PANAMA PULLS SENSATION AT GENEVA TODAY

Announcement of Dispute with United States Causes Considerable Surprise.

Geneva, Switzerland, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Panama's public presentation to the League of Nations assembly of the details of her dispute with the United States concerning the sovereignty of the Canal Zone has caused something of a sensation here.

It has distinctly created the impression that the Latin-American countries will not only air at Geneva political problems arising among themselves but also those which directly affect the United States.

Panama appealed to the United States to accord her satisfaction in her claim that complete sovereignty over the canal belt has not been abandoned by cession of special administrative rights there, but it is remarked here both by Europeans and Americans that she made this appeal through the medium of the League.

At the initial meeting of the League council's present session, Enrique Villegas of Chile, as president, made it clear that he saw no reason why Latin-American political questions could not be handled at Geneva, hence Panama's action has caused the belief that this policy now is being inaugurated.

Addressing the assembly Saturday evening Dr. Eusebio Morales, Panamanian foreign minister, suggested that the sovereignty dispute with America be submitted to an impartial court of justice, by which it was inferred he meant the world court. He said that Panama "naturally clings to the League of Nations because the league protects weak nations and favors the submission of international disputes to judicial settlement."

Washington, Sept. 12 (AP)—The flat declaration that the question by the United States of sovereignty over the Panama Canal Zone was not in dispute with the government of Panama, was made today at the State Department.

The question was raised by a statement Saturday to the assembly of the League of Nations by Dr. Eusebio Morales, Panamanian representative, that the sovereignty dispute over the zone might form a subject for arbitration. Secretary Kellogg was represented today as having no knowledge as to the basis upon which Dr. Morales' statement was made. It was said that the view of the State Department of the treaty with Panama was that it granted to the United States the right to exercise in the zone all the powers of sovereignty.

In connection with the new treaty with Panama which has not been ratified, it was said that Panama had not submitted any request for modification and so far as the United States was concerned, the treaty was still before the Panamanian Congress. It was added that the League of Nations had no jurisdiction whatever over American control of the canal zone and would have none.

Although under the existing treaty the Washington government had complete authority to exercise all the rights of a sovereign in the zone, it was added that in the treaty awaiting ratification the United States had agreed not to set up in the canal zone commercial establishments to which the government of Panama had expressed objection.

Dr. Cook Asks For Decision of Supreme Court

Washington, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Dr. Frederick A. Cook, the Arctic explorer today petitioned the Supreme Court to decide whether the Federal District Court for northern Texas, in which he was convicted of using the mails to defraud, had authority to place him on probation.

Sentence November 21, 1923, to fourteen years and nine months at Leavenworth, Dr. Cook asked the District Court recently to place him on probation under a law providing for such clemency but which was enacted after he began serving his sentence. The District Court granted his request over the objection of the government which contended that the act was unconstitutional and that the court had lost control in the matter because he had commenced serving his sentence. The circuit court of appeals reversed the district court.

In asking the Supreme Court to review the case, Dr. Cook asserted that the circuit courts, of the sixth, seventh and ninth circuits had taken a different view, holding that trial courts could place on probation prisoners who had started serving their terms and that similar rulings had been made by numerous district courts.

THREE FLIERS STILL INTEND TO CROSS SEA

Planes Remain in Trans-Atlantic Adventure Despite Four Withdrawals.

New York, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Notwithstanding failure of search of the monoplane Old Glory, and the withdrawal of four other projected flights, three planes today remained in the trans-Atlantic air adventure.

Miss Frances W. Grayson, Long Island student aviator, said she intended to fly to Europe with a pilot and navigator in a Sikorsky amphibian plane, while Miss Ruth Elder at Tampa and Captain Robert MacIntosh, at Dublin, reiterated their determination not to be dissuaded from attempting their overseas hops.

Captain Anthony Wreford withdrew as co-pilot for MacIntosh, and from Paris came word of the cancellation by Lieut. Paul Tarascon of his plan to fly to America. To these were added the definite withdrawals of Charles A. Levine and Capt. Frank T. Courtney from the trans-Atlantic lists.

The Westminster Gazette, backer of Courtney's flight, announced abandonment of the project until next year notifying the airman at Corunna, Spain, that he was released from the adventure, and made plans for a round-the-world flight in 1928. Captain Hinchliffe, Levine's pilot, said he had decided to start eastward on an endurance flight Wednesday or Thursday, with Karachi, India as his probable destination.

