Scores of Lives Believed to Have Been Lost Switzerland.

London, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Scores of lives are believed to have been lost in Alpine floods which inundated the principality of Lichtenstein, the eastern section of Switzerland and the upper Trentino, Italy, after tremendous rains over the week end.

Especially affected are those valleys whose waters join the Rhind shove Lake Constance, while the upper Rhine itself is amazing; swollen and the lake is 15 feet abova

The actual total fatalities cannot be reliably computed until the communications broken by the flood are restored.

Latest reports say the situation is improving with the downpours beginning to subside. A sudden drop in temperature in the mountain regions has checked the melting of the snow whihh contributed to the floods.

Dempsey said he was willing to get into action in short order, if an attractive offer was made and that he would meet any man. He does not plan to retire from the ring.

"It wouldn't take me long to get ready" the former champion declared "I have two fights under my belt now. I feel fine"

With Dempsey, Sharkey, Paulino, Tom Henny and George Godfrey standing out among the heavyweights, observers saw opportunity for Rickard to build up, through his tournament, another logical contender for the 1928 championship match A match between Sharkey and Paulino appears to be in the making, both fighters having asked for the chance to get together.

Rickard announced the total gross receipts of the Chicago fight as \$2,658,660. Of this amount one million dollars went to Tunney. Dempsey received \$447,000. State and Fed eral taxes amounted to \$470,000. Expenditures amounted to \$150,000 and the rent of Soldiers Field was \$100,-000, leaving a balance of \$491,660 The balance does not include re ceipts from Radio and Motion Pictures, which increase Rickard's profits considerably.
