CONTINUE INTENSIVE SEARCH FOR MISSING AVIATORS OVER TRACKLESS PACIFIC WASTES

Mystery Still Surrounds Disappearance of Seven Fliers And Three Planes.

Washington, Aug. 22.—(AP)—The Navy will continue until Thursday its search in the Pacific ocean for the lost San Francisco to Hawaii aviators, it was announced today.

San Francisco, Aug. 22.—(AP)—The aviation world, its eyes held westward, with a heavy heart to-day watched aircraft, naval vessels and merchant ships continue their intensive search in the trackless wastes of the Pacific for seven fliers who flew down the airways from Oakland toward Honolulu; last week and have not been heard of since.

Efforts of 58 naval vessels, aided by the craft steering a course along the 2,400 mile great circle between San Francisco and Honolulu after a six day search failed to reveal any trace of the 3 missing planes—the Miss Doran, the Dallas Spirit and the Golden Eagle.

Worshippers in all Honolulu churches yesterday offered prayers for the rescue of the six men and one woman comprising the crews of the lost airships.

A faint flicker of hope regarding the plane carrying Miss Mildred Doran, went up from Long Beach Cal., last night, when a carrier pigeon landed there. At one time Miss Doran spoke of taking carrier pigeons on the flight and releasing them 150 and 300 miles out in the Pacific. Check of the markings on the bird, however, revealed it was a participant in a carrier pigeon race being conducted on the Pacific coast and it had no connection with the San Francisco to Honolulu fliers.

Residents of Honolulu, mindful of the rescue of the late Commander John Rodgers, continued to express hope that the missing fliers would be found. Rodgers was found nine days after his seaplane was forced down.

Honolulu, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Thirty navy planes today to cover in its search for the missing fliers. The Golden Eagle and the Miss Doran with five persons aboard were five days overdue here and the Dallas Spirit has not been heard from since last Friday night. Searchers here refused to give up hope.

Seaplane patrols which Saturday searched the ocean to the windward side of the Island of Maui and yesterday searched the sea to the windward of Molokai, today were to search the ocean off Kauai within an area extending sixty miles north and 100 east, the U. S. S. Holland and accompanying boats yesterday searched the area between Kauai and Nohoa or Bird Island, turning last night to search the area south of Nohoa.

The U. S. S. Widgeon with accompanying boats last night were still on the leeward side of Kauai bound for Pearl Harbor.

The U. S. S. Dredon was to continue the search today north of the Island of Hawaii. The Pelican and the Sunnadin are to accompany seaplane patrols off Kauai.

SHUTTLEY SPRINGS ARE SOLD TODAY

Winston-Salem, N. C., Aug. 22.—(AP)—The Chattley Springs of the Radium Springs Corporation of America, located seven miles from Jefferson, Ashe County, has been sold at trustee's sale by J. B. Williams, trustee. Only two bids were made for the property, one bid of \$49,350 by E. E. Eller, of North Wilkesboro, and a higher bid of \$49,500 by C. A. Mullis, Attorney J. A. Rousseau, representing the trustees, announced that trustee's deed would be tendered the high bidder in ten days and if the cash was not paid that a trustee's deed would then be tendered the next highest bidder.

Miss Thomas did a very fine piece of work in the Greenville Schools. Miss Veazey has been doing Public School Music work for about ten years, most of it in Wheaton, Illinois where she has achieved very fine results. Miss Ruth Bonnewitz will again serve as supervisor of drawing.

Paris, Aug. 20.—(AP)—American veterans, planning a second trip, will be interested in the news from Paris. Everything is ready, friendly welcome, the world's best cooking, most beautiful city, and no prohibition.

King Fuad, of Egypt, has arrived. You may see him. He runs Egypt as much as the wooden Indian ran the cigar store. Britain keeps the store.

Paris today talks Sacco-Vanzetti more desperately than ever, with the men's last hope flickering. "Le People" hopes "all France, mobilized to save the men, may keep America from dishonoring herself, and asks "is such assassination possible?" The assassination of the paymaster interests few.

"The two innocents" is the usual description of the condemned men under sentence of death for seven years. Many, including Americans of the conservative kind, not convinced that Communism is proof of innocence, feel that seven years is a long time for the cat to play with the mouse. Even a guilty mouse would suffer enough in that time.

