FRENCH NOTE
OPENS WAY TO
END DISPUTEAdministration Official
See Conciliatory
Note in Reference to
Tariff Issue.

Paris, Oct. 3.—(AP)—France and the United States appear deadlocked in their negotiations for settlement of the pending tariff controversy.

Publication today of aide memores exchanged recently indicate that France continues to demand assurances of reciprocity in the negotiations, while Washington, in its aide memores delivered at the Quai D'Orsay last week insists upon most favored nation treatment.

Washington, Oct. 3.—(AP)—While the latest French tariff note is viewed by administration officials as conciliatory and perhaps opening the way to settlement of the present dispute, text of the first two notes exchanged shows that the French have been trained directly on American tariff rates from the time the Franco-German commercial treaty was signed.

These notes were made public simultaneously today in Washington and Paris, to be followed later by the current chapter in the interchange, the French note received Saturday. The American reply is now being formulated and is expected to go forward late this week.

The French note cites the equalization provisions of the American tariff act, section 319, as authority under which treaty negotiations might proceed. That section authorizes adjustment of rates up or down to allow for any difference in American and foreign production costs of the articles involved in order to remove the difference when the articles are placed in competition here with American products.

The Washington government is prepared to assure France that it will make full use of this section in dealing with tariff rates against which that country may complain; but it will not bind itself to reduce these rates. Any change in rate will be based on study of production costs and will go up or down as that study dictates. Officials are in some doubt as to whether the French authorities realize that in many previous cases such studies have brought tariff increases.

In any event, examination of the first French note shows the new suggestion is a wide departure from the original treaty to include if necessary "such reductions or adaptations of the (American) tariff" as would permit certain unnamed French goods to enter the American market. In reply the state department implied surprise that the French government did not know that the American tariff law "does not envisage the conclusion of a treaty of reciprocity in regard to rates of duty."

In attacking the American tariff schedules, the French note characterizes them as setting up a "prohibitive regime" against certain French goods to which the Washington government answered that tariff rates were a matter solely of internal policy and not involved in the dispute with France which was confined strictly to French tariff discriminations now in force against American products.

In admitting an "augmentation" of these rates, the French note said they had come about under the "customs reform" of August 30 which was "instituted in consequence of the Franco-German treaty." It adds that the previous "exceptional treatment" granted American goods entering France and which was withdrawn by the August 30 decree was "not in harmony with the constant increase in American rates and the re-enforcement of customs barriers practiced by American since 1921 to the detriment of certain specific products of the French trade."

The latest and yet unpublished French note rebukes the Washington government for a threatening reference to the penalty section of the American tariff law. That remark was prompted, presumably, by the statement in the American note calling attention to section 317 as authorizing counter discrimination, but assuming that Washington "is very loathe" to make such duty increases despite the fact that France "is clearly at present time practicing serious discriminations" and has refrained from doing so in the hope that negotiation of a most-favored nation treaty and ad-interim suspension of the French discriminatory rates would settle the controversy without that recourse.

GARDNER DIES
OF INJURIESPitt County Man
Fatally Injured in
Wreck Saturday,
Buried Yesterday Afternoon.

Funeral services for Warren Gardner, Pitt county man, who died in a Wilson hospital Saturday night at 7:45 from injuries sustained in an automobile wreck on the Farmville-Wilson highway Saturday afternoon, were conducted from his home, six miles from Farmville, Sunday afternoon at two o'clock by Rev. C. W. Blanchard, Baptist minister of New Bern. Interment was made in the cemetery at Stantonburg.

Mr. Gardner was fatally injured when his automobile collided with another car driven by T. M. Gosman, of Durham, who with three other occupants, was on his way to Greenville to spend the week-end. The injured man was rushed to the Carolina General hospital at Wilson where he died a few hours later. Mr. Gardner's skull and chest were crushed in the impact and he never regained consciousness. Two of his daughters, who occupied the car with him, were badly shocked and suffered minor injuries, while a third was so severely hurt that she was carried to a hospital for treatment.

