400 THEATRES CLOSE UP AT CHICAGO, ILL.

Fifteen Thousand Persons Out of Employment as Result of Dispute With Union.

Chicago, Aug. 30.—(AP)—The strike of a few motion picture machine operators and the lock out of virtually all the others, affecting 350 theatres in Chicago was made more stringent today when the film exchange managers decided to cut off all films to motion picture theatres in the Chicago district.

Members of the exhibitors' association met today with the assertion that the difference with the operators' union would be fought to a finish.

The musicians' union whose contract with the exhibitors expires next Sunday also called a special meeting to discuss the situation.

Chicago, Aug. 30.—(AP)—The bright lights of virtually all Chicago movie houses remained dark today as nearly 400 theatres joined in a threatened finish struggle with union labor.

Fifteen thousand persons—operators, musicians, ushers and stage hands—were without jobs and nearly 400,000 daily movie fans were deprived of a place to go by the dispute over two union movie operators which brought about the row. Theatre owners estimated their total loss daily during the strike would be close to \$200,000.

The only theatres not affected were the legitimate houses and a few neighborhood movie places, and even the neighborhood houses were imperiled by the announcement that film exchanges may take part in the struggle and withhold films.

The closing of the theatres followed a decision of the Chicago Exhibitors' Association to discharge all union motion picture machine operators and suspend employment of all other help as a reprisal to a strike called by the union operators. The strike was called because one of the theatres, adopting a new policy, had cut its staff of operators from four to two.

A meeting between union leaders and theatre owners yesterday was brief and ended in disagreement. Both factions announced they would not compromise.

More complications were predicted in as much as agreements between the owners and the musicians and stage hands union expire next Sunday.

Thomas Malory, business agent for the operators, predicted a nation-wide tie-up of theatres if an effort is made to employ non-union operators.

Brummit Reports There Was No Graft In Board Health

Raleigh, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Dr. C. O. H. Laughinghouse, state health officer, today expressed gratification over Attorney-General Brummit's report which cleared the State Board of Health of charges of graft in administration of the state sanitary law.

Attorney-General Brummit last night made public the Attorney-General's report in which no evidence that graft had been practiced by inspectors of the board was formally testified to.

The hearing cost the State \$1,724.05.

Cotton Prices Decline Under Heavy Selling

New York, Aug. 30.—(AP)—The government report on the activities of the boll weevil and other insects in the cotton belt, showing increased injury to cotton, was followed by wide and erratic fluctuations in the cotton market today and prices fell off under heavy selling.

At first, reading the trade evidently regarded the report as less bullish than expected and December contracts, which early had sold at 23.63, cents a pound or 29 points above yesterday's closing quotations, broke to 22.70, cents within a comparatively few minutes a drop of \$4.65 a bale from the high level of the morning and about \$3 from yesterday's close.

As more of the report was read, however, buying orders seemed to come into the market and more than half of the loss was quickly recovered.

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Mr. Will C. Wood, California's superintendent of public instruction, says that school hours should be made longer, and recommends legislation to that effect. He is mistaken, the hours should be made shorter, if there is to be any change.

U. S. AIRMEN RESUME TRIP AROUND WORLD

Pride of Detroit Expected to Reach Constantinople About 7 O'clock Tonight.

Belgrade, Jugoslavia, Aug. 30.—(AP)—The round the world monoplane Pride of Detroit, piloted by William S. Brock, and Edward F. Schlee, landed here at 12:03 o'clock this afternoon from Munich, Germany.

Munich, Germany, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Favored by ideal flying conditions the American airmen, William S. Brock, and Edward F. Schlee, took off in their monoplane the Pride of Detroit at 6:35 o'clock this morning for Constantinople in continuation of their flight around the world. They expected to reach their destination 1,600 kilometers (about 1,000 miles) from Munich in twelve hours. Thus they would land at Constantinople around seven o'clock tonight. The plane carried about 240 gallons of benzine.

Brock and Schlee said good-bye to Munich after a stay of less than fifteen hours having landed here from Croydon England at 4:05 o'clock yesterday afternoon on the second lap of their globe circling tour.

Argument In Brown Will To Begin Today

Raleigh, N. C., Aug. 29.—(AP)—The case in which the Beaufort County Superior Court decided the late Judge George R. Brown for 10 years a member of the North Carolina Supreme Court, was insane when he made a will leaving all his property to his widow, was slated for oral arguments this afternoon before the Supreme Court with likelihood that the hearing would extend over to tomorrow.

