## MONOPLANE "AMERICAN GIRL" HOPPED OFF YESTERDAY FOR NON-STOP FLIGHT TO PARIS

### No Word Today as to Whereabouts of Ruth Elder and Her Co-Pilot George Haldeman

New York, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The commander of the Celtic reported from mid-ocean by wireless to the Associated Press today that he had not sighted the monoplane American Girl up to noon today.

New York, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The liner Mauretania, 800 miles out from New York, today sent a wireless message to the Associated Press saying that she had not sighted "The American Girl." A smooth sea, with fine weather was reported. The liner is due in New York Thursday night.

New York, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The monoplane American Girl presumably was speeding eastward over the Atlantic Ocean toward Paris today, bearing Ruth Elder near to a realization of her ambition to be the first woman to fly across the Atlantic.

The comely 25-year-old Florida aviatrix, who said she was relying upon God and the prayers of her mother for a successful termination of the venture, hopped off from Roosevelt Field at 5:04 p. m. yesterday with Captain George Haldeman as co-pilot. If all went well they expected to reach their goal in 38 to 42 hours. A hop in 38 hours would put them in Paris at 7:04 a. m. Thursday, Eastern Standard Time, or 12:04 p. m. Thursday, Paris Time.

The fliers were following a course that called for the longest over water hop on record, a flight of nearly 2,000 miles along the shipping lanes directly from Long Island to the French coast. Seven other trans-Atlantic airmen made over water hops of approximately 1,900 miles from New Foundland to the Irish coast on flights to England and Europe.

Although it called for a total flying distance of some 3,800 miles, the more southern route was selected in preference to the Great Circle course in the hope of avoiding ice and possibly being able to fly over fog. The course lay almost due east for a distance of 1,244 miles, when the pilots planned to change to northeast for the rest of the distance. While the course followed the shipping lanes all the way, Haldeman said he would rely entirely on the plane's instruments, an earth inductor compass, drift indicator, turn and bank indicator and altimeter.

Two women have perished attempting ocean flights this year. A third was rescued at sea. Miss Elder made the hop while Mrs. Frances Wilson Grayson was waiting improved weather to start a trans-Atlantic flight from Old Orchard, Maine.

Weather conditions were regarded by Dr. James H. Kimball, of the Weather Bureau, as probably more unfavorable than for any previous trans-Atlantic flight. After the first 300 miles, he said, the winds would tend to send the plane to the south of its course and at 1,200 miles out the wind would come at almost right angles across the course of the plane. A few hundred miles further, where the ship was expected to skirt the first low pressure area, he said, the winds would swing right on the tail of the plane, and then to the South, tending to send the ship to the north of its course.

Then would come tail winds, he said, unless the fliers enter the worst weather of the trip, a storm and fog area that has hung 600 to 1,000 miles east of France. The fliers were advised by Kimball to try to climb above this low pressure area, suggesting that they cruise at 10,000 feet or higher.

"It's now or never," Haldeman said when the situation was described to him and he was told that conditions were better than they probably would be for weeks. "It's up to you," Miss Elder (old him).

"All right, we'll go," he replied. Haldeman felt there was little danger from ice due to fog and rain at high altitudes. The American Girl can climb 18,000 to 20,000 feet. Haldeman said the plane was capable of a speed of 130 miles an hour. He expected to average 110 miles an hour. The plane carried 520 gallons of gasoline, considered sufficient to last 4,400 miles and 20 gallons of oil. The loaded plane weighed 5,800 pounds, 350 pounds more than Lindbergh's craft.

Emergency equipment included a rubber life suit for each of the pilots. (Continued on Page Five.)

### AURORA BOREALIS CRIPPLES SERVICE

New York, Vt., Oct. 12.—(AP)—Aurora Borealis, or "northern lights," went on a rampage today and crippled thousands of miles of telegraph wires in the United States and Canada for more than two hours. This natural phenomenon, the bane of telegraph companies, heavily charged wires with excess electricity, making them inoperative.

Between 6 and 8 a. m. today the vast leased wire system of the Associated Press was affected as far west as Kansas City. Commercial wires were also put up.

When the sun appeared, the trouble was ameliorated to a great extent and a majority of the wires operated normally.

