Frenchman Landed On West Coast of Africa on Scheduled Time Ever Made By

Paris, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Dieudonne ostes and Lieutenant Joseph Le Brix safely completed the first leg of their four jump trip to Euenos Aires this morning, landing on in hand. scheduled time at St. Louis, Senegal, on the west coast of Africa, at 11:10 a. m.

They made the 2,700 mile flight from Paris in 25 hours 27 minutes, averaging 106 miles an hour. Gehrig, most of the ball players feel, is the logical American League choice this senson. Columbia's Lon gave Babe Ruth a hot chase most of the year for home run honors and finished with a total of 47. more than any other player in baseball history except the Bambino himself. He set a new record for driving in runs, 179 and finished third in the batting list, trailing only Harry Hellmann of the Tigers and Al Simmons of the Athletics Gehrig was a star, 100, in the world's series, despite the fact that some of his previous good work was offset a bit when he struck out in the dramatic ninth inning of the

Simmons, but for an injury that kept him out of most of the late peason games, would have been a stronger candidate for the award. howev r, seems to climinate him from serious consid-Harry's sensational ba ting for Detroit, especially toward the close, Ted Lyons' brilliant twirling for the White Sox, and Hor-Lisenbee's mound work for Washington brought all of these stars into prominence but they all happened to be with clubs that were outclased, so far as the pennant race was concerned.






