SACCO AND VANZETTI DENIED NEW TRIAL

No Trace Has Yet Been Found of Missing Pacific Fliers

SUPREME COURT OVERRULES EXCEPTIONS OF DEFENSE IN CASE OF DOOMED ITALIANS

Decision Upheld Ruling of Judge Thayer That Motion for New Trial Came Too Late

Boston, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Counsel for Sacco and Vanzetti announced today they will apply to the United States Supreme Court for a writ of certiorari in behalf of the condemned men. It will be based on points involving the due process clause of the United States constitution they said.

Boston, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The full bench of the Massachusetts Supreme Court today overruled the exceptions by Sacco-Vanzetti defense counsel to decisions by Justice George A. Sanderson of that court and by Judge Webster Thayer of the Superior Court and refused to grant a writ of error.

The decision was announced just after 9 a. m. by the Supreme Court recorder with whom the Justices filed it yesterday.

The exceptions were to the refusal of Justice Sanderson to grant a writ of error and to the refusal by Judge Thayer of a new trial, a renovation of sentence and a stay of execution. Arguments on these exceptions were made last Tuesday before the Supreme Court sitting before the full bench and at their conclusion defense counsel filed a petition for a writ of error with the full bench. The court had queried Arthur D. Hill, chief defense counsel, as to why this procedure had not been followed in the first place.

Arguments for the state were made by Attorney General Arthur K. Reading. The four Justices were Henry K. Braley, who presided in view of the illness of Chief Justice Arthur P. Rugg, Edward P. Pierce, James B. Carroll and William C. Wait.

These legal steps by counsel for Sacco and Vanzetti, whose respite from execution for murder expires at midnight on August 22nd, were based chiefly on allegations of prejudice on the part of Judge Thayer, who presided at the trial and whose previous refusal to grant a new trial was upheld by the Massachusetts Supreme Court last April.

The decision upheld the ruling of Judge Thayer that the motion for a new trial came too late because sentence had been pronounced.

"Neither the judge nor any of his associates had jurisdiction," the decision said, "to entertain the motion for a revocation of sentence."

With regard to the petition for a writ of error the decision says: "The wording of the statute is clear and must be construed as meaning that the issuance of a writ of error in a capital case rests in the sound judicial discretion of the single justice to whom the application is presented" and that "the petition was rightly denied."

Charlestown State Prison, Boston, Mass., Aug. 19.—(AP)—The statement that Bartolomeo Vanzetti had become insane was made by Michael A. Musmanno, their attorney today.

On leaving Vanzetti, Musmanno called newspapermen into Warden Hendry's office and with the warden present said:

"Vanzetti took the news very badly. He kept shouting 'I knew it. I knew it. Get the million men. The million men who are making all that noise.'"

"Vanzetti looks very bad," Musmanno continued. "His mind is in an awful condition. He wants a wireless in his cell so that he can tell his story to the world."

"Sacco took the news quietly. He was eating when I got there. When he saw me he stopped. I told him that I was sorry to have to tell him the bad news about court decision," Musmanno said.

"Well, we expected it. I want to write a letter to my boy."

LOCAL MARKET LEADS STATE WITH PRICES

Greenville Tobacco Market Made Highest Average of State Last Season.

The Greenville tobacco market led all other markets of the State in price during the 1926-27 season, according to a compilation of statistics of the various markets made public in a report issued by the government.

The average price paid on the Greenville market for the entire season was 28.24. Fannville took second place with an average price of 28.08 and Williamston third with an average of 27.09.

The market not only took first place from the standpoint of prices, but it also won second position in the number of pounds sold. Wilson took first place with 68,921.10 pounds. Greenville coming second with 49,513.184.

Greenville is acknowledged to be the best tobacco market in the State and buyers and warehousemen are determined to hold tenaciously to the record during the approaching season. Many of the warehouses and factories of the city have been enlarged and accommodations will be greater than ever before.

Dr. McDaniel to be Buried Tomorrow

Richmond, Va., Aug. 19.—(AP)—The body of the Rev. Dr. George White McDaniel, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Richmond, who died late yesterday as the result of a stroke of paralysis suffered about two weeks ago will lie in state in the chapel of the church from two until four o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Funeral services will be held in the church at four o'clock with interment in Holywood cemetery.

Dr. McDaniel first suffered a stroke of paralysis in 1925 but recovered and resumed his active duty within a few months. The second stroke occurred on August tenth and he was never able to leave his bed again. The members of his family, his widow and two children, Mary and John Harrington, were at his bedside at his death, as well as a number of relatives and friends.