The car driven by Mr. Gosman was occupied by Archie Sugg and Charles Woodward, University students, returning to Greenville to spend the week-end, and a Miss Johnson, of Durham. While badly shocked by the force of the impact, all escaped without injury.

Both cars were badly damaged. The wreck occurred near Meadow church. Mr. Gardner is said to have been entering the highway from a side road. He failed to perceive the Gosman car approaching down the highway until the collision occurred.

Surviving Mr. Gardner, are a widow, who is a sister of Mrs. W. J. Rasberry, of Farmville, and six children, Roland, Ethel, Norma, Clara, Eunice and Blith Gardner.

Charlotte, N. C., Oct. 3.—(AP)—Two rival claimants as the "true wife" of the Rev. Willis T. Jordan, Columbus, Ga., minister, sought to advance opposing testimony concerning the clergyman's matrimonial adventures at his preliminary trial here today on charges of bigamy.

Mrs. Vassey Snyder-Jordan, of Winding Gulf, West Virginia, whom the divine has maintained is his only "true wife" hastened here to land moral support to her husband and to take the stand to plead that Jordan was subject to periodic moments of unconsciousness, mental support to her husband and to take the stand to plead that Jordan was subject to periodic moments of unconsciousness, mental disturbances and headaches.

Mrs. Emma Landridge-Jordan, formerly of Washington, D. C., whose claim that she married the pastor in Charlotte on August 19, has been substantiated by records here, left Columbus Saturday to be present at the trial. She has expressed her readiness to testify fully the activities of the preacher from the marriage to his disappearance from Columbus several weeks ago while the couple was said to have been living together in that city. The unexpected departure from Columbus prompted the search, which resulted in his recent arrest in Grand Rapids, Mich.

Jordan has been confined in jail here since his arrival in custody of an officer Friday, and has made no attempt to obtain bonds of \$10,000 set. His attorney has announced his hope of placing the cause on the docket Thursday in Superior Court. In the event that case is referred to that body.

Jordan from his cell has held to the original statement that he is innocent of any intentional wrongdoing. He has maintained that if he married others "it was during loss of memory." He substantiates the assertion of his Winding Gulf wife that at times he lapses into total forgetfulness and mental oblivion.

STORM MOVES
OVER COSTAL
REGION TODAYTropical Disturbance
of Slight Intensity
Reported in Ga., S.
C. and N. C.

Charlotte, Oct. 3.—(AP)—A tropical storm of light intensity, originating in the coastal region of northern Georgia and lower South Carolina yesterday, moved early today across upper South Carolina and this state, bringing general and copious rainfall to all sections of both states. A temperature ranging from ten to 15 degrees above normal gave a late summer touch to the rainy weather.

The only wind of consequence reported to the local station of the United States Weather Bureau was a 48-mile blast at Charleston late yesterday. No serious damage was thought to have resulted.

The prospect, according to local weather bureau observers, is for continued rainfall in North Carolina throughout the day and possibly into the night with the clouds beginning to clear in South Carolina by late afternoon and night. No marked temperature change is forecast for South Carolina, while in this state the mercury is scheduled to drop to a figure around normal by nightfall.

Showers beginning moderately at around 3 o'clock this morning before noon had accumulated a rainfall approximating two inches with the amount in other sections of the state varying from slightly below to slightly above this figure.

At 8 o'clock this morning when less than an inch of rain had fallen here, over two inches had fallen in Columbia, S. C., and Savannah, Ga., since yesterday at noon. Over an inch had fallen at Charleston, S. C., the precipitation at Greenville, S. C., and the extreme northwestern section of South Carolina was somewhat lighter than here.

Wilmington, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Wilmington received what was described today as the tail end of a tropical storm that originated in North Georgia yesterday and saw one of the heaviest rains of the year this morning. The wind velocity was high at times but its duration was brief and there was no damage.

Fayetteville, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Nearly one inch of rain has fallen in Fayetteville and surrounding territory since last night.

