TWO PERSONS INJURED WHEN AIRPLANE CRASHED TO EARTH HERE YESTERDAY AFTERNOON

Miss Almetta Mallison And Pilot Jack Bellamy In Hospital As Result Accident.

Two persons are confined in a local hospital today suffering from injuries sustained late yesterday afternoon when an airplane in which they were riding, crashed to the earth in a field just south of the country club golf course.

Miss Almetta Mallison, Greenville young woman, sustained a broken jawbone, the loss of several teeth, lacerations on lower limbs and many bruises. Jack Bellamy, pilot of the plane, received a sprained ankle and several bruises. The plane was completely demolished.

The accident occurred following a flight over the city. The pilot had flown south of the landing field, and was making his last turn preparatory to descend, when for some unaccountable reason, the plane went into a tail spin at an altitude estimated at about 500 feet, and dropped to earth.

The terrific impact almost completely flattened the plane out, pinning the occupants beneath the wreckage. Persons who witnessed the accident from a distance rushed to the scene and were forced to cut their way through the wreckage before they were able to perfect a rescue.

The occupants were rushed to a local hospital where today they were reported to be getting along nicely. Jack Bellamy, pilot of the plane, has been in Greenville some little time. He has made numbers of successful trips over the city with passengers. Yesterday morning he brought a load of bright leaf tobacco to the Greenville market for a farmer residing in Bertie county.

Resume Trial Of Mrs. Willis

Greenville, S. C., Sept. 6.—(AP)—Interrupted yesterday by the illness of a defense attorney, the trial of Mrs. Ethel Willis and Henry Townsend, on charges of slaying the former's husband, sheriff Sam D. Willis, was resumed today, with the defense continuing its attack on the State's case of circumstantial evidence.

During the forenoon session yesterday, six defense witnesses were called to further establish facts concerning the actions of Mrs. Willis following the slaying of her husband. Yesterday morning he was brought to her home as he walked from his garage shortly after midnight, June 12th.

The defense sprang a surprise in yesterday's session in calling Miss Vela Keister, a roomer in the Willis home who had been summoned by the State. She testified that Mrs. Willis gave the alarm within two or three minutes after the shots were fired. State witnesses, including another lodger in the Willis home, had declared five minutes elapsed before Mrs. Willis made an outcry.

Under cross-examination, she testified to having seen Mrs. Willis and Townsend together in a dark-end automobile in front of the former's home a month before the shooting.

Other witnesses testified regarding the relations between the defendants, the actions of Mrs. Willis on the night of the slaying and one testified that he saw two women in the garage after the officer was slain. The State had sought to establish that a woman's footprint in the garage after the slaying belonged to Mrs. Willis.

Court was recessed at noon yesterday because of the illness of James H. Price, a defense attorney. The jurors who have been on the case twelve days were taken to a ball game during the afternoon, at the direction of the court.

TWO TRAINS REPORTED IN HEAD-ON COLLISION

Moncton, N. B., Sept. 6.—(AP)—The north and southbound Acadia trains, the Canadian National Railway's crack flier on the Eastern lines were reported today to have crashed head-on north of Riviere Du Loup, Quebec. All passengers and trainmen were said to have escaped injury.

VALLE CRUCIS BANK BANDIT ARRESTED

EXPRESS HOPE THAT REDFERN REACHED S. A.

Sighting of Plane by Norwegian Steamship Renews Hope For Young Flier.

New Orleans, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Renewed hope that Paul Redfern had reached the South American mainland was expressed here today with the relation of details of sighting the plane by officers of the Norwegian steamship Christian Krogh.

The ship was proceeding from Port Au Spain, Trinidad to Kingston, Jamaica, on August 26th. When the drone of the airplane motor was heard, officers said. The plane dipped to within healing distance and dropped a note enclosed in a round pasteboard box, they asserted.

A boat put off from the ship to retrieve the note, but before it had been recovered the flier had dropped and second and this was followed by a third. Each of the three requested that the ship be pointed toward the mainland and one of the messives asked that the distance be signalled the third note signed "Redfern, Thanks".