Rev. John Cowell Speaks At the Methodist Church

Rev. John C. Cowell of Fayetteville, member of the Cowell-Brainerd evangelistic party, spoke to a fairly large and appreciative congregation at Jarvis Memorial Methodist church in this city last night. He spoke on the subject of "Why Men Go to Hell." He drew home his message in a forceful and convincing manner and showed beyond a doubt that no man is lost unless he so wills it himself.

The services were well attended, despite ominous looking clouds which later in the evening gaily forth a torrential downpour of rain. The service had been advertised for the court house lawn, but unfavorable weather conditions throughout yesterday caused those in charge of the program to change to the Methodist church. That change in plans probably caused considerable confusion of those attending services from a distance because the announcement made through the afternoon paper did not reach them in time.

But despite the weather and confusion created by the change in arrangements, the services passed off pleasantly and those who braved the threatening elements were well repaid for doing so. Mr. Cowell was introduced by Rev. L. B. Jones, pastor of the local Methodist church. Some services were led by Rev. W. S. Harden, pastor of the Presbyterian church.

Mr. Cowell's text was taken from the 39th and 40th verses of the fifth chapter of St. John, in which that beloved follower of the cross quoted Jesus as follows:

"Search the scriptures, for in them ye think ye have eternal life, and they are they which testify of me."

"And ye will not come to me that ye might have life."

Mr. Cowell declared that no man is lost because he needs to be lost. If one is lost it is not because God has not provided a way of salvation. It is because of an insistent desire to follow the ways of the world, which ultimately lead to eternal damnation.

Men are not lost because they go down so deeply in sin. They are lost because they will not listen to the call of Jesus, who has promised eternal life to all that come.

"Some people say they cannot be saved because they have gone down so deeply in the mire of sin and shame," the evangelist said. "That is a mistake. The atonement of Christ provides a way to the worst of sinners. This atonement is deep as the sea, high as the heavens and broad as the east to the west. We are lost not because of sin but because we will not accept the way paved by Christ."

SIX MEN TO GO ON TRIAL AT HENDERSON

House of Striker Who Went Back to Work Was Dynamited Today.

Henderson, N. C., Aug. 19.—(AP)—The home of M. E. Partin, who walked out with 800 strikers in the Harriet Cotton Mill here two weeks ago, but returned to work later, was dynamited early today.

The blast tore off the back porch of his home and shattered the windows of his and other homes in the neighborhood. There were no injuries. Partin and his two daughters and two sons had returned to their work in the mills after several days of idleness following the general walkout.

Willis Day and Johnny Paul, who had also returned to work after walking out with the other strikers, reported that there were small explosions in the yards of their homes during the night.

There have been no arrests.

The explosion occurred, Partin said, shortly after 1 o'clock while he and his family were sleeping. The blast was very light and not an attempt upon Partin's life, but an effort to frighten him and his family. The blasts at the Day and Paul homes were also very light and created but little disturbance.

Citizens generally were ignorant as to the explosion today, and seemed not to know that the home of one of their number had been damaged. Leaders of the striking forces knew but little of the occurrence and reserved their opinions.

It is not known whether Partin and his daughters and sons, all mill workers, were among those who struck for higher wages two weeks ago, or whether they were among the large group who were forced from work when the majority of the Harriet mill operatives walked out.

Sheriff Kearney of Vance county said today he had no clues which might lead to the apprehension of the parties responsible for the explosion, and city authorities were equally at a loss. An investigation is in progress from both angles.

Meanwhile, five men charged with disorders in connection with the strike, before the arrival and departure of National Guard troops last week, brought to trial this morning had their hearing postponed until September 17.

Monk Duke, who was charged with assaulting Horace E. Holmes with an axe, was discharged. Joe Roberson, who it is alleged threatened a negro employee of one of the mills in an attempt to keep him off the mill property, was released in \$250 peace bond. The trial of Percy Faulkner, charged with assaulting J. P. Paul, was continued for six months on good behavior.

Meanwhile, quiet reigned, both in the camps of the strikers and in the offices of the mill owners, the latter remaining uncommunicative. The owners are apparently adamant in their refusal to return to the 1925 working wage demanded by the strikers, which is a 12 1/2 per cent increase over their present scale, and the workers appear equally determined to hold out until their demands are met.

Union officials here observing the strike and attempting to organize the idle workmen, with other leaders continued to distribute supplies to the families of strikers which are in needy circumstances. Additional funds from various sources are being received to aid the workmen in their war.

Union leaders today claimed that they had induced into the textile union about 600 local operatives, from both the ranks of those now idle and from the workers of the North Henderson mills, which mill officials continue to assert have been little affected by the strike.

