of the North Carolina American Legion American Legion Auxiliary, and "Forty and Eight" overseas society today.

The ninth annual convention of the North Carolina department of the Legion, in second and final day's session, went into business session to elect officers.

Charles Lambeth of Charlotte was named grand chief de guerre; Henry Gatchings grand de trap; Josephus Daniels, Jr., of Raleigh, grand conductor; and Major Albert Willis of New Bern, grand de la porte of "Forty and Eight."

General Albert L. Cox of Raleigh, was unopposed for berth of State commander of the legion to succeed Paul Younts of Charlotte.

Yesterday the convention opening was marked by parades, and informal gatherings, boating, swimming, dancing, general camaraderie. Today proceedings began with advance of the colors, invocation by department Chaplain J. S. Lockaby and the singing of "The Old North State."

Joint session of legion and auxiliary marked the morning meeting, but the auxiliary retired toward noon and the legion got down to business with district caucus, election of district committeemen, delegates and alternates to the national convention, reports, presentation of trophy cups, and election of officers at five o'clock this evening and installation in conclusion of the program proper.

Retiring State Commander Younts head of a committee to parade for entertainment of Tar Heel legionnaires when they get to France in September for the national convention, said a wreath would be laid on the tomb of the unknown soldier in Paris by the North Carolina contingents and a North Carolina dinner will be held the day after the doughboys arrive in Paris.

The Tar Heel men will be received by King Albert and Queen Elizabeth on their arrival at Antwerp, Belgium, on the S. S. Penland which sails from Newport News, Va., September 8th. About 250 legionnaires and members of the legion auxiliary in North Carolina will make the trek to France. Commander Younts reported.

Mrs. John T. Lowe, of Lexington president of the State Legion Auxiliary, reported that the auxiliary broke all records by an increase of 550 members.

She said the attention given rehabilitation had increased but that the need also had greatly increased and paid tribute to Miss Minnie Gwaltney of Hickory, State rehabilitation chairman, and Mrs. Joseph Claverie, Asheville, unit activities chairman.

Robin S. Kirby, department service officer of the legion, reported that 265 incompetent ex-soldiers and 536 minor children of veterans were receiving federal funds through efforts of the legion.

Read Admiral R. E. Condit, United States Navy, pointed to the influence legionnaires would have in a few years in Congress by virtue of increasing legions for "The American Legion, strong, well organized, gaining and representing the whole country, and non-sectarian, has immense power if it keeps clear of pitfalls and keeps its feet on the ground." He spoke for an adequate fleet.

BORDER BELT
SALES STILL
ON INCREASEFairmont and White-
ville Make Average
Around \$22.00 Per
Hundred Pounds.

Wilmington, N. C., Aug. 16.—(AP)—The 1927 season for Eastern Carolina border belt points today took on the aspects of a record breaker for sales. The second week was well under way with close to another million pounds of weed sold for the average price of 22 cents.

Rain had caused a slight let-up in farmers bringing their product to the warehouses. Thousands of pounds of primings were reported held up by rain throughout the section. Better weather conditions will probably find these offered for immediate sale.

First officials reports on sales at Whiteville revealed that 198,574 pounds brought an average of 21.56 cents. Clarkson had sold 56,324 pounds at 21.89 cents. With older markets breaking past records Clarkson, one of the fastest growing in the belt, showed marked improvement.

Fairmont officially reported through Secretary McFarland, of the Board of Trade that a total of 286,272 pounds averaged 23.33 cents. Lumberton likewise reported 21,711 pounds for 21.07 cents. Official figures from Tabor, Chadbourne and Fair Bluff were missing.

Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 16.—(AP)—Sale of 11,485,811 pounds of tobacco at an average price of 21.21 cents for a total value of \$2,435,638.56 during the second week, ending August 12, of the Georgia bright leaf season, is reported by the Co-operative crop reporting service, federal bureau of agricultural economics.

This brought to 18,943 the number of pounds reported sold to date at 43 warehouses in the State, and total value to \$3,755,523.35, based on a total average price of 19.83 cents a pound.