Young race horses auctioned at Deauville for high prices, have been bought by Americans. Mortimer Schiff paid \$2,000 francs yesterday for Ida, a yearling filly, and is expected to start racing here. William Littauer, who used to jump horses over fences with the Wadsworth hounds, bought a dozen young thoroughbreds. 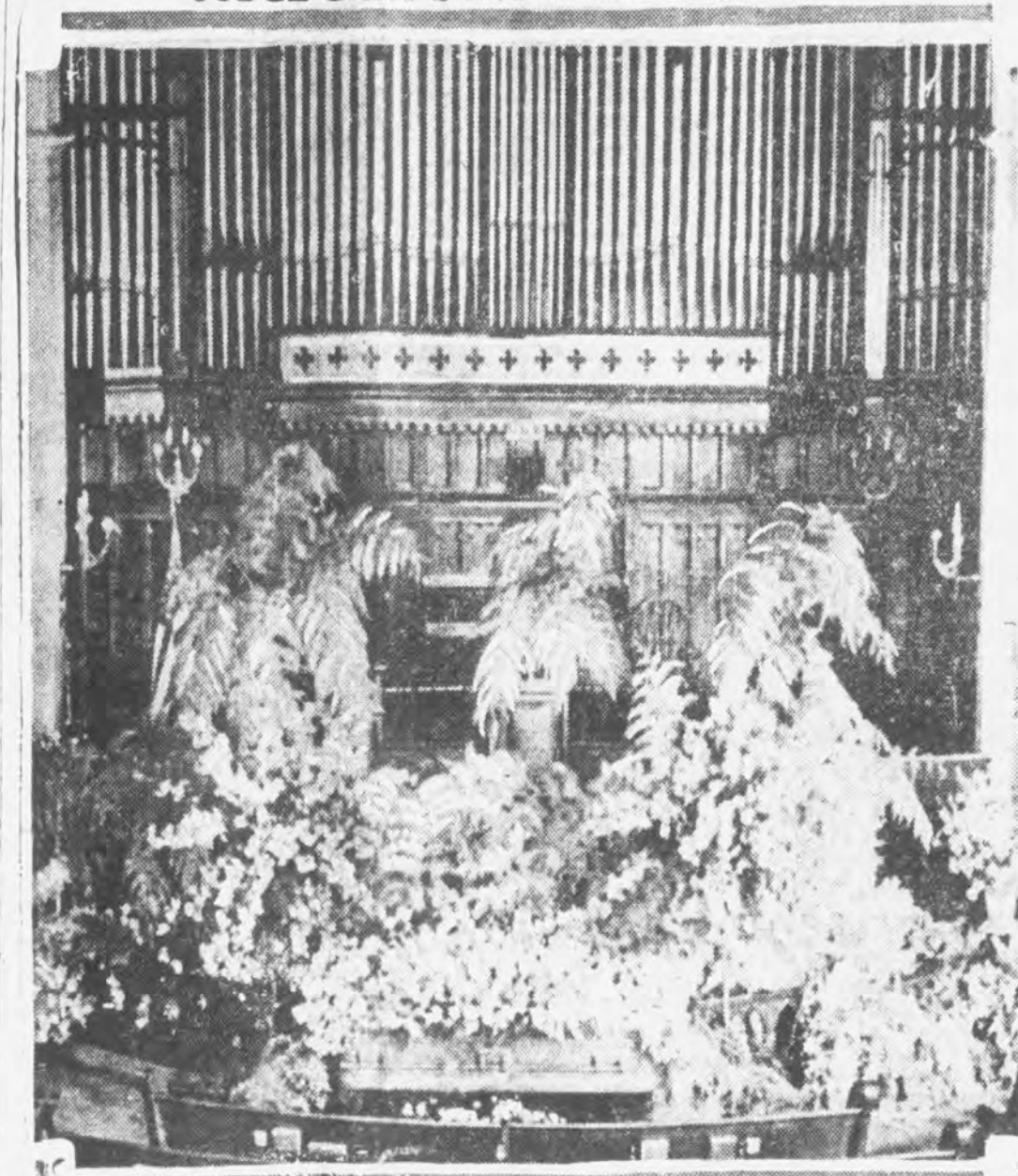

REDFERN SAYS HE WILL HOP OFF TUESDAY

Nothing Short of a Hurricane Will Prevent Take-off For Brazil.

Brunswick, Ga., Aug. 22.—(AP)—Further delay in the take-off of the monoplane "Port of Brunswick" on Paul Redfern's projected non-stop flight to Brazil was seen today when weather reports showed a tropical disturbance apparently moving into the region eastward of the Bahamas islands on the first leg of the 4,600 mile route.

Redfern yesterday set tomorrow morning as the definite day for the take-off, dependent on weather conditions.

Brunswick, Ga., Aug. 22.—(AP)—"Nothing short of a hurricane can stop me from hopping off Tuesday morning."

With this announcement, Paul Redfern, Georgia aviator, closely divided his remaining hours here between needed rest and work in anticipation of his proposed 4,600 mile non-stop flight from Brunswick to Brazil in which he seeks to set up new distance and endurance marks in the air.

The young flier today eagerly scanned a new batch of weather reports, giving new and somewhat unexpected information on atmospheric conditions along his contemplated route. The latest report came in the form of an advisory storm warning from Washington last night announcing a tropical disturbance off the lower south-eastern end of the Bahamas, apparently moving west, northwest vessels in Bahamian waters were advised to use precaution.

Redfern declared yesterday he was checking weather conditions reported unfavorable from Turkey Island to Trinidad, his longest over-water leg of the journey and added that he would not like to take the risk of the predicted strong winds and thundershowers in that region but expected this to clear.

Schlee, president of the Wayne Oil Corporation, and his pilot, William Brock, who will attempt to break the Globe Encircling Record, hopped off from Ford Airport at 10:01 o'clock this morning for Curtis Field, L. E. enroute to Harbor Grace, N. F., their official starting point.

SMITH & SUGG REPORT MANY IMPROVEMENTS

Oldest Warehouse Firm of City Has Floor Space of 62,500 Square Feet.

