SMITH FIRES
BROADSIDE AT
YOUNG TEDDY

Governor of N. Y.
Challenges Colonel
To Produce Evidence of Vice.

New York, Nov. 3.—(AP)—With a challenge that evidence be produced to substantiate charges of vice in the county in which New York's capital is located, Governor Alfred E. Smith struck back at Colonel Theodore Roosevelt in a statement published today. The Governor termed charges by the colonel "loose and foolish."

In speeches before the Republican State convention at Rochester and in this city Colonel Roosevelt attacked Tammany as corrupt and blamed Tammany and the governor for conditions in Albany.

"Colonel Roosevelt has little interest in the welfare of the State or New York when at the height of a campaign for constitutional amendments he uses up the time of the public to make a personal attack upon me," said the governor's reply.

Governor Smith said that Colonel Roosevelt "is entirely without understanding of the State's fiscal system."

Roosevelt's charges that police raids on Tammany Hall Club Houses had revealed open gambling were admitted by the governor, who met them with a counter charge that similar raids had been made on Republican club houses, in one of which police encountered gunmen with police records who were in the employ of the Republican club to protect the play.

Addressing Colonel Roosevelt, Governor Smith said in his statement:

"If you have any information about official neglect on the part of the officials of Albany county and will file charges with me in proper form as required by statute, I will proceed against them as a governor should proceed, exactly as I have proceeded in all other cases where complaints were properly filed."

"In the meanwhile, please do not insult the intelligence of the people of the State by attempting to lead them to believe that the governor is a policeman and should be out patrolling his post, every night looking for violators of the law."

"Quit the job of trying to pull the red-hot political chestnuts out of the fire for the disreputable leaders of our old, broken down, dilapidated, corrupt Republican machine."

Northern Chinese
Report Success
On Yellow River

Peking, Nov. 3.—(AP)—General Chang Tsung-Chang, the Shantung northern commander who is now conducting a drive in the province of Honan against General Feng Yu-Hsiang, has reported further successes.

The Shantung forces north of the Yellow River are reported to have captured the important town of Weihwei after defeating Feng's troops who are retreating toward Sianhsan, fifteen miles to the southwest. The Shantung troops operating in central Honan have captured Hsuehchow.

In the meanwhile the main fighting army is still engaged in a desperate battle to the west of Chuenmowhsien. Its objective being Chengchow, important junction on the Peking-Hankow-Lanchow railway.

Locate Position
Distressed Ship

Norfolk, Va., Nov. 3.—(AP)—The American steamship Arlyn, which yesterday sent out a distress call and reported that she was disabled at sea, was located this morning by the coast guard cutter Yamacraw 20 miles southeast of Charleston. She is being towed to Charleston today.

The Arlyn, which is owned by the A. H. Bull Steamship Company of New York, was bound from Port Tampa to Baltimore, with a full cargo of phosphate rock. A distress call from the ship was picked up by the steamship Belvedere, and relayed to Norfolk Coast Guard headquarters yesterday and the Yamacraw and the Florida East Coast patrol was asked to search for her.

The steamer reported her steering gear entirely out of commission and will presumably stop at Charleston for repairs. She was anchored and in no immediate danger when found by the cutter.

Rat Week in England.
The Dust of Jengis.

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This is "rat week" in Great Britain, an army of killers, men, ferrets and dogs, are attacking rats throughout the British Islands.

Last year in Britain's "rat week" 8,000,000 rats were killed. But scientists say there are 40,000,000 rats in Britain, so killing 8,000,000 won't help much. 40,000,000 rats can easily replace 8,000,000 dead in a year, or even in a month.

In Britain rats destroy \$350,000,000 of property annually. Here they destroy more than twice as much.

Our rats eat from millions of uncovered garbage cans and how many millions there are of them ready at a moment's notice to carry bubonic plague or other disease bearing fleas, heaven only knows.

Cultured American cats probably say to themselves: "Oh, to be in England, when 'rat week' is there."

Professor Kosloff, Russian Archaeologist, thinks he has discovered the tomb of Jengis Khan, greatest of all Asiatic conquerors, who died exactly 700 years ago after conquering the world from China to Poland and killing 5,000,000 human beings. The dust that is left of him is said to lie peacefully beside his "second imperial concubine" in the Gobi desert.

