LAST CHAPTER IS WRITTEN IN MURDER CASE

Sacco and Vanzetti Died in Chair For Murder Seven Years Ago.

Boston, Aug. 23.—(AP)—The bodies of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, who were taken in specially constructed caskets through the city of the East. This was announced by the Sacco-Vanzetti defense committee today.

First, they are to lie in state at the committee headquarters on Fanover street in the north end of this city. When they are turned over to the committee by medical examiner McGrath. The visit to various cities might extend as far as Chicago, it was added.

The body of Madeiros, who was executed with them, will be delivered to a New Bedford undertaker. This was at the request of his mother.

The Charlestown district and all other parts of Boston were quiet today.

No State, says Dr. Fosdick, will be able to pass laws strong enough to hold back science. He is right about that. The theory that the round earth travels around the sun is more generally accepted, although the man that gave the truth to the world was compelled to deny the truth on his knees and spent years of his old age in prison for contradicting the old Bible story.

They died calmly shortly after midnight in the electric chair at the Charlestown State prison, protesting their innocence of the crime, affirming their belief in anarchy, and refusing the benefits of religion.

In his native tongue, Sacco shouted "Long live anarchy!" he shouted himself in the death chair. "I am an innocent man!" were among the last words of Vanzetti.

The two were convicted of killing Frederick A. Parmenter, paymaster, and Alexander Bertram, guard, and robbing them of \$15,716.37 on a street at South Braintree, Massachusetts, April 15, 1920.

Celestino Madeiros, sentenced for the murder of a Wrentham bank cashier, preceded to the chair by a few minutes the two men whom he had attempted to save by a confession that he was present at the crime of which they were convicted, and that neither Sacco nor Vanzetti was there. This confession was used as the basis for a motion for a new trial but was discredited.

Up to the hour for the execution, and even later the seven year legal struggle to save the lives of Sacco and Vanzetti, had continued. When every court and legal recourse had been exhausted, defense attorneys still strove to find new means of gaining a respite for the condemned men. Four attorneys hasting by automobile to Williamston to lay an appeal for stay before Justice George W. Anderson of the United States Circuit Court, turned back only when they heard by telephone that Madeiros and Sacco had already been executed, and that the fate of Vanzetti was a matter of minutes. Then at last the defense counsel finally admitted defeat.

From his cell in the death house, Madeiros the first of the three to be called, walked the few feet to the chair on the execution chamber without show of emotion. He walked steadily and seemingly indifferent to his fate. He entered the chair chamber two minutes 47 seconds after midnight and at nine minutes, 35 seconds past the hour he was dead. He spoke no word and gave no sign of recognition of any of the witnesses.

In a few moments the second death house cell was emptied and Sacco walked to the execution room. Pale but apparently strong and vigorous, and quite alert and collected he stepped to the chair and as he sat down shouted in a ringing voice "Viva L'Anarchia."

While the straps were being adjusted he spoke in English in a more moderate tone, "farewell my wife and child and all my friends." After a pause, he looked around at the silent witnesses of the State and said, "good evening gentlemen." His final words, spoken as the head strap was tightened, were "farewell mother." He had entered the chamber at 12:11 and was pronounced dead at 12:19.

Once more the guards left the chamber and returned with Vanzetti. He was the most collected of the three and seemed quite at ease as he entered. He shook hands just inside the door with a guard whom he recognized and then grasped the hand of others as he walked to the chair. Without a quiver he took his place and said

MR. COOLIDGE PAYS VISIT TO OLD FAITHFUL

President and Party Witness Wonders of Yellowstone Park.

Yellowstone National Park Wyo. Aug. 23.—(AP)—Old Faithful geyser well known to thousands of America's tourists, was the goal of President Coolidge as he moved forward today on his tour of Yellowstone National Park.

The President's party is expected to spend at Old Faithful Inn.

It is not certain just where the President and Mrs. Coolidge with their son will go in the park or how long they will stay, but the itinerary includes many of the important sights of interest. However, as has been announced the trip has been designed so changes may be made to suit the President's fancy.

Arriving in the Yellowstone shortly after noon Monday, the President's party left the train at Gardiner, Mont., and drove five miles to Mammoth where they spent the night.

President Coolidge retired early last night and did not hear of the execution of Sacco and Vanzetti until this morning. Although it was not believed President Coolidge would be troubled by any demonstration of Sacco and Vanzetti sympathizers the quarters where the President slept was heavily guarded throughout the night.

