SEVERAL DIE
IN WRECK OF
FRENCH TRAIN

Many Others Injured
When Tourist Train
Wrecks Near French
Resort.

Chamonix, France, Aug. 26.—(AP)—A mountain tourist party, after gazing upon the vast sea of ice filling the highest basins of the Mont Blanc chain was suddenly changed into a party of death and suffering when the cog railway train in which the descent was being made, was wrecked near Mont-emers last night. Twenty-one persons were known today to have been killed and thirty were injured. Seemingly, none of the sixty occupants of the wrecked coach escaped unscathed. Twenty-five injured were taken to the Chamonix hospital and others to clinics at Montemvers, Annecy and other places in the region.

Among the injured were Mrs. Newton Perry, of Chicago, and her daughter, who suffered broken legs. Their maid was among those killed. The identity of all the victims was still unknown this morning but so far as could be learned, the two Chicago women and their maid were the only Americans.

It is supposed a cog slipped owing to the sinking of the track through recent incessant rains. The train ran away from the engine and the first coach, going off the rails, dashed over a viaduct to the ravine below just in front of the Montemvers hotel. Through the presence of mind, a passenger named Bremey who applied the emergency brake the second car was kept from following the first.

Plans to Form
Organization
For Farmers

Raleigh, N. C., Aug. 26.—(AP)—Plans for perfecting a State Farmers' Association were before James M. Gray of State College, temporary secretary in a meeting at the college today.

On July 28 the State Farmers' convention here at its close adopted resolutions looking to the organization and calling for the beginning of a movement to begin a State-wide program for agricultural advancement, a State organization of farmers; reduction of unfair freight rates, the study of tax matters, the prohibiting of the use of convicts in farming, and frowning on the development of waste lands with government money.

E. C. Brooks, president of State College, featured the movement in outlining agricultural needs, directing attention to the educational system needed by farmers, concluding that "the time has come when the farmers of this State should adopt an effective agricultural program and should work for it to become a part of our greater educational system."

The system, he said, should embrace economic production, farm management, marketing, home economics, and the education system. The movement for the farm organization was expressed in the convention resolution which called upon State College, the State department of agriculture and organizations of farmers and farm women to select representatives to serve on a committee to work out the machinery for the permanent organization.

State Scores
In Murder Trial

Greenville, S. C., Aug. 26.—(AP)—Counsel for the state sought today to score heavily from the testimony of Coroner John L. Park in the case of Mrs. Ethel Willis, and deputy sheriff Henry S. Townsend on trial charged with slaying the woman's husband sheriff Sam D. Willis, here June 12.

The trial opened yesterday after a speedy selection of jurors with appearance of ten state witnesses who testified to seeing Mrs. Willis and Townsend at various hours on the afternoon and night preceding the slaying. Coroner Park was called as the eleventh witness but adjournment came before his examination started.

The state produced as a feature witness deputy sheriff Cliff R. Brannett investigating officer of the murder who testified to the finding of footprints of a man and woman at the rear of the Willis garage after the killing. He stated the print of a woman's foot was visible in the automobile tire track left as the machine rolled into the garage. The two defendants were affected differently by the trial. Mrs. Willis exhibited nervousness and cried frequently, while Townsend was self-possessed and betrayed no emotion.

The first Pacific fliers came back from Honolulu by steamer, leaving the big army plane there. A good idea.

It would be wise to send one war plane a week to Hawaii for the next year or two, leaving the plane there, building up a big air fleet on those interesting islands. There is plenty of room to practice flying there, and the planes might be useful, in case we ever wanted to help friends on the other side of the Pacific. Pale sentimentalists will object on the ground that it might look "warlike," but pale sentimentality would not protect the country in case of war.

AIRPLANES WOULD.

It was made clear at Geneva that Uncle Sam's foolish boy statesmen working at the Washington conference, did not protect this country as they thought they were doing. Admiral Jones shows that the American navy is NOT first in swift high powered destroyers but a bad third. England and Japan coming ahead.

That won't surprise anybody who knows the calibre of men that represented Japan and England at the conference, compared with those that represented the United States.

American fliers going east and west over the Pacific and the Atlantic are said to have given Great Britain "a new thrill," also causing the British to feel a sudden doubt as to England's "air superiority."