The opposing sides have apparently settled into a "freeze out" and conditions for the workers and mills in the future will depend upon the strength of the respective sides.

Mill officials seem content to sit by and watch their machinery idle, while the operatives are equally as refused.

Complaint sets forth that demand has been made upon the company for payment and that payment was refused.

AIRPLANES AND DESTROYERS PLY PACIFIC OCEAN TODAY IN QUEST OF LOST PLANES

BEGIN SEARCH FOR GEOLOGIST LOST IN CAVE

Famous Nick-A-Jack Cave of Kentucky Holds Fast Secret of L. S. Ashley.

Shelbourn, Tenn., Aug. 19.—(AP)—A granite walled cave, once the stronghold of freebooters, housed within its uncharted regions today the answer of the fate of Lawrence S. Ashley, geologist and underground explorer who disappeared within its deep recesses Monday morning.

The famous Nick-A-Jack cave, 30 miles west of Chattanooga held fast the one man that possibly of all others had lauded its wonder more vividly. Ashley, ever fascinated by its marvels, held the cavern in higher regard than Mammoth Cave.

As the cave continued to guard its secret, a seventh party of explorers took up the search early last night when the sixth band of weary, bleary-eyed seekers staggered exhausted out of its murky entrance after a futile eight hour tramp through mysterious windings.

A slow painstaking journey through miles of subterranean passages revealed no trace of the missing man and only a cryptic sign, "L. S. A. 196" scrawled on a rock far within, which friends believed was merely a guide marker used by Ashley.

The geologist, advising intimates that he intended penetrating deep into the cave for further investigations, entered the cavern with only a few sandwiches and a small quantity of carbide for his lamps, both of which searches conclude were consumed hours ago. They cherish a faint hope that if he has escaped a watery grave in the clear river running to remains unknown he may be wandering alive within, even though in stygian darkness. Others fear he may have met the fate of Floyd Collins, of Sand Cave fame, in being imprisoned by a rock slide and helples probably in a sub-cavern, far beyond their reach.

A plan was crystallizing here today to ask the Governor for State aid and possibly for State militia to assist in the rescue work.

Withdraws Suit Against Co-ops

Raleigh, N. C., Aug. 19.—(AP)—"Col." Wiley Person has withdrawn his suit against the North Carolina Cotton Growers Association, Gen. Manager U. B. Blalock of the organization announced in a statement issued in which the former was asked to acknowledge that there was no foundation for his attack against the cotton association.

"This suit against the cotton growers association has proven to be one of the greatest legal farces anyone has ever attempted to pull off in the courts of North Carolina," Mr. Blalock stated. "There was never any occasion for this suit and no basis or foundation for it."

"Col." Person some time ago started several suits against the cotton organization in which he contended it gambled in cotton with clients' money. The suit announced as withdrawn was that of Person's client, W. H. W. Holder, Harrell County farmer.

James Dole Offers \$20,000 For Recovery of Planes and Their Occupants.

San Francisco, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The plan which preceded the take-off of \$30,000 prize Dole flight in its wake today, into a far-reaching

the Pacific went the appealing of the radio, aided by searching planes, destroyers, and submarines in quest of two lost airplanes.

James Dole, the Hawaiian millionaire who put up the prize for the race, today opened his purse again, this time to offer \$20,000 for the recovery of the missing planes and the occupants. To this amount William Mallock, Michigan millionaire, who entered the Miss Doran in the race, added \$10,000 for the recovery of the occupants of the Miss Doran, dead or alive. George Hearst, publisher of the San Francisco Examiner, also offered \$10,000 toward \$50,000 for the rescue of the occupants of each missing plane.

But the trackless wastes of the Pacific were silent to the appeal of the agencies of modern communication. All day yesterday and through the night the question was radio cast: Where are Miss Mildred Doran, attractive 22-year-old Michigan school teacher; J. A. Pedlar, pilot of her monoplane, Lt. V. R. Knope, her navigator, Jack Frost, pilot of the Golden Eagle and Gordon Scott, his navigator? Every pilot in the Pacific kept a constant watch for the ill-fated planes or their crews, but no trace of them was heard.

Their gasoline supplies exhausted many hours ago, their food sufficient for about two days more, the missing aviators if they have escaped death—were either riding along the waves in their planes or had abandoned them for a rubber life raft. Perhaps they were safer on some isolated island far away from the lines of communication of they may have been battered down to the depths if their planes crashed into the sea.

The one bright spot in the whole situation was the weather. For two days weather conditions in the Pacific have been ideal for the last three. There was an absence of wind and this would assure a smooth riding surface for an airplane forced down, or a rubber life boat, according to T. R. Reede, United States weather bureau expert here.