Relatives took 121 exceptions from the ruling of Judge Frank A. Daniels to the higher court. The case was unique in its contentions in the three weeks' lower court proceedings one side maintaining the judge was insane, the other that he was only under influence of liquor at times.

ELMER HARDEE PASSED AWAY LAST EVENING

Local Young Man Succumbs to Injury Sustained at Public Landing July 13th.

After a long, grim fight for life Elmer Hardee, 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. D. W. Hardee, of Dickinson avenue, died last night at 11:30 o'clock as result of a dislocated vertebrae sustained at Public Landing July 13th, when he dived into shallow waters of Pamlico river.

The young man's fight against death has been one of the most remarkable cases coming before attention of medical men here in years. From the first little hope was entertained for his recovery. It was said that he might live a few days or he might survive for a period of several weeks or months. He was paralyzed from his arm pits down. He remained conscious throughout the long days of suffering, except during periods of delirium when his fever registered as high as 102.

The injury was sustained while the young man was attending a church picnic at the Pamlico resort. He was said to have been standing on a pier leading far out into the river, when he plunged into shallow water beneath. Being unable to raise himself from the water, bystanders rushed to his rescue. He was brought to this city where an X-ray examination showed that he had suffered a dislocated vertebrae.

Young Hardee prior to his injury was employed by the Greenville Supply Co., wholesale grocers of this city. He was a member of the Emmanuel Baptist church and very popular among the younger set.

He is survived by, besides a mother and father, a sister, Miss Elizabeth Hardee, three brothers, David Leland and Roy Hardee, all of Greenville.

Funeral services will be conducted from the home of his parents on Dickinson avenue at three o'clock Wednesday afternoon by Rev. J. E. Ayscue former pastor of the local church. Interment will follow in the Hardee burying ground, near Red Banks church, about four miles southwest of Greenville.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES REPORTED ON DECREASE

Raleigh, Aug. 30.—(AP)—A drop in contagious diseases reported to the State Board of Health was noted in the report for the last seven days.

A drop in scarlet fever, measles, whooping cough, diphtheria, smallpox and typhoid fever, was noted compared with the previous week. Whooping cough alone dropped from 201 to 121 cases.

TOBACCO MEN LOOKING FOR FINE SEASON

Believe Greenville Market is Approaching Greatest Season In Its History.

With every contemplated improvement and addition already made preparatory to the opening on Tuesday, September 6th of the Greenville tobacco market there are various and favorable reasons to justify the prediction that the market is approaching the best season during its thirty-five years of operation.

The seven sales warehouses, practically all of which have undergone improvements gives the market about ten acres of floor space, which will enable them to handle daily approximately one and a half million pounds of tobacco. And with four sets of buyers the market will be in position to sell at least a million and quarter pounds each sales day. The buying forces have been considerably strengthened by the addition of buyers representing Reynolds Tobacco Co., and the new firm of the Greenville Tobacco Co. This with other new features makes the local market almost doubly prepared this season over any previous year for the handling of the "golden weed."

Included in the improvements made by the tobacco interests a majority of the largest buyers have increased the capacity of their factories which places them in position to easily handle daily any purchases that they make and the warehousemen have provided every convenience for the growers and their every interest. These with other features assure the old as well as the new patrons of the local market that the warehousemen and buyers are putting forth their every combined effort to prove more forcibly that Greenville is the "best tobacco market in the State." Perfect harmony and co-operation existing among every tobacco interest here to satisfy the tobacco growers is responsible in a large measure for the continued yearly growth of the Greenville market, which fact has caused favorable comment on the part of the farmers.

Universal optimism prevails that the present season will prove the greatest ever experienced on the local market.

PREPARE TO TAKE-OFF ON FLIGHT TO ROME

Roosevelt Field, N. Y., Aug. 30.—(AP)—Food was stored aboard the monoplane Old Glory today and the pilots retired for a two-hour sleep in the early afternoon preparatory to taking off on their non-stop flight to Rome before sundown.

Decision to leave was reached when the runway was judged to have been sufficiently dried off by gasoline fires from the past three days of rain and a 15-mile southwest wind sprang up.

Shortly after one o'clock Lloyd Bertaud and James D. Hill, the pilots, decided for a take-off on the strength of the daily flying weather report from the weather bureau.

They said they had been told that the wind would veer somewhat to west during the afternoon assuring them the lift they need to force them up in the air with their great load, the largest a single motor had ever had to raise.

