MANY INJURED IN DISORDERS FOR ITALIANS

Disturbance Reported in London, Paris and South Africa Yesterday.

New York, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Disturbances at London and Paris, and demonstration before the American consulate at Geneva, and the burning of an American flag at Johannesburg, South Africa, were some of the developments in foreign countries as an aftermath of the execution of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti.

After a "memorial meeting," in Hyde Park, London, last night, the demonstrators began to march, in defiance of police orders, in the direction of the American embassy. The police charged them with drawn batons, but reserves had to be summoned before the manifestations could be dispersed. Forty persons, among them four women were injured.

The international class war prisoners organization is making plans to call a "national memorial day" next Sunday in all parts of England and with a central demonstration in Trafalgar Square.

For several hours last night, Paris witnessed wild scenes as enraged radicals, balked in attempts to hold demonstrations before the American embassy, and the boulevards did extensive damage to shops, automobiles, and cabarets in the Montmartre section.

In a battle with the police from behind hastily set up barricades the mob used stolen canned goods as missiles. Before calm was restored, the aid of a heavy down-pour, 60 policemen were injured, ten of them badly, by knife thrusts, and 200 manifestants were arrested.

Monday night's disturbances in Geneva when windows of the League of Nations palace were smashed, and much other damage was done, prompted the authorities to urge the guards wherever trouble was likely to develop. Notwithstanding this, however, a large crowd gathered before the American consulate last night to protest against the death of the two men.

The shots were increased when it became known that detectives had arrested several men believed to have been responsible for Monday night's rioting. Shortly after 8 o'clock, however, a severe thunderstorm and a heavy rain sent the manifestants scurrying for cover.

An American flag was burned at Johannesburg on the steps of the town hall in the course of a demonstration by Sacco-Vanzetti sympathizers. One of the speakers called for a boycott of American goods.

A boycott of American wares has also been suggested in Finland, by the executive of the Trade Union Congress.

In Amsterdam, a stone was thrown through a window of the American consulate, but no one was injured.

Selecting Jury Delays Trial of Alleged Killers

Greenville, S. C., Aug. 24.—Impediment of a jury in the trial of Mrs. Ethel Willis, and Henry S. Townsend, charged with slaying the woman's husband, Sheriff Sam D. Willis, may delay the opening of trial proceedings in the case from the scheduled start tomorrow morning until late Friday or Saturday.

This belief was expressed by counsel for both sides today after indications that a special venire may be subpoenaed. A venire of 36 jurors was drawn, but only 27 were found available for service.

A large number of witnesses were being summoned. The defense has subpoenaed two dozen persons and the prosecution planned to summon fully as many.

STORM WARNING

Washington, Aug. 24.—(AP)—The weather bureau today issued the following storm warnings:

"Advisory 11 a. m. storm warnings changed to Boston. Disturbance of great intensity central 130 miles south of Nantucket moving northeast will cause strong northwest winds this afternoon and tonight reaching gale force off New England coast."

Moscow, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Mme. Klepikoff, sentenced to death last month by a court martial at Kronstadt, was executed today. She was charged with aiding her husband in espionage for Great Britain. He was executed recently.

SEES UNION OF S. W. FARMERS

Political Unity of South and West Proposed at Institute Politics.

Williamstown, Mass., Aug. 24.—(AP)—Political union of the farmers of the south and west was prophesied and approved of by speakers at the Institute of Politics today.

Economic kinship of the south and west and other points of political sympathy were set forth by George A. Peek, president of the American Council on Agriculture, which represents more than fifty farm organizations; by Clarence Ousley, Dallas, Tex., by Henry A. Wallace, editor of Wallace's Farmer, a western farm publication, and by Dr. B. C. Kilgore of North Carolina, chairman of the board of the American Cotton Growers' Exchange, representing co-operative associations in twelve states.

The McNary-Haugen farm relief bill came up for strong support in the conference discussion.

"The progress that has been made toward political co-operation of the west and south toward a fair and constructive policy is the result of little more than two years' effort," said Mr. Peek.

Mr. Wallace, in urging co-operation, said that farmers were not getting their fair share of the national income, partly because of governmental action favoring other classes.

SITUATION IN NICARAGUA IS BETTER NOW

Although Naval Forces Have Been Ambushed by Bandits, Situation is Improving.

Washington, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Although American marines again have been ambushed by Nicaraguan bandits, Rear Admiral Sellers, in charge of naval forces in a report to the Navy Department, declared conditions in Nicaragua are steadily improving.