## REBELS FLEE TOWARD COAST

### General Gomez and Almada Believed to Be Attempting to Escape Government.

Mexico City, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Pursued through the wild mountain country of western Vera Cruz, the rebel generals Arnulfo Gomez and Hector Almada today were believed to be attempting to reach the coast where passage in a fishing boat or other small craft would put them beyond the reach of the government.

Hot on their trail were scouting parties of federal troops under command of General Gonzalo Escobar who on Monday reported that he had dispersed the rebel forces and captured the main body, leaving Gomez and Almada with only about 400 followers.

A dozen small groups, scattered in every direction, was declared by the government to be all that was left of the rebel column, which it is stated never exceeded 1,000 men. Vera Cruz dispatches say the main group captured by the government troops numbered more than 650 and that all were from the units which marched out of the Mexico City garrison barracks the night of Oct. 2nd.

Those captured were 300 soldiers of the 50th battalion; seven officers and 200 soldiers of the 48th battalion, and the officers and 150 artillerymen of the 2nd regiment.

To guard against the activities of bandits, attempting to take advantage of the situation, the government has ordered an adequate escort of federal soldiers for every freight and passenger train. Railway officials have been instructed to notify the war department of all train movements to facilitate the posting of these guards.

Taking cognizance of reports that the government had manufactured a case of treason against General Francisco Serrano, who was recently executed, President Calles has issued a statement tracing the history of the movement.

He declares he was aware at an early stage that the revolt was being planned; that he sought to dissuade General Serrano from the attempt and that he refrained from action only because of his hope that the plotters would abandon their enterprise.

"In compliance with their duty," he says, "numerous army commanders were invited to rebel informed me thereof, which with the secret service, afforded me from the beginning full knowledge of the conspiracy."

"Any doubt that might have lingered in my hand vanished when Serrano himself, out of his wits, went so far as to ask me to consent to an attempt to overthrow the legislative power in the preparatory sitting previous to the opening of congress."

"In consideration for the state of the public mind, excited by the election campaign of the presidential candidates who became rebels, I forbore with endless tolerance, aiming at proving unreservedly my earnest impartiality in the political struggle, and with a desire of giving citizens of revolutionary inclination opportunity to return to the field of democratic campaigning."

"I made an attempt to dissuade Serrano from his foolish project a week before the opening of the congress. I issued a statement expressing my full confidence in the army and high esteem of its commanders, which esteem was not (Continued on Page Five.)

## REPUBLICANS FOR NORRIS

### Western Senators Announce Intention to Unite For Solidarity of Action.

Washington, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Western Republican Senators, belonging to the so-called progressive group, have announced their intention to unite "for solidarity of action" in consideration of presidential candidates and legislative problems of the next Congress.

Disclaiming any threat of forming a third party, of Western Senators with Senator Borah of Idaho, as their spokesman declared in a statement that their purpose of banding together was based on the theory that "the Republican party is a national party and not an eastern party."

While Senator Norris, of Nebraska, a progressive leader, has not indicated his desire to enter the presidential primaries, the Western senatorial group expressed unanimity in support of him. Other members of the group included Senators Frazier and Nye of Dakota and Brookhart of Iowa.

Although the purpose of the group's organization was announced yesterday with a presidential choice no action would be taken until other Western Senators arrived and participated in conferences.

## Temperance Union Opens In Raleigh

Raleigh, Oct. 12 (AP)—The teaching and practicing of temperance remain the keynote of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, Mrs. W. B. Lindsay of Charlotte, state president, declared today at the opening of the three day annual convention here.

About 100 delegates were present. Annual reports, on this afternoon's program, made by corresponding secretary Miss Flora B. Harding, Asheville, treasurer Mrs. Ellen J. Y. Freyer, Greensboro, and auditor Miss Velma McCullough, Greensboro, all cited progress in the last twelve months for the W. C. T. U., the longest organization of women in the State.

"While the W. C. T. U. has sponsored and worked for legislation, not only along temperance and law enforcement lines, but others, and is one of the organizations composing the legislative council of North Carolina, women, it stresses the importance of teaching and practicing temperance as its first objective," Mrs. Lindsay said.