TO CONSIDER FARM REPORT

President Also to Give Vast Reclamation Project Considerable Thought.

Rapid City, S. D., Aug. 30.—(AP)—President Coolidge turned his attention today to two problems of the West—a vast reclamation project in Washington State and a report on farm conditions prepared by the American Society of Agricultural Engineers.

On his calling list was a delegation of Pacific coast citizens headed by Senator Jones of Washington who came to Rapid City in the interest of the Columbia River basin reclamation proposal. The delegation hoped to come away with Mr. Coolidge's promise that he would give the proposition close study with a view to recommendations to the next Congress.

The farm report was to be presented by O. B. Zimmerman president and other members of the Agricultural Engineers Society. It called for "greater efficiency" among farmers and cautioned that they must be "more on the alert."

JUDGE PARKER PASSES AWAY EARLY TODAY

Superior Court Jurist Dies Suddenly While Holding Court At Asheville.

Winston-Salem, N. C., Aug. 30.—(AP)—Judge Raymond G. Parker, of this city, who died suddenly early today in Asheville, where he had been conducting Superior Court had been judge of the Eleventh Superior Court District since November 1926. For two years prior to that time he was judge of the Forsyth County Court and had practiced law in Winston-Salem for 11 years.

Dispatches from Asheville received within an hour after death said that Judge Parker became suddenly ill at 1:45 o'clock this morning and died 30 minutes later.

Judge Parker was educated at Wake Forest and at the University of North Carolina. He served in the army during the war, spending the latter part of his enlistment as instructor in the field artillery officers' school.

His ability as a jurist in the dispatch of cases by which the dockets were cleared won much admiration for Judge Parker, on the part of the Forsyth County bar and his record received the attention of attorneys throughout the State. His ability as a presiding officer inspired his friends to present him as a candidate for Judge of the Superior Court in the Eleventh District succeeding Judge Henry P. Lane and in his sessions since election, November 1927, he continued the same degree of efficiency manifested in the county court.

Judge Parker was for some time teacher of the men's Bible class of First Baptist Church, and an active Mason and Knights Templar.

Asheville, Aug. 30.—(AP)—The entire community of Asheville today was in mourning over the unexpected death of Judge Raymond G. Parker, 38, of Winston-Salem, who only Monday had inaugurated in Buncombe County Superior Court one of the most vigorous campaigns for the law and order this section has ever seen. Funeral arrangements will not be completed until tonight after the arrival of Judge Parker's only brother, Dr. K. A. Parker, of Seaboard, N. C.

Judge Parker was stricken ill of a heart disease at 1:45 o'clock Tuesday morning. He died a few minutes later after Dr. William L. Hilliard had been summoned to render medical attendance. Mrs. Parker was at his bedside.

Solicitor Robert M. Wells, of this district, the only person in Asheville with whom Mrs. Parker had become acquainted during her short stay here, was announced by L. M. Clavert of Norfolk, Va., brother of Mrs. Parker arrived at Asheville on an early morning train on business. He was informed at the hotel of the death of his brother-in-law, and went immediately to comfort his wife.

MILL OWNERS REFUSE OFFER OF STRIKERS

Operatives at Henderson Will Not be Allowed to Return Under Compromise.

Henderson, N. C., Aug. 30.—(AP)—Eight hundred striking employees of the four Harriet cotton mills here continued idle today in the fourth week after their walkout, after mill operators had refused acceptance of a proposal advanced by a strikers' committee that the operatives be allowed to return to work under a compromise agreement.

Mill officials headed by S. P. Cooper, president, flatly refused to accede to a request that the workers be allowed to return to their jobs, under condition that they be given pay for time lost, and that the adjustment of the wage scale be left to the owners.

The employees, walking out on August 4th, sought a 12-1-2 per cent wage increase, a return to the 1924 scale of pay. The scale cut in 1924 because business conditions were bad, does not constitute a fair living wage now, they contend, and conditions at the present justify a return to the former pay.

Today the situation remained quiet. There have been no demonstrations on the part of workers following the refusal of their compromise agreement and no resumption of the series of bustings which have occurred over the past two weeks. Peace talk continues prevalent at the strikers' meetings, but there has been no word from the owners following their brief statement of refusal yesterday.

ARREST THREE AT BOSTON IN FIRE EPIDEMIC

White Mongrel Led To Arrest of Master And Two Other Men Early Today.