Auto Accidents Fatal

Raleigh, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Approximately one out of every nine automobile accidents taking place on the State highway system during the month of August resulted fatally according to a compilation made today by the automobile bureau of the State department of revenue.

Four hundred accidents were listed as occurring and forty-two of these were fatal.

RAIN HINDERS
RELIEF WORK
AT ST. LOUISDownpour of Rain
Causes Weakened
Houses To Give Way
In Tornado District.

St. Louis, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Rain soaked walls today were a new menace to relief and rehabilitation workers in the tornado zone here. The heavy rain of yesterday caused many damaged houses to weaken and a number of collapsing walls were reported.

The downpour also is added to the damage by wetting furniture and household goods which had not been removed from roofless houses. The work of cleaning up the section went forward readily today however, as it was freed from the interference of thousands of sightseers on foot and in automobiles who thronged the district Sunday.

The dawn of the fifth day found all main traffic arteries which connect downtown St. Louis with the west end, open and virtually free of debris. Lindell boulevard, West Pine street, Olive street, Washington boulevard, Delmar boulevard and Page avenue, which run thru the heart of the district, were open from end to end for the first time since the storm.

New surveys of the area affected disclosed that four and one-half square miles were destroyed or damaged by the twister. The storm's path was approximately five to six miles long and from 1,000 feet to one mile wide.

The work of the Red Cross was progressing at full speed today. It was announced that more than 300 families had been moved from their homes to other habitations yesterday, largely through the efforts of a fleet of moving vans and trucks requisitioned from business houses and factories.

Drab skies yesterday saw the burial of dozens of victims of the storm. Traffic police and Boy Scouts acting as directors of traffic, cleared paths for the funeral corteges which made their way through the congested streets.

FLOYD STOCKS
FATALLY HURTPitt County Man Died
In Hospital Following
Auto Collision Near Ayden.

Floyd Stocks, 24, of Chicod township, was fatally injured Saturday afternoon shortly after the noon hour when an automobile which he was driving collided with a log truck near Cannon's store, a few miles from Ayden. The young man was rushed to a hospital but died a short time later.

Funeral services were conducted yesterday afternoon at three o'clock by Rev. W. H. Law, of the family burying ground in Chicod township.

Young Stocks, accompanied by two brothers was following a truck along a dusty road when the accident occurred. A log truck approached from an opposite direction. As Stocks turned out he collided with the heavy truck. The two brothers sustained painful but not serious injuries.

Coroner E. S. Williams conducted a private investigation immediately following the wreck and found that an inquest was unnecessary owing to the fact that the collision was unavoidable.

The deceased is survived by a wife and mother, Mr. and Mrs. "Dumpy" Stocks; two brothers, Herbert and Herman Stocks; three sisters, Mrs. Herman Everett, Mrs. Joe Smith, Mrs. Dock Loftin, all of Pitt County.

FOREST FIRE
THREATENS TO
WRECK ISLANDPopulation of Har-
ker's Island Driven
Out to Sea as Fire
Demon Approaches.

Morehead City, N. C., Oct. 3.—(AP)—An underground forest fire, so characterized by oldtimers here, today for the first time in the history of North Carolina occasioned the dispatch of firefighters and apparatus 12 miles out into the ocean to save 1,200 souls.

A power boat took 100 men from here to Harker's Island, 12 miles out, to protect Harker's 1,200 population, its homes, two churches and a theatre.

A forest fire, raging eight days, unchecked crept closer to the village of Harker's and early today had burned firemen's hose, burning through the smut, and enclosing slowly on the populace.

The first alarm back to Morehead City came at sundown Sunday with word that there was no fire fighting apparatus, nothing but water miles around and no way to get the water on the flame.

A ferry boat carried the first apparatus but the hose itself burned, according to the first reports of the few men returned to shore.

An area two miles by one-half mile has been burned up. At seven o'clock this morning the power boat took fresh men to sea to fight the flames.

Boats returning brought conflicting reports, that the fire "was spreading and that it had been brought under control, and an Associated Press correspondent went to the scene.