### TO CONSIDER PAROLE FOR EARL CARROLL

## Reed Declares Time is Ripe For Democrats to Take Over Control of the Government

Sedalia, Mo., Oct. 12.—(AP)—Attacks on the Harding and Coolidge administrations, coupled with a charge that "the times are ripe and rotten ripe for a change," placed Senator James A. Reed, of Missouri, before the nation today as a possible Democratic presidential nominee.

Delivering an address at the State-wide Democratic rally here Senator Reed, regarded generally as a likely candidate, outlined his views on issues of the 1928 presidential campaign and asserted the need today was "an American administration that thinks only in terms of America and labors for the interests of our people."

The Senator predicted his remarks by declaring that he spoke only for himself, however, and that he did not "arrogate to myself the right to speak for the Democratic party."

The Harding and Coolidge administrations, the former debt settlements, the tariff, secretary of the treasury Mellon and corrupt elections all came in for a denunciation by the famous Missourian.

On the day President Harding assumed office, he asserted, "sinister financial conspiracies to intents and purposes took possession of the government and have ever since exercised a dominant control."

Pleading for harmony in Democratic ranks, Senator Reed pointed out that "we must put aside matters which are near to the hearts of many. If everybody tries to have his own way in all things, nobody will have his way in anything."

"Fads, fancies and experimental theories should be disregarded," he continued, "we should pitch our tents in the old camp of Democracy."

"Let us rally our forces to the flag of the constitution. Let us make our fight beneath banners proclaiming—"

"The inalienable rights of the citizen, among which are liberty of conscience, without coercion, criticism or obliquity. The right of every man to worship God according to the dictates of his conscience, and that none shall make him afraid."

"The right of free speech, free press and peaceable assembly."

"The right of each citizen to regulate his own personal conduct—chart his own course through life—determine his own habits and to control the affairs of his own household, free from all restraints, save that in the exercise of these natural privileges he will not interfere with the rights of others."

Senator Reed stressed the need to "reassert the truth of the doctrine that if people are to remain free, local self government and the sovereignty of the States must be preserved."

"The federal power should be brought within the limits not only of the letter but also within the spirit of the constitution," Senator Reed observed. "The march of centralization must be arrested. Government by boards and bureaucracies must cease."

"Let us demand," he continued, "the honest administration of government, the swift and sure punishment of all public plunderers, bribe-mongers and other maniacs; the equalization of the burden of taxation; the repeal of all laws creating special privileges; the dismissal of any army of spies, snipers, sneaks and informers; the liberation of honest business from oppressive interference by governmental agents; the prosecution and punishment of those who by trusts, combinations and restraints of trade make war on honest business and despoil the people."

He declared in part: "Let us advocate the American doctrine, which places the interests of our country and our people above that of any and all other countries or peoples; which tolerates no divided allegiance; which aims to make American citizens the freest, happiest and most prosperous people on earth; and which rejects all policies calculated to imperil the rights or jeopardize the majesty and security of the United States."

"Let us demand that the government shall in all proper ways assist in the development of the natural resources of the land—that it shall immediately develop and execute a plan to control and conserve our great inland waters; harness their power; develop the arid lands of the West; protect the great valley States from inundation; and place upon our mighty rivers and lakes arsgos, which shall bear an immense commerce, thus commercially uniting the interior United States with the Panama Canal."

"We shall insist upon the encouragement and development of a great merchant marine which will not only carry our commerce to all ports of the world in American ships and beneath the American flag, but which also will strengthen our grip upon the seas in case of war."

## POLICE TAKE FOUR THIEVES

### Capture of Negroes This Morning Provides Solution to Series of Robberies.

Four members of a band of thieves who have been operating in this city the past several days, were captured by local police shortly before the noon hour today. All of them were negroes, the oldest being about sixteen years of age.

Chief Lester Jones stated there were other members of the band still at large and that they hoped to have them in custody before sunset.

The police had been unable to get any information concerning identity of the thieves until this morning when a negro youth was arrested for having a pistol in his possession. Investigation divulged the fact that the gun had been stolen from the home of a white resident.