That fierce Asiatic who drove back the power of Islam and of Christianity, directed great battles while he played at chess with his crippled son. Now in peace he lies guarded by seven lamas, each of his priests, every seventh hour, striking seven times a great jade bell hanging over the conqueror's dust.

When they carried Jengis Kahn back to the valleys of the great desert where he was born, his mourning warriors killed every human being met on the road, that

WOMEN GIVE
INFORMATION
AT TAX MEET

Business Women Present Views Before House Ways and Means Committee.

Washington, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Passing on to their discussion of corporation income tax rates, the House Ways and Means Committee had before it today consideration of the individual income levels although there have been few indications that any change in these rates will be authorized except possibly those in the higher brackets.

The witness list for the day, however, was the longest during the present tax hearings and included the names of two women, the first time in the history of committee clerks that women have sought to present their views to a congressional committee on the subject of tax reduction.

The women, Lena M. Phillips, of New York City, and Martha L. Connolly of East St. Louis, Ill., were listed as spokesmen for the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs. While on until today the question of revision of individual income rates has occupied a back seat during discussions of tax reduction, the Treasury in presenting its recommendation that the prospective total reduction should be held to \$225,000,000 advocated a slice in

Salute of 21 Guns to
Mark Celebration of
Armistice Day Exercises in City.

Feeling that the general public is interested in the proper observance of "Armistice Day" the local post of the American Legion announced today that some very definite plans have been made for the biggest celebration ever pulled off.

Several committee meetings have been held during the past few weeks and the reports indicate much activity on the part of each committee. The membership of the Legion is made up of boys who helped to make possible the signing of the Armistice and to them November 11th is one of the greatest days the world has ever known. Having had a part in the great world conflict, their hearts naturally burn with a desire to really celebrate this great event, for had it not been for "Armistice Day" several of the local boys would now be resting in "Flanders" Field with the large number of heroes who are there.

To these heroes Americans owe the honor of a fitting program on November 11th and it was long ago determined by the ex-service men that this program should be carried out each year, regardless of the handicaps facing them.

The public is not only invited but urged to set aside their duties for one day and help to make the celebration this year the greatest, by far, we have ever made. The program will be arranged to interest the public generally and it is the wishes of the Legionnaires that they enjoy it with them.

As usual the parade will form at the Coast Line depot composed of the speaker, Hon. A. L. Bulwinkle, ex-serviceman and congressman, the members of the Auxiliary and the Spanish and Civil War Veterans in cars, the high school band, high school children, boy and girl scouts, police department, Battery E, with full equipment, and all ex-service men. It will move down Dickinson avenue to Washington street, and to the courthouse.

Special services will be held at the courthouse, consisting of blowing taps and firing the National Salute of 21 nine inch guns in honor of the dead heroes in France. The firing of these guns will be in charge of Captain Jones of the local artillery unit.

From the courthouse the parade will proceed down Evans street to Fifth street and thence down Fifth street to the new auditorium of the College, better known as the Campus building. The program will continue there with the singing of several songs, led by the College girls, solo by Mrs. J. H. Waldrop, the "American Legion Soprano" selections by the "Lecton Quartet," composed of Lee, Williams, Sellers and Story, exhibitions by the physical culture department of the college, the address of Major Bulwinkle and other numbers to be announced later.

Following these exercises dinner will be served in the basement of the campus building. A war picture will be shown during the afternoon and evening, which is considered the best ever shown here. At 3 o'clock the Battery E football team will play the N. C. State College Reserve team. The local team has made a fine record this year and by continuous practice they will be in fine shape for the Armistice Day game. Both teams are well matched and it is stated that this will be one of the best games played in the State this year.

Tyson Family Hold Annual
Reunion at Farmville, N. C.;
Unveil Marker to Heroes

Around two thousand people, many of them lineal descendants, attended the annual reunion of the Tyson family held in Farmville yesterday.