They complied with his request, officers said, pointing the ship westward and indicating to the flier that the nearest land 200 miles away. The flier circled about the ship for about fifty minutes before wheeling the plane in the direction they had indicated and sped away toward mainland.

At the time the flier was sighted officers said the ship was 165 miles east of the Venezuelan coast and 100 miles from the group of islands of which Cayo Grande and El Roque are the largest. On neither of these islands, they said, could the flier have obtained a new supply of gasoline had his been depleted.

Sir John Carling Plane Delayed

Harbor Grace, N. F., Sept. 6.—(AP)—The hop-off of the London to London plane Sir John Carling was postponed today until tomorrow morning. The flier, Captain Terry Tully and lieutenant Medcalf, decided to devote today to overhauling their plane, which arrived here yesterday from Caribou, Maine.

The Carling flew here yesterday afternoon from Caribou, Maine, where it had been forced down last Thursday, on the first day of its flight from London, Ont.

Local Club Also Decides to Hold Meeting at Fountain in The Near Future.

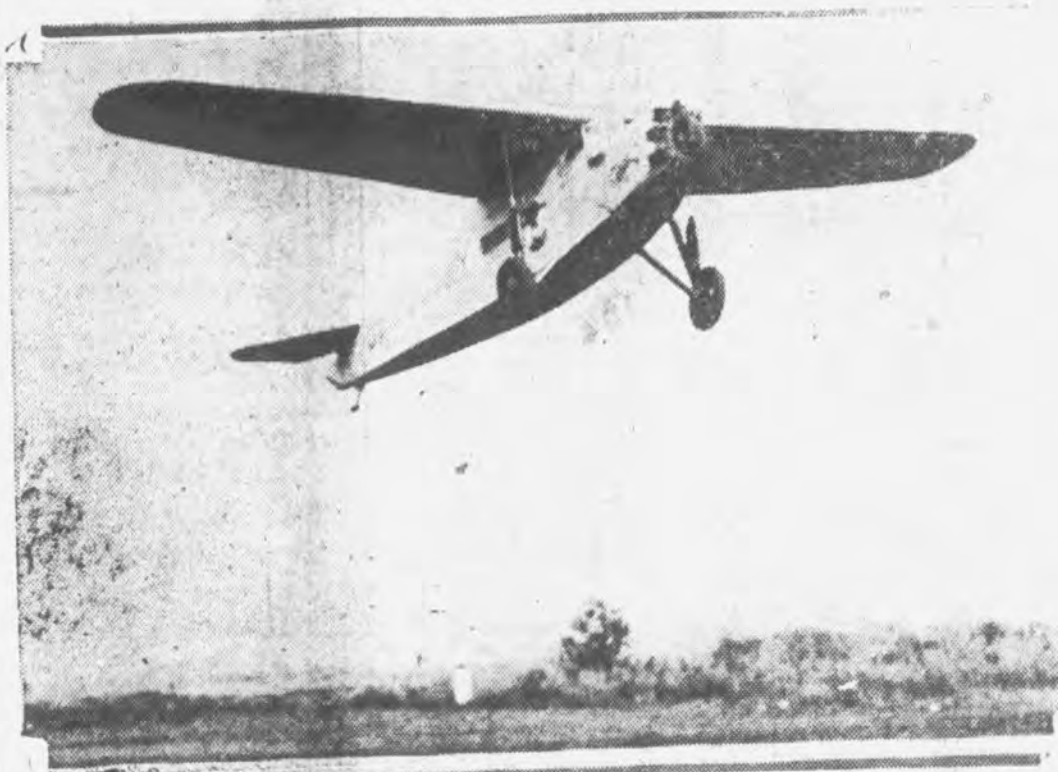

WORLD FLIERS REACH CALCUTTA, BRITISH INDIA

Calcutta, British India, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Forging steadily ahead in their endeavor to break the record for a voyage around the earth, William S. Brock and Edward F. Schlee, arrived here today from Allahabad. The trip made in 4 hours and forty minutes, added 485 miles to their log and put them 8,120 from their starting point, Harbor Grace, N. F., which they left on August 27th.