The doubt can be settled only by proper government action. Americans fly well, so do British, French, Germans, Russians and Japanese. Each nation thinks it has the best fliers. Having three times the population of Great Britain or France, we probably have more good fliers than they, flying now or ready to learn in a week.

The main thing lacking here is the right kind of flying machines and enough of them. You can trust the British to see that they have the machines. The French have them already, also the Japanese. (Continued on Page Six)

Greenville Tobacconists Add 8 Carloads
To Thousands of
Baskets Already on
Hand.

Greenville tobacconists are making great preparations for the 1927 season. Everything is in readiness for the opening on September 6th when four sets of buyers will begin buying tobacco on this market. Eight carloads of new baskets have been purchased by the Greenville tobacco market to be added to the thousands of baskets they already have on hand.

For several days W. D. Pruitt, chairman of the basket committee has had a large crew of men painting and numbering these baskets. These extra baskets were bought to take care of the large increase in tobacco expected to be sold on this market this season.

This will put the seven warehouses of Greenville in position to handle tobacco much faster in unloading than heretofore.

COLLEGE TO
OPEN BIDS
SEPT. 29TH

Hope to Have New
Building Ready For
Occupancy For The
Fall Term of 1928

The board of trustees of East Carolina Teachers College met yesterday in regular quarterly session. In addition to regular routine business the board instructed G. R. Berryman, the college architect to advertise for bids to be opened on Sept. 29, for the erection of a new practice school building, kitchen, one dining room unit, power plant and laundry. These buildings will be in readiness for the fall term of 1928.

President Robert H. Wright made his annual report to the board, and in it he said, among other things, "One year ago you adopted a reorganization plan including a schedule of training for the members of our teaching staff, and you also adopted a salary schedule and gave each member of the teaching force a rating on this salary schedule. The results accruing from this action have been eminently satisfactory. No other action of the board of trustees has ever reacted quite so favorably upon the entire staff. I consider the college year of 1926-27 as the best in the history of the institution."

During the year 1925-26 we graduated 19 students with the bachelor's degree and 176 with the two year diploma, making a total of 195 graduates. During the year 1926-27 we graduated 48 with the bachelor's degree and 256 with the two-year diploma, making a total of 304 graduates. This means an increase of 109 graduates, 29 with the bachelor's degree and 80 with the two-year diploma. These figures are most gratifying because they show that we are having a larger percentage of our students stay in college until they complete the course they entered to take. It means that the college is turning back to the State annually a larger number of well trained teachers.

I am submitting herewith a report from the treasurer for the year 1926-27 and also a partial report for comparison of the year 1925-26. This report is significant in several respects. You will not that the receipts from students were sufficient in 1926-27 to take care of all of the expenses of the dining room, dormitories, laundry, college physician and infirmary, farm and garden, and power plant, over two thirds of the expense of buildings and grounds, and a small part of the expense for instruction.

You will note that the students have paid into the college more than one half of the total expense of operating the institution. Practically the same condition existed for the year 1925-26. This justifies the action of the board at our meeting in June when you raised student charges \$5.00 a quarter.

Our appropriation for maintenance this year was \$160,000 and our expenditures from the State appropriation were \$155,397.30, leaving us a surplus of \$4,602.70. The college has operated within "ne appropriation. To do this it was necessary for us to practice the most rigid economy.

The graduating exercises and summer school commencement will take place tomorrow, at which time John A. McRea of Charlotte will deliver the baccalaureate address to the graduating class which consists of 72 members.

Less Than Carlot
Commodity Rate
To Be Canceled

Richmond, Va., Aug. 26.—(AP)—Railroads of the south propose to cancel the less-than-carload commodity rate between points in southern territory on virtually all products shipped, the Richmond Chamber of Commerce is notified.

The official notice says in part: "The carriers propose the cancellation of all less-than-carload commodity rates on inter and interstate traffic except on cotton, cotton and knitting factory products, cotton sweepings, notes and wastes, unmanufactured tobacco (leaf). It is the purpose of the carriers to separately consider and treat the rates on the excepted commodities and so soon as they are prepared to proceed with the revision of the rates on such commodities. Interested shippers and receivers will be notified."

A conference will be held in Atlanta on September 12 for the purpose of giving shippers an opportunity to express objections to the proposed action.