No injuries have been reported so far by anyone. The churches and theatres have been saved but some fishermen's shacks have been burned.

A call for aid came to the local fire department at five o'clock yesterday evening from Harker's Island where forest fire was reported as threatening the village of Harker's. Harker's has no fire fighting equipment and but few men. A high wind blew all day and night.

Eight men and a pump left last night in response to the call, one of the ferry boats which ply between here and Bafford carried the apparatus.

About 100 men had gone on a small steamer today to aid the islanders in fighting the forest fire. Harker's Island is about 12 miles from here.

Game Warden
Slain Today

Elk Park, N. C., Oct. 3.—(AP)—Murphy Patton, 35, forest and game warden and former tax collector of Carter county, Tenn., was slain late yesterday, it was learned here today.

His nephew, Grady Harris, has been placed in jail at Elizabethtown, Tenn., charged with the slaying of his uncle on the Tennessee state game preserve, four miles north of here.

Patton is said to have gone into the woods to investigate several shots he had heard and came upon Grady Harris and one of his brothers.

"Boys, what does this mean?" the warden is quoted as asking.

"It means business," Harris is alleged to have replied, drawing a pistol and firing five shots. One bullet struck the warden in the abdomen and another in the shoulder ranging downward. Patton died in ten minutes.

John Harris, father of the boys, turned Grady over to county authorities.

PRES. WRIGHT TALKS BEFORE STUDENT BODY

Head of Teachers College Delivered Annual Address of Fall Term Saturday.

President Robert H. Wright made his annual talk to the students Saturday on Church Going and other phases of college life. President Wright always talks to the students along these lines the first Saturday in the fall term.

He stated that there was a notion abroad that the State schools were non-denominational. "This is a mistake," he said, "they are multi-denominational, they are made up of all denominations. The Bible is not taught in them, but I see no reason why it should not be taught. It is the basis of our State and federal governments and for one to be a good citizen he ought to know the Bible in order to understand the background of his government and the institutions that regulate the life of its citizenship."

"The purpose of this institution," he said, "is to train teachers for the public schools of the State, but it hopes to do more. It hopes to give every student an opportunity to live a full and well rounded spiritual life."

He called attention to the Bible classes that are conducted by the Y. W. C. A. and stated that, along with the churches with their Sunday Schools and devotional services, these organizations were, society's way of giving the necessary instruction in the Bible and that he hoped every student would avail himself of these opportunities to study the Bible.

He told the student body that he knew just which church for each one to attend and that he was going to tell them. After some wonderment as to which one he would pick out he told them to go to the church of which they were members at home or to the one their fathers and mothers belonged to if they were not members themselves.

The pastors of the different churches were invited to attend chapel for this talk. Most of them were present and appreciated the wholesome advice given the students by President Wright and they expressed their appreciation of his liberal interpretation and function of Bible knowledge.