The Star warehouse, owned and operated by Guy V. Says It Is Too Late To Change Market Opening

Danville, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Admission to the United States Tobacco Association should have set the opening of the Eastern Carolina Tobacco belts earlier than September 6. A. Carrington, president of the Association, says that it is too late now to make any change.

Petitions have reached him from North Carolina merchants requesting an earlier opening with the argument that farmers have been taking their tobacco to the border markets for sale.

Confusion would arise now if any change were made in the opening date, he says.

TWO CHARGED WITH MURDER OF S. WILLIS

Indictments to be Issued Against Dead Man's Wife And Former Sheriff.

Greenville, S. C., Aug. 22.—(AP)—Immediate arraignment of Mrs. Elbert Willis, 31, and Henry Townsend, former deputy sheriff, charged with slaying Sheriff Sam D. Willis, husband of Mrs. Willis, at their home on June 11, will be asked by solicitor J. G. Leatherwood if he can obtain indictments against the pair from the grand jury today.

The solicitor said he would present the case to the jury today, asking indictment and arraignment at once, if true bills are returned. Under the South Carolina law, the defendants must plead "not guilty." They have the right to demand the lapse of three days after arraignment before trial.

Mendel L. Smith, former circuit judge, and David A. Smoak, former solicitor, who will assist solicitor Leatherwood, have been at work two days aiding in preparation of the State's evidence, while attorney general John M. Daniel also is here to assist in the prosecution.

Col. Alvin H. Dean, mayor-elect of Greenville, chief of defense counsel, has made no statements regarding his willingness to proceed after his announcement several weeks ago that unless unforeseen circumstances arose no delay would be sought.

Townsend, who was chief deputy under Sheriff Willis and his "buddy" during the world war, was arrested in connection with the shooting three days after the incident, while at the Willis home. A few days later Mrs. Willis was arrested, both being released on \$1,000 bond each. The sheriff was shot while leaving his garage.

150 APPLICANTS TO TAKE LAW EXAMINATION

Raleigh, Aug. 22.—(AP)—The roster of today's state bar examination had 150 applicants to practice law in North Carolina, exactly the same number to take the exam a year ago today.

There had been 180 applicants but 30 failed to complete their qualifications. About 60 applicants came from Wake Forest, 30 from the University of North Carolina and ten from Duke.

The full bench of the Supreme Court of North Carolina was on hand for the occasion marking the opening of the fall term but appeals will not begin until Tuesday, August 30th when the first district is scheduled.

TOBACCO TOWN ALL SET FOR OPENING HERE

Nine Factories and Seven Warehouses To Operate This Season.

Reynolds Tobacco Company, which is a new plant; Leggett-Meyers Tobacco Company, W. C. Thomas Tobacco Company, Person-Garrett Tobacco Company, who have built a new addition to their large plant; The Greenville Tobacco Company, which is a new company; E. B. Picklen Tobacco Company, who have built to their large plant; the American Tobacco Company, who have built a new plant; Imperial Tobacco Company, and the Export Tobacco Company, who have added a new edition to their plant.

The warehouse space this year will consist of about ten acres. The warehouses will be operated by the following experienced tobacco men who have been in the business several years: Smith and Sugg, who have built a new addition to their warehouse; McGowan and Cannon, have their warehouse in fine condition; F. V. Johnson's, house has been put in best condition; J. N. Gorman, who has built a new addition to his house; O. L. Joyner and sons, remodeled their house; More and Gentry, who have built a new addition to their house; Forbes and Morton, who have rebuilt their house.

ROBINSON HELD IN LIQUOR CASE

Filling Station Operator to be Given Hearing Before Magistrate Today.

Louis Robinson, operator of a filling station on the other side of Tar River, will be given preliminary hearing before Magistrate J. I. Smith this afternoon on a charge of possessing whiskey.

The charge against Robinson grew out of a raid made on his place Saturday night by chief of police Lester Jones, sheriff Whitehurst, accompanied by other members of both departments. Six pints of whiskey are alleged to have been found secreted away in the walls of the filling station building.

Robinson was immediately placed under arrest and released on bond of \$500 for his appearance in the magistrate's court this afternoon.

Officers said this morning that this was the second time Robinson had appeared in court on a whiskey charge within the last few months. The former case grew out of a raid of the filling station.

BELIEVE CONGRESS WILL PROHIBIT LENGTHY FLIGHTS

Washington, Aug. 22.—(AP)—A prediction that Congress will enact a law to prohibit long distance airplane stunt flights, except under rigid conditions, was made today by Admiral Eberle, acting secretary of the navy.

PROHIBITION AGENTS DISMISSED TODAY

Washington, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Twenty-five prohibition agents in New York city were dismissed as a part of an announced country wide program to eliminate inefficient employees.

Radicals to Die in Chair Before Dawn If Counsel Fails to Get Respite.

Boston, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Attempts to save Sacco and Vanzetti early this afternoon apparently were almost wholly back to Governor Fuller and Massachusetts state courts.

Four United States Supreme Justices, Holmes, Brandeis, Taft, and Stone, had refused to intervene.

Counsel for the two men then went before Governor Fuller for a stay to allow them further time to seek Supreme Justices, and also seeking to have Fuller order examination of Federal Department of Justice records for possible new evidence.

