Many Others Injured When Tourist Train Wrecks Near French Resort.

Chamonix, France, Aug. 26.—(AP) -A mountain tourist party, after gazing upon the vast sea of ice filling the highest basins of the Mont Blanc chain was suddenly changed into a party of death and suffering when the cog railway train in which the descent was being made, was wrecked near Montenvers last night. Twenty-one persons were known today to have been killed and thirty were injured

Seemingly, none of the sixty occupants of the wrecked coach escaped unscathed. Twenty-five injured were taken to the Chamonix hospital and others to clinics at places in the region.