START ON LONG FLIGHT TODAY TO ROME, ITALY

Lloyd Bertaud and Two Others Take Air in Old Glory at Old Orchard, Me.

Old Orchard, Me., Sept. 6.—(AP)—Tossing a coin to determine who should have the hazardous task of taking the plane into the air, three men set forth today on a non-stop flight to Rome in the monoplane Old Glory.

James Dewitt Hill, by virtue of the luteal coin, was at the controls as the heavy ship rose from the beach. Lloyd Bertaud, relief pilot and Phillip Payne, New York editor and manager of the flight for William Randolph Hearst, its backer, were the other occupants.

The course to Rome was roughly 4,100 miles and the plane was expected to arrive about noon Thursday, Italian time, or 41 hours after the time of departure here, which was 1:23 p. m. Eastern daylight time.

A few minutes later the Old Glory was a speck on the horizon as she gained speed and altitude rapidly, with a helping wind of 15 miles from the southwest.

"Phil" Payne, representative of William Randolph Hearst, who is sponsoring the flight, was the last to enter the plane before the take-off. While Hill and Bertaud were climbing into the cockpit, he had raced back to kiss goodbye, once more his wife Dorothy.

Relatives and friends of all the fliers had gathered around the plane several hours before.

Last minute weather reports, which continued to be entirely favorable were given the men by James H. Scarr, of the New York weather bureau on the basis of telegraphic reports from both sides.

Scarr indicated that there was a light rain reported along the French coast but said there was a good chance that that would clear within the forty-odd hours, the flight is expected to take. The only bothersome point he said, was a low area some 2,000 miles from New Foundland.

Old Glory, Bath, Me., Sept. 6.—(AP)—Old Glory passed over the coast guard station at Popham Beach off the mouth of the Kennebec River, 40 miles east of Old Orchard at 1:45 Eastern Daylight time. The plane was flying low, in a northeasterly direction, apparently following the Maine coast.

200 STRIKERS RESUME WORK AT HENDERSON

Return of Workers at Textile Mills Reported to be Greater Than Yesterday.

Henderson, Sept. 6.—(AP)—About 200 striking textile workers were back at work at the Harriet Cotton Mills today, a few more than had returned yesterday since the strike began August 4.

Two explosions, early this morning, which like previous explosions, did no damage were reported to a sheriff's office today. They occurred in the open spaces and a hearing was held of an unnamed young man who told the police he had seen two persons running after the explosions. They occurred at one and two o'clock this morning.

About 800 employees went on strike a month ago, seeking a return of a bonus given employees some time before 1924 by the company officials to stimulate full time work in a period of pressure, the bonus, at that time, for fulltime work amounted to a 12-1/2 per cent increase over the workers' regular pay. The demands were met with a statement that conditions warranted no bonus at this time but that the regular wage scale would obtain. Nine eviction notices were drawn up and five of them served on "troublesome" strikers, the company officials reported.

One deputy reported that a few more had returned to work today yesterday. The explosion inquiry brought in a report that several sticks of dynamite also had been stolen last night from a construction company's operations.

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TO NAME TAX MAN SEPT. 28

Pitt County Commissioners to Consider Appointment at Special Session.

A special meeting of the Pitt County Board of Commissioners will be held Wednesday, September 28th, to consider the appointment of a tax collector and to receive a final report from Sheriff Whitehurst.

This decision was reached at the regular monthly session of the body held in the commissioners' rooms at the courthouse yesterday. Only matters of a routine nature were discussed at this session.

It was decided sometime ago to relieve the sheriff's office of the tax collection problem, and when the collector is named at the next meeting it will mean that his work will be conducted separately and distinctly from any other department.