General Sandino, former Liberal leader, whose forces were defeated last month by marines at Ocotal, the Admiral added, is believed to be still in hiding in northern Nicaragua with a small band of men. In the mountains of Segovia in northern Nicaragua, General Moncada in an airplane survey, recently discovered several small bands the report said.

The fight occurred on August 16th and two of the bandits were killed, the marines suffered no casualties. Thirty bandits participated in the attack. The marines consisted of a small detachment under command of First Sergeant Bruce and were accompanied by an American mine owner named Alexander and a unit of the native constabulary traveling between Jicararo and Murra.

WILL CREMATE THE BODIES OF TWO ITALIANS

Ashes of Vanzetti to Be Taken on Tour of Europe; Sister Claims Sacco's Body

Boston, Aug. 24.—(AP)—The ashes of Bartolomeo Vanzetti are to be taken on a tour of Europe. Miss Luigi Vanzetti, who came from Italy to see her brother before he was executed in the state prison yesterday, is to accompany them. After cremation here the ashes will be taken to New York, London, Paris, Berlin, Stockholm and other cities before going to Italy. Vanzetti's native land.

The body of Nicola Sacco, who was executed with Vanzetti, also is to be cremated. His ashes will be claimed by his widow, who resides in Boston with her two children.

Announcing a cancellation of plans for exhibiting the bodies of the two men in various American cities because of the "physical impossibility," the Sacco-Vanzetti defense committee said the cremation would be next Sunday in the northern, or Italian section, of Boston the announcement said.

Difficulties developed in this connection today. City ordinances require burial within four days of death without special permission.

Mrs. Glenbow Ives, wealthy society woman, associated with the defense, said that death masks of the two men would be made and many copies distributed.

The State today still held the bodies but the tenure which began with their arrest for murder in 1920 is likely to be broken before night by delivery of the bodies to the defense committee.

The men refused to the last to return to the Catholic religion of their childhoods. Respecting their beliefs, it was announced that no prayers would be said but that comrades would speak briefly before the cremation.

A call has gone out for a national conference in New York on August 27 and 28, to organize a league "to establish the innocence of Sacco and Vanzetti and to expose the conspiracy which sent them to death."

It was proposed to accomplish this by a senatorial investigation of the Department of Justice inquiry into the decisions of Governor Fuller and his advisory committee and by exposing "the vicious under-cover activities of private and governmental detective agencies." It was hoped also to raise a fund for Mrs. Sacco and to create a memorial for the two men.

A test case of Boston ordinances on sauntering and loitering is to be made by Arthur Garfield Hays New York attorney, by appealing the cases of six persons fined \$10 each for congregating in front of the state house in a death watch. Among the six are Edna St. Vincent Millay, poet, and Ellen Hayes formerly professor at Wellesley College. Fines of \$5 each were paid by 148 other persons.

Walter Sloan To Be Buried At Statesville

Statesville, Aug. 24.—(AP)—The body of Walter E. Sloan, who died last night in a Lexington hospital after an automobile accident near Lexington, yesterday afternoon, was brought here early today. Funeral services will be conducted at the Broad Street Methodist church tomorrow morning.

Mr. Sloan was on his way to Statesville. Coming out of Lexington behind a bus with another automobile between him and the big vehicle, Sloan blew his horn several times, eye-witnesses said and started to pass. The driver of the other car, whose name is not known, is alleged to have turned out of line and crowded Sloan off into a ditch.

The left side of the car hit a telephone pole and threw Sloan about 20 feet, it was said. G. Y. Harris, a summer school student at the University of North Carolina who Sloan was giving a lift, was slightly injured. Harris lives on a star route out of Asheville and had been picked up by Sloan at High Point.

The driver of the car that is alleged to have caused the accident hesitated a second, it was said, and then sped away.

SILENCE STILL SEALS FATE OF LOST AVIATORS

Hope of Finding Fliers of Pacific Flight Glimmered With Beginning of Seventh Day.

San Francisco, Aug. 24.—(AP)—A woman and four men—seven days lost at sea—two more days of search.

Hope for the missing Dole race fliers, Miss Mildred Doran, John "Augie" Pedlar, Lieutenant V. R. Knoppe, Jack Frost and Gordon Scott who left the Oakland municipal airport for Hawaii a week ago today, glimmered wanly on the seventh day of silence.