The Presidential party arose shortly after dawn in order to leave early for the buffalo corral on the Hot Springs terrace. The Hot Springs consists of boiling water which comes out of earth and bridge with it quantities of white mineral deposits which build terraces of beautifully encrusted basins high in the air.

Although the schedule of sight-seeing Monday called for an end of activities at 5:30 p. m., Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge and John set out on foot and hiked to the top of Jupiter terrace, a promontory overlooking all of the immediate vicinity.

It was just a little past the dinner hour when the President led his weary companions back.

COURTNEY READY TO HOP OFF TO AMERICA TODAY

South Hampton, Aug. 23.—(AP)—Captain Frank T. Courtney, British aviator, who is planning a trans-Atlantic flight by way of the Azores, was preparing shortly after six o'clock tonight to start within half an hour.

As he put on his flying clothes Courtney announced that his flying boat, The Whale, would hop off for the Azores enroute to the United States immediately.

At the time The Whale was being refueled with 800 gallons of gasoline and at 6:30 was ready for the take-off.

FOUR AIRSHIPS READY TO FLY AROUND WORLD

Edward Schlee, Detroit Business Man, Prepares to Hop off Tomorrow.

Curtis Field, N. Y., Aug. 23.—(AP)—Groomed for overseas flights four airplanes, in one of which its backers hope to lower the record for encircling the globe, today stood in various stages of preparation on this Long Island flying field.

The newest arrival to the gathering galaxy of seekers after flying honors is the Stinson-Detroit Pride of Detroit, in which Edward F. Schlee, Detroit business man and William Brock, pilot, expect to hop off at dawn tomorrow for Harbor Grace, N. F., on the first leg of their journey around the world.

Schlee and Brock flew the plane here yesterday for a check-up of its instruments before making a hop to Harbor Grace where they will await favorable weather for a take-off for London, their first scheduled stop.

The present globe circling record is 28 days, 14 hours and 30 minutes and was established last year by Edward S. Evans, another Detroit business man, and Linton Wells, newspaper correspondent, who used airplanes, railroads and steamships.

Adjustments of instruments on the Stinson-Detroit, Sir John Carling, in which Captain Terrence Tully and Lt. Jas. McGrath, will attempt a hop from London, Ontario, to London, England, was expected to be completed today. They also plan to start at dawn tomorrow for Ontario, stopping at Detroit for a final check-up of their plane.

Meanwhile, unfavorable winds again prevented a take-off of the Fokker Monoplane, Old Glory, in which Lloyd W. Bertau and James D. Hill plan to fly to Rome.

The fourth plane is that in which Captain Rene Foncke expects to hop to Europe next month. His plane is a Sikorsky twin-motored biplane and is the largest of the four. It will be called the City of Paris, and Lt. Lawrence W. Curtin, U. S. N., will serve as navigator. The plane is expected to be ready for its first test flight this week.

Wash. Rotes In- vite Greenville to Special Session at Bayview.

Members of the Greenville Rotary Club in regular twice-a-month session last night accepted an invitation of the Washington Rotary Club to join other clubs of this territory in a special meeting at Bayview, popular Pamlico resort several miles below Washington, Friday night.

Definite decision concerning the meeting, however, could not be reached last night owing to the fact that other clubs had not met and acted upon the invitation.

Carl Goerch, Washington newspaperman and Rotarian, presented the invitation in behalf of his club and told of the good time which they expected to have if plans materialized. It is planned to go to the resort during the afternoon, enjoy recreation such as afforded by boating, bathing and fishing, and later to have supper at the Bayview Hotel. This will be followed by attending the regular Friday night dance given in the spacious pavilion leading far out over the waters of the Pamlico.

Complete announcement of the action of the various clubs will be made in time for all members to make preparations to attend the meeting. It was stated.

The session last night was presided over by President W. H. Rogers, Jr. The program of entertainment was in charge of George B. Chapman, chairman of the Business Methods committee. Other members of the committee taking part in the program, which consisted of three short talks, were Dr. K. B. Pace and Judson Blount. J. H. Rose directed the singing.

Numbers of visitors were present each making short talks following presentation to the club members. The visitors were Herick Rowland, Supt. of public schools of Washington; K. W. Cobb, C. B. Rowlett, Rev. L. B. Jones, Vance Perkins, Charlie Forbes, Greenville, and Mr. Frazelle, of Wilmington and James Hart, Kinston.

Each member of the business methods committee spoke on the subject of Co-operation. Judson Blount declared co-operation of the business man is necessary to the progress and development of any thriving community. He said that lack of systematic co-operation is similar to ship without a rudder. He urged the Rotarians to live up to the ethics of the organization and always endeavor to render service above self.