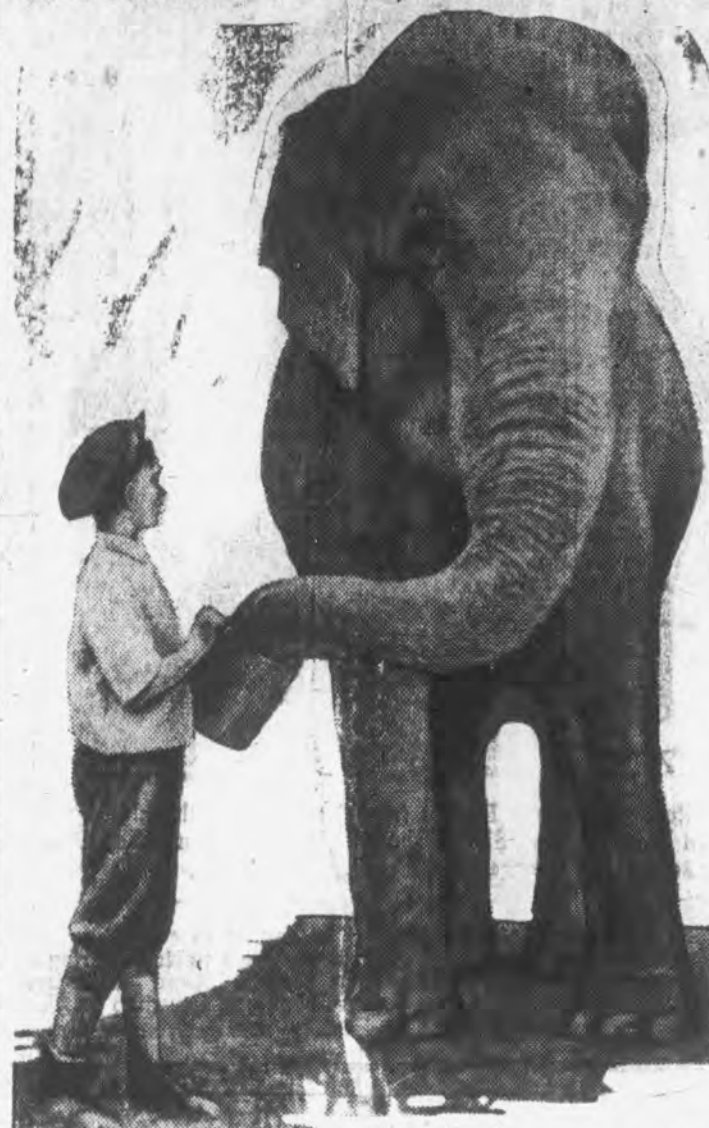

COTTON

New York, Oct. 3.--(AP)--The cotton market opened steady today at an advance of 36 to 42 points, active months selling about 36 to 42 points above Saturday's closing quotations on buying stimulated by reports of very heavy rains in the southwest and prospects of frost in parts of Oklahoma and the Texas Panhandle.

December sold up to 21.89 and March to 22.19 in the early trading, but these prices attracted a good deal of realizing, while there also was considerable selling here against purchases in New Orleans and probably some southern hedging. The offerings supplied the initial demand and there were reactions of 10 to 10 points from the best by the end of the first hour.

There were reactions of some 10 or 20 points from the early advance, under realizing, combined with some southern selling, but the market firmed up again later on a bullish view of the detailed weather reports, and a private crop report placing the condition at 49.6 and the indicated yield at 12.158,000 bales. At mid-day the market was selling around 21.77 for December with the active months showing next advances of 21 to 27 points.

Johnson Hall Buried Today

Hendersonville, Oct. 3.--(AP)--Funeral services for Johnson Hall, secretary of the state Republican headquarters here under Brownlow Jackson, who died Saturday night after an operation for appendicitis, were held at 2 o'clock this afternoon at Winston-Salem, the family home.

Mr. Hall's body was taken to Winston-Salem Sunday. Mr. Jackson, the state chairman today paid high tribute to the character of the work of Mr. Hall who formerly was connected with several North Carolina newspapers and who was a world war veteran.

Three Companies Of Garrison in Mexico Revolt

Mexico City, Oct. 3.--(AP)--Three companies of the Mexico City garrison have revolted. They left the city late last night, taking the field against the government. It is thought they are supporting the movement against the re-election of former President Obregon led by Generals Cerrano and Gomez, whose whereabouts have not been known since Saturday.

Gen. Jose Alvarez, chief of the presidential staff, declared this morning that the soldiers had been deceived by their chiefs. Apparently all the members of the garrison started to go out but when the majority of the men learned they were being led into a revolt they abandoned their chiefs and returned to their barracks.

Those who left the city did not exceed 500 he added. Their destination upon leaving the capital was unknown. Although agitation has been reported among the troops at several points in Mexico, General Alvarez asserted that reports received by the presidential bureau indicated that quiet prevailed.

Celebrate Birthday Of Von Hindenburg

Berlin, Oct. 3.--(AP)--Under the watchword "Our Hindenburg" all Germany celebrated the President's 80th birthday in a manner unprecedented in the present generation. Never since the Constitution of the empire 56 years ago has there been such an outburst of spontaneous enthusiasm and veneration for a single individual.