At the same time, the crop reporting bureau announced revised figures for the first week of the 1927 market showing 7,457,320 pounds sold, an average price of 17.70 realized and a total valuation of \$1,319,883.77.

Fairmont, N. C., Aug. 16.—(AP)—Border belt tobacco brought \$67,071 for 286,272 pounds on the Fairmont market, an average of 23.33 cents a pound yesterday. Sales were light, due to rain.

Sixty-five per cent of the offerings was primings while 32 per cent was second and third toppings. R. M. Lambs, Robeson county disposed of nine baskets of second, third and fourth toppings, weighing from 280 to 570 pounds each, prices ranging from \$30 to \$51, the average for the lot being \$43.67.

Buyers are now ready for offerings in better grades. Secretary McFarland, of the local Board of Trade, said today.

PASSES AWAYProminent Chicago
Packer Dies in Lon-
don Following At-
tack of Fear.

Chicago, Aug. 16.—(AP)—J. Ogden Armour died today in London, a cablegram received here by Lester Armour said.

Mr. Armour, wealthy Chicago packer, had been ill for some time with typhoid fever, recovery being greatly hampered by recurrences of stomach attacks, an ailment from which he has suffered for some time. The prolonged fever left him in a weakened condition, cable reports said.

John J. Mitchell, Jr., accompanied by Mrs. Mitchell, who was Lolita Armour, recently hurried to the bedside of her father, from California, when his condition became grave.

Lester Armour said the cablegram announcing the death contained no further information.

GERMAN ACES
UNDAUNTED BY
FAILURE IN AIRPilots of Junker
Planes Expect An-
other Opportunity to
Cross Atlantic.

Desau, Germany, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Undeterred by the failure of the Europa and the Bremen to get across the Atlantic ocean after starting from Desau Sunday evening, the four pilots were looking forward today to another opportunity to make the flight.

Plans for a new start are to be discussed at a meeting of officials of the Junkers works, builders of the planes, representatives of the North German Lloyd and Darnstadt National Bank, financial backers and the four airmen—Cornelius Edzard and Johann Distler of the Europa and Herman Koehl and Friedrich Loose, of the Bremen.

The real danger that besets the airmen in their unsuccessful attempt became known when Koehl and Loose returned to Desau. Fog and wind prompted the decision to turn back after the Bremen had gone a little beyond the west coast of Ireland. Edzard and Distler, who were forced to land their plane, the Europa, at Bremen after encountering storm and fog reached Desau about the time the Bremen landed.

Koehl described the "storm and fog—ridden night how the winds toyed with the Bremen, lifting it and pushing it down so that at times the plane barely missed the tops of trees.

"Twice the Bremen got out of control," he said "although the manetors functioned perfectly. Because of the divergence of our route and the fact that our battle with the winds forced us to use up our fuel at an excessive rate, we resolved to return after having negotiated the west coast of Ireland."

It was 4:20 o'clock yesterday afternoon, German time, when the Bremen made a perfect landing at the Desau air field, having been in the air 22 hours. As there had been no accurate information after she had been reported sighted over Ireland, the officials of the Junkers works were taken by surprise.

Professor Hugo Junkers expressed pleasure also over the excellent manner in which the aviators had guided the plane under difficult circumstances.

Other officials and aviation expert described the flight as a splendid exhibition of airmanship.

It was with heavy hearts that we made up our minds to retrace our way, he said. "Nor were we reconciled to this measure until so much of our fuel was used up that prospects of reaching America was out of the question. We had even reckoned with the necessity of making an intermediate landing on the return flight, and it was only because we succeeded in throttling the motor while flying before the wind and saving fuel that we are able to make Desau in a non-stop flight."

FIRST PLANE
TAKES OFF IN
PACIFIC RACEBennett Griffin Hop-
ped off at Oakland
at 12:30; "Air King"
Ruled Out; Ele-
ncanto Crashes.

Municipal Airport, Oakland, Calif., Aug. 16.—(AP)—The dream of the aerial world since its beginning, the trans-oceanic race was on at noon today when Bennett Griffin, flying the monoplane Aklahoma, hopped off from the Oakland airport at 12:30 o'clock on a non-stop flight to Honolulu in the Dole flight for \$35,000 in prize money.