Sheriff Whitehurst was to have turned in a complete report some time ago, but owing to the number of delinquent taxpayers, he was granted more time in which to make his collections.

ABOUT TWO MILLION POUNDS OF BRIGHT LEAF TOBACCO AT MARKET OPENING HERE TODAY

WHEELER DIES SUDDENLY AT BATTLE CREEK

Prices Averaged Around 20c During First Hour's Sale; Other Markets Open

With seven large warehouses filled from wall to wall with golden weed and trucks standing on the streets waiting to be unloaded, the Greenville tobacco market began its 1927 season promptly at 9 o'clock this morning.

Conservative estimates place today's total offerings at two million pounds, a record for this market. Today's offerings consisted mostly of primings with a scattering of tips. The price range was from four to 35 cents a pound with indications of an average between 18 and 20 cents based on the first hour's sales. The independents were the first buyers during the early sales.

Two piles of tobacco brought here yesterday by airplane from Bertie county, sold for \$1.01 and 65 cents a pound.

At eight-forty-five addresses of welcome and prayers of thanksgiving for the bountiful harvest of the year were delivered at the four warehouses booked for opening sales.

At the Center Brick warehouse the address of welcome was delivered by Hon. J. B. James. The prayer was made by Rev. L. R. O. Jones, pastor of the Immanuel Baptist church.

Mayor J. C. Lanier was the speaker at Forbes & Morton's, the prayer being offered by Rev. H. F. Jones, pastor of the Memorial Baptist church.

Judge Albion Dunn spoke at McGowan & Cannon's, and Rev. W. G. Harden, pastor of the Presbyterian church, offered prayer.

Hon. F. C. Harding was the speaker at Johnston's warehouse. Rev. L. B. Jones offered prayer. Each of the addresses literally vibrated with the spirit of the day.

For thousands of people living in this section of the country, tobacco town had been literally cluttered with every conceivable kind of vehicular conveyance since Sunday night, and when sales opened this morning, the warehouses were filled with a seething mass of humanity, elbowing, jamming, crowding its way to the part of the buildings where the shrill voices of the auctioneers droned out prices in rapid succession.

Traffic in the principal part of the city, however, have been excellent considering the great throngs of people that have crowded the city all day long. The police department began making arrangements for handling the crowds early yesterday morning, and only in the most congested parts of tobacco town was there the slightest bit of confusion in evidence.

Greenville has seen many an opening day of its tobacco market, but today, without a doubt, surpasses anything in history. More tobacco, more people, good prices, and greater interest have combined to give the occasion an important part in the minds of the countless thousands attending the opening sales.

Raleigh, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Clear skies brought a full attendance at the 58 warehouses in a score of eastern North Carolina bright leaf tobacco markets in opening today of the season's auctioneering of more than 400 million pounds of the weed, in production, value, and manufactured product of which the Old North State leads the nation.

All eyes and ears were turned to the first prices of the season, which last year averaged from 22 to 28 cents a pound on the September 7 opening, an increase over the previous year's initial prices.

From ten to fifteen million pounds were ready for today's opening sales, early reports from the leading markets indicated.

For the most part, the offerings of today were not the higher grades but a few isolated cases were on record as ready to sell high grades at 50 cents a pound. Today's average prices were conservatively predicted as around 20 cents although those close to the market said any average figure today—and for several days—would be a pure guess work, that 20 cents would be safe enough. General interest looked back to the record prices of 1919.

The first break of the season in the tobacco market towns drew its crowds of farmers weary from long nights of watching at the barns while the weed has been curing, but revived at the once again familiar sing-song of the tobacco auctioneer, eager to watch the advancing prices.