The monoplane Royal Windsor, in which Phil Wood and A. C. (Duke) Schiller had planned a trans-Atlantic flight is at Harbor Grace, New Foundland, awaiting favorable weather for a return flight, to Old Orchard, Me. They have decided not to fly the Atlantic. Captain Rene Fonck, French ace, whose trans-Atlantic plans received a setback when the Navy Department canceled leave of absence of two of his crew, Lieut. Lawrence Martin and Ensign Stephen Edwards, from New York cabled the French government in order to learn its attitude on his flight, before announcing definite abandonment of his expedition.

While the projected flights were being abandoned the search for the Old Glory was carried on in the North Atlantic by the steamer Kyle, chartered by the New York Mirror, of which Phil Payne passenger on the plane, was managing editor.

Through high-running seas the Kyle ploughed toward the point 500 miles off New Foundland where the Old Glory was believed to have gone down after sending S. O. S. calls early last Wednesday morning. No trace of the plane was found.

The futile search of the liners Transylvania, Carmania and Lapland was described by masters of these vessels when they reached New York. The captains said the airplane could not have been kept afloat more than half an hour.

The possibility that the Old Glory had attempted to explain its difficulties by radio before flashing an SOS was indicated in the story of Charles Kaid, second radio officer of the Lapland. He said that for more than an hour he heard long dashes which he believed came from the plane.

Seven Charged With Conspiracy In Liquor Case

Norfolk, Va., Sept. 12.—(AP)—Warrants were issued here today charging seven men found Saturday night aboard the liquor laden motor-ship Dart of Newark, N. J., with conspiracy to violate the prohibition law. Coast guard officials said they had information that 415 cases of liquor was thrown overboard before capture of the Dart with 150 cases on board.

The patrol boat sighted the Dart while trying to assist an Italian steamer which went ashore near Cape Henry. The Dart started for the open sea with the CG-233 in pursuit. After the capture she was brought into port and is now being held pending disposition of the cases in court.

Names of the men under arrest are given in the warrants as Henry Wilson, Joseph Bailey, James Ward, George Palmer, Joseph McKelley, George Olson and James Macenellis.

AMERICAN GIRL HOPS OFF FOR WHEELING, WVA

Plane Bearing Ruth Elder and George Haldeman Left Tampa at 7:11 Today.

Tampa, Fla., Sept. 12.—(AP)—After a thorough warm-up, the monoplane American Girl, with George Haldeman at the controls, and Miss Ruth Elder, pretty young aviator, in the co-pilot's seat, hopped off at 7:11 a. m., eastern standard time, today for Wheeling, W. Va., accompanying Haldeman and Miss Elder were Ed Cornell, of Winter Haven, and Thomas H. McCord, of Lakeland.

Haldeman said that their flight to Wheeling would probably take from nine to eleven hours, depending on conditions and winds. After a stop in Wheeling to consult backers of a projected New York to Paris flight, the girl and her co-pilot and navigator will proceed to Roosevelt Field, by Thursday, and will take off as soon after that as possible.

Tampa, Fla.—The fliers expected to remain until Wednesday or Thursday in Wheeling, after which they will proceed to Roosevelt Field, New York, and await a favorable day for the Atlantic attempt. Apparently undeterred by the failure of similar expeditions, Miss Elder today reiterated her determination to be the first woman to cross the Atlantic by air and expressed extreme confidence in the venture as she climbed into the pilot cabin beginning the nine hour flight to West Virginia.

Haldeman's route to Wheeling will take him over Lakeland, Fla., Jacksonville, Columbia, S. C., New York, N. C., Richmond, Va., Mrs. Haldeman, the aviator's wife, his father and sister were among the Lakeland throng to wish them bon voyage. They will not see him again before he begins his trans-Atlantic hop, they said.

E. Cornell, of Winter Haven, and T. H. McCord, of Lakeland, accompanied the fliers as passengers to the West Virginia City.

Italian Consul Shot to Death In Paris Today

Paris, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Count Carlo Mardini, Italian vice-consul here, was shot and killed today by an unidentified assailant. The assailant believed to be an Italian, sought the count in his room at the consulate and fired three times without warning.