Boston, Aug. 30.—(AP)—A white mongrel dog which unwittingly led to the arrests of its master and two other men was held by police today as a material witness against the three in connection with an epidemic of fires here and in Cambridge Sunday.

Alton J. Steeves, a Somerville chauffeur, one of the trio, in a statement to Cambridge police blamed his trouble on James Downey, Jr., a local truck man and the nephew of a former division fire chief and son of a retired fireman.

Downey "loved to watch fires and see the engines go," declared Steeves.

Robert W. Groatorex, 27, a boiler-maker was the third man under arrest and with Steeves, was held in \$3,000 bond while Downey's bond was set at \$10,000.

The fires included four in fire engine houses, set while apparatus was busy responding to other incendiary blazes. The arrests were brought about by a woman who lives near one of the burned buildings who reported the number of an automobile in which a man and a small white dog disappeared after running behind the building just before the fire was discovered.

When officers traced the machine to Downey's house they were greeted by the dog and although the woman was unable to pick Downey from a lineup a second woman who lives near another of the burned buildings reported men, car and dog and described the animal perfectly.

HOPE TO FIND PAUL REDFERN NEAR ORINOCO

Reports of Plane Near Mouth of Orinoco River Revives Hope Of Finding Flier.

Rio de Janeiro, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Every effort is being made by the Brazilian government to locate Paul Redfern the America navigator who started from Brunswick, Ga., last Thursday on a non-stop flight to Brazil and of whom no definite word has been heard since.

Regular traffic over the National Telegraph is being delayed to permit of half-hourly long distance communications over hundreds of miles of government wires, but all attempts to solve the latest aviation mystery has been unavailing.

The efforts have been doubled since the rumors were received that he had been seen at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon plowing through the sky above the northern rim of the South American continent at the mouth of the Orinoco river. It is pointed out here, however, that he should have passed over that region Friday evening, instead of Saturday afternoon, and that if he actually passed Saturday afternoon he must have used nearly all his gasoline.

It is declared further that if adverse winds delayed him 24 hours in reaching the South American continent and he then continued the flight hoping to reach Brazil, he probably had to come down at some place where perhaps days would be required before he was able to reach a point from which to communicate with the outside world. This is especially true if he landed in the mountainous region, somewhere between Brazil and Venezuela, or the Guianas which are not even well mapped.

Brunswick, Ga., Aug. 30.—(AP)—A solitary fragment of news—the report that an unidentified plane had been sighted over the delta of the Orinoco River in Venezuela—renewed hope in two continents today that Paul Redfern missing Georgia aviator may be found alive somewhere in South America.

Advices yesterday from Caracas, stating that a mailman Saturday afternoon saw a plane flying southward at an unnamed point along the Orinoco caused widespread speculation that the craft may have been Redfern's "Port of Brunswick."

The young flyer chartered his Brunswick to Rio de Janeiro route to carry him a hundred miles or more east of the Orinoco's mouth in winging his way from the Island of Trinidad to a point about fifty miles off Georgetown, British Guiana, where he intended heading inland. Flight officials here expressed the belief that if the plane sighted was Redfern's, the aviator probably had been blown off his course or else he had followed the shore line to seek a landing place when his gasoline supply was exhausted. If his plane had been running continuously since he hopped off from here Thursday noon, his fuel would have been running very low at that time.

Advices from Washington strengthened the possibility that Redfern may have reached South America. The weather bureau announced it had been unable to verify reports of a storm along the route from Brunswick to Trinidad which it was feared might have ended the flight disastrously. A seaplane pilot returning to Miami Saturday had reported a tropical disturbance in Redfern's path east of the Bahamas when the flier would have proceeded less than five hundred miles along his journey.

Lack of confirmation of the Orinoco information prompted Paul J. Varner, flight committee chairman here yesterday to request cooperation of the Navy and coast guard in a systematic search for the (Continued on Page Six)

Summing up conditions abroad Mr. Gardner goes on to say that Italy and Germany are the best conditioned countries. "I am utterly amazed at the marvelous condition of Italy. There is more industry, less unemployment and more universal satisfaction among the working people than in any country of Europe."

The party, which also includes Federal Judge E. Yates Webb, also of Shelby, is expected to return to the State about September 12.

PENNANT RACE IN NATIONAL TIGHTENS UP

One of the most eventful days in the National league has experienced this season is pointing the way for the possible dethronement of the Chicago Cubs who today were only two and one half games ahead of their closest competitors.