Alotted hours of life for Sacco and Vanzetti dwindled steadily today while legal exertions and sympathetic demonstrations multiplied to spite of repeated failures.

Before another dawn the two radicals, in whose behalf there has been world-wide agitation since their conviction seven years ago of two murders in the electric chair at the state prison, unless their counsel, working at several widespread points, obtain another respite or stay of sentence. With them will go Celestino Madeiros, who was convicted of another murder, but professed to have been responsible for the crime of which Sacco and Vanzetti were convicted.

Stonington, Maine, Aug. 22.—(AP)—A stay of execution in the Sacco-Vanzetti case was refused today by Justice Harlan F. Stone, of the United States Supreme Court, at his summer home at Isle au Haut.

At the conclusion of the conference at which only Justice Stone, attorney Hill and three associates of the latter were present, Justice Stone gave out the following memorandum:

"Application considered and denied without prejudice to application to any other Justice. I concur in the view expressed by Justice Holmes as to the merits of the application and action of counsel in presenting it."

Washington, Aug. 22.—(AP)—The petitions of counsel for Sacco and Vanzetti asking reviews of the proceedings in their case in the Massachusetts court was docketed today in the Supreme court.

Boston, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Michael A. Musmanno, of Sacco-Vanzetti defense counsel, announced today that Chief Justice Taft had sent him a telegram in which he announced his refusal to receive a petition for a stay of execution because the matter was outside his jurisdiction.

Musmanno withheld the text of Chief Justice's telegram but added that Mr. Taft had advised him to go before one of the three Supreme Court Justices now in this district. He wished action on such a petition. The defense attorney has appealed in vain to Justices Holmes and Brandeis, and today attorney Arthur D. Hill was on his way to place a petition for a stay before Justice F. Stone at Isle au Haut, Maine.

Boston, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Sacco and Vanzetti, radicals under sentence of death by electrocution shortly after midnight tonight were convicted of the murder of a paymaster and his guard in a holdup in South Braintree on April 15, 1920. Both were known to Department of Justice operatives because of radical activities. Before trial for the South Braintree holdup Vanzetti was convicted of a robbery while armed.

The State's case in the South Braintree matter rested on identification by witnesses; the fact that both men were heavily armed when arrested; Sacco with a revolver claimed to be that carried by the slain guard, a cap identified as Sacco's found on the murder scene; and various other circumstantial evidence.

The defense contended the men were armed because they feared deportation as radicals; produced witnesses to contradict identification; and charged collusion between federal and state officials, persecution for political ideas and prejudice on the part of trial justice and jury foreman.

Sacco worked in a shoe factory in South Braintree. Vanzetti was a shoemaker in Plymouth. Both Italians.

CUBS ONLY 3 GAMES AHEAD IN NATIONAL

New tension has been injected into an interesting baseball race in the National League. The Chicago Cubs were in first place today by a margin of only three games over the Pittsburgh Pirates.

St. Louis in third place was only four and one-half games away from the leaders and the New York Giants, standing fourth, trailed the Braves a five and one-half game margin. Despite the fact that the schedule favors the inspired Cubs, there are many possibilities ahead in the final stretch.

The Giants and Pirates both gained on the Cubs yesterday. New York took both ends of a double-header from Cincinnati. The score was 9-3 and 6-1. Lesie Marini pined hit in the ninth inning of the first game decided the game. His home run in the second game with a runner on base was enough for the victory. The double killing brought the record of McGraw's club to nine wins out of 11 starts, since it came home off the road.

May Leave Record For All Time



Clarence DeMar

Melrose, Mass.—(AP)—A marathon record that may endure for future generations is now in the making. Clarence DeMar, like the book in the poem goes on for ever.

Already DeMar distance running record is unequalled by any other living athlete. Since he is running today as well as he ever did, observers predict that when he finally puts away his running shoes he will leave a record that will stand for all time.

DeMar has been running marathon races more than 15 years. He has run approximately 7,500 miles in practice and competition more than a quarter of the way around the world. In 29 great races he has won more than half his starts. To the others he has usually finished high among the leaders.

This summer DeMar entered his 47th year. In spite of his slight and apparently frail physique he is still setting the pace for others, heartbeaters. He is national marathon champion for the second consecutive year. He triumphed this year in two outstanding classes. Under a broiling sun that made racing conditions anything but favorable he won the annual American Marathon at Boston for the fifth time—a record in itself which sports writers predict may never again be approached.

DeMar followed up his Boston triumph over runners of international note by winning the Laurel, Md., marathon for the second successive year. That year, as in other seasons, he has competed in various lesser races and modified marathons.

DeMar has remained a real amateur. There are no "sates" for marathon runners, and he has declined to use his reputation to further his interests financially. He works daily in a printing shop and does his training morning and evening by running the distance between the shop and his home.

When it was suggested that he go into vaudeville he wondered, naively, why anyone would want to see him on the stage, and if people weren't rather tired of hearing about him.

C., Aug. 22.—(AP)—With the football, training season of the big five North Carolina College conference teams due to get under way the first week in September, advance news from the campuses reveal that coaches are selecting the material at hand and attempting to solve the problems of filling holes made by graduation of last season's stars.