Chance were as faint for the recovery of Captain Williams P. Erwin and A. H. Eichwald, who flew out of the airport Friday in search of their missing companions and were believed to have crashed into the sea after sending out a frantic SOS on their radio.

In the face of discouraging reports from the 42 submarines, destroyers, airplanes, carriers, ever-flashing the colorless laconic "nil-nil nil" periodically by radio, came word that fifteen additional destroyers and light cruisers under command of Admiral Luke McVee were ordered to join the search.

Rear Admiral Richard H. Jackson, commander of the Pacific fleet, ordered these boats into action with the idea of scrutinizing uncovered areas before falling of the "zero hour."

Seven destroyers, deployed across a 24 mile front are continuing the almost hopeless search along the great circle steamship lane between San Francisco, and Honolulu, while every effort is being made to trace down recurrent reports from land or ocean. The latest of these, a story that a green glare had been seen up the rugged slopes of Manna Kea, in the island of Hawaii, Sunday night has thus far failed to result in definite word that any of the fliers has been found.

Three of the army's DeHavilland airplanes, which left Luke Field, Honolulu to fly over the mountain in the hope of finding a fallen plane are expected to report the result of their search today.

OFFICER HELD FOR MURDER IN GEORGIA TOWN

Wealthy Young Turpentine Operator Shot to Death as Wife Sat by His Side

Jesup, Ga., Aug. 24.—(AP)—The whereabouts of W. B. Aycock, chief of the Wayne county police was a closely guarded secret among officers today following the officer's arrest yesterday charged with killing Ernest Dyal, wealthy young turpentine operator of McRae. Dyal was shot to death as he sat in his roadster on a highway near Jesup, his bride of two months at his side.

Officers said fears for the safety of Aycock led them to keep secret the location of the jail which held the policeman who claims he fired in self defense.

Aycock and J. W. Kemp, railroad policeman, were charged with murder, but sheriff J. O. Mattox said he believed the charges against Dyal were shot, would be dropped.

Dyal was shot three times by chief Aycock. The shooting occurred a few miles out of Jesup on the highway, as Dyal and his wife were returning in their automobile from St. Simon Island. The car containing the convict officer and Kemp drove up and the Dvals were ordered to stop. Chief Aycock is alleged to have fired the bullet through Dyal's back, piercing his lung. Then followed the second and third shots.

Aycock claims he fired in self defense. He said Dyal drew a pistol on him and he fired to protect himself. After the shooting, Aycock took the body of Dyal to Jesup. Soon after the shooting, he was taken into custody.

The shooting was witnessed by the family of J. D. Turner, near whose home it occurred.

Although she was so badly overcome with grief that she could not make a full statement about the shooting, Mrs. Dyal said she had no knowledge that her husband possessed a pistol and she did not believe he was armed. An old, rusty pistol was found in the bottom of the Dyal car.

The feeling against Aycock ran so high last yesterday that more than a hundred people of Baxley and McRae went to Jesup in an impromptu automobile cavalcade. The town was in excitement for hours.

The date for the preliminary hearing has not been set.

WILL CASE TO BE COMPLETED DURING TODAY

Caveat Proceedings In Will of Late F. J. H. Bryan to Reach Jury Late Today.

The case contesting the will of the late F. J. H. P. Bryan, of Bethel, will go to the jury late this afternoon, it was predicted at the noon hour today by those who have been following the proceedings closely during the last two days.

Examination of witnesses was completed shortly before the noon hour today, and argument began immediately. It is not thought likely that argument will be completed before 4 o'clock.

The case was begun Monday afternoon, and is probably one of the most hotly contested legal battles heard here in months. Considerable acreage of land lying in the Bethel community is involved. The executor of the will is Mrs. Fannie Manning, daughter of the deceased Mr. Bryan, who contends that he was not in possession of normal mental faculties when the document was prepared.

The propounder of the will is the wife of Mr. Bryan. The propounder contends that the deceased was mentally capable of distributing the property as he saw fit, and considerable testimony has been brought to bear in this direction.

PRESIDENT EGYPTIAN CHAMBER OF DEPUTIES DIED YESTERDAY

Cairo, Egypt, Aug. 24.—(AP)—All the government offices were closed today owing to the death yesterday of Saadallah Pasha, National leader and President of the Egyptian Chamber of Deputies. Death was caused by the general trend of pneumonia as the result of eczema of the outer ear.

