HEAVY DAMAGE RESULTS FROM ALPINE FLOOD

Scores of Lives Believed to Have Been Lost in Eastern Part of Switzerland.

LONDON, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Scores of lives are believed to have been lost in Alpine floods which inundated the principality of Liechtenstein, the eastern section of Switzerland and the upper Trentino, Italy, after tremendous rains over the week end.

Especially affected are those valleys whose waters join the Rhine above Lake Constance, while the upper Rhine itself is amazingly swollen and the lake is 15 feet above normal.

The actual total fatalities cannot be reliably computed until the communications broken by the flood are restored.

Latest reports say the situation is improving with the downpours beginning to subside. A sudden drop in temperature in the mountain regions has checked the melting of the snow which contributed to the floods.

Liechtenstein, which with an area of 68 square miles, is one of the smaller principalities in the world, is overwhelmed by the inundation. The worst feature of the flood in that region was the collapse of a 3,000 foot concrete dam on the Liechtenstein-Swiss border, allowing the waters of the Rhine to sweep over the tiny principality.

Many villages are under several feet of water and some of the inhabitants, caught by the rushing torrent before they could escape to the mountain sides, are believed to have perished. The Liechtenstein government has appealed to its neighbors for quick aid. The property damage there will run into the millions and tens of thousands of acres were drowned.

Many places known the world over as tourist resorts have shared in the suffering, notably the Engadine region in Switzerland. There has been much damage at St. Moritz, Pontresina and Innsbruck, where the gas and electric lighting systems are paralyzed and bridges washed away. Train service on some railroads has stopped, and on others is being diverted around the flood region.

The authorities everywhere are mobilizing troops as boatmen to carry help to the distressed populations.

Breznitz, Austria, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Nearly the whole of the principality of Liechtenstein, flooded through the breaking of the Rhine dam, is reported as representing the appearance of a huge bog, with only house-tops and church spires protruding from the mud.

The entire adult population of about 9,000 is laboring feverishly to cut passageways through the mud sloughs to their homes, wherever the recession of the flood waters permits. The children are being kept on high ground as are the remaining cattle, which would otherwise sink in the soft ooze.

It is believed at least three weeks will be required to dig most of the villages from their blankets of mud.

Vienna, Austria, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Normal activities in the whole of the Austrian Tyrol and Vorarlberg provinces are reported to have been paralyzed by the floods, everywhere roads are impassable. Railway communications have collapsed and the rails, jutting from the mud, are suspended in the air while the flood waters are receding. Only titanic labor can restore conditions to normal.

Train service between Germany and Italy by way of Austria over the Brenner Pass is suspended, as is that between Northern and Southern Tyrol.

Just across the Italian border, in the former Austrian Tyrol, a workmen's relief train, bearing thirty laborers, broke through and underwashed embankment yesterday and fell into the Isack river. All except the fireman of the train were drowned.

Similar casualties, in towns of which children have been the victims, are reported from many points.

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International Harvester Company has a machine for picking, stripping and cleaning cotton that will do away with old fashioned hand picking.

That will cut the production cost of cotton down, for the "per strip" will strip five bales of cotton a day with only two men on the machine.

LEAGUE STILL FIGHTING FOR DISARMAMENT

Desire to Reduce Armaments Inspires Assembly to Greater Activities says Guani

Geneva, Switzerland, Sept. 27.—(AP)—The desire to reduce armaments, far from weakening in the face of difficulties, has asserted its strength and continues to inspire the League Assembly, declared President Alberto E. Guani, Uruguayan minister to France, in the closing address before the eighth assembly of the League of Nations today. After he finished speaking the assembly took final adjournment.

The retiring president of the assembly said that the work done at this session towards disarmament was such that "in the near future we shall obtain the first reduction in armaments and a better definition of the guarantees of security."

The people of the new world represented in the league who so long have been faithful to arbitration as the basis of their friendly relations and pacific development, he said, hailed with delight the discovery that the Locarno movement was bearing fruit and promised to be initiated by other powers than the Locarno signatories.

"Throughout our discussions has run the thread of a single idea," the retiring president told the delegates. "The development of international co-operation in every field was that idea. In the sphere of international law, the peoples before the seas are making a most valuable contribution and it is at their insistence that you have decided to continue work in this direction."