Dr. Pace said the combined effort of people in behalf of any great cause invariably resulted in success. He said the Golden Rule should be applied more frequently in public life, that this would have a salutary effect upon the life of a progressive community.

Mr. Chapman declared that cities do not grow within themselves—men build them. The kind of city an individual lives in is determined largely by the time which that person has devoted to character building. Building friendship means building business, he said, and building business means the laying of the foundation of a great commercial and industrial locality.

FINE PROGRAM PRESENTED AT ROTARY CLUB

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Wild Demonstration In Foreign Countries Greet Execution of Italians

New York, Aug. 23.—(AP)—Demonstrations in behalf of Sacco and Vanzetti were staged before and after their execution in various European and American cities.

At Geneva manifestants after marching on the United States consulate and being beaten off by the police, broke windows of the great hall of the library of the League of Nations palace.

From the palace the crowds went to the American agency of two picture theatres showing American films and began to attack it.

Streams of water had to be played on the demonstrators before they could be dispersed. An on-looker was killed by a stray bullet.

The Geneva correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Co. in London, in his version, said five thousand persons took part in the rioting attacking and badly damaging American shops. Twenty-five persons were injured.

As soon as news was posted that the two men actually had been executed, a crowd in front of a newspaper office in Buenos Aires, Argentina, began stoning United States commercial houses. Only with the aid of reinforcements were the police able to quell the demonstration.

To the strains of the "Red Flag" and shouts of "Sacco and Vanzetti must not die!" a procession marched into the Mall in London this morning. As the marchers neared Buckingham palace, mounted police scattered them, arresting a number.

A strong guard was kept about the American embassy in London. The American embassy in Paris and Rome likewise were heavily guarded.

Paris had several demonstrations but a steady rain kept them within reasonable bounds.

Communists in Berlin, and other German cities, attempted to stage manifestations but they were suppressed by the police.

Some disturbances took place in Stockholm and Gothenburg, Sweden.

There was a fairly complete stoppage of work throughout Argentina Monday. The most serious of a number of disorders was the burning of a street car in a suburb of Buenos Aires.

At Montevideo, Uruguay and Asuncion, Paraguay, laborers stopped work.

Sacco-Vanzetti sympathizers in Mexico City held a parade in the business section, after which there was an orderly demonstration before the United States Consulate General and the Huasteca Petroleum Company, an American concern.

Geneva, Switzerland, Aug. 23.—(AP)—A precautionary measure against the possible renewal of Sacco-Vanzetti riots which cost the life of one man and considerable property damage here last night a regiment of militia composed of three battalions today received orders to be ready for service at a moment's notice.

The regiment forms part of the Swiss federal army and the troops made available are in addition to the civic guard which has been mobilized. This latter body is a kind of citizens vigilance organization composed of volunteers, sworn to help in the main-

CHAPLIN PAYS COOL MILLION FOR DIVORCE

Los Angeles, Aug. 23.—(AP)—Charlie Chaplin's price of domestic peace today provided a wealth of figures for the conjecture and gossip of the movie going and newspaper reading worlds that know of the film jester and his marital difficulties.

Sixty two minutes in court yesterday in which the graying comedian's young wife, Lita Gray Chaplin, won in perfunctory fashion an interlocutory decree of divorce, probably cost the actor in excess of a million dollars.

His wife, according to the property settlement introduced at the outset of the court hearing and which erased from the trial sensational charges concerning "prominent motion picture actresses" which speeded her divorce complaint will receive \$625,000 of the Million Dollar total. To the small sons placed in the wife's custody does a trust fund of \$200,000.

Other items include \$10,000 as Mrs. Chaplin's expense since the separation last November, \$22,000 estimated receiver's fees, \$60,000 to be paid for the Chaplin boy's support during the next five years while the trust fund is being provided, \$17,000 in interest to Mrs. Chaplin on delayed payments and the \$14,000 already paid in temporary alimony.

These with miscellaneous items swell the total to \$950,000 not counting the comedian attorneys fees and the cost of preparing for the trial. Since out of the wife's \$625,000 comes almost \$100,000 in attorney fees the actor's quintet of counsel is expected to receive no less amount.

Under the terms of this property settlement Mrs. Chaplin will receive \$375,000 at once, \$100,000 September 1, 1928, another \$100,000 a year later and the closing \$50,000 the following year. The principal of the \$300,000 trust fund will go to the children when the younger reaches 35.