PAUL REDFERN TO TAKE OFF THURSDAY IN BRAZIL FLIGHT

Brunswick, Ga., Aug. 24.—(AP)—Paul Redfern will take off tomorrow in his monoplane "Por of Brunswick" on a projected non-stop flight to Brazil, if the weather reports late today "show as favorable conditions as did this morning's report." Paul V. Varner, chairman of the flight committee, announced.

"The only rift in today's report, which was issued late last night, is the presence of fresh winds at surface and aloft from Brunswick to the Bahamas," said Mr. Varner. "If the report to be received this afternoon is as favorable as this one, we will definitely set the take-off for about noon tomorrow."

Ships Move Out To Sea Today As Storm Passes

Norfolk, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Dozens of ships which spent last night in Hampton Roads awaiting the passage of a tropical hurricane off the coast began moving out to sea. Indications this morning were that the storm had passed without striking land. There was no rain during the night and the wind, instead of reaching gale force as had been feared, attained a velocity of only 28 miles an hour according to the weather bureau at Cape Henry. The wind velocity had dropped to 12 miles at 8 o'clock this morning.

The weather was fair and cool but the sea was heavy, indicating that a storm of great intensity had passed off the coast.

Virginia Beach last night reported the waves breaking higher than at any other time this year but there was no damage.

A dozen big freighters and many smaller vessels, after being warned yesterday of the approaching storm remained in port to await the passage of the blow.

Cohoon Elected State Councillor Of the Mechanics

Wilson, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Walter L. Cohoon, of Elizabeth City, today was elevated to the office of State Councillor of the State Council of the United American Mechanics at its 37th annual convention.

Guernsey P. Hodd, of Goldsboro, succeeded himself as State Treasurer, while L. Wilkins, of Wilson, Outside Sentinel, and R. Paul Caudell, of North Wilkesboro, State Champain, also went into office unopposed.

Wilmington, Reidsville, Albemarle, Statesville, Kinston and Elizabeth City were seeking to be at the seat of next year's meeting.

E. A. Lowell, of Cincinnati, National Councillor, warned of what he said was the peril of unlimited immigration, holding up the Sacco-Vanzetti case and its attendant disturbances as typical of what might be expected from the radical element, if the foreign element were permitted to pour into this country, unrestricted.

Other officers elected during the evening made short talks of appreciation, and stood squarely behind the new commander in offering their best during the coming year.

Discussion of the recent convention of the State department held recently at Washington brought out many different viewpoints in connection with the two days activities. Those giving narratives of their personal experiences were: Dr. Schultz, Bill Rogers, J. B. Kittrell, Herbert Waldrop, Dr. K. B. Pace.

Each of the speakers expressed keen disappointment at the lack of business methods in evidence during the first day's session. The session was great—probably one of the greatest in history of the organization, it was candidly admitted—but a little more attention to business principles would have resulted in greater things for the future.

The consensus of opinion, however, seemed to be that the department's efforts to stage one of the most spectacular meetings in history was a complete success. The citizenship of Washington and the two Beaufort County posts were highly commended for the splendid spirit exhibited toward the visitors, and the way the crowds were cared for.

Creation of Budget Perfected at Optimistic Meeting of Business Men Last night.

Tentative plans looking to the creation of a budget for a special advertising campaign for the city of Greenville were perfected at a meeting of about sixty business men composed largely of members of the Merchants Association held in the basement of the Christian church last night. The session was presided over by W. H. Woolard, president of the Merchants Association, who expressed keenest pleasure at the large attendance.

The purpose of the meeting was to create a budget for a special advertising campaign to be conducted during the last four months of the year. The plans provide for the publication of a booklet setting forth the resources and possibilities of Greenville. This feature it is believed will meet the constant demand for information about Greenville and the great locality in which it is situated.

Those attending the meeting last night contributed liberally to the budget. A committee composed of J. J. White, L. A. Stroud and C. B. Rowlett was named to complete the solicitation of contributions to the budget. This committee was also appointed to handle the funds carrying out plans for the advertising campaign. Plans for the campaign as submitted by Mr. Rowlett were unanimously endorsed.

Numbers of optimistic speakers were made during the evening. J. B. Sugg, prominent tobacconist, spoke on the subject, "Why the Greenville Tobacco Market is the Best in the State." K. W. Cobb, secretary of the Greenville Tobacco Board of Trade, told of "What has been done for the Greenville Tobacco Market through Co-operation." J. H. Blount, prominent merchant, talked on the subject, "Does Co-operative Advertising pay?" D. J. Whichard talked on the subject, "The Value of Co-operative Advertising."