The league this year, President Guani said, had really undertaken a new program in the economic field and real success had been registered.

"You may wait with confidence," he concluded, "for you have entered in resolute spirit upon the endless road of progress. You may hope without fear or apprehension and carry home a smiling vision, no longer so demote, of the fair harvest you will reap after your sowing. You have acted."

The eighth session of the League Assembly then took final adjournment at 12:20 p. m.

SENATORS TO ASK ADMIRAL TO EXPLAIN

McGruder May be Called Before Committee to Explain Recent Magazine Article.

Washington, Sept. 27.—(AP)—President Coolidge has found some good criticism in the recent magazine article of Rear Admiral Thomas P. McGruder, but does not agree with his conclusion that the Navy is over officered.

Washington, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Even should Secretary Wilbur finally decide not to take disciplinary action against Rear Admiral Thomas P. McGruder, the country has heard the last of his magazine articles assailing both the administration of the navy department and congress for making appropriations in the manner suggested by the department.

Senators and Representatives, both advocates and opponents of a big navy, have read the Admiral's charges and they will insist that he be called before the committees dealing with naval appropriations for an elaboration of his ideas.

The Admiral, however, declared plan available, his reorganization scheme being only outlined in the article. He added that it would take a long time to prepare such a plan and he would have to be assisted by a large force of expert officers and clerical help.

Proponents of a large cruiser fleet are especially interested in the article, as they believe their campaign to balance the battle fleet with this type of craft, will be greatly simplified if the necessary ships of this type can be constructed without heavy additional drain on the general fund of the treasury.

Another reason advanced by some members of Congress why the reorganization in naval administration, particularly as to the quarter of a century without the years is that the country soon must enter upon a program of replacement not only of the first line battleships, but also of the now obsolescent war-time built destroyers and submarines.

While they entertain some hopes of cutting down some naval expenses, Congressional leaders are not over-optimistic about the elimination of some of the existing naval establishments on the Atlantic coast. This has engaged the attention of Congress over nearly a quarter of a century without the closing of any of the naval buildings and repair plants.

Secretary Wilbur has ordered Admiral McGruder to submit his recommendations for naval administration improvement to the department. Some Senators and Representatives thought some of his views as well as those of other high ranking officers as to changes of administration might be reflected in the annual recommendations which the navy department will submit to the new Congress in December.

Fail To Oust Officials At Greensboro

Greensboro, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Greensboro's city government today remained unchanged after one of the hottest campaigns ever to be staged in the city and a record vote.

The recall ticket, which aimed at ousting Mayor E. B. Jeffers and councilmen E. R. Ford, David White and W. M. Ridenhour, was defeated by heavy majorities, tabulations of the vote show.

Councilman Ridenhour led the eight candidates receiving a total of 4,594 votes; White received 4,504; Ford, 4,481 and Mayor Jeffers 4,305. The recall candidates received the following vote: R. G. Hatt, 2,620; W. B. Ross, 2,425; C. B. Hall, 2,284; and S. V. Ziegler, 2,189.

Mayor Jeffers and the councilmen were assailed by the recall forces on charges that they had failed to practice economy and make certain changes in the city government as promised in their campaign prior to the regular election.

Heir To Reynolds' Millions Reported Missing At N. Y.

New York, Sept. 27.—(AP)—An expensive limousine, retrieved from the waters of Long Island Sound, a mysterious telephone call to police, and the story of a Broadway night club hostess guided detectives today in their search for Richard J. Reynolds, 21-year-old heir to the Reynolds Tobacco millions, who is missing.

First indications were that Reynolds, whose interests ranged from the presidency of the Reynolds Airways, Inc., to sponsorship of an unsuccessful play on Broadway, had been missing 10 days. But George W. Orr, his business manager at Winston-Salem, N. C., said he talked with a week ago last Thursday.

Friends, relatives and private detectives today were without trace of him, although he was not listed at the city's missing persons bureau nor were police summoned in the case. Fear of accident or foul play was inspired by the belief that he carried almost \$60,000 in cash when he disappeared.