The contagion of prosperity had caught eastern North Carolina. Special newspaper editions had emanated from a number of market city news plants and the farm

Typhoid Fever on Increase

Since the first of January of this year, there have occurred in Pitt county, 44 cases of typhoid fever, with possibly 6 deaths following. Twenty-nine cases have developed since July 1. Without exception, these cases have occurred in people who have not been vaccinated against typhoid fever. Of all the people who need protection against typhoid, the husbands and fathers need it most. In most cases he is the wage-earner and sole support for the little ones, yet in several instances it is the husband and father who now has typhoid. It is no uncommon sight at a typhoid vaccination clinic to see a mother come up, walking, with possibly a baby in her arms and other small ones following. On inquiry she tells you that her husband is too busy to come to the clinic. He can't afford to have his arm sore for one day. At the present, 4 of these men have typhoid fever. One of them died last week. It isn't right to neglect so small a thing when it may mean so much to the family. The moral is, "Let every member of the family be vaccinated against typhoid every three years." If this were done, we would have no more typhoid.

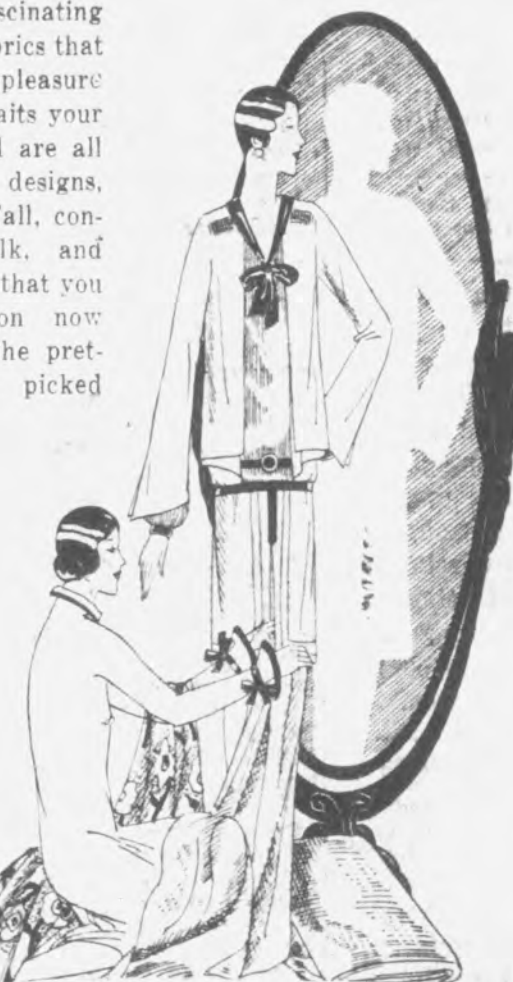

SMITH'S CHANCES

According to a Washington special to the New York World, Governor Smith's nomination for the Presidency by the Democrats next year is taken for granted in all the political figuring. When it was supposed that the President would again lead his party, Republican discussion of campaign strategy "always counted Smith as the other end of the problem," and now the tacticians of Dawes, Hoover, Lowden and the rest "are basing all their calculations on the hypothesis that it is Governor Smith they must meet." According to the World's news article, the results of the most recent survey among the Democrats throughout the country, made under "expert independent auspices," shows that if the Democratic convention were held now Smith would win with or without the two-thirds rule. It is admitted that a year from now, however, "because of the incitement to combine against the strongest candidate," the abrogation of the two-thirds rule might be necessary to nominate him. Nevertheless it is asserted that Smith counts his delegates by the hundreds while other candidates count them only by tens.

Whether this survey may be reliable or not, there is reason to conclude that once nominated, Governor Smith would poll many more votes than any other Democratic candidate named, in spite of the handicaps, real or supposed, presented by his religion and his liberal views on the prohibition question. Because of the latter he would attract many Republican votes, offsetting the possible defection of Democratic drys, and in all probability the Catholic vote would more than offset the vote against him dictated by religious prejudice.

Roxboro, N. C., Sept. 5.—(AP)—Throwing of a switch at the Carolina-Virginia state line near here today completed the final link in which Carolina Power and Light Company officials said is the world's greatest inter-connection of electric generations totaling more than ten million horsepower.