Oakland, Calif., Aug. 16.—(AP)—The "King," formerly the "City of Peoria," was ruled out of the Dole flight to Honolulu by the starting committee today. Captain C. W. Saunders, chairman of the flight committee announced.

The Air King may still take-off as it has department of commerce permit but the committee ruling makes it ineligible for the Dole flight prize.

Municipal Airport, Oakland, Calif., Aug. 16.—(AP)—Norman Goddard's monoplane "Elencanto" crashed as it was attempting to get off the runway at Oakland airport today, approximately 4,800 feet from the start and smashed up one hundred feet to the right. Neither of the occupants of the plane were injured.

Both Goddard and his navigator climbed out of the cockpit and smilingly waved their hands to the tremendous throng gathered around. The plane was completely turned around after its disastrous smash-up facing northwest and turned partly on one side. The left wing was damaged and the motor partly buried in the ground.

Lieutenant E. C. Hawkins, the navigator said the plane crashed because they could not get the rubber info action.

Oakland, Calif., Aug. 16.—(AP)—A heavy high fog hung over the Bay district and out to sea today as crews of nine airplanes awaited noon and the starter's flag to send them roaring but across the Pacific ocean in a spectacular race to the Island of Oahu, Hawaii, for the \$35,000 Dole prize.

True to the weather forecast a heavy off shore fog was reported in the path picked by the fliers for their estimated twenty-two hour journey.

The ceiling over the field this morning reached 1,500 feet later coming down to between 300 and 400 so that the fliers making their test flights could be heard but not seen above that height.

There was not a breath of wind stirring, a fact which caused some of the fliers to express hope for a slight breeze down the runway to aid the take-off.

A crash detail of 30 men under command of Captain Burdett A. Palmer arrived early from Crissy Field, San Francisco to handle any accidents arising at the take-off and assist in wheeling the planes into position.

Early in the day crowds began to press eagerly forward to the fences which mark off three sides of the field.

Oakland, Calif., Aug. 16.—(AP)—Eighteen trans-Pacific flyers were lined up at the starting post here today, awaiting the signal that will send them over the vast Pacific to the "thin target of the island of Oahu, 2,400 miles out.

The goal is Wheeler Field, at Schofield, Hawaii, a few miles outside of Honolulu. The stakes are the two prizes of \$25,000 and \$10,000 offered by James D. Dole, of Honolulu.

Post time was noon, Pacific time. Nine trim airplanes entire from five States and the territory of Hawaii, to carry 177 men and a woman, were drawn to the head of the take-off course during the early hours.

In the background of San Francisco, a real menace loomed, so the weather man reported—fog, piled

An Unlucky Thirteenth For Bobby

There may be nothing in the thirteen-superstition, but you would have a difficult time convincing Bobby Jones of its innocuity. If there happens to be such a word, O. B., after the thirteenth hole in the third round at the 1927 United States open golf championship at Oakmont.

The short thirteenth hole at Oakmont busted the world's champion after crisis, it might as well have been an 80 as the 76 he turned in. His second round was better played, but it had more putts in it—four more as I recall it—and the card was 77. He was six strokes back of the lead, just as he was at Seaside last year, with 36 holes to play. He was furious with his bad

ness being medal play, in which Bobby stood to the thirteenth hole with two-thirds of the tournament back of him and one-third left to play.

Here was the situation.

Bobby had never been right from the start on the great Oakmont course. His first round had been saved from blue ruin by wonderful putting, long putts holed in crisis after crisis, it might as well have been an 80 as the 76 he turned in.

His second round was better played, but it had more putts in it—four more as I recall it—and the card was 77. He was six strokes back of the lead, just as he was at Seaside last year, with 36 holes to play. He was furious with his bad

play, but not disharted. He was determined and cool and in a fighting mood as he went to the first tee of the third round. His idea was that a couple of rounds of 72 would be good enough. His score would be 297. He felt that would win.

The idea was O. K. A score of 297 would have won with three strokes to spare. The execution was not so good, however.