Reynolds accompanied Miss Marie Houston, hostess in the Charn Club, to the Grand Central station about 6 a. m. September 17. Miss Houston left Reynolds, she said upon her return here, and travelled to St. Louis where she visited relatives for a few days.

Detectives learned that on September 16 Reynolds drew about \$6,000 from the bank, sent his servants back to his home in Winston-Salem, N. C., and moved to a hotel in Manhattan. He instructed his chauffeur to leave his automobile at Minola, Long Island, and entering another car with John Graham, of Winston-Salem, he went to dinner at a Long Island roadhouse.

About midnight Reynolds and Graham appeared at the night club in Manhattan, using Graham's car on the trip. Graham did not accompany Reynolds and Miss Houston to the railroad terminal. Railroad schedules show the first train for St. Louis left Grand Central at 8:45 a. m.

Business associates of Reynolds, who were interested in the play "Half a Widow" which he backed, were unable to locate him next day. In consequence the production, unable to meet its expenses because of poor box receipts, was closed. Friends and relatives then began their hunt for the missing man.

On Sept. 17, Reynolds' yellow Rolls-Royce limousine, which had awaited him at Minola, was found submerged in Long Island Sound near port Washington. Reynolds apparently had not used it during the night of September 16 but it was found some distance from the place where it had been parked according to his instructions by the chauffeur. Mr. Orr said that Reynolds was not in the car when it was wrecked and that they had conferred several days after the accident.

An unidentified person called Nassau County headquarters last night and asked that they investigate "a murder in which a yellow Rolls-Royce featured." W. Edward Johnston, of Winston-Salem, stepped

BEST AVERAGE OF SEASON ON LOCAL MARKET

Tobacco Market Sold 1,017,938 Pounds of Leaf Yesterday at Average of \$20.07.

The highest average so far reported for the present season was made on the Greenville tobacco market yesterday when a total of 1,017,938 pounds of tobacco sold for \$20,438.91. The average was \$20.07.

The big companies were today reported to be buying stronger. Purchases are more equally distributed. This is causing less congestion in the factories and making it easier to handle the large amount of tobacco being offered.

Sales were said to be moving along rapidly this morning, and everything was working in the best of order.

Durham Averages \$19.—Durham, Sept. 27.—(AP)—A total of 175,000 pounds of tobacco was sold on the Durham tobacco market yesterday, bringing an average of \$19 a hundred pounds, according to figures given by the supervisor of sales of the local market. For the most part, the offerings were first primings, although a larger amount of the best grades were being received today.

Wilson Averages \$17.12.—Wilson, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Tobacco growers who have sold their season's offerings on the local market, have been paid more than three million dollars by the buyers thus far this season, according to unofficial figures compiled today. Gross receipts total \$3,009,058.88. An average of \$17.12 per hundred weight lately is noted.

SAYS PORTION OF LIQUOR LAW IS NOT RIGHT

Federal Court Judge Rules Personal Injunction Clause Unconstitutional.

Omaha, Neb., Sept. 27.—(AP)—The portion of the National prohibition law which permits a court to grant personal injunctions has been held unconstitutional by Federal Judge Woodrugh, sitting here.

Judge Woodrugh's ruling was a decision which asked a personal injunction be granted against Fred Cunningham of Scotts Bluff, Neb. The petition charged Cunningham with five offenses against the prohibition laws, involving sale, transportation, possession and solicitation of orders for whiskey.

The personal injunction, if granted, would have made it possible for a court to send Cunningham to jail for contempt if he at any time should be found selling or in the possession of liquor.

Judge Woodrugh held that such an injunction would mean that Cunningham might be sent to jail without a jury trial, contrary to the constitution.

The right of a trial by jury, the court ruled, is assured by the Constitution and "an injunction relating solely to the commission of personal acts and not affecting property is a deprivation of liberty in violation of the Constitution."

According to the opinion, "the defendant denies that any judge has the power to try him upon an accusation and asserts his immunity under Article III, Constitution of the United States, the trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury."

"To my mind," the opinion continued, "the matter does not admit of argument or debate. If this defendant has a bad reputation as a bootlegger, let the matter be inquired into, a charge formulated, and a jury of his peers called together."