## ANOTHER GERMAN AIRMAN TAKES AIR

Hamburg, Germany, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The Heinkel hydro-airplane D-1229 was forced to land in Elbe River near Brunsbuttel this afternoon because of a radiator defect.

Warnemunde, Germany, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Another German contender for trans-Atlantic flight honors, the Heinkel Hydro-Mono plane D-1229, lifted itself out of the sunlit waters of the Elbe at Warnemunde at 1:21 o'clock this afternoon and took a south-westerly course in the direction of the English Channel.

Her ultimate destination was the United States, although it was announced that the flight would likely be punctuated with landings at Amsterdam, Vigo and the Azores.

## FLAMES WIPE OUT HEART OF SEASIDE TOWN

### Fifty Buildings at New Jersey Resort Destroyed Last Night Damage \$4,000,000.

Ocean City, N. J., Oct. 12.—(AP)—Swept by fire, the heart of this South Jersey seaside resort today was a mass of ruins.

Driven by a brisk ocean breeze the blaze, which started at 7 o'clock last night in the Unger Arcade building at 9th street and the Board Walk, wiped out approximately fifty buildings, including hotels, cottages, shops and theatres, before it was brought under control four hours later. Many others were damaged. Mayor Joseph G. Champion estimated the damage at close to \$4,000,000.

The Board Walk between 7th and 10th streets was almost completely destroyed. The Arcade cafe, the Hippodrome, a pier and amusement center; several motion picture houses and a score of shops and other business places along the walk were burned before the flames spread inland.

Nearly all the buildings were of frame construction and were quickly consumed. An explosion of gasoline in a boardwalk garage was held responsible for the spread of the flames to the cottage and hotel section on Wesley, Atlantic and Ocean avenues. Here, too, the structures were mostly frame and for a time it was feared dynamite would have to be resorted to in order to check the fire.

Among the larger hotels destroyed were the Normandie-by-the-Sea which contained 1,600 rooms and was valued at \$6,000,000; the Edgemoor and the Playmoor.

Nearly every structure from the Boardwalk to Wesley Avenue, three blocks inland, between 8th and 10th streets, was either destroyed or damaged. Among the homes burned were those of Mayor Champion and Dr. W. P. Haynes, the latter was one of the shot-up places of the resort.

Many families, rendered homeless by the fire, watched over the meagre household goods they had salvaged throughout the night. Others spent the night in cottages that had been vacated for the winter or at hotels.

Firemen from nearby points aided in conquering the blaze. Hospital ambulances with doctors and nurses also were sent from several cities, and an emergency hospital was established at the city hall. A score of persons were treated for minor injuries, but no one was seriously hurt.

Company F, 112th field artillery New Jersey National Guard, was patrolling the streets of the affected area today to prevent looting. Fully armed, the men were sent here by truck from Atlantic City under command of Capt. Garrett Cramer. A line was established far from the fire zone and every person having no business was met with a bayonet.

## John Lodge Leads Detroit Primary

Detroit, Oct. 12.—(AP)—John W. Lodge, who has held public office here nearly a quarter of a century without ever having campaigned for election, led a seven-cornered field by more than 20,000 votes in yesterday's non-partisan primary election for nomination as Mayor.

Mayor John W. Smith, seeking re-election on a platform of pronounced liberalism toward enforcement of the prohibition laws, was runner-up to Lodge, and the names of these two will appear on the ballot at the November 8th election.

Lodge, who is grand uncle of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, refused to make a campaign on the ground that "The office should seek the man."

## Lively Program For The Indoor Boxing Season

New York, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The indoor boxing season of 1927-28 especially so far as Tex Rickard's Madison Square Garden program is concerned, promises to be one of the liveliest in years.

Scott and Paulino are matched November 4, while Heeney is slated to meet Sharkey on November 18 the winners of these two to be drawn together in a later elimination.

A. titleholder because of his victory over Red Chapman, Boston rival of "Whisper" Tony Canzonieri, of New York, is matched on October 24 with Johnny Dundee, the veteran Italian boxer, who held undisputed possession of the 126-pound crown before voluntarily retiring two years ago.

GAMBLING

Numerous complaints heard today regarding the gambling devices being operated at the fair here would indicate that the matter should be given immediate attention by the fair authorities or county officers.