But Bobby started hitting his shots better that third round. He lost one stroke to par going out, but picked it up with a great birdie 4 on the long Ghost Hole No. 12. And as he stood on the thirteenth tee, level with par, and hitting his shots at least he felt that he would

not trade positions with any other man in the field. He told me so later. He was only a couple of strokes behind now—a grand position with 24 holes to play—and he felt he was hitting his shots at last.

Personally I admit I felt he had another championship in the bag. He was sitting pretty.

Then he missed the long, narrow, prow-shaped thirteenth green with a mashie tee-shot, and the ball was so wide on the left that it also missed the big bunkers and stopped in a narrow ditch. This as it turned out, stopped the champion. He had to hack the ball out of the ditch and it stopped in the lee side of the big bunker. His curtailed swing could not get it out, now that it was under the bank on the side of the green. One more blast—the ball was on, in 4.

"Then" said Bobby afterward, "I carefully missed the putt."

It was about seven feet. He had a ghastly 6. He was 3 strokes down to old man par. He narrowly missed a birdie 3 at the next, and fell away to another 6 by trying too hard to place his tee-shot at the long and difficult fifteenth. A 5 at the par-3 sixteenth merely added insult to injury. Bobby was through. The four par-3 holes at Oakmont in that terrible round of 79 cost him 19 strokes—seven over par. He was eight strokes back of the lead as round 4 began.

Nobody fancied Bobby Jones could shoot four rounds on any course and not break 76. But he did. Remember, I told you Oakmont was quite a golf course.

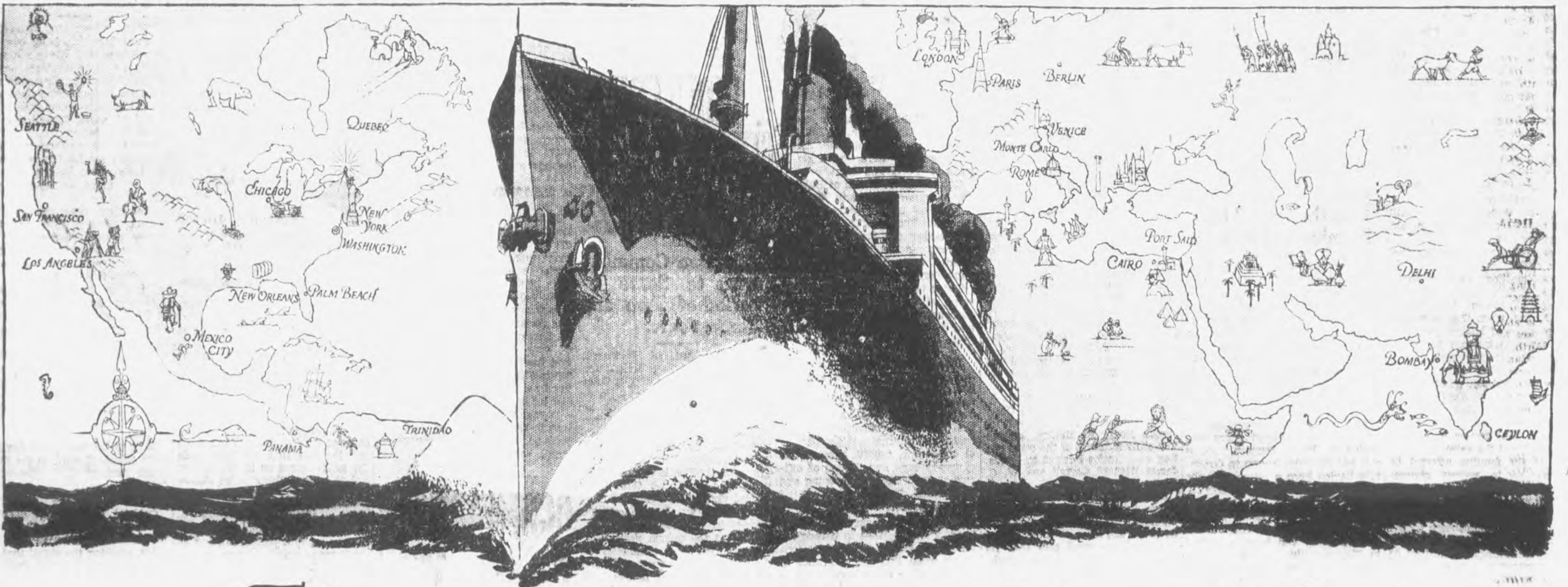

SAYS MILLER MAY SUCCEED ELBERT GARY

Half Dozen Other Prominently Mentioned as Head of U. S. Steel Corp.