"But the bill in equity though it is based upon a section of an act of Congress, calls upon the judge to do that thing which the Constitution forbids that any judge shall ever do: To try a person for crime and deprive him of his liberty without a jury."

"The bill should be dismissed, and it is so ordered."

NICHOLS WINS DAMAGE SUIT

Beaver Dam Man Awarded Sum \$300 In Compromise Action Against R. W. Gorman, et al.

By virtue of compromise proceedings taken in the case of J. R. Nichols vs. R. W. Gorman and others, the plaintiff was awarded the sum of \$300 damage in the opening session of the one week term of Pitt county Superior court here yesterday. Hearing of the case commenced the entire morning, the decision to compromise coming during the middle of the afternoon.

The case grew out of damage claimed to have been sustained by the plaintiff by a fire negligently put out by agents of the defendants and which resulted in the destroying of considerable timber land and a tenant house.

After all evidence had been submitted attorneys reached agreement, which resulted in immediate settlement.

Property involved in the case lies in Beaver Dam Township.

RUM RUNNERS STILL EVADE POLICE TODAY

Principals in Gun Battle With Rural Police Near Charlotte Not Apprehended.

Charlotte, Sept. 27.—(AP)—While his brother, H. J. (Romeo) Padgett and rural policeman Henry Moseley, in local hospitals fought for life today, Charlie Padgett, alleged rum runner, and a man known only as "Red" today continued to evade police seeking them as a result of a pitched battle here early yesterday between three policemen and an alleged band of bootleggers.

At the hospital where he was taken after another policeman, R. N. Goforth, had stood off the gang wounding three, it was said today that Moseley was in about the same condition as on yesterday. Little hope is held out for his recovery. He has two bullet wounds in the abdomen.

At another hospital, "Romeo" Padgett, with a wound under his heart, was reported as better.

Rural policeman Lacy Fesler was reported as on the road to recovery. His skull was fractured slightly by a blow on the back of the head during the fight. Charlie Padgett is known to have gone toward the mountains and officers throughout northwestern North Carolina have been warned to be on the watch for him. What became of the third member of the alleged gang, known to the police only as "Red" is not known.

Meanwhile Frank Jones and his wife, sister of the Padgetts, are held as material witnesses to the shooting. The battle occurred at the Jones home when the officers took Charlie Padgett there to get money to make bond after he had been arrested with 68 gallons of whiskey.

"Romeo" Padgett and "Red" are alleged to have started to flee Charlie Padgett with guns after his sister and brother-in-law had said they could not arrange bond immediately.

Moseley was shot and Feslerman hit on the head before Goforth, who had remained outside with the liquor, got into action. Goforth shot "Romeo" through the body and Charlie Padgett in the hand. The third man also is believed to have been wounded.

The Padgett brothers fled and seized a milk truck. They drove to Huntersville where Charlie left his brother with relatives. Another brother went to Huntersville, got "Romeo" and took him to a hospital.

Whooping 'Em Up in N. C.

Raleigh, Sept. 27.—(AP)—The State Board of Health today reported 110 cases of whooping cough, 75 cases of measles, the same number of diphtheria cases, 40 cases of scarlet fever, 23 typhoid fever, and 13 smallpox, in Tarboro afflicting school children, last week.

The same week, last year, however, saw 229 whooping cough, 134 diphtheria, 68 scarlet fever, and 53 typhoid fever cases.

PLANNING FOR 1928 TUNNEY DEMPSEY FIGHT

New York, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Jack Dempsey has come to New York to talk over his boxing future with Tex Rickard. It may be that the Manassa Mauler seriously considers becoming a contender in the heavyweight elimination tournament that Rickard has planned for the winter and next spring.

A third fight between Dempsey and Tunney was one of the main topics of conversation today in the metropolis. Very few professed the belief that Dempsey would be successful in an attempt to lift the title, but nearly everyone has agreed that he still is the biggest drawing power in the business.

Dempsey said he was willing to get into action in short order, if an attractive offer was made and that he would meet any man. He does not plan to retire from the ring.

"It wouldn't take me long to get ready" the former champion declared. "I have two fights under my belt now. I feel fine."

With Dempsey, Sharkey, Paulino, Tom Henry and George Godfrey standing out among the heavyweights, observers saw opportunity for Rickard to build up, through his tournament, another logical contender for the 1928 championship match. A match between Sharkey and Paulino appears to be in the making, both fighters having asked for the chance to get together.