The University of North Carolina, which will undertake one of the most ambitious schedules in recent years, expects to approach as "wood" with entering university men selected back. Added to them will be several outstanding men from the 1926 football team. The experience of one season under the system brought forth by Coach Clark Collins, former Notre Dame player, will be back of the team that faces Wake Forest in the opener on September 24.

North Carolina State, with a reorganized coaching staff, will have twelve letter men back along with good freshmen material. Seven of the 1926 varsity outfit will be missing. State must develop a center to replace Captain Logan, who graduated.

Out of 222 veterans who brought the State championship to Davidson last season only seven will return, indicating that Coaches Monk Younger and Tex Tilton must, as they did when they took charge of the Wildcats in 1923-24, again start from the ground up. Davidson like State, must find a center to replace McConnell.

Wake Forest loses its "big three"—demons, Capt. Barkley, Riley and Emerson and eight other letter men from the outfit that replaced the Baptist institution back on the previous map. Players must be developed to replace the famous Rockley-Riley combination of the former passer-receiver as well as the former drop kicking too. Despite the loss of eleven veterans, nine letter men are expected back.

Coach Jimmy Dehart at Duke University will continue his efforts to reorganize the Blue Devils and word comes that his hope rests on sophomores who made good on the freshman outfit last fall. The varsity which experienced numerous setbacks will be back almost to the man, it is said.

The need of good punters, sadly lacking in 1926, is expected to be solved in the persons of Buie and McNinch, incoming sophomores who played brilliantly with the Blue Imps last season.

Head coaches remain the same among the colleges as the new season approaches. There will be two new assistants. Gus Tebell at State will have Butch Slaughter, former Michigan star selected by the late Walter Camp as all-American guard, who was assistant at Wisconsin, where Tebell played the past two seasons.

Jim Baldwin at Wake Forest will have the services of Fred Emmerich, star at that institution the previous year, as assistant. Game-winning plays of plowing experience is expected by Wake Forest alumni to fit in well with the system Baldwin uses.

English Women Push Aviation As Many Earn Pilot License

Nottingham, Eng.—(AP)—Lady Bailey's feat in being the first woman to fly across the Irish ocean alone has attracted attention to the prominent part played by women in advancing British aviation.

Licensed last January, is typical of them all. Lady Bailey, who entered for the King's Cup, she completed against 18 men. She was third at the Birmingham Air League Challenge and won the Low Power Handicap Cup. She also won the second heat of the private owners race at Nottingham.

In the days before the war when the British public was not much interested women had a large part in pushing the art of flying. Today there are 15 English women who are regular licensed pilots.

The first woman aviator of England was Mrs. Hilda Beatrice Hewlett, wife of the late Maurice Hewlett, the novelist. She studied in France, received her pilot's certificate August 29, 1911, and later owned a Farman biplane which Maurice Mactell christened "The Blue Bird."

At an aviation school she established at Brooklands, she helped train army and navy flying officers. She also assisted in organizing the Patriotic Aerial League for women in 1912 as well as its juvenile branch. Mrs. Hewlett is now a member of a British aircraft company.

Another pioneer is Mrs. Cheridah Annie De Beauvais Stokes, who was licensed November 7, 1911. A third, Mrs. Winnie Buller, a British woman who obtained a pilot's certificate in France in May, 1912.

Several women flew in connection with the Women's Auxiliary Air Force. Mrs. Cecily McAulry, who was a flying expert at that time, took part in the recent sham air raid on London and was brought down dead.

Mrs. Cecily Ethel Williamson, who qualified as an aviator during the war, was certified in September, 1916.

Since the war the following women have obtained air pilot licenses: Mrs. Dubbelle Aitken, the Honorable, Elsie Mackay, Mrs. Hilda Hope McMaugh, Miss Smelda Mary Trafford, Miss Constance, Ruth Teathart of the Newcastle Aero Club, Miss Mary Teton Luis Bell, Miss Winifred Sawley Brown, Miss Doreen V. R. Ronald, Miss Celey O'Brien, Lady Bailey and Mrs. Sophie E. Elliott-Lynn. Miss Trafford was killed a few days after obtaining her certificate in June 1920.

Mrs. Lynn, Lady Bailey and Miss O'Brien competed for the Ladies Purse at the years Nottingham aero meeting. Mrs. Lynn won on the post by two yards.

Mrs. Sophie Elliott-Lynn is the most famous British woman aviator and the only one licensed to carry passengers for hire. Recently she made a flying tour of all the British Aerodromes in one day.

Mrs. Elliott-Lynn added to her laurels by winning the Grosvenor Cup, at an average speed of 88 1-2 miles an hour at the Nottingham Meet, which was fought out among 14 machines of the flying club class. She is the first woman pilot trained by the London Flying Club.

Jinx Has Followed Defenders in Recent Chicago Title Bout

Chicago—(AP)—The Dempsey-Tunney fight in Soldiers Field Sept. 22 will be the fifth major title tilt in Chicago since legalized boxing came back a little more than a year ago. And a persistent jinx followed every defending champion in the previous four.

Three of the title holders lost their crowns and the fourth was knocked out but saved his championship because his opponent was not within the title limit.

Later the New York commission did the same thing to Rosenberg and Taylor was matched with Tony Czuprenko. He shipped Czuprenko decisively in ten rounds.