The occasion was marked by the unveiling of a boulder in honor of Aaron Tyson, pioneer Indian fighter who lost his life in an effort to save the lives of his neighbors in a massacre during the Tuscarora War, and Cornelius Tyson, Revolutionary hero.

Principal speakers of the day were Senator Lawrence D. Tyson, of Tennessee, native Pitt countyan and General A. J. Bowley, commanding officer at Fort Bragg. Mrs. E. O. Gregory, State Regent of the D. A. R., under whose auspices the tablet commemorating the deeds of the Tyson heroes was erected, was also on the program.

"North Carolina, I believe has come farther and done more than any other state in the Union, considering her conditions sixty years ago," declared Senator Tyson at the unveiling ceremonies.

He paid tribute to the work of the D. A. R. organization and the two heroes of the family who had done so much to perpetuate the ideals of American civilization.

"Now that the wonderful patriotic organization, the D. A. R., are unearthing the rich treasures of her storehouses of history, we find that there is no State in the Union with a greater history or whose people have been more patriotic. This old State of North Carolina has been first in many things; first in settlement; first in its determination to be free; first to throw off the yoke of Great Britain; first in the shedding of blood against the Royal troops at Alamance; first in its declaration of independence; first in recommending a declaration of independence to the Continental congress. Later first at Bethel, first at Gettysburg and last at Appomatto. Also her sons were among the first to cross the Hindenburg line. She has always done her part nobly and in every great trial and task in which she has been engaged, and in later years she has gone farthest in leading that great galaxy of Southern States that have so impressed themselves upon the country and in the hearts of the people."

Proceeding the exercises a procession of the State Regent and distinguished guests, escorted by pages a Port Bragg color guard and band assembled and entered the High School auditorium, followed by a large number of local citizens and out-of-town guests. The singing of the National Anthem opened the exercises, and was followed by the D. A. R. Ritual, led by Mrs. E. O. Moore of Wilson, Rev. J. N. Bynum, of Belhaven, gave the invocation. Mrs. B. S. Sheppard, of Raleigh led the audience in the salute to the flag, and Miss Tabitha de Viscount read the American Creed. Mrs. T. C. Turnage, Regent of the Benjamin May Chapter of the D. A. R., at Farmville, gave the address of welcome. When F. L. Carr of Wilson a Tyson descendant responded, S. T. White of Greenville, brought greetings from Pitt County. Mrs. E. C. Gregory State Regent, introduced by Mrs. C. M. Park, of Tarboro, represented the organization and praised the work being done by the local chapter. She also introduced an interesting guest present, Mrs. Margaret Tyson of Raleigh, mother of Senator Tyson.

Gen. A. J. Bowley, commanding officer Port Bragg gave a stirring address on patriotism, and emphasized the need of adequate defense.

Hon. Charles L. Abernethy, representative of the Third District Congress, introduced Senator Tyson. After the address, Mrs. J. L. Shackelford, Farmville, gave report of the genealogical committee. Benediction was said by Mr. Mewborn, of Farmville.

Several selections of music by native composers were given by the Farmville Choral Club, accompanied by Mrs. J. M. Hobgood at the piano.

From the auditorium the audience proceeded to the site of the unveiling, about a mile from Farmville, on Highway 91. Here Mrs. R. L. Smith, of Greenville, presented the memorial, which was accepted by Mrs. E. C. Gregory. Six small descendants of the heroes being honored drew the ribbons that unveiled the granite boulder. They were Misses Betty Tyson, Fannie Cooper, Anne Jones, Doris Corzart Schaum, Norvella Horton Capps, and Nancy Flanagan.

The crowd was then invited to a local warehouse where they shared in a sumptuous basket luncheon. Here they were introduced to a receiving line composed of the following distinguished guests: Mrs. T. Washington, Nov. 3.—(AP)—The name of Rev. Maynard Fletcher, of Washington, was presented for governor of the 57th district of Rotary at the group meeting of Inter-city clubs held in the new auditorium of the East Carolina Teachers College in this city last night. The suggestion was made by R. H. Wright, member of the local Rotary club, and was vociferously received by the two hundred Rotarians, representing eleven clubs in this section of North Carolina.