With what is termed the best fair ever held here, from the standpoint of exhibits, the fair officials should make every effort to eliminate those features that detract, if they desire the good citizens of the county to continue to attend and support the fairs. We have laws against gambling and if the fair authorities do not eliminate the gambling devices from the midway then it is time for the sheriff and his officers to take a hand. Just because it is at the fair is no more excuse for permitting gambling than anywhere else and if the gambling continues officers will be doing only their sworn duty if they arrest both the operators and those persons patronizing the various gambling devices.

The operation of gambling devices at fairs should be abolished and there is no better time than the present to begin this move for cleaner and better midways at the fairs.

## ONE WAY IT CAN HELP

The News and Observer hits it right when it declares that the best step the K. K. K. can take to assure law and order in North Carolina is to step down and out and by so doing eliminate the temptation to others to hide behind a hood to carry on their acts of violence, hoping at the same time to shift the blame to the Klan organization.

Commenting on the announcement that the klan will endeavor to bring about enactment of laws for punishment of those who under cover of a hood assault or threaten others, the Observer says:

"News comes out of Charlotte that W. S. Belser, acting Grand Dragon of the Ku Klux Klan, proposes to mobilize all forces he can control to secure the passage of a penal statute to impose 'drastic punishment on any one in any conceivable disguise assaults or threatens to assault another.'

"The only way the K. K. K. as now organized can do anything to prevent flogging is to disband, or for the law-abiding members to follow the course of Judge Grady and resign. The floggings in the South are due to the Klan. This is not to say that all of it was perpetrated by Klansmen. Lawless men outside the klan have doubtless disguised themselves as klansmen and have been guilty of unlawfully inflicting punishment. Let the klan

dissolve and ninety-nine per cent of hooded violence will cease.

In the late sixties patriotic men wore disguises for the purpose, in the absence of any government able to protect the womanhood of the South, of inflicting physical punishment on miscreants. The K. K. K. stood for punishment. It was a vigilantes organization headed by men who dissolved the organization when responsible government was enthroned.

There is no need for any hooded K. K. K. today when civil government is able to give protection."

## NEGRO PRISONER SHOT

NEAR ASHEVILLE, N. C.

Raleigh, Oct. 11.—(AP)—John Crockett, Mecklenburg County negro, shot late Saturday while trying to escape from a prison camp near Asheville, was still making a game fight for his life today, State prison officials reported here.

Crockett, doing from 10 to 20 years for burglary, had been placed in solitary confinement for refusing to work, prison officials said. When he guard went to feed him late Saturday the negro dashed out of the door when it was opened and knocked the guard down. The latter arose and commanded the negro to halt.

When Crockett refused to halt, he guard shot him three times, the third shot plunging his way through the negro's abdomen. He is under the care of Asheville's physicians.

# REVOLT HAS COME TO END

Major Disturbance  
Mexico Reported  
Today With  
Capture of Rebels.

Mexico City, Oct. 11.—(AP)—With the same dramatic swiftness with which it started, the military revolt has been crushed, leaving the Calles government in absolute master of the situation. A general Obregon, the only presidential candidate in the field to succeed Calles.

Disastrously defeated in a pitched battle in the hills of Western Vera Cruz, General Amador Gomez and General Alameda were being hunted today by the victorious federal troops under General Gonzalo Escobar.

"It is the end!" was President Calles' brilliant comment on the news of Escobar's victory, which came after a five-hour battle ending in the capture of between 500 and 600 rebels, the killing of 50 and the wounding of 100.

The revolution is absolutely ended," was announced by General Alameda, chief of the presidential staff.

The Gomez-Alameda column of not more than 1,000 men was the last remaining rebel force of any size in the country, the government declared. Its members today either were wounded, captured or scattered over the countryside in two or three groups. The two leaders with hundreds of not more than 50 men each, would either be quickly captured by the authorities said, or would "disappear into the hills."

General Francisco Serrano named as the other principal leader of the revolt which was all ended based on "non-election" opposition to the presidential candidacy of former President Obregon, was captured and executed twenty hours after the capture of Alameda and part of the Mexico City garrison the night of October 2.