It was widely remarked today that the country's admiration and love, which many a ruler craved for unsuccessfully, was offered to an unassuming soldier-President like an irresistible avalanche. Not even the Communists dared openly oppose yesterday's universal tribute, contenting themselves with hanging out isolated red flags and indulging in few minor scuffles.

Mayor Walker Was Subjected To Espionage

New York, Oct. 3.--(AP)--Reports that Mayor James J. Walker was subjected to constant espionage during his recent trip to Europe caused a stir today. As published by both Democratic and Republican papers without naming the source the reports are that a watch was kept on Mr. Walker's activities by order of an undisclosed American official. Friends of the Mayor are urging him to ask the State Department to investigate.

The New York Times and the New York American say some of the Mayor's associates believe that the purpose of the espionage was to cast discredit on Tammany Hall, of which both the Mayor and Governor Smith are members, and thus indirectly discredit the Governor as a Presidential candidate.

County Treasurer Sent to Prison

Greenwood, S. C., Oct. 3.--(AP)--R. A. Ellison, former treasurer of Greenwood county, today pleaded guilty in criminal court to failure to turn over to his successor in office \$40,195.11 on July 1, 1925. He was sentenced to six months in the penitentiary and fined \$1,000. The plea was a misdemeanor.

All other charges involving grand larceny and breach of trust were dropped by solicitor Homer S. Bluewell.

Ellison was given until Nov. 1 to begin serving his sentence that he might have time to close out his filling station business at Hendersonville, N. C.

opinion, "No more oil or very expensive oil in a few years," or "oil enough for a thousand years." Let it be remembered however that the oil that would have lasted a thousand years on the basis of consumption of a few years ago, would last fifty years now. "Excessive over-production" of 1923 only equalled our "normal consumption" of 1927. Last year for the first time in British history, the tonnage of British ships built to burn oil exceeded the tonnage of those built to burn coal, \$1 per cent of oil against 49 per cent for coal. That worries British coal mine owners and should interest American oil well owners, and oil stock speculators.

In a few years millions of tractors, flying machines, gas engines and oil burning ships and locomotives in excess of the present number will be burning oil and gasoline.

One thing you may safely write on your cuff, "The price of gasoline will go up." The benefactor needed is one who will make a gasoline engine that will use ninety per cent of the gasoline power instead of using fifteen per cent or less of that power, as at present.

One day's report of livestock receipts in the Denver Post tells that Colorado sent to market so many steers, sheep, hogs, "horse none." What would old time settlers have thought if told that a livestock market report would one day show thousands of cattle, sheep and hogs sold, and not one horse? On the same day, Colorado's automobile report would have shown thousands of cars shipped in and shipped out. Times change and for the better. Cowboys even use light cars to round up cattle.

The International Congress for Physic Research in Paris is told by Dr. Von Schrenck Notzing of Munich that a spiritist "raised" himself in the air 35 times in June, July and August, lying in a horizontal position four feet from the floor, floating on air, nothing to uphold him.

The explanation of the "miracle" is that somebody lied. But floating unsupported in the air is not new. Spiritualists didn't invent it. Nearly a thousand years before Christ the first thing Buddha did after birth in his first reincarnation was to sit in the air and deliver a sermon. An in his various reincarnations from time to time the proud mother knew that her son was returned because her baby Buddha sat in the air and preached.

Everywhere at all times the law of gravitation works "directly as the mass and inversely as the square of the distance" but in every generation men have planned, imagined and believed in some scheme to conquer gravitation. They lied about it at first. Now they actually do it with the flying machine. What man can imagine he can do.