The assailant was arrested but refused to give his name or motive for the crime.

OPPOSE SPECIAL SESSION CONGRESS

Washington, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Returning to his desk in the White House after his summer vacation in South Dakota President Coolidge today was greeted with the opposition of the Republican leaders of the Senate and house to a special session of Congress or of the Senate alone.

MR. COOLIDGE BACK AT DESK IN WASHINGTON

President Tackles Important Business Sidetracked During His Vacation.

Washington, Sept. 12.—(AP)—President Coolidge was back at his desk today to tackle an accumulation of important business he sidetracked pending conferences here with government and congressional leaders.

Mr. Coolidge showed no sign of fatigue from the two days' railroad journey of 1,900 miles from South Dakota, which he completed last night.

In a series of conferences arranged for the next few days, the President hopes to reach decisions on the following:

Necessity of an early special session of Congress or of a special session of the Senate.

Appointments of ambassadors to Mexico and Cuba.

Selection of a successor to the late Leonard Wood as Governor General of the Philippine Islands.

In addition, he will start soon in the preparation of his message to Congress which involves declarations by him on farm relief and proposed relief in the Mississippi River flood area. Although living in the heart of the agricultural country this summer, Mr. Coolidge has persistently declined to comment in any way on the controversial farm relief problem.

A more immediate question holding his attention today was the problem of finding funds for repairing the Mississippi River levees for which Comptroller General McCarl has declined permission of the unexpended money of the rivers and harbors appropriation.

Secretary Hoover, director of flood relief, had recommended immediate use of the funds and it was understood the President favored this course.

This, along with the report of engineers on proposed control of the Mississippi, is expected to be involved in the discussion he will have with congressional leaders concerning a special session.

It also is anticipated that some of the numerous callers who will come to the White House in the near future will be anxious to learn more from the President regarding his famous announcement of the summer that he did not choose to run for President in 1928.

Since making that declaration, Mr. Coolidge has seen few of his official family nor his political confidant, William M. Butler, chairman of the Republican National Committee. Mr. Butler is expected in Washington soon.

REFUSE INJUNCTION AGAINST DEMPSEY

Chicago, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Judge Ootto Kerner, in Circuit Court today refused to stop the Dempsey-Tunney fight here September 22, when he denied an injunction to restrain Jack Dempsey from boxing until he carried out an alleged contract with the Coliseum Club of Chicago to fight Harry Wills, negro heavyweight.

While Dempsey was getting out of court proceedings Tunney was becoming entangled in legal matters. Thomas M. McHale, of New York, who said he was Tunney's social secretary last year at a salary of \$15,000 filed suit against the world's heavyweight champion for \$15,000 alleging breach of contract.

McHale asserted that he acted as business secretary and confidential adviser to the champion until Tunney decided to engage Eddie Egan, former Yale athlete, in the same capacity. As a result McHale figured he was deprived of \$15,000 yearly salary.

FOUR OF FIFTEEN BALLOONS OF BENNETT TROPHY CLASSIC BELIEVED STILL IN THE AIR

1,500,000 Pounds Of Bright Leaf On Local Market

There was about 1,500,000 pounds of tobacco on the local market today, according to information made public this afternoon by K. W. Cobb, secretary of the Tobacco Board of Trade. The price situation was reported to be about the same as last week. The day's offerings included a quantity of tips, which it was said, would do much towards boosting the day's average.

Three Other Bags Reported Seen in Carolina and Eight Made Safe Landings

Detroit, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Four of the 15 balloons entered in the Gordon Bennett international trophy race still were unreported this morning more than forty hours after leaving the Ford airport here Saturday afternoon, and officials of the event were inclined to believe that all of the bags were still in the air. Three others were reported seen last night in the Carolinas and eight have reported safe landings.

GLOBE FLIERS FORCED BACK BY ELEMENTS

Pride of Detroit, However, will Attempt 600 Mile Hop to Tokyo Tomorrow.

Omura, Japan, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Edward F. Schlee and William S. Brock, co-pilots of the world's monoplane Pride of Detroit, world-monoplane Pride of Detroit, told the Associated Press here today that they firmly expected to fly from Japan to mid-way Island, then to Honolulu and on to San Francisco, soon.

