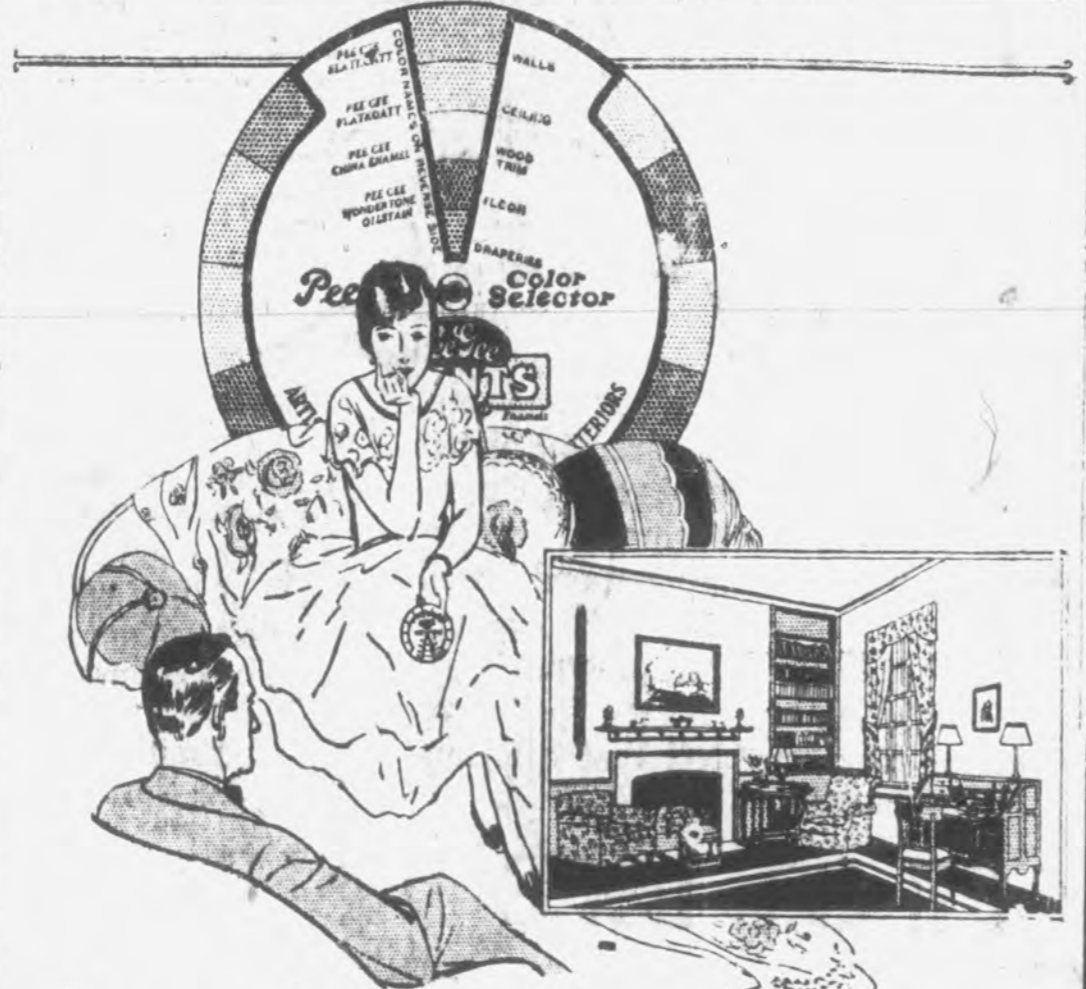

Judging from news reports Mexico sees in Dwight W. Morrow, the solution of the controversy that for years has caused much concern and trouble on both sides of the Rio Grande. Here's hoping their recently expressed belief will not turn out to be a pipe dream.

There are few people who would not resent being called criminals, yet the person who persists in driving an unlighted vehicle on the roads after dark is a criminal that is endangering his own life and that of others. Did you ever stop to think of it in that light?

### LINDBERGH'S BIG TOUR

Lindbergh, when he arrived here yesterday after an absence of almost exactly three months, completed the most amazing tour that any man has ever made in this country. He flew 22,350 miles. He touched every State in the Union. He made stops in eighty-two cities. He made 147 speeches. He endured 1,255 miles of parade. In short, he did exactly what he said he was

going to do when he started out, something that most of us had smiled at as a boyish dream, something that by all the laws of probability should have blown up before it was fairly started.

It was more remarkable this feat, than the flight to Paris itself. For that flight lasted only a day and a half, involved but one take-off and one landing. But this air tour through the country lasted three months, involved countless take-offs and countless landings, was over all kinds of country and through all kinds of weather. Yet Lindbergh was late only once, and that was when a fog forced him down near Portland, Maine.

Did he accomplish anything? One imagines he accomplished much. To judge from the despatches, he has aroused the country as has no other man to the needs of aviation. These needs include airports and all sorts of facilities for the itinerant flier, and they must be met by communities rather than by the fliers themselves. If he made communities realize what must be done if flying

**STOCK MARKET**  
New York, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Disregarding recent unfavorable corporation reports and disappointing railroad earnings statements, the Stock Market today was driven upward in the brisk competition to buy stocks as cheaply as possible. Several specialties rose to new peaks for the year, particularly in the drug group. United Drug, Lamart, Sterling products, American seed, Columbine Carbon, U. S. ether, Warren Brothers, and United States Leather A and Prior were in the list of shares selling at new high prices for 1927.

A sudden drop in Wabash which had recently been "bullied" extensively on alleged competitive buying by Lackawanna, was without effect on the general list, aside from temporary sympathetic heaviness in Texas and Pacific and Kansas City Southern.

The closing was strong. Total sales approximated 2,000,000 shares.

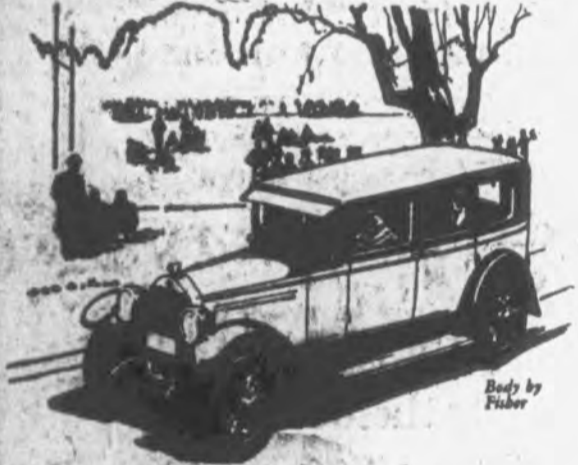

Sixty thousand cars are needed as spares for the Ford sent out alone, and \$75,000 have already been ordered and a down payment made before the cars are ready.