DERIVE TWO LESSONS IN DOLE FLIGHT

San Francisco, Aug. 23.—(AP)—While the search for the lost fliers in the Dole race from the Golden Gate to Honolulu continued with unflagging zeal, though dying hope, efforts to derive profit from the flight's lessons were underway today, just one week after the start of the 2,400 mile air marathon.

As 40 naval vessels and a fleet of observation planes fruitlessly searched the greedy Pacific's waves for the six men and the girl who made up the crews of the Golden Eagle, the Miss Doran and the Dallas Spirit, Lieutenant Benjamin Wyatt of the navy air corps, who inspected the planes and their compass for the flight committee, declared that two indisputable lessons had been learned from the flight's disaster.

First—All planes to undertake an extended over-water flight should have a thoroughly adequate test under full load.

Second—Land planes should be prohibited from making extended over-water flights.

Pilot Arthur C. Goebel, and his navigator Lt. W. V. Davis, whose monoplane Woodcock won the \$25,000 first prize in the Dole race, issued a joint statement at Honolulu agreeing with Wyatt's second contention. They predicted the Dole flight would cause development of a large amphibian monoplane, trimotored and capable of taking off from water even under unfavorable sea conditions.

Goebel and Davis likewise forecasted improvement of the radio beacon and other radio sending and receiving equipment for aircraft as a result of the Dole flight. They also expected development of floating landing stages at sea, where over water aviators may land during long flights.

Davis also predicted developments in airplane navigation by means of the stars.

"Celestial navigation by use of the bubble sextant is more reliable than hitherto was believed," said Davis. "Flyabove clouds insure a clear sky. It also eliminated the danger of blind instrumental flying."

Lt. Wyatt declared no one could be blamed for the disaster in the Dole flight, that the inspections were as rigid and as thorough as it was possible to make them.

Wyatt discounted talk of defects in the three lost planes saying the Golden Eagle was the last word in plane construction and that the Miss Doran had motor trouble and came back only to attempt the flight again." Wyatt continued, "I believe the plane was forced down in the first four hours from redevelopment of the original trouble to the motor. The fliers were advised not to try it again and should have remained to test the new spark plugs."

"The Erwin plane was undoubtedly flying to low. The only remedy for a tailspin is altitude 5,000 to 6,000 feet. By their radio report we know they were flying low and I feel they never had a chance."

Lt. Wyatt will make an extended report to the government on the Dole contest. He expects to leave here tonight for his station at San Diego.

Gary's Will Filed Today

Mineola, N. Y., Aug. 23.—(AP)—The will of Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the board of the U. S. Steel Corporation, who died in New York on August 15th, was filed here today.

He left \$800,000 each to his two daughters, Gertrude Gary Sutcliffe and Bertha G. Campbell; and \$300,000 to his granddaughter, Julia Elizabeth Campbell; to his widow Emma T. Gary, he bequeaths "Twy Hall," the Gary home at Jericho.

A bequest of \$50,000 was made to the Methodist Episcopal church of Wheaton, Ill., known as the Gary Memorial church, and \$50,000 to McKendree College, Lebanon, Ill.

Other bequests were \$50,000 each to the University of Pittsburgh, Lafayette, Trinity College, Lincoln Memorial University at Harrogate, Syracuse University and Northwestern and New York University.

To each of the servants in the Gary homes, \$1,000 and securities are to be bequeathed at the end of ten years service, all of the residue of the estate is to be divided between the two daughters and the widow of Mr. Gary.

The New York Trust Company is named as executor and trustee of the estate. In the will Mr. Gary left much business advice to his wife concerning investments and the making of loans in anticipation of the income which she would derive from the estate.

The sum of \$300,000 was left to his grandson Elbert Gary Sutcliffe.

MANY UPSETS IN NATIONAL GOLF TOURNEY

Minneapolis, Minn., Aug. 23.—(AP)—Two nineteen-year old New York youths, fast friends, today topped the champions as they started the second qualifying round of the national amateur golf championship tournament over the Minnikahda golf course. Foremost was Eugene Homans, who came in at dusk from the first round with a 37-34-71, to bowl over the hopes for premier honors of his golfing mate, Phillips Finlay, who tallied 36-36-72. Par is 35-72. Just one stroke behind was Don Carrick, of Toronto, Canadian champion for the second time in three years although only 20 years old.

And then came some of the world's most famous proponents of the game. Chief among these was Bobby Jones, of Atlanta, who lost the title last year at Baltusrol, to George Von Elm, of Los Angeles. The British open champion took 75 and deserved a larger score he said. As for Von Elm, he took a large 79, pulling and slicing as did Jones, but not recovering so well and condemning the greens or refusing to engulf his ball in the cup.