The Cubs balked twice yesterday by the Giants. New York batting Hal Carlson out of the box in the first game during a furious rally that brought McGraw's team an 8-7 win and taking the night cap 4-1 with a seven inning spurge at the expense of Charlie Root.

After seven successive days of idleness the Giants snapped right back into their winning gait which has extended to six consecutive victories. The team also has won 21 out of its last 27 games for the best late season showing in the older circuit.

The world's champion Cardinals could get nothing better than an even break in their team bill with Brooklyn. Jess Petty stopped them in the opener 2-1 but Jess Haines led the Mount City entry to a victory by the same score and in to the second place with Pittsburgh, as the Pirates played a 2-2 tie with Philadelphia, the game being called by rain.

Only three and one half games separate the Cubs from the Giants today to mark the first division split.

The Boston Braves, after whipping first division teams without much regularity in recent games bowed twice to the Cincinnati Reds who won by scores of 4-2, and 6-5. The Reds made 26 hits in the two games.

There was less excitement yesterday in the American league. The Yanks slapped the Browns again at St. Louis by score of 8-3. New York has won all its 18 games with Howley's outfit this season. Lou Gehrig belted his 41 homer of the year and trails Ruth by one.

Washington failed to get out of its 13 game losing slump. Manager Bucky Harris had his players draw for places in the game with Chicago Sox, the result being that Harris, Speaker, Ruel and Blue sat on the bench. Rain then halted the game in the last half of the second inning with the Senators leading the Sox 2-1.

Philadelphia scored a 5-0 win over Detroit with Jack Quinn allowing only three safe hits.

Elmer Harriss let the Cleveland Indians down with two hits and the Boston Red Sox won 10 - 2.

OUT of KEELER'S GOLF BAG! IN THE ROAD HOLE

A deal has been written about the famous Road Hole at St. Andrews, which has earned the sinister reputation of being the fiercest score-wrecker of the world. One of our gallant young Americans, Larry Nabholz, discovered for himself its deadly proclivities, in the qualifying round on the Old Course. I think it was Long Jim Barnes, a former British and American open champion, who was saying whimsically that he, Jim, had reached the Road Hole with a very good score in one round.

"Then, with two holes to play," said he, "I got into the road and stayed there about half an hour."

Jim could not have played so very many shots in the road, at that, because he finished very well up indeed. But J. H. Taylor, I was told, once used fifteen strokes on that hole in a championship. And, as set forth previously in this little series, I once saw Bobby Jones and Watts Gunn, in an inter-national foursome match, win it with a 7 against an 8 for Cyril Tolley and Andrew Jamison.

In his qualifying round at the Old Course, Larry Nabholz picked off an eagle 3 at the long and difficult fourteenth hole, a matter of 530 yards, and one of the toughest holes on the course. He is rated one of the biggest drivers ever seen in Britain. Many of the fans at St. Andrews regarded him as the longest hitter in the field. In this case he followed a good poke from the tee with a magnificent brassie to the green and had a putt of only two yards, which he holed for his eagle 3.

"Then I found how true is the saying at St. Andrews, that you have no prospects until the seventeenth is behind you," said Larry. "I played well and confidently at the fifteenth and sixteenth, and felt I was set for a fine low score, as I stood on the seventeenth tee. I decided to wallup the ball over the corner of the shed, cutting off the angle, and making it easier to shoot for the long green. I got the ball a little off the heel, and out of bounds it went. Playing 3 from the tee, I hit another one not too well, and I thought it went out of bounds also. I had one more ball in my pocket and my caddy was a couple of hundred yards down the course. I felt sort of dizzy. Here I was, playing 5 from the tee. And so I proceeded to knock that one out of bounds. This would make me play 7, and I began thinking about poor old Johnny McDermott, whose heart was broken because he knocked six out of bounds from the sixth tee at Muirfield, fifteen years ago. It seemed I could go on knocking them out as long as the supply of balls held out.

"I yelled for my caddy, and he yelled back that the second ball was from apoplexy. I had played 3, however, and messed up the rest of the hole, finally missing a putt of one yard and took an 8. It was a lesson to me. You really have very little idea what your round will be, until you stand on the last tee, at St. Andrews. And then you aren't sure."

Tunney is Six Pounds Over Weight

Speculator, N. Y., Aug. 30.—(AP)—Gene Tunney is fully six pounds over his best fighting weight—and glad of it.