Rickard announced the total gross receipts of the Chicago fight as \$2,658,660. Of this amount one million dollars went to Tunney. Dempsey received \$447,000. State and Federal taxes amounted to \$470,000. Expenditures amounted to \$150,000 and the rent of Soldiers Field was \$100,000, leaving a balance of \$491,660. The balance does not include receipts from Radio and Motion Pictures, which increase Rickard's profits considerably.

The Mayor of Chicago is asking that his city be chosen by the two major political parties as the place for holding their national conventions next year. If the Democrats make as big a circus of the 1928 convention as they did in 1924, then Soldier Field or a similar show ground is the proper place for it.

There are numbers of automobile drivers who either do not know that they are required to use hand signals when stopping or turning corners, or else they just prefer to take chances and don't care whether the other driver knows what they are going to do or not. So long as one driver is informed which way another driver is going there is not much danger of an accident, but the driver who goes along according to his own notions and never makes known his intentions is a menace to others. Drivers who do not know the system of hand signaling should procure a copy of the law and study it, and those who already are informed, but wilfully disregard the use of same should be dealt with.

As might be expected, plans for a return engagement between Tunney and Dempsey are already being discussed. No doubt the fight will come to pass as was predicted by some before the recent clash at Chicago. No fighter who can draw a gate of two or more million dollars is going to be permitted to withdraw from the limelight.

"More Magruder"

A great many persons will echo Senator Borah's wish for more Magruder's, in fact for "a Magruder in every department of the Government." While Secretary Wilbur appears to be greatly exercised as to whether Rear Admiral Thomas F. Magruder has transgressed against the regulations by the publication of an article on "The Navy and Economy" in the

Saturday Evening Post, taxpayers have far better reason to be disturbed over the facts that he presents in support of his plea for strict economy and administrative reform in the Navy Department. Certainly he makes a damaging case.

Rear Admiral Magruder stresses five main points, and in support of each submits strong evidence. They are: That the navy is greatly overorganized, afloat and especially ashore; that demobilization after the war was not completely carried out; that uneconomical methods, perhaps excusable in time of war, have not been abandoned; that superfluous navy yards and naval stations are maintained at heavy expense, and that many ships, useless for service, are kept in commission.

It is highly useful service Rear Admiral Magruder has performed in calling the attention of the country and Congress to conditions in the navy. If Secretary Wilbur sees in it nothing more than an occasion to discipline that officer, the greater will be the need that Congress next winter deal seriously with the matter. New York World.

In other words, he is able to see the condition of families in all parts of the county, and knows that anything in the way of wearable clothing would be appreciated.

"Winter time is coming on now," Mr. Futrell said today, "and lots of these poor people will suffer if they do not get proper clothing. If you have anything suitable in this line, please notify the department at once."

Miss Bertha Lee Ferguson, county demonstration agent, is in charge of the home demonstration department of the Pitt County Fair.

She believes this department is going to be better this year than ever before simply because the people in various parts of the county are more intensely interested in letting the other parts of the county know what they are doing.

"The fair last year was mighty good," Miss Ferguson said today.

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HUMAN RACE IN DANGER OF EXTINCTION

Biologist Declares Inter-Racial Marriages Greatest Menace of Present Time.

Budapest, Hungary, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Prof. Ludwig Mehely, widely known researcher in racial biology, made somewhat of a sensation in scientific circles today by declaring that the human race was in danger of extinction by inter-racial marriages which he said were increasing throughout the world.

Prof. Mehely who has just been elected dean of the philosophical faculty of the University of Budapest, made his remarks in the course of his inaugural address before an audience largely made up of distinguished scientists. He startled the audience by de-

claring that parents belonging to heterogeneous races produce degenerate progeny, adding "the best marriages are those where the contracting parties show blood group affinity."

The professor, indicating that he had in mind Soviet Russia, urged the governments of all countries to control the birth rate of the proletarian class, permitting unlimited reproduction only to mental workers and farmers.

The theories propounded by Prof. Mehely produced a deep impression, since Hungary is a land where the racial question is most delicate.