The program last night was one of the most interesting in months, consisting of several musical numbers, including a solo by Rotarian Stephen Gardner, of Washington, a concert by a jazz band of the Tarboro club and several selections by the Greenville quartet. IOWA SENATOR
GIVES REMEDY
FOR FARMERS

Enactment of Railroad Measure as part of Relief Program Recommended by Brookhart.

Washington, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Enactment of a railroad consolidation measure as part of the farm relief program was advocated today by Senator Brookhart, of Iowa, in a statement issued in behalf of the group of western independent Republican Senators.

"The farm problem," he said, "cannot be solved by the mere enactment of a farm bill. There is no single farm bill that is a cure-all for all the discriminations against agriculture. About 10 per cent of the farmers' troubles are due to excess charges for transportation."

The independents who favor the presidential candidacy of Senator Norris of Nebraska, one of their group, worked on plans today for spreading their views through the middle west by use of the radio.

Norman Baker, owner of a 10,000 watt broadcasting station at Muscatine, Iowa, has volunteered to erect a small station here by which to carry their messages to his station for re-broadcasting.

If the campaign is pushed into other states than Nebraska it seems destined to force a showdown between the farm forces led by Norris and Lowden, both advocates of the vetoed McNary-Haugen bill. Senator Borah of Idaho, one of Norris' chief supporters, voted against this measure but in reply to the criticism of him by the St. Louis farm conference yesterday he asked that "friends of agriculture be not misled." He also called on the conference to name its candidates.

Sensor Brookhart proposed a bill requiring railroads to consolidate by condemnation of their stocks and bonds, providing for their operation in a "little private corporation, earnings of which would be fixed by law, with power in Congress to recapture the stock at a par."

The Iowa Senator declared that American farmers received about 15 cents a bushel less for their wheat crops than Canadian farmers because of railroad rate discriminations.

"The American farmer," he said, "is compelled to pay a transportation tax of 15 cents per bushel on wheat to the railroads in the United States for their so-called efficient private management, from which the Canadian farmer is relieved by the government operated roads in his country."

Diet and Senate Dissolved

Warsaw, Nov. 3.—(AP)—The Polish Diet and Senate were dissolved today by vice-Premier Bartel, amidst a great uproar to prevent the opposition from airing its dissatisfaction with the government's policies.

PROBE EFFORT
TO INTERFERE
WITH OIL JURY

Court Officials Defer Sending Members to Grand Jury Before Tomorrow.

Washington, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Ratifications of the grand jury investigation of charges of efforts to tamper with the Fall-Sinclair oil conspiracy jury spread today with increasing rapidity.

New paths into which the inquiry led caused court officials to defer until tomorrow sending the dismissed members of the trial jury before the grand jurors, but district attorney Peton Gordon and some of his assistants conferred with eleven of the jurors for more than an hour.

A surprise witness before the grand jury was Mark B. Thompson, of New Mexico, one of counsel for Albert B. Fall, who has a co-defendant with Harry F. Sinclair in the trial which ended so sensationally yesterday when Justice Siddons cleared the jury box. Thompson said he had not been summoned. He was taken into the jury room by Neil Burkishaw, assistant district attorney dire litchneattatreat attorney directing the investigation.

Fall, who leased the Teapot Dome naval reserve to Sinclair the act which brought the indictment of the two in a statement issued on his own behalf yesterday, had denied any knowledge of the action of Burns charges made efforts to obtain contact with the jurors for Sinclair.

On leaving the grand jury room, Thompson said he had been questioned about a telephone call which he made one evening during the trial to Daniel Jackson, an assistant United States attorney general. He said he and Jackson had been friends for many years, but he could not disclose what he had told the grand jury.

Edward J. Kidwell, slender, stocky haired juror number eleven, also went again before the inquisitorial body to refute further charges made by a street car conductor and newspaper reporter and that he freely discussed the case against the courts orders and expressed the hope of soon having an automobile "as long as this corpse."

His composure somewhat restored after the thrilling events of yesterday when he became the center of blinding light of publicity after Justice Siddons declared the mistrial Kidwell showed up at the district of Columbia supreme court with his father Edward J. Kidwell, Sr. proprietor of a barber shop.

