From San Francisco To China and From Oakland to Melborne Considered.

New York, Sept. 26.-AP)-The trans-oceanic air adventure had two fresh entires today with California as their starting point and Australia and China, respectively, as their destinations.

Four Australian aviators backed by the Government of New South Wales, are reported preparing for the 9,600 mile air journey from Oakland, Calif., to Melbourne to be negotiated in five stages next month. Chinese merchant; in San Francisco and South China are backing a good-will flight from San Francisco to China in 1928.

The Australian flight, as tentatively charted, would procede from Oakland, Calif., to Hawaii, 2,439 miles; thence to Rabaul, New Britain, 3.800 miles; to Lae, New Guinea, 350 miles; 950 miles to Northern Australia, and the remaining 2,000 miles overland to Melbourne.

5,000 CHINESE PERISH IN IMMENSE TIDAL WAVE

Hongkong, Sept. 26.-AP)-The Exchange Telegraph here announces receipt of a report that 5,000 persons perished when an immense tidal wave and typhoon struck Yuengkong, Kwangtung Province, 150 miles southwest of this city, on September 10.

Twenty thousand homes were damaged and 400 junks and sampans destoryed, the report said. The total loss is estimated at \$1,000,000.

Venice, Italy, Sept. 26.—(AP) Great Britain today captured the historic Schneider cup, emblematic of supremacy among high speed seaplanes, from Italy, which hait wrested it from the United States last year.

Now comes the cru from the Anti-Saloon League that a "Wet" President in the White House would endanger prohibition. Prohibition in the entire nation can be only as effective as public sentiment demands and it is not within the power of the President to make it either wet or dry without public support. What the prohibition laws need is more persons among the rank and file of the country to show a willingness to support and abide by them.

Governor McLean has issued a proclamation setting aside the week of October 9 to 15 as Fire Prevention Week, during which time every citizen and every school in the state is urged to take part in the practice and teaching of fire prevention methods. Surely this movement will meet with widespread co-operation as in former years, but even better it would be if every citizen would make it his duty to practice fire prevention throughout every day in the year and urge others to do likewise.

STILL IN DOUBT

Coolidge owes it to the coun try to say it in plain English whether he means to run for a third term. The public has a right to know what his intentions are. His statement, "I do not choose to run," was accepted by the Post-Dispatch at its face value. We understood it to mean he would not accept of his Cabinet, Secretary Work, declared that to put any other interpretation upon it was to accuse the President of dishonesty.

Hughes, another party leader, and one who has been mentioned for the nomination himself, believes that Mr. Coolidge should run and that he will run.

.When such prominent leaders differ so hopeslessiy on what Mr. Coolidge meant how can private citizens be expected to know what he meant? There is only one person who knows exactly what he did mean. That is the President. He should tell. And if he is in an doubt over a proper choice of words we recommend to him the formula used by Mr. Hughes, who said:

"I will neither seek nor accept the nomination."