New York, Aug. 16 (AP)—Wall Street conjecture today centered around more than half a dozen men in discussing the choice of a successor to Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the board of the United States Steel Corporation, who died yesterday.

The New York Times says, persons in close touch with the organization indicated the new chairman had already been selected by the dominant interests in the corporation, but his identity would not be revealed until the board of directors formally announced the election.

The best guess of the financial community, the Times says, is that former Governor Nathan L. Miller, general counsel for the steel corporation will be named. The Times adds that President Coolidge was discussed seriously in some quarters as a possibility but the general impression was that he could not be persuaded to take the position should the controlling interests in the corporation decide to offer it to him.

Others who figured prominently in Wall Street discussions included James A. Farrell, president of the corporation, Myron C. Taylor, a director and member of the finance committee, Pierre Dupont, chairman of the board of the General Motors Corporation, and a large stockholder of the United States Steel, Dwight Morrow, partner in the firm of J. P. Morgan and Company, Orlando F. Weber, president of the Allied Chemical and Dye Corporation, Senator David A. Reed of Pennsylvania, Eugene C. Grace, president of the Bethlehem Steel Corporation and George Gordon Crawford, president of the Tennessee Coal and Railroad Company, a subsidiary of the United States Steel Corporation.

In certain quarters in Wall Street it has been assumed for some months that former Governor Miller, or Taylor, was being groomed for the place. The former Governor was a trusted advisor and friend of Gary and many believe that the late chairman preferred him as his successor. Besides being general counsel, Miller is a member of the finance committee of the corporation, which also includes J. P. Morgan, Percival Roberts, Jr., Mr. Farrell, Wm. J. Filbert, Mr. Taylor and G. F. Baker.

Mr. Gary's fortune furnished another topic for speculation. Estimates of the wealth he amassed varied widely. One Wall Street authority placed it as high as \$45,000,000, while others fixed the total at figures ranging from \$6,000,000 to \$30,000,000.

Mr. Gary's salary also had been a matter of speculation in Wall Street. Often it was estimated at \$100,000 a year, but it was also reported that he had a commission on earnings which brought his annual earnings from the corporation to \$500,000.

When it was published fifteen years ago that Mr. Gary had signed a contract to receive \$1,000,000 a year, a reported asked John D. Rockefeller what he thought of it. "I don't know what Judge Gary is getting," Mr. Rockefeller replied, "but you tell him to come around to the Standard Oil office tomorrow and I'll pay him twice as much."

In 1924 Gary paid an income tax of \$473,384.29 and in 1925 a tax of \$322,680.

Mr. Gary's body will be taken to Chicago tomorrow and on Thursday will lie in the Gary Memorial Church at Wheaton, Ill. A police guard on duty today at the Fifth Avenue home and no one, unless identified as an intimate friend of the family, was permitted to enter. Tributes to the former Illinois farm boy who at 52 became head of the country's first billion dollar corporation, were paid by President Coolidge and many of the country's business leaders.

IN PACIFIC RACE

high and extending at least fifty miles to sea.

Along the 9,000 feet of fence spectators found point of vantage. They understood that the exciting moment of this novel race occurred at the start. Skill and luck were the two factors dependent on to lift safely 4,600 to 5,900 pounds of flesh, wood, cloth, steel and gasoline from the ground at an average speed of 30 miles an hour. Once in the air the steeds had only to "keep going."

Constant reminder of the specter of misfortune was the presence of "crash equipment." Fire engines, wrecking crews, ambulances, a hospital tent and two fast official "crash cars" carrying airport officials from their stations to the scene of a mishap.

"Merely preparedness, for a fear," the field officials declared. "We expect the racers to take-off in one, two, three order without a hitch. The runway offers every chance for success."