The jinx fastened next on Tiger Brown, middleweight champion. The verdict of Referee Benny Warner gave the crown to Mickey Walker, who won so much comment that the state athletic commission decided to name two judges for each fight to vote with the referee on decision.

Mickey Callahan, junior welterweight champion, was knocked out by Sergeant Sammy Baker, but Baker was over the 140-pound limit so Callahan's title was not affected.

Fidel La Barba, who rules the flyweight division, is the only title holder who has been successful in Chicago rings in the last year.

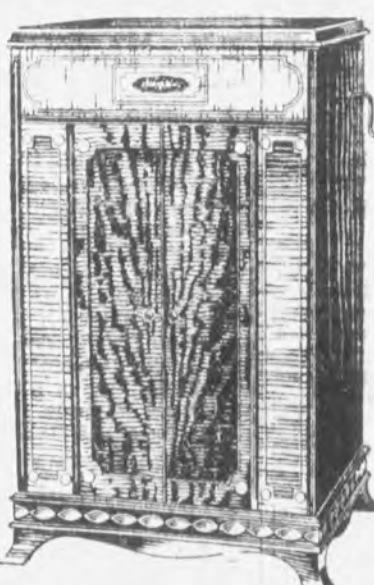

FOREST FIRES KILL FISH NEAR HAVELOCK

Thousands of dead perch and black bass seen floating in the headwaters of Slocumb Creek in Craven County caused local residents to report to County Forest and Game Warden Hooker that someone was dynamiting fish in the stream.

Since it is very unusual for fish to be killed in such great numbers during the summer months by dynamite, as there are not schooled up as in the winter months, County Warden Hooker investigated these reports.

He traced their death directly to the devastating forest fires which burned around these lakes near Havelock this spring. An authority on the subject states that the ashes from these forest fires formed alkalies which were washed down the streams in sufficient quantities to kill thousands of our best game fish.

The unusually dry spring caused the salt water to back farther up the river and creeks, thus exposing these fresh water fish to the poisonous alkalies.

"These fish were thus caught like rats in a trap. Every true fisherman should support the forestry laws and be very careful in handling fire, lest his own sport be exterminated."

Already too much time has been wasted and the law should now take its course.

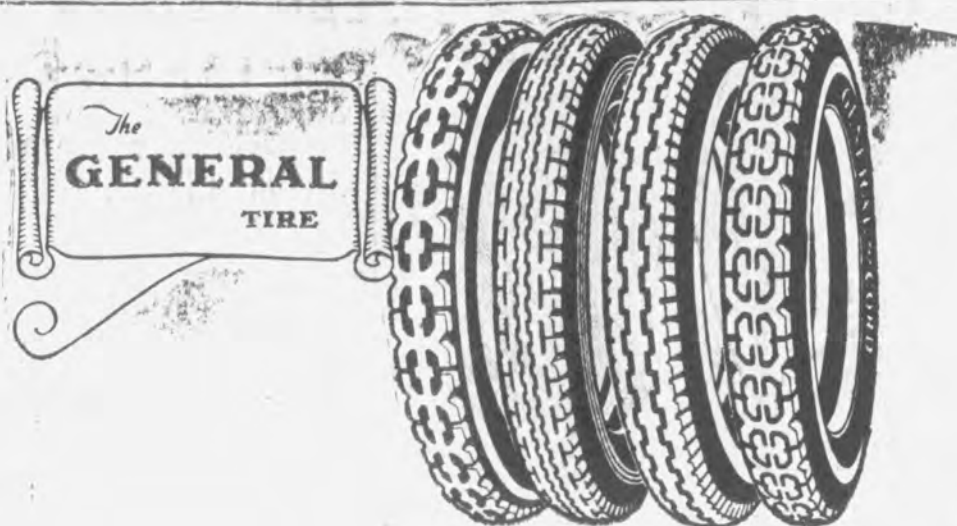

Chicago. —(LNS)—Deaths here recently of Jeremiah J. Crowley, "Pagan Priest" of Chicago has revived tales of his brilliant and fiery career.

Excommunicated from the Roman Catholic Church for alleged derogatory remarks about clergy men, Crowley refused to be unfrocked and appeared at Holy Name Cathedral here and insisted upon saying mass.

Crowley was born in Cork, Ireland in 1861. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1886 in Ireland and came to the United States shortly afterward.

He was called to the archdiocese of Chicago and was later assigned as assistant pastor of the Church of the Nativity. Here his work and zeal earned for him after two years the pastorate of St. Mary Church at Oregon, Ill. He was pastor there for two years when he began to oppose the elevation of the Rev. Peter J. Muldoon to a bishopric, publicly attacking the latter from the lecture platform.

He was then excommunicated in 1901. Crowley refused to recognize his excommunication and stormed Holy Name Cathedral, demanding that he be allowed to say mass. He was ordered to leave but forced his way to the altar before a vast congregation. The regularly assigned priests put out the lights. No one spoke. Finally Crowley departed.

On succeeding Sundays he attended mass but was given the rear seat upon each occasion.

Crowley lost what little money he had saved and was evicted from his room in the old Sherman house. He then went to Wheaton, Ill., where he began the publication of books and periodicals bitterly attacking Catholicism and clergymen. The former priest married his stenographer, Blanche MacLeod, daughter of the postmaster at Schuyler, Ill. The marriage was performed in Ellensburg, Wash., where he was a real estate broker in 1906. A Presbyterian minister officiated at the ceremony.