A little more than three weeks from today the heavyweight champion must meet the challenge of Jack Dempsey, seeking to snatch back the crown which Tunney won at Philadelphia last fall. Only that extra weight, Tunney believes will permit him to drive at top speed through the next three weeks of intensive training and insure his entering the ring in Chicago Sept. 22, in the best physical condition of his career.

The marine weight 192 pound today, six more than when he previously fought Dempsey. The added weight, all on the upper part of the body, apparently has left power to his punches without taking toll in speed.

Little serious work is in prospect before the champion breaks camp Thursday to entrain for Chicago, and will join the local Piedmont League team for training at Southside Park next spring, according to announcement made by President J. F. Smithdeal.

This is the first contract offered by the Winston-Salem club for next season, while several more are expected soon.

Final Round For Tennis Title Be Played Today

New York Aug. 30.—(AP)—Sixteen year old Betty Nuthall, blond winsome English girl, making her first appearance in a National championship final and 21 year old Helen Wills, a veteran and three times American champion in spite of her youth, came to the final round today at Forest Hills in one of the most colorful tournaments ever held for the woman's tennis crown of the United States.

For the second time in forty years of tournament history the stars of Britain and America are bracketed for the decisive test but never before has there been a more interesting or picturesque contrast in the contestants. It is "Miss Poker Face", the dynamic hitter of women's tennis, against the "Bouncing Betty", the darling of Europe courts and skillful beyond her years; California Helen, cool selfposessed and imperturbable against the smiling, romping figure of the English girl.

Both have "punch" in their strokes almost masculine in severity but Miss Wills is unquestionably the harder hitter from the base line of forehand or backhand. Add to this her advantage of five years additional experience, triumphs in the Olympic games and at Wimbledon to three times victory at home and the steadiness that comes with such seasoning it gives an accurate picture of the Californian, ruled a two heavy favorite to carry off the crown for the fourth time.

Choice of Referee And Judges Remain Problem of Fight

Chicago. — Who will be the referee when Gene Tunney and Jack Dempsey crawl through the ropes in Soldier Field to battle for the world's heavyweight championship Sept. 22?

This is the biggest remaining problem in connection with the big fight. A referee and two judges must be chosen.

The selection of judges and the referee lies solely with the Illinois State Athletic Commission, and the identities of the three men will not be known until they show up at the ringside.

A dozen names stand out among those who have officiated in Chicago rings since boxing was legalized in Illinois last year, but the impression prevails that the commission may spring a last minute surprise and name a man not at present identified with the sport.

Among those who have officiated in Chicago shrdutaoinsrdununn in championship and other important bouts are Joe Choyinski, the old time heavyweight, Dave Barry, a former lightweight boxer, Phil Collins, referee of the Mandell-Kansas lightweight championship battle and Jimmy Gardner, a one-time welterweight champion and Davy Miller.

Choyinski, now 58 years old, is the "ace" of the commission's list of referees. He has handled more windups in Chicago than any other official. Although grey-haired, Choyinski remains lithe and limber and steps about with the agility of a youngster. His decisions have met with popular approval.

The task of the third man in the ring has been simplified somewhat since the commission started this year with a system of appointing two judges to vote with the referee on decisions. The referee has only one voice but he has the power to decide fouls and technical knockouts without considering the vote of the judges.

John C. Righelmer, chairman of the commission, has succeeded in interesting men prominent in business or professional lines to act as judges of ring contests. Judges of the municipal and superior courts have been drafted for duty.

The business of selecting a referee is no passing job with the world's heavyweight champion at stake. If the decision is a tight one the man who renders it, along with the two judges will need to have considerable more qualifications than a pair of white pants and a white silk shirt.

The referee must be a resident of the State.

R. R. FREIGHT RATE TOO HIGH

Carolina Shippers Asso. Files Complaint Against N. & S. on Sea Food Rate

Wilson, Aug. 30.—(AP)—W. L. Thornton, Jr., secretary and traffic manager of the Carolina Shippers' Association, Inc., has filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission, at Washington, D. C., a complaint against the Norfolk-Southern Railroad Company in regard to refrigerator car rental charges. The shippers on shipments of fresh fish, oysters, shrimp, scallops and other sea foods from Beaufort and Morehead City to other destinations.