However, the Miss Doran would not last many hours in the most favorable weather, the construction of the plane was such that it would give buoyancy to its weight by employing the gasoline tanks, but it could not ride the waves for many hours, after the first 24.

The Miss Doran put out her face on Tuesday after it had been forced back to a first start because of engine trouble. Miss Doran, an unmarried, took her place beside Navigator Knope and went up despite the warning of Lt. Ben Wyatt, who said the changing of the plane's spark plugs would not help the Miss Doran's engines. The trouble was more deep seated, he believed.

The consensus of those who watched the planes perform was that it did not get far along its course before the engine trouble recurred and the plane was forced to come down, landing in the sea with more than a ton of gasoline in the tanks. Dropping an airplane into the sea under the most favorable circumstances is considered a precarious job for an expert pilot, but landing there with a heavy load of gasoline, would seem to invite disaster.

Against this opinion was a notion that the plane might have cruised until it went off its course and passed the islands, either to the north or south, combine down with exhausted gasoline tanks. But this was only a most remote possibility.

The Golden Eagle, carrying a crew of two, Frost and Scott, presently was no damage.

An engaging figure at the British open championship was young Edwin Haley. (AP)—Trial of six men arrested last Thursday in connection with disturbances growing out of the strike of 800 textile workers of the South Henderson mills, was set for today as the only development of the walk-out which occurred two weeks ago. One of the men is charged with assault and the others with utterances tending to incite a riot and with threats against mill officials, and others. A hearing scheduled for last Friday before Recorder R. J. Southerland was postponed until today.

Company officials report additional workers returning to their posts with a few more than 100 on the job today in Harriett Mills Nos. 2 and 3, which together with two other mills were paralyzed by the strike. There has been no disturbance incident to their return to work.

The North Henderson mills, upon which union officials and strike leaders have been reported concentrating their efforts to bring out 600 additional workers in sympathy, remain practically unaffected and are operating with full forces day and night.

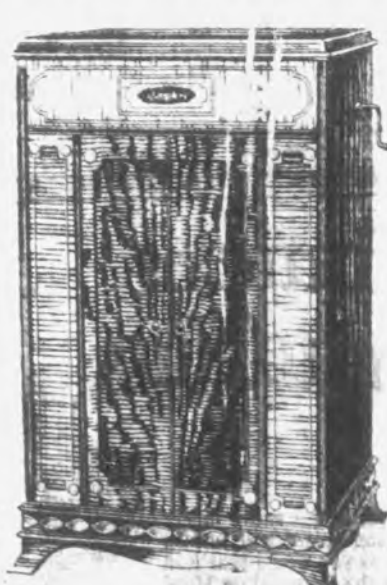

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population

Driver — (NS) — And now the "conspiration of wood!" Plans to replace the "Old Guard" woods used in paper making—spruce, fir and hemlock—which are rapidly vanishing, are being laid by the federal department of agriculture, it was learned here recently.

Spruces, firs and hemlock provide 77 per cent of the total amount of wood pulp used in the paper industry at the present time and 55 per cent of this supply comes from the spruce alone.

The country faced its first severe shortage of materials to carry on the paper industry in 1919. Now many eastern mills are facing a possible shut-down for lack of raw materials, and throughout the nation paper mills are generally immobile. The need for finding some means of supplementing the waning supply of woods makes itself more and more evident.

The application of chemicals seems at the present time to be the best possible method for adding to the pulp woods. The sulphate process applied to pines in the South together with the gums and similar hardwoods which thrive there has been found to yield a pulp which, when properly treated, may be used in the manufacture of book, magazine and other high-grade printing papers at a reasonable cost, according to recent government reports.

The South is located near enough to publishing centers, and also to raw materials so that its position is very favorable for increased paper industries is the belief of authorities. The Southern forests are filled with great quantities of woods and have a very high growth rate.

Government investigators and experiments have proved that there are 94 kinds of hardwoods and soft woods which would be suitable for pulping through the application of either chemical or mechanical processes. Government research into the matter is being carried on at the United States forest station products laboratory in Madison, Wis.

Denver can boast at least one model home for the gentlemen who live by their wits and other peoples' money—and it does not have bars over the windows, either.

The modern home builder began his activities on April 8 when he acquired ten sacks of cement. Since

then a record of his haul promises a very complete little home. He has taken four kegs of nails from a building site a complete painters outfit including ladders, brushes, painters tools and five gallons of house paint, a complete set of carpenter tools, 700 shingles and roofing beams, 30,000 brick, 100 bundles of corrugated iron, besides planks and timber, and two mortar hods.