Tokyo, Sept. 12.—(AP)—The plans of Edward F. Schlee and William S. Brock, for their next step in their round the world flight remains unknown here today, but there was growing tendency to regard their projected hop from Japan to Midway Island, half way across the Pacific as suicidal.

Advice from Omura today said the American fliers were undecided on whether to attempt the flight to Midway Island. It was the opinion of Japanese fliers that such an undertaking would be plain suicide, and that any attempt to cross the Pacific by following the Kurile and Loutian Island chain northward would be most hazardous. The advice said Brock and Schlee were expecting to take-off for Kasumigaura again tomorrow, weather permitting. The flying time from Omura is five to six hours.

Tokyo, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Forced back to Omura, near Nacasaki, on the southwestern coast of the Japanese archipelago, the American round-the-world fliers, William S. Brock and Edward F. Schlee, plan to attempt the 600 mile flight to Tokyo tomorrow.

They hopped off from Omura in their monoplane, The Pride of Detroit, at 7:20 o'clock this morning (Japanese time), but ran into a storm which forced them to return. Their goal here is the Kasumigaura airfield, near the capital.

Brock and Schlee descended at Omura yesterday at 3:45 p. m., with depleted gasoline supply after straying off their course while trying to make Tokyo from Shanghai, China.

They passed over the East China Sea safely, but strayed from their course upon encountering a thunderstorm which prevented them from getting their bearings to cross the Bungo Channel.

Lita Gray Chaplin Visits New York

New York, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Mrs. Lita Gray Chaplin was visiting New York for the first time today, with matrimony set for ever behind her and a vaudeville career under consideration.

"I have had enough to last me the rest of my life. Never again."

"Never is a long time," interposed Mrs. Lillian Spicer, mother of the girl who became the comedienne bride at eighteen "she is young, yet you must remember."

Of the eight balloons which have reported safe landings, in the Wallonia, Belgian entry, piloted by Lt. Philippe Quersin and Lt. Maurice Theis. It was believed to have made the best distance. The Wallonia landed at Greenville, S. C., the Brandenburg, German entry, piloted by Dr. Reinhold Hailer and Hugo Kaulen, Jr., made the shortest flight, having been forced down on Sugar Island in Lake Erie. Four bags after the start, when the valves failed to function properly.

The other balloons landed were, the Belgica, Belgian, at Florence, S. C., the Paris-Bruxelles, French entry, at Dunn, N. C., and the Army balloon at York, S. C., the Dux, Italian, at Newbury, S. C., and the Bee, British, at Randolph, Va.

Detroit, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Of the bags officially reported landed, the Belgica has made the best distance according to Ray Cooper, general manager of the race, who is compiling the records of the various pilots. Reports that a white balloon, unidentified, had been sighted over Sandersville, Ga., headed in a south easterly direction, led the committee here to believe that E. J. Hill, pilot of the Detroit, United States entry, was leading the race, with the best chances for victory. Hill's balloon was the only white bag in the race. If it has been sighted in Georgia, according to Cooper, the chances of victory for the American entry are good, as the wind currents are favorable in that part of the country.

The entries which have not been reported are the Lafayette, France; the Rex, Italy; the Munster, Germany; and the Barmen, Germany. There has been no definite report from the Detroit, Hill's entry.

Greenwood, S. C., Sept. 12.—(AP)—An unidentified balloon passed over Greenwood at 10:15 o'clock this morning. It was flying very high.

Detroit, Sept. 12.—(AP)—The Italian balloon Dux, piloted by Lt. Col. Domenico Leone, and the English balloon Bee, with Captain G. F. Meager as pilot, entrants in the Gordon Bennett trophy race, landed safely last night, according to messages from the pilots received today.

The Dux landed 10 miles east of Newbury, S. C., and the Bee came to earth near Randolph, Va.

J. J. Hathaway Died Yesterday

J. J. Hathaway, 83, died at his home in Belvoir township Sunday morning about 9 o'clock, following long illness. Funeral services were conducted from Gum Swamp Church, of which the deceased was a member, this afternoon at 2 o'clock by Rev. E. B. Joyner, of Saratoga, burial following in Hathaway graveyard.

Mr. Hathaway is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Annie Joyner; one brother, Bill Hathaway; and two sisters, Mrs. Palina Riddick and Mrs. Puss Shelton, all of Pitt County.

The deceased was a Civil War veteran. He was highly esteemed in the community where he resided for so many years.