A. Mason Day, vice president of the Sinclair Exportation Co., to whom the government charges the detectives shadowing the jury made their report at the home of Donald Woodward, wealthy Washington merchant, also was at the court house. He refused to answer additional questions yesterday before the grand jury on the ground that his testimony might tend to incriminate him.

Day has long been in Sinclair's service and has been entrusted with many missions both in this country and abroad. He was in the northeast soon after the war seeking oil concessions there at the time that rear admiral Chester obtained petroleum rights in that corner of the world.

When Day finally taken before the Grand Jury again, he remained but a few minutes, being excused until the afternoon session. It was stated at the district attorney's office that he probably would be taken before one of the trial justices and there asked the same questions which he refused to answer before the Grand Jury.

In the usual course of court procedure this would be preliminary to the hearing of him before a United States Commissioner, where a formal complaint would be lodged. It was said that Day was prepared to furnish bond in that event.

Besides Thompson Kidwell and Day, C. G. Ruddy, chief of the Burns operations assigned to watch the jury, and other of the Burns detectives were on hand by invitation of the district attorney's office. Some of them already have been examined by the Grand Jury.

Justice Siddons is expected to entertain tomorrow a motion for a new trial for Sinclair and Fall with the date to be fixed probably in January. It had first been intended to present the motion today but defense counsel asked for more adequate notice.

There was some speculation as to whether there would be serious difficulty in obtaining a new jury in view of the dramatic events attending the first effort to try the former interior secretary and the wealthy oil operator and sports man.

Lawyers explained that a change of venue could not be asked for by either side under District of Columbia's statutes.

NEW HEAD OF MAJOR LEAGUE TAKES OFFICE

Chicago, Nov. 3.—(AP)—In vivid contrast to the beginning of his predecessor's long reign, Ernest Sargent Barnard today started his first year as president and treasurer of the American League surrounded by friendship, co-operation and prosperity.

Unlike the former "czar" of the junior circuit, Barn Johnson, who renovated a poorly playing Western League into the American League in 1900 at a salary of \$5,000 a year and amidst threats of ruin from the haughty National League, Barnard began office with three year contract at a salary understood to be \$40,000 a year and with the well wishes of those who control professional baseball in America.

When Johnson and his circle of adventures started the American League it was the National Circuit that owned the bigger parks and the contract of a baseball's greatest salaries. Today the American League sports the largest parks, the world championship and probably greatest drawing card since baseball began—Babe Ruth.

Like Johnson, the new president is a former Ohio newspaper sports editor and, in accepting the league presidency after a unanimous vote by the league's board of directors yesterday, Barnard promised to adhere to the "czar's" general principles.

"The American League has a rich inheritance in the high ideals created for it by a great leader," he said, "and the organization must keep these ideals constantly in mind as a guide to the successful conduct of its affairs. The rise of the American League to its present strength and influence has been largely due to Mr. Johnson's demand for clean, sportsmanlike conduct on the playing field and his vigorous handling of every situation that menaced the integrity of the sport. I have always been in thorough accord with these principles and as long as I am head of the American League there will be no change in this general policy."

The new president is 53 years old and a former football coach. He

went to the Cleveland baseball club as secretary in March 1903, and has since been with the organization, vice president, business manager and, finally, president.

SPORTS SLANTS

(Associate Press Sports Editor)
New York, Nov. 3.—(AP)—"Bleacher Bosses" and "Alumni Advisers" have their places in the merry whirl of sports, it seems, whether their suggestions are desired or not.

They may be a bit more conspicuous just now but the Ohio State Alumni criticisms of the football coaching methods of Dr. John W. Wilce are not a novelty. Most every coach of a college eleven, large or small, can offer evidence of being "put on the pan" at one time or another when the fortunes of his teams failed to meet expectations of enthusiastic alumni.

"We all want to win," one prominent football authority said recently. "There is no use beating around the bush on that. It is true of undergraduates as well as alumni, coaches and athletic officials as well as academic leaders. There is constant pressure to develop a winner but the thing that always seems unfair is to criticize a coach hastily for two or three defeats. To condemn a system or demand that heads be chopped off without full knowledge of circumstance on the other hand, it wouldn't be football without the alumni advisors."