ON FIRST LEG
OF GLOBE TRIP

Monoplane "Pride of Detroit" Hopped off This Morning For Harbor Grace.

Old Orchard Beach, Maine, Aug. 26.—(AP)—The monoplane Pride of Detroit, hopped off at 5:25 a. m. daylight time today for Harbor Grace, Newfoundland, where the start of an attempt at a new world circling record will be made.

Eastport, Maine, Aug. 26.—(AP)—The monoplane Pride of Detroit, enroute to an attempt to break the record for circling the globe, passed out of United States territory at 7:55 a. m., Eastern Standard daylight time, when it was sighted at West Quoddy Head Coast Guard station.

Saint John, N. B., Aug. 26.—(AP)—The airplane Pride of Detroit was reported passing over St. Martin's about forty miles east of here about 9 o'clock Atlantic Standard time.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Aug. 26.—(AP)—A number of persons saw the monoplane Pride of Detroit as it flew over here at 10 o'clock this morning, Atlantic Standard time, the plane was flying low.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Aug. 26.—(AP)—The Pride of Detroit left Prince Edward Island at St. Peter's Bay on the north shore of King's County at 10:30 a. m., Atlantic Standard time, having proceeded directly across the island in a northeasterly direction. She maintained the same course out towards the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

Starts Suit For
\$10,000 Damage

Winston-Salem, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Alleging that his character was damaged and that he has been unable to obtain work, T. C. Harris of Durham, formerly of this city, has started suit against O. L. Davis of Forsyth county court for \$10,000 damage for false arrest.

In the allegations filed, Harris stated he was arrested at Durham Feb. 5 1926, on a charge of false sworn out by Davis on Jan. 27, 1926. He further stated that he was forced to arrange bail in the sum of \$250 for his appearance in municipal court. Harris says he was forced to appeal to superior court and bond was fixed at \$300. According to his allegations, Harris was forced to remain in jail until Feb. 27 before bail was arranged.

On June 2, 1927, Harris states his case was tried in superior court and he was found not guilty of false pretense. He states that at this time Davis employed private counsel to assist the state in prosecuting him and that he was forced to extend \$150 in securing counsel for his defense.

PROBE BOMB
EXPLOSION

Henderson Officers, However, Have no Clues to Blast of Week Ago.

Henderson, N. C., Aug. 26.—(AP)—Investigation of the three bomb explosions that yesterday punctuated the strike situation among workers at the Harriett Cotton Mills continued today but with officers professing to have no clues as to the perpetrators of the blasts of yesterday or the one that occurred a week ago.

The 800 strikers through their leaders have expressed a determination to stand firm in their demands for a wage increase and the mill owners continue firm in their determination not to grant any blanket increase at this time. Meanwhile, prayers for peace between the mill owners and operatives have been heard in churches and funds have been collected in certain circles to supply needy mill workers with necessary food.

T. A. Wilson, of Winston-Salem, president of the North Carolina Federation of Labor, is expected here. He visited Durham and conferred with Lieutenant Governor Elmer Long, who is acting as Governor during the absence of Governor McLean. Mr. Long's services have not been requested by either side and he has said he would not come here unless he is requested to do so.

Winston-Salem, Aug. 26.—(AP)—T. A. Wilson, of this city, president of the North Carolina Federation of Labor, has gone to Henderson to make a personal survey of conditions existing among the textile strikers there.

Mr. Wilson is expected to visit Lieutenant Governor Elmer Long, at Durham, today and to discuss the situation with him. It is thought that the two, through conference, may see a way in which to bring amicable settlement of the difficulties between the strikers and owners of the Harriett Cotton Mills at Henderson.

In an open telegram to the Governor, Mr. Wilson invited him to arbitrate the strike, but he declined saying he would rather wait an invitation from the operatives or owners of the mills.

TWO EARTH SHOCKS
FELT IN CALIFORNIA

SEVERE TOLL
OF LIFE TAKEN
BY HURRICANE

Heavy Damage Also
Reported From Cape
Cod to New Found-
land Early Today

Boston, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Seaports from Cape Cod to New Foundland today awaited with trepidation future reports from their fishing fleets which had already told of nine dead, four missing and many injured with ships lost or broken by the force of a hurricane which swept the coast.