This government has stamped out within a week's time what is generally considered to have been the most formidable movement against it since President Calles was elected to succeed Obregon.

The battle which brought such a swift end to the rebels was fought Sunday. The pursuit of the rebels continued over the hills of the country. The rebels were captured at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon and for a battle near the town of Alvarado.

The battle continued fiercely until about 10 o'clock in the evening. Rebel casualties were estimated at 150, of whom 50 were killed. The federal forces were estimated at 22 wounded, including six officers.

General Escobar reported that Gomez and Alameda with small bodies of followers "had shamefully" abandoned their men.

Gomez fled in the direction of Coahuila, but was captured by the old fortress of Perote and not far from the Puebla State line. The main body of rebels withdrew in the same direction, and between 500 and 600 men with their officers surrendered.

President Calles sent a congratulatory message and requested a detailed report of the action which ended the revolution. He also personally ordered that the rebels be given the officers and men who surrendered.

Stancill Will Probate  
The will of Dr. S. Stancill, former commissioner of Public Works of Charlotte, reported by the probate court to be approximately \$115,000 including \$15,000 worth of personal property. The property is left to his widow Mrs. Cora Stancill, his daughter, Cora Beatrice Stancill, and a brother J. Clyde Stancill with minor bequests to other relatives.

Steamers Collide  
Los Angeles, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Wireless dispatches to the Federal Telegraph office here early today reported the steamers Pomona and Kelpaka had collided four miles off Point Arguello, about 140 miles north of San Pedro.

Distress signals intercepted by the Pomona from the Kelpaka indicated the latter was badly damaged, but the Pomona was reported standing by.

The plane has a small radio set with a radius of 75 miles. Haldeman said that in case the plane was forced down he would operate the set on a 620 meter wave length from a battery capable of supplying electrical energy for six hours.

The plane of the American Girl weighed nine pounds and included a tin of coffee and beef tea, turkey sandwiches, chocolate, orange juice and chocolate.

The two fliers went to the field yesterday dressed as though they had planned an ordinary visit to Paris. Miss Elder wore a plaid dress and a hat. Haldeman wore a blue business suit, tan shoes and a grey cap. Before boarding the plane both bunched fur-lined army flying suits.

The take-off was one of the most thrilling since that of Lindbergh's perched on the starting mound, the plane was fueled and the fliers awaited a favorable wind. Finally Haldeman, tired of waiting for the wind to change and with only about an hour more of daylight left, decided to go to the other end of the runway. He kissed his wife goodbye and jumped aboard. Miss Elder who had been walking about nervously saying: "I'm very happy, I'm very happy," smiled and joined him.

"I depend upon God and if he wants us to get there we will get there," she said.

Paris, Oct. 12.—(AP)—A calm sea with only a faint breeze and bright sunshine awaited the American girl along the French coast. The weather outlook was favorable except for predictions that tomorrow morning is likely to be hazy.

Belfast, Ireland, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The present weather conditions for the American girl, so far as Ireland is concerned, were quite good today. It was a beautiful day at Queenstown with a light easterly breeze and some haze, but fairly good visibility with every prospect of a bright sunny afternoon.

New York, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The monoplane on whose staying powers Ruth Elder and Captain George Haldeman have staked their lives is a stock model Stinson-Detroler like that flown over the Atlantic by William S. Brock and Edward F. Schlee on their incomplete round-the-world flight.

The Elder craft is powered by a single Wright Whirlwind motor, such as was used in the flights of Lindbergh, Chamberlin, Byrd, and Brock and Schlee.

Every place of material in the plane was subject to an X-ray examination for possible defects. The plane has a wingspread of 43 feet and the fuselage a length of 32 feet in which the passenger seats have been placed by a crew and line tanks. Vision is provided by four slant windows behind the engine, two in front and one on each side. The plane carried 520 gallons of gasoline sufficient to cruise more than 4,000 miles, and weighed fully 5,500 pounds.

"As a further demonstration of my purpose to safeguard the military decorum of those who are arrested leading the revolt which has failed, I took no steps to deprive of their commands officers who since then became pledged to the rebellion."