Ahead of Jones, with whom were tied Chick Evans, Francis Ouimet, Guy Standifer of Washington, Raymond Daly of Chicago and Jack Mackie, another youthful New Yorker, scoring 74 each, were Jimmy Johnston, of the home club, Max Marston, former title holder, Art Sweet, of Chicago, who shot the first six holes in one over three, Harry Corkran, of Philadelphia and George Rotan of Houston.

There were 34 contestants with scores of 77 or better, indicating that the 32 qualifiers would need to total close to 154 to survive.

BOBBY JONES

OLD MAN PAR AT THE END OF THAT ROUND

By O. B. Keeler

In a way it seems a tribute to the law of compensation that when Bobby Jones, in his twelfth national open golf championship finally shot a round under 70 for the first time in his career, it should be at the course which he regards as the classic golfing test the Old Course at St. Andrews.

And it is the only national open championship in the United States or Great Britain in which par of the course was ever beaten. It was Bobby Jones at St. Andrews. Bobby beat more than a line field in the recent British championship. He defeated Old Man Par himself. He gave the tough old boy a sound drubbing too seven strokes in the four rounds, with never a round above par, and only one, the third as high as par, which is 73.

Curiously enough, in the third round Bobby was hitting his shots better than in any of the others. But the law of compensation had laid hold upon his putter, and where he got around in 29 putts in his card of 68 for the first round

he needed 36 putts in the third round for his par 73, thus for once compiling a par card with precisely the number of putts prescribed by par. This by the way is not often managed. This is the only instance I can recall in major competition.

I kept a detailed card of the remarkable first round which equals the St. Andrews record and which sent Bobby out in front never to be headed or collared. It may be of some interest to the fans.

The score is in the larger figures. The small figures indicate the distance in feet of the ball from the pin after it reached the putting surface. The dots are putts—one dot to a putt.

The putting is a remarkable study. On no other course has been accomplished, for the simple reason that on other course, so far as my observation extends, has greens sufficiently enormous to afford such putts. On six of the eighteen greens Bobby's ball was outside of 100 feet from the pin

if you have ever tried getting down in two putts from that range you know it is one of the most difficult tasks in golf. Yet Bobby never took three putts. And once at the fifth hole he was down in one putt of 120 feet.

This started his spectacular run of 30 strokes for the next nine holes, clipping five strokes off par and carrying him to the turn in 32 par being 36. The lead he gained on that spin sent him out in front and he never was caught. He finished the first round, in 68, equaling the course record. He had a lead of three strokes on the field. At 36 holes he led by two strokes. At 54 holes he led by four strokes. At 72 he led by six strokes—and he led par by seven strokes.

He never missed a putt under 15 feet. He holed two a 6 feet, one of 8, two of 20 one of 30 and one of 120 feet. At the tenth he was in a swale at the front of the green and chipped the ball instead of putting it. Charlie MacFarlane scored him only 28 putts, declining to count him a putt on forty-

As hope of finding the seven occupants of the three missing Pacific planes dwindles, the government talks of taking steps to prohibit the staging of other stunts similar to the Dole Hawaiian flight and the cost of this fight in lives is indeed enough to cause anxiety as to the safety of those who would undertake such daring endeavors. The Dole flight apparently has cost ten lives. Has the flight meant enough to the progress of aviation to justify such an enormous cost?

BICKERINGS

After seven years of bickerings by smart lawyers, Sacco and Vanzetti have finally paid for their crime as prescribed by law. How much better it would have been for the whole nation had the execution taken place as first scheduled. We believe in a fair and impartial trial for all defendants but when this has taken place and the defendant found guilty unless there is new found evidence to prove the defendant's innocence, the law should take its course without further dilly-dallying and sparring on technicalities. Where the laws are rigidly enforced and punishments for crime meted out speedily, records show a lesser tendency to commit crime.

ENFORCEMENT OF LIGHT LAWS NECESSARY

The North Carolina laws require that every vehicle that travels the public highways at night shall carry sufficient lights as a protection to itself and other travelers, but from observation we find many motorists, as well as drivers of animal drawn vehicles are still very lax about meeting the requirements of these laws.

One highlight in an automobile is insufficient for safety and does not meet with the requirements of the law, yet there are numbers of such automobiles on the roads at night. The law also requires a tail light for every motor vehicle but numbers of motorists apparently never give this matter the least bit of attention, and they are constantly in danger of being hit from the rear and are a menace to others traveling the highways.