Other speakers of the evening who voiced a note of optimism for the advertising campaign were J. L. Little, Frank Wilson, J. J. White and others.

C. B. Rowlett, secretary of the Merchants Association, said the session was one of the most optimistic he had ever attended during his long residence in Greenville. Every man seemed imbued with the spirit of progress, he declared, and this is going to count largely in the future development and expansion of Greenville.

LITTLE TROUBLE IN BERLIN OVER SACCO AND VANZETTI

Berlin, Aug. 24.—(AP)—With a lull today in the manifestations over the Sacco-Vanzetti execution, reports from various sections of Germany indicated that no serious clashes occurred anywhere except at Leipzig.

One person was killed and several were injured there yesterday when a crowd shouting "Revenge" rushed the police station.

32 GOLFERS QUALIFY FOR TITLE MATCH

Minneapolis, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Stripped of all supplementary play, 32 survivors of the qualifying rounds were paired off today for match play in competition for the national amateur golf championship at Minikahda club.

At the top of the draw stood George Von Elm, of Los Angeles, in the first match to defend his title, having gained admission to hard competition by virtue of a hard earned 154, just two strokes inside the limit of 156 at which 11 golfers tied for the last seven places.

At the bottom of the lower bracket was Bobby Jones, but he was there through a scintillating performance that equalled the record of 142 for medal play in the event. Two years ago Clark Corkran of Philadelphia made the same score. Jones stood out head and shoulders above the qualifiers after his record of 31-36-67 yesterday but today faced the possibility that a momentary slump on his part might meet the best game of an unheralded player in the 18 hole matches and cost him further chance to redeem the title he lost to Von Elm last year.

His first match is with Maurice McCarthy of New York and if he survives he must face either Frank Kolp, of Portland, Oregon last year's Western champion or Eugene Homans, of New York a youth who outstripped Bobby on the first day and led the field with a 71.

Von Elm was no better last year in qualifying play and yet went through to lick Jones in the finals. His first match is with John McKinley of Chicago and his second, should he survive, with either Rudy Knepper, of Sioux City, Iowa or Harry Legg, of Minneapolis, Minn.

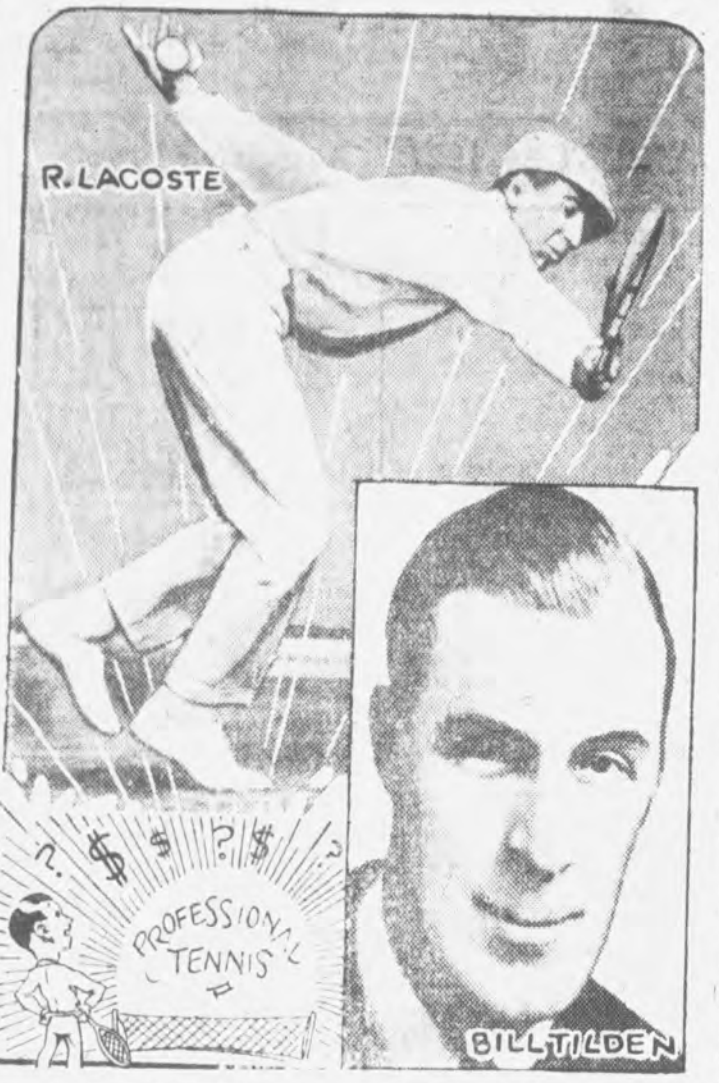

New York. The winner of the forthcoming Davis Cup tennis matches may be a loser too.