The Raleigh-Roanoke transmission line is the final link connecting about three million horsepower large

Hydro-Electric plants, in the southern states, with steam generated electric power stations in the north of more than seven million horsepower.

This line directly connects the Carolina Power and Light Company with the American Gas and Electric Company system. The North Carolina portion of the new link was completed several days ago with the building of the line to the Virginia border. Today's operations completed the American Gas and Electric Company's part. The new line is carried on steel towers and operates 132,000 volts.

"This inter-connection will be a considerable economic advantage to all the communities and industries in the territories served, reaching as far south as Mobile, Ala., and as far west as Chicago."

The mills of the south will be protected as never before against possible power shortage on account of low water. A Carolina Power and Light Company statement read.

DAUGHTER OF PETTY TO BE HELD IN JAIL

**Mrs. Alma Gatlin Will
Be Held For January
Court Without Privi-
lege Bail.**

Reidsville, N. C., Sept. 6.—(AP)—Mrs. Alma Petty Gatlin, charged with the murder of her father R. Smith Petty, will be held in jail without privilege of bail until the January term of court, it was indicated today. The preliminary hearing was tentatively set for this morning but Solicitor Allen H. Gwyn stated that defense counsel had intimated their client would waive preliminary hearing. In any event the solicitor said, the hearing would not take place today as additional evidence in the case was being developed.

While authorities worked on clues which were expected to weave the chain of evidence more tightly about the bride of two months, and perhaps to bring an accomplice in the murder definitely into the case, Mrs. Gatlin, from her cell in the county jail at Wentworth continued to deny her guilt and to characterize the confession attributed to her by the Rev. E. F. Pardue as false. She stoutly maintains her innocence. It was said and has not lost her sprightly manner. Officials today were working on the theory that the girl had an accomplice in committing the crime. There was some talk also of exhuming the body of the girl's mother, who died several weeks ago, but no definite move toward this end had been made. Some doubt exists, it was reported in official circles, as to the exact cause of the mother's death and determination of this may aid in solving the intricacies of the murder case.

MARKET OPENING HERE TODAY**

Woman was planning improvements at the home, made possible by sale of the golden weed.

Auctioneers made their rounds

from one warehouse to another, followed by the small army of buyers, representing practically all the big tobacco companies of the nation, doubly intent this year, due to federal figures showing the record breaking consumption of the cigarette for the North Carolina weed is largely grown.

There were busy scenes, too, on the farms along the roads leading to the tobacco centers. Wilson, the world's largest market, which last year alone sold 61,825,130 pounds from its seven warehouses; Greenville, Kinston, Rocky Mount, Farmville, all selling more than ten million pounds each. Laborers were cutting the leaves and piling them into the covered wagons and trucks.

The Williamston market, which last year sold six million pounds pointed to one of the largest openings ever experienced, with more than two acres of floor space.

Goldboro's three warehouses with their 150,000 square feet, was filled with tobacco piles, to break the record of five million pounds sold last year. The Washington, Tarboro, Smithfield, Robersonville, New Bern, Wallace, Enfield, Abbeville, Windsor, and Warraw markets were also active.

With the markets opening at 9 a. m., the first three hours found floor men unable to accurately estimate the total, but warehouse managers maintained they had noticed improvement in the grading over last season.

Ribbons of asphalt throughout eastern Carolina accelerated the movement of the last few days on to the markets while barbeques and clear skies gave the annual holiday aspect to the occasion.

Meanwhile sets of auctioneers had started their sing-song simultaneously over the belt, and the weed, in thousands of piles, in the 60 odd warehouses, was moved at the rate of hundreds of thousands of pounds an hour, the bright leaf hauled to the re-drying plants almost as rapidly as it was bid off. Millions of dollars of the put into circulation as the golden harvest flowed into the markets.

Tarboro, Sept. 6.—(AP)—A total of 350,000 pounds of tobacco was offered on opening day here today, the largest amount in local history. Prices for lower grades ranged about the same as in 1926, while prices for good grades were lower.