Baseball probably has as many volunteer bosses as football. The Boston Braves no sooner released Dave Bancroft to Brooklyn than several dozen experts jumped up to suggest managerial successors. Similarly, at least ten names have been put forward for the job of piloting the Cleveland Indians in next year's American League race.

It sometimes happens, however, that the "Bleacher Boss" is given a warmed welcome than the "alumni advisor." John McGraw once remarked that he was always glad to get fan suggestions on the theory that some of them would be of actual benefit, bringing out points

that were occasionally overlooked on the field.

There were a number of volunteers and spectacular suggestions for replacing the veteran Ban Johnson as president of the American League but the magnates rejected them all in selecting from their own ranks Edward Sargent Barnard, of Cleveland, who has grown up with the game much as did the man he succeeds.

For a time the names of such nationally prominent men as George Wharton Pepper, of Pennsylvania, and Mayor James J. Walker, of New York, were widely discussed, at fantastic \$100,000 a year salary figures but it now appears these suggestions may also be laid to bleachers.

DAY MEANS

President Coolidge yesterday very properly issued a proclamation urging the citizens throughout the nation to observe November 11, Armistice Day. It is to be regretted that for the last few years the significance of Armistice Day has apparently dwindled until the stage has been reached that many ask: "What does Armistice Day mean?"

Doubtless this question has occurred, at some time, to every one in the country which engaged in the World War, without a satisfactory or conclusive answer being forthcoming:

But after all is said and done, it is to be found that Armistice Day (November 11) is to the people of the United States, a combined Fourth of July and Thanksgiving Day—Fourth of July for the freedom it brought from the militaristic Prussian ambition and war machine; Thanksgiving Day, that gave to the war torn world surcease from a great

bloody struggle, that costs millions of lives as well as millions of dollars.

The signing of the terms of the Armistice, which took place almost eight years ago did not end the war so completely as the average layman contemplates; it only ended armed hostilities, for even today war deaths, that is deaths caused by military service during the World War, daily occur, and the ranks of khaki grow thinner with each setting sun. Further, thousands who wore the uniform in 1917 to 1919, are now totally or partially physically disabled and incapacitated, with additional thousands confined to beds in the various hospitals throughout this country, suffering an awful lingering death from shell shock, battle wounds, tuberculosis and other diseases induced by their service to Our Country. What of them? Did the signing of the Armistice end the war for them? It never did, and the pain racked bodies of these disabled veterans are mute testimony that the war continues, and ever will 'til the last of these heroes are returned to the dust from which they came, and gave to their country and Our Country so noble and heroic service.

It is then in remembrance of the heroic dead, the brave sufferers, and the many close ties formed during the War, that the still able veterans join and ask that all the people of the nation join in the proper observance of Armistice Day.

When on November 11th, 1918, there was messaged from Europe to the world that the gigantic struggle

was ended, the members of the Army and Navy drew a deep breath and stood filled with wonder, and the men on the battle fronts slumped as in a stupor, by their guns, or in their trenches and dug-outs—the terrific physical and mental strain was ended. And the men and women of commerce, of business, they, too, paused, filled with the thoughts of safety that was now theirs, only to arouse with an entire forgetfulness of their fellow man who had made the supreme sacrifice, or was returning to the United States physically incapacitated, or financially handicapped by reason of the service they had unselfishly rendered to the nation? And these self-same beings of forgetfulness, as Armistice Day approaches each year and the veterans begin to plan its observance, in an abstracted manner ask: What's it all about? Why observe such a day? Cannot the boys forget the War? Why don't the boys drop this stuff, for surely it does not mean anything to us? And in spite of the music of the band and the tramp, tramp of the marching feet of the men, they once proudly called and hailed as patriots and defenders, these forgetters keep their employees on the job and their businesses open, bargaining and haggling for the dollars, while the able and disabled boys of 1917 are marching onward to the grave and a still greater forgetfulness.

In no way can the people who did not serve in the Army and Navy during the World War, show better their appreciation of the service rendered by the

boys in khaki of 1917, than by laying aside their every day affairs on each and every Armistice Day, and join in the proper observance and celebration of such a day. It would most assuredly make the boys of 1917 feel that after all, they had not performed their duties and services in vain, but that the folks of the United States still remembered and were appreciative.