If France wins, one of her greatest stars, Rene Lacoste, proposes to give up the game in favor of business. If the United States wins, "Big Bill" Tilden may join the ranks of the professionals.

When Lacoste went in for tennis seriously his father, consented only on condition his son should become the best player in the world. In the last year Rene has won the championships of the United States, England and France, which comprise a goodly share of the tennis universe, but loyalty to France demands that he help win the great international test before he quit the court.

Another victory for the United States this year would make such a succession that Tilden has helped to win and would enable him to retire to a peaceful professional life adorned with honorable service stripes for his work in the tennis wars.

Tilden's expressed attitude toward turning "pro" is almost a puzzle to tennis fans as President Coolidge's "I do not choose to run" has been to political fans.

"I will not consider turning professional before 1928," Big Bill announced here, indicating a likelihood that he intends to do so some time early next year.

Knowing well the dollars-and-cents value of good will, especially to a pro, Tilden apparently intends to run no risk of the unpleasantness that resulted a year ago when Vincent Richards, his leading American rival, entered the professional fold before what the United States Lawn Tennis Association chose to consider the end of the tennis year.

In answer to the "squawk" which arose when Richards was denied a place in the amateur list for 1926, the U. S. L. T. A. admitted he would have been ranked at No. 1 ahead of Tilden, if he had not turned pro four months before the February meeting of that body, which is the official Happy New Year of the racket game.

Meeting this condition Tilden would be given ranking, perhaps his last as an amateur. It has been No. 1 for seven straight years. This would help Big Will's drawing power as a pro which has been assessed at widely varying amounts.

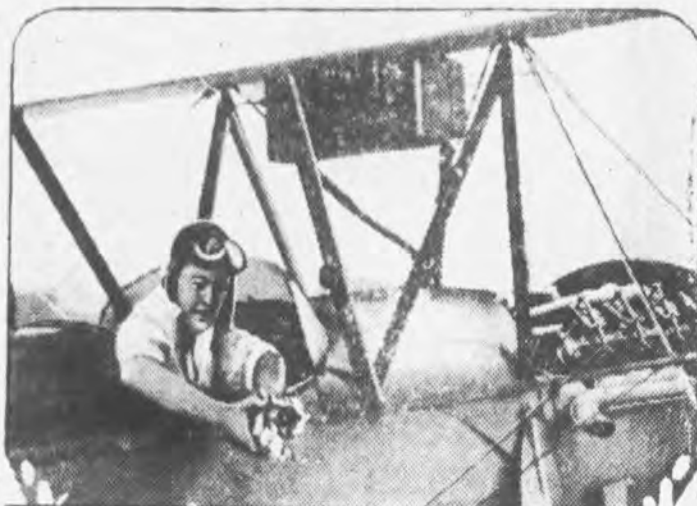

The tolerance of the various societies that have sprung up as a result of the Sacco-Vanzetti affair is nothing more than tolerating the breeding of treason and sedition, and the government should take drastic steps now to bring such an end. The point has been reached that foreigners who are eligible for citizenship of this nation should be required to become naturalized and then live under the laws of the land, while those unqualified or unwilling to become true American citizens should be sent back to the land from which they came.

America should not permit itself to be made a dumping ground for undesirable persons whose only aim in life is to tear down those principles upon which true democracy is founded.

F. as it marched through the streets of Paris just ten years ago last Fourth of July—that handful of men which was so impressive a pledge of the divisions to come. It will be something like that but a thousand times noisier, for the load that weighed down peoples' hearts and party silenced their tongues has long been lifted. There was good will toward America then, and there is good will now, and the Paris convention of the Legion should go far to help make that spirit a permanent one between America and France, between America and all of Europe."

ITALY LIKE PRISON WHEN
600 NEW LAWS ARE
PUT INTO EFFECT

LONDON—Italy may shortly become a prison for Italians, if the new penal code of 600 articles is passed. This new law is to be submitted to Mussolini by the Italian Minister of Justice, it is learned here and will sacrifice the liberty of the individual to the safety of the government.