For days and late into last night tractors had dragged harrows and scrapers back and forth along the runway, leveling the surface and packing it tight. Water wagons sprinkled hundreds of gallons of water to lay the dust, yet, under the whipping propellers of planes taking to the air the one bobbie dust remained. Only those persons near the end of the runway were expected to see the planes leave the ground.

Atop a spindly wooden tower to one side of the runway a man was to describe to the radio fans the action of the take-offs. "Thousand," were expected only to hear the roar of motors, shouts of the crowd and the voice of the man saying "they're off."

To the left of the field were the lapping waves of the Pacific, the fringe of the "big drink" the fliers have joked about for days, reminding each other "if you don't make it is the 'big drink' for you."

Spectators have been keenly interested in the first woman to start across the ocean toward the island goal. Miss Mildren Doran, the flying school teacher of Flint, Michigan, garbed in her man's uniform of drab decorated with Sam Brown belt and numerous insignia, has attracted attention when she appeared on the field to pose with her pilot, "Augsy" Pedlar, of Flint and Navigator Lieut. AMBASSADOR PUEYREDON

"One unusual and rather pleasant observation I made," he remarked, "was the number of young people in the small towns drinking milk. On every table milk instead of wine."

Home Harder To Rule Than River
Steamer, Says Woman Captain

American Trapshooters Meet In \$20,000 Championship Event

Speedboats and oil burning liners have been a stronger force than family tradition, ousting Mrs. Blanche Leathers from her profession of river pilot. Now that she is a land-housewife, she regrets the days when the "Natchez" of which she was captain, rolled down the Mississippi.

New Orleans, La.—(AP)—Piloting a household is much more difficult than directing the process of a Mississippi river steamer, declares Mrs. Blanche Leathers, who has done both successfully.

Mrs. Leathers is the only regularly licensed woman captain of a Mississippi river steamer.

"The worst I ever heard of on the river in my years of association with men was a little clean cursing," she says. "Women are much worse than men."

Capt. Leathers directed the activities of the steamer Natchez fourth of that name. It was a direct "descendant" of the Natchez up the river with the Robert E. Lee.

Jefferson Davis was a passenger on her boat on his last trip to his Mississippi plantation. He gave her a bottle of rare Madeira wine with the parting injunction that the wine should be opened in honor of her first child.

River steamboating was in its heyday during the period in which the Natchez moved majestically up and down the stream. Gamblers made regular trips with the cotton planters, who were their greatest prey.

Capt. Leathers saw fortunes won and lost aboard the boat. Plantations were mortgaged, she says, to pay debts to the gentlemen of the green cloth.

The Natchez also had its bar. Here Southern gentlemen sipped mint juleps or drank their whiskey straight. Many dinner parties with dancing to the accompaniment of banjos and guitars took place on the Natchez.

But there was a serious side to the life too. Passengers, sometimes numbering 500 had to be looked after as well as crew and boat. Once she brought the Natchez into New Orleans with 3500 bales of cotton aboard. Wrecks and near wrecks came into her experience.

With the demand for more speedy transportation and the growing popularity of railroads, business slumped and the Natchez finally went under the auctioneer's hammer. After the death of her husband, son of the captain of the first Natchez, Mrs. Leathers quit the river. She now regards the world quietly from the comfort of her home. But times are not like they once were on the great rolling Mississippi, she regrets.

MOVIE "TWINSHIPS" IRK STARS WHEN CAMERA FINDS TWO ALIKE



To the motion picture camera many a Hollywood star resembles another one of equal renown. It finds resemblances between Mary Brian and Jean Arthur (upper and lower left); Norma Talmadge and Louise Lorraine (upper and lower center); and Priscilla Dean and Leatrice Joy (upper and lower right).

Hollywood, Cal.—(AP)—In Hollywood almost everyone looks like someone else. Some enjoy it and occasionally make a little money at it. To others the coincidence of resembling a stranger is just another one of those unpreventable annoyances.

There are so many extras who look like stars that the central casting bureau, through which the studios employ their extra talent would by an order for a dozen Pola Negris half a dozen Harold Lloyd's ten Charlie Chaplins and a quartet of Greta Garbos.