"Mr. Bulwinkle is well known in this section of the State. He is not only a politician of ability, but has won considerable recognition as a public speaker. Greenville people would do well to take advantage of hearing this distinguished man tell of the wonderful part which American soldiers played in winning the greatest war the world has ever known."

NEGRO DRAW TERM IN PENN

Several Road Sentences Also Marked Yesterday's Session of Criminal Court.

Edward Wilson, colored, charged with larceny was sentenced to not less than five nor more than six years in the penitentiary by Judge C. C. Lyon, of Elizabethtown, in yesterday's session of the criminal term of Pitt county Superior court.

Wilson was one of the eight negroes who broke jail here last week. The larceny charge resulted from robbery of Laughinghouse's store, a few miles from this city, shortly after the escape from jail had been effected.

Will Johnson, colored, drew a total of 24 months on the county roads on a charge of breaking jail and larceny. He received twelve months on each charge.

James Hardee, colored, charged with manufacturing liquor, was sentenced to eight months on the roads.

Oris Daniel, colored, charged with manufacturing whiskey, drew ten months on the roads.

Roy Sumrell, driving a car while drunk, paid a fine of \$100 and cost of action and was ordered not to drive a car again within the next twelve months.

George James, colored, was given a suspended sentence of 12 months on the county roads on a charge of unlawful possession of whiskey. Council Leggett, white, charged with driving an automobile while under the influence of whiskey, paid a fine of \$50 and cost and was ordered not to drive a car again within the next 12 months.

Marines Still Fight Bandits In Nicaragua

Managua, Nicaragua, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Continuing their search for two missing marine corps aviators, a combined combat patrol of United States marines and national guardsmen have fought two more engagements with Nicaraguan irregulars, in which sixty of the guerrillas were killed or wounded. One marine was wounded when cut by flying glass from a bomb hurled by the bandits and two guardsmen were killed.

Combat patrols have been searching the region near El Chipote, province of Nueva Segovia, ever since second Lt. E. A. Thomas and Sergeant Frank Dowdell engaged in bombing followers of the rebel General Augusto Sandina, crashed in their plane and disappeared early in October. Although no trace of the missing flyers has been discovered, hope that they are still alive continues here and the search for them is being actively pushed by combat patrols in northwestern Nicaragua. There have been frequent encounters between the bandits and these patrols.

Not In Favor of Hearing on Taxes

Asheville, Nov. 3.—(A)—Criticism of the holding of tax reduction hearings by the Ways and Means Committee of the National House of Representatives and of the proposed holding of hearings by the House committee before Congress convenes December 5, was voiced by representative Zebulon Weaver here today on his return from Washington.

"These committees do not exist," Weaver said. "The 69th Congress has passed out of existence and the 70th has not yet been organized."

It is necessary to take early action on major legislative problems why didn't President Coolidge call Congress into extra session before December 5 so that solution of these problems could be arrived at in a legal manner?

"When Congress convenes its members will be asked to consider with only a few hours debate bills formulated by groups not authorized to draft them."

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Can Burn Books But Decides Not To At Present

Chicago, Nov. 3.—(AP)—Mayor Thompson has replied to a suit for an injunction restraining him or his subordinates from destroying pro-British books of the Chicago public library with the remark: "I can burn the books, but I won't."

Chief among the contentions set forth in the Mayor's reply, which will be filed in the form of a demurrer before circuit court Judge Fisher today, were the following:

Citizens do not have right to unrestricted use of books in the public library.

The right to decide what publications shall be received into the public library or removed therefrom is reserved to the directors of the library board, and may not be interfered with by injunction.

The Mayor has the right to investigate or cause to be investigated any public institution.

No injunction can be issued against the defendants to restrain them from destroying any books or having them destroyed.

The suit for injunction to prevent destruction of library volumes was filed by attorney J. Kentner Elliott, following a threat by library trustee W. J. (Sport) Hermann to seize alleged pro-British texts and have them burned on the lake front by the public hang man.