Under this law no Italian may cross the frontier without permission of the governmental authorities.

To attempt to go abroad is punishable by severe terms of imprisonment and heavy fines. All frontier guards will be empowered to use their firearms to prevent the crossing of the borders by indirect ways, and accomplices will be given the same punishment as those who attempt to leave Italy.

Recently an ex-deputy was fined 20,000 lire, and sent to prison for four years because he attempted to go abroad for political purposes.

"Everything possible is being done to make Italy a stronger nation," declares Signor Turati, Secretary-General of the Fascist party. "Italy does not wait to be any longer the grand historical museum of the world."

Speaking of the antagonistic doctrine of Fascism and Bolshevism, "Either Moscow or Rome will conquer."

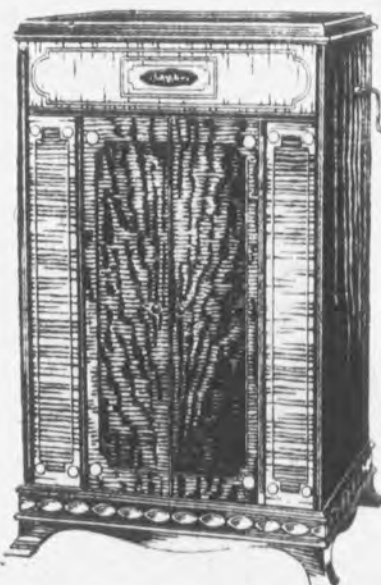

Denver. —(INS)—Women are entitled to suffrage, and other equality rights, but there is no necessity for them being dragged down to the level of men while exercising these prerogatives.

This, in effect was the plea of Mrs. Martha Hurd, a Mont Vista clubwoman, who advocated sex segregation in primaries and elections. Speaking before the annual convention of the State Federation of Women's club's for the south-central district of Colorado, at Alamosa recently, Mrs. Hurd declared that women should be registered separately from men; vote in different polling booths, and have their ballots counted apart from those of male electors.

"This plan," Mrs. Hurd explained, "would relieve women of the odium cast upon them by those who believe their right to suffrage, in that it would prove to the world that women vote independently of their husbands."

The idea was applauded by the club women, and a movement was launched to have the next Colorado legislature enact a law to make the suggestion effective.

"East is east and west is west," but that is no reason why they should never meet, in the opinion of Ong Do King, 21-year-old Chinese and Elizabeth Dunbar, 16, of this city, who were married here recently.

When or where the romance started is not known. Their strange affection was first noticed by the bride's mother two years ago. Last April the pair ran away and were married, but the marriage was annulled by Judge Ben E. Linsey, at the mother's urgent request.

"But it didn't do any good," says Mrs. Oliver, Dunbar, the girl's mother. "I guess they are really in love with each other."

After fighting the marriage as long as she could, she finally gave her consent to the match. There was nothing else to do she feels since it appeared to be impossible to separate the young couple.

And so, pretty, blue-eyed Elizabeth Dunbar became Mrs. King. The young Chinese, who is a cook in a local Chinese restaurant, is said to be a native of Tiensein, Canton province, China, where his father is reputed to be a wealthy drug exporter. King has been in this country for several years.

While the couple refused to discuss their plans for the future, King indicated that they will probably make their home in Denver.

Nevadaville, a long dead mining town located 50 miles west of Denver near Central City, in the midst of a group of "ghost cities," formerly a beehive of rich mining activities, is coming to life, according to W. J. H. Davey, mining man, who has stuck to the village ever since the end of its prosperous days. In 1863, Nevadaville was a noisy little city of 1,500 citizens, 13 saloons, two churches, and three jail cells. Today those citizens are dead or scattered through the world, there is no more use for even one saloon, the churches are tumbling down and the jail cells have not known an occupant for many years.

Nevadaville, with Idaho Springs claims the honor of the first place where gold was discovered in Colorado.

If the phantoms of long dead prospectors and miners ever wandered through the deserted streets during the past few years they must have found a very dismal sight for the houses, stores and saloons had been stripped of their furnishings and left to the mercy of the elements. A new population, however, can find comfortable quarters there by replacing a few windows, and refurbishing the empty houses.

During all the years in which the town has been one of Colorado's "ghost cities" Davey has remained at his post, working his own holdings. He now talks with delight of the circumstances which he believes will bring a new lease of life to Nevadaville.

