Woman in automobile plunges to death over embankment into Lake Summit.

HENDERSONVILLE, N. C., Sept 17. (AP)-A summer vacation which was in reality a honeymoon, was brought to a tragic and sudden end at Lake Summit, near Tuxedo, last night shortly before 10 o'clock when Mrs. J. R. Berck Bickler, bride of a few months, plunged in an automobile over a steep embankment into the deep water below before the horrified gaze of her husband, who stood by powerless to save her.
A crowd of searchers and several divers, including a deep sea veteran, were toiling tirelessly today in an effort to raise the car, a big sedan, believed to contain the body of the

In their midst stood Mr. Bickler almost overcome by the tragedy, yet watching intently for some trace of his wife as the volenteer workers and county officers, led by Married early this year, the couple had come to the mountains for summer vacation two weeks ago from their home in Belleview, Fla Friday night they decided to take a drive. At a point about 200 yards above the Lake Summit dam on a highway which winds around the lake. Mr. Bickler noticed the

brake bands on his machine were burning. He got out to adjust them, leaving the engine running. After working on the bands very briefly, he called his wife to pull on the emergency brake to test it. Instead, she grasped the gear lever and threw the engine into reverse, backing swiftly over the bank before Mr. Bickley could intervene Passing motorists hurried to Mr

Bickler's aid but could be of little assistance until Clarence Edney, member of the Hendersonville police force, brought a diver. With the aid of grappling hooks, the sedan was located in about 15 feet of water. It was caught on top of a high stump, and as it was being pulled to the surface slipped from the hooks and fell into water estimated about 90 feet deep.

McIntosh's Flight To New York Balked By Winds and Fog Of Stormy Atlantic.

Ballybunnion, County Kerry, Irish Free State, Sept. 17.-(AP)-Another attempt to conquer the unruly Atlantic by a non-stop flight from East to West has failed.

The great blue and brown monoplane Princess Xenia, owned by the American tinplate heir, William B. Leeds and named for his wife, came to rest on Beale Strand near the mouth of the Shannon last night, after her pilots, Captain MacIntosh and Commandant James C. Fitzmaurice had fought vainly with violent head winds and blinding fog over the sea.

The plane was under the protection of civic guards today while the airmen told the story of their attempt to reach New York from the Baldonnel airdrome, near Dublin MacIntosh and Pitzmaurice geep-





not especially thrill him: "Strangely enough, the greatest kick' the fight game has ever given me came not in my defeat of Jack Dempsey last fall, nor when my hand was raised in victory at the close of my first professional match with Dan O'Dowd in Jersey City," the heavyweight champion said to

"My greatest moment "came in April, 1919, in France. I had fought my way to the finals of the A. E. F. tournament, a series of elimination boxing matches to determine the best fighting men at their weights in a fighting army. I fought Ted Jamieson for the championship at 170 pounds. I won and the victory was the sweetest, the nost thrilling of my career.

"Next Thursday night in Soldier Field, I'll fight Jack Dempsey again. I was confident of victory at Phila delphia last fall. Of this time I am certain. . To me the fight offers the apportunity of finishing the job I started then. This time I must knock Dempsey out to prove to the scoffers that there is no question of my superiority, that I am a real champion, and did not win my title on a "fluke."

Proud of his standing as king of the fistic universe, Tunney admitted that the scoffing that greeted his one-sided victory, the cries of "fake" last fall, hurt him to the





Calshot Air Station, England. (AP)-The advance in air speed since 1913, when the Schneider Cup race was first held, seems incredible when it is recalled that the winner, a French airplane, only reached a speed of 44.7 miles an

England captured the trophy in 1914 with a speed of 55,3 miles an nour, while the next meet in 1919 at Bournemouth, England, resulted in no award. In 1920 Italy won with 102.5 miles, and it repeated the victory in 1921 with a speed of 117.4 miles.

Great Britain recaptured the rophy in 1922 with a speed of 146.5 niles, but lost it again in 1923 to the United States when Lt. D. Rittenhouse made 177.38 miles an hour it Cowes, England, in his Curtiss D-12 biplane. In 1925, when the next race was held at Baltimore Lt. J. H. Doolittle retained the rophy for the United States wiv speed of 232.57 miles an hour in is Curtiss racer.