Complaint in the case was filed with the Commission Saturday, and called attention to the fact that where defendant carrier furnishes refrigerator cars for the handling of the above mentioned commodities in straight or mixed carload, the points mentioned the per car rental charge will be assessed for use of refrigerator cars and will be in addition to the regular freight rates published and lawfully on file with the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The per car rental charge taxed the shippers by the carriers in \$12.50 per car per trip, the complaint alleges, regardless of whether the car is in the business of the car, body of the car, in packages, or on top of the packages in the car. The complaint also alleges that the imposition of the \$12.50 charge for the use of the cars in transportation of fresh fish in addition to the charges for ice is unjust and unreasonable and a violation of the Interstate Commerce Commission act.

Mr. Thornton commenting on the refrigerator charge case today, said: "We feel that it is an obligation of the carriers to furnish suitable equipment and they are compensated for it in the linehaul rate and that it is a duplication of charges to tax the shippers with a per car rental charge." He also stated that Beaufort and Morehead City shippers who are in competition with Norfolk, Va. shippers, are handicapped by the imposition of this rental charge which is not taxed the Norfolk shippers.

Half of Ashes Of Two Italians To Be Interred

Boston, Aug. 30.—(AP)—The ashes of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti, executed radicals will be divided into four parts, the Sacco-Vanzetti defense committee announced today. Half of the remains of each will be interred in a Malden Cemetery.

Miss Luigia Vanzetti, sister of the executed man will take half of his ashes and those of Sacco to Italy under this plan but its final approval must await her recovery from the collapse she suffered following the ordeal of Sunday's funeral procession.

Conflicting rumors as to the disposition of the ashes which included one to the effect that they were being held as security for the payment of the undertakers bill were dissipated by Joseph Langone, the undertaker.

Langone branded the story as "idiotic" and said that Gardner Jackson, of the defense committee, already had offered payment but he had told Jackson that there was no hurry and the bill could be met in due course.

Langone said he preferred to hold the ashes, which rest in two copper urns, until he had been specifically ordered to release them by either Mrs. Rose Sacco or Miss Vanzetti.

Proposals looking toward a tour of the country with the ashes have been definitely counted out. Miss Vanzetti vetoed the idea although Mrs. Sacco was reported to have been willing to give her consent.

Meanwhile the ashes repose in Langone's safe.

PUBLIC SENTIMENT
AND THE LAW

Judge W. C. Harris uttered a great truth in his charge to the grand jury yesterday, when he declared that law enforcement in any community was only as strong as was the public sentiment toward enforcement.

Just so long as citizens of our community countenance disobedience to the law and aid in the breaking of the law by trading with bootleggers and the like, just so

long will we have disregard for the law and a growing tendency to crime in our community. Every citizen has a duty to perform in connection with law enforcement, that of obeying the laws himself, and by his example teaching other to obey the law. As stated by Judge Harris, our community will be law-abiding when public sentiment demands it, and not before.

"Every civic organization in the city of Greenville is clamoring for commercial and industrial expansion," said a citizen to the writer of this column today, "but how in the world can they hope to grow and expand without sufficient homes to house the numbers of families coming here from time to time during the year?"

This citizen, like numbers of others, had had considerable trouble getting a home to rent. He advertised and walked from one part of the city to another in hope of getting some kind of house, but it was not to be had.

The remark brings up a problem which must be solved by Greenville business men if they expect to prosper in the future as they have in the past. There is no question but that an acute shortage of homes exists, and has existed for some little time. The question is, how are we going to improve the situation?

There are numbers of Greenville business men who would find building homes for rent a profitable investment. Numbers have already found this to be true, and there is no reason why building now would not yield richer returns than ever.

We want to build, but let's first build homes to take care of the newcomers, and then we shall be in position to go forward just as rapidly as we desire.

"Judge Harris was right when he told the grand jury that law enforcement is largely determined by the sentiment of a community," declared M. K. Blount, senior member of the firm of Blount & James, attorneys-at-law, in conversing with the writer today.

"Crime may be greatly reduced in any locality if the people are unreservedly in favor of law enforcement. Carelessness and indifference to flagrant violations by citizens of the various communities, is one reason why the courts are unable to more fully punish the violators."

"When a criminal knows that the public is indifferent to activities of the courts, he becomes bolder than ever in preying upon his victims. But let him know that sentiment is against him, and that the influence of that sentiment will be used against him in the courtroom, and nine times out of ten his tendency toward crime will not be quite so keen."

"Nearly every town in the country presents a prosperous appearance during the day," says C. P. Earhart, manager of the J. C. Penny Co. stores. "What do we look like after dark?"