The normal demand for photographic doubles is very slight so the casting bureau seldom keeps more than one or two listed for each star. But should a sudden demand arise for doubles in whole-sale lots they would be available.

The photographic double, incidentally, is not to be confused with the孖生, swimming, flying or fighting doubles who sometimes substitute for stars in hazardous scenes. Such athletic doubles may resemble the star only in height and weight and may even be of the opposite sex without impairing their usefulness.

Some of the most interesting resemblances are among the established players, who decidedly are not looking for employment as doubles. Jean Arthur, for instance, Monty Banks' new leading woman, is the image of Mary Brian. Priscilla Dean and Leatrice Joy strongly resemble each other, and Louise Lorraine is the photographic twin of Norma Talmadge.

Others whom the camera, in certain moods at least seem to classify as doubles include Walter Goss and Charley Ray, Eugene O'Brien and Jack Mulhall, and Lawrence Grey and Harrison Ford. Rudolph Valentino doubles have periodically ever since that actor's death.

Sometimes the unofficial twins of Hollywood look alike only on the screen or in certain photographs. In other cases the resemblance is so strong they are mistaken for each other even at screen colony gatherings, where presumably everyone knows everyone else.

In the latter event the likeness is more often embarrassing than entertaining.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population

Paris. —(INS)—Stone by stone Paris is moving westward, so that almost the last remaining souvenir of old French aristocracy will disappear from the Avenue des Champs Elysees with the approaching removal of the old house of the Duke de Massa to the Left Bank. Intimately connected with the events of France's two imperial regimes and celebrated as having been frequented by Napoleon, Murat and Talleyrand as well as the social stars of the Second Empire, the fine mansion numbers about one hundred and fifty years. It is now being removed from its original site and will be set up stone by stone to become the quarters of the Societe des Gens de Lettres, a home for literary men.

President Doumergue, like every other Frenchman, is taking a summer holiday. But in reality it is only a change of scene. He has merely gone to the old palace at Rambouillet, an hour away from Paris where the government departments can easily reach him. He could not pack his bags and go where he wanted to. The President is a prisoner of his greatness. Every morning he is busy with despatches and the numerous documents for which his signature is indispensable and he must preside from time to time over a Cabinet Council which may be held at either Rambouillet or in Paris.

Has one the right to cut the tail of his cow? The question being seriously considered by the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals in France, following a curious incident in the Haut Rhin department.

Upon the advice of a former who has the reputation of being a practical joker, one of his neighbors decided to cut the tails of his cows in order to fatten them. On the contrary, the remedy did not work. The poor animals have become as thin as rails and are dying off one by one. Besides losing a fine herd, the poor farmer is threatened with a large fine as well.

Another curious case which has recently come up before the French courts has to do with a number of love-letters written by a French actress awaiting her divorce. Eighteen months ago, she and her husband decided to separate and an order was obtained by mutual consent. Just recently, the ex-husband entered a suit for divorce on the grounds of his wife's alleged adultery. He had come upon certain love-letters and based his case upon this correspondence.

The pretty young wife argued that any woman whose divorce is pending has the right to look ahead and think of the future. Her letters were written with a view to what was going to happen after the divorce was obtained. The court granted the divorce and the responsibility was divided equally between the husband and wife.

Paris will soon be worthier than ever of the name of "the City of Light." The Municipal Council has just adopted the recommendations of a committee which has been studying the lighting of the capital and voted credits of 10,000,000 francs for the proposed improvements. More lights will be installed in the smaller streets, so that no one can ever say that Paris is light only in the central districts.

Another American cabaret is just getting started in the rue Boissy d'Anglas and will be known as "Finny's Bar." Julian Levy of Philadelphia, has decorated the walls which are reported to be quite as lively as one can expect to find on the Right Bank.

The "Cite Lindbergh," a group of modern dwellings, seven stories in height, will soon replace the unwholesome little barracks which have long stood on the fortifications around Paris. 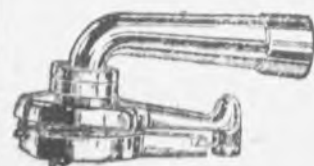