In June, 1922, Mrs. Crowley filed suit for divorce in Wheaton, Ill., court charging that the former priest was a "wife beater and a knife thrower." Subsequently they became reconciled.

Crowley was six feet three inches in height and weighed 270 pounds. His death followed a short illness. Burial was at Schuyler, Ill. There were not church services at the grave, his widow and daughter alone attending.

The spiral nebulae and planetesimal theories of the earth formation are incorporated to some degree in the theory of a sun's explosion, Dr. Elvey computed.

"Because we have become accustomed to the sun's daily rays it is hard for us to believe the sun is liable to explode any minute," Professor Elvey pointed out. "Yet our sun is no exception to the rule of the universe. It may explode and deluge the earth with burning gases tomorrow or a million years from now."

"If this event happened we would know it in eight minutes, the time required for light to travel from the sun to the earth at a speed of 160,000 miles per second. The gases would burn our planet like an electric blast furnace would eat an apple."

GREAT BRITAIN DRINKS MORE MILK THAN BEER

London. —(LNS)—Britain now drinks more milk than beer. Statistics issued by Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lester, Pres. of the Board of Trade, reveal that while approximately nineteen gallons per head of the population are consumed of each beverage, milk is in slightly greater demand.

The amount of milk consumed by Britain's population during 1926 was approximately 850,000,000 gallons. Beer consumption in the period worked out at 749,531,184 gallons.

DIGS WAY OUT OF CAVE WITH SMALL SHOVEL

Lawrence Ashley Tells of Entombment in Nick-A-Jack Cave in Tennessee.

Shelbourn, Tenn., Aug. 22.—(AP)—Lawrence Ashley, according to his own story, today owed his life to a small cache of food he had planted far back in the recesses of the Nick-A-Jack cave and to a small shovel with which he dug his way to freedom after being entombed for six days.

Ashley made his exit yesterday from the famous cavern which spreads out under three states and from which marauding bands of Cherokee Indians used to make their sallies against white settlers, at a point in Castle Rock Gully, eight miles from the mouth of the cave which he entered on Monday morning a week ago.

In a dazed, semi-conscious condition and on the verge of collapse, the explorer protested he was none the worse for his experience.

As Ashley emerged from the cavern through a small opening hitherto unknown, rescue workers were preparing to make a final attempt to locate him alive. A crew of trained workers, was ready to enter the cave and preparation had been made to drag the River of Darkness, which courses through the cavern, in an effort to locate Ashley's body.

The entrance of the Nick-A-Jack cave is on the Tennessee line where that state joins Alabama and Georgia and the passageways of the cavern run far back into the latter two states.

Ashley entered the cave last Monday to examine an unexplored sub-cavern, and it was there that he was trapped by a landslide which cut off his retreat and forced him to dig his way to freedom with a pocket knife and a small shovel. A supply of food which he had cached in the cavern, and from which he was not cut off by the slide, served to sustain life.

After a brief rest at the home of a friend near the cave, Ashley appeared much refreshed. He was indignant at suggestions that the whole affair was a hoax to advertise the cave, on which he is said to hold a 50 year lease and threatened to bring suit against any party or publication that spread such a report.

Nashville, Tenn., Aug. 22.—(AP)—L. S. Ashley, cave explorer, was not lost in the Nick-A-Jack cave at Shelbourn, and did not dig his way out by another opening to the cave after six days of confinement, in the opinion of D. P. Pile, State mine inspector, who said today that he would report to Governor Austin Peay today.

There was no evidence to show that Ashley had been in the cave, he said, and a great deal to indicate that he and members of the searching party were working "a publicity stunt."

While Ashley came down the mountain from the place where "he dug himself out," Ashley passed within a short distance of the main entry to the cave at which the searching parties were gathered, he did not stop to look at those who were supposedly trying to save his life, Mr. Pile said, while the attention of people there was not that of those witnessing "the return of a dear friend from the dead" in Mr. Pile's opinion.

Other evidence will also be included in the official report, he indicated.

Fiery Irish Miss Is Dynamo of Forces Fighting to Save Agitators

Boston, Mass. (U-I-N)—If, by any chance, Sacco and Vanzetti should win their long battle against the State of Massachusetts and regain their liberty, they'll have Mary Donovan to thank.

Miss Donovan is the dynamo of the defense committee. For months—yes, and for years—she has worked night and day to keep the campaign going.

When others were ready to quit, declaring that the case was hopeless, it's always Mary Donovan who has instilled the workers with new enthusiasm and courage. She refuses to be beaten.

Being a Donovan, she's Irish—and it's proverbial that the Irish never know when they're licked. Miss Donovan, peculiarly enough, was employed in the State House when she first became interested in the two men accused of the world-famous payroll murders.

She didn't think Sacco and Vanzetti were getting a square deal. And she didn't hesitate to air her opinions.

With the result that she incurred the displeasure of her superiors. And between these two happenings she found herself plunged right into the midst of the battle to save the Italians from execution.

Practically every move made by the defense has had its inception in the brain of Mary Donovan. And it's certain that she'll continue to inspire the flagging workers, and fill them with new zeal, until the campaign is definitely decided, one way or the other.