"There is where many towns are getting ahead at the present time and making themselves known throughout the country."

"Much of the motor tourist travel reaches town after the stores are closed. It is the habit of the tourist to drive all day and then stop at the nearest town at the approach of dark."

"What buying he does is done in the morning before the start for the next day's run."

STOCK MARKET

AUSTRALIA DROWNS

Sydney, Australia.—(AP)—Australians say the easiest method of disposing of man-eating sharks is to drown them. The idea is an old one, conceived by sailors.

An enormous hook, baited with a large piece of horse flesh or beef, is used as bait in the shark-drowning trick. By means of a cable or chain this hook is attached to an anchored buoy.

The "line" is then set in the shark-infested waters which abound in various coast districts, and when the victim comes along it swallows the bait, hook and all. Then the shark will submerge the buoy for a time, the float tugging all the while endeavoring to come to the top and the shark tugging at the other end, trying for dear life to release himself. In time the shark is worn out and meets his fate by drowning down in the ocean depths in which he was so perfectly at home before he took the hook.

METALS OF TWO WARS

The main hall will be able to seat three thousand people. Besides this, there will be smaller ones accommodating five hundred and two hundred persons respectively. An interesting feature will be the foyer in which music publishers' shops will be installed. The "Home of Music" will also contain fifty or more music studios, each one of which will be phonetically isolated. The exterior will be simple but of lofty proportions.

A large linen shop near the place de l'Opera is advertising some of its latest models in linens. There is a "Chemise-culotte Thoiry," "Combination Briand," "Pyjama Paul Boncour," chemise de nuit Herriott, "Chemise de Jour, of water-green linen de fil," "Japanese Smulle" is a charming kimono and "Senate" is a silk jersey combination in green.

At Gennevilliers, near the capital is the well-lighted and ventilated building which is the refuge for all abandoned cats and dogs. It was founded in 1902 by James Gordon Bennett and has recently been enlarged and improved by Madame Camilla Du Gast. There is plenty of space for the little creatures to exercise and bury their bones and plenty of trees for the cats to climb. The present list of pensionnaires includes about 130 dogs and eighty cats.

BROWN DRAWS SENTENCE TO PENITENTIARY

Raleigh Negro Given Not Less Than Four Years on Charge of Robbing Safe Here.

Not more than eight, and not less than four years in the penitentiary, was the sentence meted out this morning to Kid Brown, Raleigh negro, found guilty in yesterday's session of the criminal term of Pitt county Superior court, on a charge of breaking in and robbing the safe at the office of the Greenville Ice & Coal Company several weeks ago. The jury returned the decision shortly before recess yesterday afternoon, but Judge Harris withheld sentence until this morning.

Brown is alleged to have taken in the neighborhood of \$1,000.00 from the safe of the local concern. He succeeded in evading capture for several days, but finally fell to the tools of the law during a trip to Raleigh.

While in the capital city, he is reported to have been "flushed" with coin. In fact, he had so much cash that he was induced to purchase half interest in a cafe. He is said to have had nearly three hundred dollars in his possession at the time, and paid \$100 of this amount as first payment in the cafe deal.

About the time Brown made an automobile trip to Greenville in company with a "dusky damsel." He was later arrested and given preliminary hearing.

Entrance to the office of the Greenville Ice & Coal Company was made from a window in front of the office. A drill was used in gaining entrance to the large safe. The robbery occurred some time in the early morning hours, and was discovered by a man who went to feed up stock on the premises.

One or two others were arrested in connection with the case during the investigation following Brown's arrest, but insufficient evidence to bring about complicity in the crime resulted in their release.

URGE SAVING OIL RESOURCE

Work Tells Bar Association of Need For Legislation in Oil Fields.

Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 30.—(AP)—The Federal Oil Conservation Board, called attention to the tremendous over-production of the Smackover and Seminole pools with its attendant waste of billions of feet of valuable gas, and pleaded for "constructive statesmanship to save an over-competitive industry from itself."

"What is needed," he declared, "is not government interfering with business nor business meddling with government, but government helping industry for its own and the public good."

Unless the industry is able to cooperate in the conservation program, the Secretary asserted, huge losses are inevitable.

The 12-month-old baby of Mrs. Lewis Swan, is being cared for at a local hospital.

The women told their story of being deserted by their husbands near Bassett, Va., to city probation Officer C. A. Watts and up to today no word had been received from their relatives.