Helen Gardener, a very intelligent artist, lecturer and woman suffragist, said for years, "Woman's brains are as good as man's" and to prove it left her own brain to be dissected by Cornell University Dr. K. W. Paper, who did the dissecting, says Mrs. Gardener's brain "is the equal of the best masculine brain in the Cornell collection." That is hard to prove. Cuvier, the naturalist, had a huge brain, but a man who died in a British poor house had a brain bigger than Cuvier's. The quality and power of a

brain might depend on a particle of brain matter weighing less than a tenth of an ounce.

There is no such thing as "equality in human brains." How would you compare the brain of Napoleon with that of Burns the poet, or the brain of Marconi with that of Villon? Women create the entire human race including all the men with all their brains, good or bad. That ought to be enough. Eventually when the earth is fully populated only two children to each family, childbirth made painless, no doubt woman, with more emotion and will than men, will gradually take the upper hand. You know what happens to the parasite crab? The female very big, carries him around under her flipper only about as big as a ten cent piece. He is taken out on state occasions. Man may come to that.

DEATH CLAIMS GOV. OF TENN.

Nashville, Tenn., Oct. 3.—(AP)—Through a few sorrowing hours, for the first time in her history, Tennessee was leaderless today, bereft by the death of Governor Austin Peay. The state's executive stricken during an afternoon nap by a cerebral hemorrhage, came to the end of a long and weary path of public labor shortly after eight o'clock last night. His duties automatically devolved on senator Henry H. Horton, 61, of Lewisburg, speaker of the senate, but the actual inaugural ceremony was postponed to this morning.

Death's first invasion of the state's gubernatorial chair came to the first man in nearly a century who had been honored by election to three consecutive terms in this office.

his connection with, and defence of the Butler anti-evolution bill, Governor Peay prided himself rather on an elaborate program of reorganization and development much of which he had fulfilled. Some of his measures attracted widespread interest.

He sought a third term, however, pleading for a chance to round out his achievements.

Today the man whom Governor Peay once praised as an ideal successor in event of his own death, and he was convinced at the time that he would not live through his term, stood pledged to carry out

his policies. Governor Peay's health had been precarious for several years because of his high blood pressure. He was warned in 1926 not to go through the trials of a third election and third term of office, but the heat of the campaign seemed to improve rather than hurt his condition.

Arduous work in connection with the opening 1927 legislative session undermined his constitution, and he contracted a severe cold and fever during an official visit to Washington in February. This developed into influenza and pneumonia, his

heart became affected and for a time it appeared he would not survive. Herculean labor on the part of physicians and a period of rest enabled the Governor to return to his desk, but he was drawn almost immediately into a maelstrom of legislative strife, culminating in an attempt by opponents to prolong the session and in his own announcement that he would pardon any legislators convicted for refusing to help make a quorum according to majority wishes.

As residents of Tennessee re-told the story of how Governor Peay, re-

tiring to his room following a jovial Sunday luncheon, awoke in pain only to collapse without a word from the hemorrhage and lay gradually sinking until his death three and a half hours later, interest shifted in a measure to the kindly, white-haired man, who received his mantle as Governor of Tennessee.

Senator Horton was notified early yesterday evening. He made immediate arrangements to motor to Nashville, and arrived late last night. He went immediately to the Governor's Mansion and expressed his

sorrow to Mrs. Peay, who was prostrated by the tragedy. It was suggested that he make a statement, and later a typed sheet was given out, expressing his belief that overwork had caused Governor Peay's death, and that political enemies had "unappreciatively and jealously" taken advantage of his falling health to cruelly attack him.

"God willing I will complete his unfinished work," he said. "to that high mission I dedicate myself and summon all patriotic citizens to my assistance."

Senator Horton then retired, with

the hour for inaugural ceremony tentatively fixed at 9 A. M. Its location was at the capital, where tomorrow Governor Peay's body will lie in state from 9 A. M. to 4 P. M. Simple services will be preached by Rev. W. F. Powell, of the First Baptist church, Nashville, and the body will then be reinterred to the Mansion. Wednesday it will be sent to Clarksville the Governor's home. Governor Peay will be buried Wednesday afternoon, with services at the Immanuel Baptist church conducted by the Rev. Powhatan W. James.