A novel feature of Denver Market Week early in August brought scores of merchants and buyers to the Mile High City, when it was announced by the association that stages the annual Market Week event that all visiting merchants and buyers would be refunded their railroad fare provided they made purchases here totalling \$500. Registration showed merchants and buyers from Kansas, Nebraska, Wyoming, Oklahoma, Texas, Arizona, Utah, Nevada, Idaho and Montana took advantage of the offer.

Mr. Miller will speak upon the accomplishments of the deaf in the state during the past year, devoting particular attention to the placement work of his department, which is connected with the state department of labor and printing.

O. C. Carroll, deaf editor of the *Pender Chronicle*, will also attend the convention.

The chief appointive position is that of department adjutant and this appointment will be made with out delay by the commander-elect, it was understood.

Frank Camps, well known legionaire, and Spague Silver, in charge of the automobile registration office of the state government both of Raleigh are candidates for the position of department adjutant.

Department headquarters of the Legion will be removed from Charlotte to Raleigh when Gen. Cox resumes his duties on the return of the North Carolina delegation of members of the legion and legion auxiliary from Paris France. This delegation composed of 315 persons and will sail September 8 from Hampton Roads Virginia.

BILEO LEADS FOR GOVERNOR MISSISSIPPI

Strike Continues At Henderson, N.C.

Henderson, Aug. 24.—(AP)—The strike of employees seeking restoration of the 1924 wage cut of 12 1/2 per cent because they say the Harriet cotton mill owners have increased dividends from six to eight per cent, continued today uneventfully.

The mill owners, maintaining operations do not show sufficient profit to justify going back to the prior-to-1924 wage, remained equally set in their position.

Outside union officials continue to add to their enrollment of the men, urging them to remain steadfast and promising support to tide them over the strike, now in its third week, having started August 4th.

The south Henderson mills are operating nominally.

Highway Body Meet Tomorrow To Receive Bids

Raleigh, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Low bids on 12 projects advertised for letting by the State Highway Commission total \$1,167,937, the work involving construction of 28.92 miles of hardsurface, 42.61 miles of dirt road, and two bridges.

Included in the letting are two projects calling for the construction of 9.39 miles of dirt road in Catawba county and a bridge over the Catawba river, which the Highway Commission was retrained on Monday from building. The temporary restraining order was secured by the town of Newton and its individuals, and is returnable before Judge Michael Schenck in Leon, September 3.

The Commission will contest this order, chairman Frank Pace said. The Commissioners will meet tomorrow to consider low bids, and take up other routine business.

Explosion Wrecks Chicago Building

Chicago, Aug. 24.—(AP)—An explosion, attributed to gas from a leaking pipe, wrecked three stories in a one-story building on Taylor street in the west side early today and fire then destroyed the structure.

Firemen found no trace of a body in the ruins although a man in the neighborhood said the proprietor of a dry goods store had been asleep in the store. A grocer, and the owner of a bakery in the building said they could not account for the blast.

Scores of persons in the neighborhood were routed from their beds as the fire spread to an adjoining three story building. Another three story building also was damaged.

Many families were driven from their apartments.

Early theories that a dynamite bomb set by beer gangsters, or that a still had exploded were abandoned when firemen found no supporting evidence.

FARM HINTS

Mixing heat-damaged wheat with sound wheat is a poor practice. Only one per cent of skin-burned wheat, or half of one per cent of badly heat-damaged kernels, will injure the milling and baking qualities when mixed with sound wheat. Wheat that is badly stacked-stained also is of inferior milling quality. It usually gives a low flour yield and the flour has a high ash content. Bread is discolored, has a bitter taste and a weedy odor.

Most egg producers do not candle eggs, although buyers and dealers find it advantageous to do so. Where a high-class retail trade is being catered to, candling by producers is desirable and necessary. Sometimes absolutely fresh, new-laid eggs are unsuitable for food because of bloody whites, blood spots and meat spots.

Every abandoned or neglected piece of hillside farm land tends to augment flood conditions. More tree planting is needed as a flood control measure on a large acreage or abandoned or worn out hill land.

Sausage of good grade, made wholly from meat, contains more protein, more fat and less added water than the product made in part from meat by-products and containing cereal as a binder. The difference in food value is greater than that shown by analysis, since the proteins of the high-grade products are complete and can be utilized by the body for repair of waste and the building of new tissue, whereas the proteins of the inferior products are in part incomplete and therefore not utilized by the body to the best advantage.
