

NEW PLAYS AND STARS ON GRID HORIZON

Atlanta, Ga. Oct. 18.—(AP)—Scouts of southern conference football returned to their camps this week with stories of unexpected plays, new stars and a change passing game to watch as the twenty-two eleven prepared for action this week-end.

Sewanee is playing Alabama Saturday, will have a threat from Alabama to Guard against in the form of a pass from punt formation. The Crimson Tide on several occasions lined up on a third down exactly as if a kick was to be expected and then the triple threat man would pass.

Swink, South Carolina half back, showed an alertness for watching the ball against North Carolina and this resulted in victory for the Game cocks. He intercepted a pass and ran forty yards for touchdown.

Ward, of the Tar Heels, continued to show versatility in ground gaining.

English Typist Making Try At Channel Swim

London, Oct. 18.—(AP)—"I shall try to lift the cloud from English swimmers," Miss Mercedes Glets, London typist and channel swimmer declared today before setting out for Boulogne, France, from where she will go to Cape Gris Nez, intending to repeat her channel swim "as a personal vindication and for the honor of women swimmers."

"Dr. Dorothy Cochrane Logan's book has covered us with suspicion and filled the minds of the public with doubt," she said. "The water is much colder now than when I swam the English channel on October 7. The weather conditions are not so favorable now—but I feel that I must try it. Something must be done to restore the prestige which Dr. Logan's criticisms have impaired."

Master Of The Drop-Kick

Colorado Springs, Colo. (AP)—Much of the hope of Colorado College for a Rocky Mountain Conference football championship this year rests on the team's captain Field Phelps, a halfback whose drop-kicking has made his team a serious contender for the last two years.

Phelps established a world's interscholastic record for the drop-kick four years ago by putting the ball through the uprights from a distance of 59 yards. He has averaged two drop-kicks to a game for the last two years. Many of them were from the 45-yard mark and beyond. In one game in which his team scored more than 100 points he scored from the field nine times and two of the drop-kicks were beyond the 45-yard mark.

The Colorado College team is coached by William van de Graaff former University of Alabama star and an all-American end at the United States Military Academy. Van de Graaff hopes to overhaul the University of Utah, whose powerful team won the Rocky Mountain title last year and then beat the University of Hawaii in a post-season contest—the first time the Islanders had met defeat at home in years.

PLAYING THE GAME

The American Interest In Football
By Fielding H. Yost

Ann Arbor, Mich.—(AP)—Residents of the United States are beginning at this time their greatest period of concentration on any one sport. Continuing on to the end of November almost unaccounted millions of people will see a football game at some time during the week and other untold millions will seek the accounts of the game in the newspapers or listen to description of the contest by radio.

At the present time there are more than 40 organizations and groups of colleges that have teams in active participation in football games. Almost every state also has a high school organization or union.

These conferences and state organizations have helped to promote the highest quality of competition and have assisted in widening the appeal of the game by building up a common interest, a common eligibility as well as competitive possibilities. This latter is especially true of the high schools with their divisions according to their capabilities into A, B, C, and D classes.

Why this intense interest in the game?

Every nation has the songs and games that typify the spirit and interest of the people.

The English, pioneering in many of the games that have been transplanted to the United States have their form of football and cricket. The American, developing these games, have their form of football baseball and basketball.

In many ways the games are similar—in one sense, however, they are vastly different.

Any one who knows the English temperament is not surprised that cricket is one of Britain's sports. No normal American, however, would go to a game of cricket, stop for tea, return to the game, spend a night in slumber, and go back the next day to see the first batter put out.

It is really true that we took English football and cricket, added speed, action and rules that assured a speedy termination and developed our football and baseball. In doing so, games that better suited the temperament of America were developed. It is possible we have not developed better games, but cricket could not

become the national game of America any more than baseball could become the last word in sport in England. The spirit and interest of the people are suited by different types of games.

It seems strange how America's swiftest transportation and football have kept pace with each other. In the early days of football, when "Old 999" was setting records, the game was so planned that a quick concentration of power was the objective. When the automobile was in the pioneering stage and more than a mile a minute became a possibility, the game was opened up to make speed and versatility of primary importance instead of power. Now with the airplane and its two miles a minute, greater speed, more varied versatility is added to the game.