Severe damage to crops and high ways was reported from the land but the toll of life was exacted at sea. As the storm swept northward came reports first of the grounding of three yachts at Nantucket then the grounding of one schooner and the dismantling of another off Cape Cod, three vessels and dozens of small crafts wrecked in Nova Scotia, one sunken, six grounded, and two forced adrift at St. Pierre, Miquelon with the storm still raging at St. Johns New Foundland.

A vivid narrative of the force of the blow was brought here by the steam Trawler Harvard, which lost one of her crew, had another severely injured when the sea which took him off flung him back to the deck and had two others hurt. Grave fears were expressed for the smaller boats fishing on George Bank. No lives were lost from the British schooner Minas Princess although she lost all but her foremast before being taken in tow for Vineyard Haven, Mass.

Nova Scotia, felt the full fury of the storm and damage there was estimated at more than \$1,000,000. The dominion Atlantic railway reported 22 washouts between Halifax and Yarmouth alone with highways in some sections were eight feet of water.

Santiago, Chile, Aug. 26.—(AP)—An earthquake of moderate intensity was felt here at 1:50 o'clock this afternoon.

FRENCH MINISTER
OF COMMERCE LANDS
AT DETROIT, MICH.

Detroit, Aug. 26.—(AP)—M. Bokanowski, French minister of commerce and aviation, with William B. Stout, and his party, landed at Ford airport at 8:55 this morning in a Ford-Stout trimotored monoplane, after a flight from Toronto. Commander Richard E. Byrd, who accompanied the party from New York, to Toronto, did not accompany the party here.

ROME FLIGHT
HELD UP BY
BAD WEATHER

Bertaud Ready to Hop
Off The Minute At-
mospheric Condi-
tions Improve.

Roosevelt Field, N. Y., Aug. 26.—(AP)—The monoplane "Old Glory," loaded and fuelled, perched at the runway top today, earthbound by a fresh wind that definitely precluded a take-off on the non-stop flight for Rome.

Neither Lloyd Bertaud, nor J. D. Hill, the pilots had appeared at the field by mid-morning.

Jac. McPhail, Fokker mechanic and a member of the recent Gugenheim flight to New Foundland in search of Nungesser and Coli, was positive there would be no flight today.

The hop-off is set for the first moment between 10 in the morning and 7 in the evening that wind and other atmospheric conditions are favorable.

In order that Bertaud and Hill might start their giant Fokker monoplane Rome, all that is necessary is a 15 mile westerly wind between 10 a. m. and 7 p. m.

Dr. James H. Kimball of the weather bureau, unofficial starter of the flight held out little hope, however, for a change of favorable conditions while today's weather in mid-Atlantic might be better he said, there was little chance for a veering of the southerly breeze which prevailed yesterday and failed to aid in lifting the 12,600 pound plane.

Old Glory was on a ramp in preparation for the take off and the single engine, a 450 horsepower Phone-Gnome Jumper was functioning perfectly when the necessary wind suddenly died.

Ocean Liners
Report Heavy
Storm at Sea

New York, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Ocean liners arriving today reported wind of from 80 to 100 miles an hour which churned the sea into 40 and 50 foot waves during the big blow which swept the Atlantic Tuesday and Wednesday.

Captain Kruse of the Hamburg-American liner Resolute said his vessel passed through the center of the storm but was only forced to heave-to once and then for only 20 minutes.

The coastwise liner Yoro arrived from Jamaica 40 hours overdue. The captain said the decks were awash for 48 hours and at times 40 and 50 foot waves swept over the navigating bridge.

The Santa Marta, arriving 20 hours overdue from Kingston and Havana, reported that it was able to make but six knots an hour.

REDFERN SEEN
FLYING NEAR
THE BAHAMAS

Other Reports, How-
ever, Say He Was
Not Observed Pass-
ing Over Porto Rico.

San Juan, Porto Rico, Aug. 26.—(AP)—If Paul Redfern, Georgia aviator, who is now en route from Brunswick, Ga., to Rio de Janeiro passed over Porto Rico in his huge Stinson-Detroit monoplane during the night his passage was unobserved so far as any reports received here this morning.

