Greensboro, N. C., Sept. 7.-(AP) -For the first time in the history of North Carolina so far as could be learned the machinery of a municipality was put in motion today to bring about a recall election of a majority of its council.

Acting on petition by slightly more than one fourth of the qualified voters of the city of Greensboro, the city council yesterday afternoon set Sept. 26 as the date of an election to determine whether four of the seven councilmen elected four months ago shall be displaced for alleged failure to per form their public duties in a manner pleasing to the citizens. Today city officials were busy arranging for advertisement of the recall alec tion and for registration of additional voters between now and the election date. The city council will meet this afternoon to name judge of the election and other officials.

The recallists seek to displace Mayor E. B. 