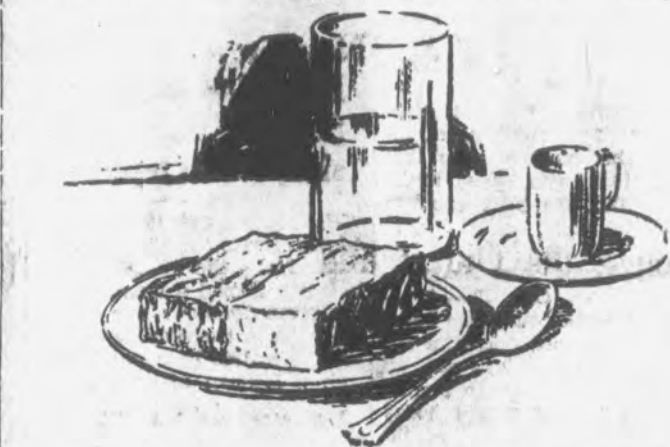
This opening up of the game has added value for both spectator and player—more than that, it has put the game abreast with or ahead of the people. It has added to the interest of the spectators because even the latest informed can follow the progress of the game at all times and see the personnel of competing teams. It has added to interest of the player because wits and quick thinking and not power only are the requirements.

The widespread interest in football is because it represents the interest and spirit of America. It is the "Long Long Trail" of the war days the "Dixie" of the Southland expressed in terms of moving, clashing figures, cheering crowds, stirring students, the game that suits the spirit of America.

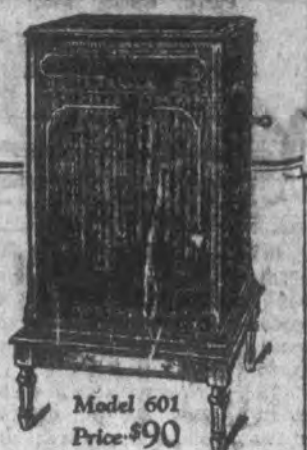

TURNER OPENS REVIVAL HERE

Pastor Hayes-Barton Church, Raleigh, at The Immanuel Baptist Church.

Rev. James B. Turner, pastor of the Hayes-Barton Baptist church, Raleigh, began a series of revival services at the Immanuel Baptist church in this city last night. He delivered a forceful message dealing with the subject of "Another Kind of Immortality," and was heard by a splendid crowd.

Song services were under the direction of Rev. L. R. O'Brien, pastor of the church, who also introduced Mr. Turner to the congregation, although, he declared, an introduction was not necessary.

The revival will continue for a period of ten days, and will begin each evening at 7:30. Services will also be held each afternoon at four o'clock. Dr. Turner is well known in Greenville, having been pastor of the Immanuel Baptist church a few years ago. While here he took an active part in the civic and religious development of the city. He came in contact with men and women in all walks of life and accomplished great good in behalf

of Christianity.

His subject last night was a slight departure from the usual kind dealing with immortality. His text was taken from the third to sixth verses of the fourteenth chapter of Mark, which gives a vivid description of Christ's visit to the house of Simon, the leper, at Bethany.

He talked about immortality of words and deeds. Words have been immortal since the dawn of history. They have had telling effect in the moulding of lives and the destinies of nations. Once spoken, they can never be recalled. So one should not be careless of speech, but should guard the tongue and see that only helping and constructive things are uttered by it.

"So it is with deeds. Many a deed has been immortalized in song and poem. A person must be right

within before his words and deeds can have the influence they should have. There is only one direct way to get right, he declared, and that is through the teachings of the Bible.

INDICTED FOR ALABAMA FLOGGINGS

After laying itself open to the reproach of doing nothing to bring to justice those responsible for masked-gang floggings, Alabama is in a fair way to vindicate itself. In Crenshaw county, where more than twenty-five such outrages were committed in less than two years, a Special Grand Jury has returned 102 indictments against twenty-eight men in that county and eight others in Butler county. The prospect of protection from pursuit through the intimidation of public officials or their tacit connivance no longer holds good.

Only after long and bitter agitation in the press was this action of the Grand Jury taken. Because of the circumstances the Ku Klux Klan was directly under suspicion, and in Alabama the Ku Klux Klan has been all-powerful in politics. At any rate, many months passed and nothing was done. When the Special Grand Jury had been sworn in, Judge A. E. Gamble denounced the rule of "the mask and the lash," while assuming not to know whether the "outrages were committed with the sanction of the Ku Klux Klan," he called on the officers of the Klan to come to the aid of the officers of the law. Just what assistance, if any, they rendered does not appear, but one conspicuous leader, the Rev. I. A. Nalls, Exalted Cyclops of the Georgiana Klavern, promptly left home when the Grand Jury met and has not since been found. Other Klansmen of high rank are sharply rebuked by name in the Grand Jury's report.

New forces have been at work in Alabama; a changed spirit has been created under pressure of public opinion. In charge of the investigation now so vigorously prosecuted, is Attorney Charles C. McCall, himself a Klansman. He promises that within two weeks

the first case will be called. It looks at last as if Alabama were aroused to the fearless administration of justice in dealing with offenders of whatever class.—New York World.