PENNANT RACE IN NATIONAL TIGHTENS UP

Further changes had been effected today in the bunched race among four clubs for the National League pennant, once again the fourth place club is only two and one half games away from the leader.

Hopes of the world's champion Cardinals flamed anew as the club whipped Brooklyn and climbed into a tie for second place, and the Giants, matching that pace, will invade the mound city tomorrow for what may be considered an elimination series.

Fred Frankhouse, a rookie hurler from Houston, pitched St. Louis to a 5-0 win over Brooklyn yesterday. He let the Robins down with four hits. It was his second successive victory in the majors.

Hack Wilson's 26th homer of the season started Chicago off toward a 7-5 defeat of the Giant. Virga, Barnes blew up in the sixth and the Bruins put over a half dozen runs. Hal Carlson was in trouble in the fifth but the Cub infield staged a rally after the Giants had put across three runs.

Cincinnati captured both ends of a double-header from Boston, the scores being 8-4 and 16-5. Pittenger led the Cincinnati attack in the second game with four hits out of five attempts. Purdy, Coast League out-fielder with the Reds, collected six hits out of the double-header.

The Yanks were two games removed from the American League pennant today. After having beaten the St. Louis Browns 21 times in succession the Hughes fell before Milt Gaston's tight pitching 6-2. Gaston granted only five hits, one being Babe Ruth's 50th homer of the year. The Babe is now five up on Lou Gehrig.

New York added another record in yesterday's game, nevertheless, Ruth's homer brought the team total to 141, one better than the season mark made by the Chicago White Sox of 1884.

Blue's double and Hay's single in the 12th gave Washington a 6-5 win over the Chicago White Sox. Judge opened the 12th with a triple but Stewart, who ran for him, was declared out after crossing the plate on a sacrifice, for leaving third before the catch. The Senators worked four pitchers, Lisensky working the last three innings. Lyons was charged with the defeat. The Sox were out-hit 16 to 11.

University of North Carolina was faced with the threat of Wake Forest before it, always a menacing foe. For three years straight the Deacons have sent the Blue and White mack to the gymnasium on the short end of the score. The game is set for September 21.

In another serious game of that date Arkansas Razor Backs were scheduled to meet Ole Miss.

The following Saturday holds a much that fourteen of the conference teams stand a chance of making a loss almost at the start. Twelve of them play between themselves, while Kentucky and Washington and Lee are faced with strong intersectional opponents.

The games are: Georgia vs. Virginia. South vs. Maryland. Kentucky vs. Indiana. Georgia Tech vs. V. M. I. Washington and Lee vs. West Va. Auburn vs. Clemson. Ole Miss vs. Tulane. Tennessee vs. North Carolina. In preparing for these eight games the coaches will be bent to their utmost.

As all carry great potential possibilities and probably considerable bearing on the eventual conference championship.

All of these games are stand-out ones, the teams having met before some of them many times. Especially is this the case in the Auburn-Clemson game at Clemson. These two teams of Tigers date their Athletic Rivalry well back into the early stages of this century. The Georgia-Virginia game is another that has been among the classics in southern football for years.

LIBRARY NEWS

(Library Hours: 2 p.m. to 3 p.m.)

With the growth in the number of readers outside of Greenville in Pitt county, we are changing our slogan of "Let the Library Serve Greenville" to "Let the Library Serve Pitt County."

The past year has been marked by an increase of 622 members for the year, there now being 1938 readers enrolled. Book circulation has increased from about 75 a day last year, to the present average of 100 and over a day. The library has responded to over 900 calls for reference material to be used in the library aside from the material taken out for reference work.

The library has received some very valuable gifts during the year. One is the special shelf of books given by the End of the Century club in honor of Mrs. W. A. Bowen, who gave 13 years of service to the library from 1906 to 1919. Not only on the highways but even on our city streets, animal drawn vehicles continue to appear after dark without lights. There is a law against such dangerous practice and it should be rigidly enforced.

It would appear that the great majority of mankind, who have inherited a quite contrary opinion, still have inherited a quite contrary opinion, still have much to learn.