Another requirement of the law is that animal drawn vehicles must be equipped with a light, but there are numbers who have failed to comply with this requirement. The number of fatal accidents throughout our state in the past few years as a result of unlighted vehicles is sufficient evidence that lights were needed on all vehicles, and now that such requirements are law, we urge every citizen

Minneapolis. Minn.—(AP)—Prohibition will not be modified if the dry women of the country succeed in the educational campaign they propose launching.

The Women's Christian Temperance Union will hold its 53rd annual convention here the week of August 25. At that time several plans will be presented to the delegates for an educational campaign which shall absorb the full strength of the organization.

It is believed by the W. C. T. U. that agitation for modification has reached the point where it must be met with a complete change of public sentiment. This it says can be effected only by the concerted effort of those who favor total abstinence.

It efforts will be directed particularly against campaigns for the return of wine and beer. The results of a two years study of the

effects of alcohol on the human system, including 2.75 per cent beer, will be reported by Miss Cora F. Stoddard of Boston. Miss Stoddard is director of the department of Scientific investigation and instruction of the W. C. T. U.

Three thousand women from the United States and from a number of the 52 foreign countries where the "White Ribboners" are represented are expected to attend.

India, some of the South American countries, Canada, and several European countries will furnish delegates.

Miss Anna A. Gordon, president of the World W. C. T. U., whose headquarters are at Evanston, Ill. will present the plans which she has outlined for greater participation in the fight for prohibition in foreign countries.

A place of honor at the convention will be devoted to Miss Melissa A. Davis, of Delaware, Ohio, who

is 88 years old. In the past four years she has brought in 85 new members.

For the first time in 20 years the organization will bestow a diamond medal for the greatest contribution toward the education of young people to the value of total abstinence. All but six of the 57,000 girls who originally entered the contest have been eliminated.

The winner will be selected from among the following: Bertha Brinker, Los Angeles; Miss Evalyn Demaree Cooper, Sanford Florida; Miss Mary Haisley, Marion Ind.; Miss Vera Powers, Minneapolis; Miss Gladys Widrick, East Syracuse, N. Y., and Miss Aurine Proffitt, Chattanooga, Tenn.

It was in 1886 at a national W. C. T. U. convention in Minneapolis that some of the first steps toward campaigning for prohibition were taken by the organization.

NEGRO SHOT TO DEATH AT NEW BERN LAST NIGHT

New Bern, Aug. 23.—(AP)—John Bellamy, negro, was shot to death late last night while in a downtown section here and police today were searching for Neal George, another negro in connection with the slaying. Eye witnesses told police that George fired three rifle bullets at Bellamy.

George fled the scene immediately, using an automobile to make his get-away. No motive of the shooting had been learned. Eye witnesses said George appeared on the scene and opened fire without warning.

NO DISORDER MARKS DEATH OF ITALIANS

News of Execution of Sacco and Vanzetti Received Quietly in America.

New York, Aug. 23.—(AP)—Announcement of the execution of Sacco and Vanzetti, was received quietly by the crowds that gathered in public squares and before newspaper bulletin boards in many cities after a day of unceasing police vigilance and general uneasiness.

At midnight at union square New York where police estimated 12,000 persons had gathered, placards reading "Sacco murdered," "Vanzetti murdered" were posted by a radical newspaper when word of the execution was received, but the crowd dispersed quietly shortly thereafter. In Boston crowds that filled the streets before bulletin boards received word of the execution in silence.

Students from various cities told of a day of unremitting watchfulness with public and semi-public buildings, transporting and public service facilities under heavy guard.

They told for the most part of strike calls that received little response of mass meetings, animated but orderly which were dispersed in the main without trouble though a Pennsylvania State trooper was shot and killed in Acetonia, Penn. and scores of Sacco-Vanzetti sympathizers were arrested in various cities.

In New York city, the entire force of 12,000 police was on duty and six companies of infantry and two machine gun companies, with war time ammunition insurance, were held in reserve on Governor's Island.

In St. Louis police elected a crowd of 100 persons who tried to hold a Sacco-Vanzetti memorial in the labor union temple. One woman was arrested.

One hundred and twenty-seven communists were arrested in San Francisco as they passed the hall of justice.

Chicago police were on watch armed with machine guns, shotguns and tear bombs.

Four men were arrested in Jersey City. One of them, police said was armed and another had a mysterious bag.

In Detroit police broke up a mass of several thousands men and women in a demonstration at city hall.

Clay Output In This State On Increase

Raleigh, Aug. 23.—(AP)—Kaolin clay production in North Carolina in 1926 increased by more than 11 per cent over the previous year the respective yields being 20,781 and 18,349 tons, according to figures released today by the Department of Conservation and Development.