QUEEN GIVES FORTUNE TO CAUSE OF ISLAM

Bombay, India, (AP)—Her Highness the Begum of Bhopal, known as the Queen Victoria of India, has given one of her private properties valued at fifty million rupees, to the propagation of the Islam religion and she will devote the remainder of her life to the cause.

The queen, who recently abdicated at the age of 70 in favor of her son, has been ruler of Bhopal for 25 years, and her enlightened government has made the province one of the most progressive in India.

Recently the queen went to London to assure the succession of her son. The British government and the Indian government agreed to her request. She abdicated at once and returned home accompanied by her son, the Nawab, in accordance with the tenets of the Islam religion, the queen was nearly veiled on her appearance in London.

irrigation, canals from lakes to ocean and Mississippi flood control, in a few years.

Laws should discourage carelessness. Imprisonment for life with no credit for good behavior non-sense, should punish incendiarism. Property owners insure for full value or more, and then neglect fire precautions.

Proof of such neglect sought out by paid officials should cancel insurance automatically, and keep it cancelled for three to five years. If that happens, fewer tenement house fires would happen. The landlord would sit up.

Premier Baldwin says Britain and America will never fight. They may not always agree but they will thresh out differences, or differ like friends and gentlemen. It's a safe prediction, for various reasons, if Britain and America fought, that hideous squall would put the world back five hundred years, and financially speaking, ruin both countries.

In addition, Britain and America have all they want and more than they want. Why should they fight? Ford, Rockefeller, Baker, Mellon, are the four richest men in the world.

Can you imagine them going after each other with automatics, mustard bombs, etc? They compete for hard for business and just a few more hundreds of millions, to make the game amusing. But they don't shoot.

Great industries, not content with gigantic production, work constantly to produce better methods, of which the public gets the benefit. Standard Oil spends on research work, producing no immediate profit, more money every year than it. Rockefeller had when he was already considered a very rich man.

The tube works department of United States Steel, making annually thousands of miles of steel and iron pipe for every conceivable purpose, spends large sums on the fight against rust, studying methods for protecting iron against rust and destruction by chemicals in the ground.

It costs millions to renew pipe lines for the great oil companies every year. Find a method of protection from rust as copper protects itself and you will save for this country enough to pay the national debt in 20 years.

LOYOLA TEAM OF NEW ORLEANS  
FOOTBALL SENSATION OF SOUTH

Undeclared last season and in its first two games this year, the Loyola College Maroon Cyclone of New Orleans is rated as one of the strongest football teams in the South. Because of its record, Notre Dame has given it a place on the 1928 schedule.

New Orleans, La.—(AP)—Virtually unknown in the athletic world seven years ago—a college without a football team—Loyola of New Orleans in this brief interval has become one of the strongest gridiron forces in the South.

So impressive was the team's showing in going through last season without a defeat that Notre Dame has given it a place on the 1928 schedule. Sweeping through ten victories in 1926, Loyola scored 355 points, topping all other eleven in high scoring and winning the sobriquet of "The Maroon Cyclone."

Only three teams succeeded in crossing the Louisiana's goal line and these amassed a total of only 31 points. Loyola of Chicago was defeated 40 to 14, Baylor, 13 to 10, and the Tennessee School of Medicine 14 to 7. Jefferson, Detroit, Catholic University, Spring Hill, Lincoln, Fort Branning and Little Rock were smothered with scores ranging from 6 to 76 points.

Although the Jesuits were pioneer educators in old Louisiana and Loyola was founded nearly a hundred years ago, the student body never went in for sports on a large scale until 1921, when its first football team was sent forth. The first five years saw a gradual rise of the eleven and then came the sensational season of 1926, when the undefeated freshman team of 1925 became the varsity.

Eddie Reed, who had coached the Frosh, became the varsity coach and he centered his attack and defense on Bucky Moore, generally recognized as one of the greatest backfield stars ever produced in the South. Bucky ran wild with the opposition, leading the entire South in point scoring with 195 to his credit.

New Orleans made him its idol. He was called "The Dixie Flyer." A race horse and a candy were named after him. Great in his ability to tear through the field for substantial gains, Moore has strong assistance from his teammates. Spalding, for example, named 18 Louisiana football players on its all-star list last year and of these six were members of "The Maroon Cyclone."