THE LEGION IN FRANCE

A special medal is to be struck by the French authorities in commemoration of the visit of the American Legion, and forty French cities are preparing to welcome the "comrades in arms" from across the Atlantic. In concluding his exhortation to his countrymen to honor the visiting Legionnaires Marshal Foch declared that "it is difficult to conceive of a greater loyalty to the past and solidarity in faith than this attachment to an ideal common to the two nations." General Pershing is quoted as saying that the visit of the men of the American Legion in France will be "the greatest good will pilgrimage that ever took place." What else could it be, asks the New York Times, "when 15,000 American veterans march to the Arc de Triomphe to decorate the grave of the Unknown Soldier; when the Americans repair to the graves of their own dead so carefully tended by the French; when General Pershing and Commander Savage aid Premier Poincaré in dedicating the Ossuaries of Fort Douaumont, where the bones of 300,000 French soldiers who fell in heroic defense of Verdun are gathered together; when French and American soldiers mingle as brothers in arms?"

What else, indeed? The doubt expressed has been based only on exceptional and scattered occurrences during the past year or two, for which inconsiderate American tourists were as much, possibly more, to blame than irritated Frenchmen. Undoubtedly there will be "a national manifestation worthy of a great people," such as the Paris editors call for and predict, and the American Legion will receive a welcome long to be remembered.

About Town

With the opening of the Tobacco market city schools and soon the East Carolina Teachers College, Greenville begins to assume old-time form, remarked one of the old-timers as he walked around over warehouse floors of the tobacco market today.

"The tobacco market and the schools are great assets to this city of ours. Both have their separate and distinct missions. One without the other would make community life seem like something was missing."

"We advertise that we have the best schools in the state. No one doubts that. We don't have to advertise that the Teachers College is one of the best in the country, because people are talking that everywhere. The real greatness of the institution is beginning to be appreciated by men and women of other districts even as it is in Greenville and Pitt county. It is bound to grow, because it is doing a work we simply can't do without."

"Where the schools are giving its prominence in an educational way, the tobacco market is winning a prominent place in commerce and industry. It is one of the greatest industries in Eastern North Carolina and as time passes will become even greater."

"Boosting our schools and industries is one of the most direct ways to convince the outside world that we really and truly have something to offer the new-comer."

The request of Mayor J. C. Lanier for co-operation of Greenville people in improving traffic conditions during tobacco season should be heeded believe members of local civic organizations.

"People who do not need their cars downtown during the day ought to leave them home," a club

member said today. Automobiles of this kind parked along principal streets only increase the burden of traffic officers who are working day and night to make room for visitors on the next day.

"The situation at the opening of the market last week was not as good as it might have been, but it would have been far better if every man had responded to the Mayor's request and left his car in his garage."

"I do not mean those who needed their cars. I am speaking of those who merely ride because they don't like to walk, and who park their cars along principal streets for long periods of time."

Good traffic conditions means as much in the development and growth of a city as any other thing, and if Greenville should be able to keep her streets from becoming congested her growth will be far more rapid.

"The organization of a batchelor club is one of the most pressing needs of the moment," said one of the old landmarks of the batchelor realm, discussing the situation with this scribe today.

He mentioned the names of two or three individuals who would make most efficient officers for such an organization. But we shall withhold these names until we are able to determine whether or not the gentlemen have their hats in the ring.

"It makes me sorry for the old boys-at nights." The loquacious one continued. "They have become too weather-beaten and worn with age to furnish entertainment for the fairer sex. Certainly they should provide some place where they may retire during the long winter evenings and snatch a few moments of peace and tranquility from fleeting time."

"The club might be called 'Kill Kare', because behind its closed doors these objects of loneliness might be able to kill care long enough to give their befuddled minds sufficient time to recover from the days activities."