Aviators said today that the lighthouses along the coast of Porto Rico as well as the reflected lights of towns and cities on the island would be sufficiently strong to aid him greatly in keeping his course if he came within 25 or 75 miles of the island.

Locally the weather was reported excellent throughout the night. (Redfern was expected to pass Porto Rico about 2 a. m. Eastern Standard time.)

St. Petersburg, Fla., Aug. 26.—(AP)—A radio message from station 4 A O F, Nassau, picked up here by the Financial Journal's forty-meter wireless station today said that the port of Brunswick piloted by Paul Redfern, on a nonstop flight from Brunswick, Ga., to Brazil, was sighted 300 miles east of the British Bahamas by a steamer which arrived at Nassau at 11:40 p. m. last night. The message said the plane was flying at an altitude of about 2,000 feet headed in a southerly direction.

Brunswick, Ga., Aug. 26.—(AP)—The wireless report from a steamer at Nassau, through St. Petersburg, Fla., that Paul Redfern's plane, the Port of Brunswick, was seen 300 miles east of the Bahamas yesterday indicated that the Georgia aviator was holding to the course which he expected to follow when he hopped off from here yesterday at 12:45 p. m., Eastern Standard time.

Taking off from Glynn Is. beach Redfern's course lay straight over the sea to the southward, 45 degrees east. This course swung him east of the Bahamas and then over land for the first time in passing the southwestern corner of Porto Rico.

From there Redfern planned to jump across the Caribbean Sea, passing near Grenada Island, Tobago, Trinidad and thence over continental land for the first time in South America over Dutch Guiana. This should be his path this morning if all went well with him and he maintained his schedule.

After traversing Dutch Guiana, Redfern expected to steer for Macana on the north bank of the Amazon river. It was there he said he would decide whether to turn to Pernambuco or continue to Rio de Janeiro.

Brunswick, Ga., Aug. 26.—(AP)—A vast expanse of sea and sky stretching away to the tropics held behind its walls of silence today the fate of its newest explorer.

Roaring away from Brunswick at noon yesterday in the face of unusually favorable weather conditions, Paul Redfern, Georgia aviator, piloted his huge Stinson-Detroit monoplane seaward on his proposed 4,600 mile non-stop journey to Rio de Janeiro. He sought to establish new endurance and distance marks.

Despite head winds forecast along his trip, Redfern today should be far along on his route through the tropics. Steering a course east of the Bahamas, the young birdman headed for Porto Rico, which his schedule indicated he should have reached by midnight. Passing over Redfern hoped to be speeding during the day over the waters of the Caribbean Sea toward the isle of Trinidad.

The daring aviator had not been heard from since his plane winged its way southeasterly over the Atlantic yesterday from a beach near this city.

Far out of the path of ships plowing through southern waters during the early stages of the flight before he reaches Porto Rico, Redfern was not expected to be sighted until he had swung over the Caribbean Sea, the cradle of hurricanes.

As soon as he entered this leg of his trip, passing steamers may give first reports of the plane's progress. Radio advices have been broadcast throughout the region requesting any information.

If the big ship is aloft today, Redfern has passed a big portion of the twenty-four hours in darkness.

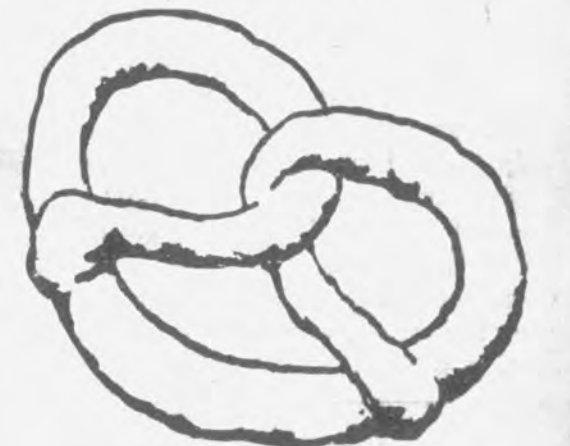

Fying Center

Dayton, Ohio, (INS)—Plans are afoot in this city—sometimes called the cradle of aviation—to establish what may be the first airplane country club. Men backing the venture are said to have already raised a million dollars and to have purchased the large estate of R. E. Olds, automobile magnate, at Gross Island in the Detroit River. Club members expect the club to become one of the most important aviation centers in the country.