"We have not yet been invited to the house warming," said Chief R. Fred Reed of Denver police, "but we do not intend to stand upon ceremony. All we need is the address and we'll all take a look at the Denver thief's model home."

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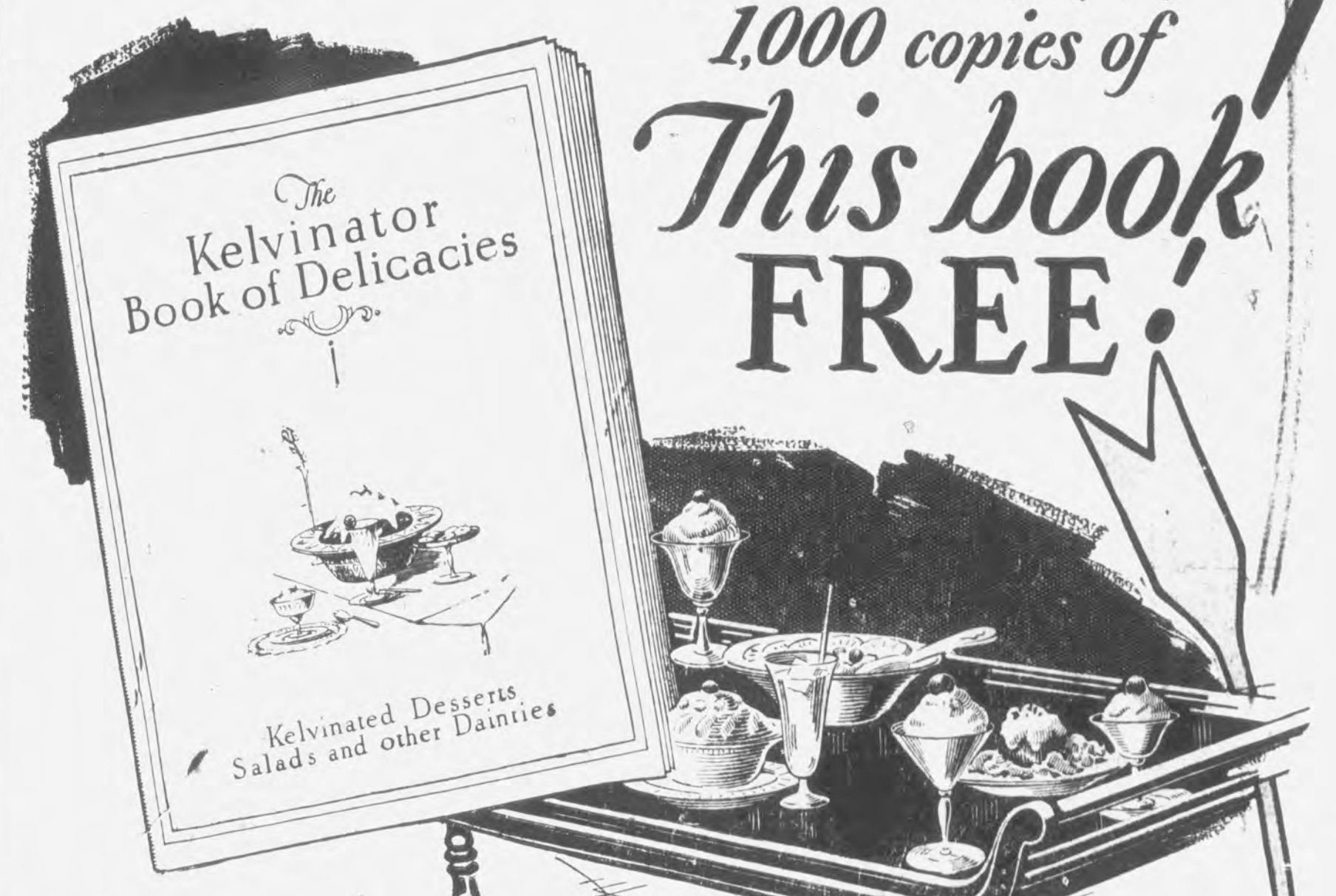

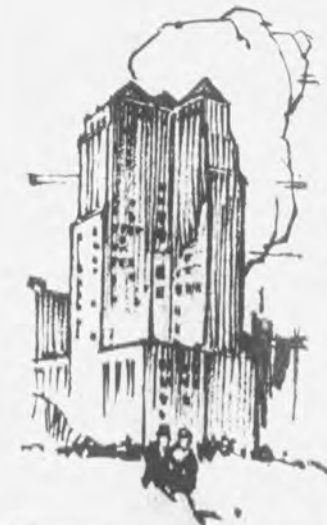