The 1926 production was the largest since 1923, when 23,793 tons were furnished by North Carolina. Value of the product for last year was also largest since 1923, the 1926 material being valued at \$331,562 as compared with \$369,518 in 1923.

Average price per ton of kaolin in 1926 decreased slightly from the two previous years with \$15.95 a ton compared with \$16.00 for 1925 and \$16.34 in 1924.

"North Carolina has long been a leading producer of kaolin, a high grade residual clay, which is found in pegmatite dikes and coarse-grained granites that have been altered," says state geologist H. J. Bryson. "It is the purest type of clay known and when properly washed is almost pure kaolinite."

"The chief uses of kaolin are in the manufacture of china, semi-porcelain and porcelain, mosaic and other tile, and road, plane, and other uses. It is also used in the manufacture of glass, melting pots, and in the bodies made up for several grades of china and other white ware."

ASKS LAW APPLICANTS TO GIVE HISTORY OF SACCO-VANZETTI CASE

Raleigh, Aug. 23.—(AP)—"Give the history, as you understand it of the Sacco-Vanzetti case and state briefly your view as to the duty, if any, devolving on the American bar and the American lawyer as a sequel to what has happened in connection with this case," reads the last of the 67 questions propounded to 145 applicants who took the bar examination before the North Carolina Supreme Court yesterday.

The questions were prepared by Chief Justice W. P. Stacy, who today returned from Chicago where he has been teaching the law school of Northwestern University.

The stick which the young man fell on, penetrated his body to a depth of several inches, inflicting a gaping wound. He was rushed to a Kinston hospital, but died a few hours later.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population

Paris—(INS)—Paris is undergoing her annual summer overhauling. Streets are being repaired in every quarter, the new Boulevard Haussmann joins the Grande Boulevard and is being prepared to meet the demands of heavy traffic and old houses are having their faces scrubbed clean and white. Inasmuch as nearly all the Parisians are away at the seaside or country, they do not object to this turn-up appearance of Europe's most beautiful capital, but the many tourists do.

Flowers are going to play a large part in the future beautifying of the city. One large safety-island is being constructed which will bear a tall three-globed light and a rising filled with flowers. Other islands are being planned with stone beaches and large flower baskets, so one will soon be able to wait for the autobus or metro in a sweet scented bower.

The 1927 tourist traffic has not come up to expectations. Hotels normally crowded at this time of year have many vacant rooms. Few of the seaside resorts are handling their usual capacity crowds.

Some blame the weather, which has been exceptionally rainy. Others blame the shopkeepers and hotel proprietors who raised prices with the fall of the franc and failed to lower them when the franc rose in value.

Shopkeepers claim they are the chief sufferers because whereas foreigners who planned trips far in advance are carrying through their plans, nevertheless they are economizing on their purchases abroad.

Whatever the reason for the disastrous season may be the government, according to L'intransigent, is taking steps to attract more and more tourists to France.

Chief among the government's projects is a scheme to establish "Maisons de France" or tourist propaganda centers in all the chief capitals of the world. These centers, subsidized by the government, by the railroad companies, Casinos and hotel proprietors will be charged with the duty of disseminating attractive propaganda about the country and counteracting adverse propaganda.

Foreigners planning trips to France will be able to get all desired information, even to the cost of a good luncheon in an out of the way inn in a remote part of France absolutely free of charge.

The first "Maison de France" is to be established in Berlin, chiefly because it is believed that from there most of the misleading information about conditions in France is distributed.

Vienna, London, Copenhagen and Madrid are to receive attention in their turn. New York is far down on the list, chiefly because it is believed that less missionary work is required there than elsewhere.

The Brasserie Lipp, well known to all Left-Bankers and famous for its beer, has recently inaugurated the custom of giving a receipt after he has paid for his drink instead of turning down the saucer in the old French manner. Some one observed that it isn't only the garçon who can turn down a saucer and then too, a recent client refused to pay the waiter when he came around to collect being quite convinced that he paid once for a large number of glasses. The new system will avoid all discussions between weary waiters and customers none too clear in the head.

Mrs. Blanche Cavitt, an American chemist has just arrived from the Baltic regions where she produced a fossil resin which embodies a secret which she says will enable her to make a perfume in ten minutes and it will be just as intriguing as any the ancients took thousands of years to concoct.

This perfume expert was born in France but has spent most of her life in America where she specialized in chemistry in several universities. She has just passed her examinations for her Master's degree in chemistry in France where she has three large perfume shops. A bit of sweet elixir rubbed into the skin will do as much as an ounce of the mysterious potions concocted by the old alchemists. Mrs. Cavitt affirms.