Among those mentioned in connection with the project are Charles F. Kettering, official of the General Motors Corporation; Vice President Jackson of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana; President Clark of the Midwest Refining Company; Vice president Marks of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company; W. B. Mayo, chief engineer of the Ford Motor Company and others.

The U. S. Government has appropriated \$350,000 and the state of Michigan \$100,000 to aid in the equipping of a naval seaplane base on the club grounds, it was said.

A large dirigible hangar is also planned and some members are already predicting that monster airships, capable of carrying 100 passengers, will be operating on a regular schedule between Detroit and London, England, within fifteen months.

Edwin Denby, former secretary of the navy, is commodore of the club. Announcement has also been made here that Kettering is interested in the formation of the Scenic Airways Company, Inc., with a half-million dollars capital, which plans to receive the transfer of an exclusive twenty year franchise from the government for the operation of passenger-carrying airplanes in national parks.

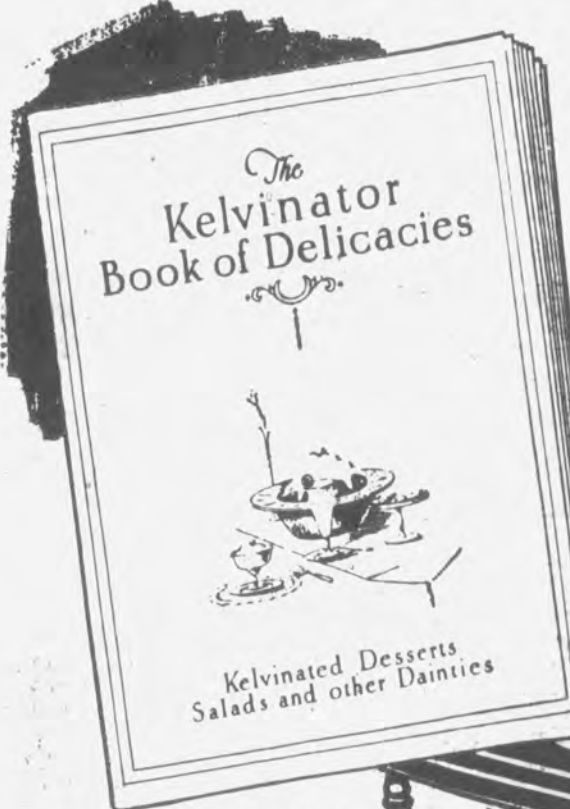

COTTON (AP)—The cotton market opened easy today at a decline of 8 to 25 points under realizing and selling for a reaction, promoted by relatively easy Liverpool cables and belief that the technical position had been weakened by recent advances.

December declined to 21.50 and March to 21.50 in early trading, net losses of about 20 to 25 points but reports of rains and low temperatures in Eastern belt sections led to buying on the decline and there were rallies of 9 or 10 points from the lowest by the end of the first hour.

Private cables attributed the easier tone in Liverpool to local, American and continental selling and houses with continental connections were credited with selling here at the opening.

The early decline appeared to bring in trade buying as well as covering. At midday December contracts were selling at 21.60, and March at 21.81.

SAY FREIGHT RATES ON COAL OUGHT TO BE REDUCED SOON.

Washington, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Rates on coal moving from principal Southern mining centers to south Atlantic ports should be reduced by an average of 28 cents per ton, the Interstate Commerce Commission was advised today at the conclusion of an investigation by its examiners into the subject.

The Traffic Association of South Atlantic ports, representing business interests at Wilmington, N. C.; Charleston, S. C.; Savannah, Ga.; Brunswick, Ga.; and Jacksonville, Fla., brought a general complaint against the level of coal rates to their cities from West Virginia, Virginia, Tennessee and Kentucky.

FILE ANSWER IN NEEDLEMAN ISSUE TODAY

Defendants in \$100,000 Damage Suit Invoke Statute of Limitations in Answer.

Washington, N. C., Aug. 26.—(AP)—Invoking the statute of limitations, and an agreement that no civil action would be brought, defendants in the Needleman mob mutilation damage case have filed their answer in federal court here.

The case is set for hearing on October 17th.