Asheville Dry As Bone Today

Asheville, N. C., Aug. 22.—(AP)—Asheville over the weekend was dry as Sahara in spots as a result of the whirlwind campaign waged here Saturday by a flying squadron of twenty dry law enforcement officers and half a dozen deputy marshals in which sixteen alleged rum runners were caught in a dragnet spread over the city by the raiders.

Wet spots remained in the city, to be sure, it was said, but the so-called Pinland half pint boys, the rummers whose great hunting ground embraces street corners and hotel lobbies were reported to be missing from their accustomed "beat" while R. Q. Merricks of Richmond, Va., prohibition administrator for North Carolina and Virginia, Ben C. Sharpe of Charlotte, the prohibition administrator for Western North Carolina, and other dry law chiefs who participated in Saturday's raid returned to their headquarters other warrants for alleged liquor law violators remained to be served here it was learned from federal authorities in Asheville.

Those warrants, it was learned, are to be served by dry agents and by deputies from the office of Brownlow Jackson, marshal for Western North Carolina district.

EQUALIZATION BOARD TO MEET AT BOONE

Raleigh, Aug. 22.—(AP)—The State Equalization Board meets in Boone, Watauga County, Wednesday, August 31, carrying its campaign of education to Western North Carolina.

Lieut. Governor Elmer Long today issued a call for the meeting which follows the recent meeting in Morehead City in Eastern North Carolina.

No definite dividing of further equalization funds has been set for the Boone meeting.

TROOPER KILLED IN DEMONSTRATION FOR TWO DOOMED ITALIANS

Pittsburgh, Pa., Aug. 22.—(AP)—A Pennsylvania trooper was shot and instantly killed today during a Sacco-Vanzetti demonstration at Armonia, near Springdale. The officer, private John D. Downey from Greensburg barracks of the State police, was shot while assisting in breaking up a meeting of some 2,000 Sacco-Vanzetti sympathizers.

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FINISH PLANS FOR DEATH OF TWO ITALIANS

Sacco and Vanzetti Refuse Last Rites of Church in Death Cell Today.

Boston, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Sacco and Vanzetti today refused the last rites of the church, saying they preferred to die as they had lived outside its pale.

Boston, Aug. 22.—(AP)—All details of the plans for the execution of Sacco and Vanzetti due to die in the electric chair sometime after midnight, were completed at the prison today. Unless last minute moves of their counsel serve to bring them another stay, the respite which saved them from death barely a half hour before they were to start the march to the death chamber on the night of August 10th will expire at exactly 12 o'clock tonight.

Despite the international interest in the case the steps in carrying out the law will differ in no particular from those surrounding the highest penalty. There will be the customary number of witnesses, the same executioner, the usual prison guard.

Only in the arrangements outside the execution chamber will there be any difference. Outside guards, state and city police will keep crowds a block or more from the prison gates. Within the gates the largest crowd of newspapermen who ever gathered for an execution in Charleston will be stationed to flash the news to every corner of the world which the case has attracted attention.

Sacco and Vanzetti and Celesti, no Madeiros, due to die at the same time though for another crime, rested today in their cells apparently forty feet from the chair in which they are to die, though shut off by brick walls that hide the knowledge of its presence. There they will remain until the guards summon them one after the other to start the march to the chair. Customary this occurs within a minute of the stroke of midnight.

The official witnesses, invited by Warden William E. Hendry, will gather in the Warden's office shortly after 11 p. m. in the group will include besides the warden and deputy warden James L. Hozsett, the medical examiner of Suffolk county Dr. Geo. Burgess Magrath; the prison physician, Dr. Johnson, Mr. Laughlin; the surgeon general of the Massachusetts nation guard, Dr. Frank P. Williams; Sheriff William H. Copen, of Norfolk county; and W. E. Playfair, of the Associated Press.

Three Youths Die in Wreck Near Hurt, Va.

Washington, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Three youths were killed today when Southern Railway train number 30 en route to Washington, struck an automobile truck in which they were riding near Hurt, Virginia. Southern headquarters announced here.

Greensboro, N. C., Aug. 2.—(AP)—One man was killed instantly and two others died before reaching the hospital when train number 30 of the Southern Railway struck the truck in which they were riding just outside of Hurt, Virginia, according to reports received here this morning.

The victims were Ollie Miller, 19, Henry Durham, 18, and Charles Hagwood, 18, all of Port. Details of the accident were meagre, but it was learned that the boys had just left Hurt for a farm near there. They apparently did not see the train nor hear the whistle, it was stated, for they drove upon the track and were knocked several feet. Miller, it was reported, was dead when the train crew after stopping, arrived at the scene. The other two were taken to the hospital but died on route.

ROBERT PARSONS SHOOTING BROTHER

Winston-Salem, N. C., Aug. 22.—(AP)—A report from the Piney Creek section of Ashe county, is to effect that Robert Parsons shot his brother Jesse Parsons, the shooting taking place as a result over a controversy as to where the fence to the family cemetery should be placed. One of the brothers wanted the fence located at one place and the other at another, and as a result of the controversy Robert Parsons drew his gun and fired several shots at Jesse, one shot taking effect in the leg. It is not known that the wounded man is seriously injured.