New York, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Jack Britton, former welterweight champion of the world, has been halted temporarily at least, in his effort to get back at the top of the ranks. Britton came within inches of winning the bout in the first round, when Martinez sent a low blow home that put Jack on the resin. The crowd yelled for a foul but referee Dorman started a count and Britton got to his feet when five had been tolled.

No damage was done by either fighter. The action was slow and many in the crowd began to leave at the start of the seventh round.

Borah Declares Prohibition Is Not Dead Issue

Washington, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Prohibition as a political issue, in the opinion of Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho, is far from dead and he has accepted an invitation to speak before the New York women's committee for law enforcement November 12, in New York.

His acceptance was subject, however, to a stipulation that that organization take definite action with the political parties and he has been given the assurance that the meeting which he will address was called for that purpose.

In a letter to the committee, the Idaho Senator deplored evasion of the prohibition question by "an insipid, meaningless" belief in law and order.

"Here is a definite, and extraordinary situation," he said. "The Constitution is being deliberately defied. And there are those who say it is right and proper to defy it, and through organized public opinion to nullify it. If political parties are unwilling to meet the issue if when the Constitution of the United States is definitely challenged, political expediency without holds support, it must be apparent to all that those who are opposed to the Constitution have won out."

ARRANGE MANDELL AND TERRIS BOUT

New York, Oct. 18.—(AP)—A match that would bring Sammy Mandell, lightweight champion, against Sid Terris, New York contender, is in the making and will be closed if suitable financial arrangements can be made for Terris, according to Jess McMahon, matchmaker for Tex Rickard.

The fight would be 15 rounds to a decision at Madison Square Garden late in December or early in January of 1928.

Virtuous, mildly rebellious wives of Chicopee, Massachusetts, prepare ten commandments for husbands and show that they do not understand the problems of husbands or marriage. It is useless to talk about details, including the double standard of morals.

A problem is in two words—SYMPATHY AND JUSTICE.

If a man is sympathetic and just he will try to do what he ought to do. His success will depend on his age and his degree of semi-civilization.

No reality is the "husband calling contest." At the Suffolk Vinn "A. Fair, prizes were for wives that could call their husbands with a voice endearing and audible from afar.

The wife, combining endearment with extreme radius, was to be crowned queen of husband callers. Unrestrained husbands will shudder at the thought of that penetrating, endearing call.

Wives have been engaged in this husband calling contest for 500,000 years, first to get him, then to keep him.

Their patience throughout the ages is amazing, the smallness of their reward pathetic.

A clergyman kills himself. No need to print his unfortunate name.

A young woman is caught stealing to get money to buy tombstones for her mother and sister.

That clergyman struggle on as they do, many poor and neglected to old age, is a tribute to their courage and a disgrace to men.

The poorer families suffer most this way, and clergymen should discourage regardless of Sexton's protests.

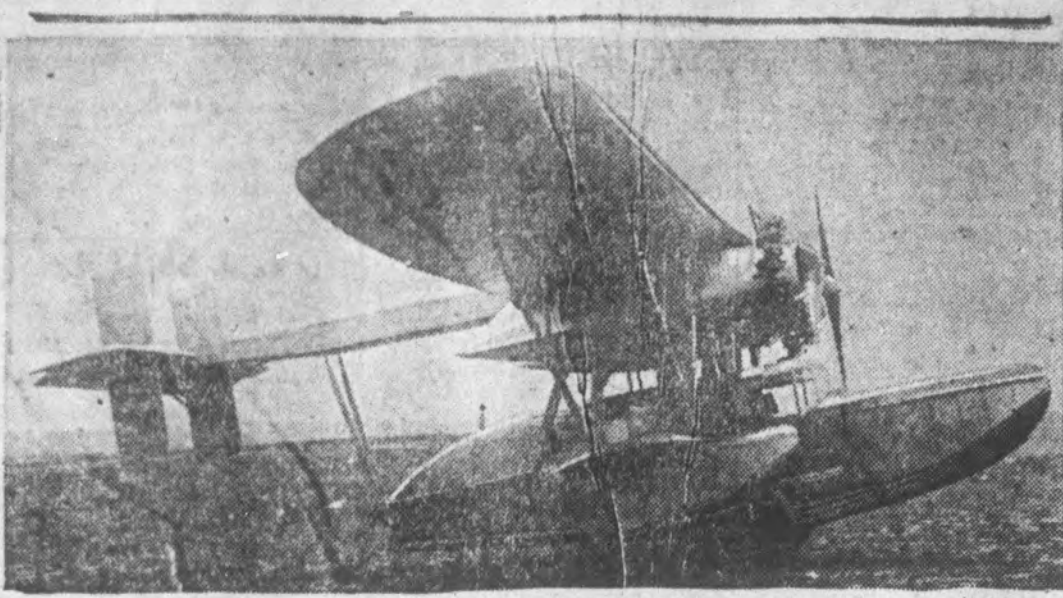