The defendants cite the law which provides a suit for damages in North Carolina must be brought within a year from date of the assault which occurred in 1925.

Joseph H. Needleman, Philadelphia tobacco salesman, who was mutilated near W.ilmington, recently petitioned for \$100,000 damages. All but two of the defendants filed answers. A. T. Lilley, as died and Julian Bullock is still at large following his escape from prison.

Needleman's complaint has been amended to include Miss Edith Griffin, among the defendants instead of Miss Ethel Griffin, as was erroneously charged.

Needleman was charged originally with attacking Miss Edith Griffin, of Wilmington, relative of some of the alleged mob members. Defendants L. A. Croom, Lester Crofton, Lester Edmondson, Edgar Johnston, S. L. Robertson, James Henry Gray and Grady Smith all deny that they did not visit the cell in which the plaintiff was incarcerated and that they were not in the masked mob and had nothing to do with the crime. They admit they did plead guilty as accessories of the crime when called to trial.

"As a further defense," these defendants contend, Needleman's alleged agreement that he would not bring civil action to recover damages was made with them when they agreed themselves, they alleged, to plead guilty as accessories in the mutilation. They contend further that this agreement, alleged to have been made with consent of the court, will bar Needleman from recovering damages he seeks.

Decide on Road To Kitty Hawk

Raleigh, Aug. 26.—(AP)—The action of state Highway Commissioners in session here late yesterday, in deciding on the 17 miles from Nag's Head to Kitty Hawk to the system was regarded as a material boost toward erection of a memorial to the Wright brothers, who first caused a machine heavier than air to remain aloft near Kitty Hawk.

Heretofore Kitty Hawk has been accessible only by boat from Manteo, but with a bridge at Nag's Head across Currituck Sound, a high Dare county is now building a road to Kitty Hawk, this place will be linked with route 345 which runs from Manteo to Manteo.

Before it adjourned last spring, the board passed an act appointing a commission to investigate the matter, and recommend to congress a suitable memorial.

Secretary of Commerce Hoover suggested a lighthouse as a fitting memorial.

The Association plans a celebration at Kitty Hawk in commemoration of the pioneer accomplishment of the Wrights.

In addition to Representative Warren, W. O. Saunders editor of the Elizabeth City Independent, and a moving figure in the Association to further the erection of a memorial, R. B. Etheridge of Manteo, W. G. Gather of Elizabeth City, Herbert Bonner of Beaufort and W. P. Baum, chairman of the Dare county commissioners, appeared before the commissioners.

Mill Workers Buy Village

Boston, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Two New England mill villages have passed under the auspices of the American B. B. and R. Knight, Inc., textile concern built and owned them, to the townsmen which had occupied them for years or outsiders who bought them for investment. The post-war depression caused the corporation to abandon its mills in Manchug, Mass., and White Rock, R. I., most of the population drifted away but those who remained lived rent free. Finally the corporation decided to liquidate some of its holdings.

The first to be sold was the Manchug property of 74 houses, a farm and three mills which were founded in 1826. The company gave two of its buildings as churches. The remainder brought \$91,000 although the replacement cost was said to be nearer \$1,000,000.

The scene was repeated at White Rock, a village with its own water supply, electric light service and fire protection. In a day long auction, the 64 year old village was knocked down for \$80,795.

Purchasers of the Manchug mills hope to restore industries to the town. Many persons were able to obtain at the sales comfortable homes for as little as \$400, scarcely a year's rent in a busy town.

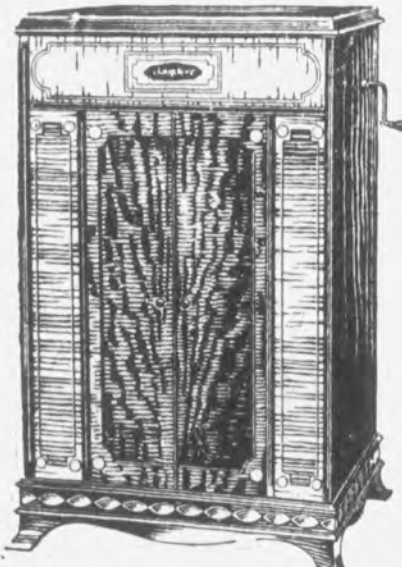