Rocky Mount, Sept. 6.—(AP)—With more than a million pounds

of tobacco on the local market for opening sales, tobaccoists estimated here this morning, after the sales had been underway for several hours, that prices for tobacco would average well around \$24 for the opening day.

Every available inch of floor space in the seven Rocky Mount warehouses was crowded to capacity and several buyers were in very strong competition for tobacco.

First primings made up the volume of first day offerings with the China American, Liggett and Myers, American, and several independent companies bidding down the largest amount of tobacco.

As fast as tobacco is moved off the floors following sales, additional piles of tobacco are being unloaded, weighed, and prepared for the sales tomorrow morning.

Thousands of people are in the city for the opening of the market. Additional traffic police are on duty at several corners of tobacco town, and parking space is difficult to find, as tobacco wagons and trucks are still overflowing the streets waiting to be unloaded.

Farmers are in an optimistic mood as their first offerings are being knocked down for excellent prices.

R. J. Reynolds is the strongest buyer for tobacco of the higher grades, although other companies are bidding for the best grades.

Sales, at the rate they are going now, will last throughout the day before the tobacco on the local floors is cleared off. Farmers are awaiting the end of sales today to load tons more for record second day sales tomorrow.

New Bern, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Indications today are that the floors of both warehouses will be filled to capacity for the opening sales of the New Bern tobacco market tomorrow.

The weed started coming in Monday, while this morning it contin-

ued to arrive in large quantities. The best season in the history of the New Bern market is indicated. Other markets of the eastern bright belt opened today, but the season here will not start until Wednesday, the local market always opening one day behind others of the belt.

Wilson, Sept. 6.—(AP)—The Wilson tobacco market opened the official 1927 sales season this morning at nine o'clock with offerings of the bright golden weed exceeding two and a half million pounds. The floors of the seven mammoth warehouses were filled to capacity before dark yesterday evening but a steady stream of vehicles bearing the precious golden leaf continued to roll into the city during the entire night and this morning the storage rooms of the warehouses were being filled with the weed which will be placed on the sales floor as soon as space is available.

Indications today were that the daily sales record of 1,429,000 pounds would be shattered before the sales stopped this afternoon as five complete sales forces started to work on the vast amount of the weed offered for sale in as many warehouses at the same time. Block sales were expected in at least four of the warehouses in which the sales started this morning.

Thousands of farmers, tobaccoists and visitors thronged the city today. Vehicular traffic was as dense as Wilson has ever known it to be and the crowds milling about the warehouse section reminded one of the great crowds attending a State Fair.

Vendors and motorists shouting their wares from soap boxes on the sidewalks near the warehouses lent color to the greatest tobacco sales

opening the local market has ever experienced.

Warehousemen were confident that prices paid for the leaf would be higher than the prices prevailing on the border markets this year the quality of the weed offered by the growers today is far superior to that offered a year ago when exceptionally high prices were paid for the common grades of tobacco.

A range of prices could not be ascertained this morning as the sales started.

Williamston, Sept. 6.—Total offerings on the local tobacco market today will reach over a third of a million pounds, a record opening for this market. The average price based on unofficial figures for the first two hours sales, indicate an average of about \$20.70 per hundred pounds.

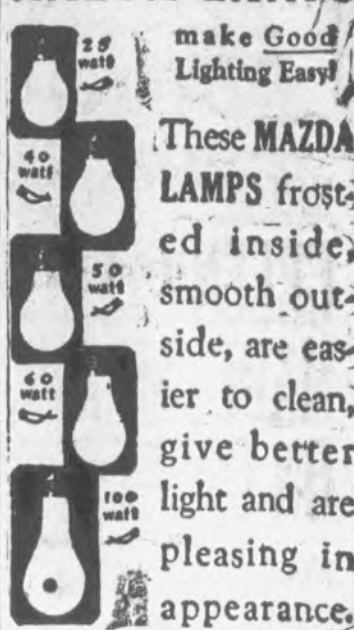