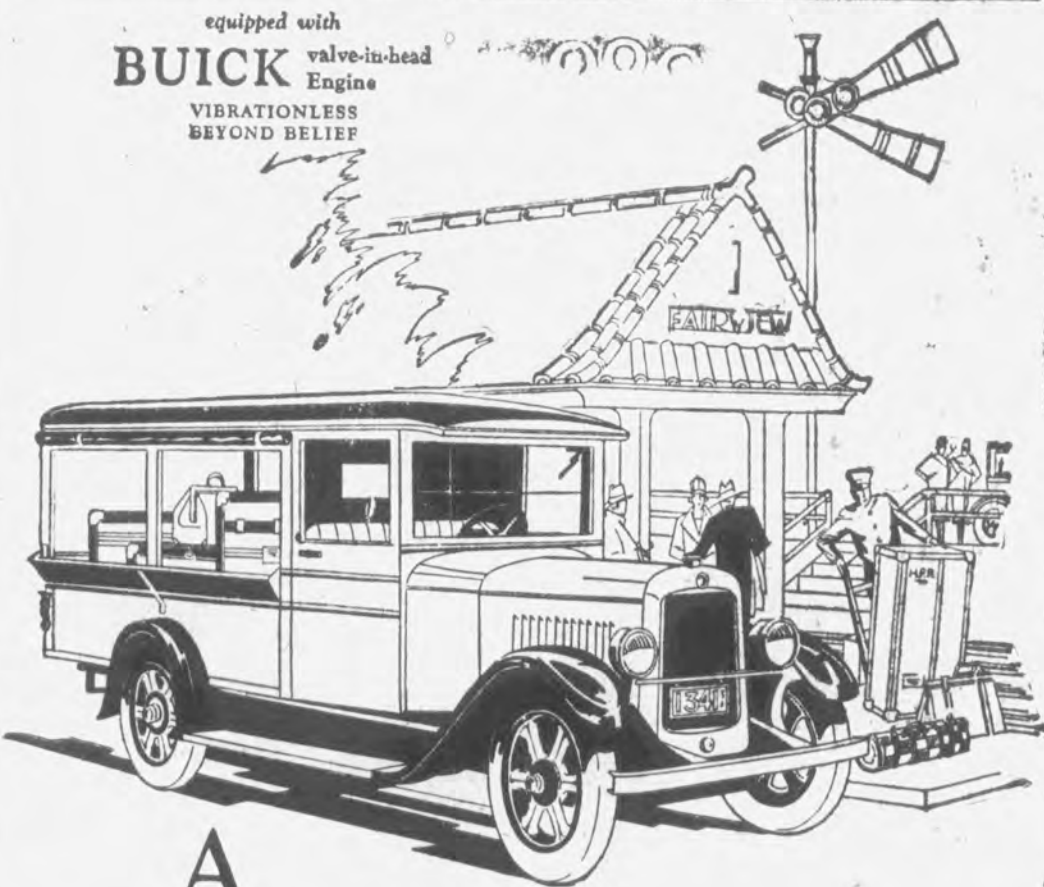

Word of the landing reached here when Lieut. Earnest Demuyter the pilot and his aide arrived here this morning to ship their equipment north.

Lieut. Demuyter said that they encountered a number of thunderstorms enroute but that they came down only when a wind blowing in from the coast turned them about and started them back toward Detroit.

Greenville, S. C., Sept. 12.—(AP)—A large balloon passed over Belton, S. C., about 20 miles south of here, at 8:40 o'clock this morning, flying too high to be identified.

St. Matthews, S. C., Sept. 12.—(AP)—An unidentified silver colored balloon passed over St. Matthews at 6:30 o'clock this morning moving in the direction of Charleston. It was flying about 15 miles an hour, according to local calculations.

Dunn, N. C., Sept. 12.—(AP)—Refreshed by a long night's rest Maurice Bienname and A. Veenstra, in charge of the French balloon, Paris-Bruelles, which landed near here late Sunday, boarded a train this morning and headed toward Detroit.

The balloonists were in the air for nearly 25 hours before pilot Bienname decided to descend three miles south of Dunn. They took off along with 14 other balloons Saturday from the Ford airport, Dearborn, Michigan, in the annual James Gordon Bennett international race.

The landing here was effected without mishap. Hundreds of people saw the balloon as it wended its way over Erwin and thence to Dunn, where it landed.

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 12.—(AP)—Floating directly over the city at an altitude of approximately 2,500 feet, an unidentified balloon continued south this morning. The balloon was sighted at 8 a. m.

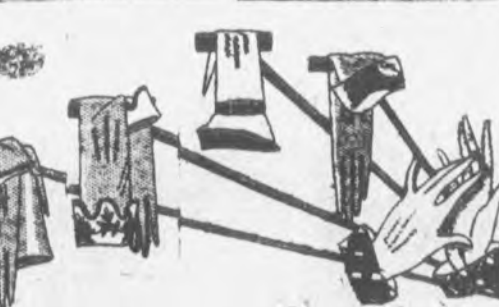