LAST CHAPTER IS WRITTEN IN MURDER CASE

"I wish to tell you I am innocent and never committed any crimes but sometimes some sin. I thank you Mr. Warden for everything you have done for me. I am innocent of all crime, not only of this one but all. I am an innocent man."

Vanzetti had been convicted after the Braintree murder of a robbery while armed, committed in

Bridgewater a short time before.

As the final steps, those which held the head in place were being adjusted, he spoke a final message of forgiveness. "I wish to forgive some people for what they are now doing to me," he said simply. He entered at 12:20:38, and was dead at 12:26:55.

Through seven years of repeated efforts to save them, Sacco and Vanzetti protested their innocence of the shoe factory payroll robbery of which they were convicted. They maintained that it was their radi-

cal beliefs and activities which brought upon them what they termed the "persecution" of the authorities.

When tried for the South Braintree crime Vanzetti was serving a sentence of 12 to 15 years at Charlestown for the holdup of the paymaster of the L. G. White shoe factory at Bridgewater, Mass. This holdup was December 14, 1919. Vanzetti always protested his innocence of this crime also.

Madeiros was convicted of the murder of James E. F. Carpenter, cashier of the Wrentham National Bank, which occurred Nov. 1, 1924.

The conviction for the South Braintree crime was obtained partly through direct evidence of witnesses, some of whom identified Sacco and Vanzetti and partly through circumstantial evidence in which a cap found at the murder scene was identified as Sacco's, and the fact that both men were armed when arrested.

The shoe worker, Sacco and the fish pedlar, Vanzetti soon became known in many lands as the defense committee organized and collected hundreds of thousands of dollars which were spent not only for legal talent to fight their case but also for extensive propaganda.

Both bore fruit. Counsel succeeded counsel but the fight went on until eight motions for a new trial had been argued and the Massachusetts Supreme Court had three times been asked to pass upon exceptions. Even after sentence had been pronounced last April, there remained the review of the whole case conducted by Governor Alvan T. Fuller and his advisory committee, consisting of President A. Lawrence Lowell of Harvard, President Samuel W. Stratton of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and Robert Grant, former probate judge.

Meanwhile from many countries and from individuals of high and low estate came protests that injustice was being done or petitions asking mercy. But there were also messages which demanded that the men pay the penalty for their crime.

The bodies of Sacco and Vanzetti were removed shortly after the execution to a mortuary where autopsies were performed by Geo. McGrath, medical examiner. The authorities decided to turn the bodies over to the Sacco-Vanzetti defense committee. No announcement has been made of burial plans. The body of Madeiros will be taken to New Bedford for burial.

Uncle Sam owes \$18,000,000,000 in bonds outstanding. The bonded indebtedness of all the states totals \$1,846,000,000. Borrowing by the states, stimulated perhaps, by those willing to pay a high price for bonds free of national income tax has been criticized. But state debts are small, considering the wealth of the nation.

Florida, Nebraska and Wisconsin have no state debt. South Dakota has the highest per capita, \$65.15. New York state owes most and can afford to. Central Park in New York City is worth more than the whole state debt.

Half the money borrowed by the states has been spent on good roads a fact that justifies the borrowing. If it could be said that the other half had been spent on public schools, it wouldn't matter if the states owed a billion apiece.

The Carnegie foundation has spent years and money most usefully to promote care of the teeth and proper education of dentists. In many cases the poor pay more than the rich for inferior dental work. The number of really good dentists is totally inadequate. Ninety per cent of children at least have their teeth neglected. Neglected teeth prevent perfect digestion and a good blood supply. 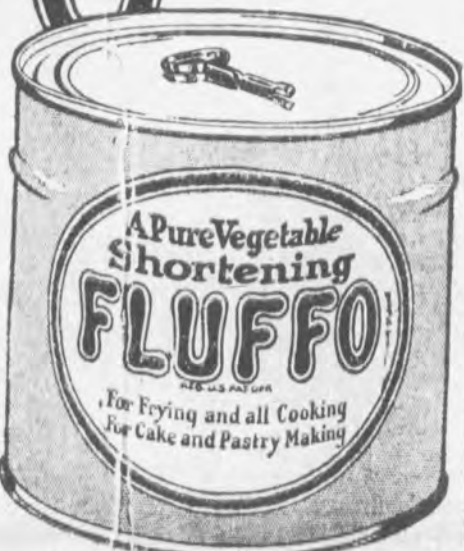
